LADIES TENDER LIBRARY TO CITY

Commission Accepts Club Library and Mayor Appoints Managing Committee.

Some weeks ago the now resident members of the Monday Afternoon Club, which had ceased to exist officially, met and discussed the question of the disposition of the public library. It will be remembered that the ladies of this once popular and prosperous club formed the nucleus of a library and had accumulated thru their efforts a goodly number of books. For a while the library was in the rooms of the Western National Bank, then in the rear offices of the State Bank building, but for some time now, the books have been in the rest rooms of the court house. At this meeting, the ladies passed a resolution tendering the library to the city. The Commission at a recent session adopted suitable resolutions accepting the proffer and also worked out a plan for its future management. In speaking of the matter, Mayor Knight says that the city accepts the library only as custodian of the property, it being understood that no expense will attach there to. The mayor's plan is simple. A committee of five citizens are to have full control of the library. This committee will make a report once each year to the city, giving such information as may be needful and desirable. The committee for the year 1913 is composed of the following persons: Mesdames Garrison, G. A. F. Parker, J. J. Gallihier, Messrs. J. E. Garrison and A. C. Elliott.

A Letter Back to Iowa.

Sherm Williams, a successful Deaf Smith county farmer and feeder, writes back to his old home paper and tells about this country: Hereford, Tex., Jan. 4, 1913. Mr. C. H. Austin, Lineville, Iowa. Dear Friend:—Inclosed find one dollar to advance my subscription for the New Year.

This has been a very prosperous year for the people of this part of the world, and we can notice the difference in the general feeling of the people, and especially in the money matters, and I do not give the credit of it all to the election of Wilson as president of the U. S. and the Panhandle of Texas. But I am inclined to believe that this country is on an upward tendency to the betterment of the people. While it is no boom but a steady growth of immigration. Dry farming will pay here if stock farming is handled right, but irrigation far exceeds it for grain farming. The soil is as good here as Iowa was 40 years ago and the growing season is much longer. Irrigation is fast developing this country into a grain farming country that will be as good if not better than old Iowa or Illinois. They are pumping water from 30 to 100 feet with gas engines, pumping from 1,000 to 1,500 gal. per minute, burning oil that costs 3 to 5 cents per gallon. One of these wells will irrigate 160 acres, and the land lies in ideal condition for the purpose. The winter is mild here so far. Christmas was fine with some snow. Good luck to all our old Wayne county friends I remain as ever

MAGNOLIA OIL CONCERN HERE

Site For Supply Tanks and House On Old Cement Block Plant Location.

E. M. Hackett of Dallas, general manager for the Magnolia Oil Co., and F. W. Moore of the same place, superintendent of construction work, are here this week to start the work of erecting the five big storage tanks and building, from which the company will supply the trade of this territory. Since the use of fuel oil engines for pumping have come into such demand, the erection of these tanks become a necessity. The Magnolia people, some weeks ago, visited Hereford to look over the situation and at once decided to erect a plant here. The actual work was begun yesterday, clearing off the lot and removing the remains of the old building. The storage of fuel oil at this place in large quantities will encourage the irrigation projects around Hereford and will enable the farmer to get fuel at a cheaper price and when he needs it. The local manager, J. W. English, has been as busy as a bee in blossom, time getting things in shape for this step, and it was largely thru his efforts that this strong concern has located here.

Dear Sir:

I am in receipt of your favor enclosing an application for the recognition of the Hereford High School as a high school of the first class. The application seems to meet all of the requirements of the law and the regulations of the State Department of Education, and the Hereford High School is hereby recognized as a high school of the first class. A certificate of approval will be sent you at a later date. In order that our records may be complete with respect to your high school, I shall ask that you forward at once a copy of your course of study.

Forest Walker, a brother of the head of the firm, will be business manager, and C. E. Walker, another brother, will have charge of the sales department. J. I. Walker, the senior member of the firm, will still devote his attention to the development of their large land holdings and irrigation plants. TOPS FAT LAMB MARKET

Hereford Raised Sheep Takes Highest Price in K. C. Market Bringing \$9.20 Per Hundred.

