WOODROW WILSON NEW PRESIDENT

New Jersey Citizen Becomes Head of Nation—Inducted into Office by Usual Forms—Great Day in Washington.

Washington, March 4.—Woodrow Wilson became president of the United States today amid imposing ceremonies and tumultuous popular greeting. Standing at the historic east front of the capitol, he took the oath of office. In his brief inaugural address made a fervid appeal to all patriotic men for counsel and aid.

"This is not a day of triumph," he declared; "it is a day of dedication. Here muster not the forces of party, but the forces of humanity. Men's hearts wait upon us; men's hopes call upon us to say what we will do. Shall we live up to the great trust? Who dares fail to try? I summon all honest men, all patriotic, all forward-looking men to my side. God helping me, I will not fail them, if they will but counsel and sustain me."

Vice president Marshall had been inaugurated in the senate chamber only shortly before, and at the conclusion of President Wilson's inaugural address the party hurried back to the White House ahead of the inaugural procession, where Mr. Taft said good-bye to President Wilson and prepared to leave at once for Augusta, Ga. President Wilson shortly afterward took his place to review the procession.

Daylight found things moving swiftly toward the climax of the day's program. About the Shoreham hotel, where Mr. Wilson was stopping, a small crowd, kept a distance by the police, waited for a glimpse of the new president. Another crowd, admirers of Mr. Taft, waited at the White House grounds for a glimpse of him. The grounds, however, had been closed to the public, and the throng waited at a distance. All over the city there was an air of expectancy and final preparation. Finishing touches were being put on everywhere. One of Mr. Wilson's early callers asked him if he had anything to say to the American people on the morning of his inauguration. "I'll wait until noon," he returned smiling.

Three hours before the ceremonies at the capitol were scheduled to begin, the entire east front was packed with a crowd which seemed to be patient, good-natured and content to wait. Scenes about the Shoreham hotel and the White House became more active as the morning wore on. The Princeton students and University of Virginia students, who were to form the line between which Mr. Wilson was to pass on his way to the White House began arriving. The Essex troop, Mr. Wilson's escort, and the Culver troop, Mr. Marshall's escort, began to appear. Their bright uniforms and their prancing horses added action to the scene. Mr. Wilson instructed his secretary, Mr. Tumulty, to learn at what time it would be proper to transmit his cabinet nominations to the senate. The incoming president planned to send in the names today. No one in Washington doubts the cabinet will be composed of the men who have been unofficially named.

GREAT COMMONER APPEARS.

Shortly after 9 o'clock W. J. Bryan called, with W. F. McCombs, chair-

man of the Democratic national committee, to see Mr. Wilson. The president-elect greeted both with a hearty welcome and the three went into a conference. When Mr. Bryan came out of Mr. Wilson's room he held in his hand one of the ten invitations which have been issued to the new cabinet members, providing places for them in the senate chamber today.

"Good morning, Mr. Secretary," cried a chorus of voices as the distinctive envelope was seen.

"Good morning, gentlemen," replied Mr. Bryan with a broad smile, and then he went to call upon Mr. Marshall, who has a suite of rooms in the same hotel.

CONGRESSIONAL ESCORT.

At that time Senators Bacon, Crane and Overman, and Representatives Rucker, McKinley, and Garrett, the congressional committee in charge of the ceremonies, arrived, ready to take Mr. Wilson and Mr. Marshall to the White House. Secretary Tumulty meanwhile skipped across Lafayette park and paid a short visit to the White House offices. Secretary Tumulty's visit to the White House was to determine when President Wilson's nominations should be sent to the senate. It was decided that, as the senate would not be in session immediately after Mr. Wilson takes the oath, the nominations would be sent in tomorrow.

DRIVE TO WHITE HOUSE.

At 9:45 Mr. Wilson and Mr. Marshall, accompanied by the congressional committee, left their hotel and began the short drive to the White House. The Culver and Essex troops cantered along as their escort. The students of Princeton and Virginia universities, in long lines on either side of the street, fell in behind the procession and followed it to the White House. The ride to the White House was finished between cheering lines of the students.

THE RIDE TO THE CAPITOL.

