Hereford Candidates Present Views

Managing Editor Eight candidates challenging for three at-large berths on the local school board and two men seeking the Place 2 city commission seat fielded questions before a crowd of around 70 interested citizens Thursday night as the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce sponsored a

"Meet The Candidates" night at the community center.

Justice of the Peace O.K. Neal moderated the meeting, at which city commission candidates Ed Coplen and Rumaldo Garcia provided their views on five questions submitted in written form by local individuals.

The eight school board candidates then gave their opinions on a variety of subjects ranging from federal aid, pairing, expansion of facilities, bilingual education, and overall qualifications of school board members.

Each of the 10 candidates was given the opportunity to make opening remarks after Hereford Mayor Bartley Dowell briefly explained the

Statements made by the candidates included the following remarks:

R.C. Hoelscher: "I feel I can help improve the school system. School is for the children...their education. I also feel we need more parent participation..."

Don T. Martin: "I feel that I need to be of service to be happy...and, I think I am qualified to serve on the school board with my experience in the education

Bill Townsend: "I am interested in the education of children, and its direction for my children and all children. I have worked with children for several years in various programs, and feel that the school system is very important in a business sense and needs people with business

sense to provide input..." James Self: "I think there are some problems, but overall we have a very fine school system. I am interested in the school system, and believe I can be an effec-

Polish Union Defies Troops, General Strike Threatened

Associated Press Writer WARSAW, Poland (AP) -The blare of factory whistles shattered Poland's labor peace today as the 10 millionmember Solidarity independent labor union staged a four-hour warning strike, defying Warsaw Pact troops and tanks maneuvering on the nation's borders.

'We don't want to overthrow the (Communist) party," national Solidarity leader Lech Walesa told striking workers at a steel mill near here. "We only want to get rid of the people putting the brakes on renewal."

Renewal is the word Poles have given to the economic and political reforms sought by Solidarity, the Communist bloc's first non-governmental trade union.

The strike began at 8 a.m. - 2 a.m. EST - and ended on schedule four hours later. But union officials have threatened a general - and openended - strike for next Tuesday if their demands are not met.

A Solidarity strike bulletin published today quoted Polish radio and television chief Stanislaw Balicki as

State House Trims **Interest Rate Limit**

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Interest rates on almost every kind of loan, except home mortgages, could "float" as high as 24 percent under a bill that passed the Texas House.

An 84-51 vote Thursday sent the bill to the Senate, where the sponsor thinks the House may have put the maximum interest rate too low for today's torrid money market.

The bill governs interest rates on department store installment sales and credit card unpaid balances as well as loans by banks, credit unions, savings and loan associations and consumer finance companies.

Associated Press Writer LOS ANGELES (AP) -Comedian Carol Burnett says her \$1.6 million victory in a libel suit against the National Enquirer "evens the score" and may teach the popular tabloid a lesson, but its editors say they don't plan to

change editorial policy. Miss Burnett, who sat in court throughout the trial, covered her face and began to cry when the jury announced its verdict Thursday.

"If they had given me a dollar plus carfare, I would have been happy," she said. "It was the principle. I feel like I've been pregnant for five years, and the baby is beautiful."

The verdict also cheered other celebrities who have suits pending against the weekly.

"Yippee!" said Jeff Wald. husband-manager of singer Helen Reddy, who is suing the Enquirer.

"I'm delighted for anyone who is attacked by publications like the Enquirer," said "Tonight Show" host Johnny Carson, whose televised attack against the Enquirer for an item about his marriage prompted the dismissal of two jurors. Carson said he would not file suit.

The suit, which began in 1976 after the Enquirer reported that Miss Burnett acted boisterously at a Washington restaurant, ended when a jury that deliberated for more than 13 hours awarded Miss Burnett \$300,000 in damages and \$1.3 million in punitive damages.

The suit originally sought \$10 million, but in closing arguments her attorney urged the jury to award the popular entertainer \$1.5 estimated net profit for a

Enquirer attorney William Masterson said he would file a motion next week for a new trial, reduction of damages and reversal of the verdict. If those motions are denied, he will appeal, he said.

"These were clearly excessive damages." said Masterson. "It's ridiculous for five lines in a gossip column to take a year's earnings and half of a company's net worth....This is the equivalent of capital punishment against a corporation."

