

Six Persons Injured In Spectacular Accident



Big Crash

A spectacular six-vehicle wreck occurred here Monday morning at the intersection of US-385 and 60, sending six persons to the hospital. Police reported that a truck-trailer rig set off the chain-reaction smashup when it ran into the rear of a pickup at the traffic light. Four other vehicles

stopped at the signal light were involved in the wreck. Above are two views of the accident, showing the truck, pickup and a Mustang which was spun around in the collision. Most seriously injured was former Hereford resident, Mike Ranspot, a passenger in the Mustang.

A spectacular six-vehicle pile-up at the intersection of US-60 and 385 here Monday about 9:20 a.m. sent six persons to the hospital but, fortunately, only one man was seriously injured.

Mike Ranspot, former Hereford resident from Wichita, Kan., was taken to Deaf Smith General Hospital and then transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo for treatment of an eye injury.

Ranspot, here to preach in a revival at First Bible Baptist Church, underwent five to six hours of surgery on his eye. A Hereford relative reported that some vision loss was anticipated by doctors. Ranspot was a passenger in a car driven by Gordon Parsley, pastor of First Bible Baptist.

Police reports indicate the freak accident occurred when a truck-trailer rig driven by William O. Scott Jr., Liberal, Kan., collided with a pickup being driven by Maria G. Perez of Friona. The pickup and four other cars were stopped at the traffic light, all headed east.

The Mustang occupied by Parsley and Ranspot was in front of the pickup; a Blazer driven by Joe Tijerina was in front of the Mustang, and a car driven by Willie Wilson of

Friona was in front of the Blazer. Another car, driven by Adolpho Rocha, was in the left-turn lane.

According to the police investigation, the truck driver apparently dropped a cigarette, bent over to pick it up, and saw the parked vehicles too late to stop. The pickup and Mustang were heavily damaged.

Mrs. Perez and her daughter, Belan, were treated for lacerations and were listed in stable condition at Deaf Smith General Hospital today. Parsley, Tijerina and Wilson were treated and released following the accident.

Police said the driver of the truck was issued a citation for failing to control speed. He was not injured.

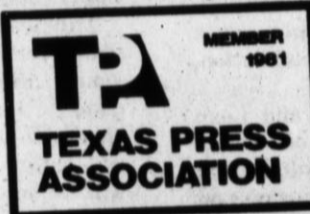
Another accident was investigated Monday afternoon at US-385 and Bradley street. Autos driven by Judith M. Chadwick, Rt. 4, and Francisco Martinez, 37, collided at the intersection. Ms. Chadwick was treated and released after being taken to Deaf Smith General Hospital.

Coplen Re-Elected

Simons, Hoelscher, Townsend Win School Board Elections

Tom Simons, R.C. Hoelscher, and Bill Townsend were elected to the Hereford Independent School District Board of Trustees, and incumbent city commissioner Ed Coplen was a big winner as a good number of voters turned out to the polls Saturday.

The school board election drew the biggest interest during the voting as eight persons sought three at-large places on the board. Simons topped the challengers with 1,003 votes, while Hoelscher drew 885 ballots and Townsend claimed the third seat with 721 votes. A total of 1,534 votes were cast in the school board election.

The other school board candidates and their vote totals included Don T. Martin, 642; James Self, 509; Johnny Gamez, 250; Anne Ivey, 232; and Jerry Walls, 223. The three new board members are replacing outgoing trustees Mack Tubb, Clark Andrews, and Jim Arney.

Coplen, the incumbent Place 2 City Commissioner, easily outdistanced challenger Rumaldo Garcia with 948 votes to Garcia's 294. In addition, Place 1 commissioner Wes Fisher and Mayor Bartley Dowell, both unopposed, tallied 1,040 and 1,069 votes respectively.

Commissioners Canvass Votes, Approve Bids In Short Session

It was short, but sweet for at least two of the City Commission members present Monday night as the city fathers canvassed returns from Saturday's election and accepted the figures as submitted to them. The regular session of the commission took only 30 minutes as the board handled relatively minor items on a brief agenda.

Official vote tallies for the election included 1,069 votes for Dowell and 1,040 for Place 1 Commissioner Wes Fisher both unopposed on the ballot. Coplen was a winner over challenger Rumaldo Garcia by a 948-294 count. In addition, two city charter amendments were approved.

Amendment one called for allowing the city to legally participate in the joint tax-appraisal program, while Amendment 2 called for the appointment of a substitute city judge. The first measure was approved in a vote of 777-355, with the second amendment was approved 836-300.

