The greatest change comes with the children themselves. Vacation time ends, and they must forget the carefree summer days and accustom themselves to studying, keeping quiet, obeying instructions and getting plenty of sleep at nights. A child gies. left to form its own habits will be handicapped from the start.

Do not let physical defects handicap your children and destroy or hamper their chances of being the top-notch pupils. Be sure their eye-sight, hearing and physical comfort are not retarded by defects.

Each year a safety campaign is pushed in almost every community in the United States just as school opens. This is not "a stunt" or promotion scheme. It is done in all seriousness and should not be passed over lightly. When children return to school, new hazards face motorists and children alike.

If these children are worth educating and developing, they are certainly worthy of protection. An accidental death or the maiming of a child on its way to or from school is one of the most tragic occurances of community life. Everything possible should be done to prevent it. This is the outstanding responsibility of the citizens who make the advantages of schooling possible.

There is little need to urge support of all school activities. We give the students the privilege of entering into these activities by footing the bills. We are not likely to leave them entirely to their own resources with our investments.
