

Animal control poison charges are strengthened

Proponents of changes in Hereford's animal control policy will appear at the Hereford city commission meeting at 7:30 p.m. Monday at City Hall.

Lynn Dawson, who also appeared at the July 1 city commission meeting, is on the agenda for Monday night.

Commissioners are expected to also receive a four page, handwritten letter from Hereford resident Kay Cavin concerning her complaints about the Hereford animal control program.

Dawson, in a telephone conversation with the **Brand** last week, claimed the city is using Sucostrin, a lethal drug, in darts used to control dangerous dogs. That refutes the statement made by Police Chief Don Brush made to the **Brand** last Tuesday. Brush said, in a story in Wednesday's **Brand**, that "we certainly don't use poison in the gun."

Brush was out of town and not available for comment on Friday, according to a police dispatcher.

Dawson claimed that animal control officers use Zylazine HCI, a sedative, and Sucostrin in darts fired in a rifle to control some dogs. She said the city uses FP3 to euthanize dogs. The FP3 is used in a syringe, with the dosage adjusted to match the dog's weight.

Dawson said she visited with Capt. Pat Michael (who was also taking a vacation day Friday and was unavailable for comment) last week, and Michael told her that the darts containing the Zylazine HCI and Sucostrin had been kept in the same box in the animal control pickup until an incident last Jan. 19 in which a dog was accidentally killed by Animal Control Officer Butch Trevino with a dart believed to have been loaded with Sucostrin.

The dog that was killed belonged to Jim and Kay Cavin of Hereford.

Mrs. Cavin, in a letter addressed to Mayor Tom LeGate, explained that she had been attempting to have a Weimaraner "that had been a pest in the neighborhood for months" caught by Trevino.

Cavin said in the letter that she had called Trevino out several times and had reminded Trevino not to mistake the Cavin's Black Labrador, "Sug," for the other dog.

Cavin's letter said:

"On Jan. 19, he was slow to respond and I had forgotten about the call, with the dog in question long gone. I was standing at my back door sweeping when I heard a noise in the yard. I looked up, horrified to see Butch's upper torso hanging over my fence with a gun aimed at my dog house. Sug came running out of the dog house with a stricken look. I was shocked! I stepped out on the patio and said, 'Butch, that's my dog! You shot my dog.'

"His exact words were, 'That dart will kill her. There's stuff in there that will kill her.'"

Mrs. Cavin said the dog, shaking, ran into the house.

"The look in her eyes will always be with me," Mrs. Cavin said.

Mrs. Cavin said her husband went into their backyard, had a verbal confrontation with Trevino, and recovered the dart. She said Trevino demanded the dart be returned, but the Cavins have kept the dart and intend to have a laboratory analysis of the red-feathered dart.

The Cavins loaded up their dog to take it to Dr. Ronda Clark at Hereford Veterinary Clinic. The dog died on the way, and efforts by Clark to revive the dog failed.

Brock receives Key Club honor

PCS stresses self-help

Individuals and families who appear at Panhandle Community Services in Hereford seeking help very often have one thing in common -- a very low self-esteem.

Once they learn that PCS is not a "welfare" program but is dedicated to "helping people help themselves," their attitude changes, observes Celia Serrano, coordinator of the Hereford PCS Center.

PCS "clients" learn early on that the primary goal is to help them find their own niche and achieve self-sufficiency.

As they achieve their own goals, there is a parallel rise in self-esteem.

Thirteen PCS centers are located in the Texas Panhandle, serving all 26 counties. Deaf Smith and Parmer Counties are yoked for administrative purposes.

PCS, formerly known as Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation, is observing its 25th anniversary, founded in 1966, during the administration of President Lyndon Johnson.

His "Great Society" programs offered a myriad of projects. Community Services is a self-help program that has survived through the administrations of five presidents.

Defined as a "private, non-profit corporation," Panhandle Community Services administers a variety of programs funded by federal and state money. Counties join in support in some ways, also.

The PCS office in Hereford has been serving the community since 1969. At different times, PCS has offered alcoholism counseling, senior citizen activities and planned parenthood, but turned those projects over to other agencies.

Enduring through the years, though, have been programs related to nutrition and housing.

One of the better known is commodities distribution, started several years ago to make good use of overabundant production by the nation's farmers.

Last month, 3,774 persons received food items through the program. In April -- commodities are distributed in alternating months -- the number was much lower, 1,570.

The coordinator explains the large increase, "I think there were more in June because of migrant workers."