In giving the market reports published at Kansas City, Hereford sheep raisers and shippers come in as winners in the price taking contest. One item says:

"Frank Elder of Raymond, Kas., who marketed here today, January 9, about 550 head of lambs, the first shipment out of 3,000 he has been feeding, made just a little the best showing of any sheep feeder discovered so far this winter. Last fall Mr. Elder bought these lambs near Hereford, Tex., at \$2.60 per head. On a short feed they added a big gain in weight, and today averaged 73 pounds, and sold for \$8.80. It might be safe to say that Mr. Elder cleared \$2 per head on these lambs. If he sells the balance at this same rate he will be decidedly to the good."

A second item reads that 2 car loads of Peter Ronse lambs topped the market at \$9.20, and part of a car sold at the close of the day at \$9.30. These lambs weighed 73 pounds. These lambs were bought last fall at Hereford, Tex., through Bell & Conkright. These lambs were in good shape when brought off the range and made good gain in weight in a remarkable short time. The Ronse shipment had 501 lambs and were the first to the market out of 8,000 he had brought from the Plains of Texas. Frank Elder's lambs were also bought through Bell & Conkright.

ANOTHER BIG RAIN MAKER

McDonald Company Brings in 16th Big Irrigation Well on Green Farm This Week.

The sixteenth big irrigation well for Hereford drilled by the D. L. McDonald Company was "brought in" this week. The well is on the H. T. Green farm 19 miles northeast of town. Mr. Green and family moved here recently from far-off Wisconsin and the first thing he wanted after he landed here was one of McDonald's big water getters. Mr. Green's farm is the east half of section 41, block No. 7, and is as fine a piece of land for irrigation as could be found anywhere. The well drilling crew "developed" the well this week, pumping out a lot of sand and at the final test, the 8-inch discharge pipe was letting out a stream of water full size. Water was found at a depth of 80 feet. A 80 H-P Bessmer Oil engine will be used.

This well widens the field of "Oceans of Water" at Hereford, it being the greatest distance out from town. The "proven field" now will cover a territory 12 miles wide by 24 miles long, or nearly 200,000 acres. Other wells are under contract by the McDonald Company. The Walker-Perkins Company have purchased a big rotary drill and are now at work putting down their fifth big well. This well is located just one mile south of town, really in South Hereford, on the L. W. Ricketts place, which this partnership has recently purchased. Thus irrigation has come in earnest. There is no longer any doubt as to the supply of water and it is only a question of "How many wells for 1913."

Peanuts Success in West Texas.
Lynn Co. News.—Recently L. and W. D. Coffee shipped a carload of Spanish peanuts to the Barnhart Mercantile Co. at Denison; there being 1,388 bushels in this shipment and in the neighborhood of 75 cents per bushel was received.

This makes the second carload of peanuts they have shipped this season and it is thought that another car will be made up in the near future. The success of the Spanish peanuts during 1912, one of the most favorable years possible, has opened the eyes of our farmers to the value of this crop and it is an assured fact that a large acreage will be devoted to peanuts this year. We give a list of some of those who experimented with the Spanish peanut this year and the success they had.

From 100 acres L. Coffee secured 850 bushels of peanuts and 400 bales of hay. So well pleased is he with this crop which made good under the most adverse conditions that he expects to devote 200 acres to this crop this season.

W. S. Martin from 20 acres secured 362 bushels of peanuts and 230 bales of hay. He is more than pleased and expects to plant 50 to 60 acres this year.

John Rowe harvested 325 bushels and 200 or more bales of hay from 20 acres.

Walter Davis from 5 1/2 acres secured 125 bushels of peanuts and 75 bales of hay. This being the best yield both as to the peanuts and hay made in the county.

From 6 1/2 acres Walter Robinson secured 106 bushels of peanuts. As he did not bale the hay it is not known just how much was secured.

Joan Baker secured 56 bushels of peanuts and from 40 to 50 bales of hay from 4 acres. He expects to plant from 40 to 50 acres in peanuts this year.

D. B. Cox from 30 acres harvested 385 bushels of peanuts and 200 bales of hay.

T. D. Richards from 7 acres secured 110 bushels of peanuts and about two tons of hay. Mr. Richards kept tab on his peanut and cotton crops and finds that he received as much from his peanuts as he did from his cotton per acre and has the peanut hay over and above that.

BIBLE STUDY ON THE MARK OF CAIN

Genesis 4:1-15—Jan. 26.
"Whosoever hateth his brother is a murderer."
—1 John 3:15.

