## Save the Fruit.

The prospects for a splendid fruit crop on the Plains this year is flattering. Never before have the trees, speaking of Hereford orchards, shown such vigor and promise. But what is the use to incur the expense of growing trees and then to sit idly by and allow the frost or worms to destroy the fruit. Smudging and spraying: that is the way it is done. In Colorado and New Mexico and in all of the northwestern states, fruit growers count on smudging and spraying just as they do upon cultivation of other crops. It's practical and reliable. At Hereford last year the apple crop was entirely destroyed by the apple worm and coddle moth worm. There are several other kinds of destructive worms and insects that prey upon the apple, but the coddle moth is the worst pest. The only way to offset his ravages is to spray. The following spray solution has been tried successfully.

Arsenate of Lead in water, 3 pounds to 50 gallons.

**Important directions:** Apply this solution with a spray pump immediately after the blossoms (corolla) fall and before the calyx lobes close. See that the solution gets into the blossom end of the apple as there is the place where the moth lays her eggs. To make sure, a second spraying should be done in about ten days, but this should be done before the apple turns down. A second brood is likely to appear again in July. Look out for these and if the moths begin to fly, use the same spray.

## School Trustee Elections.

There will be two elections in all of the county school district next Saturday, April 6, at which time each district will vote for trustees for their own district and in addition vote for five county school trustees for the entire county. The Hereford Independent District will vote at this time for county trustees only. The elections for independent districts are held in May. The present county trustees are: J. W. Barnett, A. P. Murchison, B. K. Nutter, S. J. Rice and Chas. Donnell.

## Hereford Still Holds Third Class.

The Hereford post office still holds her own as an office of the third class and is in the eighteen hundred dollar class; this is to say, that the gentleman (or lady) who knocks the Hereford plum will get \$1,800 per year as a stipend for his services. The applicants are all busy pulling on their "pulls," but if suffin don't happen party soon somebody's "pull" will break. 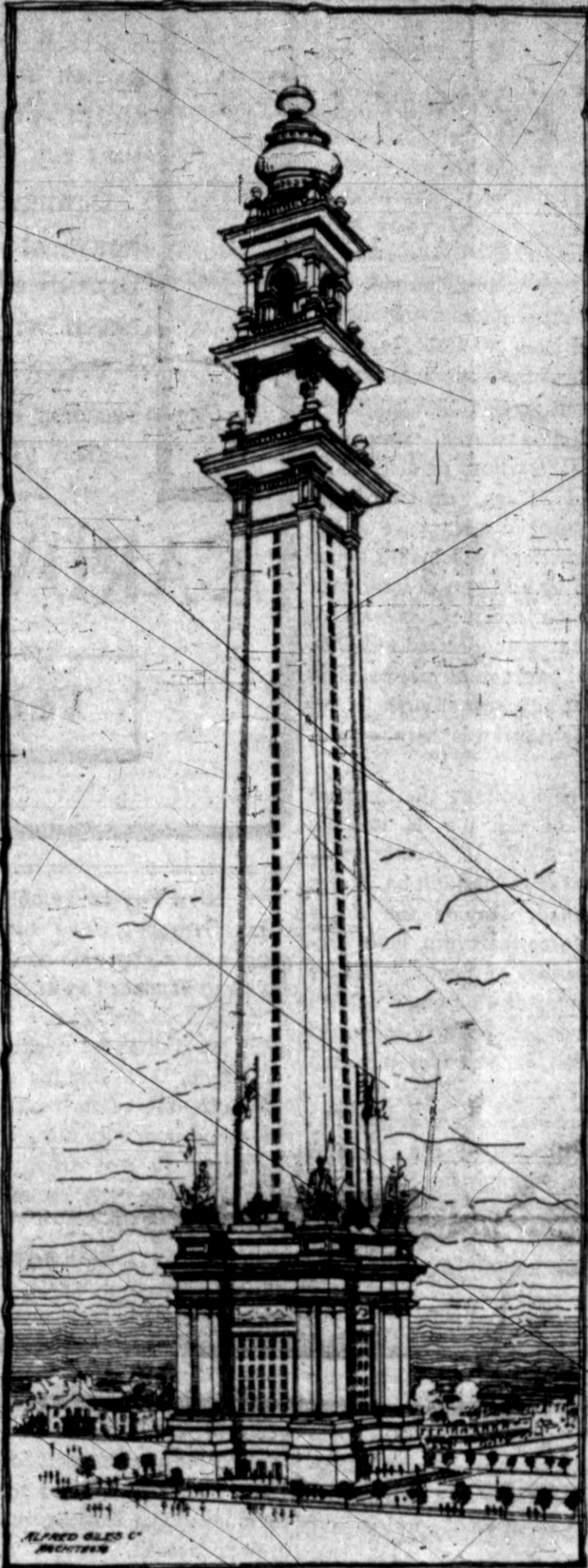
## Auto Turns Turtle.

