# Charity meals set records

The newly unemployed helped swell-lines for free meals as charities handed out Thanksgiving dinners in record numbers, while more Americans fortunate celebrated with traditional turkey, parades and football.

Some people hurt by the recession said they got their first hearty meal in weeks by going to missions, churches

and restaurants that shared their donations, or good fortune, on Thanksgiving day.

'We're here because we're hungry," said Leonard Darling, balancing pie on his lap as he sat on a bleacher at the Oklahoma City Salvation Army beside his wife. Nearby, an oilfield worker waiting in line said he hadn't eaten a good meal since losing his job

in September. 'We've noticed a lot more families," said Maj. Neil Saunders of the Salvation Army Hospitality House in Tucson, Ariz., which served 1,200 meals, compared with 870 last year. "Those who were our givers are now our

receivers. Many spent the day the traditional way - behind a stove at home or watching parades or football.

### Shuttle reveals ancient rivers

WASHINGTON (AP) - Radar aimed earthward from the U.S. space shuttle has revealed ancient river systems as mammoth as the Nile buried beneath the desert sands of southwestern Egypt, according to a report published to-

The article in Science magazine said the striking discovery of valleys and stream beds last seen by Stone Age man - and since then known only in legend resulted from an "imaging radar" experiment carried aboard the shuttle Columbia in November 1981.

"These river systems were probably independent of the evolution of the Egyptian Nile," wrote the eight-member research team headed by John F. McCauley of the U.S. Geological Survey. "Thus, the old saying that the Nile is Egypt ... while true in a human sense, is not so apt

Another team member, archaeologist C. Vance Haynes. said of the radar pictures produced by the shuttle experiment: "They boggle the mind. They look through the

Haynes, from the University of Arizona in Tucson, said the images captured by sophisticated gear aboard Columbia may amount to road maps to the settlements of prehistoric peoples who roamed the now-inhospitable region as early as 200,000 years ago.

In their magazine account, the scientists noted that legends about the "Bahr-bela-ma" - or "great rivers without water" - in the midst of the Sahara have been told since ancient times. Explorers were drawn to the area, the earth's driest and most featureless desert ex-

However, the sprawling river valleys remained hidden beneath yards of sand until the shuttle experiment managed to yield radar images unobtainable by optical reconnaissance methods.

In the Egyptian region known as the Arbain Desert rainfall occurs only every 30 to 50 years. Such extreme dryness enabled radar signals to penetrate the sand down to about 15 feet below the surface, compared with a depth of only a few inches in wetter terrain.

Researchers were able to trace the outlines of the hidden river valleys because bedrock a few feet under the sand bounced back bright radar images, while the deeper valleys showed up as great dark veins

About 2 million years ago the climate of the area dried suddenly, changing from savannah - or grassland - to desert. But scientists have identified three periods about 200,000 years ago, 60,000 years ago and 10,000 years ago - when the area received enough rain to permit human habitation.

The magazine article said the shuttle radar-imaging experiment succeeded in "revealing previously unknown buried valleys, geologic structures and possible Stone Age occupation sites.

"The potential for mapping ancient drainage patterns and, by inference, potential sources of near-surface ground water - is sufficient to arouse excitement among earth scientists," the Science article said.

# Japanese parliament elects prime minister

TOKYO (AP) - Conservative Yasuhiro Nakasone was elected prime minister today by the Japanese parliament and immediately began forming a Cabinet while newspaper editorials questioned the "political ethics" of his leadership.

Nakasone's election was assured by the majority held in the Diet (parliament) by his, ruling Liberal Democratic Party

In the Lower House, where the LDP holds 287 of 505 active seats, Nakasone received 287 votes, against 102 for Ichio Asukata, chairman of the top opposition Japan Socialist Party. Later in the day Nakasone outpolled Asukata 130 to 50 in the Upper House where the LDP holds 134 of 246 seats

The other votes were divid-

ed among four smaller par-

The LDP, a conservative coalition of factions in power since 1955, chose Nakasone as its president after his convincing win Thursday over three rivals in primary election voting by the party's 1 million rank and file members.

