Local voting light, Walcott sets record

Light turnouts were reported for the local hospital and school board elections Saturday, but a record number of voters cast ballots in a tight Walcott School board contest.

Uncontested races for two seats on the Hereford School Board drew just over 200 votes each. Kathy Moore, District 4, received 201 votes and Shirley Wilson, District 5, received

219 votes. They will be sworn into office during the regular board meeting at 6 p.m today in the administration building.

In the Deaf Smith Hospital District board election 478 ballots were cast for the three at-large seat sought by four persons. Elected were Frank Zinser with 425 votes, Marjorie Ford with 422 and John Gililland with 402, all incumbents. Max Maes received

Letters mailed requesting voter application cards

Smith County have been mailed letters requesting them to fill out a voter application form to insure that cancelled, according to David Ruland, county clerk.


At Walcott, a record 100 voters cast ballots in a six-man race for three atlarge seats. The previous record was 72 votes cast.

Options studied against Libya following attacks sergeant and a Turkish woman in

WASHINGTON (AP) - The United States is renewing its effort to cut Libya off from its European trading partners as President Reagan weighs military and other options following two terrorist attacks on Americans in Europe last week.

Six people - including five Americans - were killed in the attacks, which administration officials believe may be linked to the Libyans.

Reagan, who took advantage of beautiful spring weather to fly to Baltimore on Monday for the opening of the major league baseball season, refused to answer reporters' questions going to or from the White House. His only public comment on what action he planned against Libyan leader Moammar Khadafy was a "no comment" issued Sunday as he returned from a California vacation.

White House spokesman Edward Djerejian said that following the two recent terrorist incidents involving Americans, the United States is seeking "the possible closing of more Li-

byan Peoples' Bureaus known to be the source of terrorist planning and activity."

Although the European allies have declined in the past to go along with U.S. attempts to coordinate the economic and diplomatic isolation of Khadafy and his oil-rich Arab republic, Djerejian said the latest terrorist incidents, "both on European soil, have sensitized the Europeans to the danger, that the danger is really at their doorstep, not only at our doorstep."

The United States has detailed contingency plans for retaliation against Libya, including five potential military targets there, CBS News said Monday night. It said the Joint Chiefs of Staff met in special session Monday.

Ambassador Richard Burt, the U.S. envoy to West Germany, said there were "very clear indications that there was Libyan involvement" in a nightclub bombing last week that killed an American Army

West Berlin. When asked if he favored military

action against Khadafy in retaliation for the attack, Burt said, "I'm not going to close the president's options. ... He's studying this issue right now."

Burt, interviewed on NBC-TV's "Today" show, said Khadafy must recognize that he is fighting not only

Reagan to discuss summit with envoy

WASHINGTON (AP) - U.S. officials say a meeting between President Reagan and Soviet Ambassador Anatoly Dobrynin could lay the groundwork for a second summit between Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev.

Reagan was to meet Dobrynin todauw White House, where the Soviet statesman was expected to bring word of Moscow's willingness to hold a meeting soon between Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze and Secretary of State George Shultz to discuss summit arrangements, the U.S. officials said.

Dobrynin and Shultz had a breakfast meeting Monday, and although details of their discussion were not disclosed, they were believed to have focused on the timing of a Shultz-Shevardnadze meeting, according to the officials, who spoke only on condition of anonymity.

Almost no progress toward a se-cond summit has been reported since Reagan and Gorbachev agreed to one when they met last November in Geneva. The United States has been pressuring for a summit no later than July, while the Soviets have been holding out for a meeting that

will produce a major agreement. Recent statements by Gorbachev indicate, however, that the Kremlin is prepared for serious discussions about a second summit. Two congressmen who just returned from a 10-day trip to the Soviet Union said

The attorneys said it was unfair for the agency to refuse to grant a 90-day extension on an April 16 deadline for comment by the states on three potential dump sites. The three judges of the 1st U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals took the matter unde advise-

Parking fines total \$9.5 million

HOUSTON (AP) - City Councilwoman Christin Hartung is urging the city to take measures to collect about \$9.2 million in delinquent parking fines.

