There are so many all-year uses for the electric fan that it is to be regretted that most of them will be put on the shelf or in the attic within the next thirty days. The value of the fan motor from a hygienic view point during the winter months has been admitted many times. Its practical uses for many purposes cannot be denied.

A fan in the kitchen will blow out smoke and odors if it is set on the window sill. A fan in any closed up room will do away with that "stuffy" feeling.