"I don't want to see anybody go out of business," Miss Burnett said. "I just want to improve them. This

Absentee Voting Turnout Light

Absentee balloting for the general election April 4 has been light according to representatives of the Hereford Independent School District, the City of Hereford, and Deaf Smith General Hospital District.

Only two absentee votes had been cast for the city and hospital district elections as of Thursday afternoon. In those elections only one race, for Hereford City Commission Place 2, is contested, apparently accounting for the light turnout. Incumbent Ed Coplen is being challenged by Rumaldo Garcia for that position on the city commission. Hereford Mayor Bartley Dowell and Place 1 Commissioner Wes Fisher are running unopposed for re-election. as are hospital board members Dr. Gerald Payne. Ed Reinauer, Jr., and

Warner Lawson. A few more absentee ballots had been cast in the school board election, where eight candidates are vying for three at-large seats. According to school Tax Assessor-Collector Fred Fox. 21 ballots have been cast for that election.

Absentee balloting for all three elections will continue until 5 p.m. Tuesday, March 31. Absentee ballots for the hospital district election may be cast in the personnel office of the hospital, while those wishing to vote absentee in the city election may do so at the Hereford City Hall. Fox's office at the school administration building will accept ballots for the school board election.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) - A nine-hour siege in which a man wounded a policeman then fatally shot himself began during quarrel over a pizza, police said.

Robert Veach, 32, shot himself in the head with a shotgun as special tactical officers smashed down his garage door and ted the house with tear gas about win Friday, police

Veach had engaged police in a gun battle that was the climax of a dispute that began whhen Veach and his mother argued over a pizza, officers

Veach died later Friday at a hospital from the wound which police said was self-infliected.

Patrolman Fernando C. Gonzales, 26, was listed in fair condition from a bullet wound resulting after a slug richoceted off a pocket knife which Gonzales wore on his belt.

The victim's mother, Delma Veach, telephoned police saying her son created a disturbance over a pizza about 9:45 p.m. Wednesday.

While Gonzales and another officer were standing in the doorway talking to Mrs. Veach, they said a man entered the living room with a .38-caliber revolver and fired one shot from close range at Gonzales.

The bullet glanced off his knifecase. penetrated his belt and entered his abdomen, officers said.

Police evacuated a dozen families after the two officers called for additional help and spent all night attempting to talk Veach into surrendering.

Ransom Missing

After 2 Arrests

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) -Police nabbed two men in connection with the kidnapping of a young girl and returned the child to her parents. but a \$4,000 ransom left for the kidnappers was still missing, said police.

Police Chief Bill Banner said a man dropped the money as he was being chased by a police officer. A search for the money was called off Thurs-

The girl had been kidnapped while on the way to school, raped and forced to drive to Corpus Christi, officers said. She was treated and released to her parents, hospital officials said.

Banner said he expects charges of aggravated rape, aggravated kidnapping and robbery to be filed. But police said the victim had yet to file a formal complaint against two San Antonio men, one 18 and the other 22.

The pair was arrested about 11:40 p.m. Wednesday after a police stakeout at a pre-arranged drop point for the ransom.

An officer waiting in ambush sprained an ankle and was unable to catch the man who took the money. But minutes later, policemen in a squad car arrested two men a few blocks away.

Videotapes of Prison

Beatings Released

BROWNSVILLE, Texas (AP) - A federal judge Thursday gave reporters and photographers access to videotapes showing McAllen police officers beating and otherwise abusing prisoners.

U.S. District Judge James DeAnda ordered the films opened. DeAnda is directing a hearing which follows the filing of a series of police brutality and misconduct civil suits by American Civil Liberties Union attorneys.

The tapes were subpoenaed by a federal grand jury which is expected to begin an investigation of the police department next month.

The videotapes are police records filmed at the station's booking desk. Some were broadcast by South Texas television stations Thursday night.

In one, a handcuffed man argues with a police officer and leans toward him. The officer slaps him to the ground, but the man keeps talking.

Two officers pick him up and hold him while another hits several times in the stomach. Then one repeatedly pounds the man's head against a table several times. A number of other officers in the room do nothing to interfere.

Afterwards, one of the officers asks the man, "Want to use the telephone?

Also at the hearing Thursday, Bill Roach, a former officer on the force, testified that McAllen police Capt. Ruben de Leon instructed recruits at a police academy to abuse prisoners.

