"THE VICTORY OVER DEATH"

Sermon Delivered at the Funeral of Rev. S. T. Shore, January 28, 1912, by Frederick F. Grim.

Text:—"O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory."

In the presence of a large number of friends, the following funeral sermon was spoken by Mr. Crim of Albuquerque, N. M., a warm, personal friend of the deceased pastor:

"These words of Holy Scripture have been selected because they are in keeping with the life of our brother, whose soul has taken its heavenward flight, and is now in the presence of the Lord; and around whose earthly form we have gathered to pay this last tribute of respect. Moreover, I believe this is the message he would have me leave with you—the living—his friends, his neighbors and his loved ones. We sorrow not as those who have no hope. To us death is not "a cold and barren peak between two eternities." It is not the end of life, but "an event in life," the gateway to the larger, the richer, the more perfect life. For "what we call life is a passport to death, and what we call death is a passport to life." The great word with Jesus was life. "I came that ye might have life and that ye might have it more abundantly." How thankful we should be at this time, although bowed under the weight of sorrow, for victory is ours. Our God is a loving Father, full of compassion and tender mercy. He does not mock us. He has not shut us up to blind fate, nor has he left us to wander in a labyrinth of doubt and despair. There is no grief that comes to the human heart that does not find a sympathetic response in the heart of Infinite Love. There are many things we cannot understand; there are mysteries that the mind of man cannot fathom; there are times, when, with hearts broken and bleeding, we must say we do not know. But Oh! what a blessed thought, that "there is One who does know and that is better than if we knew ourselves."

GOD HAS GIVEN US VICTORY OVER DEATH THROUGH CHRIST.

If we would know what God would be to us, let us behold Jesus. He stands as the great central figure of human history, towering above other great minds like the topmost peak of the highest mountain range. Neither myth nor legend can account for him; he is unique and peerless. If we would understand him we must take him at his own valuation. His life was incomparable; his death was sublime; his resurrection gave meaning and purpose to all that had gone before, and all should come after. They who had been disheartened were made strong; the fearful became bold; the sad and sorrowful became hopeful and optimistic.

Christianity is conceded to be the greatest moralizing, spiritualizing and uplifting agency that the world has ever known. Such a continuous power and influence for the elevation and preservation of the race must rest upon the eternal truths of God. Nothing less than the fact of Christ, his divine life and teachings, his sacrifice and resurrection, can account for the faith and experience of the apostles, and the persistency of that faith and experience through

the centuries, whereby "a dying world has been revived, a decrepit world regenerated, darkness illuminated, despair dispelled, the captive made free, and the heart of humanity made to throb with noble impulses." But imagine for a moment that Christ has not been raised from the dead. Then we must agree with the Apostle Paul, in the 15th Chap. of 1-Cor.: "that our preaching is in vain, the apostles are false witnesses, ye are yet in your sins, they which have fallen asleep in Christ have perished, we are of all men most pitiable, for we have been building upon a false foundation, if it be that Christ hath not been raised from the dead."

But Christ hath been raised from the dead, "the first fruits of them that are asleep." He appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve, then to about five hundred brethren at once, many of whom were alive when Paul gave this testimony, then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles, and, last of all, he appeared to Paul, also, as unto one born out of due time.

"But each in his own order, Christ the first fruits; then they that are Christ's at his coming. Then cometh the end, when he shall deliver up the Kingdom of God, even the Father, when he shall have abolished all rule and authority and power. For he must reign until he hath put all enemies under his feet. The last enemy that shall be abolished is death."

The apostle then further forces his argument from analogy. "That which thou thyself sowest is not quickened except it die, but a bare grain of wheat or some other kind;

but God giveth it a body even as it pleased him, and to each seed a body of its own. So also in the resurrection of the dead. It is sown in corruption it is raised in incorruption; it is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory; it is sown in weakness, it is raised in power; it is sown a natural body, it is raised a spiritual body."

He leads us to the very heights above as he concludes this wonderful chapter, his soul filled with a passion of victory and a song of rejoicing—"O death, where is thy sting? O death, where is thy victory? O death, where is thy sting? The sting of death is sin; and the power of sin is the law; but thanks be to God which giveth victory through our Lord Jesus Christ."

INSPIRES US TO STEADFASTNESS AND ABUNDING SERVICE.

