Hugh Brown and force have been doing some excellent street work with the new grader. The scope of the work is quite extensive and it is being finished in a thorough manner.

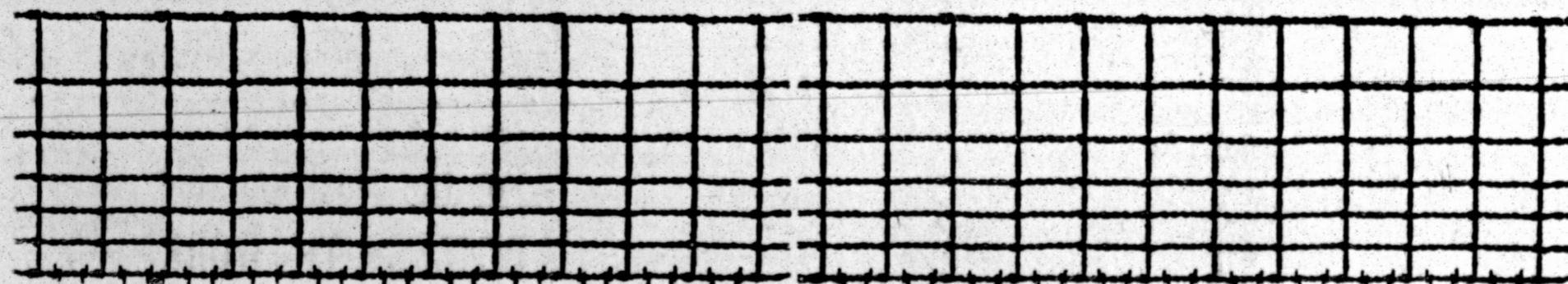

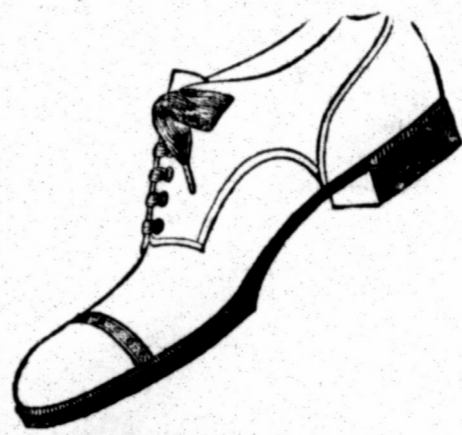

I will put out a large bed of these potatoes near my office in Clarendon so everyone who wants to make money out of potatoes can get the slips when they are in town, or I will order the seed for you without any charge above the original cost and freight. I want to see you make money instead of losing it—when you prosper so do we. Here are some facts which I gathered on my recent trip to Denver, Colo., and other points along the Denver Road:

The Irish potato grower at Greeley, Colo., is growing an average of 350 bushels to the acre. They are now getting a little less than 18c per bushel for them. Of course this is remarkably cheap for potatoes but that's not half of what I want you to see. His water costs him \$12 per acre a year to grow these potatoes, and the land costs \$200 per acre. This will give us \$100 per acre, which is over eight times the price of our land. How is that compared to the WONDERFUL Greeley country? The kind of watermelon that will sell best is the "Halburt Honey", and the best cantaloupe is the "Rocky Ford." We need some live, wide-awake business men in Clarendon to help the farmer find a market for what he raises. People with enterprise are shipping produce from above us and below us to all parts of the United States, and we do not believe it because we do not see inside the ears as they go by. THE RHODES KILLING

A Childress Paper's Report of the Shooting of John Rhodes by Fred Dewey.

Sunday afternoon at 5:10 o'clock there occurred one of those sad tragedies that seem unavoidable. And this one is peculiarly sad on account of the family connection of the parties interested.

At that hour W. F. Dewey, an engineer on the Denver road, shot and killed John Rhodes at a point on the railway side track a little way west of the coal sheds. There were no eye witnesses to the shooting, so far as is known at present, and what words, if any, were passed is known only to the defendant.

The evidence at the preliminary trial Monday afternoon did not bring out anything of importance, save that deceased had uttered some words of slander against the daughter of Mr. Dewey. Also that there was found on the body of deceased a pistol, but which had not been fired or drawn.

The engine had just come from the round house and Dewey was looking it over preparatory to taking out the 6:15 passenger. Rhodes left his residence, just across the right-of-way from the engine, going to the engine and in a few minutes one shot was heard. When those hearing the shot arrived Dewey was on his way to town to surrender and Rhodes was lying along side the engine dead. The ball entered the forehead, two inches above the right eye and lodging at the back of the head, taking a downward course.

Justice Williams viewed the body after which it was taken in charge by Undertaker Kendrick and prepared for burial. The remains were taken to Karnes City Monday, accompanied by Mrs. Rhode and two friends.

The examining trial was held Monday afternoon before Justice Williams, who after hearing the evidence decided that it was a bailable case, and by agreement of the attorneys the bond was fixed at \$5,000, which was immediately given with the following sureties: Dr. J. W. Albert, W. B. Howard, Fred Estes, H. J. King, R. E. Dunn, R. W. Greathouse, E. C. Adams, R. H. Norris and A. J. Fires.

The deceased had been a citizen of Childress about three years and has been employed in the copper shop of the Denver road. He was also interested in the Swearingen street barber shop. The deceased had many friends among the railroad people. He leaves a wife and one child, also a brother in Childress who is a fireman.—Index.

THE STOCK YARDS.

They Will be in Shape to Handle Cattle by the 15th of April.

Col. O. H. Nelson, the cattleman who has made Ft. Madison famous, and who is the chief spirit in the new stock yards at this point, is in the city, giving the work of building his personal attention, and is authority for the statement that the yards will be ready to handle cattle by the 15th of next month.

The yards at Ft. Madison, which are under the management of the Western Stock Yards Co., will be continued as heretofore, except that the main office will shortly be removed to Amarillo. Here the preference will be given to home people where possible, in buying material for construction and maintenance, and in erecting contracts, and every effort made to give the institution rating as a Panhandle affair, which it is in the strictest sense of the word.

Col. Nelson is enthusiastic regarding the coming session of the Panhandle Cattlemen, which will convene in this city the 8th, of next month, continuing in session three days, and particularly the fine stock sale, which will form the central portion of the program each afternoon.

"The selling of this many thoroughbred cattle at one time is a great undertaking," he said yesterday. "It is a greater number than has been offered in one sale anywhere for a number of years, but knowing the needs of the cattlemen in this part of the country and realizing the fact that the demand for the good kind of Panhandle feeders is here to stay, and believing that our stockmen fully recognize the necessity of breeding the good kind only, I believe they will buy these cattle offered at a fair price. We do not expect fancy prices, but we do expect our friends will give us fair values." It is our intention to make this an annual event, and one of the important features of the convention.—Amarillo Herald.