The stay in the White House was brief. At 10:17 o'clock the ride to the capitol began. In the first carriage were President Taft and Mr. Wilson, Senators Crane and Bacon. In the second carriage were Mr. Marshall, Senator Overman and Representative Rucker. In the third rode Representatives McKinley and Garrett. The party moved briskly down Pennsylvania avenue. To roars of cheers the president and Mr. Wilson gave their acknowledgments.

PANHANDLE STEERS ST. LOUIS MARKET

National Stock Yards Bidding for White Face Cattle of the Plains of Texas—"Beef in the Rough."

In a recent issue of the St. Louis Daily National Live Stock Reporter, a bid is made for the "Beef in the Rough" of the Panhandle of Texas. The National Stock Yards located in St. Louis has inaugurated a campaign to make that city the great central market of the United States, and they begin by laying claim to the fact that their city is the center of the greatest corn belt in the world and, therefore, the logical feeding center. They state that more than one-third of the corn crop (a billion bushels) is raised within a radius of 300 miles of St. Louis. The article which has since been sent out as a circular says:

TO THE PANHANDLE.

"After a canvass of the reasons why the St. Louis market holds the greatest demand for feeding cattle, we naturally turn to raisers of feeder cattle, and the Panhandle ranchman holds our eye as the greatest producer of "Beef in the Rough." These breeders raise more, and a better grade of feeding calves, than anyone else in the country. Cattle feeders from all over the country go to them when looking for the best beeves to feed.

CENTRAL MEETING PLACE.

The idea, then, is to find the central market, and there is no reason to look further than the St. Louis National Stock Yards. At this point the seller and feeder come together. Feeders from a score of states come here annually to restock their feed lots and the demand at this point is far in excess of the supply. Feeders are sold almost as soon as they arrive. Opportunity knocks at the door of the Panhandle feeder cattle raiser. It has been proven that the buyers of feeders have found their central market and it is up to the ranchman to supply the cattle they are after and reap the profits caused by keen competition. The Panhandle ranchman has the class of cattle we want and we have the class of buyers he wants. Why not get together?

HALF MILLION PANHANDLE CATTLE NEEDED.

St. Louis could easily handle half a million Panhandle feeders every year at a handsome profit to the Panhandle producers. In fact, this half a million is but a drop in the bucket compared with the actual annual requirements of the Corn Belt cattle finishers residing in St. Louis territory. There are 23 railroads centering at St. Louis. These penetrate the Corn Belt and in addition give an outlet to New York, Pennsylvania, Ohio, West Virginia and Virginia, states that each year need thousands of Panhandle feeders for their pastures and would be glad to look to St. Louis for supplies. The cattle supply of the Corn Belt is today at its lowest ebb in a decade. Compared with growth of population the cattle supply here is alarmingly short. To meet this emergency a steady movement of Panhandle feeders and calves is needed at St. Louis year after year."

Verdict in Sweet Clover Case.

After the jury has been out a week, it reported today to the court that it has reached a conclusion, which was: That where a farmer could raise anything else he should not "monkey" with Sweet Clover; that if he has an irrigated farm, he should let it severely alone as it will "take" his ditches and give more pains than profit; that the "dry farmers" could plant it for early grazing, but should plow up the field where planted at the end of the second year, or else the clover will get the best of them. The jury agreed that some stock could be "taught" to eat it, but others had to be "starved" into eating it; that the plant was a great soil builder and fertilizer, but as the Panhandle soil was already pretty fair, farmers should take no chances. The jury closed their report by quoting from the evidence of F. D. Coburn, feed expert of Kansas and specialist in alfalfa: "Those situated where alfalfa seems unreliable or cannot be grown, might do well to experiment with a patch of sweet clover."

Will Enforce Curfew Ordinance.

There is an ordinance for the city of Hereford prohibiting children under 16 years of age from loitering upon the streets from the hours of 7:30 o'clock p. m. until 5 o'clock a. m. from Oct. 1 to March 1; 8:30 p. m. to 5 a. m. from March 1 to Oct. 1. This ordinance will be enforced hereafter. If you don't want your boy put in jail keep him at home or give him written permission to remain on the street.

