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Mother's death gives son chance to live

To paraphrase, greater love has no woman than she gives new life to her son.

Because a Hereford mother knew and understood that organ transplants represent life to many recipients, her 29-year-old son has a functioning kidney that was removed from the mother's body after her death last Tuesday.

Rose Lee Salinas was only 53 years old when she was stricken with an aneurysm Sunday evening. She was taken to an Amarillo hospital where the family learned there was no treatment to remedy her condition.

Her son, Michael, just last spring was placed on a list of the first five who would receive a

kidney transplant in a Dallas program. Tuesday morning, while his mother still was on life support, Salinas was told that a kidney was available for him in Dallas.

But, he was anemic and not considered a good candidate for the transplant. As the decision to put off the transplant for Salinas was being made, his mother died, at 11 a.m.

A woman whose life had been devoted to her own family and to handicapped persons, Ms. Salinas had provided the necessary instructions for removal of all her vital organs.

Her sister, Lorena Condarco of Hobbs, N.M., said Friday that the decision was made to transplant a kidney from the mother to the

son. "They decided that since she was donating, he should have it," said Mrs. Condarco.

At the time, no one knew if the compatibility necessary in transplants would be available. But, the family knew what Ms. Salinas would say.

"She'd say, 'Go for it,'" said her sister.

Michael Salinas and his cousin, Leticia Gomez of Grand Prairie, left for Dallas just hours after his mother died. Wednesday morning, tests were run and he was given blood transfusions to combat the anemia.

At 6 p.m., he went to surgery in Methodist Hospital in Dallas, where his mother's kidney was transplanted to him.

"At 11:30 that night, he was out of surgery and doing well," reported Mrs. Condarco.

Since there was no time to waste in the procedure leading toward transplant, Michael Salinas could not stay at home for his mother's funeral, held Friday morning.

By that time, his condition was progressing satisfactorily, said Mrs. Condarco, about the report from her daughter who accompanied Salinas to Dallas.

"My daughter called at 8:30 a.m. Friday and said Michael is doing terrific," she continued. "They expect to move him to a regular room, from ICU, Saturday."

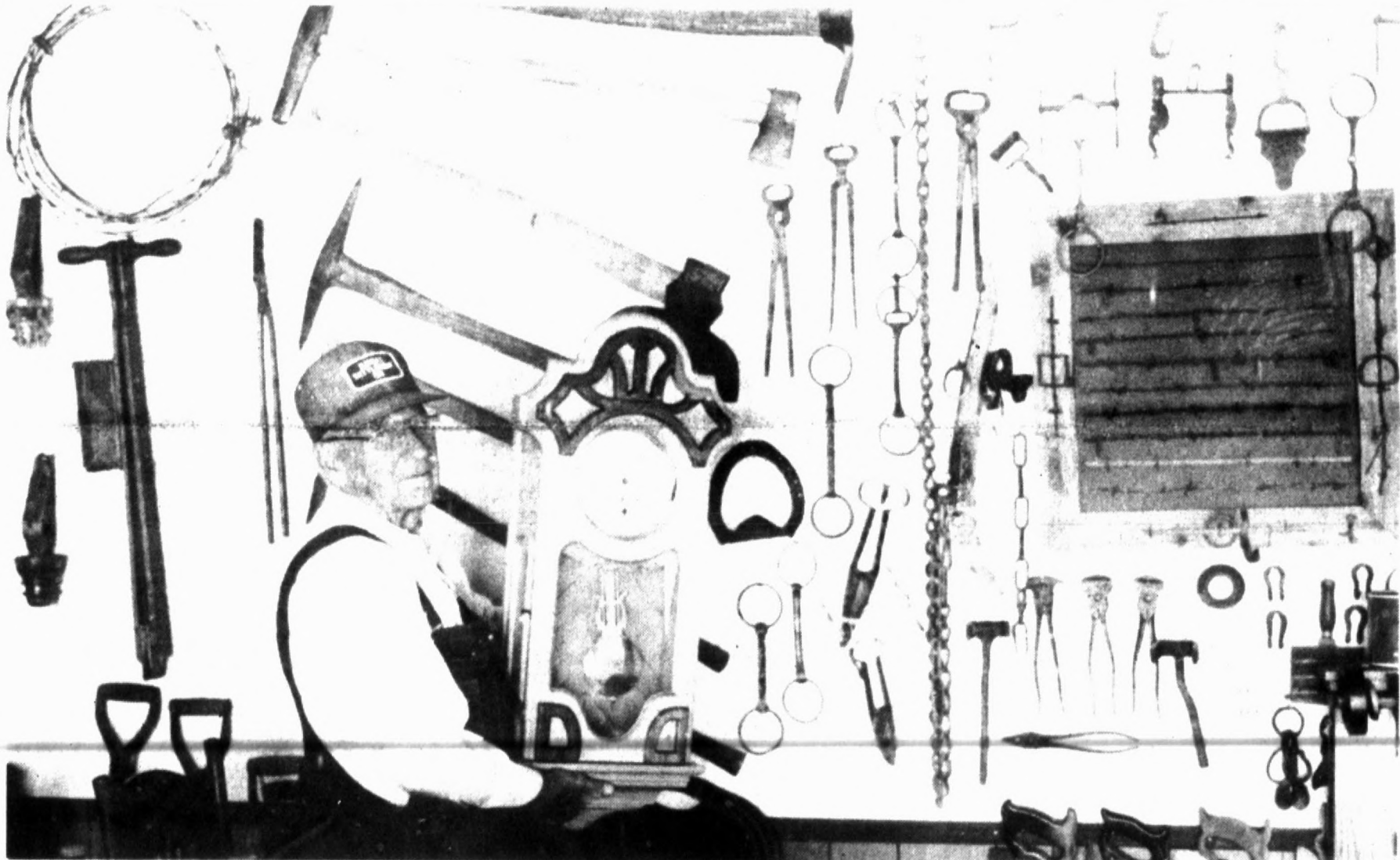

McBride recalls crafts, collection

Take a walk around A.E. McBride's property in South Hereford.

It sure doesn't look like a house in the middle of town.

In fact, it looks much more like a residence that would be found in the middle of the country.

There is an old well house, a pump attached to a large barrel, a large garden and several antique farm tools.

They are all part of McBride's collection.

Inside the well house is a compact workshop. That is natural for a man who worked much of his adult life as a cabinet maker and builder.

But it is inside the small nearby shed and in the house that the true purpose of McBride's workshop is known.

There, hanging from walls, standing in corners and sitting on shelves are literally dozens of wooden clocks that he has crafted over the last quarter-century.

"I started in 1967. The first clock I made is in the house. I've been making them ever since," he said. "It kind of gets in your blood."

Stand quietly in the shed for a moment and listen to the soft ticking of the seven-day wall clocks.

None of the clocks are set to the same time -- that becomes perfectly clear at the hour, when chimes sound out one after another in a melodious cacophony of time.

"Every time I build a clock, it's to use different wood," McBride explained.

"This one here is made of ironwood out of Mexico," he said

holding up a mantle clock. Another one -- dated March 1990 -- is crafted from elm wood.

"I dug a root out of a tree -- one of those old elm trees -- and I made this clock out of a root that had been under ground," he went on, handling each clock with the loving care that only a craftsman can have.

On another shelf stands a clock crafted from an old cedar fence post.

"I make it piece by piece," he said, only purchasing the numbers and works.

Although the 78-year-old McBride has only been making clocks for 26 years, he has been working with wood a lot longer than that.

"This is the first piece of woodwork I ever did," McBride said, holding up a small, open square frame with a round ball rolling around inside.

It was carved, he said, in March 1929, when he and his brother-in-law were snowed into the family home with only a path to the barn (where they would feed the chickens).

That brother-in-law vowed to make McBride a carpenter, but died before he could teach his prodigy.

Still, wood was in McBride's blood and he worked 20 years in the lumber business in Amarillo before changing careers.

"During the war, a fellow said, 'You reckon if I buy you some power tools, you could build me some doors and window screens?'" McBride recalled.

That was all it took to change from lumber sales to cabinetmaker.

He worked in Amarillo from 1940 until 1960, working for the same man (See MCBRIDE, Page 2A)

Garage full of history

A.E. McBride has been collecting antique tools and building clocks since 1967. Now, with age and health forcing a move to Amarillo, the retired cabinet maker and builder is forced to part with much of both collections, including many wall-

mounted clocks he has made over the years. The antique collection also includes walking and riding farm implements from the early part of the 20th Century and numerous examples of barbed wire.

This young woman, however, recognized her desire to achieve at a young age.

"As a child, I can remember watching pageants on television and admiring those girls. I always wanted to be in their position so receiving the title of Miss Hereford is like a childhood dream come true," said Dusty.

Dreams are not realized overnight and for Dusty, her success entailed long weeks of preparation.

"You have to spend hours practicing your talent, finding a hair style that will hold all night, and looking for the perfect dress. Maybe I sound like a wimp, but it really begins to wear you out," answered Dusty.

An eight-year piano player, Dusty's talent was particularly important to her. She performed Prelude in C Sharp by Rachmaninov.

"It was a difficult piece of music. Dee Anne Trotter was a tremendous help as my piano teacher," said Dusty.

The winner of the 1977 Miss Hereford title, Dee Anne Trotter also coached Dusty on walking, the interview and other specific areas of importance.

Despite the emphasis on appearance and poise, the three-minute

interview allowed Dusty to excel with her academic talents.

"Looking over newspapers and magazines is the best thing to do for current event questions. I was lucky. During my interview, I was asked about prison overcrowding, a hot topic for the state of Texas," she said.

A third year competitor, this teenager has had considerable experience with the formalities of pageantry.

"My first year I competed at the age of 15. I didn't place, but I did learn a lot about the process," Dusty said.

Her second year, Dusty placed as second runner-up.

"There's a lot of pressure and I had terrible butterflies in my stomach all day. I was so anxious for the last

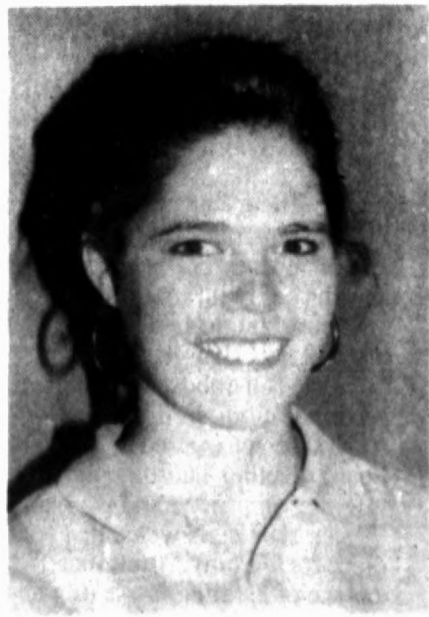
stage call," Dusty remarked.

Administration vows to push agenda more

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) - The White House is promising jittery state Democratic leaders it will be much more aggressive in promoting President Clinton's agenda and responding to criticism many of the party activists worry is ringing true to voters.

"We have things to learn - there is no doubt about that," White House political director Rahm Emanuel told the Association of State Democratic Chairs meeting Friday in New Mexico.

He took comfort, however, in recent Clinton congressional victories and a White House staff shakeup he said had given the administration some much-needed momentum.

"But by no means would anyone take the last two weeks as us being out of the woods," Emanuel said.

The shakeup includes Emanuel moving, effective July 6, from political director to the communications office, where he will lead a "rapid response" team designed to quickly counter any attacks on Clinton programs.

His current deputy, veteran

Democratic operative Joan Baggett, will take over as political director.

Many of the state Democratic leaders who came to the weekend meeting worried that the White House political operation was faltering said they had been reassured that Clinton's team had learned from its mistakes and was laying the groundwork for a rebound.

"It's like starting a business," said Minnesota Democratic Chairman Rick Stafford. "When you start a business from scratch there are going to be stops and starts."

As part of their effort to be better cheerleaders for the administration, the state Democratic leaders predicted Clinton would engineer the needed comeback.

"I've known Bill Clinton for so long and seen him go through so many trials and tribulations that I'm not worried at all," said James Brady, the Louisiana Democratic chairman.

The meeting in Albuquerque opened just hours after Vice President Al Gore broke a tie to get Clinton's economic program through the Senate.

until he decided to go solo.

For 10 years, he worked in Amarillo, then, since he had been building cabinets in Amarillo and driving them to Hereford, he decided in 1970 to move here permanently.

He then joined with his son and a friend and began building homes, a profession he kept until retiring several years ago.

With him on that move came an antique tool collection that had started when he had his own shop in Amarillo.

Around 1967, he had some old tools that he hung on the wall of his Amarillo shop.

"Some of my customers kept coming in and hanging tools on the wall," he said. Thus a collection was born.

Today that collection is relegated to McBride's garage.

Next month, it will be gone.

McBride is in the process of moving back to Amarillo with his wife, Pearl, of 13 years. Both have children in Amarillo and the city is more convenient to doctors and requires less driving.

So, the collection of tools -- as well as some of the clocks -- will be auctioned off on July 10.

Although McBride does not want to part with the collection, he realizes it is time.

Much of the collection was gathered by McBride and his first wife, Elsie, whom he married in 1940.

She died in 1979 and is buried here. "This stuff is just like parting with her," he said, but "I had to part with her," so feels he can part with the tools.

McBride and Elsie moved to the house on South Julian in 1975 when it was a "little, bitty two bedroom house" with a basement.

He built another bedroom and living room himself, then added a two-car garage.

Then, a number of years ago, McBride recalled, he had a conversation

with God.

"Seven years ago I told the Lord, I said, 'This is your house, your property. I can't afford the insurance. You're going to have to protect it. When you're ready to sell it, bring a buyer.'"

For seven years the house sat on the market.

Then, earlier this spring, a couple came with Realtor Marn Tyler to view the property.

"They came in the front door, came in, looked around a little," looked at the kitchen, bedroom and bathroom, then went outside.

As rain began falling, Tyler and the woman retreated to the car and McBride showed the man the rest of the property.

As the rains intensified, the man left. The group sat in the car for a while, then drove off.

McBride said he didn't think he'd hear any more from them, but "about 30 minutes (later), Marn Tyler came back out with a contract. I signed the contract" and the sale was complete.

Even though the deal has been closed and McBride no longer owns the property, he has mixed feelings about leaving.

"The 18 years I've spent on this place were the most enjoyable time I've spent in Hereford," he said sadly.

"Hereford's been good to me. I'm not all that enthused at all about moving back to Amarillo."

Still, McBride said, God told him that, "You're getting about to the end of your life now, so you have to get rid of everything you've got and start over."

So, the tools will be sold, the clocks will be packed up and moved to Amarillo and McBride will move his workshop into the garage of his new home in Amarillo, where can keep making his clocks -- and remembering the time he had here.

Dusty's parents, Roland and Sandra Saul, are particularly proud of her. "Both my parents are nervous wrecks during pageants," remarked Dusty. "They're glad to see this one is finally over."

The title of Miss Hereford includes numerous responsibilities. "I will speak to several local organizations and work with the Chamber of Commerce on several projects," the graduate said.

This win, however, does not mark the end of Dusty's pageant career. In August, she will compete in the Top

is more complex, even, than the transplant.

Since birth, Michael Salinas had health problems. Birth defects required extensive surgery, beginning at the early age of six months. Doctors said he probably wouldn't live more than year.

His mother nursed and nourished the boy and he proved the doctors wrong. She saw him finish Hereford High School. But both knew that he probably could never do physical work.

Three years ago, Michael Salinas' physical condition forced him to dialysis treatments, three times each week.

Mrs. Condarco said her sister told her that the dialysis was "killing" him because of the debilitating effects of the treatment.

Rose Lee Salinas had worked to provide for her son. She was employed for a while in the special education program in Hereford schools.