"It certainly wouldn't solve all of our problems, but \$9.5 million would really go a long way toward improving our current financial situation," Ms. Hartung said, since the city is facing a \$72 million budget shortfall.

There are about 450,000 outstanding tickets ranging from \$10 to \$250 dating back four years, Houston Municipal Court records in-

One motorist has more than 330 outstanding tickets and owes more than \$7,600, according to the court records.

National ** Reagan signs cigarette tax

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Reagan signed into law a measure that makes permanent the 16-cent-a-pack federal cigarette tax and sends billions of dollars of offshore oil revenue to the federal government and coastal states.

The legislation, a complex package designed to cut deficits by \$18 billion over the next three years, was signed by Reagan Monday soon after he returned from watching part of the opening-day baseball game in Baltimore, the White House announced.

The bill was an outgrowth of the fiscal 1986 budget debate, designed to meet some of the deficit-cutting goals. However, the final version was expanded to include language making permanent a 21-yearold drinking age, a new tobacco program, and continued aid to workers who lose jobs to imports.

More than a quarter of the red ink saved by the bill, \$1.7 billion a year, would come from the cigarette tax. The tax, doubled in 1982, rolled back to 8 cents on March 15 after Congress failed to extend it. The bill includes language to impose the full tax retroactively as well as extend it permanently.

The cigarette tax is joined in the law by a sweeping new tobacco price support program.

AIDS survives outside the body

CHICAGO (AP) - The AIDS virus remains active outside the body much longer than previously believed, but common disinfectants are sufficient to neutralize it, according to a new study.

Tests conducted during a three-month study suggest the need for more careful guidelines for laboratory personnel working in AIDS research, scientists reported in an article to be published Friday in the Journal of the American Medical Society.

The tests showed that the virus can live up to 15 days in a waterbased solution of human blood cells at room temperature outside the body. As the temperature is increased, the virus can survive for increasingly shorter periods, the scientists said. Dried, the complete inactivation of the virus required three to seven days, the resear-

Although it was previously believed that the virus died quickly outside the body, the new findings do not mean that it can be spread by casual contact such as touching a toilet seat, one of the researchers

Setting aside money, little help

WASHINGTON (AP) - Setting aside federal money for minorityor female-owned businesses has been of little help to disadvantaged enterprises and has led to fraud and increased costs to government,

a draft report by the staff of the U.S. Civil Rights Commission says. The paper urges a year-long moratorium on the "set-aside" programs, Al Latham, staff director of the commission, said Monday

Latham said that the 96-page report says the programs - under which the government sets aside percentages of money or work for minority businesses - have usually helped wealthier black and Hispanic employers and have been marked by fraud and corruption.

It says set asides have increased government procurement costs, and resulted in financial problems and bankruptcy for many whiteowned businesses.

The commission may consider the report at a meeting Friday. Since the commission is an independent advisory group, even if it approves the staff report, the action would not be binding.

Man walks on ice toward USSR

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP) - When last seen, John Weymouth was on his way to the Soviet Union, picking his way on foot across the frozen Bering Strait.

Authorities said Weymouth, a man known in western Alaska as the wanderer," set out last Wednesday from the U.S. island of Little Diomede, apparently heading across the ice to the Soviet island of Big Diomede, 21/2 miles away.

The two islands in the Bering Strait between Siberia's Chukchi Peninsula and Alaska's Seward Peninsula are the points at which North America and Asia come closest to each other. The international date line runs between them.

"He was confronted by these villagers and asked where he was going. He said, 'None of your business,' and kept walking toward Big Diomede," said 1st Sgt. Tim Litera, an Alaska State Trooper in

Disaster areas declared

WASHINGTON - Rep. Larry Combest has announced that eight counties in the 19th Congressional District of Texas have been designated natural disaster areas due to crop damage brought on by severe weather conditions in 1985.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has declared Lamb, Bailey, Cochran, Castro, Hale, Hockley, Lubbock and Parmer Counties natural disaster areas as a result of severe crop damages and losses due to hail, high winds and drought occurring May 19, 1985, through December 12, 1985, Combest said.