Irrigation Commission Proposed in Burges' Bill.

Austin, Texas.—An irrigation bill has been introduced in the House by Hon. Richard F. Burges of El Paso which, if it becomes a law, which will be of incalculable value in promoting the agricultural development of all sections of the state and especially the western or arid portion. The measure is known as the Burges Irrigation law and covers not only the irrigation sections of Texas, but embraces the entire state in its provisions. The bill provides among other things for an Irrigation Commission to be composed of men who have the technical skill and practical experience to fit them for their duties. The conditions throughout the state are so widely divergent and in many instances antagonistic that a Commission to adjust the law to meet the various situations is thought necessary. We now have 450,971 acres of land under irrigation and 42,700,000 acres susceptible to irrigation. The retention and the distribution of water is one of the most important problems in agriculture.

MAN FREEZES TO DEATH

G. B. Tuck of Endee Found Frozen to Death Near Cap Rock Saturday.

Endee Enterprise.—The people of this vicinity were greatly shocked last Saturday to learn of the finding of the body of Mr. Tuck some 14 miles southeast of Endee.

Mr. Tuck had taken a contract of building a fence for the Syndicate people, and established a camp about 15 miles from town, leaving his camp Wednesday morning he came to Endee, going from here to his home north of town, and on Thursday about noon left Endee to return to his camp. The last time he was seen alive was between 4 and 5 o'clock Thursday afternoon, when a short distance south of the Chapman place he was seen to leave the road and go west. John Gates while looking for his horses Saturday morning found Mr. Tuck's body, and W. C. McDonald and Mr. Gates, who were working for Mr. Tuck, immediately came to town with the sad news. A coroner's inquest was held Saturday afternoon where the body was found, the verdict being that death was caused by cold and exposure. The general opinion is that Mr. Tuck became lost Thursday afternoon and as he was walking, became exhausted or sick, and could go no farther. When found he was about a mile from camp.

Glover B. Tuck was an honest, hard working farmer, and had lived a few miles north of Endee for more than six years, and was a good neighbor, highly respected by all who knew him. Deceased leaves to mourn his death a widow, who is now in frail health, and four children, the eldest being 15 years of age. The entire community unites in extending sympathy to the bereaved family. Funeral services were held Sunday, and the remains were laid to rest in the Nunneley cemetery.

Are Planting Tamaracks.

Plainview News.—The Pearson syndicate has just received a carload of 125,000 cuttings of tamarack or salt cedar trees and will plant them along the roadsides of each tract of its land in the Plainview country, for shade trees, ornamental purposes and as windbrakes.

The tamarack is a very fast growing tree, growing from ten to twelve feet the first year and thirty feet or more in three years, and is an ideal windbrake, besides it has a beautiful peacock green foliage, which continues all the winter. By planting the cuttings six feet apart excellent and everlasting posts can be grown, and by planting them six inches apart a solid wall hedge can be grown. The tree grows only from cuttings, and is adapted to a dry climate. The wood is almost as hard as ebony. The planting will be under the direction of Mr. Kruger, the syndicate's horticulturist, and he will have two deep furrows plowed, then thrown up with a keep furrow between, this will be flooded with water, then the cuttings, stuck down in the wet ground, and the ground swept back over the furrow.

BRINGS IN ANOTHER PUMP

McDonald Company Finishes Big Irrigation Well for R. M. Dunn of Colorado.

The McDonald Company finished and developed another big pumper this week, it being for R. M. Dunn, whose home is in Colorado, but who intends to move here soon. The well is located on what has been known as the Dennison place 2 miles north of town and on 25-Mile Ave. This makes four big wells on this main public thoroughfare and in going up the road makes one think he is approaching a rapidly developing oil field. But it ain't; it's better. This well is only about 1,000 feet south of the Vaughn well. Water was "struck" at 46 feet and the entire depth of the well is 180 feet, thus giving 134 feet of water. A 50 H. P. engine will be used as the power and will be attached to a Layne pump. The "flow", of this well is 1,500 gallons at present, and after being pumped should run up to not less than 1,750.

