## THE NEWSPAPERS AND JOHNSTON

An Epitome of Editorial Comment Upon the Appointment of Houston Man to Succeed Junior Senator.

That many Texas editors are not pleased with the action of Governor Colquitt in appointing Col. R. M. Johnston as the successor of the Junior Senator is in strong evidence from the following extracts clipped from the newspapers. The general opinion is that as Mr. Sheppard was the choice of the Democrats of the state by an overwhelming majority, the Governor has ignored the party and has run rough shod over the results of the Primary to please a few political friends and to award Col. Johnston for his attack upon the standard bearers of National and State Democracy:

Hall Co. Herald (Senator Johnson editor).—The naming of R. M. Johnson of Houston for U. S. senator by Gov. Colquitt in place of Morris Sheppard, who was entitled to the place, was nothing more nor less than a slap in the face of the people of Texas. It was done for the purpose of putting Johnston in the race six years from now against Sheppard. It is now believed by all well posted men that Colquitt is to contest for Culberson's seat four years hence and Johnston will make the race for Sheppard's place.

Memphis Democrat.—Senator Joseph W. Bailey tendered his resignation Friday, and it seems that R. M. Johnston is stated to fill his unexpired term regardless of the wishes of all Texas, whose choice was Morris Sheppard. We hardly think Colquitt will appoint Johnston under the present conditions, but if he does, he had just as well "sew up" and quit politics. Our people have expressed their desire to have Sheppard succeed Bailey, and as Sheppard has expressed himself as being willing to fill the unexpired term in case Bailey should resign, we think he is justly entitled to it. If Colquitt should appoint Johnston, it will then be up to the coming Legislature to do the right thing and veto the appointment.

Hall Co. Herald.—Some of the partizan friends of R. M. Johnston lay much stress upon the fact that for a quarter of a century he has stood by the democratic party and assisted to fight its battles. Surely that is by no means strange, and we cannot see how he could have even expected to do otherwise. He was placed in charge of a democratic newspaper, and as such, with a democratic patronage exclusively he could not well have done otherwise. There are hundreds of democratic editors in Texas who have done the same thing and more. Col. Johnston has not always been so well grounded in his support of democracy. When Col. Bryan has been the democratic nominee Col. Johnston, although the democratic committee man for Texas, has invariably pulled into his shell and sulked. We have now to only refer to a very recent occasion when he refused to recognize democratic duties. Texas has gone overwhelmingly for Gov. Wilson and a solid Wilson delegation chose to the Baltimore convention. This delegation appealed to Col. Johnston not to force Judge Parker down their throats for temporary chairman of that convention,

because he was an ultra stand-patter. We submit that no such man should now be placed in the seat of honor by Texas progressive democracy. We doubt very much his election by the legislature.

Stratford Star.—Hon. C. Herbert Walker, representative from 125th Representative District, said today in reference to the appointment of Hon. R. M. Johnston of Houston to succeed Senator J. W. Bailey in the Senate: "I will vote for the election of Hon. Morris Sheppard when that matter shall come before the House for action. I believe that in doing so I will vote the desires of the Democracy of my district and the Democracy of the State of Texas. The only standard of action for a Representative, charged with the duty of voting the desires of a people, is to vote and support those desires as best they can be ascertained from previous elections, and I fully believe that Morris Sheppard is the one man in Texas who is desired by the people for that place."

Quanah Observer.—Senator J. W. Bailey has resigned from the United States Senate and Gov. Colquitt immediately appointed Col. R. M. Johnston of the Houston Post, to fill out the unexpired term. Col. Johnston was in Washington the following morning so as to be on the job as soon as the Senate was convened that noon. No doubt Col. Johnston will make a capable senator, and it is too bad that Mr. Bailey didn't resign two years ago so Mr. Johnston could have had a fair chance to show his capabilities; then we would have had more work and less wind jamming and gallery oratory.