He succeeds Prime Minister Zenko Suzuki, 71, who announced he was stepping down after two years in office on Oct. 12.

Nakasone and his 20-member Cabinet will be formally inaugurated tonight by 81-year-old Emperor Hirohito if the selection of ministers goes smoothly. The emperor, a powerless symbol of state, has been directed by the constitution to appoint the prime minister chosen by the Diet since the end of World

The Japanese press

reported that the foreign minister post would go to Shintaro Abe, who as International Trade and Industry minister under Suzuki was a chief spokesman for Japan's controversial trade policies. Nakasone retained Susumu Nikaido, a deputy in the

largest LDP faction led by former Prime Minister Kakuei Tanaka, in the powerful party post of secretary general. Several other Tanaka followers also were expected to receive key Cabinet posts.

Nakasone's opponents in the party race criticized his ties to Tanaka, who was tried on charges of accepting \$2 million in bribes to promote

# Reagan's proposals to tax unemployed, lower wages for summer youth jobs drawing fire

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP) - President Reagan is drawing political fire for a plan under study to tax unemployment insurance benefits of jobless workers. and reduce the minimum wage for youth hired in summer jobs.

White House deputy press secretary Larry Speakes confirmed Thursday that the two proposals were among eight options developed for Reagan by his Cabinet Council on Economic Affairs to attack the problem of chronic unemployment.

Although Speakes said Reagan had not discussed the ideas with his economic advisers and would take no action on them until next year, the proposals came under immediate attack from organized labor and a ranking congressional Democrat.

In Washington, Rep. Henry S. Reuss, D-Wis., chairman of the Joint Economic Commit-

tee, declared: "I don't think Mr. Reagan has thought that one through " or he would have rejected the proposals out of hand. "People on unemployment aren't goldbricks or loafers. They're usually people who are down on their luck, through no fault of their own.

"I wouldn't mind considering some change in the current exemption on taxation. But it would be unconscionable to, in effect, reduce unemployment compensation for the poor by taxing it," Reuss said. Earlier Thursday, his panel predicted that November's unemployment rate might rise a notch to 10.5 percent.

The proposals will not be ready for the lame-duck session of Congress that convenes Monday but will be carried over to early next year, Speakes said.

# Resident's son killed in wreck

A 16-year veteran of the Amarillo Police Department, and the son of a Hereford resident, was killed in a freak mishap on I-40 in Amarillo Wednesday.

Delbert Wayne Miller, 49, a motorcyle patrolman, was dead on arrival at Northwest Texas Hospital around 4:15 p.m. Wednesday after he was struck by a truck while directing traffic in the westbound lanes of the highway at the Nelson St. overpass.

Hospital physicians pronounced Miller dead of head and chest injuries.

Miller was the son of Harvey Miller of Hereford. Sgt. H.R. Kelly of the Crime Prevention Unit said Miller was directing traffic at the scene of a minor accident atop the overpass when a 11/2-ton International truck

skidded out of control in the

eastbound lanes of I-40.

The truck jumped the median and metal guardrails of the highway, Kelly said, then slammed into the officer in the westbound lanes. The truck continued on to strike a patrol car, strewing asphalt shingles over the roadway as its contents spilled as a result of the accident.

Investigation into the accident was continuing Thursday. The accident Miller was working on was one of many minor mishaps reported along I-40 and the Canyon Expressway as snow began falling in the city.

Funeral services for Miller were pending with N.S. Griggs & Sons Funeral Directors of Amarillo

Miller was a native of Canadian and a member of the Church of Christ. He joined the Amarillo police force



# Cowboys rip Browns; Giants edge Lions

It's a good thing for the New York Giants that Lawrence Taylor has a good memory

It was worth a touchdown and a 13-6 National Football League victory over the Detroit Lions on Thursday.