"She never finished high school but when she decided to get her GED, she passed it the first time -- without even studying," said Mrs. Condarco.

Recently, Mrs. Salinas had been an employment specialist with Hereford Satellite Center.

"She really liked working with handicapped people," said the sister.

Mrs. Salinas was a "giving woman," who wanted to help others. Her sister recalled that she had been a volunteer with Rape Crisis/Domestic Violence.

Last July 6, Mrs. Salinas suffered a stroke that left her disabled. The aneurysm discovered last Sunday, Mrs. Condarco believes, was the cause of the trouble a year ago.

"We don't know how long she had the aneurysm," said Mrs. Condarco.

In her instructions for the organ harvest, Mrs. Salinas did not specify that her son should benefit.

There was no hesitation by anyone in the family when the decision was made to transplant a kidney to Michael.

Mrs. Condarco and her daughter, Mrs. Gomez, are taking responsibility for further care of Salinas. And, it's a responsibility that they do not shirk.

"My sister and I were so close," said Mrs. Condarco. "He's my nephew, like my son, now."

Even though Michael Salinas had to miss his mother's funeral, the family is convinced that Rose Lee Salinas would have applauded the decision.

"That's what she would have wanted," said Mrs. Condarco.

Bishop notes first 10 years of diocese

LUBBOCK, Texas (AP) - Bishop Michael J. Sheehan evaluates his 10 years as a bishop of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Lubbock in changed attitudes more than in numbers.

"God has been so good to us as a church to allow us to make progress," Sheehan said. "I don't measure in terms of warm bodies, but in terms of the unity that has formed out of the diversity of the 62 entities that make up the diocese."

The new diocese was carved in 1983 from the Dioceses of Amarillo and San Angelo. The 25 counties that make up the Diocese of Lubbock cover 23,380 square miles, most of it sparsely populated.

The major changes have been limited funds and limited personnel, the bishop said.

Most recently, Sheehan was appointed by Pope John Paul II as temporary administrator of the

Archdiocese of Santa Fe when the archbishop resigned after allegations of abusive sexual behavior were made against him.

Mercy Sister Elena Gonzalez, now chancellor and moderator of the curia for the Diocese of Lubbock, returned to West Texas and the new diocese in 1986, after being away several years on other assignments.

When she returned in 1986, Sister Gonzalez said she noted a new sense of unity among Catholics on the South Plains.

"The people feel more connected to their bishop; whereas before, I had felt there was a distance because the southern part of the Amarillo Diocese felt so far away."

When Sheehan was ordained as bishop and installed as head of the diocese, he chose as his official motto "Love One Another Constantly."

It is a theme that he has practiced as well as preached, according to many of his associates. He appears to wear the robes of authority lightly

but firmly as he goes about the many tasks of the office. A document he wrote for the diocese on evangelism has garnered national attention within the church.

The document, a 1985 pastoral letter titled "A New Way of Acting," urged parishioners to demonstrate a more positive attitude in their churches and to be more committed to sharing their faith with the unchurched and with marginal Catholics.

The creation of the diocese "has given us a sense of being, of pride in who we are as a Catholic Church," Sister Gonzalez said. "So many of our rural areas can so easily identify with our bishop because they see him at least once a year when he goes to the parishes for confirmation."

She also sees the bishop's language skills - his fluency in Spanish - as an important part of the new sense of unity in the diocese. The South Plains Catholic, the diocesan

monthly newspaper, also is an important contributor to diocesan unity, she said. It has articles in English and Spanish.

Edited by Deacon Leroy Behnke and associate editor Pat Behnke, the diocesan newspaper has produced a monumental, 82-page anniversary edition that contains the history of Catholics on the South Plains.

Sheehan is an adroit and able administrator, said Sister Gonzalez, describing him as "not demanding, but exacting. If he has a weakness, it is trying to be all things to all people - that can be good, but it can also be not good," she said, adding, "I'm not saying anything I haven't said to him."

Her own skills as an administrator were recognized by the bishop when he appointed her chancellor in 1986. She is one of the first women ever appointed to a position of such prominence in the diocesan structure of the Catholic church.

The ministries closest to the bishop's heart are youth and jail ministry, she said, noting that in December he held the first Catholic Mass at Lubbock County Jail.

Several major events have brought outside attention to the fledgling diocese - events both negative and positive.

"I have a whole bunch of things I get excited about," Sheehan said, naming the celebration of the 500th Anniversary of evangelization in the Americas, observed by the diocese in December 1991. The celebration was marked with a procession of about 3,000 Catholics from St. Joseph's Catholic church to the Municipal

Auditorium for a service of commitment.

"One of the beautiful things has been the ordination of the men to the priesthood, one in January last year and two on June 12 (today)."

In 1988, extensive local and national media attention centered on Lubbock's St. John Neumann Parish when reports circulated that certain parishioners were receiving special messages from the Virgin Mary.

His most painful experience in the 10 years he has been bishop was the charge in December 1992 that a diocesan priest, the late Rev. Rodney Howell, had some years earlier been involved in sexual abuse of minors.

Sister Gonzalez said the down side of being constituted into a diocese lies in the heavy responsibility that is entailed.

"We feel more responsible in that our numbers of priests, sisters and deacons have decreased, and we realize that being a small diocese, that's part of the negative," she said.

The hard work of serving the 63 parishes and missions of the diocese falls on 48 priests, 25 deacons and 43 women religious. Three of the 48 priests are serving outside the diocese and two are in retirement, she said.

Shrinking numbers of clergy in the diocese are part of a nationwide problem, she acknowledged, but "we feel it more in being a smaller diocese - the sense of responsibility is greater."

As to the future of the diocese and its bishop, a good bit of interest centers on whether the pope might make him an archbishop and assign him to the Archdiocese of Santa Fe.

"I don't know whether he will be named archbishop of Santa Fe, but I would think he is destined to be named to a larger diocese," said Sister Gonzalez.

As for the diocese, "We have information on some new diocesan candidates that will help the ministry," she said.

New parish life coordinators also have been selected. "Men and women who will help take leadership in the parishes, especially in the rural parishes, where it is harder to have a priest on a daily basis," she said.

Compound may beat cancers

DALLAS (AP) -- A Nobel Prize winning Dallas researcher says an experimental compound may disarm a protein linked to most of colon and pancreatic cancer.

Dr. Joseph Goldstein, co-author of a study to be released today, said that if successful, the drug or one of its successors could change the way cancer is treated.

The other co-authors are Dr. Michael Brown of UT Southwestern and Dr. Guy James, a postdoctoral fellow at the medical school.

In 1985, Dr. Goldstein and Dr. Brown won the Nobel Prize for research on cholesterol metabolism.

He said most current cancer medications are toxic drugs that hunt for all rapidly dividing cells, even ones that have nothing to do with cancer. They are notorious for their side effects.

The new drug, in experiments with cell cultures, only halted the growth of cancer cells and left normal cells intact, he said.

"It's a whole new class of drugs," Dr. Goldstein, said.

The new drug will be described in today's issue of the journal "Science"

in a paper written by the Dallas scientists and researchers from Genentech Inc. a biotechnology firm based in South San Francisco, Calif.

Patients won't be able to use the drug for years even if proven effective in humans. New drugs must first be tested in animals. Then the drugs are gradually checked for safety and effectiveness in people before being submitted to the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for government approval.

But, the new compound still excites cancer researchers.

"The potential significance is considerable," said Dr. Douglas

Lowy, chief of cellular oncology at the National Cancer Institute.

The drug--a newly designed molecule--targets a protein that scientists call Ras. It is thought to promote at least one-fifth of all cancers. The mutant form of Ras is made by an oncogene, which contains the instructions for making the protein. Oncogenes, which are essentially normal genes gone amok, trigger uncontrollable cell division. Scientists have searched for a way to short circuit that process.

The new study clears that first hurdle.

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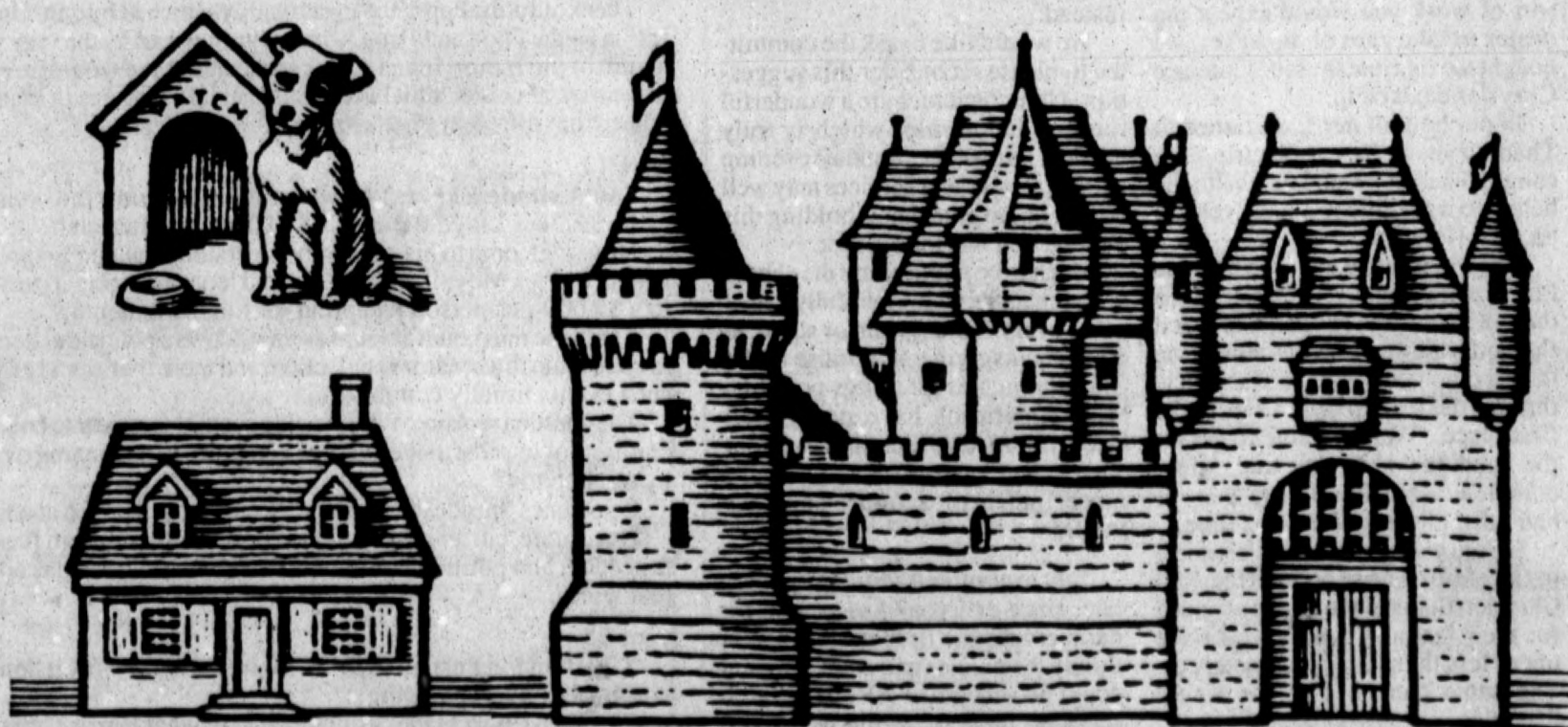

Since we were out of town this week attending a state press convention, we looked back at some old columns and picked out a tale we thought readers might find of interest. The television people have re-runs all summer long, so we figure a reprint will work, too.

Build prisons or reform education?

"Let us reform our schools and we shall find little reform needed in our prisons."--John Ruskin, 1819-1900.

The answer to funding public education in Texas is very simple: pass a law making it a felony to be between 6 and 18 years of age. Then we can send all of our school children to jail where the state will spend \$35,000 a year to help them instead of a paltry \$2,300. That way, every child could grow up having his own teacher. Talk about test scores going up!

In November, voters will be asked to pass a \$1 billion prison bond issue to increase capacity by 20,000 beds (\$50,000 per bed, not counting interest which will probably double or triple the cost). Of course, if we borrow the money--instead of appropriating the needed amount--we are spending tomorrow's tax dollars and there are two distinct benefits:

1. The politicians of today can be heroes in their hometowns by bragging that they have prisons in 88 locations across the state.

2. Politicians can write articles and tell the world they did a great job of increasing spending by only 12.9 percent (\$8 billion) this biennium after an increase the previous two-year cycle of 32.4 percent (\$15.5 billion) and did not have to raise taxes. Of course, at the same time, it was necessary for the Legislature to NOT fund even enough money for the growth of the student population of the non-voting school children of Texas. I believe all of this falls under the heading of false economy.

When the governor of Texas increases her staff from some 185 persons to 345, and when state employees increase during her regime by 34,000 through the first quarter of this year, there is going to be a day of reckoning and it is steamrolling down the track toward the taxpayers of Texas.

One top of all this frivolous activity, let me now note and all of us long remember that \$1 billion was budgeted for the schools when a minimum of \$1.2 billion was needed for the growth in enrollment alone.

In addition, after the voters rejected Robin Hood by some 60 percent to 40 percent--even after being threatened with school closure, consolidation and a state income tax--the Legislature then passed a law and presented to the courts a solution which arguably is the same thing as Robin Hood.

Where is the threat to our schools? Our Legislature has attempted to legislate the school children's permanent school fund to make investment decisions that could cost the students \$1.7 billion over the next 10 years, so the politicians will not have to fulfill their financial responsibilities for this biennium.

What is the answer? At some point, we need our elected representatives to do what you and I do at home. They need to say: "This is a good idea, but we cannot afford it." We, as taxpayers, cannot afford all of these good ideas, either.

Again, local school boards will have to raise local taxes because of state legislative action. When, are we as taxpayers, going to yell "calf rope?"

Committee are asking churches to cancel their Sunday evening services and have picnics in Veterans Park instead.

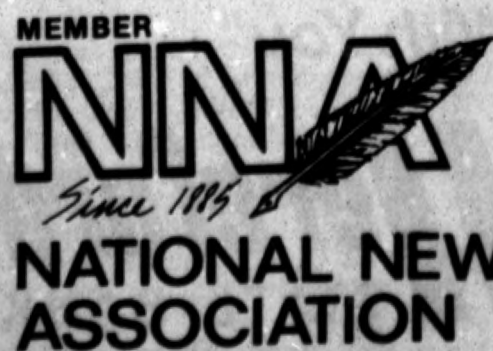

High-ranking defector was actually a spy

WASHINGTON (AP) - On April 6, 1953, FBI Director J. Edgar Hoover went ballistic. Life Magazine, which hit the stands that day, revealed that a former general in the Soviet secret service had been living undetected virtually under Hoover's nose for almost 15 years.

Through subsequent questioning by the FBI, CIA and Congress, Gen. Alexander Orlov came to be portrayed as the highest-ranking Soviet ever to defect to the United States. He also came to symbolize staunch anti-Communist fervor, as reflected in a eulogy in the Congressio-

nal Record upon his death in 1973. Now, newly opened KGB files reveal that Orlov was neither defector nor anti-Communist. In their book "Deadly Illusions," British and Russian authors use the Soviet files to show that Orlov remained a dedicated Communist to his death, although he feared and hated Joseph Stalin's regime.

In fact, Orlov decided to expose Stalin's brutality in a serialized book published by Life, knowingly risking exposure to the FBI, co-author Oleg Tsarev said in an interview.

The files also show that rather than defecting to the United States, Orlov fled here fearing Stalin would kill

him, but never revealed the important secrets he knew so as not to betray the Soviet revolution and the spies he had recruited.

FBI files, obtained under the Freedom of Information Act, confirmed to authors John Costello and Tsarev the authenticity and basic thrust of some KGB documents. And Costello, a respected author and lecturer on espionage history, says former U.S. intelligence officials have privately confirmed the book's basic facts.

