## Texas Expects Deaf Smith County to Do Her Duty by Making it Unanimous for Culberson Saturday

### FATAL ACCIDENT

#### Children of Mr. and Mrs. Loren Stead Accidentally Poisoned.

The hearts of all were inexpressibly saddened Friday evening when the news was brought to town that little Raymond and Beulah Stead, children of Mr. and Mrs. Loren Stead living on the Pratt ranch had died from the effects of poison, thought to have been strychnine tablets, which the children had found and eaten. The empty bottle lying where they had been playing was mute evidence of the agency by which they came to their death.

The tragedy occurred about 5 p. m., both children when first noticed being desperately ill. Fearing poison, an emetic was at once given and the father ran to a neighbors to phone for a doctor. The little boy, a baby of only two years, died during his father's absence, his death being followed by that of his sisters just as the doctor arrived. The little girl was four years of age.

The bodies were brought to Hereford on Friday evening and prepared for burial at Black's undertaking parlors, Saturday afternoon at three o'clock, a short funeral service was held at the Baptist Church, conducted by Rev. Mc Clurkin and interment was made in the city cemetery.

### EVERY CITIZEN A VOTER

The proudest possession of every man in Texas today is his citizenship. There is nothing for which he will willingly barter it away and allow himself to become "A Man Without a Country."

A man can suffer no greater indignity than that which deprives him of citizenship and brands him an outcast among his fellows, yet it is too true that many are indifferent to the high privileges and obligations which citizenship implies, and by their indifference prove their unworthiness.

The man who is so lost to a sense of his duty as to remain away from the polls upon election day and have no voice in the naming of those who shall represent him in the law-making body of the land is distinctly lacking either in his understanding of his obligations as a citizen or in loyalty to the country, the benefits of whose citizenship he enjoys.

On next Saturday, August 26th, an election will be held at all the voting boxes in Deaf Smith County to nominate a candidate for the United States Senate. Ample funds have been provided to pay the officers who hold the election and make the returns, just as was the case in the run-off for the sheriff's office on Saturday the 12th.

It is the imperative duty, to say nothing of privilege for **Every voter to vote.** Let every man discharge his mind of the idea that this election is less important than a local election.

In the general primary of July 22nd, there were 535 votes polled. In the sheriff's run-off race on August 12th 543 votes were polled.

Surely every voter with the faintest spark of patriotic fire in his make-up will cast his vote in Saturday's election, than which, none of greater concern to the people of Texas has ever been held.

The election of next Saturday is the decisive battle in a conflict of principle. It is not so much a choice of men, as a choice between right and wrong.

Every vote will count.

Every vote is needed.

Let every voter, as he values his citizenship exercise the prerogative that citizenship confers upon him by casting his vote in the election for United States Senator Saturday, August 26th.

### Home Economics at Panhandle State Fair

In the woman's Department of the Panhandle State Fair for this year there are many things provided for which have been the subject of much thought and preparation by the ladies charge, and there is one feature which will no doubt appeal most eloquently to the women in all the homes all over the Panhandle. We refer to the "Home Economics Division" in charge of Mrs. Scott Laycock of Claude, and Mrs. Geo. Bishop of Panhandle. Class No. 39 in this Division provides premiums for the best county exhibit of food products prepared in the greatest variety of forms for home consumption. Each exhibit in this class is to be shown with the general exhibit from that county, but is to be judged separately for awards from a list of desirable specialties. The first prize being a silver cup, valued at \$25.00 offered by Mrs. W. A. Warner of Claude, who is the originator of this exhibit. The second prize is a silver cup valued at \$15.00 offered by the Fair Association. These are supplemented by a long list of prizes. It is expected that there will be a considerable number of exhibits in this class.

### Shipping Hogs.

Several loads of hogs have been shipped from Hereford this week.

These porkers are bringing good prices. Some are bringing as high as nine cents here. Already this year about 80 cars of hogs have been shipped from this section, most of them loaded at Hereford.

Over one hundred thousand dollars has been paid for hogs in this territory and there will probably be nearly as many more to go out as there are large numbers on feed.

Last year there were but 15 loads of hogs shipped from here during the entire year. This shows how rapidly the hog industry is growing. Where alfalfa can be raised, and that is any place here where irrigation is possible hog raising is very profitable.

Where alfalfa is not available Sudan grass is best for summer grazing. Mr. J. H. Bowers just west of town has been pasturing his hogs on Sudan grass and they have done well. The grass remained soft and green through the dry weather especially where it was grazed close.

From this on wheat and rye will furnish good fall and winter pasture.

With provision for pasture and for storing grain when it is plentiful and cheap, for times when it is scarce, hog raising here can be made more profitable than cattle raising. The returns are quick and not so much capital needed, besides it is more intensive farming than cattle grazing. However, both go well together.

