

Flowers for Winter

WASHINGTON, Nov.J.—Steps e taken at this season (fall) for placing the flower garden in shape of plants grown and the latitude, say to thaw. specialists of the U.S. Department of agriculture. In the case of perennials, which die down to the ground but which should live through the winter and send up shoots again on the advent of warm weather the roots should be well mulched with manure 3 or : inches deep as soon as the ground freezes. In this group are included Sall, spirea, mock orange and illaes. such plants as peonies, larkspur. hollyhock, columbines, /iris, saltycodones, Harrison, and perennial poppies. CANNAS AND KINDRED PLANTS

Plants such as cannas, dahlies, gladiolas and Caladiums should have their roots dug up and stored in a cellar. where the temperature will not rise above 60 degrees nor fall below 50 degrees Fahrenheit. The root slumps of cannas and dahlias should not be shaken free of soil. These plants with the soil naturally adhering to them should be placed on racks or in slat boxes so that air may circulate among them. It is important that the roots do not become too warm or dry and cers connived at the theft when they




