State Highway Commission Hears Paving Requests

The Texas Highway Commission, meeting in Amarillo Tuesday, heard a renewed request from the Deaf Smith County commissioners for an allotment to complete Highway 51 between Hereford and Vega, and for the paving of 36 miles of Harrison Highway from Hereford west to the State line.

The Commission has been asked to designate Harrison Highway as a state highway. Contracts should be let soon for a part of Highway 51 for which rights-of-way easements are now being secured, County Judge Fred W. Baird said. However, there is still a 15 mile gap in the center of that stretch of highway which has never yet been surveyed by the state engineers.

Right-of-way is now almost completed on 9 miles of Highway 51 north from Hereford, and on 5 miles south from Vega, and contracts for paving of these stretches will probably be let as soon as easements are completed.

Commissioners Troy Moore and Jeff Roberson and Judge Baird appeared before the commission. The requests, with others heard Tuesday, were "taken under consideration."

In the meantime, the Highway Commission announced in Amarillo Thursday that approximately \$500,000 worth of highway construction projects had been approved in the Panhandle. Potter, Carson, Moore, Randall and Donley counties were the authorized projects. The bulk of it (\$376,645) going to Potter and Carson counties for surfacing and widening of U. S. Highways 60 and 66.

County Judge A. D. Smith of Farmer county asked the commission Tuesday for several arm-to-market roads and a road from Felona to Muleshoe.

Forrest Elected President of Hereford School Board Friday

New and Retiring

Leo Forrest, manager of the Deaf Smith County Rural Electrification Cooperative, was elected president of the Board of Trustees of the Hereford Independent School district, succeeding Jesse Stanford, veteran member of the board, at an organization meeting Friday night.

Stanford, who has served 11 years as president of the board, and 17 years as a member, submitted his resignation Friday. Jimmie Gillentine, editor of The Hereford Brand, was named vice-president, succeeding Cliff Hicks, who was defeated for reelection on April 6, and Henry Sears was named secretary, succeeding Homer Henslee, who is still a member of the board.

Stanford, who had announced his intention to retire prior to the recent election, said that he felt that he had served long enough and did not want to undertake a new program of expansion which is now becoming necessary in the local school system.

Major Schroeter was appointed Saturday by the new president to fill Stanford's unexpired term, which still has a year to run.

Three new members of the board of trustees took their places at the meeting Friday night. Forrest, Sears, and Sylvester Slagle were elected to the board in a surprise write-in.

County Board Will Not Call Election On Consolidation

Washing their hands of any legal responsibility regarding a consolidation election, or the calling of such an election, members of the Deaf Smith County School Board Wednesday night told trustees of the Hereford Independent District that such a movement or election was beyond the legal rights of the county group.

County Judge Fred W. Baird acted as spokesman for the County Board and suggested as an alternative a statute under which Consolidation Elections may be brought about through presentation of a petition to the County Judge from each of the districts under consideration.

Leo Forrest, new president of the Hereford Board, indicated that the Hereford Board would like to see an election called, regardless of outcome, in order that the Hereford District might know how to plan its future building program.

The joint session, a bit fiery in spots, closed around 11 o'clock and left conditions in much the same manner as when they started except for the fact that a new method of calling an election was advanced and any responsibility for the calling of such an election was shifted by the County Board to each of the individual Common School Districts.

Veterans of Three Wars Will Take Part in X-Day Parade on Saturday

Veterans of at least two other wars will be on hand Saturday to help the Ex-Servicemen of World War II make their X-Day parade a big success.

W. C. Hromas, Post Commander of the American Legion, says that the Legionnaires of World War I, though getting a little old, still will have some marching in the X-Day Parade. "I realize," Hromas said, "that the vets of the 'Big War' of 1917-18 cannot compete with the veterans of the late World War II, but we'll be in there pitching all day long to make X-Day celebration a big success."

"Don't forget," Commander Hromas said, "that all Legionnaires of World War I are requested to wear their Legion caps."

Hromas also stated that a few veterans of the Spanish-American War will participate in the X-Day parade.

At least two Spanish-American War veterans, J. A. Loerwald and Dr. F. M. Kester, are living in Hereford and will probably be on hand.

Veterans of the First World War will be present in strength in Hereford, and the local veteran's organizations which are sponsoring the X-Day events are urging a big turn-out for this first big post-war celebration.

Saturday's Field Day is part of a drive by the American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars to raise funds for the construction of a Veteran's Memorial Center in Hereford.

A goal of \$75,000 has been set by the two local posts for the proposed construction.

The day's program will close with dances at the County Club and the City Hall beginning at 8 o'clock.

Light Showers Bring No Relief For Local Crops

A light shower which covered most of this area Monday afternoon brought little aid to crops, which are, for the most part, beginning to need rain badly.

