I will put out a large bed of these potatoes near my office in Claren-
don so everyone who wants to make don so everyone who wants to make lips when they are in town, or I will order the seed for you without any charge above the original cost and freight. I want to see you nake money instead of losing itwhen you prosper so do we. Here
are some facts which I gathered on my recent trip to Denver, Colo. and cther points along the Denver Road:
The Irish potato grower at Greeley, Colo., is growing an average o 350 bushels to the acre. They are now getting a little less than 18 c per bushel for them. Of course this is remarkably cheap for potatoes but that's not half of what I want you to see. His water costs him 12 per acre acar potatoes, and the land costs $\$ 200$
per acre. Therefore he is getting less than one-third the cost of his and and water right out of one crop, not counting the expensive labor in that counsry. Now listen -Our land is worth $\$ 12$ per acre and God gives us the water iree. We can at the lowest figures grow 250 bushels of sweet potatoes to we con We can a pound for then f. o. b. Clarendon, Texas. Now we will give ourselves the benefit of a doubt in two instances by saying 200 bushels to the acre, and count on $50 c$ per bushel $f$, o. b Clarendon. This will give us $\$ 100$ per acre, which is over eight times
the price of our land. How is that compared to the wonderful Gree ley country? I will assist you in marketing your potatoes, melons, etc., free of any cost whatever the will se'!.
The kind of watermelon that will sell best is the "Halburt Honey" and the best cantaloupe is the 'Rocky Ford." Of course this stuff will come in later than the south ern crops but it is also a bette grade and this will sell it if proper ly handled and raised in large quantities so as to ship out by the car load. We need some live, we-awake bnsiness men in Clar endon to help the farmer find market for what he raises. Thave as everyone knows, spent time and money for the upbuilding of my years, and I would like to meet with a spark of support in some way from the farmers and the merchants. People with enterprise are shipping produce from above us and below us to all parts of the United States, and we do not be United States, and we do not be lieve it because we do not see in side the ears as they goby. ## Election Proclamation.

The State of Texas, County Donley and City of Clarendon.
In obedience to and in pursuance an order made by the city council, of the City of Clarendon, Tex as, made and entered, March 6th A. D. 1905, and by virtue of au thority vested in me by law, I here by order an election to be held in the City of Clarendon, Texas, the first Tuesday in April, A D 1905. The engine had just come from the round house and Dewey was looking it over preparatory to
taking out the $6: 15$ passenger. taking out the $6: 15$ passenger.
Rhodes left his residence, just across the right-of-way from the engine, going to the engine and in a few minutes one shot was heard. When those hearing the shot ar rived Dewey was on his way to town to surrender and Rhodes was lying along side the engine dead. The ball entered the forehead, two inches aboye t.ee right eye and lodging at the back of the head taking a downward course.
Justice Williams viewed the body after which it was taken in charge by Undertaker Kendrick
and prepared for burial. The remains were taken to Karnes City Monday, accompanied
