pile-up at the intersection of US-60 and 385 here Monday about 9:20 a.m. sent six persons to the hospital but, fortunately, only one man was seriously injured.

Mike Ranspot, former Hereford resident from Wichita, Kan., was taken to Deaf Smith General Hospital and then transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo for treatment of an eye injury.

Ranspot, here to preach in a revival at First Bible Baptist Church, underwent five to six hours of surgery on his eye. A Hereford relative reported that some vision loss was anticipated by doctors. Ranspot was a passenger in a car driven by Gordon Parsley, pastor of First Bible Baptist.

Police reports indicate the freak accident occurred when a truck-trailer rig driven by William O. Scott Jr., Liberal, Kan., collided with a pickup being driven by Maria G. Perez of Friona. The pickup and four other cars were stopped at the traffic light, all headed east.

The Mustang occupied by Parsley and Ranspot was in front of the pickup; a Blazer driven by Joe Tijerina was in front of the Mustang, and a car driven by Willie Wilson of

Friona was in front of the Blazer. Another car, driven by Adolpho Rocha, was in the left-turn lane.

According to the police investigation, the truck driver apparently dropped a cigarette, bent over to pick it up, and saw the parked vehicles too late to stop. The pickup and Mustang were heavily damaged.

Mrs. Perez and her daughter, Belan, were treated for lacerations and were listed in stable condition at Deaf Smith General Hospital today. Parsley, Tijerina and Wilson were treated and released following the accident.

Police said the driver of the truck was issued a citation for failing to control speed. He was not injured.

Another accident was investigated Monday afternoon at US-385 and Bradley street. Autos driven by Judith M. Chadwick, Rt. 4, and Francisco Martinez, 37, collided at the intersection. Ms. Chadwick was treated and released after being taken to Deaf Smith General Hospital.

The regular session of the commission took only 30 minutes as the board handled relatively minor items on a brief agen-

Place 2 commissioner Ed Coplen and Mayor Bartley Dowell, two of the three officials re-elected in Saturday's election, were on hand as the commission canvassed the votes. The city fathers also appointed a new Mayor Pro-Tem, a City Health Officer, a new member to the Planning and Zoning Commission, and accepted low bids on several items to be puchased by the

Official vote tallies for the election included 1,069 votes for Dowell and 1,040 for Place 1 Commissioner Wes Fisher both unopposed on the ballot. Coplen was a winner over challener Rumaldo Garcia by a 948-294 count. In addition, two city charter amendments

## Bank Deposits, Net Loans Up

Total assets at First National Bank were \$79,105,000 for the first three months of the year, while the Hereford State Bank reported total assets of \$47,294,000. Both of those figures were up from \$72,995,000 and \$42,504,000 figures released by the two institutions respectively in

FNB reported net loans of \$50,654,000 for the first quarter this year, compared to \$43,195,000 last year. Likewise, HSB showed an increase in net loans with \$26,817,000 this year, up from

Deposits were reported at \$68,135,000 by FNB, up from \$64,561,000 last year, while HSB reported deposits of \$40,691,000 this year, compared to \$35,326,000 in 1980.

Both bank's net loan figures were down slightly from the last quarter of 1980. FNB had net loans of \$51,822,000 during the final three months of last year, while HSB reported loans of \$27,545,000.

Deposits were up at HSB this quarter over last quarter, but showed a slight decline over the same period at FNB. Hereford State Bank showed deposits at \$40,020,000 during the fourth quarter in 1980, while First National Bank had deposits of \$71,094,000.

## Wife, Bush Stand In For President

WASHINGTON (AP) -President Reagan, receiving an expanded range of antibiotics to ward off infection and still feverish, is sending his wife and Vice President George Bush as his stand-ins at a Republican dinner at the same hotel where he was shot

eight days ago. Extraordinary security steps were being followed at the Washington Hilton Hotel, where nearly 3,000 guests were expected at a \$1,000-a-plate, black-tie dinner tonight to raise money for Republican candidates for the House and Senate.

White House limousines carrying the president's wife, Nancy, and Bush and his wife, Barbara, were to enter the hotel through the garage, instead of stopping outside at the "presidential entrance". where a would-be assassin fired six shots at Reagan on March 30.