Roach said de Leon told the class to "throw (your) weight around as much as you like," and "if an ol' boy falls and busts his face on a curb well, that's just too bad.'

FBI Says Nearing End To Wood Investigation

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) - A federal grand jury gathered for its third consecutive session today as the FBI confirmed it may be nearing the end of a lengthy investigation into the assassination of U.S. District

Judge John H. Wood Jr. Theresa Starr Jasper, 23, of Houston, was subpoanaed as the 10th grand jury witness this week. She is the stepdaughter of convicted hired gun Charles V. Harrelson and the the grand jury - empaneled Wednesday - apparently is retracing previous evidence in preparation for indictments.

The 23-member grand jury took over the case from a special grand jury that had been investigating Wood's death since June 17, 1980, but which reportedly was "tainted" by erroneous evidence and prosecutors dissolved it to make sure any indictments could stand up to court challenge. In Washington, meanwhile, FBI director William Webster said Thursday, "we are very close to a solution" of Wood's killing on May 29,

"I don't think it's wise for me to project indictments, but we are very close to a solution," Webster said during a White House briefing. We intend to solve this. We believe it's close to solution. We already know the

Webster said he did not want to be "tied down" on any time element for indict-

The newspaper said a federal judge authorized the electronic eavesdroppings in a sealed order and the tape was made last year while the two Chagras met in an interview room at the federal prison in Leavenworth, Kan., where Jimmy Chagra was serving a 30-year term.

He since has been transferred to the high-security prison at Marion, Ill.

At the time Wood was killed, the judge was scheduled to hear Jimmy Chagra's trial on a narcotics-related charge of continuing criminal enterprise.

The investigation into the attack on Kerr, who has been secreted at an undisclosed location for nearly two years, concentrated on members of the Bandidos Motorcycle Club.

Lung Assoc. Names March Risky Month

The plague of the "common from the mouth even when cold" occurs more often during cold weather, but March can be a risky month for persons exposed to colds, according to the American Lung Association of Texas.

Extremes are the norm in March. Temperatures change quickly, and chilling rains oftentimes follow gentle breezes. Weather variety does not cause colds, but it can increase vulnerability to viruses which do cause colds. Viruses are minute infectious agents that can't even be seen with a microscope, but which enter body cells, multiply and then cause disease.

Many different kinds ofviruses can cause a cold. Over a hundred have been identified; that is why no vaccine has been successful. There is little anyone can do to avoid infection but hope for the best and stay away from people who have colds. Infants and young children are the most susceptible to colds because they have not yet built up immunity.

When a cold can't be thwarted, grandmother's advice is still good: aspirin, liquids and even chicken soup may relieve symptoms.

By covering your coughs and sneezes and keeping your distance from people, you can protect others. Germs escape

Winter presented each person with a copy of the WTSU master plan report. The university is seeking a \$16.3 million budget from the state the coming year, and the total budget estimate is approximately \$21 million.

Senate Defeats Debate On Right-to-Work Laws

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -Sen. Walter Mengden, staunch supporter of right-towork laws, says he has had his run this year and will not try to revive the controversial issue.

"There is no need to try again," the Houston Republican said Wednesday after the senate refushed to take up and debate one of three right-to-work proposals he had on the calendar. "I thought I had enough votes before today but I know where they stand now."

He added: "From this key vote we can sec who is in the hip pocket of labor."

By a 18-12 tally, Mengden failed to achieve discussion of his bill that would outlaw the so-called "agency shop," so that an employee cannot be required to pay dues to a union in order to hold a job. State law already prohibits the "union shop," in which an employee must join a labor

The vote was three short of the two-thirds needed to allow

"I had counted on Sen. Peyton McKnight (D-Tyler)

and John Wilson (D-La Grange) and I thoungt maybe Sen. Kent Caperton (D-Bryan), who has been 'iffy' on the subject," Mengden said later.

McKnight and Caperton voted against the debate and Wilson was listed as absent at the time of the vote.

Mengden said he was sure the same vote would apply to his two other measures on the calendar - a proposal to put the right-to-work policy in the state constitution and a resolution calling on Congress to approve a similar change in the U.S. Constitu-

There was no discussion or comment about Mengden's bill before the vote other than a brief explanation by the author.