YOU'LL LIKE HEREFORD!



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The patriotic citizens of Texas have formed what they have rightly termed The Alamo Heroes Monument Association which has for its purpose the erection of a sublime memorial structure to the fallen heroes of the Alamo, the monument, as shown, to be erected in the Alamo Park at San Antonio. This monument will be 802 feet high, about 90 feet square at the base, will contain, besides four large auditoriums, a museum, an art gallery and a statuary hall, an exhibit room for each county in the state. The ceiling of the lobby will be 50 feet high, and opening in the center eight feet across forming its summit, and this opening is the base of an open shaft which will run thru each succeeding story until it reaches a total height of 700 feet. At this point will be set into the ceiling, the Lone Star of Texas, in art glass colors, lighted from the interior by electricity. The monument will cost two million dollars and it is proposed to raise this sum in the different counties through the sale of admission tickets at 50 cents each, the regular price after the completion of the structure to be \$1.00.

## Mrs. C. S. Richards Passes Away.

After a short illness, Mrs. Mattie Richards, wife of C. S. Richards, died at their home Wednesday of this week. Before passing away she called for each member of her family, and after making to each a mother's talk, bidding them farewell, and then perfectly resigned, she fell asleep. She leaves a husband and five children, one being only a few weeks old. She was a faithful and devout member of the Baptist church and had lived a consistent Christian life. She was the daughter of Mrs. G. H. LeGrand, and the family had lived in Hereford for a number of years. The funeral services are being conducted this afternoon at the Baptist church, her former pastor, Rev. Dean, assisting Rev. Purser. The Brand joins the many friends of the bereaved family in full sympathy in this sad hour.

## Sold Fire Wagon to Tucumcari.

The City Commissioners have sold the big fire wagon to the city of Tucumcari, N. M., for the sum of \$800 as shown by the clerk's statement. It cost originally several years ago, \$1,400, but the commissioners thought that a less expensive fire department should be had and so the change was made. A good hose reel has been purchased instead and is now installed.

## ALAMO HEROES TO BE HONORED

Imposing Structure to be Erected By Patriotic Citizens Near Sacred Alamo.

Combining beauty, grandeur and usefulness and representing the patriotic devotion of loyal Texans to the memory of the pioneers who fought for and won liberty, the Alamo Heroes Monument, to be erected in San Antonio on ground hallowed by the blood of the fortress' defenders, who preferred death to surrender, will be one of the greatest works ever undertaken in Texas. Its graceful lines that emphasize strength and the rugged strength of the structure will mark it as a work of art; its great height and the massive character of the base, its columns and statuary within and without will give it grandeur, and its usefulness to the people of the whole state will be realized in its galleries, its auditoriums, its museums, its art gallery, its halls for state and national patriotic societies or associations and its individual rooms for each county in Texas for the maintenance of art or historical exhibits.

The Alamo Heroes Monument will rise to a height of 802 feet, the highest structure in the world. It has been designed along modern lines to possess strength and stability such as would not have been possible when the tower of Babel was built, for modern engineering has made possible feats that were impossible then or, for that matter, were impossible only a generation ago; yet with all the advance the science of engineering has made this monument will be one of its greatest accomplishments. It will contain four spacious auditoriums, a museum, an art gallery and statuary hall and a separate room for every county in Texas to be devoted by each to the encouragement of art and history by the maintenance of exhibits along these lines associated with that county. Near the top balconies will be provided for visitors that wish to take a look into the neighboring counties through the large telescopes to be provided for that purpose.

The base of the monument will be of solid granite rising to a height of fifty feet. On this base will be placed at each corner of the monument and arranged around the shaft high pillars, each eight feet in diameter and seventy feet high, all of solid Texas granite. These pillars will surmounted by heroic-size statues of Travis, Crockett, Bowie and Bonham—the four great leaders who died in the Alamo with the men in their commands, who had followed them devotedly in the early days of the campaign for liberty, and who did not hesitate to follow them even to death. Above these statues will be placed the six flags that have waved at different times over Texas, the Lone Star and the United States flags in the center, and on each side the flag of the Confederate States of America, of Mexico, Spain and France. Place will be made, too, for an emblem representing the Indian Tribes that possessed this land before the Spanish adventurers found their way here.