As the Lions lined up for a play in their Thanksgiving Day game at Pontiac, Mich., Taylor recognized the formation as one that the Green Bay Packers had used against the Giants earlier in the season.

So he was ready for a pass

With third-and-goal at the Giants' 3-yard line, Detroit quarterback Gary Danielson tried to hit Horace King in the left flat. However, Taylor picked it off and galloped along the sideline for 97 yards to score the game's only touchdown with 10:56 remain-

"The situation was similar to the one Green Bay had against us earlier in the season," Taylor explained. They called a timeout and when they lined up, I recognized the formation as one similar to the Packers'. I was supposed to cover the man out of the backfield (King) and when he went into the flat, I cut in front of him and got the pass.

In the other holiday game, the Dallas Cowboys routed the Cleveland Browns 31-14.

While making his coast-tocoast run, Taylor ignored a sore right knee that has plagued him during this strike-shortened season.

'My knee didn't hurt me a bit as I was running down the field," he said: "I just saw Coach (Ray) Perkins waving his arms and telling me to keep going.

Perkins called it a "mustwin" triumph for the Giants, who gained their first victory of the season after three

"Today, we looked like the New York Giants of last year (when they made the NFL playoffs)," Perkins said. We have to play like this the

next five games if we want any shot at the playoffs."

Danielson was driving the Lions toward the potential tving touchdown in the closing minutes before cornerback Terry Jackson made another interception, at almost exactly the same spot as Taylor's, to preserve the victory.

Perkins' joy was tempered by his anger over a fourthquarter incident which sent Leon Bright of the Giants to a hospital for X-rays and overnight observation. As he got set to field a punt, Bright was leveled by a hit from Leonard Thompson of the Lions and was carried from the field on a stretcher.

X-rays of his neck were negative.

Perkins said he had complained to the NFL about similar plays but said no one was willing to do anything about it. "If anyone gets seriously hurt, it will be the league office's fault because they don't insist that officials follow the rules and throw out

many (AP) - Jill Grant looked up at the run-down 19thcentury building she calls home and scowled.

"Germans don't live like this," she said, shaking her head with disgust. "You know Germans don't live like this."

About 10 feet away, Mrs. Grant's 2-year-old daughter, Precious, played in front of a building where two sex shows are housed on the ground

"Yeah; those women are out here every night," Mrs. Grant said. "I used to let it bother me but now I just ignore them.

"If I'd known it was going to be like this I never would have come over here."

Mrs. Grant, 20, is the wife of an American soldier stationed in West Germany. She and her husband Gene and their daughter live in a tiny apartment in a former Wiesbaden hotel, smack in the middle of a strip of girlie

About 42,000 U.S. soldiers in Europe live off base, Army headquarters in Heidelberg says. In West Germany, where most of the Army is stationed, many of these soldiers and their families live in low-rent, run-down housing - all they can afford in this country's overcrowded housing market.

On base, things aren't much better. Gen. Frederick Kroesen, commander in chief of the U.S. Army in Europe, said in a recent interview that housing remains the Army's No. 1 European problem, with a worrisome effect on

morale "The U.S. Army in Europe's living facilities are old, often crowded, and insufficient," a report from Kroesen's office said last year. "Soldiers are not happy with the facilities that they

fold-down bathtub. -"A private first class in Mannheim rents an apartment for himself and his wife that has no hot water in the kitchen. His wife washes the

dishes in the bathtub. -"A specialist, in Hanau who is entitled to quarters moved to a one-room economy apartment when he learned that there was a 44-week wait for quarters. He pays about \$350 each month for rent and utilities; which leaves barely enough money for food."

Make the Connection GI families in her building complain there is not enough heat and not enough hot water. There are too many ants, roaches, mice rats and break-ins - four break-ins within two weeks in August

alone.

The worst problem is lack of space. The Grants all sleep in the same room, which is about 10 feet by 12 feet and doubles as the living room. It is the only real room in the apartment, which also has a small bath and a kitchen nook too narrow for both a table and chairs.