Providing transportation is a growing program in Panhandle Community Services. In Hereford, as in many other communities, there is

no public transportation system, either bus or taxi.

The transportation program was initiated about five years ago, in response to this problem.

The center here has two mini-vans and a bus, operated by two fulltime drivers and a parttime driver.

Available to anyone who needs the service, transportation is provided within the area for such needed trips as doctor's appointments and to Amarillo for medical attention.

"We have 10 people who go to Amarillo three times a week for kidney dialysis," reports Serrano.

A fee of 25 cents per mile, one-way, to Amarillo is charged. Within Hereford, the cost is 50 cents per mile, one-way.

"The average for a trip to Amarillo is less than \$25," Serrano points out. In a single month, the service was provided for more than 1,000 persons, she adds.

Several different programs help the homeless and provide families with more comfortable living quarters.

Through HUD, families with low income may move into housing that costs no more than 30 percent of their income. Property owners apply for HUD renters and must meet certain standards to qualify.

"There is some misunderstanding about this program," explains Serrano, "because people think the owner has to rent to anyone who shows up, but the landlord can ask for references or turn down a renter."

Grant money also is provided through Panhandle Community Services, Serrano continues, to help the "homeless," to assist with rent on a one-time basis only.

"Operation Bootstrap" is a special rent assistance program designed to assist persons seeking post-secondary education. Through the PCS project, the recipient pays no more than 30 percent of net adjusted income toward housing rent.

Weatherization is a unique project that is limited by funding but brings housing up to better energy utilization by insulating homes and, in other ways, making the house more energy efficient.

Emergency Nutrition-Temporary Emergency Relief Program helps low income persons in dire emergency situations with such needs as prescriptions, housing, food, transportation and medical expense.

When the north winds howl and the mercury drops into the freezing zone, heating bills climb -- and the Energy Crisis program is geared to help families with bona fide emergencies with their bills.

PCS depends a great deal on volunteer help, especially in commodities distribution. Serrano says 40, or more, volunteers help with that task.

The Center also maintains a roster of senior citizens willing to do volunteer work in nonprofit agencies in the community.

While no price tag could be placed on the PCS programs' value to persons needing help, there is a sizeable economic infusion in the community.

No other single county in the Panhandle reaps the benefits that accrue to Deaf Smith County. Only the

Recession stress

Families pulled apart by financial problems

The young families come in a sad, steady stream. For Merlene Wall, director of social services in Charlotte, N.C., these are the faces of recession.

They come for food stamps, maybe help with drug or alcohol dependence. Some must be taught how to keep a grip on frustration and anger - emotions that may translate into child abuse or neglect during tough economic times.

"Many of these people have been self-sufficient all their adult lives, so it's hard on them to ask for help," Wall said. "It's a matter of pride, and the source of some real pain."

Much as in other areas hard hit by recession, social workers in Mecklenburg County have seen a nearly 50 percent increase this year in their welfare caseloads, while reports of child abuse shot up to nearly 400 last month.

"The ambiguity and insecurity is what's most stressful. It can pull families apart," said Charles Hennon, editor of the journal "Lifestyles: Family and Economic Issues."

About 8.6 million Americans were unemployed this spring, compared with 6.7 million a year ago. The number of children living in poverty has climbed to about 12.6 million - 2.2 million more than a decade ago.

"I'm supposedly middle class," Jessica Kopp, a divorced mother of two college-age sons said in Oxford, Ohio. "My ex-husband is a professor and I was a teacher. But the reality is, I'm poor ... and it's a real strain."

Kopp is tired of saying no. "I'm tired of talking about money, of saying we can't do this, we can't afford that," she said. "It exhausts me and makes me feel terribly, terribly guilty."

Guilt is common among parents barely getting by. They are also embarrassed, frightened, angry and intimidated by an insecure future.

"We get a lot of callers who are finding themselves less supported and more scared, trapped, depressed," said Ulla-Britt Jonsson, who runs a parental stress hotline at the Novato (Calif.) Human Needs Center. "There's a definite sense of desperation."

Many parents find themselves short-tempered and preoccupied with finding work, juggling bills,

reassessing their financial limits. Meanwhile, amidst the worry and distraction, children are often overlooked.

Increases in child abuse and neglect have not been directly correlated with downturns in the economy, but financial stress has been identified as a factor in 41 percent of such cases, according to the Denver-based American Humane Association.

And during the 1981-82 recession, researchers linked parental distraction to an increase in such household accidents as bathtub drownings and scaldings. Meanwhile, the number of children hospitalized with stress-related asthma attacks also rose dramatically.