This makes the 16th well of this type completed by the McDonald Company. The big drilling outfit has been moved to the 40-acre tract the property of Mr. McDonald, in south Hereford, where work is proceeding rapidly.

Stockmen's Convention.

The annual Roundup of cattlemen at Amarillo this week was largely attended. This being the first year for the new organization which takes in a wider territory. Oklahoma City was well represented, a live bunch coming down after the convention for 1914. The boosters kept things moving wherever they were. Amarillo "entertained" the visitors in true Southwestern hospitality. The first day and night was given over to the opening sessions and to preliminaries. The second day brought in a number of new features, the auto parade, ladies' banquet and the men's smoker being the biggest events. The ladies of Amarillo entertained the visiting ladies with a dinner at the Harvey house. The men packed the Grand opera house to the roost and a sort of medley was pulled off beginning with a band concert and running thru a series of motion pictures, vaudeville acts, serpentine dances, patriotic exhibitions, glove contests, closing with a "fight" between a man and a live lober wolf. Light refreshments of distilled ambrosia with Havana flavor were generalously served throughout the entire evening. During all these attractions, the different delegations kept up a friendly but sharp rivalry for honors and to make votes for their city for the next convention. The Oklahoma City bunch evidently came down loaded to take all the game. Hereford was well represented in the general mill and on the streets and at the Smoker.

BROOKLYN TABERNACLE BIBLE STUDY ON

HOPE FOR THE SODOMITES. Genesis 19: 12-17, 23-29—March 9.

When Abraham was ninety-nine years old—in 2021 B. C.—his encampment was at Hebron. There the Lord and two angels appeared to him as men. He knew them not, but entertained them. (Hebrews 13:2.) The one called the Lord was doubtless the Logos, subsequently man's Redeemer. The Lord on this occasion told Abraham that Ishmael would not be the heir of the Promise, but that shortly Sarah would have a son. The next year Isaac was born.

As Abraham walked a little distance with his visitors, he learned who they really were, and that the destruction of Sodom was imminent. Nobly and generously he petitioned God's Mercy on the Sodomites. The Lord gave assurance that if there were even ten righteous in Sodom, it would be spared. Thus of the Sodomites and the "Sodomites" God made illustrations of the great lesson, "All the wicked will He destroy." We are to remember that these are not illustrations of eternal torment, but of destruction. These merely passed into destruction a few years sooner than ordinarily; for the death sentence passed upon humanity in Adam. But since "Jesus Christ by the grace of God tasted death for every man," all of Adam's children will eventually come from the tomb.

"And Delivered Righteous Lot." St. Peter informs us that Lot was not in sympathy with his surroundings. (2 Peter 2:7, 8.) The flight of Lot, with his wife and two unmarried daughters, is simply told in our lesson. The intimation of verse 29 is that God's Mercy toward Lot was because of his relationship to Abraham. This view is consistent with all Scriptural statements on the subject.

Adam's entire race was condemned to death in him. Hence Divine Justice owed them nothing. Divine Mercy had entered into a special Covenant with Abraham, but that Covenant extended to none others, except Abraham's seed. Therefore Lot's relationship to Abraham was the only reason why God should favor him.

"There's a Witness in God's Mercy." This does not signify that God is merciless, but that, having provided a way by which He will exercise Mercy, He rarely exercises it outside of that channel. The channel of God's Mercy is Christ Jesus, who declared, "No man cometh unto the Father but by Me." St. Peter substantiates this statement. See Acts 4:12. The Scriptures clearly teach that none were saved until Jesus died. This is the key which unlocks the wonders of God's grace even though to some the statement may seem astounding.

We should rid ourselves of the thought that the holy men of the past went to Heaven, and the remainder of mankind to eternal torture. The Bible most distinctly declares that all, both good and bad, "sleep with their fathers." They still sleep, awaiting the time when Abraham's Seed (Galatians 3:16, 29) will be completed, and set up God's Kingdom on earth, overthrow sin and death, and deliver the captives from the tomb.

The First, or Chief Resurrection. The First Resurrection began with our Lord Jesus and is not yet complete; for all the Elect are to share both His sacrificial death and His Resurrection. These will reign with Christ a thousand years, and as the Seed of Abraham, fully empowered, will bless all those redeemed by the precious blood of Calvary.—Revelation 20:4.