The FBI and KGB files also show that Orlov never revealed to Americans the extent of his espionage work in Europe, and never tipped them to the existence of Kim Philby and other notorious British spies who belonged to a spy ring he ran in the 1930s before he fled.

Costello and Tsarev, a former KGB agent, were given access to the Soviet files under an agreement between Crown Books and the successor of the KGB, the Russian Foreign Intelligence Service.

Their is the first of five books planned under the 1992 agreement. "This book begins to lay the foundation for serious Cold War intelligence history," said Timothy Naftali, an intelligence historian at Harvard University's John N. Olin Institute.

Until now, histories of the Cold War could only rely on documents made available in the West, said Naftali, who under the Crown agreement will be given access to KGB files for an upcoming book on the 1962 Cuban missile crisis and the effect of U.S. and Soviet intelligence on those tense days.

The Russian decision to selectively open intelligence files appears to have been prompted both by a need for money and a desire to have the KGB go down in history as a legitimate espionage agency rather than as a tool for internal repression of dissent.

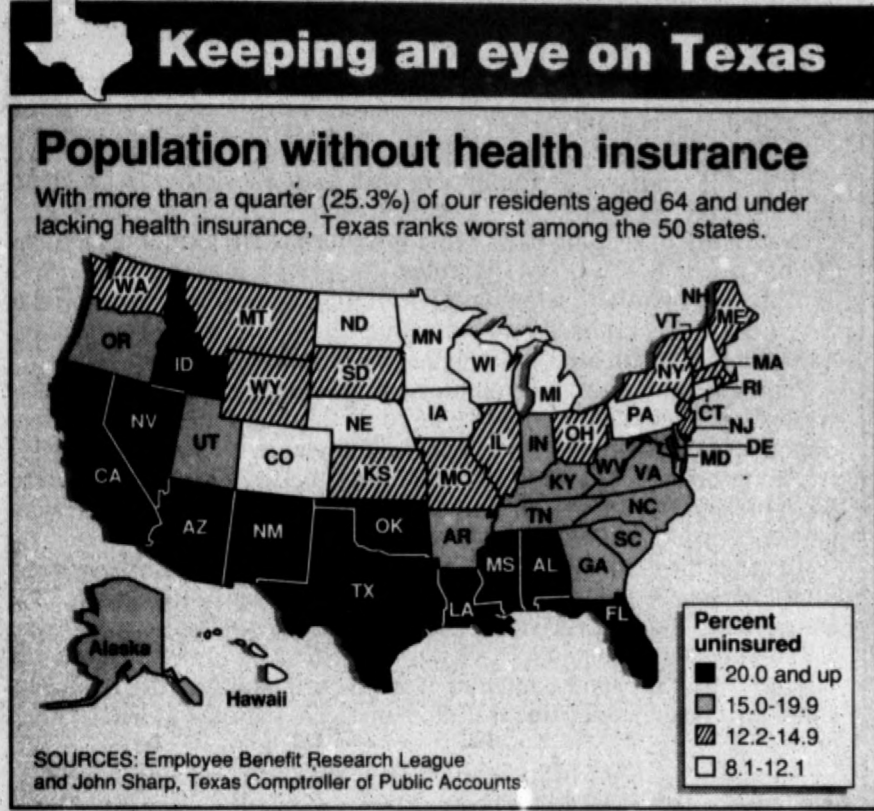
Costello and Tsarev believe that in the process, the Russian openness puts the CIA and the British intelligence service to shame.

History, Costello noted in an interview, is usually written by the victors. Yet the Russians, who essentially lost the Cold War, are now shaping some of that definitive history by opening their files, albeit selectively, he said.

The CIA has promised to

declassify documents of historic interest and also has released information requested in FOIA applications. But both processes take years, and much material is still blacked out.

The British are even stricter, arguing that one disclosure leads to another and then to a slippery slope of revelations that would compromise intelligence and diplomatic operations.



Democracy has roots stretching to Greece

WASHINGTON (AP) - If you lived in Athens in 490 B.C., it really didn't pay to be unpopular. A majority of your fellow citizens had the right to banish you from town for 10 years simply by inscribing your name on terra cotta ballots.

Ostracism by majority vote is one element of the world's first democracy that didn't make it into later copies. But other aspects of the Athenian legacy can still be seen in America in everything from jury trials to a bicameral legislature.

Now the National Archives is hosting an exhibition of artifacts to mark the birth of democracy in Athens 2,500 years ago. It's on display - fittingly enough - in view of the vault that holds the Declaration of Independence, the Bill of Rights and the Constitution.

The exhibit, which opened Tuesday, was organized by the archives, the Greek government and the American School of Classical Studies at Athens, which conducts archaeological digs.

Most of the items were excavated from the ancient Athenian agora - or marketplace - where the government buildings were located.

They include a selection of the terra cotta ballots - called ostraka - and dining crockery from the Tholos, a building that housed the executive committee that presided over the legislature.

Demokratia, or power of the people, came to the city-state of Athens in 508 B.C. when the populace rebelled against the ruling aristocratic families and the occupying Spartan army.

A popular ruler, Kleisthenes, broke up the old power bases by dividing

all Athenians into tribes - each of which included people from all over Attica, the state surrounding Athens.

He set up a legislature that included the ekklesia, or assembly, where all citizens could come; and the boule, or senate, made up of 50 representatives from each of the tribes.

Athenian democracy often was crowded and rowdy. Thousands attended assembly meetings, and at least 200 jurors served on each jury. Socrates was condemned to death in 399 B.C. by a jury of 500.

But the system had strict limits too. On display is a reconstructed ancient water clock - called a klepsydra - used to keep arguments in court down to about six minutes. Water would flow out of a hole in one vessel and into another vessel below. Time was up when the last trickle had stopped.

"The really good speakers watched the flow carefully, and when they saw it get down to a trickle they neatly wrapped up their remarks," said Diana Buitron-Oliver, the curator of the exhibit.

Water clocks weren't used at the assembly, which was regularly attended by at least 6,000 citizens. And anyone who showed up had the right to stand up and give a speech. But there were limits there too. If the speakers got boring, they were sure to be shouted down by the crowd.

Then there was Themistokles, a 5th-century politician who apparently fell victim to partisan politics Athens-style. Archaeologists excavated a group of 190 ostraka bearing the name Themistokles. Handwriting analysis revealed that 14 people had written all 190 ballots to ostracize the politician.

YOUR EYES

"IN HARNESS"

The classic example, in books and paintings, of working in harmony is often two oxen yoked together to the same harness. There's really a better example closer to hand: your eyes.

Then the result may be double vision, a concept the brain rejects. Either to aim at the same object at the same time or, in time, the brain will block out the image seen by one of the eyes. In that case, depth perception is lost.

This problem can be corrected. After careful examination, your optometrist may recommend corrective lenses and/or vision training. Sometimes a prism is added to corrective lenses to alter the image that the eye sees. If vision training is advised, the exercises are usually started in the optometrist's office and continue at home.

Hot O's move closer to AL East lead

How about them O's!
The Baltimore Orioles, closer to the back than the front in the AL East race when the month began, moved within four games of the front-running Detroit Tigers with another improbable victory Friday night.

This time, a leadoff double was all the Orioles needed as New York Yankees relievers Steve Howe and John Habyan contributed three walks to force home the winning run as Baltimore rallied from a 6-0 deficit and eventually won 7-6 in 10 innings.

The victory was Baltimore's fifth in a row, 10th straight at home and 18th in 21 games overall. The O's, 10 games out on June 1 at 21-29, are 39-33 now and gaining fast on the Tigers, Blue Jays and Yankees.

"I don't think there's anything magical to it," manager Johnny Oates said. "The way we've been playing the past three weeks, you've got to believe that we've got a pretty good baseball team here."

Pinch hitter Damon Buford opened the 10th with a double against Howe (2-3), and Harold Reynolds was

intentionally walked. After Mark McLemore sacrificed, the Yankees walked Cal Ripken to load the bases.

Habyan relieved and struck out Mike Devereaux, but the former Oriole walked Chris Hoiles on four pitches.

"I've never been involved in two comebacks this close together," said McLemore, who hit an RBI triple and scored the tying run on a passed ball in the ninth. "We've been lucky, yeah, but most of all we're just playing good baseball right now."

Elsewhere in the AL, Minnesota beat California 8-5; Boston pounded Detroit 8-2; Milwaukee rallied past Toronto 6-5; Cleveland beat Kansas City 6-1; and Seattle edged Chicago 3-2. The Oakland A's and Texas Rangers were rained out.

Twins 8, Angels 5
Kirby Puckett ended the Twins' nine-game losing streak almost by himself. The center fielder drove in four runs with three hits - including a homer - and made a running catch to save two runs as Minnesota beat visiting California.

"Whatever it took, we just needed

to win," he said.

Scott Erickson (4-8) won for the second time since May 14 despite allowing 10 singles and four runs in six-plus innings. Rick Aguilera got his 20th save.

Russ Springer (0-2) was pounded for seven runs, six in a second-inning outburst highlighted by Puckett's 411-foot, three-run homer, his 10th.

Red Sox 8, Tigers 2

Billy Hatcher homered and drove in four runs, and Boston stretched its winning streak to four while handing Detroit its season-high fourth straight loss. David Wells (9-2) was beaten for the first time in his last 10 starts.

Hatcher accounted for Boston's first three runs with a two-run homer, his fourth, and a run-scoring double. He added an RBI single to cap Boston's five-run rally that broke open a 3-2 game in the home half of the eighth.

Danny Darwin (6-7) and Greg Harris combined to hold the Tigers to six hits, with Harris working the last two innings for his second save.

Brewers 6, Blue Jays 5

Dickie Thon spoiled Paul Molitor's return to County Stadium by hitting an RBI single with two outs in the ninth inning to lift Milwaukee over Toronto.

The Brewers scored four times in the eighth to tie it at 5-all, Greg Vaughn driving home two runs with a single and the other two coming home on bases-loaded walks. Milwaukee won it with a two-out rally against Danny Cox (5-3).

Darryl Hamilton doubled and Vaughn walked before Thon lined a 3-2 pitch over shortstop, making a

winner of Mike Fetters (1-0).

Molitor, who played 15 years with the Brewers before signing as a free agent with the Blue Jays, received a minute-long ovation on his first at-bat and delivered a run-scoring single, delighting the crowd of 39,308.

Indians 6, Royals 1

Paul Sorrento greeted reliever Tom Gordon with his first career grand slam in the eighth inning as Cleveland won for the fourth time in five games and extended Mark Gubicza's losing streak to eight games, dating to June 19, 1992.

Gubicza (0-6) loaded the bases in the eighth on a single and two walks before Gordon came on to face Sorrento. The homer was Sorrento's 13th of the season and the loss was the visiting Royals' ninth in 14 games.

Four Cleveland pitchers limited Kansas City to four hits, with reliever Dennis Cook (4-4) earning the victory for two scoreless innings.

Mariners 3, White Sox 2

Ken Griffey Jr. homered for the sixth time in six games and extended his hitting streak to 12 games for Seattle, which has won nine of its last 13 to move within 2 1/2 games of first place Chicago in the AL West.

Griffey, 21 for 46 (.456) during his streak, hit his 19th homer in the first against Wilson Alvarez (7-3) after Rich Amaral's infield hit. Mike Blowers added a solo shot, his fourth, in the fifth inning.

Tim Leary (6-3) won his third straight start with help from Norm Charlton, who got his 14th save. Chicago's only runs came on Steve Sax's first homer and Frank Thomas' 15th. Thomas extended his hitting streak to 15 games.

Unseeded Martin retires Ivanisevic

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) - Unseeded American Todd Martin, in the biggest victory of his career and the biggest surprise so far at Wimbledon, ousted last year's runner-up, Goran Ivanisevic, in a third-round upset today.

Ivanisevic, the No. 5 seed, fell apart at the end of his third consecutive five-set match, double-faulting on the second match point to give Martin a startling 2-6, 7-6 (7-3), 6-7 (7-4), 7-5, 6-0 victory. It was the 15th double fault for the Croatian, who also received two warnings for outbursts of temper.

Martin, 22, lost in the second round here last year, his only previous Wimbledon appearance.

Both No. 2 seeds advanced to the fourth round, Martina Navratilova with another rout and Stefan Edberg with a sloppy victory in which he lost his serve six times.

Navratilova, keeping pace with top-seeded Steffi Graf, crushed Pat Hy of Canada 6-1, 6-0 in 41 minutes.

Edberg, a two-time champion, appeared clumsy at times, but survived 6-4, 7-5, 6-3 in part because British longshot Chris Wilkinson, ranked 143rd in the world, also was plagued by mistakes.

Navratilova has dropped eight games in the her first three matches, while Graf, seeking her fifth title, lost only three and shut out two of her opponents. They are odds-on favorites to meet in the final on July 3.

"Every match I've been playing a little better," said Navratilova, 36, who is seeking her 10th Wimbledon singles title. She said she was particularly pleased with her serve.

In other third-round matches today, No. 13 seed Wayne Ferreira of South Africa advanced over Henrik Holm of Sweden 6-4, 6-3, 7-6 (7-2) and unseeded Natalia Zvereva of Belarus beat Sabine Appelmans of Belgium 6-3, 6-4.

Graf's fourth-round opponent Monday will be Meredith McGrath, and it will be an achievement if the American manages to win a game or two.

A qualifier ranked 148th in the world, McGrath has slipped quietly into the round of 16, by far the best performance of a three-year pro career. But the anonymity ends with her next match, when the 22-year-old from Midland, Mich., has the dubious honor of facing Steffi Graf.

The top-seeded German, pursuing her fifth Wimbledon title, has dominated her three foes, shutting out two of them, 6-0, 6-0, and losing only three games in all.

Met have yet to win two straight games

The New York Mets have a lot in common with the 1907 St. Louis Cardinals.

They're both dreadful teams who made a lot of errors. The current miserable Mets and Cardinals, of 87 years ago, also each went 61 consecutive games without winning two in a row.

Erik Pappas drove in three runs for St. Louis, two in a five-run seventh inning, as St. Louis rallied to beat New York and Bret Saberhagen (3-7) at Shea Stadium, 8-5, Friday night. Saberhagen is 6-12 in 1 1/2 seasons with New York.

"Obviously, we need the whole team to step up, but I'll take bits and pieces," Mets manager Dallas Green said. "We haven't even had that. Tonight there was a total lack of execution of fundamentals. We had a top flight pitcher who couldn't get the big outs."

New York last won two games in a row on April 16-17 at Cincinnati. The all-time record for consecutive games without winning two straight is 80 by the Philadelphia Athletics in 1915.

Saberhagen lost his fourth straight decision. Reliever Omar Olivares (2-2) was the winner.

Giants 7, Rockies 2

Willie McGee drove in three runs and Mike Benjamin hit a two-run homer, sparking San Francisco past Colorado at Candlestick Park. The Giants, who have won nine of their last 10 games, scored all their runs in the first four innings.

Marlins 3, Expos 1

Newcomers Gary Sheffield and rookie Darrell Whitmore provided an immediate boost in their first game with Florida, contributing to all the

scoring in a victory over Montreal at Joe Robbie Stadium.

Jack Armstrong (5-8) took a one-hitter into the eighth inning, and Bryan Harvey pitched the final two innings for his 22nd save.

Whitmore - batting third - tripled home a run in his first major-league at-bat, then scored on cleanup hitter Sheffield's single off Ken Hill (6-2).

Braves 8, Astros 2

Steve Avery (9-2) pitched six strong innings to run his winning streak to eight straight games and Atlanta capitalized on three Houston errors in a five-run third inning at Fulton County Stadium. Avery hasn't lost since April 22 and the Braves haven't lost in the left-hander's last 11 starts.