'The Bushes and Mrs. Reagan will have a closed entrance and exit - directly into the garage — and take a back elevator," said Larry McCarthy, a spokesman for

Other precautions also were planned but were not publicly discussed.

The president slept well through the night and was still sleeping when an update on his condition was released shortly before 7 a.m. EST today. David Prosperi, assistant press secretary, said

Reagan's temperature was "near normal" - indicating the president still had the slight fever he has had for several days.

The president was described Monday by his daughter, Maureen, as "doing terrific" as he continued his convalescence at George Washington University Hospital.

After a 90-minute visit, Ms. Reagan said they talked about "feeling good - and that bullets are not friendly things."

Aides said Reagan is expected to remain hospitalized at least until the end of the week, and White House chief of staff James A. Baker III said Reagan might not be able to deliver a planned nationally televised appeal for his tax-cut proposals before income tax day, April 15.

The president, who was troubled by a temperature as high as 102 degrees Fahrenheit last week, had a slight fever again Monday. Deputy White House press secretary Larry Speakes refused to reveal the specific figure, but a source who insisted on anonymity said it was less than 100 degrees. normal body temperature is 98.6 degrees.

A White House medical report said doctors had found no evidence of infection, in Reagan's wounded left lung.

# Brezhnev Quietens Fears Of Soviet Move

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) - Soviet President Leonid I. Brezhnev today quieted fears of Soviet military intervention in Poland, saying the Polish Communist Party would be able to deal with its problems.

Brezhnev in a speech to the Czechoslovak Communist Party Congress charged that enemies of socialism were using "economic pressure and blackmail" as well as "propaganda lies, ruses and demagogy" against Poland's communist regime.

But the 74-year-old Soviet leader said the Polish party "with the support of all true Polish patriots" would be able to deal with its own pro-

"As far as the Soviet Union is concerned," Brezhnev said, "it has been and continues to be the loyal friend and ally of socialist Poland."

In a clear reference to Poland, Brezhnev said "class enemies" are "instigating and supporting counterrevolutionary forces in those places where they still exist, and carrying out other subversive actions."

"You will, comrades, remember all this from your own experiences," Brezhnev said, referring to the events that prompted Warsaw Pact forces to march into

Czechoslovakia in 1968. 'These showed convincingly that the plans of reaction hold out no prospect of success."

The Polish Communist Party, he said, would "prove able in adequate measure to oppose the designs of the enemies of the socialist system, who are at the same time the opponents of the independence of Poland. (It will) prove able to successfully defend socialism, the true interests of its people, the honor and security of their

homeland." The rest of Brezhnev's 27-minute speech was devoted to a defense of his proposal for a moratorium on the stationing of mediumrange missiles in Europe and criticism of the United States and its allies for their reluctance to accept the proposal.

#### Horse Racing Called 'Natural Resource'

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - Legislators and voters have turned down legalized horse race betting many times, but Rep. Craig Washington — calling it a "natural resource" — says it's time to allow Texans to go to the track.

The House and Senate Committees on State Affairs on Monday listened to the oft-heard pros and cons of horse racing. Both panels sent the bills to subcommittee.

Washington, D-Houston, said his bill is "an idea whose time has come." "Fashion it if you will as a natural

resource that is available to the state," he said. Washington's bill allows local op-

tion elections to decide if pari-mutuel betting would be legal. Sen. Ike Harris, R-Dallas, is carrying a similar Senate bill. Opponents testified legalized

gambling preys on the poor, who go to the track in search of a quick payoff. Not so, said Washington. "I have always been a champion of

the poor, downtrodden and under-privileged," he said. Washington predicted legalized pari-mutuel wagering would bring the state up to \$40 million the first year. His bill calls for a 5 percent state tax

#### New Bill Would

# Include Power Plants

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - A stateoperated disposal site for low-level radioactive wastes could accept certain things from nuclear power plants for disposal, but not their high-level byproducts that could contaminate generations yet unborn, a legislative witness said.

The bill to create the Texas Low-Level Radioactive Waste Disposal Authority was debated before the House Environmental Affairs Committee, which sent it to subcommittee for further discussion.