"Children are the most vulnerable," said sociologist Paula Rayman of Wellesley College's Center for Research on Women. "They are very troubled psychologically because they ... are totally impotent to do anything."

Adolescents may be particularly sensitive to financial strains. In many cases, they've come to take for granted annual family vacations and the promise of a college education.

"And very often, those plans get flushed down the toilet," said Tony Jurich, a family therapist and professor at Kansas State University. "Kids that before might have gotten some parental help are suddenly on their own."

The confusion is often heightened by the pressure many teen-agers feel to keep up with the latest fad, own the hottest new album, the snazziest sneakers.

"Suddenly, your dad's been laid off and your status drops off," Jurich said. "That's when the parents need to approach the adolescent and say, 'OK, I want you to understand the situation.' That gives them information."

Experts advise discussing the family's financial situation at the dinner table, looking together for ways to conserve gas or electricity, plan inexpensive meals or weekend entertainment.

"For many families it can be a positive experience to re-examine what is important and what is optional," said Knight Kiplinger, editor of Kiplinger's Personal Finance Magazine. "It's amazing how you can redefine as frills things that you once thought were essential."

Instead, however, parents often try to protect their kids - an understandable, if flawed strategy.

Without frank discussion, children are apt to imagine the worst.

In times like these, family support can be of tremendous help.

Only three of their 13 kids are living at home today, but Flora and Oneal Russ' budget is tighter than ever. The emergency fund is on empty and improvements on their Pinehurst, N.C., home will have to wait.

"Prayer and working together helped me get over the emotional stress, the hopelessness and despair," said Oneal, 55, who had to take leave from his job inspecting meat after suffering a stroke in 1988. "I definitely would feel isolated without the church community and my family's support."

Unfortunately, such support systems aren't always what they once were. Social agencies are strapped by government cutbacks, extended families are ever rarer and many feel alienated from church and other local institutions.

Meanwhile, some couples find themselves distanced rather than drawn closer by financial strains. Out of fear or a sense of powerlessness, husbands and wives may withdraw - just when they need each other most.

They may instead seek escape through drugs, alcohol and late nights away from home. Temps flare more

easily, but where to turn for help amidst the confusion? Many, sadly, turn further inward.

"Assumptions about themselves and their world are shattered and can run the full range from depression to questioning one's competency," said Ramsay Liem, a psychologist at Boston College. "It can be very scary."

A woman who called herself Jane Doe told the story in an op-ed piece published recently in The New York Times. She and her husband, both college graduates, saw their world suddenly transformed after both lost their jobs:

"At Christmastime I saw my husband shake my son violently, yelling at him. He adores that child. I've never seen him so angry," the woman wrote.

"I knocked my husband to the floor, trying to strangle him in front of the Christmas tree. My son stood at a safe distance on the stairs and said, 'Guys, guys ... it's Christmas!' We broke my grandmother's coffee table in the struggle. We are not violent people."

It's a scene Marilyn Mason, a family therapist in Minnesota, fears is being played out around the nation as jobs are lost.


"In our culture, the myth has been that one's worth is measured by one's economic development. If you've got a good job, you're a good man and father," said Mason, author of "Making Our Lives Our Own."

The mindset isn't easily altered, but there are strategies for staving off destructive self-doubt. In church basements and town halls around the country, unemployed workers meet to offer each other moral support, leads on jobs and in some cases financial assistance.

"It's very difficult to maintain an even keel when you're worried about your self-image and finances and the mortgage," said Steve Cotton, one of thousands who recently lost jobs at General Dynamics Corp. in Fort Worth, Texas.

"But if you don't remain focused, you fall into a downward spiral very quickly," said Cotton, 36, who has started his own consulting business. "The pressures build up and that can endanger a marriage - or a whole family."

euthanasia compounds versus sedative compounds, as well as the physical segregation of the needles and the drugs into independent boxes which are clearly marked with their contents," said the city attorney's letter.

Mrs. Cavin said simple replacement of "Sug" won't be enough.

"We had Sug since the day she was born, five years ago," Mrs. Cavin said. "We loved her and miss her terribly. You cannot imagine what our drive to the vets was like. Sug's heart was beating, but her respiratory system had quit functioning. We were desperate, but knew it was hopeless. I don't know when or if our family will forget or forgive. I do know that the City of Hereford owes us more than an offer to buy us a new dog. That won't right the wrong."

The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m. in the City Hall.



