As Congress continues slow march toward Christmas adjournment

WASHINGTON (AP) — Farm price support legislation and an omnibus spending bill to keep government operating for the next nine months remained unresolved as Congress continued a slow, frustrating march toward Christmas adjourn-

Much of the government was operating today under another stogap measure Congress passed Tuesday to give congressional negotiators time to work out a revised version of a \$370 billion omnibus spending bill. The House overwhelm-

ingly rejected the bill Monday night.

The stopgap measure, which
President Reagan signed late Tuesday, expires at midnight Thursday
and was the second such bill Congress has had to pass in less than a

Other measures awaiting last-minute action included an emergen-cy rescue package for the \$70 billion Farm Credit System, the 37-bank network that is the nation's largest farm lender. The Senate passed it with minor changes Tuesday night and House approval was expected toAlso pending was a sweeping five-year agriculture package providing about \$52 billion over the next three

years for crop price and income sup-port programs.

While Congress was trying to wrap up its work, Reagan administration officials and legislators alike were voicing frustration over the un-predictable, crisis atmosphere that has engulfed deliberations over fiscal matters for months.

"Truly the system has broken down," complained White House budget director James C. Miller III. Sen. John Glenn, D-Ohio, said the necessity for repeatedly passing stopgap bills was "a mess. And we could get into other four letter words and make it even stronger."

Rep. Trent Lott, R-Miss., the assistant House minority leader, was angry about the length of the session and the need for emergency legisla-tion, saying, "It's beginning to look like Christmas again. ... Every year we do this. Over and over we go again. It's a part of the Christmas

Meanwhile, the most dramatic event of this week's drive toward adjournment came Tuesday night when the House on a voice vote revived the president's effort to overhaul the federal tax code. The initiative had

been swamped last week by near-unanimous Republican defections. But Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-III., chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, said legislators now could "begin the trail of

The president has said he does not like the House bill and is counting on the Republican-controlled Senate to shape it more to his liking next year.

But the more immediate business was the omnibus spending bill.

On Monday night, conservative Republicans upset with the overall size of the measure and liberal Democrats angry at increases in-cluded for the Pentagon joined together to scuttle the measure. There were 120 Democrats and 119

Republicans voting against it.
Sources, who spoke on the condition they not be identified, said House members were discussing a possible \$1 billion reduction in the \$262.5 billion earmarked for the Pentagon, plus addition of military buy-ing reforms dropped in earlier negotiations with the Senate.

House turnabout sends Reagan's sweeping tax reform bill to Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) - The House shouted through a bill cutting taxes for most Americans and overhauling the federal income tax, preserving thanks to solid Democratic support - the top legislative goal of President Reagan's second term.

The measure was approved Tuesday night by voice vote after Democrats beat back, 256-171, a

tire issue back to the Ways and Means Committee, where it would have been buried, at least for the

On that crucial vote, 207 Democrats and 49 Republicans wanted to keep the bill alive; 39 Democrats and 132 Republicans voted to send it to committee.

The Senate will take up the Republican attempt to send the en- measure when it returns from the Christmas break next year. Reagan, who was forced by a GOP

revolt to lobby personally at the Capitol for votes, issued a statement after the bill passed, declaring it "moved us one historical step closer toward a new tax code for America."

House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr., D-Mass., said his party had "rescued tax reform from the jaws of big-business Republicans" and "delivered on our historic commitment to tax fairness."

"Only the Republican Senate can stop tax reform now," O'Neill said. And in a reference to Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Ore., chairman of the Finance Committee, O'Neill pleaded, "Write Packwood!"

Reagan is counting on the Senate to reshape the bill more to his liking. Rep. Bill Archer, R-Texas, then but Senate Majority Leader Robert Dole, R-Kan., cautioned against setting expectations too high.

"I hope the president doesn't make too many promises of what he will veto," Dole said. "Somebody may be locking the Senate into something we can't produce."

Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-III.,

chief author of the bill, hailed it as "an act of fairness to the millions of Americans for whom taxes have long been the measure of faith in our way of life."