During Monday's committee hearing, Todd Samusson of the Lone Star Alliance, an anti-nuclear coalition, raised the question of whether nuclear power plants would be allowed to use the proposed 250-acre disposal site.

He said the Legislature would be "playing God" if it allowed permanent storage of nuclear waste in Texas, mentioning the possibility of future cancer cases and birth defects.

"Nuclear garbage from power plants remains toxic for hundreds of years, after we are all dead and gone.... People who never got a chance to vote you people into office will suffer the consequences.... You will be leaving a radioactive legacy for your grandchildren," Samusson said

## FBI Discloses Double Life Of Flamboyant Smith

LOS ANGELES (AP) The flamboyant career of boxing promoter Harold J. Smith, named in an embezzlement suit by Wells Fargo Bank, has ended with the revelation that Smith is someone else - a man described by federal officials as a fugitive "bad check and bunco artist."

Smith, who parlayed the name of former heavyweight champion Muhammad Ali in-

to a prominent position in boxing, burst into gulping sobs as he stood before a federal magistrate Monday and said, "My true name is Ross Fields."

A prosecutor seeking to block Smith's release from jail said Fields had an arrest record dating to the 1960s, is wanted in three places and is now a figure in a grand jury investigation of an alleged \$21.3 million embezzlement from Wells Fargo Bank.

Smith's wife, Barbara Newman Smith, actually is Alice Vicki Darrow, wanted in Alabama on federal charges of interstate transportation of fraudulent

securities, according to Assistant U.S. Attorney Dean Allison. She has used 20 aliases over the years. Allison said. Smith, wir was arraigned on a passport falsification

charge, was ordered held on \$200,000 bail on that complaint and on a warrant from North Carolina, where he is wanted in a check forgery His attorney said friends

hoped to post bond sometime today.

The FBI, which swooped down with guns drawn and arrested Smith Saturday in a Los Angeles park, alleged he falsified a passport application on July 15, 1977, by using the name Smith.

The disclosure of Smith's

double life was the latest bizarre twist in the Wells Fargo story, which broke last January.

Smith, head of Muhammad Ali Professional Sports Inc., dropped from sight amid accusations by Wells Fargo officials that he and L. Benjamin Lewis, a MAPS board member and operations officer of the bank's Beverly Hills branch, were involved in a fraud scheme involving MAPS funds. Lewis has not been seen publicly or heard from since Jan. 26.

The bank has filed suit against the two men seeking \$43.3 million in actual and punitive damages.

Smith maintained his innocence in interviews while in hiding. He alleged the bank was using him in an effort to cover up what he said was a much wider fraud scheme involving 40 to 45 bank branches and up to \$300 million a story the bank called preposterous. He also charged he had

been followed, his family threatened and his 4-year-old son briefly abducted. Some fights promoted by



shape for warm weather? A. Although most air conditioner repairs should be done by professionals, there are several things you can look for in terms of preventive maintenance or to remedy small problems. First, it's a good idea to turn the air conditioner on occasionally for brief periods during the winter months when the system isn't being used. This will circulate the refrigerant and, possibly avoid a recharge. If the system isn't blowing cold air, the first thing to look for is a low refrigerant charge. Kits are available for this do-ityourself procedure. Check the air conditioner drive belt for proper tension. There should be no more than one inch give if you press the belt with your finger between the compressor and drive pulleys. If the air conditioner does not operate at all, the first thing to look for is a blown fuse.

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (NEA) — He doesn't look like what he is — a performer in a sport that emphasizes finesse, quick reflexes, agility. Only a finely honed athlete can consistently make contact with a round ball going up to 100 miles per hour, wielding a rounded piece of ash — or stab and collar instinctively that same ball at lightning speed off somebody else's bat.

Bob Horner is squat and blocky. His thighs have the circumference of a beer keg. His neck is thick enough to carry a yoke. He would look completely natural in a professional football dressing

Critics maintain he's ballooning himself into the size of defensive tackle. Outwardly he has the pugnacious, almost sullen demeanor that goes

with that job.
Yet Bob Horner is merely the most exciting young slugger in all of baseball, and a talent who doesn't disgrace himself when he has to put on a glove and waddle out to third base when the Atlanta Braves, his team, have to go out in the field.