The official gauge in Hereford recorded .07 inch of moisture, and most of the surrounding communities reported about the same amount.

At Adrian, however, nearly a quarter of an inch of rain was reported, and farther north Ochiltree and Hansford Counties reported more than half an inch of rain Monday. Only a trace of moisture was received in Amarillo.

The showers were accompanied by lowering temperatures, and a light freeze was reported Monday night. The cold snap, however, failed to damage fruit trees which are now in full bloom, and the thermometer Tuesday began climbing again.

Farmers Co-Op to Hold Meeting in Amarillo 18-19

AMARILLO, Texas, April 17—Plans are complete for one of the largest agricultural meetings ever to be held in the southwest, when farmers and ranchers from Texas, Oklahoma, Colorado, and New Mexico will converge on Amarillo April 18 and 19 for the annual shareholders meeting of Consumers Cooperatives Associated, according to

an announcement made today by Donald W. May, educational director of farm cooperatives in the southwest.

The two-day meeting will be held at the Herring Hotel in Amarillo, and the speakers will include S. D. Sanders, commissioner of banks, Farm Credit Administration, Washington, D. C.; Dr. Raymond W. Miller, president of the American Institute of Cooperation, Philadelphia, Pa.; C. J. McLanahan, national educational director of the Cooperative League, Chicago, Ill.; Glenn S. Fox, director of finance, Consumers Cooperative Association, Kansas City, Mo.; and T. A. Terhune, general

manager of National Cooperatives of Chicago.

The first day of the meeting will be taken up with discussions of various phases of cooperative agriculture and will feature an address by Commissioner Sanders of FCA on "Improved Economic Conditions for Farmers Through Cooperatives."

A square dance will be given with Cecil Hefley of Amarillo as caller and presenting the "Gay Nineties" Club.

The second day of the meeting will be used in the business session of the OCA group and will be presided over by R. B. Gist, president, of Happy, Walter L. Bradley, of Buffalo, New York, will read the audit report and discuss cooperative financing and tax matters.

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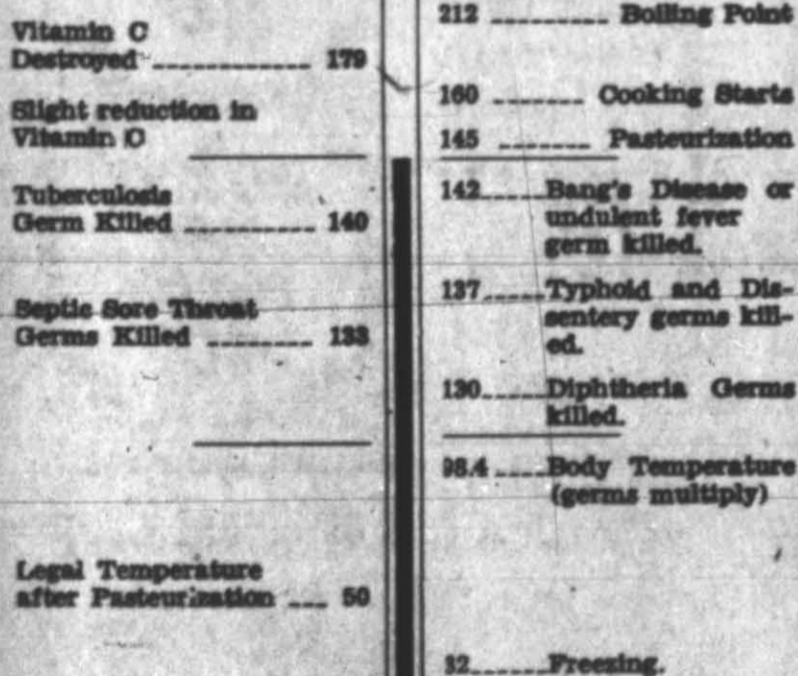

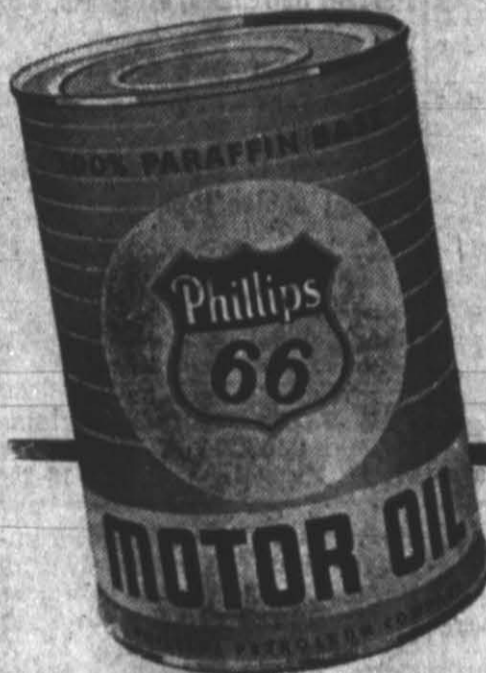

Garden Club Hears Chemist Speak

The Hereford Garden Club met at the home of Mrs. C. D. Carnahan Friday afternoon with Mrs. John Robinson as co-hostess.

