Election for County Hospital Bonds.

On last Monday night a number of citizens met to discuss the advisability and feasibility of the issue which our Commissioners Court has placed before the voters. That is, shall we vote the \$25,000 bonds on November 18th for the purpose of erecting a county hospital? In the meeting on last Monday night, the citizens of Hereford only, were present, but it was there decided to call another meeting and request the attendance of all the citizens of the county. In the first meeting the ministry, the legal profession, the medical profession, the bankers, merchants, etc., were represented. We want the farmers, the stockmen, the laborers, the money lenders, the women, and all other classes to meet at the county court house on next Monday night, November 18th, for the purpose of a full and free discussion, both pro and con, as to whether or not it is best to vote for or against the issuance of these bonds to the amount of \$25,000 on November 18th. This business proposition is before us and we have got to meet it. There is no chance to dodge it. Our staying away from the polls and taking no stock in the election on the 18th will not relieve us of avoiding the issue. We have got to buy that county hospital and pay \$25,000 for it on November 18th, or we have got to refuse to buy. We had as well post ourselves as to whether or not we will gain or lose by buying that hospital. If it is not a good investment let us vote against the bond. If it is a good investment, let us vote for the bond.

Every person in Deaf Smith county is requested to meet at the court house at 7:30 sharp - this means at exactly 7:30 p. m. - Monday, November 6th, and have a full discussion, and give his or her views about the matter.