### Forty-Second Wedding Anniversary

One of the most pleasant surprises that ever occurred in that community was the celebration of the forty-second wedding anniversary of Mr. and Mrs. J. Tice, whose home is a few miles southeast of Hereford. This event was on last Sunday. No thought of the recurring event was had, except to mention the fact to each other in the early morning. About ten o'clock, however, they saw buggies, carriages and automobiles coming towards their home, but still they could not make out just what it all meant. When the company arrived, over fifty in number, their surprise was complete. The couple was told that the neighbors had come in to help them celebrate their wedding anniversary. The good neighbors had not only brought themselves, but they had brought their baskets filled with every palatable viand of the land, and after the good women had busied themselves for a few minutes, a feast was spread that no king and queen could have honored more. The fat of the land was there, and everything that could tempt the appetite was home-grown and home-made, except the sugar and coffee. Three kinds of meat, jellies, preserves and fruits, pickles and relishes, and a lot of other good things went in to make up the menu.

Mr. and Mrs. Tice were married January, 1871, and before they moved to this country lived at Redfield, Iowa. To their union have been born three sons. One of the sons and his family, Chancy Tice, lives with the parents. There is a son in Montana and one in South Dakota. When this good family moved to Texas, 4 years ago, they came to establish their full citizenship and to become one with the people here. How well they have

done this will be known when all their neighbors say that the family has gained the full confidence and friendship of every one with whom they have become acquainted. They have never complained of conditions in their new surroundings; they have learned to endure the privations and sometimes disappointments incident to the development of a new country. But now they are fully identified with the people and are considered one of the community's best families. This neighborly celebration serves only to show in what esteem they are held and also how the Texas people treat their new neighbors. ## MCDONALD CO. AT LUBBOCK

Hereford Company to Drill and Install Big Irrigation Well Near South Plains Town.

(From Lubbock Avalanche.)

Greater interest is centering in the irrigation question at this time than has ever been known in the Lubbock country. New wells are being put down and new plants will be installed. These wells are in the hands of people who know the irrigation business from A to Z. The new plants of L. O. Burford and Jno. W. Wortham are being installed under a guarantee to accomplish what the well and pumpage machinery people claim they will do, and what they claim for their plants is sufficient to guarantee a crop far in excess of the best ever produced on the South Plains under the system of "dry farming," which means something "worth while."

The well on Mr. Burford's place will be completed and ready for the machinery within a few days and no delay is anticipated in the installation of the plant.

The test well on the Wortham farm east of Lubbock about 8 miles will be completed this week at a depth of 250 feet, which is what the contract calls for. This is the ordinary sized well and was drilled merely to get a "log" of the well. The well for the main plant will be the largest ever drilled in the country, 27 inches in diameter. The McDonald Company of Hereford has the contract to drill the big well and install the machinery for this plant, and he has had the necessary experience along this line to insure success.

### Western National Directors Meet.

The stock holders of the Western National Bank of Hereford met in the directors' room of their building on last Monday and transacted the business usually to come become such meetings. The directors then held a meeting and all of the old officers were re-elected: G. A. F. Parker, President; J. L. Smith, Vice President; A. J. Lipscomb, Cashier; John W. Sherman, Assistant Cashier. The bank has issued a letter to its friends and customers in which this fact is stated: That in the ten years this bank has been in business, every vote taken by the stock holders and directors has been an unanimous one. This certainly speaks well for the institution and the officers are but modest when they tell their friends about it.

### Good Lecture.

Dr. Wesley Gaines gave Hereford lyceum attendants a wholesome lecture at the high school building Tuesday night. From beginning to end, he held the attention of the audience by his flights of imagery, his flashes of wit and his thrusts of satire. Mr. Gaines is a rapid speaker and sustains himself well in a two-hour talk. He never hesitates nor hunts for something to say. His word pictures are vivid as the actualities, his humor as pure as the dew drop. As a platform character he has his own peculiarities, but these are rather to his advantage. The entire lecture "New Wine in New Bottles" was well received.

