COMMISSION ER DISCUSSES TAX

State Officer Gives Out Extracts From Annual Report-Complains of Land Monopoly.

A special to the Dallas News from Austin sets out some important extracts from the forthcoming annual report of Land Commissioner Robison. He complains of the what he pleases to term, "Land Monopoly," ask some pertinent questions as to the tax systems. Among other things, he discusses the early grants under the Republic, the later grants under the State, loan agencies and land He calls attention to the fact that Texas has fostered the large acreage of land borons and suggests that they could well afford to give away to actual settlers 160 acres out of each section. In a closing paragraph he has some profound questions which are along the same line as has been discussed in the Brand regarding taxation. All of the questions are under the general bead of "What of the Future," and are as follows:

"WHAT OF THE FUTURE?"

Since our Government guarantees protection in property rights it can not now compel one to alienate what has been acquired heretofore. Then what of the future?

Would it be wise to limit the amount of money or other property that one may acquire legitmately?

Would it be wise to restrict one's privilege of investing legitmate earnings in land either by purchase direct or through a loan?

Would it be wise to limit specifically the land acreage one may acquire in the future?

Would a tax on land alone tend to increase one's desire to sell the land, and, if so, would such tax tend to decrease another's desire to purchase it?



> Five Per Cent of Texas Area Planted to Cotton.

Washington, D. C., Oct. 10-A report issued today by the Federal Department of Agriculture shows only 5 per cent of the total area of Texas is planted to cotton yet that state produces 21 per cent of the tetal production of the world's sup ply of this staple. There are 10,-927,000 acres planted to this product in the Lone Star State this year which is a decrease under last year of 223,000 acres or 2 per cent. Georgia, which ranks second as cotton producing state has 11.2 per cent of her total area planted to this product and only furnishes 11 per cent of the world's supply.



"It occurs to be wrong to me to see one school of say eighty pupils shown in the scholastic census, but where only fifty attend, receive the same amount of money where sixtyfive or seventy of the eighty enrolled attend," Professor Abbott declares. "I believe in putting a premium upon the interest taken in the school and I think a change to this effect would bring about a decided improvement. All patrons are anxious to see their schools get the largest amount of money, and if the plan I suggest could be carried into effect, many parents who now permit their children to go off rabbit hunting, or into some other form of diversion instead of attending school would see that these children attend school regularly."

Favors Change in School Law.

THE writer advocated a change in the apportionment rules last summer while traveling over the 123rd district, but not exactly as Supt. Abbott would have it. While each county apportionment should, no doubt, be based upon attendance each school in the county should be taught the same number of months. Thus a school with 25 pupils would be taught the same number of months as a school with 50 pupils or a school with 75 pupils. The framers of the State Constitution contemplated that all children should have the same school education, when they wrote in that instrument that the public schools should be supported for a County Superintendent R L. Ab- period of not less than six months of each year. The state has never provided sufficient funds for this length of term, because the same clause limits the amount of ad valorem tax for this purpose, but the towns and districts have provided additional funds by local taxation. A better plan than the present system of apportionment would be to divide the state funds among the different counties in direct proportion to the average attendance of the several counties. Thus, if a county has 5,000 pupils, but with an average attendance of only 3,000, then that county should be paid only for 3,000 pupils. An example of how this would work. Fannin county in 1908 had 8,305 scholastic census, but only 6,747 enrollment. The average attendance was even less than this, possibly 5,000. Washington county had 8,887 in the census, but only 4,906 enrolled in the schools with a possible 3,000 average attendance. Now both of these populous counties had practically the same number in the scholastic census, but Fannin county patrons kept 5,000 of their children in school while Washington had only 3,000 in theirs. Then, instead of dividing the funds about equal between these two counties, the division should be on the basis of 5 to 3. In the year mentioned, Washington received \$59,000 and Fannin received \$56,-000 from the State; an average of \$12.20 for each pupil enrolled in the Washington schools and only \$8.30 for Fannin. If the apportionment has been based upon average attend-ance instead on the census, Fannin

would have received \$72,000 and



Washington \$43,000. The write believes that the county is the whit of state apportionment and that it should be based upon the average attendance. As claimed by Supt. Abbott this would certainly put all of the schools in the county on the metal for a good average attendance. Then the county school board could have all the schools of the county taught the same number of months. While the term would vary somewhat in the different countries, in those communities where the people appreciated an education, the good attendance would be awarded.