County to see maps

A first look at proposals for changes in Deaf Smith County Commissioner Precinct lines will be laid before commissioners at a special meeting Tuesday.

Bob Bass of the Austin legal firm hired to prepare the county's new precinct boundaries will make a presentation at the meeting, beginning at 1 p.m., in commissioners court-room.

The commission engaged the Austin firm of Jim Allison and Associates to prepare the redistricting proposals. Bass is associated with the law firm.

County Judge Tom Simons reports that the computerized projections will be unveiled for the first time for the commission.

Based on figures from the 1990 U.S. Census, commissioner precinct boundaries as well as voting precincts must be in place and approved by the U. S. Justice Department before elections of 1992.

Each commissioner precinct must include 25 percent of the county's population.

"This will be our first look at some proposals," Simons says, adding that the law firm may present more than one proposal for consideration.

Simons also says that hearings on the precinct boundaries will be conducted at a later date.



July 8

San Antonio Light on Supreme Court:

Thurgood Marshall's resignation from the U.S. Supreme Court confirms the final demise of the Warren Court, to the chagrin of liberals and the joy of conservatives. But this occasion should help activists of both persuasions finally recognize that most of this nation's problems should be dealt with by the legislatures, not in the courts.

That this point is not now accepted is illustrated by news stories about liberals scouring Clarence Thomas' past remarks for evidence to help defeat his nomination to succeed Marshall. ...

For too long, Americans have looked to the courts to settle policy issues that more properly belong in the political arena. Texas, for example, has abdicated many of its state government responsibilities to federal judges because the Legislature has been unwilling to deal with them. ...

Activists should not rely on the Supreme Court to do what they cannot persuade Congress to do. And Congress should not look to the court to settle policy issues that are the responsibility of the legislative branch.

July 7

Waco Herald-Tribune on strong governor:

Gov. Ann Richards listened to the voters during her campaign and is prepared to pass the message along to lawmakers during the special session - first, eliminate government waste and duplication.

Gov. Richards heard right. Texas voters want to make sure their government is trimmed to its optimum level of efficiency.

"They (Texas voters) believe that there is too much fat in government, that government needs to be cut," Richards said when she officially set a special legislative session on the budget for July 15. She said lawmakers will first consider spending cuts and agency consolidations.

The Legislature will be guided by Comptroller John Sharp's audit of Texas government that showed how \$5.2 billion could be saved or raised over the next two years primarily by cutting out fat and duplication and consolidating services. ...

Along those lines, Richards also should be supported in her attempt to seek the power to hire and fire heads of major agencies. She wants more direct and immediate control of agencies to make them more responsive to the will of the public. ...

The idea of a weak governor has far outlived its original purpose - to foil carpetbagging governors from wielding too much influence. Richards' plan would not affect rate-making bodies such as the Public Utility Commission or the State Board of Insurance. The governor needs the authority to hire agency heads with the advice and consent of the Senate in line with a typical corporate structure.

Liberals want 25% hike in tax dollars

On July 15, the state Legislature will reconvene in special session in Austin to formulate a budget. We will determine not only how much revenue we have for the next biennium, but how to spend the available funds.

This simple task will become very complicated because of the fundamental difference in what the so-called conservative legislators and the so-called liberal legislators believe to be best for our state. In truth, it is more of a conservative vs. liberal issue than a Democratic or Republican issue.

The figures are clear because we know approximately what we will spend in 1990-91 and what revenues we can expect without additional taxes in 1991-93. In the 1990-91 biennium, Texas spent \$47 billion. We will have available revenues of \$52.3 billion without a tax increase in 1991-93. That constitutes a \$5.3 billion or 11 percent increase in government spending. The Democratic leadership wants another \$6 billion, which would mean government would grow 25 percent from 1990-91 through 1992-93.

Our leaders are committed to the continual out-of-control growth of government. I will be voting "no" to all tax increases. I have worked on a plan with the House Republican caucus and am confident that we can fund all essential services with our present income.

Government is out of control. Did you know that the Texas Education Agency has more than 1,100 employees? The state only has 1,058 schools. That equals over one person supervising each school, and they have the nerve to use terms like "site-based management" and "local control."

Also, while our businesses and families in the Panhandle have been cutting back, over 15,000 new state employees and over 26,000 local government employees were hired during a period from March 1, 1990 to March 1, 1991.

Did you know three of the fastest-growing budgets in Austin are those of the governor, lieutenant governor and the House speaker? Government is out of control.