No writer has better appreciated the important place which this doctrine of the resurrection must hold in the building up of a strong Christian character and in the development of a life of love and service than has the Apostle Paul. He has no "pale scheme of ethics" upon which he would feed the soul of man, neither is he a mere theorist. But he makes doctrine touch life. Truth must be incarnated. Surrounded as we are in this world by those influences which dissipate the moral and religious life, and tend to paralyze all noble endeavor, we must have a "wherefore" that will keep us "steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord." That we may have the experience in our hearts of "The Victory Over Death," which gives a triumphant certainty of life beyond the grave, and the assurance that our labor is

not vain in the Lord; that we are not fighting in a lost cause, is the purpose of the apostle in this mountain top vision. As the pendulum swings from the materialism of the nineteenth century, and we find ourselves breathing a different religious atmosphere, we need above everything else, this doctrine of "steadfastness." Old theories are giving way, new ideas are forcing themselves upon us. What can we hold on to? What will prove to be an anchor of the soul? What will give to our lives, amidst all the sorrow and suffering, the heartaches and disappointments we are called upon to bear, peace and serenity and power? Steadfastness in our faith—faith in the living, loving, personal Christ. Then we shall not be wafted about by every wind of doctrine, but shall be kept secure until that great day when the Master shall say: "Come ye blessed of my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world." As we stand in the presence of death, how small and petty our differences appear! How grand and glorious is the life in Christ!

Let us be steadfast in our hope, for God, through his great mercy, hath begat us to a living hope by the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, unto an inheritance, incorruptible and undefiled and that fadeth not away." Above all, let us be steadfast in our love; love to God and love to one another. Give love the supreme place in our hearts, then shall we cast out all unholy desires and unworthy purposes. If we are steadfast in our faith, and hope and love, then shall we be immovable, always abounding in the work

of the Lord, living epistles read and known of all men."

Slayer of Brittain Denied Bond.

W. E. Lowe, who is charged with the killing of W. W. Brittain at his ranch near Fort Stockton, January 12, has been denied bail by Justice Puckett. Brittain is an uncle of our fellow townsman, F. H. Brittain. Mr. Brittain leaves a wife and two sons, age 10 and 12 years. The commissioners court offered a reward of \$750 for the apprehension of the murdered. He was shot to death about 9 o'clock at night while on his way from his ranch to Fort Stockton, about two miles from the last named place. When killed he was on the ground opening a gate, and received three wounds from a 41-calibre pistol, one in the breast and two in the neck. The wounds in the neck show to have been inflicted after the deceased fell to the ground, and that the assassin was on horseback when he did the shooting. The dead man was not found until the morning after the shooting.

W. E. Lowe, who was marshal, jailor, and constable at Fort Stockton, was arrested on Tuesday following the tragedy. Defendant was practically raised in Taylor county, at Merkel. His mother now lives at Merkel. After the arrival of Judge Cunningham the defendant was given hearing before Justice of the Peace Puckett, who remanded the man to jail without bond. Lowe was removed to Marfa for safe keeping. A writ of habeas corpus has been sued out before Judge Douglas of the Marfa district and an examining trial will be held.

BIBLE STUDY ON ABRAHAM, THE HEBREW.
Genesis 12:1-9—Feb. 16.

"I will bless thee, and make thy name great, and thou shalt be a blessing."—Verse 2.

ABRAM is one of the greatest characters in history. God's promises made to him constitute the foundation of faith for Jews, Christians and Mohammedans, although many of them are not aware of the fact. The Jews are Abraham's descendants through Isaac and Jacob; while Mohammedans represent especially Ishmael and Esau. Christians profess to have become heirs to the chiefest blessings promised to Abraham's Seed, by becoming joint-heirs with Christ Jesus, whom they consider the antitype of Isaac.

The New Testament claim is that the Church of Christ is the antitype of Rebecca, Isaac's wife and joint-heir; and that Christ and the Church, as the Spiritual Seed of Abraham, will be God's agency in blessing the nations. But much of the New Testament teachings was lost during the Dark Ages. Christians forgot that they were called to be joint-heirs in Messiah's "In thy seed shall all Kingdoms be blessed."



all the families of the earth. Instead, they get the narrow view that merely the Elect would be saved, who to all eternity would look over the battlements of Heaven and see all others of mankind in torture, and hear their groans to all eternity.

Only now are Bible students getting back to the teachings of Scripture. Only now are we learning the true import of St. Paul's words: "If ye be Christ's, then are ye Abraham's Seed, and heirs according to the promise."

