## NEXT TUESDAY CLEAN UP DAY

One Hundred Men Volunteer to Cut Weeds on the Streets; Cleanest Town in Texas, the Slogan.

Next Tuesday has been duly set apart by the Chamber of Commerce as Clean Up Day. On this day every business house will likely be closed. A petition has been circulated and liberally signed by the men who have agreed to volunteer their services for one day to give the streets of the town one thorough cleaning. They will meet at the Bogard building at 8 o'clock sharp bringing hoes and files, rakes and shovels. The 100 men will be divided into three or four squads and each squad will take a street, and all of the weeds in the streets will be cut and piled, the trash raked into piles. If you read this and desire to contribute your part towards making Hereford the cleanest town in Texas, don your overalls, bring your arms of offense and help fight the battle strong. Don't sulk in your tent nor go fishing. The fish will not bite on next Tuesday.

## WITH THE COUNTRY PRESS

Department of Scissors and Paste Pot—Hodge-Podge From the Pens of Country Editors, et al.

Waco Tribune.—"Bunco and Booze." Is it to such sources that the imperial State of Texas has to look just now for revenue—for its meat and bread, so to speak? We are told that the State Treasurer says he will have money to pay off warrants and keep the State on a cash basis until September first. Where did the State get the money? Well, it is said that about \$250,000 will come out of the cash that the State mulcted the Standard of New Jersey for. And another \$250,000 will be realized from taxes paid by liquor dealers, taxes that are being paid at this period—making up a half million dollars, which sum suffices to put the State on a cash basis again, paying warrants until the end of August. After that—well, the State will be off the cash basis for a while. And thus we jog along, knowing all the time that a State with the resources of Texas should never be off the cash basis. But the "tainted" money of the Standard (which we got in such peculiar way) and the money from the liquor traffic came as balm in Gilead at this time of stress.

If the Brand is not badly mistaken the Booze money was also "got in such peculiar way." While the State may have mulct the Standard Oil for this Bunco money, it robs the mouths of babes for the Booze money. Which is worse.

### STRADDLING THE FENCE.

Vernon Record—In the beginning of this campaign, the Record editor plainly outlined his views relative to the operation of the open saloon, and therefore we refrain from discussing the question further, on the street or elsewhere. Notwithstanding, we attempted to make our position understood, we had a visitor early in the week who asked us if we were "straddling the fence" on the prohibition question. We reminded our guest of the fact that we never fail to declare our position, and that in this instance we proposed voting for prohibition as we have always done, when the opportunity was offered; but that we did not propose to attempt to dictate to our 2,200 subscribers how they should vote. The prohibition question is one that should be settled by a vote of the people under the law, and the Record is willing to abide by the wishes of the majority.

It seems that Vernon is in the middle of a local option election and that some of the Record's readers have been prodding its editor for "straddling the fence." The Brand believes that both sides would think just as well of the Record to discuss the question as to run a half page ad of advertisement for the anti side.

**Some New Laws and Amendments.**

Some very stringent laws were passed by the last legislature and some old laws were amended. The public would do well to keep these in mind, and for the general information these new statutes are published.

"That hereafter it shall be unlawful for a person to willfully throw or deposit in or upon any public road, street or alley any glass bottle, glass, nails, tacks, hoops, wire, cans or any other substance, likely to in-

jure any person, animal, automobile or vehicle and any person violating any of the provisions hereof, shall upon conviction thereof, be fined any sum not less than five dollars nor more than two hundred dollars."

"If any person shall leave the carcass or body of any horse, mule, ox, steer, cow or other animal which died in the actual possession of such person, in any public road or highway, or in any street or alley of any village, town or city in this State,

or within fifty yards of such public road, highway, street or alley, or shall leave any such carcass or body within five hundred yards of any private residence he shall be fined in any sum not less than five dollars nor more than one hundred dollars."

"If any person shall willfully obstruct or injure or cause to be obstructed or injured, in any manner whatsoever, any public road or highway, or any public bridge or causeway within this State, he shall upon conviction be fined in any sum not exceeding two hundred dollars."