Comptroller John Sharp has just determined how to save \$3 billion to \$4 billion. Some leaders are beginning to say, "Well, maybe we don't need an income tax." Do you know why they found these savings and why we do not need the tax? Because they have heard you say so.

State government needs to look to hard-working families for the solution. During tough economic times, the majority of families in Texas have established a budget and most importantly, have learned to live within that budget. They have learned to make their money go farther and work harder. In short, Texans have learned to be fiscally responsible, and they have every right to expect the same of their state government. It is time for the people of Texas to demand that their elected officials learn how to balance a checkbook.

We are at a turning point. We can continue with a government out of control or we can find new ways to govern Texas. In John Sharp's Texas Performance Review, he quotes an old Texas saying: "If you always do what you've always done, you'll always get what you've already got."

I hope we can be bold and do something for Texas - not for personal gain, not for political gain and not for a political party, but for Texas.

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Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: When I was just 4 years old, I had my first outbreak of cold sores around my nose and lips. I'm now 24 and have occasional outbreaks. They usually appear from a bad cold, or after being sunburned.

I have read that these are herpes simplex and can be passed to the genitals. Is this true? I always thought my cold sores were just that—cold sores. Could they be herpes simplex?

How would a 4-year-old child get this? I was adopted at 6 days of age and know nothing of my medical history. Is there anything available that can help control these?

DEAR READER: You got those cold sores because you were kissed when you were 4 or sooner. Yes, you have herpes simplex. There are two types of herpes simplex viruses, type 1 and type 2. Type 1 is the usual cause for cold sores, also called fever blisters. Blood tests that measure antibodies developed after a person has been infected with the virus show that as many as 85 percent of the public has herpes simplex type 1. And the antibodies develop in early childhood.

Herpes simplex type 2, genital herpes, is also rather common, affecting at least one in five adults. Antibodies for this infection develop after puberty, reflecting when the population becomes sexually active and is commonly spread from sexual contact. However, you can have herpes simplex type 1 of the genital area and type 2 of the oral area—again spread by contact. It used to be said that type 1 was above the belt and type 2 below the belt, but changing sexual habits has made that distinction not so neat any more.

Bradley leads hot Open

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — To hear Pat Bradley tell it, hauling cement across a hot roof would surely be more fun and less arduous than competing for a U.S. Open golf championship under the prevailing conditions.

And she's the co-leader.

Bradley, the LPGA's top money winner, and little-known Joan Pitcock took a 1-shot edge into today's third round after a marathon 5-hour duel with the long, hard, dry, hot, windswept Colonial Country Club course, site of the 46th women's Open.

"I am a little surprised to be leading," said Bradley, the 1981 Open champion, who bogeyed two of the final four holes.

"Is it golf or is it pocket pool?" grumbled Pitcock of the unpredictable greens.

Bradley fired a 73 Friday after an opening 69 and her even-par 142 matched Pitcock's 70-72 and was a shot ahead of veterans Amy Alcott and Alice Ritzman. Two back at 144 was another tour regular, Debbie Massey.

"It was a long day," Bradley said

of the slow play. "Five hours is a long time to be out there. I guess we all expect to deal with the heat, wind and tough putting conditions."

Pitcock was even harsher:

"The pace of play is absolutely pitiful. I don't know what's going on out there, but something has to be done. I sat on my golf bag all day long."

Pitcock, who celebrated her 24th birthday Friday, said nobody expected her to be leading except possibly herself and that "Honestly, I don't expect to win. But I am at that point in my career..."

Alcott sliced three shots from par for a 68, Ritzman matched par 71 and Massey recorded her second straight 72.

With 29 tour victories, Alcott needs only another conquest to qualify for the LPGA Hall of Fame and she could only laugh when asked how she'd like that pivotal triumph to come in a major such as this one.

"That would be exciting," she said. "Probably the most exciting thing I can think of at this moment."

Alcott said she took cart No. 68 to the driving range Friday and told her caddy Bill Kure: "That's a good

number — all those loops and curlicues. That would be a good number to shoot today."

She did, but, like Bradley, it wasn't easy or entertaining.

"This is a great golf course, but it's tough, and it takes a lot of energy to play in the United States Open anyway," she said, recalling an exchange with Kurre on the 17th hole.

"I'm not having much blanketly—blank fun out here," she complained.

"You're not supposed to have fun," he snapped. "This is a survival test. It always has been and it always will be."

At the green, she knocked in a 28-foot birdie putt and yelled, "Now I'm having fun!"

Her 68 was the lowest of the tournament and propelled her back into the chase for the \$90,000 top prize, which suddenly was out of reach for Betsy King, who is seeking an unprecedented third straight Open trophy.