Eligible farmers may qualify for Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) emergency loan assistance if they have suffered a 30 percent crop loss resulting from hail, wind or drought during this time. The interest rate on approved disaster loans will be established at 5 percent up to \$100,000 and 8 percent over

Emergency Loan applications should be obtained at local FmHA of-

In addition to the eight counties designated as disaster areas in the 19th District, seven other Texas counties have also been declared. Those counties are: Baylor, Cottle, Foard, Hardeman, King, Knox,



Soils, plants topic of recent program

Garden Beautiful Club members met Friday in the home of Inez Witherspoon with Jean Dowell serving as co-hostess.

After refreshments of fruit and cakes, the group assembled for a program given by Deaf Smith County extension agent, Dennis Newton.

Newton presented an informative talk about soils and plants in their care. He said there are 26 different varieties of soil in this county and that it tends to be of a clay type, very high in calcium or salt.

The speaker explained that by heavy watering once a week one can leach much of the salt down below the root systems. He suggested that one needs to piece the hard pan with a soil sampler of a deep spading fork every year.

Newton added, "This year will be a bad year for insects because of the mild winter. Diazon is a good remedy for aphids which are already appearing. Maned is good to treat rust and 2-4D will kill most weeds but should be applied with care with a big drop applicator on a still day.

"Ditel applied to leaves and surfaces will kill worms. An insect killer should be painted on tree trunks every week to prevent borers and

a good chemical to apply. The soil in this area needs heavy applications of nitrogen and iron as in amonium

trees for this area," he added. "We need to follow directions concerning

The following weekend Stan called to say he was coming back to town and would like to stay with us again. My husband yelled, "You're not


welcome in this house. And don't call here again." He hung up and muttered, "How do you like the guts of that guy?"

AUSTIN - It would be hard to find a better example of mixed emotions than those of state employees as they fill their gas

No one in their right mind is going to complain about paying less than 80 cents a gallon for unleaded gasoline. Like everyone else, state employees haven't seen gas that cheap since 1979.

But, while lower prices represent extra spending money for many of us, cheap gas represents poor job security for employees of a state that relies too heavily on oil and gas production taxes.

State employees aren't alone in the predicament, either. Anyone who works and lives in an area dependent on oil and gas produc-tion understands those mixed emotions. Just ask a resident of the Panhandle or South Plains. Just ask one of the 34,000 Houstonians who have lost their jobs since the first of the year.

We've got a real problem in Texas, and it gets worse every day. Last Monday, the price of West Texas Intermediate Crude - the leading U.S. crude - dropped to \$10.42 per barrel on the futures markets and \$10.40 on the cash market. That's the lowest oil has been since

Unfortunately, those nostalgic prices signal the end of oil's dominance in the Texas economy. Lower prices make marginal wells unprofitable. Those wells are shut in and people lose their jobs. Exploration grinds to a halt and more people lose their jobs. Support businesses fail and even more jobs are eliminated.

Declining production also results in less production tax revenue for Texas. State government, which is required by law to operate on a balanced budget, will be \$1.3 billion in the red by the time the fiscal year ends. Cutbacks are being made, but it is doubtful they will eliminate completely the deficit.

All of this bad news would be easier to take if relief was in sight. None is. Only an agreement by the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) to limit production will stabilize the price of oil in the short run. Without such an agreement from OPEC, and OPEC's competitors, oil prices could go as low as \$5 per barrel.

OPEC, of course, caused the current decline by flooding the world market in an effort to drive prices so low that competitors would be forced out of business. Their strategy has succeeded only in forcing oil prices through the floor. None of OPEC's rivals has

quit exporting oil. Ministers representing OPEC members are scheduled to meet later this month in Geneva, but no meaningful agreement is expected. In fact, one OPEC minister has

Beef raisers ask judge to stop USDA

SAN ANGELO, Texas (AP) -Beef cattle raisers say the U.S. Department of Agriculture has caused the sharpest drop in beef cattle prices in history, and they have ask-ed a judge to stop the USDA from selling dairy cattle for slaughter.