Pete Harnisch (6-5) lost his third decision in a row.

Cubs 8, Dodgers 5 (10th innings)

Rick Wilkins' three-run homer highlighted a four-run 10th inning as Chicago beat Los Angeles at Dodger Stadium. The Dodgers, who have lost four straight games, made two costly errors in the inning to make a loser of Jim Gott (2-5).

Phillies 8, Pirates 6

Ruben Amaro hit a go-ahead two-run homer in the eighth for his fourth straight hit, helping Philadelphia rally from four runs down to beat Pittsburgh at Three Rivers Stadium. The Phillies, losers of 18 of their previous 21 in Pittsburgh, scored twice in the seventh and three times in the eighth after trailing 4-0 and 6-3.

Reds 6, Padres 2

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Remember Us Again Next Year

America's national pastime gains fans in Italy

EDITOR'S NOTE - American GIs of World War II left it behind on the beaches of Anzio: "il giuoco Americano." Now baseball - score an assist by Joe DiMaggio - has swept the country, Italian style. It's OK to call the umpire "cieco come un pipistrello," blind as a bat. But watch those hand signals.

ROME (AP) - The outlook wasn't brilliant for the Roma nine that day; the score stood 8 to 7 with but eight innings left to play.

Or was it 9 to 8? Or maybe 7 to 6? The scoreboard recording the runs for the "ospiti," the guests, and the "locale," the home team, couldn't make up its mind. Anguished shouts from the outfielders and the bleacherites only added to the confusion.

The Rome nine was on the verge of overhauling visiting Bologna when, with a mighty bloop of his aluminum bat, Darryl Brinkley, who had a tryout with the Cincinnati Reds before breaking his arm, lined a double off the Toshiba sign in right center. But when the dust had cleared, it seemed he had over-slid second base and been cut down by a clothesline peg from Jeff Schulz, who patrolled the outer pastures of Kansas City and Pittsburgh before joining Bologna.

"Eliminato!" - Out, came a feminine cry from il primo arbitro, the head umpire, hovering near first, although her husband, umpiring on third, already had spread his hands palms downward in the safe sign.

"Un ladro!" "Cieco come un pipistrello!" cried the rabid Rome fans - Thief! Blind as a bat!

"Arachidi!, Olive!, Ciecic!" - peanuts, olives, yellow beans, cried the handlebar-mustachioed vendor, moving through the stands with what appeared to be a purple Easter basket cradled in his arm and a tank of Gatorade lashed to his back.

Although Security Service, as the Class A-1 Rome team is officially known from the sponsor's name emblazoned on their pinstripes, eventually lost, it was a splendid home opener on the playing fields of Acqua Acetosa, which means vinegary water.

Joe DiMaggio, on a sentimental journey to his fisherman father's home island of Isola della Femina, off Sicily, had tossed out the first ball. Then Jolting Joe sat in the dugout, which offered all the amenities of the nearby catacombs - not even a water cooler - signing autographs and reminding the adoring paisans that there is a street in Palermo, Via DiMaggio, named for a distant cugino, cousin, who had once been mayor.

Joe became briefly ill the next day (some say he got sick to his stomach at the sight of aluminum bats) and curtailed his trip, but sports writers from Genoa to the toe of the boot acknowledged his contributions to Italian baseball. His book "Baseball for Everyone," printed in Italian in Milan, for years was the bible for kids taking up il giuoco Americano, the American sport.

Exactly 40 years ago, Joe showed up in Rome with a planeload of bats, balls and gloves to encourage the game which really got started here during World War II when Gen. Mark Clark's Fifth Army landed at Anzio, Nettuno and Salerno.

Giulio Glorioso, a legend in Italian baseball who captained the first national all-star team and was his league's most valuable player, was 13 years old when the GIs laid out a diamond in an Italian navy compound on the banks of the Tiber.

"We kids were fascinated by the hitting and sliding," Giulio recalled over a cappuccino one morning in Rome. "Outfielders would leave their gloves on the grass when their turn came at bat, and we'd run out and grab them. We got started with stolen equipment."

In Naples, where street urchins could hop on a moving jeep and unbolt the spare tire before an M.P. could blast the whistle at the end of his lanyard, chest protectors, batting cages and whole bat racks would disappear. Italian fans still joke that when a Neapolitan steals second base, "it's gone."

"Actually," Giulio pointed out, "baseball had a brief tryout when the American Expeditionary Forces arrived in northern Italy in World War I, but it didn't last." He believes the renaissance inspired by the Allied landings south of Rome took root because of the organizing talents of Prof. Guido Graziani, a YMCA director with a degree in physical education at Springfield College (Mass.) and the patronage of Prince Stefano Borghese.

Borghese, of the noble Italian family that contributed four popes to the church and the Villa Borghese to Rome, with its magnificent art collection and formal gardens, fell in love with the game. He first saw it played by GIs encamped on his Nettuno estate just after the beachhead was secured. He served as its mentor and ambassador until his death in the late '70s.

The bloody road to Rome provided Giulio with one of his first baseball heroes, Lou Brissie, a southpaw with the Cleveland Indians and Philadelphia Athletics who was the only survivor of his platoon in the bitter battle for Monte Cassino. An exploding shell shattered his left leg. The doctors wanted to amputate, but he refused and survived to pitch again.

After the GIs went home, Italian teams beefed up their lineups with Marine guards from the embassy, college players on summer vacation and seminarians from the North American College on the Janiculum Hill.

Now batting for Rome: Paul Marcinkus, a 6-foot-3, 230-pound slugger from Cicero, Ill. Marcinkus went on to become an archbishop, the

director of the Vatican Bank and the advance organizer for papal trips outside Rome until the Vatican banking scandals ended his rise in the Curia.

Bulldozer base running earned Marcinkus the nickname that stuck with him all his priestly life, "il gorilla." Aldo Notari, who played second base for Parma in those days, remembers him as "a fierce competitor who swung a big home run bat."

Aldo, a retired computer company director, now serves as president of both the Italian baseball federation and the Confederation of European Baseball, as well as vice president of the International Baseball Association. He has just returned from helping organize leagues in Russia, Romania, Bulgaria, Belarus and the Ukraine.

"In Europe, 30 countries now play baseball," Aldo reports. "Twenty years ago there were only 11. The boom resulted from baseball's acceptance as an Olympic sport. Before Barcelona, in 1992, it was a demonstration sport at the Los Angeles Olympics, thanks to Peter O'Malley of the Los Angeles Dodgers who has given us so much help and encouragement."

Italy leads the way with 10 teams each in Class A1 and 2, which they boast is the equivalent of triple-A ball in America, 24 teams in class B, 85 in Class C and a booming Little League program that now allows up to three girls on a team.

"Nothing to do with feminism," explains Giulio, "it's just that in some places not enough boys show up."

Parma, with three Class A teams playing in three arc-lighted stadiums, is the capital of European baseball; Nettuno, where the game made its first beachhead, is its Cooperstown. Aldo presides over the Parma Angels, named for the golden statue atop the 11th-century cathedral, but listed in the standings under the sponsor's name, Banco di Parma.

"They won the European championship 10 times," Giulio proudly points out. "No other team in any sport in Europe has won as many cups."

Baseball, Italian style, presents a "bella figura," a beguiling image of raucous fun and fury that would have appealed to Ty Cobb, Babe Ruth, Dizzy Dean and other idols of baseball's rowdier past.

The brush-back pitch, with homage to Brooklyn's Sal "The Barber" Maglie, who was famous for his close shaves and sometimes taking a little off the top, is frequently employed. The spitball, sometimes betrayed by a hint of garlic, is less common.

Games are played Saturday and Sunday under the lights on grass. "Moscow," says Aldo, "boasts the only Astroturf diamond in Europe, a gift from the Japanese."

Since most players have other jobs, teams practice on weekday evenings.

The native gift for talking with the hands adds unstated nuances to the dialogue between dugouts and the

breezy banter of the basepaths. By bunching the fingers together or karate-chopping an imaginary mosquito from the crook of the elbow, a third-base coach can convey imprecations that would have got Leo "The Lip" Durocher banned for life.

"You must be careful, however," warns Sal Varriale, who coaches at first base for both the Angels and the national all-star team. "Umpires speak the same language. We warn American players when they flash the sign for two outs not to raise the index finger and the pinky. That's the cornuto, the horns, the worst insult you can give. It means your wife is playing around, and can get you kicked out of a game."

Born and raised in New York, Varriale arrived in Parma in 1972 in answer to an ad for baseball players in an Italian-American newspaper. He hit 10 home runs in his first 15 games and never went back, except for a brief tryout with the Atlanta Braves.

Class-A teams are allowed two "foreigners," usually a pitcher and a long ball hitter with major league experience.

Lenny Randle sought consolation in Italian ball for the troubles he brought on himself by punching out Texas Rangers manager Frank Lucchesi.

Italy's top pitcher is Parma's Mike Kinnunen, late of the Baltimore Orioles.

Some teams have Cuban and Nicaraguan managers, who communicate in Italian baseball's basic English of "ball, strike, bunt, hit-and-run, etc." and, of course, the multilingual hand talk. Foreign players are not eligible for the national all-star team but can play in the European club championships.

Admission to a game is 5,000 lire, about \$3.50, but free in Rome where it would cost more to rent the stadium and pay the grounds keepers if tickets were sold.

To date, baseball fans have not matched the ardor of Italian soccer fanatics who have been known to bite off a referee's nose or an occasional ear lobe to register a second opinion. In deference to team morale, Americans are secretive about their salaries, but there are rumors of six-figure contracts with maybe a car

and an apartment thrown in for a 60-game season.

Most Italians play for the fun of it, but top players can command upward of \$30,000 with bonuses for all-star and Olympic appearances. Teams travel by bus, stay in first-class hotels and, adds Sal, "being Italians insist on the best food."

A few teams have bat girls. "How," asks Giulio Glorioso, "can you refuse the daughter of the sponsor who pays all those hotel bills?"

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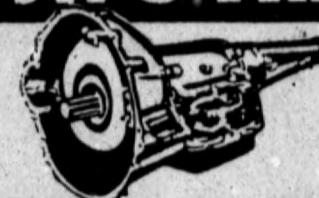
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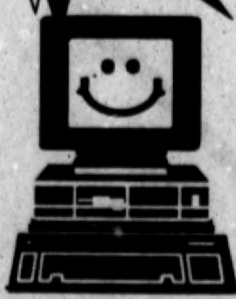
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United States shaping up as good World Cup host

DALLAS (AP) - The world gasped on July 4, 1988: Had the United States, a country of soccer novices, really been awarded the 1994 World Cup?

Soccer followers in every time zone wondered if the Americans could be trusted to plan and attend their wonderful event. Could they enthusiastically support it, and coddle it with all the affection it deserves? "When I first got this job," admits Bill Stroube, Dallas' venue executive director, "I even had my doubts." But no more. The World Cup begins in less than a year. On June 17, 1994, Chicago will play host to the opening ceremonies, then stage the first World Cup match played in the United States. Later that night, the world will watch as Dallas plays host at the Cotton Bowl to the second game on opening day.

Few doubts persist that the United States is unprepared or ill-equipped to handle the World Cup. The event will consume the world's sporting populace until an estimated worldwide TV audience of two billion views the World Cup final at the Rose Bowl on July 17, 1994.

A year before soccer's quadrennial championship, ticket sales have exceeded expectations. TV rights have been awarded, corporate America has embraced the event, stadiums are nearly ready and security planners have devised a comprehensive strategy they hope will deter violence without being obtrusive to fans.

Alan Rothenberg, a Los Angeles lawyer who doubles as the U.S. Soccer Federation president and World Cup USA chairman, has stressed that Americans don't have to be soccer purists to stage a great event. He said his group, borrowing largely from the experience of running the highly successful 1984 Olympic soccer tournament, will be ready when 23 finalist nations join the United States at next year's competition.

"In Italy (in 1990), they were still building roads, bridges and stadiums just months before the World Cup," Rothenberg said. "We've got everything here right on schedule."

Locally, Stroube, a paid staff that has grown to 10 and about 100 active volunteers work night and day on event planning. Dallas' task is more ambitious than most of the other eight World Cup venues. In addition to being host to six games - four first-round games, a second-round game and a quarterfinal - Dallas will play host to the International Broadcast Center, FIFA's headquarters and the referee training and fitness center.

World Cup Dallas has a database of more than 1,500 volunteers, and Stroube's group plans to use all of them during the World Cup and surrounding festivities next year.

"There's no doubt in my mind that this will be the biggest event ever in Dallas," Stroube said. "People will be surprised by how important this is to the rest of the world."

It certainly will be important to local merchants. The four-week event is expected to produce a \$4 billion economic impact nationally. Dallas' economic impact is expected to reach \$265 million, bolstered by the International Broadcast Center. Thanks to the IBC, about 3,500 broadcasters and technicians from around the world will camp in Dallas for about six weeks.

From broadcasters and fans, the city of Dallas expects to receive \$2 million to \$3 million directly from parking concessions and sales taxes. "No one ever doubted the U.S.

would put on a first-class event," said Jeff Farmer, executive producer of England's ITV Sport, which will help broadcast games to England. "The Americans have always known how to do that. But some people have wondered about the atmosphere."

Translation: Would the games be played in half-empty stadiums?

By all indications, the 1994 World Cup, with a record-high 3.5 million tickets available, will be the first to completely sell out.

The tickets have sold much faster than marketing experts predicted. In fact, they were advising Rothenberg last February that his group's ticketing plan, which was about to commence, was doomed to failure.

At issue were ticket brochures mailed to America's soccer family: 1.7 million registered players and officials. The brochures asked fans to buy tickets without the basic knowledge of which team would play at which site. Plus, the games were 16 months away. There had been no major advertising campaign. And, the average ticket price was \$58.

"God only knew the response we would get," Rothenberg said.

World Cup organizers sold 650,000 tickets in about a month and had to close the sale early. A second round of tickets, about 600,000 tickets available to the public, sold even faster. They went on sale Sunday and were gone in seven of the nine venues within 24 hours. Detroit is the only venue with tickets remaining.

"If you really want to test the American public, ask them to put their hard-earned dollars out there," Rothenberg said. "We passed that test."

The only tickets left now are a "premium" series that will go on sale later this year and an allotment set aside for foreign teams, many of whom are still trying to qualify.

World Cup Dallas co-chairman Lamar Hunt, who has been to five of the last six World Cups, said there won't be any problem selling those tickets. He used perennially powerful Brazil as an example.

"How ever many Brazilians there are in the United States," Hunt said, "they will move heaven and earth trying to see that Brazilian team in the World Cup."

Machine gun-toting military personnel dotted the World Cup landscape in Italy in 1990. But American organizers are resisting that heavy-handed approach. They say security will be heavy, yet well-disguised. This "soft" policing will rely on modern security tactics and years of planning.

It starts with identifying known trouble-makers and denying them entrance to the United States. Security officials turned away an undisclosed number of European "hooligans" last week at Boston's Logan Airport before U.S. Cup matches.

"We will have a plan that does not detract from the 99.9 percent of the people who just want to come to watch the games," Rothenberg said.

The man in charge nationally is Edgar Best, a 22-year FBI veteran who was director of security for the 1984 Olympics. Best was appointed last September to head the World Cup security effort, and immediately retreated from publicity to begin devising strategies. Security officials will concentrate on three areas: anti-terrorism, thwarting hooliganism, and in-stadium security.

Locally, deputy police chief Rick Hatler was appointed more than a year ago to a full-time position of World Cup planning. He is coordinating the actions of 11 local, state and federal agencies.

Some fans may find some of the security measures a little jolting, like

fences within the stands to separate rival fans, and security frisks when entering the gates.