When I saw this, I said, Why'd you bring me over here to this place?" Mrs. Grant said. "He said, 'It's the best I can do."

Mrs. Grant and the other particular bind. Until a soldier attains a rank of E-4, the Army won't provide him with government family housing and recommends that he leave his family at

But the great majority of the married, lower-grade soldiers ignore this advice. Lower grades mean lower pay, so these families are trapped in low-rent housing.

The inability to speak German also keeps the Grants from looking around, Mrs. Grant said. They got their apartment - for which they pay 425 marks (about \$170) a month - through an Army housing referral office.

"We didn't know what's out there, and if we did, we wouldn't know how to ask for it," she said.

# Blinded man guides rescuers by sounds

TOPEKA, Kan. (AP) -Bloodied and partially blinded from an accident, Kenneth Meggison listened for sirens as he clutched a telephone in an empty house; using the sounds to guide rescuers...

Meggison had stumbled into the unlocked house and fallen asleep in a bed early Thursday after crawling away from his car, wrecked in a ravine.

When the 20-year-old Topeka man woke up several hours later, "Nobody had been there yet, so I decided I better get up and make the call myself," he said. But there was a major pro-

blem. "I didn't have any idea where I was," he said in a telephone interview with The Associated Press from his hospital bed Thursday night.

Authorities said the house was about a quarter-mile north of the accident site.

He called St. Francis Hospital and was patched through to the Shawnee County Sheriff's Department, which had found his empty, wrecked car about 5:30 a.m. While Meggison and the hospital stayed on the line. Sheriff Ed Esberger turned on the siren of his patrol car. and began a block-by-block search of a residential neighborhood near the accident. Deputy Bill Kilian walk-

ed up and down the streets. When the siren became louder, he'd tell us," Esberger said. "And when it got dimmer he told us."

Meggison also told authorities a "big dog was in the garage. He was barking all the time I was on the

"I guess they started pounding on the garage door. I said that was the house, and they came on in."

They found him sitting on the kitchen floor, clutching the phone.

Meggison was in satisfactory condition Thursday night with corneal abrasions in both eyes, cuts and bruises. said Rosalind Lewis, a nursing supervisor at St. Francis

Hospital. His eyes were burned by battery acid, oil ... or something," he said. The doctors said "the first layer of skin on the eyes was eaten away, but in a couple of days

it will grow back. Meggison said doctors told him he can expect to see normally again.

My vision is getting better," he said, but his eyes thurt so bad I can't open them for too long a period.'

Meggison said he believed the accident occurred when he fell asleep at the wheel

about 2 miles from his home. Esberger said Meggison's car left the road and became airborne as it plunged down a hill. The car sheared a utility pole nearly in half, overturned at least twice and landed upside down, the sheriff said.

"I remember crawling five or 10 feet, then I got up and started walking," Meggison said. "I think I had my hands over my eyes. I'd pry them open, look where I was going and take off.

### Melting chocolate

DEAR POLLY — Why does chocolate turn stiff and grainy when I'm melting it? Just as it's getting really liquid, suddenly starts hardening again. - O.R.

DEAR O.R. — Here we go again, talking about one of Polly's favorite subjects. As the melter of many an ounce of chocolate, I've found that the marvelous stuff can be a bit temperamental if you don't treat it with consideration for its subtle sensitivities. Chocolate will harden if any water gets into it. This includes mere droplets of steam from the water over which you're melting it. To guard against this problem, melt chocolate over hot, not boiling, water. Be sure your utensils — saucepan, spoon, etc. — are absolutely dry. A few drops of water on a spoon can ruin an entire batch of melted chocolate.

If the chocolate does begin to stiffen, mix in one tablespoon vegetable oil for every three ounces of chocolate. This should smooth the mixture out nicely. However, be sure you use vegetable oil, not butter, since butter contains water which would add to your problems rather than solve them.