In a copyright story in Tuesday's editions, the San Angelo Standard Times reported that representatives of three beef cattle associations asked U.S. District Judge Halbert O. Woodward to temporarily stop the USDA from selling dairy cattle and to consider a permanent injunction until a more gradual marketing program is established.

Presenting their request to Woodward for a temporary restraining order were representatives of the National Cattlemen's Association, the Texas and Southwestern Cattleraisers Association and the Texas Cattle Feeders Association.

U.S. House Agriculture Committee Chairman Kika de la Garza, D-Mission, asked the Secretary of Agriculture Monday to suspend the USDA's dairy cattle buy-out program until a more orderly marketing system is devised, the newspaper reported.

To reduce the country's milk surplus, last year's farm bill authorized the whole-herd buyout program for dairy animals over the

On March 27, the USDA announced it would pay dairymen \$1.83 billion to sell 1.55 million dairy cattle for slaughter to reduce milk production.

During the first week of the sales, March 31-April 4, the USDA put more dairy cattle on the market than beef cattle raisers expected. Fed cattle prices dropping \$4-\$5 a hundredweight or about \$35-\$45 a head.

That was the sharpest price drop in history for fed cattle, said Texas and Southwestern Cattleraisers Association President John E. Birdwell. He said the industry lost \$25 million in one week, and lost \$2 billion in equi-

The buyout was scheduled over three periods - April-August 1986, September 1986-February 1987 and March-August 1987 — but Birdwell said USDA figures indicate "that 82 percent could be marketed within the April-August period."

De la Garza told the Standard-Times, "it was never the intent of the Congress that they (USDA) would go and buy the top number up front.

'We wanted to keep a balance," he said, "and as a matter of fact, we wrote (the legal language of the buyout) with the advice of the beef cattle industry."

Cat ills apply DR. GOTT to humans, too

Medical columnists receive mail. This mail consists of readers' queries and comments, promotional materiand comments, promotional material, advertising, announcements, flyers and books. I have just received a new book titled "The Complete Medical Guide to Cats" by Drs. Robert Perper and Edward Kepner (New American Library). I am not at all sure why I was chosen for this honor by the publisher, because I neither treat cats nor own them. Nonetheless, it seems to be a good book — if you it seems to be a good book — if you like cats — and could be useful to cat

Before giving the medical guide to a more deserving recipient, like my sister-in-law who loves cats, I thumbed through it. I was immediately struck by the realization that cats suffer from many maladies common to humans, including ingrown toenalls, asthma, diabetes, slipped discs, glaucoma, lupus and constipation. I noted with satisfaction that the treatments for these feline afflictions correspond pretty closely to those used for humans. So far, so good.

However, veterinarians seem to be much more imaginative than people-healers. I think we doctors could take a cue from vets and upgrade our nomenclature to be more descriptive. For example, cats suffer from two skin diseases called "walking dan-druff" and "licker's skin." With a flash of intellectual insight, I perceived that some of my patients

might suffer from these conditions.

There is enormous pressure on doctors today to arrive at proper diagnoses. In fact, this exercise is still considered — in backward parts of the country — to be a valuable part of medical care. In preference to diagnostics, many modern doctors are happier fiddling around with ma-chines. But physicians of a more lan-

guid temperament are sometimes re-

guid temperament are sometimes required to reach a diagnosis without an electronic jack-in-the-box. That is tough going, as some doctors (and many patients) have discovered.

Therefore, for the benefit of my colleagues and the amusement of the public, I suggest that we stealthily introduce some catlike diagnoses into the often frustrating world of human the often frustrating world of human

"Stud tail" is a feline term I can hardly wait to apply to some of my more nocturnal, younger male patients. It goes along with "drooling," an open six-pack, a pick-up truck with a rifle rack behind the seat and dungarees with worn knees. Stud tail can often progress to "blotch," hair balls and "hot spots" in macho males who

develop the complete disease.

