permitted to take more than this amount of work. "The Hereford School cannot lo cetain its affiliation if the above rule s violated, and very few, if any, accredited High Schools in Texas permit students to take more than five sub jects at one time, and only when they have made an average of 85 or 90 on each subject the preceding year are

they permitted to take as many as five

subjects. "In keeping with the above rule of the State Department and with the practices of first class high scho oyer the State, announcement is herei made that in order to keep its affiliation and its standing with other his schools the Hereford High School will have to limit the number of subjects taken by a pupil at one time to a maximum of five and this number cannot be permitted unless previous work will The state of the s

This rule is for the purpose of take ing care of the best interests of the students as individuals and for the best interests of the school as a whole, Few, if any, high school students can do lustice to themselves while taking more than five subjects at one time.

"This announcement is made at this time in order that some may possibly avail themselves of the opportunity to attend summer school if they can gradnate next year by taking one or two units of work during the summer.

FRUIT GROWING ON THE PLAINS OF TEXAS

(Copy of article furnished a horticulture Paper.)

The Plains of Texas is no longer a hunting ground for the Red Man, but is now the greatest agricultural and horticultural field in America. It is noted especially for its vast area of fertile soil, mild healthful climate, an abundance of pure water just under secretary, advisory committee, committhe surface, and its natural adaptation tee supply program in progress. for growing fruits, shades, vegetables, The Plains of Texas is also noted for its fields of waving grain, greenmendows and great herds of cattle. Space will prohibit telling of all of its wonderful resources, but many of the at the home of Charlie Hogge Friday. things that make life worth while, may be realized here.

Realizing then, that our own home country has such possibilities we hould avail ourselves of the opportunity that is before us. Since it falls my lot to be interested in tree growing. I shall give a few suggestions along this line, which may be of some use to you. The late blooming varieties of peaches, ms, pears, apples, cherries, grapes berries, etc., do best here. It is well to prepare your soil early. Prepare your ground like you would for a gar-Plow and harrow it twice; shallow the first time, and deeper the second time. If it is dry, the holes should be dug a month or two before planting time. Fill them nearly full of good rich soll and then flood them with water. This will make the soil in a live and active condition, which is necessary to good rooting and fast growing. Do not neglect to give the trees good watering several times when fresh transplanted. Also keep them cultivated. This will induce them to grow fast-er, and produce fruit of a larger and better quality.

After having specialized in promolmy and landscape gardening for thirtytwo years, and having tried out more than three hundred varieties of fruits, shades, etc., here, I find we are just beginning to unfold this line of develnent in this great productive field.
