## WIRELESS, RADIUM LIQUID AIR SHOW

Prof. Patty Gives Interesting and Instructive Entertainment—Makes Good as Advertised.

Prof. Patty, the liquid air, radium and wireless demonstrator, drew a good audience to the court house last Monday night and for two hours held the undivided attention and interest of the elders as well as the youngsters. Mr. Patty in his remarks reviewed some of the wonders of the past and present ages and predicted some of the things that the future generations might enjoy. He began by making experiments with wireless telegraphy in a practical way. He explained as he went along how the instruments were constructed and then how the messages were sent on their way thru space from one station to another. He demonstrated how machinery could be started and controlled by the use of the power. For the purpose, he started and stopped miniature motors, turned and stopped fans, rang bells, exploded miniature submarine mines. His next was to explain something about the wonders of radium, that subtle substance discovered by Madam Curie and her late husband. He had four small tubes to exhibit and explain the power of radio-active substances. This part of his lecture was somewhat disappointing to the more expectant of the audience, but was sufficient to demonstrate the wonders of nature and what she has in store for he who would know the secrets of the universe. Mr. Patty's liquid air demonstrations were, perhaps, more comprehensible than some of his other experiments. He froze a few carnations to a temperature of 312 degrees below freezing, crushed some of them between his fingers and the leaves and petals fell to the floor like dry flakes. The remaining flower was laid by and in a few minutes it had regained its former condition, not showing any signs of its cold bath. Another was to freeze a few cranberries as hard as glass marbles and at the same time and in the same vessel, only a few millimeters from the freezing berries, burn with beautiful squintillations, strips of steel. He explained that the liquid gave off, first its nitrogen and then its oxygen, the latter forming a layer just above the liquid, and in this almost pure oxygen, the steel was fused and burned. His last experiment was to boil liquid air on a piece of ice. This was a simple thing, but served to fix the idea of the differences of temperatures, the ice being much warmer than the liquid that the latter would be rapidly evaporated by the temperature of the ice. Just for fun, he placed a few chips of ice in the ebullient liquid and the ice was thus "boiled." Prof. Patty passed the "stewed" ice to the audience and several partook of the new dish, which they seemed to relish. In all the entertainment, or rather the demonstration, was a success, and the high school should be given full credit for bringing such to the town.

## Alamo Heroes Monument Association.

San Antonio, Texas, April 10.—Modeled on the exact proportions of the Alamo Heroes monument to be erected in honor of the brave men who died in the Alamo on March 6, 1836, not one of whom sought to escape, but each fought with his face to the enemy until death, a replica of the monument is being erected in San Antonio. It will be 25 feet high and 3 feet square at the base and will be columned, panelled and decorated with statues of Travis, Crockett, Bowie and Bonham exactly as will be the 802 foot structure, but smaller in proportion. It is expected this replica will be completed in time to be unveiled April 21, the day the Fiesta San Jacinto opens in San Antonio, when the city will be filled with visitors.

Among the many letters received endorsing the monument is one from Prof. F. M. Bralley, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, who wrote as follows:

"It gives me pleasure to know that at last a well-organized movement has been started, with apparent success, to pay the debt of seventy-seven years' standing which the people of Texas owe to those great men and patriots who died for our liberty, those men who paved the way for our present imperial commonwealth, and who are deserving of a monument such as contemplated by your Association. I am glad to give my approval to the plan by which it is intended to reach every inhabitant of our great state, teaching the story of the Alamo and its heroes, and giving every one an opportunity to show his patriotism and appreciation for what has been done for Texas by such men as Travis, Bowie, Crockett, Bonham, and the other heroes of the Alamo."