The bill would make the greatest number of changes in the income tax in more than 30 years, rewriting major portions of a tax system that government officials often criticize as being unfair and overly complex.

It would cut the taxes of a typical four-member family with \$30,000 income and average deductions by about \$247, to \$2,509. On the average, taxes would drop about 9 percent. But the most striking impact of the 1,379-page bill would be to remove more than 6 million low-income families from the income-tax rolls.

Tax rates would be cut significantly for individuals (the 50 percent top rate would be reduced to 38 percent) and for corporations (a top rate of 36 percent). The personal exemption, now \$1,040, would be raised to \$2,000 for those who do not itemize deductions and \$1,500 for those who do. The

The three retiring regents-including Frank Barrett of Hereford--have continued to serve on the board in a holdover capacity since Aug. 31. The other two retiring regents are Stanley Davis and Betty T. Bivins.

Nursing home trial rests

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) - Defense lawyers say they will move for a directed verdict of innocent for a nursing home corporation and five workers, all charged with murder-by-neglect in the death of an elderly woman.

The motion will be taken up Jan. 6, the day the trial resumes after a Christmas recess that began Tuesday.

The state rested its lengthy case Tuesday against Autumn Hills Convalescent Centers Inc. and five of its current and former employees.

They are charged with murder in the Nov. 20, 1978, death of Elnora Breed.

The elderly woman died 47 days after she entered an Autumn Hills nursing home in Texas City.

"My opinion is or has been that they have not been able to establish evidence proving the allegations in the indictment," said attorney Roy Barrera, who represents the corporation.

To prove murder, Barrera said, the prosecution had to show the defendants knew "to a reasonable certainty that their actions would result in death."

But Assistant Attorney General David Marks said he felt good about the case he presented.

Hance reminds voters of 'Promise'

AUSTIN (AP) - Republican gubenatorial hopeful Kent-Hance says he is anxious for voters to compare his record on taxes with that of Democratic Gov. Mark White.

Hance, the former Democratic congressman who switched parties earlier this year, said he has supported tax cuts while White backed last year's \$4.6 billion tax hike to fund school reforms and highway

'We have a record that speaks for itself. I co-sponsored President Reagan's tax cut in 1981 ... That is the record as the largest tax cut in the history of the country," Hance told the Austin Republican Forum on Tuesday.

"You can compare that with Mark White's record of the largest tax increase in the history of this state or any other state."

Hance said the 1984 sales and motor fuel tax hike came after White had been "running those ads that say, 'I promise I won't raise your

"We have saved the ads and you'll be able to see those ads again," Hance told a laughing audience.

Meese, Ramirez conclude meeting

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) - More meetings on mutual problems of drug trafficking, immigration and other issues are planned between Attorney General Ed Meese and his Mexican counterpart, Meese says.

Meese and Sergio Garcia Ramirez wound up several hours of talks early Tuesday and then met with reporters.

They said they discussed ways to crack down on drug trafficking. stem the smuggling of third country illegals into the United States and the ongoing investigation into the slaying of U.S. drug agent Enrique Camarena Salazar.

"There will be more meetings," Meese said. "We have found they are very productive."

The meeting was the third for the two men and the first in San Antonio, selected because it is at a midway point between the capitals

"What we have proven in this meeting is there is total agreement in our objectives and how they will be met," said Ramirez, speaking in Spanish through an interpretor.

Aid requests up but donations down

The Salvation Army in Cleveland had to stop taking requests from poor people seeking Christmas aid and Army branches across the country are facing similar situations as donations drop and the ranks of the needy swell.

"We have a definite lag in donations right now," said Capt. Donald MacMurdo, spokesman for the Army in the Cleveland area. "We're well behind last year. We've been saying all along that people are still hungry the day after Christmas."

The Salvation Army in Cleveland stopped taking applications for Christmas food baskets as of late Monday, MacMurdo said Tuesday. The group had hoped to help 12,000 families but cut off applications at 10,500.

Reagan vetos textile bill

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Reagan, meeting a midnight deadline, vetoed major trade legislation to curb textile, apparel and shoe imports, declaring "the economic and human costs of such a bill run far too high."

