

Marcos flees Philippines

WASHINGTON (AP) - Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos, en route from power to a reluctant exile, is "welcome to come to the United States," Secretary of State George Shultz announced today. He said the United States had officially recognized the new government of Corazon Aquino.

Shultz said U.S. officials had "a great deal of interaction" with Marcos as the long-time Phillipine leader mulled over his decision to flee the island nation.

The secretary, speaking to reporters at the White House shortly before 10 a.m. EST, said Marcos was at the United States' Clark Air Base outside Manila, adding, "I don't think any decision has been made" as to his destination.

Marcos' first stop was to be at a U.S. base on Guam, a congressional source said.

"Obviously, President Marcos was reluctant to leave his post," Shultz said. "At any rate, he did leave."

Asked what he thought convinced Marcos to leave, Shultz said, "I would suppose that, if you conceive of yourself as governing a country and ... see people switching over, (you) have to conclude (you are) not able to govern."

"But basically," he said, "this is not something the United States has done - this is something the people of the Phillipines have done."

"Of course," he said, "Ambassador (Stephen Bosworth) had

many discussions with the principles involved." He said Reagan confidante Sen. Paul Laxalt, who undertook a special mission to Marcos last year, had spoken with the embattled leader on Monday.

"I'm not going to get into details of the conversation," which Marcos initiated, Shultz said. At another point, he said he was not "going to get into the process" that led to Marcos' departure.

He praised the peaceful end of the Marcos era, which began with Marcos' claiming victory in the Feb. 7 election amid charges of widespread fraud.

State aide

AUSTIN (AP) - Gov. Mark White is being unrealistic to hope that freezing hiring and cutting spending will save \$1.3 billion, according to an aide to Comptroller Bob Bullock.

In a report titled "The New Math of the Governor's Budget Plan," the aide said White's plan to meet a projected budget shortfall this budget cycle could save as little as \$100 million to \$200 million. The Austin American Statesman got the report on the condition the author would remain unidentified.

White ordered state agencies and universities last week to cut spending. by 13 percent by imposing moratoriums on hiring and merit pay raises, restricting travel and halting purchases of non-essential supplies. The action was spurred by falling oil revenues caused by a col-lapse in oil prices.

The report said White's plan will save \$567 million "under the most optimistic assumptions."

"While it does appear possible that it will save some money, holding out

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Man found sleeping with drugs

WICHITA FALLS, Texas (AP) - Police at Wichita Falls say a man arrested for possession of amphetamine hadn't been using the

The Wichita Falls man was arrested after he fell asleep in his car at an intersection a block from the police station.

Officers said they found the car parked in a traffic lane. They first believed the man was intoxicated and unable to drive.

But when they pulled him from the automobile, officers discovered he was sleeping and said they saw a package containing 13 ounces of high-grade amphetamine, much of it uncut.

Narcotics officers estimated the street value of the drug at about \$40,000.

"It's sort of funny, you know. Having that much amphetatmine and going to sleep," a narcotics officer said. "That's what speed (is used) for, to tstay awake for several days."

"Maybe he was so far gone, it wouldn't do any good. But for some reason, he was down," the officer added.

S&L Insurance said threatened

WASHINGTON (AP) - A federal fund that insures savings and loan deposits is threatened by increasing numbers of financially troubled thrift institutions, the General Accounting Office says.

The watchdog agency of Congress warned in a report Monday that the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corp.'s fund could be wiped out if federal regulators were forced to liquidate the 239 financially weakest S&Ls.

The number of technically insolvent S&Ls increased from 455 to 461 between March and June 1985, said the report, "Thrift Industry Problems, Potential Demands on the FSLIC Insurance Fund."

Another 833 institutions had net worths that were less than 3 percent of their assets, the report said.

Just six years ago, there were only 16 technically insolvent S&Ls, according to the report.

The GAO projected that FSLIC's \$6 billion fund would have to pay out \$11.8 billion if all 239 troubled thrifts had to be sold off or merged with financially stronger institutions under the least favorable terms to the government.

Even though the savings industry projected record profits last year, there were nearly 1,300 federally insured S&Ls "whose financial condition was weak when judged by conventional standards of financial strength," the report said.

Edwin J. Gray, chairman of the Federal Home Loan Bank Board, which regulates federally insured thrifts, said the GAO report "seriously distorts the magnitude of the problem."

"The report also does not acknowledge that numerous techniques exist for replacing the current managers of weak institutions and thereby limiting any growth of the problem," Gray said in a letter attached to the study.