King stumbled to a 78 and at 152 barely made the cut, 10 strokes behind the leaders.

Even Clemens failing Red Sox

The Boston Red Sox always turn to Roger Clemens, their bridge over troubled water.

But someone should have posted a "Bridge Out" sign Friday night, when Clemens failed to halt a slide in which Boston has fallen 7 1/2 games behind front-running Toronto in the American League East.

"I felt strong and thought I was making good pitches," said Clemens, who blew a 4-2 lead as the Red Sox lost 5-4 to the Minnesota Twins. "I got them to hit ground balls, but every ground ball seemed to take off and pick up speed."

Clemens (11-6) is only 6-5 after Boston defeats this year, compared to 67-17 in such situations in his first seven seasons. On Friday night, he allowed 11 hits in 6 1-3 innings.

Chili Davis had a game-winning single in the seventh inning.

Chuck Knoblauch opened the inning with a double and advanced on Kirby Puckett's sacrifice. After Kent Hrbek was walked intentionally, Davis hit a hard grounder by Clemens to break a 4-4 tie.

"I thought I had a chance to field it but it took one bounce and stayed on the ground," said Clemens. "The ball hit the bottom of my glove and got past me."

Davis' single made a winner of Paul Abbott (3-0), who pitched two perfect innings in relief. Rick Aguilera, the fourth Minnesota pitcher, worked a spotless ninth, striking out two for his 23rd save.

Blue Jays 6, Rangers 2

Pat Borders had a three-run double in support of David Wells as Toronto won for the 17th time in 20 games.

Borders broke a 2-2 tie, capping a four-run seventh inning. Wells (10-4) allowed two runs on five hits in seven innings before Duane Ward came on to get his 15th save.

Roberto Alomar and Joe Carter started the seventh with singles to chase Jose Guzman (4-4).

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Cowboys draw fans in Austin

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) - The Dallas Cowboys drew fans to their Austin training camp last year as if they had won the NFL championship.

Actually, they were the league's worst team, winning only one game in 1989. But the Cowboys were kings to the people of Travis County.

The Cowboys, one of the most glamorous of NFL franchises, relocated last year to Austin after decades of training at Thousand Oaks in cool and comfortable California. Nearly 100,000 fans trekked to the St. Edward's campus in three weeks of practice.

Dallas officials are expecting many more fans to turn out when they

check in Sunday for the start of practice. Two-a-day workouts begin Tuesday after a day off on Monday for a big golf outing.

"We should be getting some big turnouts even with the heat," said Dallas public relations director Rich Dalrymple.

For one thing, the Cowboys fell just a game shy of the playoffs with a 7-9 record that was such a dramatic improvement that it earned coach Jimmy Johnson NFL Coach of the Year honors in just his second year on the job.

Dallas was 1-15 in Johnson's rookie season after replacing Tom Landry.

The Cowboys have worked hard in the off-season with numerous

minicamps. Also, quarterback Troy Aikman has healed quickly from shoulder and elbow surgery and is throwing the football with more velocity.

Johnson, who loves to work his team in a hot climate, said Dallas will have to earn its respect all over again in the NFC East.

"Even though we were pleased with our progress last year, we are still not where we want to be," Johnson said. "What we did realize is that the hard work put in by our people during the off-season can pay off in wins."

One of the biggest items to watch will be the progress under the offense now that the much-criticized David Shula has left the Cowboys.

Johnson hired Norval Turner, who developed the passing game of the Los Angeles Rams and has drawn praise from Aikman.

"I enjoy working with Norval and I think we'll be much improved," Aikman said.

It wouldn't take much. The Cowboys were 27th in passing in the NFL last year, averaging only 161 yards per game passing. They were 26th in scoring with an average of 15 points per game.

Both rookies and veterans were expected to report to training camp on Sunday. The Cowboys have already signed their first three draft picks.

The first Blue-White scrimmage will be on Sunday, July 21. Dallas once again will scrimmage the Houston Oilers who are working in San Antonio.

There will be a Cowboys-Oilers scrimmage in Burger Stadium in Austin on July 25 and one at Alamo Stadium in San Antonio, where the Oilers are training, on Sunday July 26.

Dallas has its first pre-season game at Kansas City on Aug. 3. The first pre-season game at Texas Stadium will be on Monday, Aug. 12.