### Not Forty Feet of Snow Nor 35 Degrees Below Zero.

### Two Kinsmen of F. H. Brittain Killed.

Word has been received here by Mr. Brittain that his nephew, Eldon Brittain, 27 years old, was killed at Sherman, Texas, last week. He was foreman of a county road working gang and a discharged negro shot him with a double barrel gun. A telegram from J. C. Mauk of Fort Stockton brings another sad story of the death of W. W. Brittain, a half brother, who was killed at that place.

A dispatch to the Record says:

Fort Stockton, Jan. 13.—W. W. Brittain, a highly respected citizen, was waylaid, robbed and murdered, while coming to town on horseback last night, about three miles southwest of Fort Stockton. He was shot three times with a pistol, twice in the head and once in the body. No clew as to who perpetrated the deed has been found. He leaves a wife and two children. Sheriff Barker has offered \$1,000 reward for the arrest and conviction of the slayer.

## IRRIGATION WELL AT FRIONA

Capitol Syndicate Concern Has Pumper Installed on Tract of Land for Demonstration.

Garrett A. Dobbins, land commissioner for the X-I-T Ranch, was all smiles Tuesday when he dropped into the Brand office and he began at once to tell how he was the proud father of the newest irrigation well on the Plains of Texas. "You should have seen Dr. W. A. Pitman, the pump expert and general manager of the Crescent Pump Co., of Fort Worth, when we got everything hooked up and ready for the start," he said. "The Muncie 20 H-P oil burner engine was started at 6 o'clock last Wednesday evening and we didn't let up until 2 a. m. the following morning," he continued. "The water began to flow in 10 seconds after the juice was injected and it continued with an increase until all of us were tired out and ready to hunt a bed. The next day and the next the pumping was kept up, and the test was entirely satisfactory," he said.

The well is located on a tract of 160 acres near Friona, Texas, on the south side of the Santa Fe tracks as the approach is made from the north. The entire depth of the well is 400 feet; water was found at 120 feet; the 7 inch, 7 foot cylinder is at 153 feet. The pump has a stroke of 21 inches and 38 strokes per minute are made during the test. The capacity of the cylinder is 8 gallons per stroke. This would give 304 gallons per minute. The water discharged measured 3 inches over a 20-inch standard weir, and nearly one million gallons was pumped during the test. A good deal of sand was pumped out with the water for the first few days, but this is good for the development of the well. Near the pump house, Mr. Dobbins has had a large reservoir built. Water will be pumped into this during the night and at times when the water is not needed on the crops. The demonstration attracted a lot of attention. All Friona and the neighborhood was out to see the big pumper "brought in." Both Mr. Pitman and Mr. Dobbins were proud of their good job. The crops to be planted under this pumping next spring will be watched with interest, and if it proves practical, there will be a hundred more of such wells.

Even his bitterest enemies admit that few men have been so well acquainted with the fundamental principals of government as Senator Bailey and few men in this age have rendered so great service to their country.

Quanah Tribune-Chief—Joe Bailey delivered his farewell address the other day, and his friends are now wondering how the United States and the world will be able to rock along without this sonorous gentleman. That the ex-senator shares this opinion is not to be doubted, but the great majority of Texans, we believe, will not greatly worry over the future on account of his departure from public life. During his long political career, Bailey has never given proof of a single act of constructive statesmanship. The best law and statutes we have were passed over his opposition, and the men who mostly grieve over Bailey's retirement are the men the American people have a right to look upon as their worst enemies; wholesale poisoners, whiskey barons and other spawns of the trusts. May the Lord deliver Texas from such brilliant servants whose talents can be exploited by the worst elements in the county!

**ADAM'S SIN PUNISHED**  
THE DEATH-CURSE.

Genesis 3—Jan. 19.  
"Every one that committeth sin is the bond-servant of sin.—John 8:34.

**A**DAM'S first sin brought the penalty specified in this lesson. The Bible proposition is that God, having made Adam perfect, required perfect obedience as the condition of everlasting life. One act of disobedience broke the covenant between God and Adam. (Hosea 6:7, Margin.) Immediately he dropped from favor, under the sentence, "Dying, thou shalt die." Nothing that Adam or his children could do subsequently could recover covenant relationship with God. The death penalty was the limit.