St. Paul emphasizes this point in Hebrews 11:38-40, declaring that while the Ancient Worthies received indications of God's favors, nevertheless that favor can come only through Christ. Consequently they cannot reach everlasting life until the Spiritual Seed of Abraham shall have been completed. Jesus also at

tested that they had not gone to Heaven, saying, "No man hath ascended up to Heaven."—John 3:13.

Hope For the Sodomites. The hope for the Sodomites is exactly the same as that for the remainder of mankind. The hope of the world is the Messianic Kingdom, and the deliverance from sin and death which it will effect. The basis of hope for both Church and world is the one

laws of the Messianic Kingdom. It is time of minimum rainfall that makes the necessity of irrigation. In the full years, the wells can stand idle, but in the time of the lean years, the wells will fill the granaries. Irrigation at Hereford is the best sort of insurance, not against the destruction of the crop, but for the growth of the corn and wheat or alfalfa.

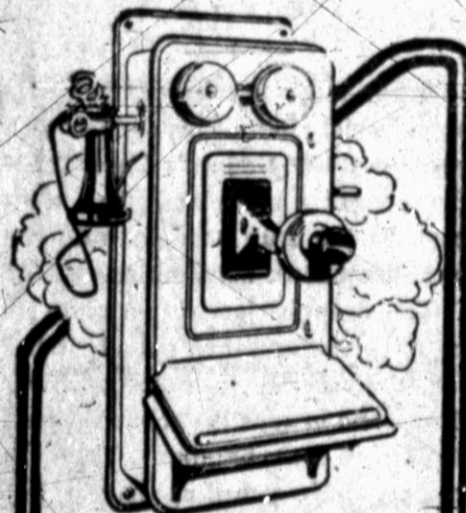

MAKING A PRESIDENT

The inauguration of Mr. Wilson as president of the United States of America marks a radical change in the policy of governmental affairs. Elected, as he was, as a protest against the long standing abuses of privileges to the classes to the suffering of the masses, he enters upon his duties in as much favor as did President Monroe, who was elected without practical opposition. True, Mr. Wilson had "strenuous" and "avoirdupois" opposition, but as the day of the election approached, even his most bitter political enemies saw his great victory. The inauguration of a president is in itself a very simple matter, but the making of a president in its political aspect is a process as complicated as would be the re-building of all the telegraph and telephone lines of the country. The policies, new or old, must be carried to the mind of every voter, the promises and pledges of the party must make a permanent lodgment in every heart; and at the ballot, the response must be decided.

First comes the selection of a "standard bearer" from the ranks of each party; then after that the battle between the parties themselves. Often the effort to select the candidates involves greater labor and the results are watched with greater interest than the contest between the parties. This was true in both of the leading parties in 1912. The Republican Convention was "split" in twain and while Mr. Taft was nominated, the results showed that he did not have the support of the men in his party, who controlled the situation. The Roosevelt Convention had little trouble in making a nomination, but his following only took votes from the "Regulars" and assured the choice of Mr. Wilson. The Democratic Convention at Baltimore stood in "deadlock" longer than any other national convention ever held in the United States, and, at times, it seemed that a rupture would come.

The method laid down in the Constitution for the election of a president has never fit the situation. The provisions hoped for the selection of a president by a purely non-partisan vote. The framers of that instrument thought they had hit upon a plan, but experience taught them that the mark had been missed. Then that part was amended, but it, too, has failed in its purposes. The indirect method as provided has always been accompanied with far too much unnecessary "red tape." It was supposed that the chosen "Electors" would enter the "College of Electors" free from political affiliations, promises or pledges and would select a man in whom they thought to find the best qualifications; but this was the "door ajar" for political schemes and "wire pulling," resulting in the "instruction" of the "Electors" as for whom they should cast their votes. Accordingly the "spirit" of the Constitution has been violated, but the results have been, perhaps, more satisfactory to the people and the "people are the government."

The election, now, of a president is an election "by the states," the value of the votes of the states being determined by the census. If a party can secure enough of the state's "Electoral Votes" its candidate may be elected even though he