Preceding the regular program members of the club heard a talk given by Nelson Armstrong, a chemist from Seattle, Washington. Mr. Armstrong made the statement "Let me say how your gardens are fed and I will give you a race of people unequalled in mentality." He advocated feeding vitamins to plants instead of taking them bringing out the point that degeneration of races comes through soil deficiencies.

Mrs. E. T. Brooks spoke on plant structure dealing with the root, stem and leaf and describing the structure and use of each part. She also explained why transplanting is beneficial to plants.

Mrs. Fred Axe gave the meaning of Easter Symbols, telling of many legends and explaining why certain trees, flowers and birds are considered symbols of Easter.

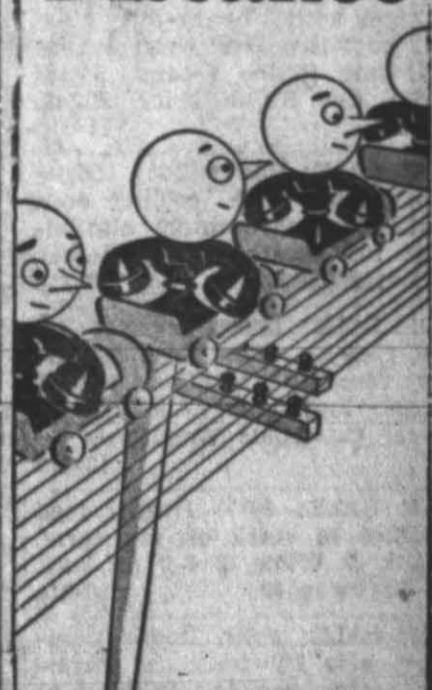

Estimate 2,000 Combines Will Be Needed This Year

COLLEGE STATION, April 15.—Two thousand combines from out-side the state will be needed in harvesting the Texas grain crop this year, if weather conditions continue favorable. This figure was obtained in a poll of county agricultural agents made by J. B. Kidd, farm labor field assistant who is in charge of the wheat harvest program for the A. and M. College Extension Service.

The wheat and small grain acreage is 12 per cent larger than the record acreage of 1945, according to recent state crop reports, and the crop conditions in early April were better than average.

After considering these factors Kidd wrote the custom combine operators in Texas and other grain producing states notifying them of the indicated combine needs in Texas. His office at Plainview will keep custom combine operators informed on crop conditions as well as combine, truck and labor needs and inform them of the exact place and time they will be needed in order to make most efficient use of manpower and equipment.

In asking the combine operators to start their harvest operations in Texas this year, Kidd advised them to bring trucks with their combines. He said, however, that trucks not attached to combines were not solicited at the present time. Warning operators of the shortage of implements parts, he advised them to bring along with them spare parts for their equipment.

In the same period county agricultural agents made 11,905 labor placements, and 5,923 workers were referred to other counties and states as the harvest moved northward. While some combines arrived late in areas of need, the crop was cut in record time and very little grain was stored on the ground.

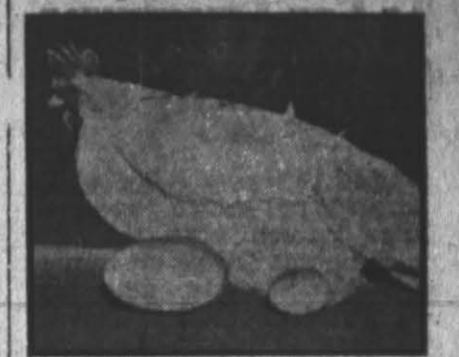

Brick and Tile Factory Now In Production Here

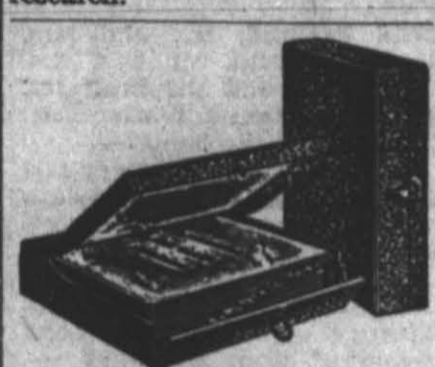
Loyd's Brick and Tile Factory, located a mile east of Main street on Highway 60, is open and in full production now, according to Loyd E. Bradley, owner of the plant.

The new plant is producing tile made of volcanic pumice imported from New Mexico. Three types and sizes of tile are being produced for partition, residential and commercial building.

