FIREMEN FIXIN' FOR BIG DOINGS ON SEPT. 4

BALL GAME, TOO

Vega Outlaws May Furnish Opposition for the Whitefaces

A ball game and another one of those famous Firemen's Fracas will be used by the people of Hereford as a means of fittingly celebrating Labor Day, which falls on Monday, September 4.

According to present plans the ball game will be between the Whitefaces and some team to be agreed upon, possibly the Vega Outlaws, if they accept the proposition made them. The game will fall in the afternoon, while the Fracas will be held at the Stock Pavilion at night.

Chief Rockwell of the Firemen announces the following tentative program for the fracas:

Wrestling: Littrell Spratt vs. Sam Hamby.

Boxing: Ilo Chamness vs. J. M. Murchison; Baker vs. Pierce; Kid Caskey vs. Bruner; Red Alban vs. P. G. Sisk.

An effort is also being made to secure five real negroes from Amarillo for a free-for-all climax. Arrangements will also probably be made for the Hereford Band to assist the Firemen in the evening's entertainment.

More complete details are being worked out and will be announced between now and the date of the celebration.

Wheat Show May Include Exhibit Of This Section

Wichita, Kansas, Aug. 21.—Extensive exhibits of the farm products of Northwest Texas are being sent to the International Wheat and Farm Products Exposition, which is to be held in Wichita from September 25 to October 7, by the West Texas Chamber of Commerce with headquarters at Stamford, Texas.

This organization has sent several large and interesting exhibits to the Wheat Show in past years, and this year asks for as much space as can be spared them, which would indicate that it hopes to outdo itself. The exhibit will comprise the most characteristic and successful soil products of West Texas, such as the grain sorghums and wheat.

The West Texas Chamber of Commerce has done much to colonize and develop its tributary territory in the past and has brought thousands of settlers to Western Texas. As the Wheat Show has as its avowed purpose the greater development of the Southwest as a whole, the union of this commercial body to it presages great results.

An effort is being made at Hereford to secure samples of grain native to this section to be included in this display. D. L. McDonald is chairman of a committee for this purpose and will be very glad to hear from anyone in this section with good grain samples for display. Or telephone The Brand and arrangements will be made to collect any such samples. Wheat, kafir, maize, sorghum, etc., both in threshed or unthreshed state is what is desired.

Mike Chews Up Badger In Desperate Struggle

Mike, seventy pound bull pup, pal and first lieutenant of Night Watchman Omer Baker, had one ear slightly lower than the other Tuesday morning, his face was somewhat disfigured and his neck and body were mutilated—chewed up, in other words. Mike was still and languid and lacked his usual pep, but there was an air of the conqueror about him and he looked at you with an air as much as to say: "Bring on the next one, I'm ready!"

Back of the Stockmen's Cafe there hangs the carcass of one of the biggest badgers discovered in these parts for many a moon—a regular, honest-to-goodness country badger, that, according to all circumstantial evidence, had sneaked into town Monday night on a chicken raid and had been highly successful in his quest until he unfortunately ran afoul of Mike and the Watchman. When Mr. Baker performed the last rites upon his carcass Tuesday morning he was found to be full of somebody's fine blooded chickens.

The encounter between Mike and the badger occurred at 3:00 a. m. Tuesday morning in front of the Magnolia Filling Station and was one of the bloodiest and most exciting contests of the kind ever pulled off here, says the Watchman. Mr. Baker and the pup were making their rounds in the dead quiet of the small hours when Mike jumped the badger from the flowers across the street from the station. The husky pair tied in and fought all over the pavement of two connecting streets, Tuesday morning the square about the courthouse looked like the slaughtering pen of a butcher's establishment. For over thirty minutes the animals fought it out. Mr. Baker says the badger wrapped himself about Mike's neck, pinning him severely, and really took the first six rounds on points and bites. But then Mike got a new hold, on the badger's back, and literally beat him to death on the pavement under foot. The badger was game and fought until the last gasp.

Mr. Baker says he came within an ace of calling out the fire department just so the boys could witness the dandiest scrap pulled here since before Mike was a pup.

SCOUTS ARE SUN-BURNED AND CHEERY

HAD GREAT TIME WHEN CAMPING IN THE MOUNTAINS

CLIMBED A PEAK

Went 9,000 Feet to Top. Nicely Entertained at Roswell

Sunburned, scratched up and tired, but happy, Hereford's troop of Boy Scouts, fifteen strong, rolled into town Monday night after a week's splendid camping trip into the mountains of New Mexico.

The Scouts left Hereford August 16, under leadership of Rev. J. R. Sharp and Allen Bell. They traveled in the two cars belonging to these gentlemen and their baggage and camp equipment was hauled in a truck generously donated for the occasion by H. G. Conwright. They camped the first night near Roswell and the next morning went on into the foothills of the El Capitan mountains, camping on a stream near a nice spring, on the south side of the mountains. This spot is in the Lincoln National Forest on an Indian reservation and is a beautiful place of timber and scenery. The U. S. Forest Rangers were nearby and one night the boys listened to a lecture about the work of forest preservation by our government. The boys climbed to the top of El Capitan mountain, 9,000 feet in altitude, straight up through the rough and not with the aid of any path or road.

After four days in this camp the boys went back through Roswell and out to the Fin & Feather Club, at the Bottomless Lakes, where they were admitted through the courtesy of H. P. Saunders, president of the Citizens National Bank of Roswell. Courtesies were extended by the Roswell people, especially by Superintendent Pope of the public schools, who took the boys for a fine swim at the Roswell Country Club.

The Scouts financed this trip themselves by selling the automobile "Hereford" signs and through the magical performance given just before their departure. Their general health was good and they returned much benefited mentally and physically by their experience.

The Coal Strike

President Harding in a recent letter to Governor Groesbeck of Michigan says:

"It is a matter of record that coal operators and miners workers in many districts have been quite ready to come to an understanding in very short order, but the policy of the national organization is hostile to any district or state arrangement. This apparently is one of the issues involved and is one which must be definitely settled.

"I do not know of any way of settling it under the legal authorities which are now possessed by either State or Federal Government.

"Manifestly, legislation must be provided and I mean to submit the whole problem to Congress at the earliest consistent time possible after the House reassembles.

"If the coal producers of the United States were so organized that a national body were to determine the policy of every member and permit no sales of coal except on dictation of terms by the national officials, every State Legislature and Congress itself would instantly put an end to such a practice.

"The mine workers unhesitatingly assume national dictation. It is the big issue involved in the present dispute. Frankly, I think it must be dealt with if we are to have any security and any insurance of a supply of fuel."

What do you think of laws that permit a dozen labor leaders to shut down the industries of a nation of one hundred million people? Isn't it about time this was changed?