World Cup officials have acknowledged that some type of barrier - most likely plexiglass - will separate the fans and the field, and that chain-link fencing will be used within the stands.

Aside from the installation of fences, all nine stadiums will undergo some degree of renovation. Dallas' \$11 million project to upgrade the Cotton Bowl is the most ambitious.

Most venues needed only minor work, like a grass surface to replace artificial turf in New York, Boston, Detroit and Dallas - a FIFA mandate. Some venues, including Dallas, had to have seats removed in the corners to widen the field to the minimum width of 75 yards.

But stadiums never were a major concern. Pleasant, accessible arenas were a main reason FIFA brought the World Cup to the United States.

"I think when the Europeans and South Americans come here next year, they will be very pleased," said ITV's Farmer. "They will all have a back on their chair and a nice place to watch the game. That's is not always the case in other countries."

For those who don't want to risk going to the games, or can't afford tickets, there's always television.

ABC will show 11 games of the 52-game tournament. ESPN will televise the tournament's other 41 games, 31 of them live.

Thanks to some hardball by Rothenberg, the U.S. viewer will see the games as they are seen throughout the world - without commercial interruptions.

Advertisers will hawk their goods before and after the game and at halftime. Rothenberg knew that would not please the networks but insisted.

Even with the restrictions, advertisers were easy to find. The commercial air time was auctioned late last year and completely gone in two hours. The rapid sale of air time was only the first show of corporate support.

World Cup USA has signed 11 sponsors, each of whom paid about \$20 million in rights fees. World Cup USA also has signed eight "marketing partners," including locally based American Airlines and EDS, each of whom paid about \$8 million in rights fees.

Rothenberg said each sponsor and marketing partner is spending \$3-5 on World Cup promotions for each dollar it paid in rights fees. In the case of MasterCard, company officials estimate that it will spend about \$75 million in promotions by next summer.

While there is money to be made, Hunt said the worldwide prestige cannot be measured. As a Dallas resident, Hunt couldn't be happier Dallas will share in the World Cup excitement.

"Americans are not tuned in to the national team aspect of sports," Hunt said. "There's a great feeling of national pride involved in these games. I think they'll see a tremendous amount of color next year."

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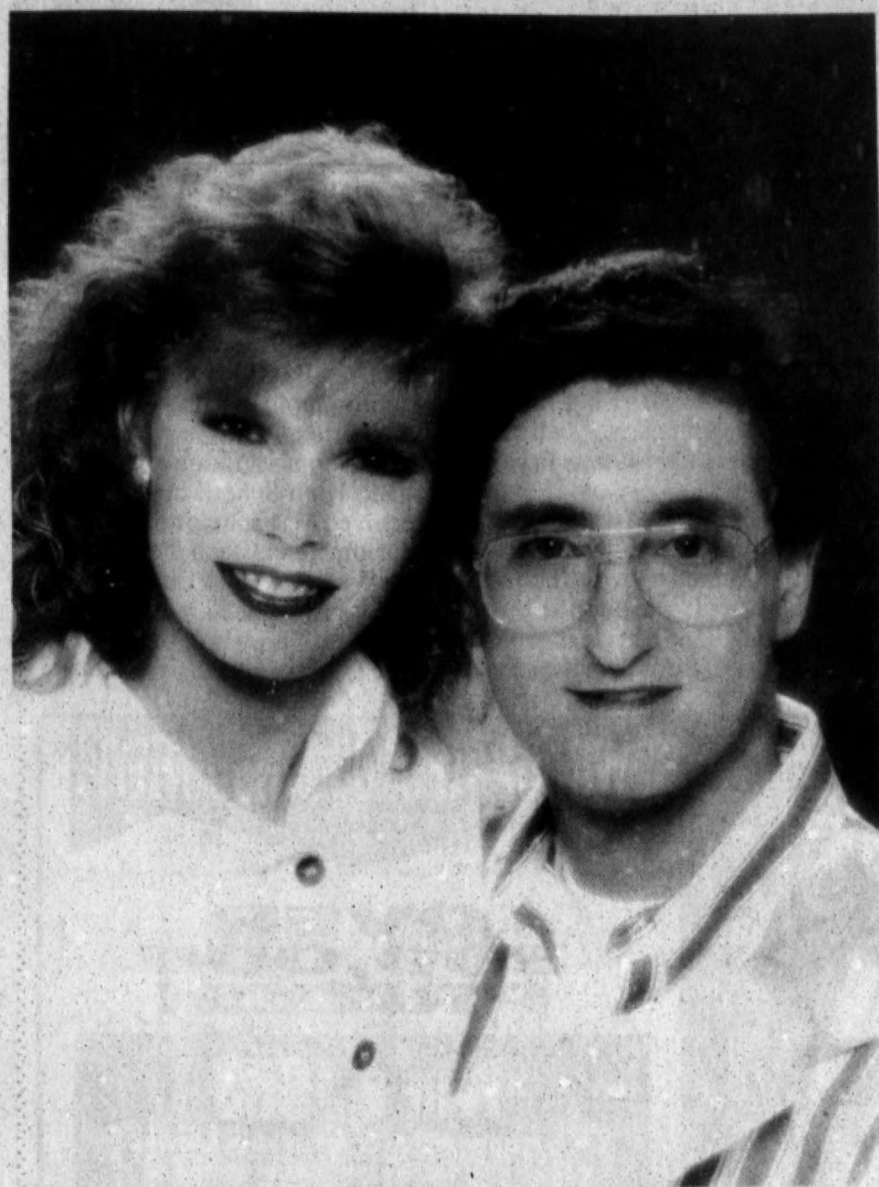

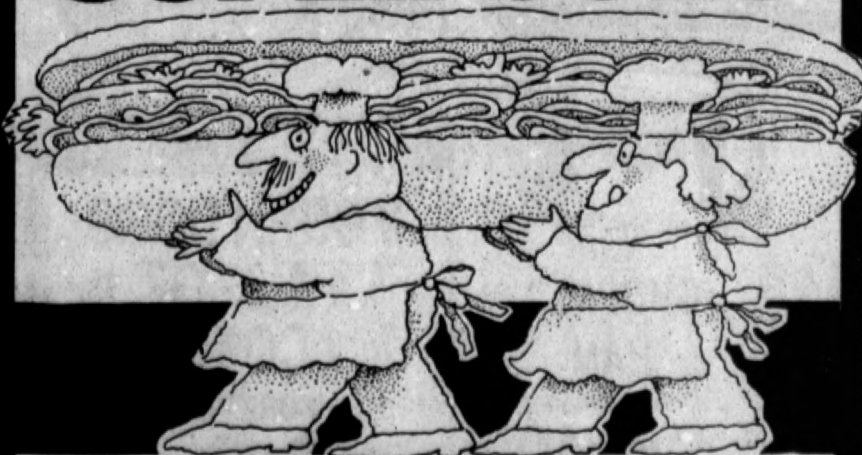

Micro-wave cleaning hints

According to product experts, food soils in the oven absorb micro-wave energy that should be used to cook the food. In addition, unpleasant odors may develop if food soils build up on the interior surfaces.

The home economists suggest you keep a roll of paper towels handy near the oven to wipe the oven's interior when you notice a spillover. If more than a quick wipe-up is needed, use a soft cloth dipped in mild detergent and rinse with warm water. For stubborn soils, boil a cup of water in the oven for two or three minutes. The steam will soften the soil for easy removal.

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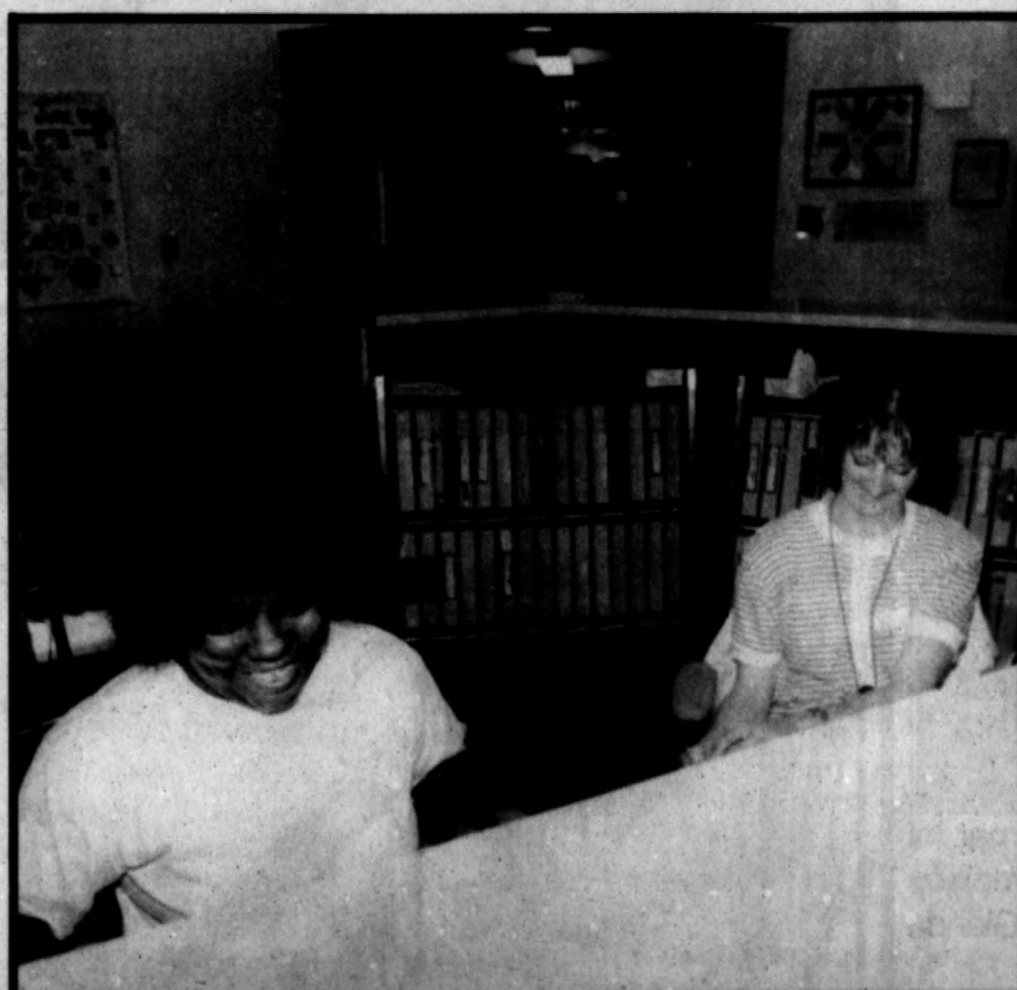
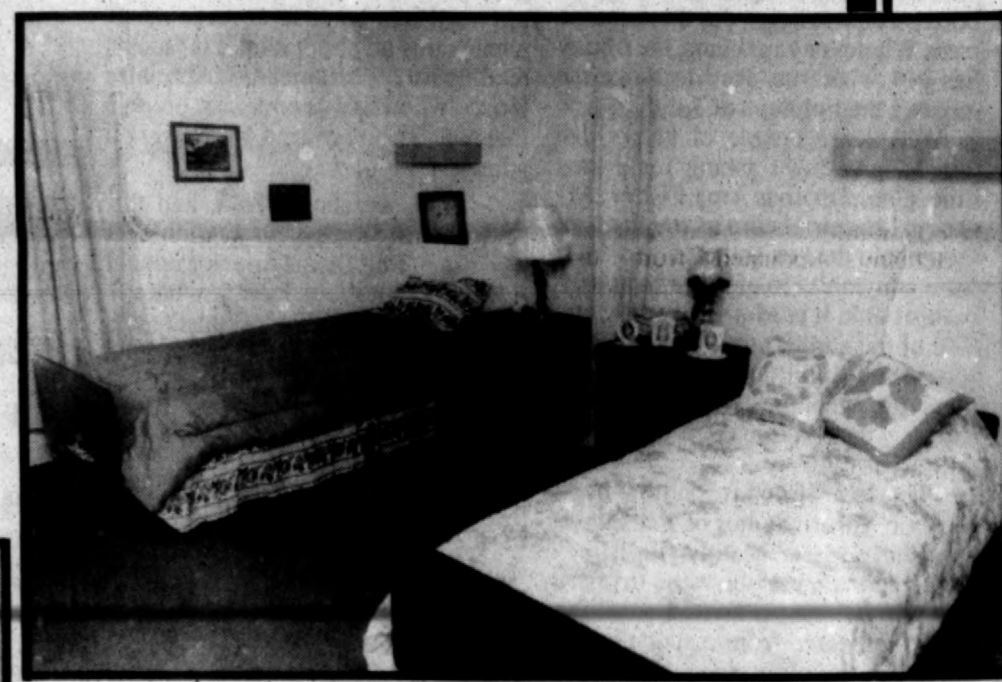

Breast screening planned July 2

Appointments are now being taken for breast screenings. The Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital mobile mammography unit will be in Hereford from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. Friday, July 2, at the South Plains Health Care Providers, Inc., 603 E. Park.

Appointments may be made by calling 1-800-377-HOPE or 1-359-4673. The total cost of the screening is \$70. This includes the x-ray, physical breast exam and the radiology fee for reading the mammogram. Funding has been provided by the Texas Department of Health to allow for free breast screenings for women who qualify.

The major goal of the clinic is the early detection of breast cancer. The clinic provides low cost screening which includes a breast exam by a registered nurse trained in breast

cancer detection, teaching of breast self examination and a mammogram.

Currently, the most effective method known to win the battle against breast cancer is early detection. Early detection is best done by following the guidelines recommended by the American Cancer Society for breast cancer screening for women who have no signs or symptoms of breast cancer.

The guidelines are:

1. Learn and perform breast self examination every month.
2. Have a physical examination every year.
3. Have a mammogram according to recommendations by age: 40 years of age, one baseline mammogram; 40-49, a mammogram every one to two years; and 50 and over, yearly mammograms.

Between The Covers

Summer is here in full swing, as of last Monday. Now the days will get shorter, but hotter. This is the time to take it easy--relax in the yard or by the pool with a glass of iced tea or lemonade and a good book. Maybe you prefer to stay in under the influence of A/C with a good book. Or perhaps you plan on getting away, and need a good book on tape to help your driving time pass. Whatever your plans, the library has just what you need to make the most of the hot days of July.

We have a couple of books that people have been asking for a long time. One of them is *Amy Fisher: My Story*. I haven't heard as much about this whole deal as some of you must have, but don't look for fair treatment in this book. It is admittedly only one side of the sordid tale. After all, why should Joe Buttafuoco tell his side in this book, when he can write his own and they can both make a buck (or a million or two).

Pleading Guilty is the new book by Scott Turow, author of *Presumed Innocent*. "Mack" Malloy, fiftyish ex-cop is called on to solve the mystery of a missing lawyer and \$5.6 million that disappeared from a special fund set up to settle a massive airdisaster class-action suit. In his travels he runs into various friends and enemies, AND a cold corpse.

An enduring landmark church here is St. Mark's-in-the-Bouwerie.