Industry supporters conceded Tuesday night they lacked for now the two-thirds support needed to override the long-threatened veto. "None of us wants to see American workers lose their jobs or

American businesses suffer," Reagan said ir. his veto message. He pledged "everything possible to see that this doesn't happen." Reagan said the bill would "violate existing trade agreements

with other nations, inviting immediate retaliation against our exports, resulting in a loss of American jobs in other areas." "Workers in agriculture, aerospace, high-tech electronics, chemicals and pharmaceuticals would be the first to feel the

retaliatory backlash," Reagan said. "But the damaging effects would soon be felt by every American in the form of higher prices and shrinking economic growth."

Texas grain reaches Ethiopians

GODA KILE, Ethiopia (AP) - In the dusty yard of a small feeding center here, villagers line up for rations of grain donated by the peo-

"If you had been here last December you would have seen people dying on the road," said Mulatu Tafese, a field director for Save the Children (USA). "But no one has died here for months now."

The Texas food came here under Project Tejas, which raised more than \$680,000 since last March 1 for Ethiopian famine victims. State employees contributed \$113,000 to the project, while other donations came from farmers, school children and labor unions.

The Goda Kile storehouse is crammed with sacks of grain, all of it from the United States and much of it bearing a map of the state of Texas with a shock of wheat and a state AFL-CIO emblem.

"This was donated by the children of Texas," Mulatu said, picking up one of the empty bags and grinning.

The center here — 156 miles northeast of the capital, Addis Ababa—is one of 178 run by Save the Children (USA) in the Shoa Region of

central Ethiopia. It serves about 4,000 people, giving monthly rations of 33 pounds of grain per person.

United Way receives record amount

WASHINGTON (AP) Americans are giving a record \$2.33 billion to the United Way this year, capping the charity's best three years in more than a quarter century, officials estimated today.

The projected 1985 increase of 9 percent over 1984 for the nation's 2,200 local United Ways follows gains of 10 percent and 9.5 percent the previous two years. And the money contributed in the three years was relatively undiluted by inflation, in contrast to dollars given during much of the previous decade, officials noted.

"The significant fund-raising story is that the \$2.33 billion raised this year comes when inflation is weighing in at just a little over 3 percent," said James D. Robinson III, volunteer chairman of United Way of

DEAR DR. GOTT - For years I have had kidney and bladder infec-tions, which clear up with ampicillin. Would this medication cause dizziness? For the past two years, I haven't been able to get up on my feet without feeling dizzy. I've had all kinds of tests for this trouble, but, so far, haven't found the cause of it. I do have essential hypertension and cerebrovascular

DEAR READER - Dizziness means two different things to doctors: lightheadedness (a "woozy," vague feeling, like fainting) or vertigo (a sen-

sation of spinning).

Lightheadedness is often due to circulatory disturbances. If you suddenly stand after being in a sitting position, the blood pressure may not adjust in-stantly to gravity, and you may feel lightheaded for a short time. A similar but more pronounced reaction can occur when a person's heartbeat slows down, if the blood pressure suddenly falls, if the blood pressure is too low (particularly in patients on bloodpressure drugs) or if there is an obstruction in one of the arteries supplying the brain.

Lightheadedness is a common symptom, especially as we age, it may indicate circulatory insufficiency. However, young people will sometimes feel lightheaded. During the 1940s, bobby-soxers would sometimes become lightheaded and faint while listening to Frank Sinatra sing. Old Blue Eyes doesn't have that ability

anymore, and we'll probably never know with certainty what caused ado-lescents to swoon when he crooned but swoon they did.

On the other hand, vertigo is a different problem. "Swimming" of the head, loss of spatial orientation, a feelnead, loss of spatial orientation, a feeling of revolving or spinning are symptoms that point to the vestibular apparatus of the inner ear, a kind of double gyroscope. When you close your eyes and turn around repeatedly, the dizziness you experience is vertigo. In patients with vestibular malfunction, the vertigo can be disabling libe the vertigo can be disabling, like the sensations of extreme motionsickness. Vertigo requires evaluation by an ear, nose and throat specialist.