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Oilers undergo less change

HOUSTON (AP) - Right after Jack Pardee introduced himself a year ago as the Houston Oilers' new coach, he scrapped the existing offense for a high-powered run-and-shoot and changed the defense from a three-man line to the more traditional four-man approach.

"You can't change much more than that in one year. I didn't want it to appear as a rebuilding year or a step backward. I wanted to stay good along the way," Pardee says. He and his staff are preparing for a different but equally difficult task as the Oilers open training camp this week at Trinity University in San Antonio.

But rather than implement an entire system like last summer, Pardee says they must try to maintain the team's positives and improve on negatives.

The Oilers finished second last year in the AFC Central at 9-7 but were eliminated in the first round of the playoffs.

Looking back, Pardee says he was able to install his new defensive scheme but did not have time to teach his secondary how to react at the line to different offenses.

The new offense was not a

problem, except to opposing defenses. Quarterback Warren Moon set numerous records while piling up yardage to help the team become the NFL's top-ranked offense.

For this season, Pardee says his goal for the offense is to sustain its high level and add a few more wrinkles.

The Oilers had many memorable moments in 1991, mostly from the offense. Moon and his crew were impressive in victories over Kansas City and the AFC Champion Buffalo Bills.

But the Oilers' problems came from their inconsistency. They never won more than two straight games and suffered disappointing losses to the New York Jets and the Los Angeles Rams.

"We're not so overly talented that we can just show up and beat everybody," Pardee says.

"We did play pretty well at times, but we didn't scratch the surface of our best ball. We played some really good games, but we've got to do it every time out."

Many forecasters have named the Oilers the pre-season favorite to win their first AFC Central title and first conference crown. Some magazines

even have the Oilers penciled in for a Super Bowl trip to Minnesota in late January.

"The encouraging part for this year is that there's high expectations," Pardee said. "But the reality of it is that you can't wish your way into it. You have to work."

The Oilers also need to avoid a repeat of last year's 0-2 start. Half of this year's games, including their first three, will be against 1990 playoff teams.

"Right off the bat, we've got to be pretty darn good just to be a .500 club," Pardee said. "We've been in the upper echelon, enough to make the playoffs four or five years in a row, but we need to go beyond that now."

The first chore is reaching contract agreements with 23 players. Among the unsigned are starters Lorenzo White, Cris Dishman, Sean Jones and all draft picks.

Those who are signed, Pardee says, are excited.

"I think most of them are ready to get started again," he says. "They realize the work ahead of them to be special and have a good team. We've just got to say our prayers and have a lot of luck."

The territory Big George roams. There remains his ministry based in Houston and there is the realm of television where he has appeared as a commentator and pitchman and where he could soon be employed as an actor.

Foreman is going to Los Angeles later this month to talk to a producer about doing a television series.

What could be the format? How about "Minister Foreman Mysteries." Or stage it at Foreman's ranch and call it, "Big George on the Prairie."

A series would be time-consuming, but it would still allow Foreman to fight and it would provide exposure.

As for making commercials, Foreman, who has done one for a fast-food chain and another for an athletic shoe company, said, "I don't want to do that any more. You work all day, and you're only seen for a few seconds."

That could be a description of his preparation for and his fight against Pultz.

Dan Duva, Holyfield's promoter, both said that if their fighters couldn't meet each other, they would fight Foreman. King couldn't make a fight with Foreman, but Duva could, and that brought about Wednesday's deal.

"He (King) had to do it," said Shelly Finkel, Holyfield's manager. "Once he lost Foreman, where was he going to go? We had it (Holyfield-Foreman)."

So Foreman will have to wait until 1992 to get another chance at winning the title he held in 1973 and 1974. Finkel said the Holyfield-Tyson agreement stipulates "the winner make a good-faith deal to fight Foreman."

"I'm going to get down to 235 pounds," said Foreman, who weighed at least 250 for his last 13 fights, as he prepares for a Sept. 7 match on HBO for which he will get \$5 million. The next opponent for Lean-and-Mean George is expected to be a ring-rusty cruiserweight (190 pounds) named Boone Pultz.

Cancer, early detection could mean life, death

One in ten women will develop breast cancer sometime during their lifetime. Statistics show that if the cancer is detected and treated early enough, many women with breast cancer can continue to lead normal productive lives.

The Don and Sybil Harrington Cancer Center and High Plains Baptist Hospital of Amarillo will conduct a breast cancer screening clinic in Hereford on July 15. The clinic is targeting low income women in need of financial assistance.

A clinic will be held in Hereford from 10 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. at the South Plains Health Care Providers, Inc., 603 E. Park Ave. Exams are done by appointment only.