By the law of heredity, Adam transmitted to his race a share of what he possessed, good and bad. As Adam could not increase his penalty, neither can his children. But as Adam could, by obedience to the Divine Law, prolong the process of his dying, so may his children. But the impairment wrought by sin has so progressed that many of Adam's children die in infancy, and few maintain the struggle for existence for a hundred years.

**Death the Curse—Not Torture.**  
Our forefathers during the Dark Ages misunderstood the Heavenly Father's character and Plan. Misunderstanding the Bible to teach that God arranged for the eternal torture of all except the Church, they sought to copy their misconception of Jehovah by torturing their fellow-creatures. Because God's people have been gradually getting back to the teaching of His Word, the horrible practices of the past are no longer approved. 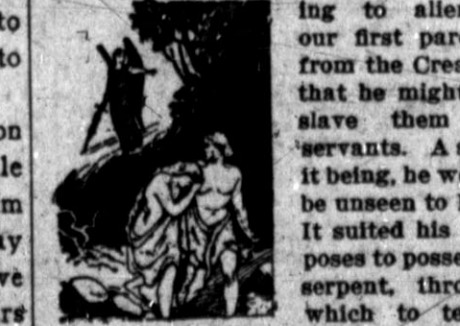

**Found Ancestor of Modern Wheat.**

The alluring prospect that some day—and that not long distant—vast areas of so-called desert lands in the west may be converted into richly productive wheat fields was held forth yesterday by Aaron Aaronsohn. He delivered an address at a luncheon given in his honor by Julius Rosenwald at the Blackstone hotel. Mr. Aaronsohn is the discoverer of "wild" wheat. As head of the Jewish agricultural experiment station in Haifa, Palestine, he is conducting a work which is not only of value practically but is regarded by scientists as of immense importance biologically and historically.

**DISCOVER WHEAT'S "WILD" ANCESTOR.**

The discovery that American domesticated wheat had an existing "wild" ancestor was announced through scientific journals some time ago and created a sensation. It had been supposed the prototype of the cereal had long since been exterminated in the course of natural selection. The most interesting part of Mr. Aaronsohn's talk had to do with experiments that have been made in Palestine with this "wild" ancestor. In this connection Mr. Aaronsohn ventured the prediction that species may be developed which can be grown profitably in places where no vegetation exists at all now. In the experiments at Haifa eighteen varieties of wild wheat have already been developed. These are adapted to varying soil conditions and climates. Eventually, he hopes, a plant may be evolved which, possessing all the food values of domesticated wheat, may still preserve the ancestor's hardihood.

**GROWS IN ROCKY SOIL.**

"I found my first wild wheat plant," said Mr. Aaronsohn, "growing in a crevice of a rock in a vineyard in Palestine. It was in four inches of soil. Later I discovered that it was indigenous to all of the subhumid regions from the water's edge to the borders of the mountain snow fields. It grows naturally in a rocky or alkaline soil. It is immune to practically all of the diseases of domesticated wheat, particularly rust and other fungus diseases."

Mr. Aaronsohn's belief that the plant can be developed until it has a tremendous commercial value is based on what his investigations have led him to believe is its history.

"Before the discovery of the prototype," he said, "it was the scientific theory that the plant from which wheat had its beginnings had become extinct centuries ago. It was supposed to have been an inconspicuous weed which prehistoric man gradually had developed into its present high efficiency as a food producer. I could not agree with this theory because I could not conceive how our uncivilized ancestors should have had the shrewdness to select this one particular, inconspicuous plant for cultivation. This forced upon me the conclusion that the prototype of wheat must be a plant not only conspicuous in its appearance, but of a utility so obvious that even aborigines could not have overlooked it. This was what led to the discovery."