Reagan wants medium-range ban

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Reagan has dismissed Mikhail Gorbachev's ambitious nuclear disarmament plan but urged the Soviet leader to take the "first necessary steps" to curb the arms race by negotiating a ban on medium-range miss Asia and reducing long-range weapons by 50 percent.

Supreme court ruling knocks pornography

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Supreme Court derailed an "innovative" antipornography ordinance in Indianapolis, but leaders of the drive say at least they focused attention on the way sexually explicit material can lead to abuse of women. John Samples, a spokesman for Indianapolis Mayor William H. Hud-

nut, said the court defeat was not in vain. "We were looking for new and in-

novative ways to fight pornography," he said. "And while this particular ordinance has apparently been struck down, it has helped focus attention on new ways of fighting pornography that will be of value in the future."

The Supreme Court, by a 6-3 vote, said Monday the ordinance that subjected distributors of sexually explicit materials to lawsuits violates freedom of speech.

The ordinance allowed women injured by someone who had seen or read the explicit material to sue the maker or seller of the pornography. Indianapolis Councilwoman

Beulah Coughenour said the ordinance was "a little like the Edsel a little ahead of its time," referring to the car once made by the Ford Motor Co.

"I don't think pornography should be a protected speech," she added. But Sheila Suess Kennedy, a lawyer who challenged the ordinance

on behalf of the American Booksellers Association, said the Supreme Court ruling was "wonderful. I am extremely pleased the

237,000 new

jobs created

WASHINGTON (AP) Unemployment in the last month of 1985 dipped below 7 percent for the first time in nearly six years, with a rebound in manufacturing helping create 237,000 new jobs in December, the government has reported.

The number of people officially listed as unemployed fell by 138,000 in December, dropping the civilian jobless rate to 6.9 percent.

Total employment in December, aided by strong growth in both service-related and manufacturing jobs, reached an all-time high of 108.2 million, the department's Bureau of Labor Statistics said. At the same time, the ranks of the unemployed shrank from 8,161,000 in November to 8,023,000.

December's unemployment rate was the lowest since April 1980, when it also was 6.9 percent and was on the rise due to a recession.

A Soviet commentator immediately criticized Reagan's stand, while Paul Warnke, a former U.S. arms control director, said it was "a step backward."

Warnke said in an interview: "It demonstrates the anti-arms control group headed by Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger is still in charge of U.S. policy." The Carter administration official included senior Pentagon deputies Fred Ikle and Richard Perle in his condemnation.

Reagan outlined his views in a letter to Gorbachev. It responded to the plan the Soviet leader announced in mid-January to rid the world of nuclear weapons by the year 2000.

The president said he could not consider banning nuclear weapons while the Soviets were not living up to earlier agreements with the United States, had an advantage in combat troops in Central Europe, interfered in regional disputes and did not intend to compete peacefully with the United States.

His statement, issued at the White House on Monday, said there were other "serious obstacles" to progress in the Soviet position. Reagan and his spokesman, Larry Speakes, did not spell them out. But the president may have referred to Gorbachev's effort to stop U.S. research into using futuristic technology to destroy attacking missiles in space.

Human remains found in search

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) - Human bones, large pieces of aircraft, and at least one set of dog tags have been found at a crash site in southern Laos where a U.S.-Laotian team is searching for remains of American MIAs, a spokesman said today.

Lt Col. Terry McCann, a spokesman for the U.S. Pacific Command, said the bones were found with "limited personal effects" and large pieces of aircraft at the site in Savannakhet province where an AC-130 gunship carrying 14 American airmen crashed almost 14 years ago.

Today is the ninth day of excavation at the site. The search is expected to last several more days and the remains will be flown to the Honolulu-based Joint Casualty Resolution Center for analysis, Mc-Cann said.

Two Kims critical of South Korea

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) - Two leading dissidents said today that the government's proposal to postpone debate on the constitution until 1989 was incomprehensible, and that they planned to forge ahead with a signature drive supporting the changes.

Kim Dae-jung and Kim Young-sam, who co-chair the Council for the Promotion of Democracy, said the opposition position was that the constitution must be amended before 1988 so elections that year could be held under a new system.

They said that since President Chun Doo-hwan's term expires in 1988, he is "not qualified to talk about 1989." They said the question could be taken up in the National Assembly "if no conditions are at-tached," but that the opposition objective is to amend the constitution, not merely study it.