This may seem like a long answer to your question, but I think the distinction between lightheadedness and vertigo is a crucial issue. You seem to have lightheadedness, perhaps related to your hypertension and cardiac disease. Therefore, in your case, a spe-cialist in internal medicine (diagnostician) may be your best resource. The antibiotic ampicillin is usually not associated with either lightheadedness

Varicose veins may be caused by weak valves

Varicose veins may be unsightly and troublesome but they seldom signify serious disease. And treatment for mild cases includes several common sense measures, says the Texas Medical Association.

Varicose veins are veins, usually in the leg, that have become twisted and swollen and appear just under the skin. Blood flows backwards into the veins from above because their valves do not keep the circulation going toward the heart. Pressure builds and the legs swell.

Deeper veins within the leg often can compensate for the shallower, varicose veins and maintain circulation without significant swelling. But if the deep veins also have faulty valves, swelling increases and more varicose veins may develop.

The problem of weak valves may be inherited. Varicose veins are also associated with occupations that require prolonged standing. And diseases, such as phlebitis, can destroy valves and lead to the enlarged veins.

The common first symptom of varicosity is the veins protruding from the leg. Other signs include fatigue in the leg muscles, and cramps and tenderness near the

Complications arising from varicose veins can often be prevented by wearing support stockings to reduce the pressure on the veins, elevating the legs above the heart level daily, avoiding long periods of standing, exercising lightly (swimming, cycling, walking, dancing, golf), and not wearing tight garters or girdles.

If varicose veins worsen, your physician may suggest surgery. In the most common form of surgery, the affected veins are simply stripped from the leg. The remaining small veins rapidly enlarge to take over the function of collecting blood and channeling it to the deep veins.





KERRVILLE, Texas (AP) - The pregnant wife of a Kerrville banker freed herself and walked to safety after an armed kidnapper left her tied up in a wooded area and demanded that her husband pay a \$100,000 ransom, police say.

An armed, masked gunman abducted Gay Haufler, 28, from her home about 11 a.m. Tuesday after forcing her to call her husband, Mark Haufler, at his office, FBI officials

The kidnapper failed to show up at the Interstate 10 location where the banker had been told to leave the ransom money, but FBI agents were questioning two men seen in the

Officials had set up surveillance where the money was left, but called the operation off at about 7 p.m. after television camera crews arrived, police said.

FBI agent Patrick Cowley said Mrs. Haufler, who is seven months pregnant, was not harmed in the incident.

She had managed to free herself from her bonds and flagged down a passing motorist about 6 p.m. on Texas 16 as she walked toward Kerrville from a wooded area where the kidnapper had driven her in the couple's station wagon.

"We're very glad she's safe and sound," Cowley said. "She's the prime concern in something like

The gunman also did not harm the Haufler's 4-year-old daughter, Megan, whom authorities found hiding under her bed in the Haufler home, Kerrville Police Chief L. Scott Evans said.

Haufler, a longtime employee of Shreiner Bancshares Inc., received the call from his wife at his office in the Charles Shreiner Bank in downtown Kerrville at 11:10 a.m., authorities said.

After contacting Kerville police, he took \$100,000 in cash to a telephone booth near the telephone company in downtown Kerrville, where he received the next part of a series of



instructions from the kidnapper.

Haufler was finally told to drive to a spot on Interstate 10 west of Kerrville. The banker dropped off the money between 12:30 p.m. and 1 p.m. No one showed up to retrieve the money, Cowley said.

"The people either changed their mind, got cold feet, or saw something they didn't like," he said.

The Hauflers' car was found on a dirt road a mile north of Interstate 10 and a half-mile west of Texas 16, police said.

In a similar incident, Kay Lane, the wife of InterFirst Bank Austin

chairman Robert Lane, was tied up Dec. 9 by a gunman who forced his way into the couple's west Austin home after posing as a flower deliveryman.

She was bound with tape by the man, who then called her husband at the bank and demanded a \$200,000

The extortionist left the home, and Mrs. Lane freed herself and called her husband to tell him not to pay the ransom. The extortionist never appeared at the place where the ransom was to be paid.

