A large number of visitors and patrons were present and these, with the papils, filled the auditorium to its capacity At the appointed hour, Supt. Short called for quiet and Rev. G. A. Farris, pastor of the First Christian church, lead in prayer. He was followed by Presiding Elder O. P. Kiker of Amarillo, who read a few verses from the Bible. After him, Mr. Short introduced Rev. Geo. S. Slover, president of Clarendon College, who made a short address. At the close of his remarks, Rov. Farris made a talk, congratulating the present day schools and pupils upon their opportunities, saying that our facilities are so great now as compared with older days that our opportunities lie near at hand. Mr. Kiker was called for and he responded by telling a few "jokes out of schools." He told one on Mr. Slover, calling to mind the occasion when the latter was a small boy in school and the teacher had asked who lead the children of Israel out Egypt. Indians were his neighbors when he went to congress, and the land controlled by them in Oklahoma was leased to cattlemen of Texas, who were making fortunes off the stupidof the Indians and the graft of the government officials, who were at the head of the Indian affairs. Mr. Stephens realized that the growth of opportunity to students of high class Northwest Texas depended to a large extent upon the development of the Indian country adjoining Texas. He at once set about to have this fand purchased by the government and opened to settlement. He succeeded and today the better part of Oklahoma is that adjoining Texas along Red river. The settlement country caused the building of railroads. The building of the Frisco. into Quanah and Vernon and the building of the Wichita Falls and Northwestern can be attributed soley to the settlement of the Indian country in Western Oklahoma. City Comtemplates Change in Pumping Water.

The City Commission is facing the problem of expending some \$2,000 for another well equipment. Over against this is the proposition from the Light Company to pump the water at 6 cents per 1,000 gallone and to furnish steam to operate the emergency pump; in addition they will agree to put in a 10 ton ice plant. The water at present is costing over 71 cents, not including the salary of the attended at the well. 



The Bench Congress.

"Man is God's noblest creations." In him he placed the likeness of his image; in fact, gave him the faculty of reasoning and worship, thus imparting His own attributes to his creature and thus made him also a God. While possessing the characteristics of a God, he being a free moral agent, and subject to the temptations of life, may often go astray, and wander away from the paths of rectitude, but in time, if his life is spared, will return to his original state. While we often speak of the physical man, the true man is one of character. A man will guard his character as he would his life. The outwardness of character is reputation and any one will lay down his life for his reputation if his character is one of true merit and worth. A man without character is little concerned about his reputation.

As an example of strong individual characters, men who would defend the good name of their neighbors, it is with some degree of pleasure and pride that mention is made of the Bench Congress. There is no similar organization in the world. Composed of men past the meridian of life, to represent the achievements of the past and hold up the hopes for the future. Banded together by the common ties of noble manhood, they are ever ready to defend the fair name of their daughters and wives and the loved ones of their neighbors. Many of them have stood in the smoke of battle and have seen their brothers slain by the cruel hand of War, but never have they flinched from their duty in time of industrious peace nor in the period of devastating war. Assembling almost daily at their accostomed place, they discuss in a friendly way interesting topics of home and state. National and state policies are disected; the tariff, the currency issue, the foreign policy. Fashions and fads are given their praise and friendly criticism; dry farming and wet farming are discussed pro and con; deep plowing and shallow plowing are dragged into the calendar every week, the weather, the indications for rain, the prospects for a cold winter, are all given a place. But the leading topic and one that occupies the time of many of the member's is that of reminiscent story telling, especially of the 60's; when these men laid down their hoes and took up their muskets. They retrace their many tiresome marches, they fight over their bloody battles, they relate the incidencies of camp life and tell of the privations of soldier life. And why should they not relieve their glorious past? Who would dare to molest them in their peace, these fifty long years afterward the smoke of cannon has cleared away and peace reigns over our beloved land? And who are they? They are the leading citizens of Hereford, prominent in both church and state, standing as exemplary for all walks of life. No vulgar or obscene language falls from their lips, no swearing nor backbiting nor tale bearing escapes' their guarded tongues: they stand for all the right, with good will towards all men and ill will towards no one. No woman need fear their presence; they are as chaste in their language as will be found around the most sacred

fireside. Look into their open faces,

observe their good demeanor, behold

their noble manhood; there they stand. They need no encomiums from other men; no praise from press or pulpit; no heralds to announce their names. Their faith in their fellow men is their bulwark; their reputations are as impenetrable as the Rock of Gibraltar; the darts of unfriendly criticism cannot pierce their armors of integrity; no dynamite could destroy their fortifications. Let men wail and demons cry; they stand and do and die.