With the figures showing the lowest monthly unemployment rate yet during Ronald Reagan's presidency, the administration predicted the jobs picture will continue to improve.

"With this strong year-end finish, we can reasonably expect to exceed the administration's forecast of a 6.7 percent average unemployment rate for 1986," said White House spokesman Larry Speakes.

Private economists have predicted that civilian unemployment could fall to as low as 6.5 percent if the current annual rate of economic growth picks up from between 2 and 3 percent to 4 percent.

"Jobs are growing at sort of a fast pace," said Lyle Gramley, chief economist for the Mortgage Bankers Association and a former member of the Federal Reserve Board. "And employment statistics are as good as any in determining where the economy is going."

Despite the recent improvements, the commissioner of labor statistics, Janet L. Norwood, told the congressional Joint Economic Committee: "The number of jobless remains a very high 8 million, and little reduction in labor market discouragement occurred during 1985."

The BLS said one in every five of the 3 million new non-farm jobs created in 1985 were in the the ss and health services industries. At the same time, the size of the labor force, which includes both those working and those seeking jobs, increased only 1.8 million.

However, he certainly should have insisted on frequent followup vis-its to make sure that your blood pres-sure was controlled and you were not having adverse reactions to the drugs. Your dizziness may mean that the madicine was too strong for your your Your dizziness may mean that the medicine was too strong for you; your blood pressure may have fallen to an unacceptably low level. Look for a doctor who is both thoughtful about your needs and willing to check your blood pressure until it stabilizes lood pressure until it stabilizes.

DEAR DR. GOTT - My son (32) was told he has polycythemia and was advised to give blood. How does one get this and what is the treatment?

DEAR READER - Polycythemia means "too many red blood cells," the exact opposite of anemia. It can be a primary disorder or it can be secondary to other conditions, like lung or heart disease. Polycythemia is a normal result of living at high altitudes, where there is less oxygen and the body must compensate by producing more red corpuscles.



Bookstore caters to Hispanic Christians

ODESSA, Texas (AP) - No crucifixes adorn the walls at the Manatial de Vida streams of living water -Hispanic Christian bookstore. No votive candles line the racks. Rosary beads do not clutter the tables

Gone are the trappings of Catholicism. That absence, said the operators of the store on West Eighth Street in Odessa, is one of the more obvious signs of their reborn faith.

Manatial de Vida, in other words, is a store not just for those of the Catholic faith the religion embraced by many of the world's Hispanics - but for Hispanic Christians of all denominations, say operators Joe and Nelida "Nellie" Arana.

The 30-year-old Joe Arana, an Alpine native who earns his living selling insurance, said that, like most Hispanics, he was brought up in the Catholic church.

Today, he attends the First Assembly of God Church along with his wife. Both teach a Sunday School class for 14- to 17-year-olds. The Aranas say they are

among a growing number of Hispanics to turn from traditional religion toward what they consider a "personal" faith.

"It's just Christian," Mrs. Arana said. She said it is a misconception that all Hispanics are Catholic.

"People are hungry for the word of God," Arana added. He was quick to point out that he's not trying to say Catholics don't embrace God's word. "It's just that (many

Hispanics are) looking for something different, and

in the Aranas' store of medicinal herbs and votive candles found in many other Hispanic religious bookstores.

The books, written in Spanish, bear titles familiar to many Christian readers: "Las Cruz y el Punal," or

"The Cross and the Switchblade," for example, and "Corre! Nicky, Corre!" or "Run! Nicky, Run!"

Spanish translations of books by James Dobson, a minister who produced a film series on family life, elbow for space with books by evangelist Billy Graham.

In a sunlit back room, Spanish records and tapes fill cabinets and spill over into several racks.

In a black dress and black heels, Mrs. Aranas smiles wryly as she recalls phone calls from Odessans who obviously misunderstood the 2-year-old store's purpose.

A sign in front bears both the store's name, Manatial de Vida, and the explanation. "Libreria Y Discoteco Cristiana," or Christian book and record store, Mrs. Arana pointed out.

Some passers-by must miss reading the word "Cristiana," Mrs. Arana speculated, because she has received calls asking whether the store sold the Spanishlanguage edition of "Playboy" magazine.

Other would-be customers walked inside the store for a quick survey before walking back outside. Those people may have wanted "hiervas," or medicinal herbs traditionally found in Spanish bookstores, the Aranas speculated.

The Aranas said they notic-