## Smudged Orchards at Hereford.

The cold snap that fell upon us Wednesday put the Hereford orchardists busy preparing to smudge. A number had secured pots and cans and had arranged with the Southwestern Telephone Company to "sound the alarm" when the thermometer indicated the frost degree. W. H. Ray, better known as Bill Ray, jeweler and inventor, had built for himself an electric frost alarm. This he places in his orchard and when the temperature falls to 30, 32 or to any degree for which the "alarm" is set, a bell is vigorously rung in his sleeping room, and it continues to ring until he gets up and stops it; it won't let up. Mr. Ray then rings "Central" and the young lady "at the switch" connects with all who have placed a request to be called. Thus in less than a half minute every one is warned of the approach of the frost degree. Thursday morning a few minutes before 5 o'clock, the alarm was sounded and sent out and in less than 5 minutes, one could see springing up in different parts of the community the smudge fires. These fires were kept burning until after the sun was well up. The fuel used is distillate or common kerosene. Those who smudged Thursday morning were: W. H. Ray, W. B. Dameron, C. Smith, J. T. ## Mayor Issues Clean-Up Call.

To the people of Hereford: Gov. Colquitt has recently issued a proclamation designating Friday, April 18th, 1913, as a general clean-up day throughout the state, and has especially requested that owners of property to give personal attention to the removal of all rubbish and combustible material from their premises, in order to lessen the enormous fire waste in Texas.

In compliance with the request of the Governor, I hereby designate April 18th and 19th as general clean-up days in the City of Hereford and vicinity, and request all of our citizens to give their premises a thorough overhauling and cleaning. Not only for the purpose of minimizing the fire risk by burning and destroying all combustible trash, but also for the purpose of putting the town in the best possible sanitary condition.

All combustible trash of every kind should be burned. All non-combustible trash and waste matter, such as tin cans, broken glass and leaky iron utensils should be raked into piles accessible to the trash wagon.

It is likely that the most of our people do not know how near Hereford came to winning the prize for being the cleanest town in its class in the year 1912. Our sewer system and water works, our public buildings, including court house and school building, gave us a very high grade in those lines. Our failure to cut and burn the weeds, as we should have done, was the fact that caused us to lose the prize.

It is the duty of every citizen to have the trash hauled off his own premises, but the City will assist in this particular those needing assistance on request made to the marshal.

I specially request the assistance of the Civic League and of all the ladies of the community in organizing for this clean-up crusade that we may get the best results possible.

## Young Actor Displays Jackson Courage.

The following account of a serious stage accident at Claude last week, as told by the Claude News, finds in the young man the courage of a Jackson:

During the play, "Down in Dixie," rendered at the auditorium Saturday night, what proved to be quite a painful accident occurred.

In one scene between "Harvey Wells" (Olin Slay) and "Major Bradley" (Tommy McClure), the latter had to use a pistol. The wadding from the cartridge stuck Olin in the side, burning a hole about two inches in his coat, passing through his underclothing and causing quite a painful wound in his left side. Olin finished the act, slipped down a fire escape and hurried home. A physician was summoned and dressed the wound, his side being badly swollen and powder-burned. The young man has been confined to his home since the accident, but will probably be out in a few days. No blame whatever attaches to young McClure, who was greatly distressed when he heard of the injury. Olin had the nerve to finish the act without giving the audience any intimation of the accident.

BIBLE STUDY ON

THE GATE OF HEAVEN.  
Genesis 28:10-22—April 13.

"I am with thee and will keep thee, whithersoever thou goest."—Verse 15.

JACOB was over forty years old when he left home, forsaking the possessions which belonged to his purchased birthright. He counted all earthly possessions insignificant compared with the Abrahamic Promise, to which he had become heir. That Esau cared nothing for the spiritual Promise and was quite content with the earthly inheritance, is manifest from the subsequent story.

In his journey toward Haran, Jacob came to Luz. He did not seek lodgings there, but placing a stone for a pillow, wrapped himself in his mantle, and lay down in a quiet spot to sleep.



His deep religious convictions, his faith in the God of his father and his grandfather, his desire for a share of the Divine blessing, had made him an outcast. Doubtless he felt lonesome and heart-sick. He was leaving his friends and going, practically penniless, to find some kind of service.