"This is me," he says blunt-ly, assessing his size. "This is the way I've been all through college, all through high school. When you're built like me - I'm a very stocky perme — I'm a very stocky per-son — people assume you have weight problems. I haven't varied eight to 10 pounds the last nine years. I usually start the season between 212 and 220, and get down to 208.

Whatever his size, in the two and a half years he has been in the big leagues since coming to the Braves straight out of Arizona State University, the results have been most

impressive.
In 330 games as a major leaguer, he has walloped 91 home runs. That's a rate of one homer for every 3.6 games. By contrast, Henry Aaron, the most prolific home-run hitter of all time, averaged one round-tripper every 4.3 games. (The legend-ary Babe Ruth had a homer

"He has a very fast bat," says Randy Jones, a former Cy Young Award winner who is now with the New York Mets. "You've got to pitch him low and away, and even that doesn't always help because he can bring it

around so quickly."
Joining the Braves in June 1978, right off a college campus, he hit 23 homers in National League Rookie of the Year. His second season, he batted an impressive .314,6 with 33 homers. He was also playing a position completely

"I'd never played third base in my life until I got to the big leagues," he says. "I played shortstop and second base. I've still got a lot to learn about the position, but I feel I'm an adequate third baseman."

Hopefully, as he approaches a new season, he expects to shy away from any more clashes with Turner.

"We don't see much of each other," says Horner. "I respect the man. I think he's a smart, intelligent business man, but I don't think he knows a lot about the game of haseball.

"I've got two years left on a contract I signed before last season, so all I want to do is be left alone — just let me play. I don't want or deserve any special treatment. I only want better communication between myself and manage-ment. They've got to be more truthful with me.

"It's hard enough to play a major league schedule, 162; ball games, without all that other garbage."

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
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



# Postal Service Official Used To Stamp Increase Complaints

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) -Bob Hardesty once worked for high-pressure Lyndon Johnson and says complaints including an occasional "abusive and obscene" letter about the new 18-cent postal rate don't bother him.

Hardesty, chairman of the Board of Governors of the U.S. Postal Service, wanted a 20-cent rate and believes the price of a postage stamp must rise again within a year.

"If we had had no inflation,

we wouldn't have needed a rate increase. If we had based our recommendation on the Consumer Price Index entirely, we would have asked for a 22-cent stamp," he said. Hardesty had the job of announcing to the public last Monday's three-cent - 20 percent - jump in the price

of mailing a first class letter. "The heat doesn't bother me," said Hardesty, adding that what he gained from his years on Johnson's White House staff was "not

necessarily a thick skin, but learning not to take things personally."

Hardesty, 49, is vice chancellor for administration of the University of Texas System, and his \$10,000-a-year job as postal service chairman is only part-time.

He takes it seriously, though, and doesn't bother to conceal his anger at the U.S. Postal Rate Commission for cutting the board's recommended 20-cent rate to 18 cents.

"What they have given us is a one-year rate. During the first quarter this rate is in effect, we will lose money, which is ridiculous," Hardesty said. "... Twenty cents would have been a stable rate for at least three years."

The board of governors has asked the Postal Rate Commission to reconsider its decision against allowing a 20-cent rate, and going to court is "always

possibility" if the commission refuses, Hardesty said.

"I would think ... within a year we would have (another) rate increase one way or another, whether the commission gives us 19 or 20 cents or we go back with another request," he said.

The board's requested 20-cent first class rate was designed to last three years as did the 15-cent rate that went out of effect last Mon-

From the standpoint of avoiding public outrage at "precipitous" postal rate increases every few years, it Hardesty said.

"But that would create havoc in the business community. The big mailers have to budget ahead," he said.

Hardesty was interviewed in his fourth-floor office in a 100-year-old former post office that the university remodeled for its top officials. A bust of Johnson, framed postage stamps commemorating LBJ and Sam Rayburn and autographed pictures of Johnson, Harry Truman and former Speaker Carl Albert are part of the office decor.