\$500 Million Military, Economic Aid Proposed consensus that Secretary of tative because the Pakistani

WASHINGTON (AP) -The Reagan administration is proposing a \$500 million military, and economic aid package to Pakistan - which has not yet agreed to accept it - as part of its strategy to contain Soviet expansionism in Southern Asia.

The proposal, up from \$400 million in military aid alone proposed by former President Carter, breaks down to \$400 million in military aid and \$100 million in economic assistance.

Carter's proposed aid was rejected by Pakistani President Mohammed Zia ul-Haq as "peanuts."

However, a State Department official said Monday night a major difference between the Reagan and Carter packages is that there would be an implied commitment by the Reagan administration to come to Pakistan's aid in time of crisis - a kind of "credible security guarantee.'

Pakistan would be a key part of the so-called strategic

State Alexander M. Haig Jr. said the administration wants to build in an area stretching from Pakistan to Egypt to counter Soviet moves in the

In other aid matters, another official, who like the first did not want to be identified, said the new administration would ask Congress to approve \$225 million in economic aid to Zimbabwe. Aid to Pakistan could not be

given until Congress agrees to lift a ban on assistance to that country. The ban was imposed because of a nuclear program that many officials believe is aimed at producing nuclear weapons.

Haig told Congress last week he hoped it would modify the law so the United States could "re-establish a dialog of trust and confidence" with Pakistan.

While the \$500 million program is being discussed for the 1982 fiscal year, an official said it was still ten-

'We're not there yet," he said. "The important thing, as far as I'm aware, at least, is that Pakistan has not bought and signed off on it." He said U.S. Ambassador Arthur W. Hummell Jr. had been disucssing the package with the Zia government in Islamabad in recent days.

A major concern of the Pakistani government, according to the official, apparently was that it be provided with a "credible security guarantee" and at the same time that any assistance not compromise; its status as a non-aligned nation. Those two concerns, he said, have to be reconciled

Although the \$400 million in military assistance for Pakistan is the same amount Carter proposed, it could be made available in such a way that it would buy more U.S. weapons if those weapons were offered at discounts.

Degrees of depression

DEAR DR. LAMB - Is there any permanent cure for depression? I suffer from chronic depression and have just realized this past year that the symptoms can vary. I used to think one had to be listless, maybe hysterical, with hopeless thoughts. Now I know there are other degrees of depression. My main trouble now is a great and deep sadness. And I feel that every effort is really useless since we are all just waiting for death. I am not consciously

suicidal. I have had five nervous breakdowns in 25 years. I recovered each time and returned to work. I have had electric shock therapy, insulin shock treatment and lots of medicines. And I have had private psychotherapy and group therapy. Now I can no longer afford a private psychiatrist. I am an impoverished 62-yearold widow. There are lots of women like me. I've met them in the general and psychiatric

DEAR READER - Yes. there are degrees of depres-sion. We all have mood swings and it must be a rare person indeed who never experiences depression. The mild depressions we experience can be relieved or controlled in many instances by things we do in our personal life. I am glad you recognize the difference because you can help yourself in controlling the less severe problems.

Now, you and others need to recognize that beyond the mild depressions and sadness are the more severe depressions which you cannot man-age yourself. These require professional help. It is dangerous to neglect such cases because some people who are depressed are suicidal.

Yes, women are more prone to depressions than men. About 20 percent of women who live to age 70 experience a depression. And it is difficult to get help when your funds are limited. Those with this problem could check the

I don't really understand why his cholesterol is that high as we don't like fat meat and rarely eat pork, but he does not like vegetables and never eats fresh fruit. What makes triglycerides go up? He is keeping his smoking to a minimum with this diet.

DEAR READER - First; POLLY'S POINTERS you can't be sure what a person's cholesterol or trigly-ceride level is with just one test. They can fluctuate a great deal in some people. Three successive tests are a better indicator of the usual level.

Triglycerides are blood fats. When you hear triglyceride, think fat. Often high cholesterol and high triglycerides are associated with being overweight and with diet, but you can be skinny and have high levels.

Your cholesterol level is set by your liver. If you don't get a lot of cholesterol or fat in your diet, your liver may still manufacture too much choles-terol from other food substances, and that can even include making cholesterol from carbohydrates. A person may inherit the tendency to have high levels.

The goal of sensible dieting is to lose pounds of body fat. not normal body water. I'm not an advocate of diet sodas or other sodas either, for that matter. But two diet sodas a day will not cause you to gain


