CITY PURCHASES

Commission Makes Contract With Wichita Concern For Modern Fire Fighting Aparatus-Will Arrive Soon.

Hereford has placed herself in the forefront of the smaller cities of the tate by the purchase of a modern fire fighting machine. It is a comhination hose and chemical motor truck. The specifications call for a four cylinder motor, mounted on substantial chars, with wheels of the artillery type, cushion tires. The equipment consists of hire extinguishers, flexible buckets, axes, lanterns, ladders, chemical tanks and hose capacity for 1000 feet of water hose, place for as many as 10 or 12 men on the running boards. The entir outfit was built by the Wichita Falls Motor Truck Company and is finished in good style and attractive manner. The truck was used recently at the State Firemen's Convention for exhibition purposes and Hereford was given no little advertising as

The Commission feels itself fortunate in making the change to this new outfit. It has effected such a trade by which the payment of \$50.25 for 22 months, the new equipment becomes the absolute property of the city. This stands against the expense of \$90 per month to maintain and keep up the old equipment and eliminates the possible loss by death of one or both of the fine horses. The new motor is expected to arrive at any time. Some arrangements will be made at once for a place to keep the outfit. The problem now.

business and should bring a revenue, that it should not be composed of complimentary subscriptions to any and everybody that happened to extend a favor to the editor or give the paper a two inch ad. The Midlothian Argus of last week contains some pungent reading on the subject and it is so much to the point that the

readers of the Brand are given the treat to see it.

Another thing: We do not want to begin or continue the practice of giving the paper free to those who advertise or have job work done. The paper is worth a dollar a year and the advertising space is worth ten cents an inch, and the man who does some advertising or has some job work done has no more right to demand a dollar's worth of newspaper free than we would have to demand a dollar's worth of free sugar from the merchant with whom we trade. 


