Examine Your Flues

Reports to the State Fire Marshal from December 10, 1910, to September 10, 1915, show that 3766 fires, or 15 percent of the total number that occurred iu dwellings, private boarding houses and other like occupancies were due to unsafe flues. Assuming that the same proportion of fires reported, "Cause Unknown," is due to unsafe flues, the total number is 4,580, or 20 percent of all such fires. Unsafe flues cause a larger number of fires than any other one thing to which fires are attributable. The saddest thing about this fact is that all such fires are preventable. They occur by reason of carelessness and indifference that almost amounts to criminal negligence. The season when fire must be had for warmth and comfort is almost here. HAVE YOU EXAMINED YOUR FLUES? The rules of ordinary prudence and business sagacity require that everyone make a careful examination of all flues in his property at the beginning of each season before fire is permitted in them. This precaution is absolutely imperative at the beginning of this season, and more especially so in the Gulf Coast country, and that portion of the State passed over by the recent hurricane. The high winds of that storm left in their wake a yeritable chaos of unsafe flues, which, if not put in order will cause the fire demon, with hellish glee, to follow the storm and take a fiendish delight in completely destroying what the wind only damaged. Again we ask: HAVE YOU EXAMINED YOUR FLUES AND PUT THEM IN GOOD ORDER? If you have not, DO IT NOW. If you do not, and a fire occurs by reason of your negligence, destroying valuable property of your own and perhaps that of your neighbor's as well, your conscience will rightfully accuse you as responsible for a fire that you could have prevented by heeding this warning to EXAMINE YOUR FLUES.



OUR PUBLIC FORUM

Henry N. Pope On Where is the Money?



The bankers of this state have undertaken the patriotic duty of providing money to relieve the distress of the present cotton crop. Conventions have been held, committees appointed and resolutions adopted which make a good beginning.

Most every kind of information has been given out on the subject except the amount of money available and rate of interest demanded on the cotton fund. The farmers would like to hear this phase of the subject discussed by the bankers. The crop is beginning to move, where is the money?

Will the bankers, who are willing to lend money, at the rate of six per cent per annum, on cotton stored in an interior warehouse the loan to terminate at the option of the farmer, please state the amount they have available for such purposes. We are fast approaching the time when the Texas bankers must fish or dig bait, and the

farmers of this state want to know what they can depend upon I recall the \$135,000,000 cotten pool of last year that spent its energies in discussing plans, organising committees, hurrying across the continent, sending telegram and giving out newspaper interviews but no money was available for lending purposes. Cotton is the thing and a movement that exhausts itself before it gets the money to the farmer had better never been started. A broken premise is werse than a drouth. I am not questioning the integrity of that movement but the results were disastrous to the farmer for the cotton was held down to a low price until it left the hands of the producer and every effort should be made to prevent repetition of that calamity.

Lending mency on cotton at a low rate of interest is as much the part

of the warehouse system as the warehouse itself. Building warehouses will not solve the problem and warehouses without meney would be of little use to the farmers. The purpose of the warehouse is to make the loan of the higher courts of the state. We banker more secure. If a banker would lend money to a farmer on cotton think Judge Hall could figure on held on a farm there would be little necessity for a public warehouse except as a safe and convenient means of storage.

The farmers will patronize the warehouse if it is to his interest to do The interest rate, storage and insurance charges will determine largely whether or not he will store his cotten. What are the rates? We now have on deposit in the banks of Texas about \$200,000,000. Is any part of it available for handling the Texas cotton crop?

It is time to get down to business. How much money have the bankers available for cotton loans and what do they want for it? That is the question and its answer determines the prosperity of the farmer of the South.

The farmers are depending upon the Texas bankers to handle this year's erop and I have no doubt they will do so for they have announced a willing. ness to do it and are thoroughly capable of the task, but the danger of all public movements is that we urge and expect the other fellow to put up the funds, hence the question where is the money?



Writes Very Interesting Letter on Board Ship Rturning to the Foreign Mission Field.

3. S. Mongolia, sept. 2, 1915. Dear Earl and Jennie :-

We are now more than a day' sailing out of Honolulu, and it has just been announced by the official bulletin that we will pass the "Siberia" S. S. tomorrow about noon and that mail will be transferred, so I will this afternoon write you some more about our lovely voyage and stop:over in Honolulu.

On account of the exceedingly large amount of freight and baggage to be loaded in San Francisco, we were a few hours late in leaving and so we arrived in Honolulu a bit late, however, we came in sight of the islands early in the morning of August 31.

We anchored in the harbor in full sight of the beautiful city about 11:30 and the physician and other officials came out and looked the ship's crew and passengers over to see if there was any contagion on board, then we sailed right into dock, (the harbor there is said to be one of the deepest and finest in the world) and all went ashore for a sight see of the wondertully beautiful little city.