**Elevations at Hereford.**

Sometime last year the United States Government Corps made surveys along the line of the Santa Fe railroad and established a number of "Marks of Elevation." The figures at Hereford were given out at that time, but only approximately. Recently, however, Judge C. D. Wright received from Washington an accurate statement, giving the location and the different elevations at Hereford. For the information of the public, these figures are published:

Q-20—Hereford, Deaf Smith Co., Tex., on the top of the southeast corner of the southeast footing of Hereford waterworks tank, 1.8 mile east of the depot, 95 meters south of the main-line track.

P-20—Hereford, Deaf Smith Co., Texas, on the south face of concrete basement entrance to Deaf Smith county court house, 1.3 meters above the sidewalk, and 0.3 meter from

the east side of the door.

Q-20—Hereford, Deaf Smith Co., Tex., at the southwest corner of the Pecos and Northern Texas (Santa Fe) depot; in the south face of the limestone water table in brick corner pier, in the center of a stone 1.3 meters above the brick flagging.

R-20—3.8 miles west of Hereford, Deaf Smith county, Texas, at the eighth pole west of milepost 603, 51 meters west of road that crosses the track, one meter from the fence between the right of way and a parallel road, 32 meters from the center of the track on the right of way.

### Ordinance No. 72.

An ordinance to be known as Ordinance No. 72, protecting the property of the Fire Department from theft or damage, prescribing rules for its operation and fixing a penalty for a violation of same. Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Hereford.

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to sit in or loaf upon the fire truck when not in use, or to handle the tools or equipment belonging to the same without the consent of the Chief or City Marshall or some member of the Commission. Any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than three nor more than ten dollars.

Section 2. If any person not a member of the fire department shall jump on the fire truck when going to or returning from a fire, unless by invitation of the Fire Chief, a Captain or the driver of the Truck, he shall be punished by a fine of not less than three nor more than ten dollars.

Section 3. It shall be unlawful for any person not a member of the fire department or the driver of the Fire Truck to remove from the place where it is kept, or to use any Fireman's hat or coat or wrench or other tool used in connection with the fire truck or fire fighting apparatus. And it shall be unlawful for any Fireman or driver of the truck to remove or use the same except for some purpose in connection with the operation of the fire fighting equipment. Any person violating this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than three nor more than ten dollars.

#### GROUCHIES OF THE GROUCHY.

Some people have the grouches thrust upon them; some catch them like small pox; and others are just born grouchy. There are several varieties of this disease: the social grouch, the church grouch, the business grouch and political grouch, but all have practically the same cause and effect, the patients similarly. The systems of the disease are easily discernable. At first, the patient begins with a small whine complaint that he (also she) is not appreciated by the people of the community. If they are taking the church, they complain about the church not giving their talents proper notice or they have been ignored by those who sometimes "take the lead," or the aid society is not working to suit them. The second stage of this malady breaks out in bumps that are visible across the church aisle. The third and last stage, they refuse to attend the society, the church and finally refuse to fellowship. The social grouch is very much like this, except that it attacks the women folks more than the men. This form is never fatal and often results in good as it forces patient to drop out of "society" and thus obtain a much needed rest. The business grouch is not epidemic nor catching, but grows out of over self-estimation. It will often attack a business man in his prosperity without apparent cause, but it often breaks out violently if he sees his former good customers pass by with bundles from other merchants under their arms. A man with a business grouch will become expert in boom-a-rang throwing and the self inflicted bumps can

be seen across the street. He complains about hard times and talks about what he used to do; he refers to his competitors in a slurring way and often accuses them of dishonest dealing; he makes himself unpleasant to his friends and his case becomes hopeless. But the political grouch is the worst disease of all. It attacks grown men, mature in years, more than the younger. The women seldom have it, but as the suffragette movement grows, they may take it also. The man with a bad case of political grouch is often a disappointed office seeker.