The commissioners approved bids submitted by Stagner-Orsborn Buick, Pontiac, GMC for three pickups and a cab and chassis. Two of the new pickups will be used by the city water department with the third to go to the street department. The cab and chassis will be used by the fire department.

Place 2 commissioner Ed Coplen and Mayor Bartley Dowell, two of the three officials re-elected in Saturday's election, were on hand as the commission canvassed the votes. The city fathers also appointed a new Mayor Pro-Tem, a City Health Officer, a new member to the Planning and Zoning Commission, and accepted low bids on several items to be purchased by the city.

Submitted a bid of \$6,682.20 per unit, while Pratt Chevrolet-Oldsmobile submitted a figure of \$6,710.80. Stagner-Orsborn also submitted the low bid on the vehicle.

Stagner-Orsborn's bid of \$6,661.85 per unit for the pickups was the lowest among the three bids received, but all three were very close. Orval Watson Ford

submitted a bid of \$6,682.20 per unit, while Pratt Chevrolet-Oldsmobile submitted a figure of \$6,710.80. Stagner-Orsborn also submitted the low bid on the vehicle.

Bank Deposits, Net Loans Up

Hereford's two banks responded with reports for the first quarter of 1981 with reports of increases in net loans, deposits, and total assets over the same period a year ago.

Deposits were reported at \$68,135,000 by FNB, up from \$64,561,000 last year, while HSB reported deposits of \$40,691,000 this year, compared to \$35,326,000 in 1980.

Both banks' net loan figures were down slightly from the last quarter of 1980. FNB had net loans of \$51,822,000 during the final three months of last year, while HSB reported loans of \$27,545,000.

Deposits were up at HSB this quarter over last quarter, but showed a slight decline over the same period at FNB. Hereford State Bank showed deposits at \$40,020,000 during the fourth quarter in 1980, while First National Bank had deposits of \$71,094,000.

FNB reported net loans of \$50,654,000 for the first quarter this year, compared to \$43,195,000 last year. Likewise, HSB showed an increase in net loans with \$26,817,000 this year, up from

\$23,807,000 a year ago.

Deposits were reported at \$68,135,000 by FNB, up from \$64,561,000 last year, while HSB reported deposits of \$40,691,000 this year, compared to \$35,326,000 in 1980.

School Board Elects Officers; Vocational Plan Approved

Saturday's election results for the Hereford Independent School District were made official last night and new board members were sworn in when the board met in special session.

In addition, a new slate of officers were elected. Before the transition took place, however, building insurance for the school was elected and the proposed vocational plan was approved.

Election results were canvassed. Results included Tom Simons, 1,003; R.C. Hoelscher, 885; Bill Townsend, 721; Don T. Martin, 642; James Self, 509; Johnny Gamez, 250; Anne Ivey, 232; and Jerry Walls, 223. A total of 2,534 votes were cast.

Simons, Hoelscher and Townsend will replace Mack Tubb, Clark Andrews and Jim Arney.

B.F. Cain, Deaf Smith County Clerk, was at the meeting to swear in the new members.

As the outgoing board members stepped down Sallie Strain, board president, extended her appreciation for their "service and dedication."

New officers were elected at the meeting which was held at the administration building.

James Gentry will serve as president, replacing Mrs. Strain. Dave Hutchins will serve as vice president, and Tom Simons will serve as secretary. All were elected by acclamation.

Before the new members took their place on the board, building insurance was selected for the district.

Lone Star Agency, Inc., was accepted with a low bid of \$50,890 payable in three payments. The other bid received was from Plains Insurance Agency for the amount of \$60,216 payable in three payments.

Brezhnev Quietens Fears Of Soviet Move

PRAGUE, Czechoslovakia (AP) — Soviet President Leonid I. Brezhnev today quieted fears of Soviet military intervention in Poland, saying the Polish Communist Party would be able to deal with its problems.

Brezhnev in a speech to the Czechoslovak Communist Party Congress charged that enemies of socialism were using "economic pressure and blackmail" as well as "propaganda lies, ruses and demagoguery" against Poland's communist regime.

But the 74-year-old Soviet leader said "the Polish party with the support of all true Polish patriots" would be able to deal with its own problems.

"As far as the Soviet Union is concerned," Brezhnev said, "it has been and continues to be the loyal friend and ally of socialist Poland."

In a clear reference to Poland, Brezhnev said "class enemies" are "instigating and supporting counter-revolutionary forces in those places where they still exist, and carrying out other subversive actions."

"You will, comrades, remember all this from your own experiences," Brezhnev said, referring to the events that prompted Warsaw Pact forces to march into Czechoslovakia in 1968.

"These showed convincingly that the plans of reaction hold out no prospect of success."