"Temperature-dependent hair-color changes" affect not only cats; I've just concluded that it is a common condition in people, too. I once knew a surgeon who tried repeatedly to dye the gray streaks in his hair, but he always seemed to come out with blue or green topping. Women with platinum hair that looks like cotton candy, teenagers with the punk look of orange or magenta bands, and aging portly men with uniformly walnut hair are not victims of the dye-bottle; they obviously suffer from temperature-de-pendent hair-color changes. I've indicated that fact, where appropriate, in their medical records. I don't know whether this condition produces "head mange," but I'm working on the

Vatican outlines broad social goals

VATICAN CITY (AP) - The Vatican, in a major document defining the church's role in society, today said Roman Catholics have the right to combat unjust regimes, but that clergy must not intervene directly in "the political construction" of their countries.

"It would be criminal to take the energies of popular piety and misdirect them toward a purely ear-thly plan of liberation," said the 59-page document entitled "Instruction on Christian Freedom and Liberation."

The document, dated March 22 and approved by Pope John Paul II, was drawn up by the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith, the Vatican's watchdog over deviations from Roman Catholic doctrines and

The Vatican made the document available to news organizations Friday for release today.

It mainly reiterates positions previously taken by the church on liberation theology, a movement born in Latin America that sometimes uses Marxist theories to support social activism by priests and nuns in Third World countries.

But Vatican officials said the documt represented the first comprehensive and binding guidelines on how bishops, priests and lay people should pursue the church's mission of seeking freedom and liberation in the modern world.

The document says Roman Catholic clerics must not intervene directly in "the political construction

that the church has the mission of "enlightening consciences."

However, it said Christians have the moral right to oppose unjust governments and even in some cases resort to armed struggle.

"One cannot passively accept, still less actively support, groups which by force or by the manipulation of public opinion take over the state apparatus and unjustly impose on the collectivity an imported ideology contrary to the culture of the

Consequently, it is "perfectly legitimate" that those who suffer oppression "on the part of the wealthy or the politically powerful should take action, through morally licit means, in order to secure structures

and organization of social life," and and institutions in which their rights will be truly respected," the document states.

In a 1984 document, which the Vatican said formed an integral part of the latest guidelines, the Holy See condemned Marxist class struggle and any attempt to use an atheistic conception in the church's efforts to help the poor and oppressed.


"Far from being outmoded, these warnings (in 1984) appear ever more timely and relevant," the latest document said in the introduction.

A Vatican official who helped write the new document said it should not be interpreted as a change in the church's position on liberation theology.

"It does not represent any letting up or softening of the church's posi-tion, not at all," the Rev. Thomas J. Herron, a native of Philadelphia, told The Associated Press.

Herron was asked how the active role played by Catholic bishops in the Philippines in the Feb. 25 ouster of President Ferdinand E. Marcos related to the Vatican directives.

"We do not find this conduct (of the bishops) at variance with the letter and spirit of this document," he said.







Tax Tips

Thirteenth in a series of "tax tip" articles provided by the Panhandle Chapter of the Texa Society of Certified Public Accountants.

A. I own a vacation home. Are any of my expenses tax deductible?

A. If you do not rent your vacation home to others, your deductions are limited to those you can itemize for any

residence-interest and taxes. If you rent your home to others, you may also deduct maintenance, repairs, utilities, insurance, depreciation, etc., within limits. Compute your deductions from rental income based on the percentage of days rented divided by total days of use. If you rent your home 90 days and use it 10 days, you may deduct 90 percent of your operating expenses and

depreciation. If, however, your personal use exceeds 14 days or 10 percent of rental use (whichever is greater), your deductions are limited to no more than the gross rental income minus allocable interest and

If you rent your home less than 15 days, you have the option of not reporting the income nor deducting any expenses other than interest and taxes.