Varicose veins may be caused by weak valves

Varicose veins may be unsightly and troublesome but they seldom signify serious disease. And treatment for mild cases includes several common sense measures, says the Texas Medical Association.

Varicose veins are veins, usually in the leg, that have become twisted and swollen and appear just under the skin. Blood flows backwards into the veins from above because their valves do not keep the circulation going toward the heart. Pressure builds and the legs swell.

Deeper veins within the leg often can compensate for the shallower, varicose veins and maintain circulation without significant swelling. But if the deep veins also have faulty valves, swelling increases and more varicose veins may develop.

The problem of weak valves may be inherited. Varicose veins are also associated with occupations that require prolonged standing. And diseases, such as phlebitis, can destroy valves and lead to the enlarged veins.

The common first symptom of varicosity is the veins protruding from the leg. Other signs include fatigue in the leg muscles, and cramps and tenderness near the

Complications arising from varicose veins can often be prevented by wearing support stockings to reduce the pressure on the veins, elevating the legs above the heart level daily, avoiding long periods of standing, exercising lightly (swimming, cycling, walking, dancing, golf), and not wearing tight garters or girdles.

If varicose veins worsen, your physician may suggest surgery. In the most common form of surgery, the affected veins are simply stripped from the leg. The remaining small veins rapidly enlarge to take over the function of collecting blood and channeling it to the deep veins.

Try cutting the sugar quantity in half first. Then, if the resulting pudding is not sweet enough, you can always add a little extra sugar the next time. Adding extra flavoring extracts (vanilla, almond, etc.) or naturally sweet fruit purees will heighten the flavor of these low-sugar puddings. Stir these ingredients in after the pudding is cooked.

NutraSweet (aspartame, Equal) is not stable when heated and cannot be used to sweeten cooked foods, al-though you could prepare the pudding without any sweetening, then stir in sweetener to taste after the pudding has cooled.

In a typical cornstarch pudding recipe specifying two cups of milk and one-fourth cup sugar, calorie savings stack up like this: Two cups of skim milk instead of whole milk will save approximately 180 calories. Two tablespoons sugar instead of four (onefourth cup) will save a little over 100 calories. That's a total calorie savings of 280 calories for the entire recipe. Divided into a typical four servings, you'll save 70 calories on each serving





KERRVILLE, Texas (AP) - The pregnant wife of a Kerrville banker freed herself and walked to safety after an armed kidnapper left her tied up in a wooded area and demanded that her husband pay a \$100,000 ransom, police say.

An armed, masked gunman abducted Gay Haufler, 28, from her home about 11 a.m. Tuesday after forcing her to call her husband, Mark Haufler, at his office, FBI officials said.

The kidnapper failed to show up at the Interstate 10 location where the banker had been told to leave the ransom money, but FBI agents were questioning two men seen in the

Officials had set up surveillance where the money was left, but called the operation off at about 7 p.m. after television camera crews arrived, police said. FBI agent Patrick Cowley said

Mrs. Haufler, who is seven months pregnant, was not harmed in the incident.

She had managed to free herself from her bonds and flagged down a passing motorist about 6 p.m. on Texas 16 as she walked toward Kerrville from a wooded area where the kidnapper had driven her in the couple's station wagon.

"We're very glad she's safe and sound," Cowley said. "She's the prime concern in something like

The gunman also did not harm the Haufler's 4-year-old daughter. Megan, whom authorities found hiding under her bed in the Haufler home, Kerrville Police Chief L. Scott Evans said.

Haufler, a longtime employee of Shreiner Bancshares Inc., received the call from his wife at his office in the Charles Shreiner Bank in downtown Kerrville at 11:10 a.m., authorities said.

After contacting Kerville police, he took \$100,000 in cash to a telephone booth near the telephone company in downtown Kerrville, where he received the next part of a series of

instructions from the kidnapper.

Haufler was finally told to drive to a spot on Interstate 10 west of Kerrville. The banker dropped off the money between 12:30 p.m. and 1 p.m. No one showed up to retrieve the money, Cowley said.