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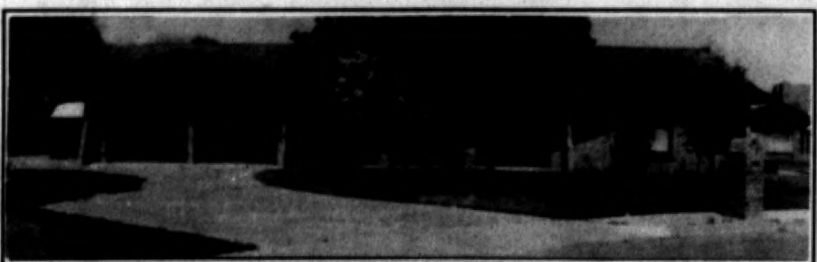
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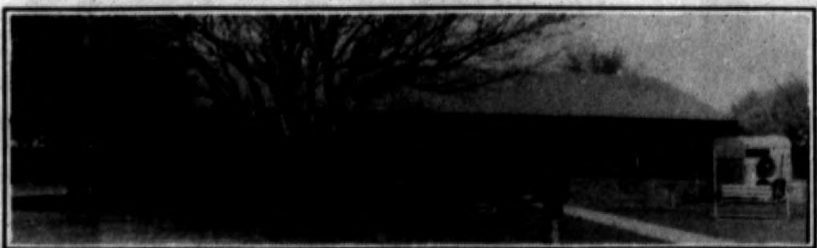
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Local DAR chapter selling quilt tickets

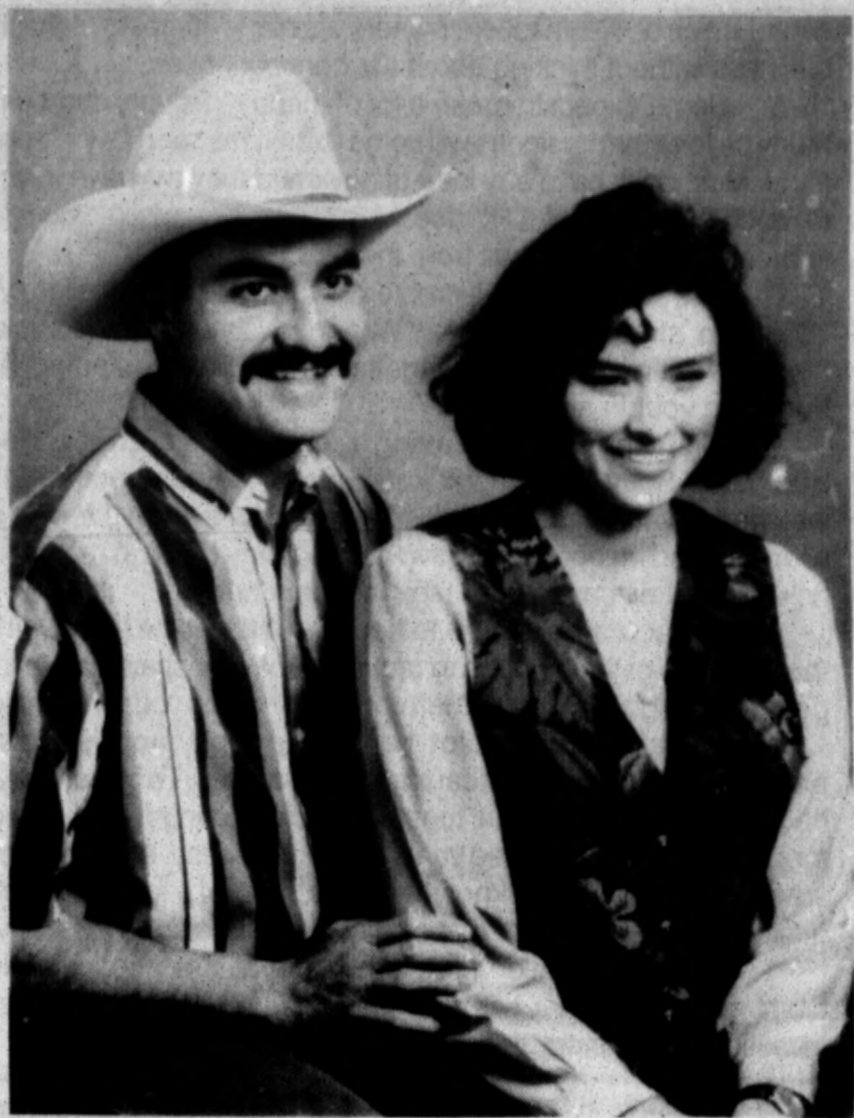
Members of the Los Ciboleros Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution are currently selling tickets for a queen-size "Lover's Knot" design quilt.

HOME-BASED HEADACHES

Starting a business in your home was the most popular start-up concept in the last decade. It is currently estimated that nearly 10 million Americans have a home-based business.

There are several advantages in starting in your home. These include lower capital requirements, convenience and lower risks. However, many entrepreneurs who start at home fail despite the advantages.

We have counseled with the owners of more than a hundred of home-based businesses. We've seen firsthand the problems they encounter. Here are some of the most common errors.

Common mistakes

Mistakes No. 1 - Leaping before you look. The most

common error we've seen owners make is jumping right into business without thinking about the consequences.

Some expect to make a lot of money in a very short time. Many believe that business will come to them as soon as they open shop. Most don't have any idea of how hard they will have to work to become successful. It does look so easy when you view someone's else's success from the outside.

The solution for this problem is to create a plan before you decide to start the business. Writing a simple, but complete business plan will help you gather facts before starting and operating your business.

Mistake No. 2 - Leaving a great job to start a good business. Some folks don't know when they are well off. I've watched several hard-headed souls walk away from a terrific job with outstanding benefits. Within months they begin to realize just how much they gave up for their independence.

A practical solution is to begin on a part-time basis. When the business grows enough to require all of your spare time and is generating a good income, then consider leaving your present job.

Mistake No. 3 - Not having enough money. This is probably the most frequent cause of early failures. To be certain you have enough money, put together a cash budget and income projections for the first three years of your business. Always include some extra money for unknowns. There is Murphy's Law regarding business starts. It says: "What ever should cost a dollar, costs two."

The best solution for this mistake is also good planning. Don't spend your hard-earning savings until you've thoroughly investigated the start-up costs.

Mistake No. 4 - Underestimating your ignorance. No one knows everything about running a business before actually starting one. However, not knowing enough can be very costly.

You need not be an accountant, but you should know what records to keep to satisfy the IRS. You need not be an attorney, but you should know if you can legally operate your business from your home. Many communities have strict zoning ordinances prohibiting home-based businesses.

You don't need to be an advertising executive, but you should know how to promote your business. Even if you have a better mousetrap, don't expect your customers to beat a path to your door.

Mistake No. 5 - Lacking the self-discipline to work at home. Motivating yourself to work at home is not easy. I often find many distractions when I work at home. It is easy for me to get side-tracked by maintenance work around the house, laundry, family, the swimming pool and television. If you are going to be successful in a home-based business, you must treat it as any other work experience. When you go to the "office," you've gone to work.

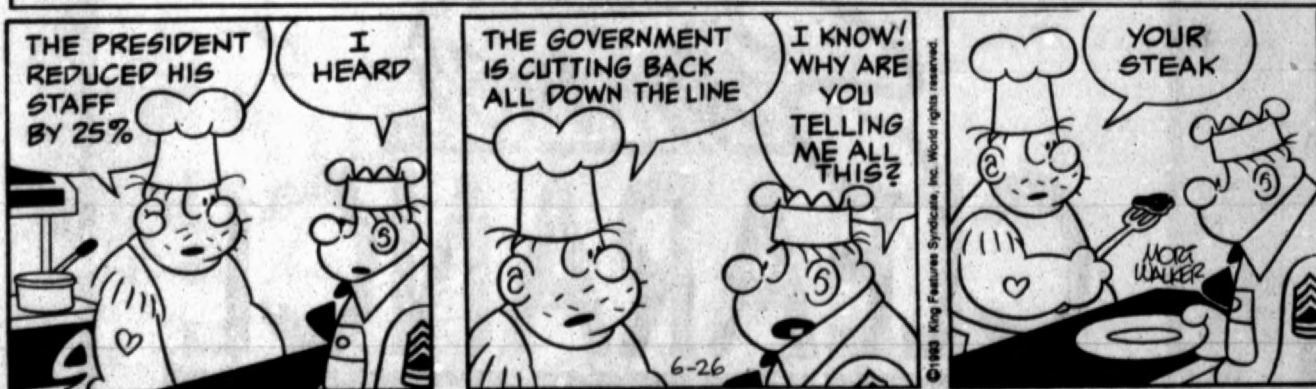

Talk to pharmacist, it may be the law

While millions of Americans rely every day on prescription medicines to feel better and get well, studies show that some patients will still end up sick or hospitalized because they don't understand or follow medication instructions. To address this problem, which has been reported to cost billions of dollars annually in preventable illness, the federal government has enacted legislation requiring pharmacists to advise Medicaid patients about all new and renewal medication prescriptions. But it is important for all patients, not just

those using Medicaid, to take the time to talk with a pharmacist about medication. That's why 23 states currently require pharmacists to consult with every patient about every prescription. More states are considering such legislation.

Whether or not a specific state requires patient counseling by pharmacists, a patient can make medication use safer and more cost-effective by insisting on full information from the pharmacist each time a prescription is filled. A few simple questions will help.

-What is the name of the drug and what is it supposed to do?

-How and when do I take the medication and for how long?

-What foods, drinks, or other medicines, or activities should I avoid while taking this medicine?

-Are there any side effects, and what do I do if they occur?

-Is there any written information available about the drug?

In addition, if the prescription is a refill, patients should open the bottle and make sure the medication looks like it did the last time it was filled.

"Today's pharmacists are taking a greater role in helping patients make the best use of their medication," says Joseph A. Oddis, executive vice president of the American Society of Hospital Pharmacists. "Pharmacists are medication use experts, trained to counsel patients. Their knowledge can make a difference in the safety and quality of a patient's medication care. It can make a big difference in whether the patient feels better or not."

An Ordinance of The City of Hereford, Texas, amending Article 11 of Chapter 17 of The Hereford City Code, 1973, as amended, by adding Sec. 17-95a Designating a portion of Union Avenue and a portion of Avenue F as one-way streets at certain times.

Be it ordained by The City Commission of The City of Hereford, Texas:

First Aid for Nosebleeds
The first concern about a nosebleed is getting it to stop. Simple first-aid procedures usually can do the trick, says Dr. John K. Jones, an otorhinolaryngologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. Among his recommendations:
- Apply pressure to the soft part of the nose (not the hard bony portion) for several minutes.
- Soak a piece of cotton with nasal drops such as Neosinephron and pack it into the nose.
If bleeding can't be stopped in 20 minutes, consult a doctor.

Jones recommends using a humidifier during winter months when indoor air is dry to lessen the chance of nosebleeds. He says that children should be discouraged from putting their fingers in their noses - the leading cause of nosebleeds in children.

A Cold in Hand
Wash your hands a lot to avoid colds or to keep from passing the one you have to someone else.

You can catch a cold by rubbing your nose or eyes with your fingers, which may have picked up the virus from hand-to-hand contact, according to Dr. Christine Matson of Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Cold sufferers often sneeze or cough into their hands, then touch objects or other people, thus passing the bug to someone else. Frequent handwashing will lessen transmission chances.

Tissues or handkerchiefs also can help keep the germs from spreading. Just be certain to dispose of or launder them quickly after use.

Seat Belt Syndrome
"Seat Belt Syndrome" - both external and internal injuries to the abdomen and lumbar spine fracture - is a particular problem for children and young adolescents, who typically have smaller pelvises with less well-defined bone architecture than adults.

Adult seat belts rarely fit into proper position on a child, says Dr. M. Shay Womack, co-author of a study on the problem presented to a recent meeting of the American Academy of Orthopedic Surgeons.

Beware of eye strain

Computers may save us time and paperwork, but they're certainly not a "sight for sore eyes." Out of some 35 million people who work on computers, more than half complain of eye strain, according to Dr. Richard J. Glonek, a behavioral optometrist specializing in functional vision problems.

Why do computer terminals cause so much eye trouble? According to Dr. Glonek, the human eye works most comfortable when viewing objects at a distance. Jobs that require prolonged concentration on a computer screen can create nearpoint visual stress. Fluorescent overhead lighting or poorly illuminated work areas can also contribute to eye strain in the workplace.

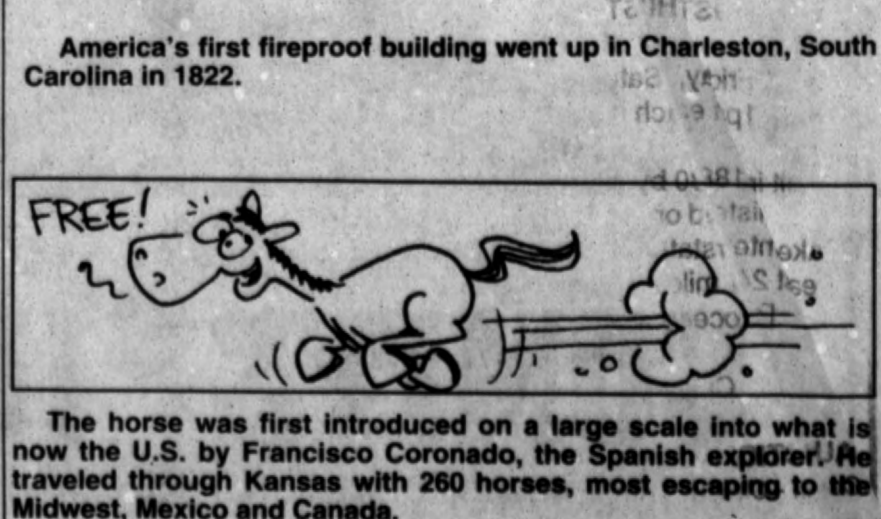
People suffering from eye strain should consult their eye care professional as soon as possible to avoid any permanent visual damage, such as nearsightedness, suppressed vision in one eye or poor eye teaming. Experts offer these suggestions for relieving workplace eye strain:

-Modify the position of your computer terminal slightly below eye level. Documents should be placed at the same height as the computer screen.

-Adjust the brightness and contrast of your computer screen for maximum viewing comfort.

-Select eyewear which reduces glare. New lens products offered by eyecare professionals can significantly enhance eye comfort.

Whether at work or at play, a smart way to avoid eye strain is to look into prescription eyewear which adjusts comfortable in any lighting.

Agriculture experiencing 'green industry' growth

WASHINGTON (AP) - One of the fastest growing sectors in U.S. agriculture is "the green industry," consisting of flowers and decorative and environmental plants, says the Agriculture Department's Economic Research Service.

"Green industry cash receipts (at the grower level) rose to \$8.4 billion in 1991, 10 percent of farm cash receipts for all crops," it said in a report in this month's Agricultural Outlook magazine.

Fifty-eight percent of the industry comes under the heading of environmental horticulture, consisting of live plants used for water and soil conservation, wildlife preservation, air quality, shade and aesthetic purposes.

Forty-two percent of the industry is floriculture, which consists of cut flowers and decorative greens, potted flowering and foliage plants and bedding and garden plants.

"Floriculture and environmental horticulture comprise one of the fastest growing sectors in U.S. agriculture - the green industry - which more than doubled its sales between 1982 and 1991," the report said.

The floriculture sector hired an estimated 132,000 workers at the peak season of 1992, with payroll an estimated \$900 million for workers involved in growing and harvesting operations.

Texas cattle bought by Thai government

AUSTIN-First shipment of more than 700 Texas cattle sold to Thailand left from Houston Intercontinental Airport recently. The heifers were sent through the Texas Department of Agriculture export pens at HIA.

The Brahman cattle are part of a record-breaking sale to the Thai government, at a cost of more than \$840,000. Three shipments are planned.

Thai government farms began purchasing Texas breeding stock in 1986. A 1991 Brahman purchase by Thailand was the largest of its kind at the time.

"Texans don't know the meaning of the word impossible," said Rick Perry, Texas Agriculture Commissioner who saw the shipment off. "We've learned that cows can fly and be happy living somewhere people don't speak in a Texas twang."

He added, "Texas has long been known for excellent cattle genetics and the Thai have had great success with our Brahman. The climates are similar and our Brahman have helped the Thai improve their own cattle stock."

Ausswin Wongwan, director of the Complete Agriculture Systems of Thailand, purchased the cattle for the Thai Department of Livestock Development. The Thai government runs 32 farms and the Brahman heifers will be distributed over those farms to improve the quality of Thai Brahman.