The Polish Communist Party, he said, would "prove able in adequate measure to oppose the designs of the enemies of the socialist system, who are at the same time the opponents of the independence of Poland. (It will) prove able to successfully defend socialism, the true interests of its people, the honor and security of their homeland."

The rest of Brezhnev's 27-minute speech was devoted to a defense of his proposal for a moratorium on the stationing of medium-range missiles in Europe and criticism of the United States and its allies for their reluctance to accept the proposal.

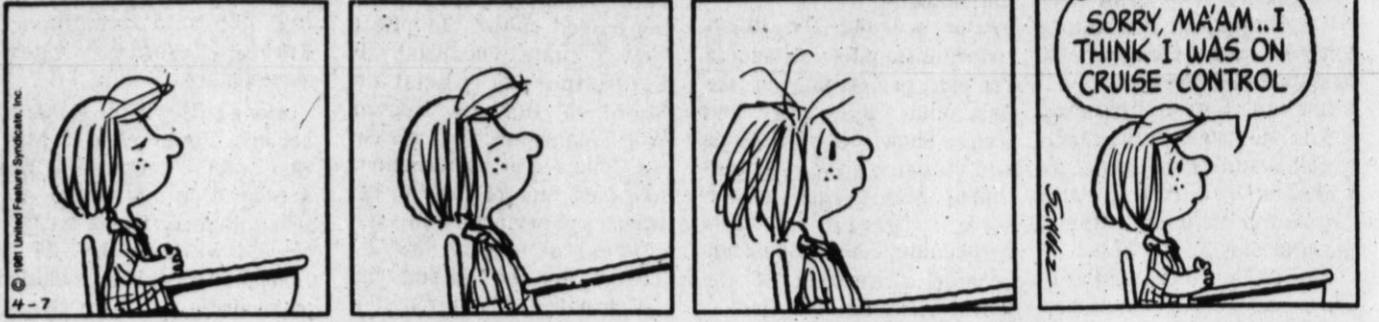

"WHERE IS YOUR FAITH?"

Once when Jesus' mother and brothers came to see Him, they couldn't get into the house where He was teaching, because of the crowds.

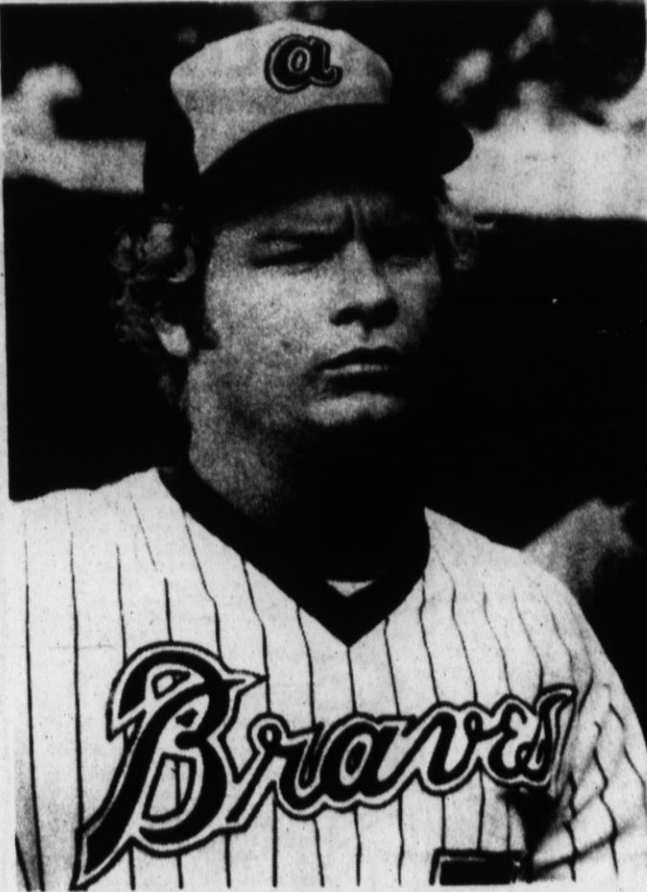

Postal Service Official Used To Stamp Increase Complaints

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Bob Hardesty once worked for high-pressure Lyndon Johnson and says complaints — including an occasional “abusive and obscene” letter — about the new 18-cent postal rate don’t bother him.

Hardesty, chairman of the Board of Governors of the U.S. Postal Service, wanted a 20-cent rate and believes the price of a postage stamp must rise again within a year.

“If we had had no inflation, we wouldn’t have needed a rate increase. If we had based our recommendation on the Consumer Price Index entirely, we would have asked for a 22-cent stamp,” he said.

Hardesty had the job of announcing to the public last Monday’s three-cent — 20 percent — jump in the price of mailing a first class letter.