When the work planned is completed that part of town will be a complete net work of walks and crossings. This added to the beautiful places will make that part of town most attractive.

### The New Liquor Law.

The following statement has been issued from the Anti-Saloon League headquarters by State Superintendent J. H. Gambrell:

"As a matter of information, the press of Texas is asked to print the Webb liquor law, which passed in Congress over ex-President Taft's veto and is now in full force and effect:

"A bill (S. 4043) divesting intoxicating liquors of their interstate character in certain cases.

"Be it enacted, etc., that the shipment or transportation in any manner or by any means whatsoever, of any spirituous, vinous, malted, fermented or other intoxicating liquor of any kind from one state, territory or district of the United States or place noncontiguous to but subject to the jurisdiction thereof, into any other state, territory or district of the United States, or from any foreign country into any part of the U. S. jurisdiction, which said liquor is intended by any person interested therein to be received, possessed, sold or in any manner used either in the original package or otherwise in violation of any law of such state, territory or district is hereby prohibited."

It will be seen that the purpose and effect of this law is to take liquor out of the inter-state commerce, so far as prohibition states are concerned, leaving the states free to enforce their own laws prohibiting the sale of liquor. Under the law liquor now becomes subject to state laws immediately it passes the state line, and neither the consigner nor consignee will be protected by inter-state commerce. The law guarantees that the Federal government will not interfere with the enforcement of state laws. It is exactly what prohibitionists have been working for for 12 or 15 years.

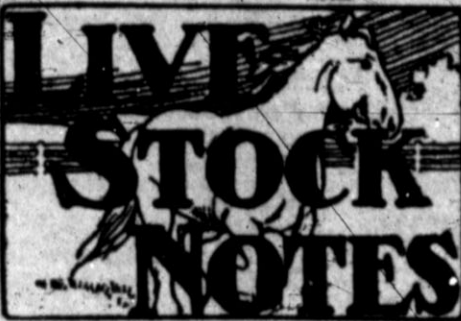

A poorly-nourished, stunted two-year-old filly should not be bred.

Food plays an important part in the growth and development of the colt.

Failure to secure profits in hog raising are usually due to mismanagement.

Ewes that are in bad condition at lambing time frequently disown their lambs.

Many lambs are far from being as good individuals as either of their parents.

Match horses with reference to size and motion particularly, to color, if you can.

When you begin to train a young horse, do it with mingled firmness and goodness.

When the hogs fail to gain at least a pound a day it is time to say goodbye to them.

Great care should be used in watering the horses. A little and often is the best way.

If a hog seems to be ailing, separate it from the herd at once and give watchful care.

If you find it necessary to change the horse's feed, cut the amount down for a time.

It is conducive to health and economical pork production to have an alfalfa swine pasture.

When ten days old, dock your and castrate those not kept for rams at about two weeks old.

Sheep are timid, nervous creatures, and all excitement and roughness should be avoided in handling them.

### Fattening Cattle in the Panhandle.

More fat cattle have come out of the Panhandle this winter than ever before, and of course they have sold at record prices. Charles Heck of Aulia had a shipment in Kansas City March 18th, which included 18 yearlings, 671 pounds each, at \$8.40, and 9 cows, 1,013 pounds average, at \$7.00 per hundred pounds. On March 27th, M. L. Steel of Groom sold 100 head of 1,225 pound steers in Kansas City at \$8.25 per hundred pounds. Increase in cattle feeding in the Panhandle has been rapid since the introduction of the silo, which permits of storing crops and thus getting every ounce of benefit from them, nearly half of which feeding value was formerly dissipated to the winds. Mr. Steel, whose shipment is referred to here, erected a 300 ton capacity silo last year, which he filled with kafir corn. He fed the steers mentioned for 100 days, giving them 40 pounds of silage and 4 pounds of cottonseed meal, and a little ground milo maize per day. The steers gained 225 pounds each in the 100 days of feeding. Speaking of the possibilities of the silo, Mr. Steel said, when in Kansas City: "So well did this experiment turn out that I will build more silos this season, and next fall will have 1,200 tons of the feed on my ranch. This little experiment plainly shows how we can fatten and finish our cattle right at home, and do it at less expense than it can be done up here in the corn belt."