### S. J. Williams Hurt.

What might have been a much more serious accident occurred Thursday evening when S. J. Williams was thrown from the seat of the Williams Bros. delivery wagon by the sudden starting of the horse. He suffered only slight injuries however, though he was unable to attend to his work for a few days.

### The Coast Storm.

The following vivid description of the gulf storm recounted by an eye witness has in addition to its merits as an accurate account of the storm the touch of personal interest which is always appreciated. The story is taken from a letter written Saturday to Mrs. O. G. Hill by her father, Attorney W. C. Jones of Robston, formerly a resident of Hereford. Robstown is located about 15 miles from Corpus Christi.

On account of the fury of the driving storm I was unable to post my letter to you yesterday, which I hurriedly finished and got down from the second story of the building, where my office is located. And now amid the wreck and ruin and desolation and distorted condition of things in my office, I will write the sequel to the said letter.

A few minutes after I went down stairs, I was standing on the front porch, under the awning, when a terrific gust, more powerful than any preceding it, drove in the fire wall to the Paul building at the same time came rolling across the street, the large tank that stood just in the rear of said building and amid hundreds of other pieces of debris, the roofing, paper roofing, and every imaginable thing that was loose and many that were torn loose by the force of the wind, I never noticed the large part of the wall falling. The noise was terrific and the damage is great; but so far as I have learned, no lives were lost at this place, though many buildings are blown down, others torn and twisted, so that carpenters are in great demand this morning. I can give no detailed report of the damage, only such as I can see from my window the large glass of which is blown out and broken into millions of pieces. The storm had free access to my office after the windows gave in and everything is in ruin, broken and scattered over the office, save that which was carried out through the windows, and are now probably in old Mexico.

The front of Robertson's Grocery Store, Raynders, the Bakery, the meat market, are blown in, the roofs torn off and the goods greatly damaged or probably ruined. The Baptist and Christian churches are twisted around and greatly damaged; the cotton warehouse is scattered everywhere, no two pieces being left together; the two brick smokestacks at the glass are torn all to pieces; W. W. Wright's porches and the roof to his house are things of the past. Mrs. Fagan's house is in ruins, the Methodist parsonage is twisted around and the porch gone, all tanks and windmills are down. I cannot give any more of the details, but will send you a newspaper later giving the details. I will say, however that it filled my house with water, wetting everything but the beds, two of my setting hens nests down and destroyed the eggs, and the wind to do that had to blow through cracks in the building and the nests were nailed to the wall; turned over my closet; tore the gates all down; blew off the tin guttering.

The storm began at about 10 o'clock a. m. and never let up till about 1 o'clock a. m. the next day. I was never scared but I was very uneasy and never went to bed till about 11 o'clock. When I awoke, everything was quiet. I have never seen anything like this hurricane and never want to again.

### ALL PANHANDLE SOAKED

#### Five Inch Rain Insures Plenty of Feed.

The drought that has continued for many weeks has at last been broken by good rains that have been general all over this part of Texas.

The rains began last week with showers in different parts on Saturday and Sunday night heavy rains came amounting to two and a half inches. On Monday night a two inch rain visited the entire section. All the lakes are well filled. The lake in the north part of town is assuming proportions like it did in the spring of 1915 and is already offering local riding for the boys.

While the rains are too late to make the immense yields of grain sorghums that grew here last year, they came in time to make abundance of feed and much grain.

The ground will be in excellent condition for plowing for wheat and rye and much of this will doubtless be sown for fall and winter pasture. The rains are early enough to give a good growth of grass before frost so that it may cure for winter feed.

I caught her by the arm and led her back into the building and told her it would not do to get out there; that was when the tank and other things were flying across the street and the air was full of flying debris. She quietly permitted me to turn her back, but she was sure panic stricken.

W. J. just came up and warned me I had better get out of this building, as it is likely to fall in on account of the fire wall that fell on the roof; but that is all at the extreme north end and I think there is no danger.

## HEREFORD'S ANNIVERSARY

On the first day of September Hereford will have its 17th birthday anniversary. Just seventeen years ago September first, the first house was started on what is now the site of this flourishing little city. It was built on the east side of what is now the lower end of Main Street.

This event will be celebrated at least by the Old Settlers Association, which organization will hold their second annual picnic on that day.

When we consider that less than two decades ago all this section was an unbroken prairie with only here and there a cow camp and now see this thriving town of three thousand people with good schools and churches, good homes and hospitable people and the country settled with many good farmers, it should inspire us with hope for the future. Twenty years is a short space of time in the life of a city yet what may not happen in twenty more years here? None of us perhaps realize what twenty years will bring to this section. In less time than that all this shallow water will be utilized in growing crops and in many places intensive agriculture will be carried on. Good farm houses and barns will dot these prairies and all will take on a substantial air in less than twenty years. Another twenty years will see land values triple. Hereford will become a good business center for a large and prosperous section.