THE first tragedy of Earth was disobedience to God—the eating of the forbidden fruit. The next generation saw murder resulting from jealousy. Since the Bible teaches that our first parents were perfect, the image of their Creator, the question arises. How could such noble parentage bring forth a son of Cain's evil disposition?

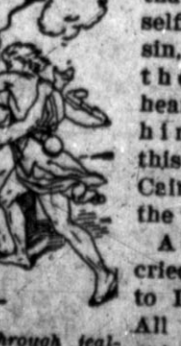
Cain was not degenerate in the present acceptance of that word. Undoubtedly he was a great man in many ways. But he was birth-marked, as all are, with selfishness. After his parents were expelled from Eden, after they began to toil with sweat of face, Cain was born. The period of his gestation was surely one of much mental distress to his mother. As she murmured respect-hacrifices of Abel and the loss of Eden, she marked her child with discontent and selfishness. By the time Abel was born, doubtless our first parents had become reconciled to their fate. We are in this not justifying murder, but taking a sympathetic view of the murderer's case, as God did. He condemned the slayer, and arranged for his punishment; but none of His messages to the murderer indicated hatred. So parents, correcting their children, should allow no sentiment to control their hearts contrary to the best interests of their children. So the laws of men in dealing with crime should be as severe as seems necessary in the interests of society, but should never be vengeful. They should recognize that mankind were born in sin. The vengeance of the law should be sympathetically enforced, to warn others against evil-doing.

With great satisfaction we note that our prisons are being turned into reformatories. Judges in pronouncing sentence, especially against murderers, are often fatherly and tender. The feeling that terrible responsibility is associated with the taking of human life, even judicially, is right. A certain weakness, however, manifests itself in opposition to capital punishment. This, we believe, results from misunderstanding the Divine Word. In the case of Cain, God especially prohibited the execution of the criminal. Nevertheless, the Divine Law stands: "Whoso sheddeth man's blood, by man shall his blood be shed." The careful observance of this Law, with a spirit of kindness and sympathy, but with proper ignominy, seems necessary to the preservation of order. Weakness in this respect encourages criminality, and furnishes an excuse for mob law and violence.

General misapprehension of the Divine Plan has led up to the weakness which opposes capital punishment. This wrong view led us to believe that the murderer passed at death into endless torture, and we hesitated to plunge a fellow-creature into such misery. Bible students are now learning that this delusion came from the Dark Ages. Our forefathers, imagining God to be worse than themselves, twisted Scripture to support their errors.

The Bible teaches that mankind fall asleep at death, to awake after Messiah establishes His Kingdom. The Bible statement is that all, good and bad, go to one great slumber-house, the tomb—Sheol, Hades. Messiah so loved the world that He gave His life for the redemption of mankind. As soon as He shall have selected His Church, He will establish His glorious Kingdom, open the prison doors, set at liberty the captives of death, and bring all to an accurate knowledge of the Truth.

"Sin Croucheth at the Door."
Cain was jealous because God manifested favor toward Abel's offering, while rejecting his own. Cain should have rejoiced with Abel, and brought a similar offering. God warned him that his spirit of selfishness was sin, crouching at the door of his heart, and advised him to conquer this beastly spirit. Cain heeded not the warning. Abel's blood cried, figuratively to Divine Justice. All injustice cries out to God. Sooner or later, the Divine penalty will be meted out. But the judgments of the Lord are left for the Great Mediator to execute during the Millennium, the world's Judgment Day. Only those begotten of the Holy Spirit are now on trial for life or death eternal.

The counties proposed for the new Panhandle district are: Dallam, Sherman, Hansford, Ochiltree, Lipscomb, Hartley, Moore, Hutchinson, Roberts, Hemphill, Oldham, Potter, Carson, Gray, Wheeler, Deaf Smith, Randall, Armstrong, Donley, Collingsworth, Farmer, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Hall, Childress, Hardeman, Wilbarger, Bailey, Ump, Hale, Floyd, Motley, Cottle, Foard, Knox, Baylor, Young, Throckmorton and Dickens from the present Thirteenth (Mr. Stephens), with Cochran, Hockley, Lubbock, Crosby, King, Yoakum, Terry, Lynn, Garza, Kent, Stonewall and Haskell added from the present Sixteenth.

This will certainly make a more homogenous district than the old lop-sided 13th; it, however, is still a big district, being 235 miles at its greatest width and 240 miles north and south.