"The people either changed their mind, got cold feet, or saw something they didn't like," he said.

The Hauflers' car was found on a dirt road a mile north of Interstate 10 and a half-mile west of Texas 16, police said.

In a similar incident, Kay Lane, the wife of InterFirst Bank Austin

chairman Robert Lane, was tied up Dec. 9 by a gunman who forced his way into the couple's west Austin home after posing as a flower deliveryman.

She was bound with tape by the man, who then called her husband at the bank and demanded a \$200,000 ransom.

The extortionist left the home, and Mrs. Lane freed herself and called her husband to tell him not to pay the ransom. The extortionist never appeared at the place where the ran-

The loss puts Hereford at 0-3 in District 3-5A games and 3-9 overall.


In the junior varsity game, Amarillo scored a 73-57 victory over Hereford. The HHS junior varsity now has a 2-7 season record.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The who need to be protected are getting merican public, overreacting to lost in the avalanche of new cases." American public, overreacting to graphic news accounts of beaten, starved or sexually abused children, is jumping to conclusions and reporting suspected child abuse where at times none exists, an authority says.

Nationwide, 65 percent of all child abuse reports eventually prove to be false, Douglas J. Besharov, director of the American Enterprise Institute's Social Invention Project, said Tuesday. In 1973, 35 percent of those reports were deemed groundless.

"This flood of inappropriate cases is not just unfair to the parents who are investigated, it also creates real danger for children who are in true jeopardy," he said. "These children

People falsely accused of child abuse are striking back, often with lawsuits, he noted. The organization, Victims of Child Abuse Laws, was formed a year ago to help wrongly accused parents protect themselves, and it now has more than 3,000 members in 38 states.

"We are very angry," said Mary Lou Bauer of Hampton, Minn., a cofounder of VOCAL who said she and her husband were falsely accused of neglecting their adopted children. "This could happen to anyone. Anyone can misinterpret an action as sexual abuse if it's a caress, physical abuse if it's a spanking, emotional abuse if it's a lecture."

False reports put innocent families through the anguish of an investigation and also overwhelms the limited resources of child protective agencies, Besharov said.

Besharov, whose findings were published last week in the Harvard Journal of Law and Public Policy, said the public must be educated about what should be reported. He said people should "be careful don't report on flimsy evidence" such as a single bruise or a brief change of behavior. He said the guideline should be, "If you think the child is in serious danger, then you should report."

Other recommendations: -The news media and politicians should cool rhetoric about child

abuse. Besharov said graphic news stories about children beaten, starved or sexually assaulted make people too eager to "do something" about the problem.

-Hotline workers should screen calls. Half the states prohibit hotline workers from making judgments about suspected abuse, so all reports are treated as true. "Anyone can report and trigger an investigation."

-Federal and state laws must be modified to discourage reports without basis. He said in all but six states it is a crime not to report suspected child abuse. To protect themselves, doctors and social workers are overreacting and reporting even marginally suspicious cases

Last year 1.5 million cases of child abuse were reported to the authorities, a 10-fold increase since 1963, said Besharov, a former New York City prosecutor and a past director of the National Center on Child Abuse and Neglect.



Arts in Texas town alive on Fry Street

DENTON, Texas (AP) - Down on Fry Street, when the sun goes down, a couple of spots heat up — Fry Street Classics, a used bookstore, and The Connection, a college-crowd

Each spot acts as a nucleus around which cloud two distinct types of people, who are, for the most part, mutually exclusive: Only a few are at ease with both the musician-artistwriter circle of the bookstore and the younger rock 'n' roll headbangers of The Connection.

Some warm nights hundreds of people line the street, either gasping fresh air outside the bar or leaning against a wall or telephone post near the bookstore, where Olivarez or others my be reciting poetry. When the Sigma Alpha Mu fraternity, which sits on a corner of Fry Street and Oak, has a party or band in full swing, the whole street is alive with people, colorful fashions and oftentimes raucous music.