The largest size, 5x8x12 inches, is being turned out at the rate of 2,000 tiles a day, and smaller tiles are being produced in larger quantities.

There are no government restrictions on the sale of tile, Bradley points out, and the local production is expected to relieve some of the material shortage for construction here.

Veterans Granted Extension on GI Insurance Policy

The best veterans' news of the week was General Omar N. Bradley's announcement that ex-servicemen whose National Service Life Insurance policies have lapsed may now reinstate them without physical examination, if they submit a signed statement that they are in as good health as at the time of lapse.

This liberalization of reinstatement privileges will remain in effect until Jan. 1, 1947, and also will apply to any NSLI policies which lapse between now and that date. After Dec. 31, 1946, regulations that applied before the liberalization will again be in effect. These regulations governing reinstatement require a physical examination if the date of reinstatement is more than six months after the veteran's separation from the service, or more than three months from the date of lapse, whichever is later.

The liberalization does not affect the requirements regarding payment of premiums upon reinstatement of lapsed policies. In the case of National Service Life Insurance which has not been converted to a permanent form, only two monthly premiums must accompany the application for reinstatement. In the case of policies which have been converted, payments which have been missed must be repaid with interest.

This new ruling is a boon to many veterans, including those with disabilities who might never be able to qualify for other insurance, it is pointed out by Harold W. Breining, VA insurance chief. Breining also noted that veterans receiving disability pensions may authorize VA to deduct their service insurance premiums from their pension payments.

Ban on Greeting Telegrams Lifted

The war-time ban on greeting telegrams has been lifted, and Easter and Mother's Day greetings may be sent again this year on specially decorated blanks symbolic of the holidays, the local Western Union office has announced.

The government ban on telegraphed greetings was lifted last September, and now Western Union has taken the further step of restoring the illustrated blanks and special greeting envelopes in which the messages will be delivered.

Air Force Vets Tell Rotarians of War Experiences

Four Air Force veterans presented a program at the Hereford Rotary Club Luncheon last Friday.

With G. T. Higgins, former pilot with the 15th Air Force, acting as interlocutor, three Hereford veterans, Paul Foster, R. L. Dowell, and George Jones told of their experiences as prisoners of war in Germany. All three were lieutenants and pilots. Foster and Jones with the 8th Air Force and Dowell with the 9th Air Force.

Higgins, as a pilot with the 5th Air Force, was assigned the task of flying food into Germany for the liberated prisoners of war.

Foster told of ways and means employed by prisoners in the German camps of communication and escape. He was a prisoner in Germany for 10 months. Dowell, who made a forced landing behind enemy lines and was a prisoner of the Germans for 6 and a half months, told of his treatment when he was captured, and of his liberation from the prison camp.

Jones, a prisoner of war in Germany for 17 months, told of the Gestapo's methods of questioning prisoners in an effort to get information.

Teachers Leaving School for Better Pay Survey Shows

CANYON, Texas, April 15—That 165 public school teachers have left their jobs in forty Panhandle towns since September to take more attractive positions is revealed in a recent study.

Among this number, 60 said they quit teaching to earn more money. Others mentioned that they felt their new jobs would be less exacting than teaching.

Superintendents of the schools studied said they had a total of 117 sub-standard teachers in their classrooms, said Dr. A. M. Meyer, dean of the Graduate School of West Texas State College.

In reply to a question concerning recommendations for getting—and holding—teachers of ability and good preparation,

the school heads gave three:

1. Raise teachers' pay to "respectable" levels.
2. Make teaching loads more

reasonable.

3. Establish a social status for teachers comparable with that of other professional workers.

"The following punishment will be imposed on all World War II veterans who are not in uniform on X-Day," G. T. Higgins, senior vice-commander of the VFW, has announced. "Veterans out of uniform will be fined \$5 or placed in a cage on Main Street for five hours . . . or until they have raised enough money to pay the fine."

Uniform regulations, however, have been amended since the original letter of instructions to veterans was sent out last week.

"Since many veterans have complained that they do not have sun-tan uniforms," Robert Wood, commander of the VFW announced, "we have decided to authorize either sun-tans or o. d. uniforms. We don't want any veteran to stay away from the celebration on that account."

Veterans will meet at the District Court room at ten o'clock Saturday morning to organize for the parade. Army, Navy, and Marine veterans will organize in separate groups, with Woody Wilson in charge of Navy exes, Hugh White with the Marines, and Earl Stagner in charge of army vets.

The Office of Price Administration has filed suit in federal court in Amarillo against Sears and Teter Grain Company for \$606,838 damages, alleging that the local grain company sold 14 million pounds of grain sorghum to Joseph E. Seagrams Co., Louisville, Kentucky, above ceiling prices.