“The heat doesn’t bother me,” said Hardesty, adding that what he gained from his years on Johnson’s White House staff was “not

necessarily a thick skin, but learning not to take things personally.”

Hardesty, 49, is vice chancellor for administration of the University of Texas System, and his \$10,000-a-year job as postal service chairman is only part-time.

He takes it seriously, though, and doesn’t bother to conceal his anger at the U.S. Postal Rate Commission for cutting the board’s recommended 20-cent rate to 18 cents.

“What they have given us is a one-year rate. During the first quarter this rate is in effect, we will lose money, which is ridiculous,” Hardesty said. “... Twenty cents would have been a stable rate for at least three years.”

The board of governors has asked the Postal Rate Commission to reconsider its decision against allowing a 20-cent rate, and going to court is “always a

possibility” if the commission refuses, Hardesty said.

“I would think ... within a year we would have (another) rate increase one way or another, whether the commission gives us 19 or 20 cents or we go back with another request,” he said.

The board’s requested 20-cent first class rate was designed to last three years as did the 15-cent rate that went out of effect last Monday.

From the standpoint of avoiding public outrage at “precipitous” postal rate increases every few years, it probably would be better to put them on “a cost of living” basis and raise them a small amount every few months, Hardesty said.

“But that would create havoc in the business community. The big mailers have to budget ahead,” he said.

Hardesty was interviewed in his fourth-floor office in a 100-year-old former post office that the university remodeled for its top officials. A bust of Johnson, framed postage stamps commemorating LBJ and Sam Rayburn and autographed pictures of Johnson, Harry Truman and former Speaker Carl Albert are part of the office decor.

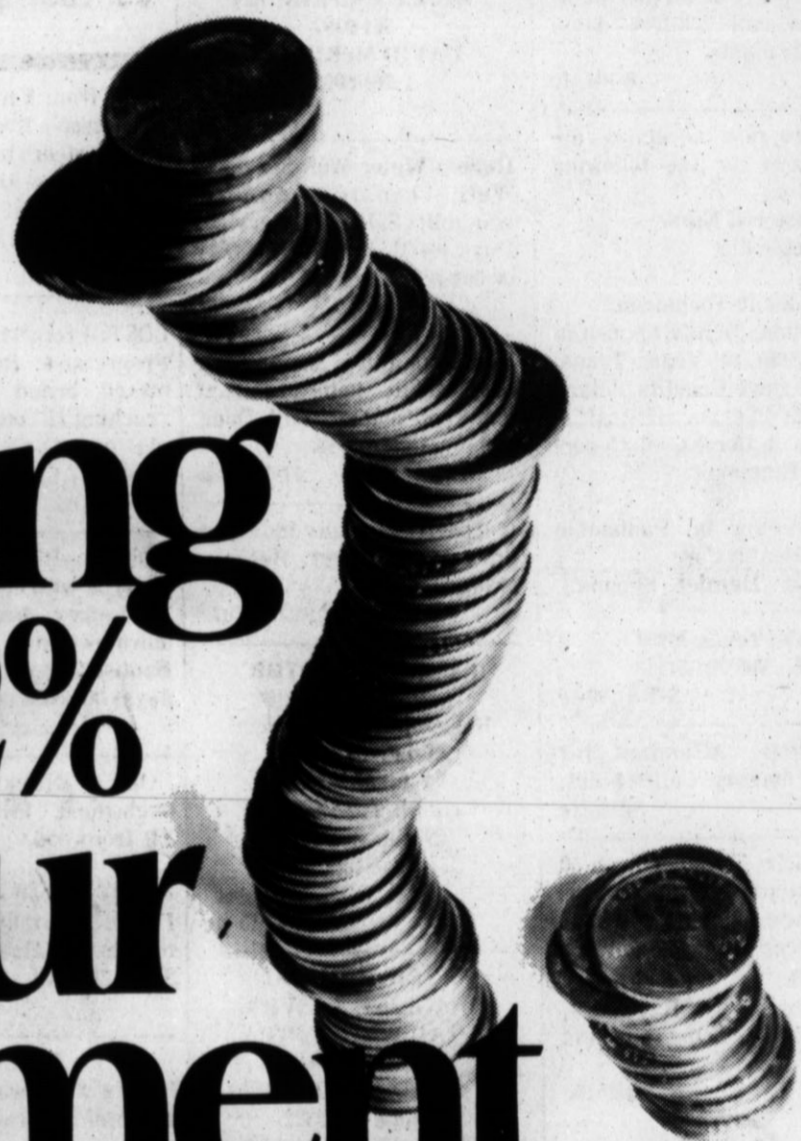