God's Call to Abraham.

Abraham's birthplace was Ur, one hundred twenty miles north of the Persian Gulf. His father Terah was a heathen. Polytheism prevailed—the worshiping of many gods. From Ur, the family migrated to Haran, about five hundred miles in the direction of Palestine. There Abraham remained until Terah's death.

God's dealings with Abraham, according to St. Stephen (Acts 7:2, 3), began while he was in Ur. God called him out of his evil surroundings, to be the founder of a new nation, holy and obedient to God. The migration from Ur to Haran took the family away from the idolatrous scenes of the metropolis to pastoral life. In harmony with the Divine call, Abraham, then seventy-five years old, his wife Sarah, and his nephew Lot, with their flocks and herds, moved to Canaan after the death of Terah.

Abraham's Great Faith in God.

Abraham was full of faith. This feature of his character especially endeared him to the Almighty, who, because of it, styled him His friend. The Bible does not claim that Abraham was perfect. The reverse of this is declared: "There is none righteous [perfect], no, not one." (Romans 3:10.) None measure up to the glorious image of God represented by Adam.

Abraham was not the friend of God because of his great education, nor for his wonderful intellectual powers. Nevertheless, he had intellectual powers. The fact that he was very rich indicates that he was a good manager. His skill as a leader was shown when Lot and the wealthy Sodomites were taken captive by Chedorlaomer. Abraham promptly armed three hundred and eighteen of his servants, pursued the victors and recovered the spoils.

But it was not for his skill as a general that God loved Abraham. The special quality that God esteemed in him is repeatedly mentioned in the Bible as having been his faith. "Abraham believed God."

Children of Abraham.

Abraham's children, from God's standpoint, include only those who have faith in God. The original evidence of this faith and obedience was circumcision of the flesh, figuratively representing a turning away from sin to obedience to God. Circumcision has become largely a ceremony with the Jews. Such faithless circumcision entitles them to no special Divine favor. But all Jews who still trust in the promises made to Abraham will soon be recipients of marked evidences of Divine blessing through Messiah, who soon is to set up God's Kingdom.

St. Paul explains that all true Christians become the Spiritual Seed of Abraham—heirs of certain spiritual promises, as the natural seed are heirs of certain earthly promises, not yet fulfilled. As the natural seed must main-

tain circumcision to mark their separateness from the Gentiles, so the Spiritual Seed must have circumcision of the heart—separating them from the world and from sin, marking them as "peculiar people, zealous of good works."

We exhort both Jews and Christians to honesty and faithfulness—obedience to God; the one class, that they may inherit the Heavenly promises; the other, that they may be ready for the inheritance which will be theirs as soon as the Heavenly, Spiritual Seed of Abraham shall have been completed by the First Resurrection.

General News Items.

At an election held at Childress February 1st, 543 votes were cast in preferential primary for postmaster. Out of 13 candidates, B. J. Turner and J. W. Hand were the two highest and they ran again last Saturday, the first named winning.

Ochiltree county is reported to have had 4 inches of snow during the last "snap."

A three inch snow fell at Canyon Sunday night, Feb. 2.

Hemphill county was visited recently by a 9-inch snow, falling gently. The wheat farmers are rejoicing.

Senator Johnson of Memphis has introduced a "local option" pool hall bill. If such a bill should become a "law," the people of a community could "vote out" a pool hall if they so desired.

The Lower House of the Congress has passed, by a large majority, a bill prohibiting liquor shipments into "Dry Territory."

A resolution adopting the proposed amendment to the national constitution changing the method of electing United States senators to a direct vote, has passed both houses of the Legislature at Austin.

A general uprising in Old Mexico occurred last Sunday, headed by Gen. Felix Diaz. Severe fighting took place in front of the President's Palace, during which Gen. Reyes, who had been released from prison, was killed.

Denatured Alcohol From Kafr Corn.

High prices for gasoline and fuel oil may force the use of kafr corn in making denatured alcohol for fuel and power purposes. Dr. C. K. Francis, chemist at the Oklahoma Experiment Station, says that with crude equipment at 50 cents per bushel for the seed alcohol can be made at a cost of 15 to 20 cents per gallon. As a gallon of alcohol will furnish as much heat and power as 4 gallons of fuel oil, the manufacture of the kafr into fuel should be undertaken. This would furnish a market for the grain and at the same time give cheaper fuel for automobile and irrigation engines.