Fry Street as a street runs for several blocks, up and away from North Texas State University. Fry Street as an event is far shorter, perhaps only slightly longer than a hundred yards, bounded by Hickory and Oak streets.

Olivarez has published a book of poetry titled "Song of the Children." Copies are available at the bookstore. He said he's going to begin working on another soon. He has read his poetry in Houston, Austin and San Antonio.

Most Sunday nights Olivarez has lined up a band to play in the parking lot behind the bookstore. Bands used to play there Friday and Saturday nights as well, but Olizarez said complaints about the noise led him to schedule bands only on Sunday nights. Of course that doesn't prevent musicians from getting together and jamming when the mood hits them.

Bands that have played at the bookstore include The Cartoons. When Clowns Go Bad, Cots, United Snakes, Wounded Pelicans, Banda Eclipse and the Peacemakers.

Olivarez also sponsors art shows, and the vibrant, colorful portraits of David Bowie, Grace Jones, John and Yoko Lennon and other pop personalities hanging inside the bookstore are the current exhibit. The artist in this case, Amy Grant, works out of Dallas, but Olivarez said he will consider exhibiting almost any art. Any artist interested in having his work displayed may find Olivarez at the bookstore most afternoons and evenings.

Olivarez characterized the bookstore crowd as more sedate, less wild, than the bar crowd.

Against the north wall stands a Stargate video machine. On the east side of the room is the bar. with four or five stools next to it. On the south side of the room and a step below is the dance floor and the cubby hole in which Fontechia spins

Many of the female patrons are wearing dresses reminiscent of the flapper era of the '20s and sporting haircuts which may seem strange to many. Most of the male patrons have short, conservative haircuts and wear blue jeans. An occasional earring dangles from an occasional male

"I grew up on bands like U2, The Clash, Specials. Anything fun," he said. "That's the philosophy of this bar and this street.'

Back down Fry Street, behind the bookstore, three members of the Peacekeepers have begun calmly jamming. Armed with a guitar, harmonica and saxophone, they soon attract about 40 or so listeners.

Three policemen wander around the circumference of the listeners. One, a balding older man, mumbles softly, "It can't be a poetry reading, it's not the first Friday."


One policeman approached a T-shirted, blue-jeaned youth sitting on the pavement, listening to the music. He's holding an open beer can, and another beer can, unopened, sits at his side. It's after midnight.

After they write him a \$25 ticket. the policemen wander off.

"In Houston," the youth sid, "closing time is 2 a.m." He tugged at the safety pin dangling from his right ear. "Those cops were real sympathetic. They said I could carry this one," he said, holding an upopened

Olivarez, who witnessed the incident, said, "We don't have any trouble from the police. I'm running a business here, and we stay within the guidelines of the law. A lot of times policemen will come out here just to listen to the music. They've been real supportive."



"Those reservoirs in the direct vicinity of source rocks are more apt to be supplied by hydrocarbons than others," said Dr. Guven. "We will attempt to develop a model of hydrocarbon formation and migraton which would be invaluable for future exploration. The pro-

cedure would be a major departure from today's predominant exploration technique which is finding reservoirs and drilling into them without much concern for whether they are close to

mature source rocks." Guven said source rocks which produce petroleum are similar no matter where they are found, so the model should suit oil exploration in fields other than the Permian

Basin. While developing the formation and migration model, the researchers will study source rocks using laser fluorescence spectroscopy which involves shining short laser pulses onto source

rocks. Physics Department Chairperson Walter L. Borst, co-principal investigator in charge of the laser fluorescence research, said organic material in rocks shows fluorescence when exposed to laser radiation. Different patterns of fluorescence are exhibited by various kinds of rocks because of the combination of organic materials in the

rocks. "Each organic material emits the fluorescence with a characteristic duration. The technique allows us to observe fluorescence decay times and emission spectra. The characteristics of the fluorescence depend on what chemical is doing the fluorescing," Dr. Borst said. With the laser technique we hope to find out which

materials emit various patterns of fluorescence." By knowing how rocks of different maturity levels fluoresce, the technique could be applied to actual exploration in determining the maturity of source rock beds and when they might begin producing hydrocarbons. Borst said.