## THE PANHANDLE A DROUGHT RESISTER

It has been again demonstrated that this section of Texas can stand as much drought as any portion of the United States and then give a good account of itself. With only a few light showers since planting time gives us one of the driest seasons on record here. There is now every promise of abundance of feed to take care of the cattle with a fairly good grain crop. The wheat yield was much better than anticipated earlier and the quality was first class.

Another thing very evident is that the best cultivation has given the best results. In the few fields where the ground was deep-plowed and then thoroughly cultivated and kept clear of weeds, the crops have stood the dry weather remarkably well and will make good yields. There is one thing certain, this drought has left this country in much better condition to take care of its stock than the drought that visited the corn belt states this year has done. Once our farmers learn to summer fallow more and till better this country is not likely to suffer more from droughts than the corn belt sections. Where the land was summer fallowed last year the wheat crop is about the average in quantity and quality.

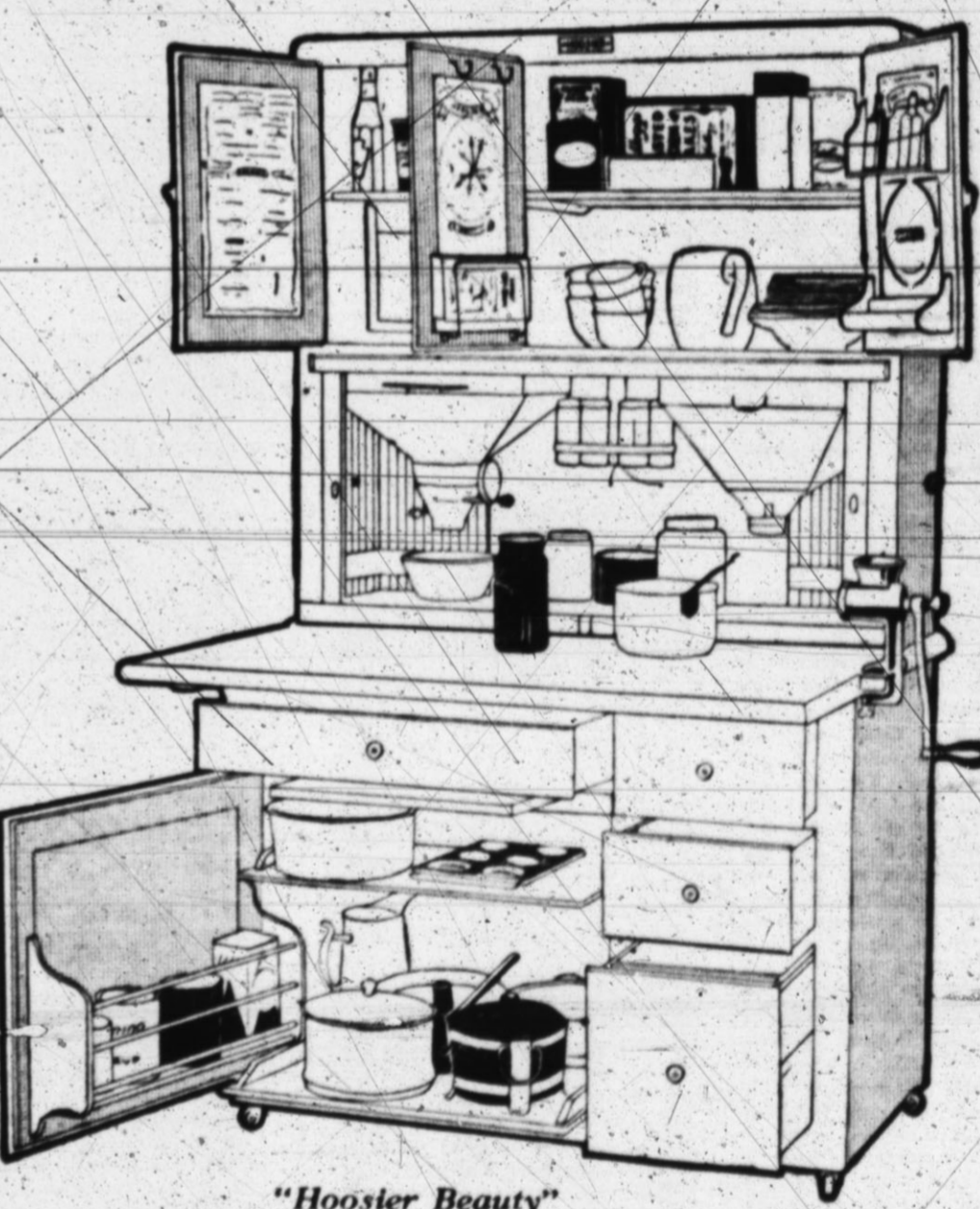