"Jacob Have I Loved."

This Scriptural statement is borne out by God's dealings with Jacob. He had shown his courage, his faith. Now he needed encouragement, and therefore was given a dream of beautiful import. In his dream he saw a ladder extending from his side up to Heaven and crowded with angels. At the further end, in his mind he saw God and heard His words, full of encouragement. God assured him that He recognized him as the legal heir to the great Abrahamic Promise.

The phraseology of God's Message is much the same that was given to Abraham, and confirmed to Isaac. Now it was confirmed to Jacob. He was thenceforth in covenant relationship with the God of his fathers.

Neither a Jew Nor a Christian.

Jacob was not a Christian; and therefore God's providences over him were not of the same kind as those of the Church. He was not invited to share in "the high calling." He was not promised a change of nature to the Heavenly condition. All of the promises to him were earthly, as were those made to Abraham.

Neither was Jacob a Jew. The nation called Israel, afterwards known as Jews, were Jacob's children; but they were yet unborn. They became a nation by being brought into covenant relationship with God through Moses and the Law Covenant.

The patriarchs, Abraham, Isaac and Jacob—under neither the Law nor the Gospel—constituted a distinct class. To them especially (in conjunction with some of the noble Prophets and Worthies of the Jewish Age) belonged God's great promises respecting the blessing of all mankind. Not being of the spirit-begotten Church, they can have no share with Messiah in His Spiritual Kingdom. In fulfillment of the Abrahamic Promise, however, they will be granted human perfection in the resurrection, and thus qualified to be princes of earth, representatives of Messiah's Kingdom.

What the Dream Meant.

Jacob's ladder represents the thought of direct fellowship between Heaven and earth. Through Jacob's Seed this great work of opening up relationship between God and men would be accomplished. The vision of God at the further end, and His encouraging words, were to stimulate Jacob to faithfulness and appreciation of this great Promise as worth much more than it had cost him. The dream had its intended effect. Jacob was encouraged for the remainder of his life.

This lesson applies to Christians also. With the fuller light of the Apostolic teaching and the guidance of the Holy Spirit, we understand that before Abraham, Isaac, Jacob and the Holy Prophets of the past can bless the world, another work must be done. That work will be done by our Lord Jesus,



whose death constituted the entire foundation for the complete outworking of God's Plan for mankind. During this Gospel Age a secondary feature has operated; an elect company has been called out of the world to constitute the Spiritual House—Seed of Abraham. If this ladder of communion came down to Jacob, still more does it center in the Christ, of which Jesus is the

Head, and the Church the Body.

When Jacob awakened, he felt overwhelmed. To have the Almighty thus indicate His approval seemed wonderful to the friendless man. He said, "Surely this place may be called God's House and the Gate of Heaven!" He then set his stone pillow up as a monument, and poured oil upon it, signifying its sacredness.

The Church of Christ has delighted to be known as the House of God—Bethel. By and by as the Temple of God, Jesus being the Chief Corner Stone, it will be the Gate of Heaven, through which will come great blessings to mankind.

**Big Flood In Deaf Smith County.**

Twenty three years ago last Sunday, W. S. Higgins, president of the First National Bank, familiarly known by his friends as Uncle Summy, landed in Deaf Smith County.