Laser fluorescene, which Borst developed with grants from the U.S. Department of Energy and Leitz, Inc., has been used with coal and in a preliminary study of source

Other forms of research, including geochemistry and sedimentology studies, will also be done on the source rocks. These studies will provide additional information and complement the laser fluorescence work.

Commission adopts **Substantive Rules**

Commission has adopted on a permanent basis Substantive devices (ADAD). Under Substantive Rule 23.32, persons using ADAD's for telephone solicitation or collection of information must obtain a permit from the

Persons applying for the required permit will be responsible for a one-time fee of \$500 for each permit issued. Permit applications may be obtained through the PUC Cen-

tral Records Division. The requirement that ADAD users obtain a license in order to operate their equipment within the state was outlined in House Bill 659 during the last legislative session. The bill calls for the PUC to incorporate the licensing requirement and additional ADAD guidelines in the Commission's Substantive Rules. It also establishes failure to obtain a permit as a

Class C misdemeanor. Other requirements outlin-

ed in the rules include: -The user must give a copy of the permit as notice to each

The Texas Public Utility company over whose system the equpment will be used.

Many buildings should be preserved

LUBBOCK - They don't construct buildings like they used to.

All the more reason, says Texas Tech University history Professor Joseph E. King, that many buildings should be targeted for preser-

vation, not demolition. "Things could be done years ago-such as heavy stone masonry and ornamental fretwork or 'gingerbreading'-that are simply not possible in today's economy," King said. "Most buildings cannot be built again because of the high cost of materials and energy."

And while many cannot be rebuilt, many can be saved and renovated, often to the economic advantage of the owner, King said.

"Not everything can be saved or even should be saved or renovated, but those structures of particular historical or architectural significance should be identified so intelligent decisions can be made about their disposition," he said.

That's why Texas Tech's Center for History of Engineering and Technology was created in 1970. King, who directs the center, and his associates assist communities, counties and even states in making assessments of buildings and structures.

"We act as a source of professional expertise in historic preservation to the public at large, particularly in Texas and the Southwest, though we have had inquiries from as far away as Alaska," King said. "We provide the historical techniques and documentation to assess the historic and architectural value of structures."

During the past two decades, seaving and reusing older buildings has made greater economic sense, King said, because of legislation which offers incentives. The National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, which emphasized the cultural value of old buildings, and the Tax Reform Act of 1981, which provided economic incentives for restoration, are major laws which focused attention on preservation.

'The economic advantages often go beyond the value one building may have for an owner," King said. "Restoring older buildings makes a town a more attractive place, helps draw visitors and tourists and often enhances property values."

Along with the economic benefits can come a renewal in old-fashioned community pride, King said.

"This is a grassroots kind of history because it recognizes the contributions of the people themselves to the town or area they developed," he said. "It is perhaps a more meaningful type of history because it is more immediate and tangible. It communicates a sense of place because buildings speak to the history of a town more than anything else."

Since the Center for History of Engineering and Technology was established, its researchers have conducted 24 projects with grants totaling more than \$750,000. The center crosses disciplinary lines, using experts not only from the Texas **Tech History Department but** also from the Civil Engineering Department, the Division of Architecture and the Park Administration and Landscape Architecture Department.

While historical building assessments and inventories are common projects for the cente,r its researchers have also done extensive work at engineering sites throughout the Southwest, evaluating bridges, dams, mining sites, industrial plants and irrigation networks, among others, for historical significance. The center has conducted studies throughout Texas as well as in New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado and

Nevada, King said. Work by the center usually involves careful on-site inspections and evaluations by teams of researchers visiting the survey areas. Identified sits are then documented and evaluated for their historical. architectural or engineering value and listed on inventories which can be used for further study or as a beginning point for possible restoration projects.

In some cases the best of the identified structures are nominated by the center to the National Register of Historic Places in Washington. The register is an inventory maintained by the National Park service of the most worthwhile structures in the nation.

"The work we do can help people understand what of their architectural and engineering heritage is worth preserving and why," King




