grants of 45 percent of the total cost on any single project is made by the government, when the project is approved by the administration. From authoritative sources we have information that projects allocated between now and January 1, 1939, will possibly be the last ever sponsored by the department.

While citizens of this community have been talking about paving for Harrison Highway, Castro County has slipped in and secured allocation for a new \$125,000 courthouse; while we are mentioning a swimming pool with yearning eyes, the streets of Dimmitt are now being surfaced. While Hereford wonders about a municipal auditorium, Amarillo has secured a 45 percent grant on a new \$150,000 water softener, already having received a similar grant on a new water-sewer project.

The object of this editorial is not to criticize any single person or organization; it is an attempt to find out if the people of this area really want to advance, grow and improve their country. A signed petition will result in ACTION by your city, county or community organizations. If we do want our city to grow, our county to improve and our property to become more valuable, certainly we should take advantage of the 45 percent grant which is now available. All three projects are desirable, but The Brand feels that surfacing of Harrison Highway is by far the most im-

portant project for consideration.