The first shipment of 310 heifers were airlifted aboard special 747 Jumbo jets on June 7 and another 300 were scheduled for shipment on June 10.

Cattle for the final shipment on June 29 are being tested. The final number has not been determined. The animals were selected from 69 Brahman breeders across Texas. Total economic impact of the deal is more than \$2.6 million.

In 1991, the Thai government purchased 660 head of Brahman, the largest single Texas cattle purchase by any foreign country in the last 20 years and the largest effort ever by Thailand.

Perry has spearheaded a marketing program, "Texas Livestock... Best in any Language," which promotes the excellent quality of Texas livestock in this country as well as abroad.

Since January, more than 3,000 head of livestock valued at more than \$3 million, have gone through Intercontinental. Just a month ago, more than 2,000 sheep were shipped to India through the Houston pens.

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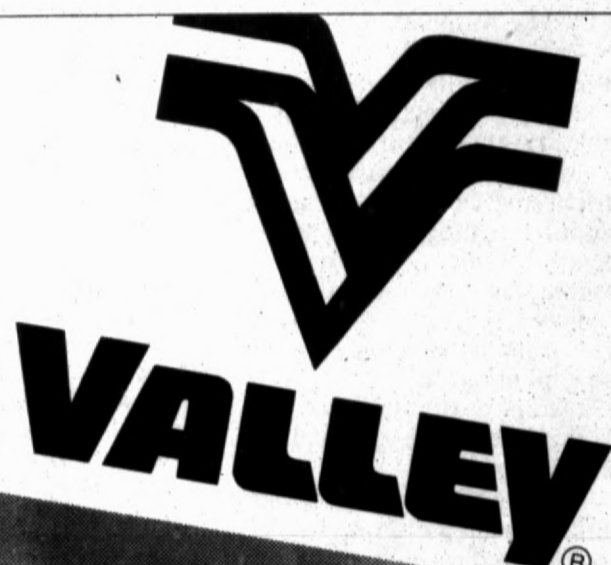
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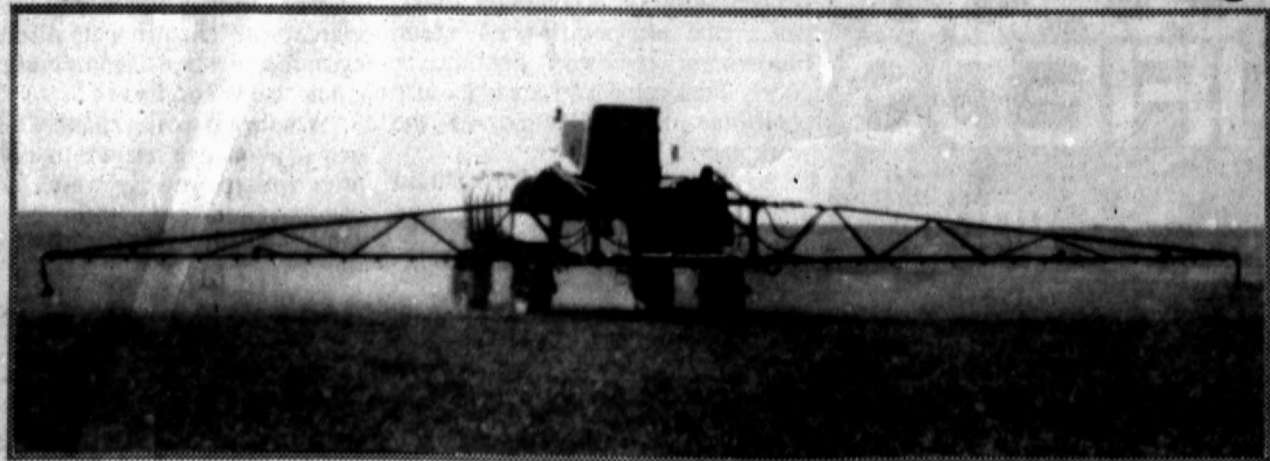

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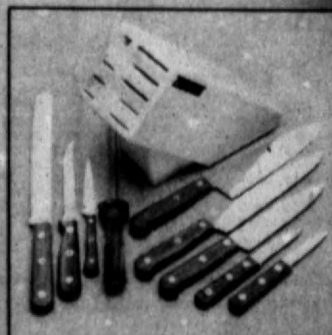

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No threat to Hitchcock, Fox's 'Lifepod' still fun

In 1944, 20th Century Fox released Alfred Hitchcock's "Lifeboat." Based on a detailed outline by John Steinbeck (from an idea suggested by Hitchcock himself), Jo Swerling's screenplay focuses on a group of survivors set adrift after an English luxury liner is attacked by a German U-boat.

But the real drama of the piece is set in motion by the rescue of a German sailor who claims to have become separated from his ship. Should he be allowed aboard the tiny lifeboat? Should they simply kill him? Can they trust him in his claim to guide them to a safe shore? The ethical questions raised in "Lifeboat," of compassion in the face of fear, of the value of human life vs. the weight of learned prejudice, spoke loudly to a war-torn world.

Forty-nine years later, the brilliant Hitchcock/Steinbeck/Swerling collaboration has been transformed (and transplanted) in the Fox television network's "Lifepod," a fairly well-crafted story of disaster, betrayal and justifiable paranoia in outer space. Debuting on Fox Monday, June 28, "Lifepod" echoes none of the original film's moral quandaries, but offers clearly defined characters, credible acting, and fast-paced storytelling sure to hold viewer interest.

Set in the year 2168, the movie opens on the control deck of the interplanetary space liner Terrania. A crew member detects an alarmingly high temperature reading in the bowels of the ship and it soon becomes evident that the craft is about to explode. Passengers and crew members alike race for the lifepods, modest, semi-powered vehicles capable of propelling a small group away from immediate danger but little else.

Only Lifepod 7, however, manages to escape in time; the rest are destroyed in the fireball that consumes the Terrania.

In retrospect, that fact will seem as mysterious (and ominous) as the explosion itself.

Robert Loggia ("Jagged Edge," "Big," "Wild Palms") heads the cast as crusty Daniel Banks, a plain-spoken senator on his way to Venus. Tony winner Ron Silver ("Reversal of Fortune," Broadway's "Speed the Plow") deftly plays enigmatic Miles Tremain, a blind man who nevertheless works as a fraud investigator for Earthcorp, the private firm that oversees interplanetary investments. Piloting the craft is reliable character actress CCH Pounder, and Stan Shaw etches a small but memorable portrait as a rugged crew member unprepared for the deceit and evil that lay before him. Each of these performers delivers a vivid, colorful performance that helps move "Lifepod" on its quick, satisfyingly surprising journey.

Adam Storke, as a high-strung political prisoner, and Kelli Williams, as a humorless medical technician, are less effective, giving shrill, overdrawn portrayals. Jessica Tuck, as the requisite journalist (Tallulah Bankhead played the role in the Hitchcock film) and the occasional narrator of the film, is disappointingly bland.

In addition to acting, Silver makes his debut as a director with "Lifepod," and his handling of the material is commendable. His swift pacing helps smooth over the story's faulty logic and preserve the necessary suspense. Colin Irwin and Curtis Schnell have fashioned a credible set for the ship, and the occasional special effects, if nothing spectacular, at least do not detract from the film.

Besides "Lifeboat," co-scripter Pen Densham ("Robin Hood: Prince of Thieves"), says he also drew on 1981's "Das Boot," which he describes as an "extraordinarily tense and confined story."

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Elizabeth Thoman wants you to learn how to read your television. Seriously.

Ms. Thoman, founder of Media & Values magazine, has been on a 16-year campaign to get Americans to become media literate: to think critically about the images presented by television and the effect on their lives.

"It's a new tradition of literacy for the 21st century," she says.

"We are asking for a thoughtful analysis of the impact of media, both in messages, in techniques... and in its potential for bringing the world together."

"The stories of our time unfold not by people with something to tell, but by people with something to sell. That definitely influences the kind of stories we get, the kind of images we get, the kind of culture we get."

Much is at stake, Ms. Thoman says. Many other observers have been increasingly critical of television's tendency to veer between news and hyped-up drama, blurring the line for viewers.

Ms. Thoman and her Los Angeles-based Center for Media and Values believe the more subtle

influence of TV - and of all media, including radio, newspapers, magazine and advertising - must be recognized and examined.

Taking any at face value could be hazardous to your perception of reality.

Funding for the nonprofit center has come from foundations, including the ARCO Foundation, and from the California Council for the Humanities and the Catholic Communication Campaign.

To help guide people through the media maze, the center has created a concise framework for basic literacy. It has also produced a thoughtful series of nuts-and-bolts guides for dealing with specific issues - such as violence on TV.

First, Ms. Thoman says, the public must understand that all media are "constructions." Whether it's the nightly news or a billboard, the use of words, the omission of others, combine to form a version of reality.

Secondly, the programming is then packaged using identifiable techniques, such as camera angles, music and even laugh tracks on TV sitcoms to manipulate viewers.

"You can learn those techniques to see how they're being used," Ms. Thoman says. "You can say to kids,

'Oh, listen to that laugh track. I don't want to laugh here, this is not funny to me. They're telling me to laugh here.'"

The third literacy concept: understand that media are businesses with commercial interests, and those interests have an influence over content.

"It may not be conscious, but it's clearly there," she said. "It's simply the fact that certain stories are salable and others are not."

Finally, she says, the attainment of modern literacy rests on the realization that all media contain ideological messages and messages weighted with values.

"There is no such thing as value-free media," Ms. Thoman says. "It was written by someone. The same goes for TV news."

The four principles "are under a very important umbrella: All audiences negotiate the meaning of media messages. When we challenge and think about and reconsider the messages coming at us, we change the way they affect us," she says.

To help families and community groups tackle the issue in a manageable way, the center produces workshop kits such as "TV Alert: A Wakeup Guide for Television

Literacy."

The "TV Alert" kit guides people through workshops on such topics as how to watch TV news, how to watch with your grandchildren and "TV Violence: Decoding the Danger."

In the section on grandparents, for instance, the objectives include learning strategies to limit TV's influence on children and overcoming problems in restricting youngsters' TV use.

Issues of the prize-winning quarterly Media & Values also aim to help the public sharpen their media-savvy skills.

In "The Birds, the Bees and Broadcasting: What the Media Teaches Our Kids About Sex," a series of articles examines such issues as the frequency of sex acts on TV and how youngsters evaluate media sexuality.

Included is an activity sheet intended to guide parents and youngsters in a discussion of sexual behavior and consequences, family relationships and sex roles.

Media literacy is a growing movement, Ms. Thoman says. Ultimately, she contends, it must lead to a deeper examination of "the commodification of culture."

Tom Hanks is 'Sleepless in Seattle'

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Is there nothing to fear about Tom Hanks? No matter how dark his character in "Punchline," no matter how cynical in "Nothing in Common," you still think of him as that clever older brother you idolized as a kid.

Even as a surly baseball manager in "A League of Their Own," when the actor is contorting his face like a wad of tobacco, you're waiting for the boyish grin that assures you he's the same sweet guy you rooted for in "Big."

"It's getting to be my curse," he says. "They say that all the time. So now they don't fear me. You want them to fear you, just a little bit."

He's kidding, of course.

In "Sleepless in Seattle," Hanks

again tests his fans. He plays Sam Baldwin, a young Seattle architect whose wife's death leaves him with an 8-year-old son. When the son, Jonah, telephones a national radio show to talk about Sam's loneliness, Baltimore journalist Annie Reed (Meg Ryan) immediately falls for the widower.

Haunted by his late wife's memory, Sam initially is not interested in dating. Eventually, he begins going out, but does not find someone whom both he and Jonah love. The film's question is whether Sam and Annie are made for each other - even though they live 3,000 miles apart.

"You don't direct Tom Hanks," says Nora Ephron, who did so with "Sleepless in Seattle."

"You just sit there and say,

'Action,' then you say, 'Cut.' You just get lucky when he agrees to be in a movie. I'm not kidding."

During a recent interview, Hanks confirmed his director's high regard.

"I'm a pretty naive team player when it comes down to saying yes to a movie. I'm kind of, 'Go, team, go, man. Come on, we're here to do a job, so what do we need to get it done?'"

"In the early going of 'Sleepless,' Nora and I had spent a number of hours saying, 'What the hell does this mean?' Why would he be doing this? I take people to task. But once the agreement is made, man, you don't have a better friend on a movie set than me."

Even when a movie is going down the tubes?

"You never know when it is going down the tubes. You never know when it's going to be great. You always have faith in the alliance, faith in the material."

Even the infamous "Bonfire of the Vanities"?

"That seemed big. That was the only thing about 'Bonfire' that seemed out of the norm: It seemed huge. Every day there was something massive about it - the set, the number of people, the number of (script) pages you were doing, the shot itself. There was always this big chunk of moviemaking happening. You weren't intimidated by the size of it all. But sometimes you wondered, 'Is all this stuff going to fit together?'"

"At the same time, when we were doing another movie with a 'B' in it and we were just dancing on a piano, I honestly thought: 'How long are they going stand for us dancing on this piano?' You never know."

"Big" was a smash hit, earning Hanks an Academy-Award nomination as best actor.

Hanks, 36, credits his natural optimism to "moving around too

much as a kid." One of four children, he was born in Concord, Calif., and his parents divorced when he was 5.

His father remarried twice, his mother three times. Tom bounced from family to family and from town to town as his father changed restaurant jobs all over Northern California.

Theater courses at the State University of California, Sacramento, led to summer work at the Great Lakes Shakespeare Festival near Cleveland, then more classics in New York City. His first important exposure was co-starring in the 1980 sitcom "Bosom Buddies."

Since "Splash!" in 1984, Hanks has enjoyed his choice of scripts and received acclaim for "A League of Their Own" and "Punchline" among others.

How long will he stay in the movie trade?

"As long as they will write my name on a check."

What could be nicer than that?

Roller hockey comes to ESPN

Aztecs, Blast, Express, Fury, Titans, Turbos, Typhoon and Wave. The newest additions to "American Gladiators?" No, these are the teams participating in the newly formed, first-of-its-kind World Roller Hockey League (WRHL), which premiered on ESPN last week and continues weekday afternoons.

Combining most of the standard rules of ice hockey with the current popularity of in-line skating (basically ice skating on wheels instead of blades), roller hockey is a fast-paced, rough-and-tumble game that ESPN hopes will appeal to young viewers. The game is played on a specially designed rink and stadium at the Disney-MGM Studios Theme Park near Orlando, Fla.

The eight-team league was formed by a nationwide draft, with a good number of players drawn from college or International Hockey League levels. Teams compete in a 28-game regular season followed by a best-of-five championship series for the tops in each division.

There are even a few former NHL players scattered around the fledgling WRHL. Three-time NHL All-Star Robert Picard plays for the Titans while 14-year NHL veteran Pierre Larouche serves as coach of the Turbos.

