## AIDS survives outside the body

CHICAGO (AP) - The AIDS virus remains active outside the body much longer than previously believed, but common
tants are sufficient to neutralize it, according to a new study. Tests conducted during a three-month study suggest the need for more careful guidelines for laboratory personnel working in AIDS research, scientists reported in an article to be published Friday in the Journal of the American Medical Society.
The tests showed that the virus can live up to 15 days in a waterbased solution of human blood cells at room temperature outside the body. As the temperature is increased, the virus can survive for increasingly shorter periods, the scientists said. Dried, the complet inactivation of the virus required three to seven days, the resea chers said.