**SAYS NOMADS USED SEEDS.**

"My idea of the history of the plant is that these ancestors of ours, being nomads, carried the seed of this wheat about with them, sowing in the spring in one spot, going on, and coming back in the fall to harvest. The plant grows practically without cultivation. From this beginning developed the present highly degenerate plant which is the foundation of all our civilization. My explorations in Palestine have had the effect of confirming this theory. I find the plant growing in its native state everywhere the desert nomads were wont to travel.

"There is a corollary to this

proposition that is intensely interesting to historians. It has long been the belief that the human race had its origin either in the valley of the Euphrates or along the fertile reaches of the Nile. But if look for the spot where man originated we must also look for the place where wheat—the main item of his bill of fare—had its natural habitat. This habitat is not in Egypt or along the Euphrates, but in Palestine and Mesopotamia. Apparently the human race had its beginnings there and from there man's migrations started."

**Newspaper Obituary.**

The Lubbock Avalanche writes a tearful (?) dead piece about its namesake, the Tulia Avalanche. No doubt, Editor Dow has long since learned that "it takes money and brains to run a newspaper," but has seen that any man who had a little money but few brains could start a second newspaper in any sort of a town, but that he would soon lose the money as well as his mind if he continued long. Read what the Lubbock Avalanche slides over the Tulia Avalanche:

"The Tulia Avalanche is dead. Tulia people certainly have been burdened with newspaper funerals for the past three years. They have been called upon to donate to the burial expenses of several during that period of time. This goes to show very conclusively that there is no sense or ordinary business judgment in having two newspapers in a small town, and when we say a small town, we do not mean that class of towns with a thousand population and under alone, but we mean towns of less than seven or eight thousand population. Less people than that cannot support more than one paper, without unnecessary drain on their finances. There is no use to add to your advertising expenses by encouraging a second newspaper into a one newspaper town. Our town, too, has a small graveyard, wherein lies the remains of several newspaper ventures, and sometimes we feel like it is not far in the distance when we too, will be numbered among the headstones that dot that lonely field, especially when we see the numbers and numbers of orders for stationery going to the foreign houses, when we could do the very same work as neatly and oft times better. One well supported newspaper, alive and active in the work of up-building the town and helping the community in which it is published, is as far better than two half-starved and dead papers. The Avalanche can never be accused of not doing its best for the advancement of the best interests of the city and county surrounding Lubbock. True, we have made mistakes. The editor has that much human in his anatomy. We cannot please everybody, we would be absolutely worthless to any community, and not fit to move in decent society if we did, but we at all times try to be fair and consistent in our business relations. The Avalanche is for a bigger and better Lubbock and if it takes another newspaper to make it a bigger and better town, we would be in favor of its starting tomorrow, but unlike other lines of business, the fewer the better—the subject of this article is proof. The Tulia Avalanche is dead. Why? Because in the first place it was not needed. In the second place the town is not big enough to justify it."

The Randall Co. News also comments thusly:

Tulia is again with only one paper, the Avalanche having thrown up its hands in despair last week and quit the job. Tulia has been the fighting ground for several years of two newspapers. A half dozen or more times a second paper has been started and died before it had published a dozen weeks. There are in the world many fools who think that a town of less than 5,000 will support two newspapers, but they always go broke bucking the game.

**COLQUITT CALLS CONFERENCE OF CHARITIES AND CORRECTIONS.**

Austin, Texas, January—Governor O. B. Colquitt has called a State conference of Charities and Corrections to meet at Austin Tuesday and Wednesday, January 28th and 29th, to consider measures which will have been submitted to the Legislature up to that time, and other measures which, in the opinion of the conference, should be submitted.

The delegates will be requested to present suggestions for legislation along the following lines:

- (1) State and County institutions, public and private eleemosynary and reformatory.
- (2) Public health and sanitation.
- (3) Welfare of Children.
- (4) Industrial Welfare of women.
- (5) Labor legislation (social aspects.)
- (6) General and miscellaneous subjects.

The Governor has invited a full and free discussion of the above subjects by the conference and will incorporate in a message to the Legislature such views as meet with his approval.

The movement comprehends the betterment of the social welfare of all the people, and the Governor is seeking the counsel of organizations engaged in promoting the public welfare.