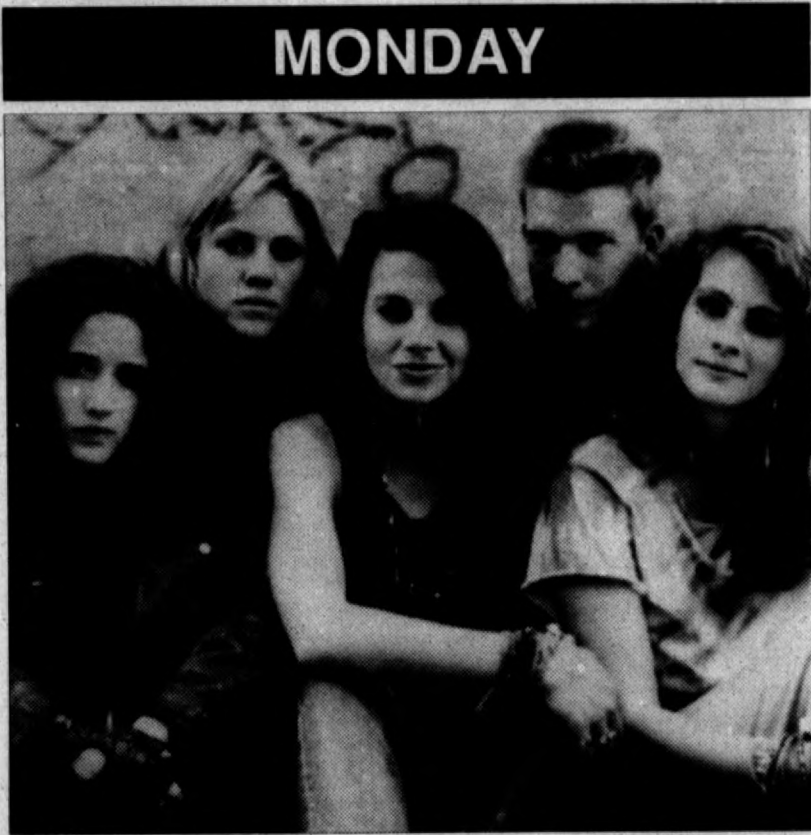

Will fans finally see Vanessa and Billy walk back down the aisle? Only time will tell.

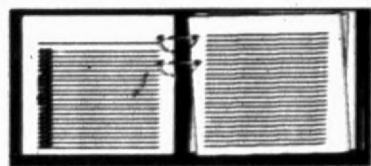
Danger Signs

Nerve growth surprise

At present, physicians caring for patients with spinal cord injuries or various neurodegenerative diseases are severely limited in their therapeutic options.

They can relieve pain, attempt to slow the progression of the disease, or provide compensating physical therapy to improve function. However, what is really desired, the ability to regenerate the damaged nerves, has remained out of reach.

Recently, a step towards that goal may have been taken by researchers investigating nerves from frogs. Their experiments have produced results that fly counter to the conventional wisdom, and may reveal new insight into how nerves grow at the most basic molecular level.

It has long been accepted that much like a carrot, nerve cells grow at the tip. In fact, the tip is called the "growth cone" to reflect this belief. Recently, scientists, using sophisticated techniques, examined the surface of the nerve cell and found exactly the reverse--the entire cell surface grew, with the tip of the cell growing the slowest, and the rest of the cell growing faster the further it was from the tip.

Dr. Mu-ming Poo of Columbia University and his colleagues used nerve cells which branch from the spinal cord of the South African

water frog. After incorporating molecules which could be made to glow into specific spots on the surface of the cell, they examined the cells under a microscope and stored the images on a computer. By following how fast in which direction the glowing spots moved, the researchers were able to measure which part of the cell surface was growing and by how much. To their surprise, they observed that the entire cell surface was elongating, with the part furthest away from the growth cone tip growing the fastest.

To confirm their results, the scientists also observed yolk particles which stuck to the nerve cell surface. They found that these particles also moved fastest when situated away from the growth cone, and that they moved at about the same rate as the glowing spots. The yolk particles that the scientists took advantage of were a lucky byproduct of some broken cells that were produced during the preparation of the nerve cells for microscopic examination.

Although these experiments may not directly provide a specific nerve treatment, with continued progress into understanding the mechanisms of nerve growth, perhaps one day physicians will be able to induce nerve regeneration to help the many patients who desperately need it.

SOCIAL SECURITY QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q: My father, who receives Supplements Security Income (SSI), has decided to move to a smaller apartment in the same building. His rent will be \$10 per month less. Will his SSI decrease because his rent is less?

A: No. As long as he is paying the fair market value for the rent on the new apartment, he will continue to receive his regular SSI check. Please be sure he reports his address change timely to assure his check will go to the correct address.

Q: My mother, a widow, died in late March. I received a notice from Social Security that stated I must return her March benefit check. Why is this? Shouldn't the amount I have to pay back be pro-rated? After all, she lived most of the month.

A: To be entitled to a Social Security benefit check for a given month, the person must be alive the entire month. No benefit is payable for the month of death and Social Security benefit checks are not pro-rated.

Q: My doctor wants to schedule me for surgery next month, but I don't think that surgery is necessary. Will my Medicare coverage pay for a second opinion?

A: Yes. Medicare will pay for the second opinion just as it pays for other doctors' services. To get a second opinion, ask your doctor to refer you to another doctor in that area of specialization or contact your local Medicare carrier.

Q: I retired last year from my job as an accountant but I have continued to work part-time helping people with their income tax preparation. How much can I earn before Social Security will reduce my benefits?

A: In 1993, people under 65 earn \$7,680 before their benefits are reduced. Those ages 65-69 will be able to earn \$10,560 without a reduction. The amount of the reduction is \$1 for every \$2 earned over the limit for individuals under 65 and \$1 for every \$3 of excess earnings for those ages 65-69. There is no earning limit for people age 70 and older.

Q: I have never worked under Social Security but my husband has for many years. When can I get retirement benefits as his wife?

A: To receive a wife's benefit, your husband must apply for his own retirement benefit and you must be at least 62 years old or have a child under 16 still living with you.

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Watch for heat stroke

Summer is here, the weather is great and it feels wonderful to sit and soak up the sun. Right? Wrong! You need to be careful if you want to enjoy the summer heat safely. When temperature and humidity climb, sometimes they can overwhelm your body's ability to get rid of excess heat and the result can be heat exhaustion or heat stroke.

Heat exhaustion sounds just like its name. It can occur when someone overdoes it in hot weather and loses too much salt and water in perspiration. Symptoms can include an upset stomach, muscle cramps, an elevated temperature and feeling dizzy or faint. Fortunately, heat exhaustion can be treated fairly easily by resting in a cooler environment and replacing the fluids and salt. Drink plenty of juices, sodas and other non-alcoholic beverages, if you do not recover quickly, call your doctor.

Heat stroke is a more serious condition that can be life threatening and usually requires hospital treatment. Heat stroke most often occurs during a prolonged heat wave. It can happen in people who are physically active and in those who have not been exercising. In susceptible individuals, high heat and humidity alone may cause this condition. Seniors can be a greater risk, particularly if they are overweight, heart disease and certain medications can also increase the risk. The most common symptoms are confusion and an elevated temperature. If you suspect heat exhaustion or heat stroke in yourself or someone else, seek medical attention promptly.

It's better to be safe than sorry, so, when the temperature climbs, drink plenty of fluids, wear loose and light clothing, take it easy, and, if you have to be outside, try to stay in the shade.

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Nutrition Notes

In the May article you became familiar with the overall message of the Pyramid. One can also see how the Pyramid pieces together to create a healthful eating pattern. In this article we will help you work with the Pyramid to decide which foods to select each day and how much to eat from each food group.

The Food Guide Pyramid shows a variety of appealing foods in all of the food-group pieces. That's because it is important to choose a variety of foods from among all the five food groups each day. No one particular food or food group will provide all the nutrients you need for good health.

So, don't get caught in a taste or nutrition rut. Vary your food choices regularly.

The Food Guide Pyramid also emphasizes a reduction in the amount of fat in the foods you eat. That's because most Americans eat too much fat (especially saturated fat). Protect your health by making lower-fat choices whenever possible.

The Food Choice Chart provides a variety of lower-fat foods from all the Pyramid's pieces. Use it as a reference to piece together your healthful eating pattern.

Level 1
BREAD, CEREAL, RICE, AND PASTA GROUP = 6-11 servings Daily

Try sliced and pita whole-grain bread (such as corn, whole wheat, multi grain, rye) whole-grain English Muffins; lower-fat crackers; breadsticks; whole-grain hot and ready-to-eat cereal; rice, barley, buckwheat, polenta; spaghetti and other egg-less noodles; pretzels and pretzel chips, plain popcorn; low-fat or nonfat cookies and cakes; tacos and tortillas.

Level 1
VEGETABLE GROUP = 3-5 Serving Daily

Try carrots-broccoli, cabbage, Brussel sprouts, cauliflower, peas, yams, potatoes, tomatoes, kale, squash, spinach, Romaine lettuce, onions, celery, vegetable juice, salsa; vegetable soups.

FRUIT GROUP = 2-4 serving daily

Try apples, pears, bananas, peaches, grapes, plums, apricots, cantaloupes, strawberries, blueberries, oranges, grapefruits, mangoes, papayas; fruit juices; fruit salad.

Level 3
MILK, YOGURT, AND CHEESE GROUPS = 2-3 servings daily

Try nonfat or 1% milk, evaporated skim milk, buttermilk; low-fat or nonfat yogurt; lower-fat cheese; ice milk, low-fat or nonfat frozen yogurt; custard or pudding made with nonfat or 1% milk.

MEAT, POULTRY, FISH, DRY BEANS, EGGS, AND NUTS GROUP + 2-3 servings Daily

Try skinless chicken or turkey; all fish and shellfish; extra-lean chopped beef, sirloin, beef round; leg or rib of lamb; pork tenderloin; all veal except ground; navy, kidney, black, baked, and pinto beans; lentils; black-eyed, chick, and split peas; bean dip; four whole eggs per week; egg whites, or cholesterol-free egg substitutes; peanuts, almonds, walnuts, sunflower seeds.

Level 4
FATS, OILS, AND SWEETS = use

in moderation.

Try liquid oils such as corn, canola, soybean, olive, safflower; lower-fat margarines and spreads; hard candy, reduced-fat candy bars; jam, jelly, and other fruit spreads.

When preparing foods from the five food groups:

1. use butter-cheese, and cream-based sauces sparingly.
2. trim excess fat from all meat and remove the skin from poultry
3. roast, broil, poach, steam, boil, or microwave
4. choose whole-grain cereals and grains most often.

HOW MUCH TO EAT

According to the Food Guide Pyramid, all foods can be part of a healthful diet. Even foods in the fats, oils, and sweets category are an integral part of the Pyramid's structure-when eaten in moderation. VARIETY, MODERATION, AND PROPORTIONALITY are the keys to getting the foods you need, as well as those you want.

*Eat moderately, and opt for lower-fat alternatives whenever possible.

When you choose a higher-fat food, eat a moderate portion and balance your choice with a lower-fat food some other time during the day.

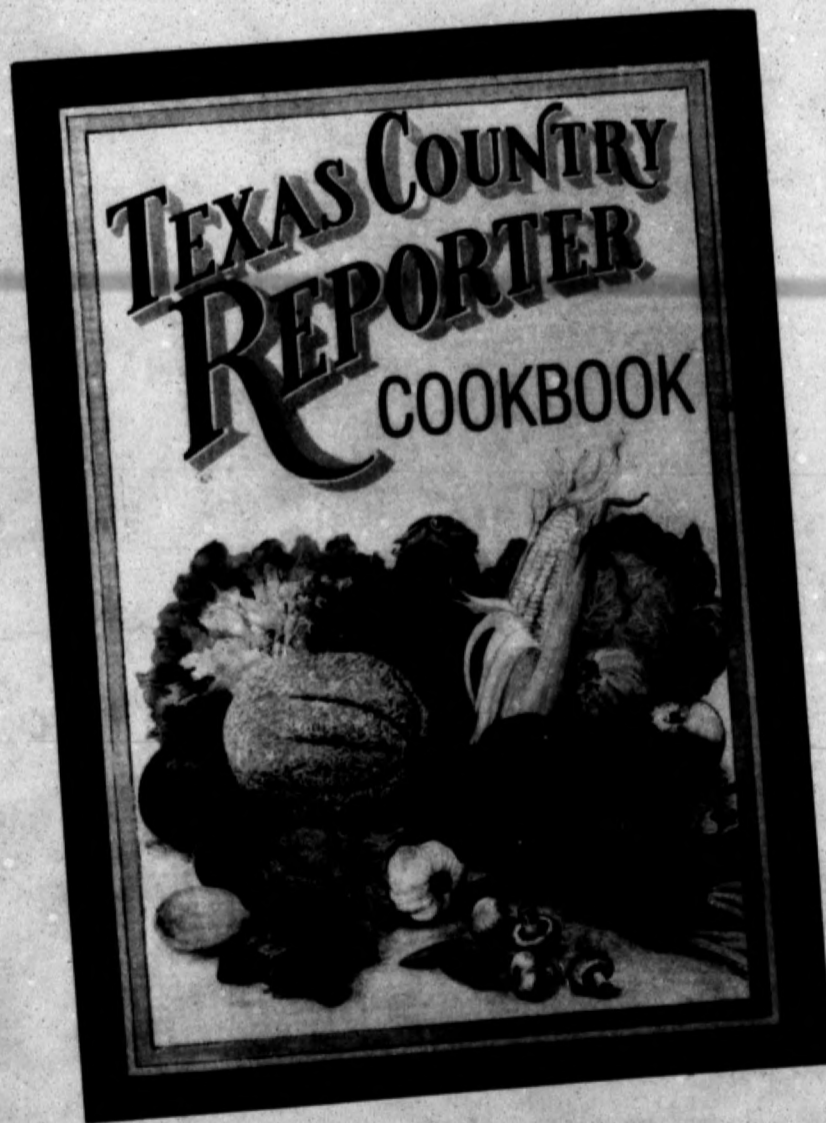
*Vary your choices within the food groups regularly. Also, follow the recommended number of servings for each food group daily. This way you can get all the nutrients you need for good health.



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Arthritis is hurting America

One in seven Americans, or 37 million people, has some form of arthritis. Three million Americans with arthritis cannot do everyday tasks such as dressing, walking, or bathing, according to the Arthritis Foundation.

Economically, arthritis costs the U.S. \$35 billion per year in medical care and lost wages. It is a leading cause of disability payments, accounting for 45 million days lost from work.

"Although arthritis is a very painful, chronic disease, there are ways to help limit the impact on both individuals and society while research advances are made to possibly cure or prevent the disease," said Arthur Grayzel, MD., the Arthritis Foundation's senior vice president for medical affairs.

Once a specific form of arthritis is identified, a treatment program, most often consisting of medication, rest, exercise and joint protection, can greatly reduce pain and increase use of the joints.

Q. My 65-year-old wife needs x-rays but she is very ill and unable to travel. I've been told that there are portable x-ray machines that can be brought to our home and used. Will my wife's Medicare insurance pay for x-ray services performed in our home?

A. Yes. Medicare will help pay for portable diagnostic x-ray services in your home if the services are ordered by a physician and provided by a Medicare-certified supplier.

Q. A lady comes in once a week to clean my house. She works for a local janitorial service. Do I have to pay Social Security taxes for her?

A. No. Her employer must pay her taxes.

Ulcer problems put to bed

If you're average, the odds are about one in seven that you'll have a hospital stay this year--over 33.5 million people are admitted to hospitals annually, according to the American Hospital Association.

If you do become a hospital patient, it's good to know there are new things that can speed your recovery.

One of these is a new hospital bed that can prevent a serious problem--pressure ulcers, commonly called bed sores. A new study, just published in the Journal of the American Medical Association (JAMA), shows that a specialized therapeutic bed can help prevent pressure ulcers in a cost-effective manner. This KinAir bed from the KCI Therapeutic Services uses a controlled air suspension system to provide pressure relief to

help prevent and treat skin breakdown and minimize pain. The bed has a Gore-Tex fabric surface which aids in reducing friction, shearing and moisture buildup and acts as a bacterial barrier.

Some 805,000 to 2,953,000 pressure ulcer cases could be avoided each year with the help of this bed, medical experts say. With the cost of treating pressure ulcers ranging from \$5,000 to \$40,000 per case, this could result in health care savings of from \$4 billion to more than \$14.7 billion annually--savings that would be welcome in a nation where medical costs have soared to about \$738 billion a year.