The exact point of his mooring was on the section of land now known as the Brukbaker place. With a few camping effects in the wagon and in company with a few other men, young men then, they pitched their tent on the wide plains. Filled with ambition and possessing the courage of a Boone or a Bowie, they had come to face the wilds of a new country and to win their fortune. In the crowd were: W. S. Higgins, John Higgins, Adam Davis, So Blocky, and a man by the name of Hatfield. For the first two weeks, the boys took it time about in hauling water about two miles from the only well in the whole country around, but at the end of that short period, the heavens were cleft asunder, the thunder rolled its denotations along the unbroken prairies, the lightning emblazoned earth and sky, the wind blew and the rain fell and beat upon that tent. The flood gates of heaven were burst. The boys at the camp had not made the same preparations as Noah, as they had not been warned, neither had they a hundred years in which to build an ark; but in less than thirty minutes they were standing half knee deep in water. All but two of them left the tent and made for the wagon, leaving Uncle Summy and one other in the tent. They swung onto the ridge pole, trying to hold the tent down and at the same time to keep their feet from dragging them down to an untimely and watery grave. It rained and it rained, says Higgins, until you could not see a point of land anywhere. All of their things were soaked with water, but in an hour or two the sun shone out, but still the water was seething everywhere. So the boys all lined up on the wagon tongue like chickens on the roost to dry out their clothes, having only one suit apiece. "This was the biggest rain I ever saw in all my life," remarked Mr. Higgins last Monday when narrating this story to a crowd of his friends at the First National Bank corner. "Twenty three years ago, we landed here," he began. "I went out to the old place last Sunday and it was on Sunday that we landed here. I have seen the country pass from the Texas Lonhorns to the blooded White Faces. Hereford was not thought of then; La Platta was a little settlement and the county seat. Little did we think that a greater part of the county was underlaid with an ocean of water, but on that rainy day, May 3, an ocean of water was on top."

### Farmers' Institute.

Under the direction of the State Department of Agriculture, Farmers' Institutes will be held at Hereford, April 18, 2:00 p. m. The place of meeting will be announced. These institutes will be conducted by E. A. Miller, Assistant Entomologist and Plant Pathologist of the Texas Department of Agriculture, who will discuss Orchard Management, bearing particularly upon principal diseases and insects, especially the control of the codling moth or apple worm and fruit tree borers.

The State Department of Agriculture publishes, from time to time, valuable reports upon topics of vital interest to the farmers of the state. All institutes will receive copies of all bulletins issued by the Department free of cost, and will be placed on the regular mailing list for future bulletins and reports. These institutes are farmers' meetings devoted to the upbuilding of the best interests of the farmer. It is urged, therefore, that farmers bring their families and devote, at least, one day to a careful study and discussion of the agricultural questions which lie nearest their hearts.

ceeded, about three years ago, to raise only Holstein cattle, to buy, in common, high-standard bulls. Some got registered heifers, and all cows had the Holstein strain, no other bulls being used. On the same principle they selected two breeds of hogs—Berkshires and Jersey Reds—and worked out all that did not have one or the other of these strains. They also settled upon one breed of sheep, and for poultry they raised only White Leghorns and Rhode Island Reds.

The Thirty-Third Legislature, which adjourned April 1st, to meet again in special session July 21st, considered a total of 1,467 bills and resolutions. Of this number 197 general bills and resolutions finally passed both branches of the House and have been acted upon favorably by the Governor. In all 1,397 bills were introduced. Of this number the Senate fathered 494 and the House 903. In the Senate twenty-four joint resolutions were offered and in the House forty-three. Bills and resolutions offered this session

exceed those of the Thirty-Second Legislature by 443. During the session of the last Legislature a total of 1,024 bills and resolutions were presented for consideration.

There were 95 bills passed by the Senate, all of which have either received consideration at the hands of Gov. Colquitt or will soon be at his disposal, while 102 bills passed the lower branch of the House. A perusal of the records shows that during the past session of the Legislature 114 bills were either killed or died on the calendar while 23 amendments to the constitution met the same fate. The following Senate and House bills which passed both branches of the House were vetoed by the Governor:

No. 26. Brelsford—Normal school for the Twenty-Eighth Senatorial District.

No. 54. McGregor—Giving railroad employees a voice in control of hospitals supported by earnings from railroad men.

No. 95. Hudspeth and Johnson—Permitting the sale of school lands in forty-acre tracts.

No. 159. Connor and Lattimore—Providing for the issuance of first-grade certificates (teachers') by colleges that will enlarge their curriculum.