A mammogram is an X-ray of the breast. Two views of each breast are taken, one from the side and one from the top.

A mammogram is very important because it can reveal benign or malignant lumps before they are large enough to feel.

To help aid early detection, it is important that women learn and perform breast self-examination every month, have a physical examination of the breast every year and have a mammogram done according to age recommendations: 35-40, one baseline mammogram; 40-50, one mammogram every one to two years and over 50, yearly mammograms.

Although it is natural to be alarmed if a lump is found, it can be a comfort to know that 80 percent of breast lumps are benign, and no cancer is present.

If a malignant tumor is treated promptly, 85 to 95 percent of women with early breast cancer will be alive five years after diagnosis. Most of them can be rid of breast cancer for the rest of their lives.

One Hereford woman knows first hand the importance of early detection and self-examination.

Thirteen years ago, Kee Ruland was diagnosed with having breast cancer. She found the lump herself during a self-examination.

"I feel very fortunate that I went to a doctor who firmly believed in self examination," Ruland said.

"I found the lump and called the doctor. I had a history of fibrocystic disease and the doctor felt sure it was just a cyst."

"He sent me to a surgeon to do a biopsy. At that time I discussed with the surgeon 'what if' it was cancer. I told him that is was up to him. I wanted the doctor to do what he felt was best."

"When they discovered it was malignant, I had a radical mastectomy. Because we caught the cancer in its early stage, I didn't have to go through chemotherapy."

"I see television shows where these women think it is so traumatic to lose a breast, but losing a breast is not nearly as important as losing your life."

Ruland can't stress enough the importance of early detection.

"If it weren't for the education I

had about breast cancer and a doctor who stressed the importance of self examination, I would probably not be here today."

According to Ruland, breast cancer is one of the cancers, when caught in early stages that can be curable.

"After ten years, you are declared cured," Ruland said with excitement. "The best celebration I ever had was the day I reached that 10 year mark. It was better than any birthday or Christmas. I felt that a huge weight had been lifted off my shoulders that day."

If the family has a history of cancer, a yearly examination is vital.

"A mammogram is real important for women over 40," Ruland said. "I have one every year."

Ruland has found that educating others has helped her cope with her own cancer.

Next, press your hands firmly on your hips and bow slightly toward your mirror as you pull your shoulders and elbows forward.

Raise your left arm. Use three or four fingers of your right hand to explore your left breast firmly, carefully and thoroughly. Beginning at the outer edge, press the flat part of your fingers in small circle, moving the circles slowly around the breast.

Gradually work toward the nipple. Be sure to cover the entire breast.

Pay special attention to the area between the breast and the underarm, including the underarm itself. Feel for any unusual lump or mass under the skin.

Gently squeeze the nipple and look for discharge. If you have any discharge during the month, whether or not it is during examination, see your doctor. Repeat steps four and five on your right breast.

Steps four and five should be repeated lying down. Lie flat on your

doctor examines each breast and underarm by feeling the tissue. Although a doctor can tell a lot by the way the lump feels, no one can be certain what a lump is just by palpation.

Aspiration, also call fine needle aspiration, can help the doctor discover whether the lump is a cyst (fluid filled) or a solid mass of tissue.

A local anesthetic is used to numb the area, then the doctor inserts a needle into the lump and tries to withdraw fluid. If it is a cyst, removing the fluid will collapse it.

The fluid can be sent to a

laboratory for testing.

If the lump is solid, the doctor sometimes removes a sample of cells with the needle. These cells are also analyzed in the lab.

The only certain way to learn whether a breast lump or area seen on a mammogram is cancer is by a biopsy.

During a biopsy, the doctor surgically removes all or part of the lump and sends it to the laboratory for analysis.

A doctor may use a needle biopsy, incisional biopsy, excisional biopsy, and a mammographic localization

with biopsy.


Inserting a needle or cutting into a breast lump will not cause cancer to spread.

By having a biopsy, the doctor can tell whether the lump is benign or malignant.

If no cancer is found, the area may be the result of a fibrotic condition, fibrotic disease or benign breast disease.

Even if the lump is diagnosed as being benign, the fear is not always calmed.

"I had rapid growth and I happened to have found it at the right time. I can't stress the importance of education; if it weren't for education, I would not have found the lump."

Because of early detection and self-examination, Ruland is able to lead a full productive life. If it were not for early detection, she might not be around to enjoy her new grandbaby.

Breast self-examination should be done once a month to become familiar with the feel of the breasts.

One way to do a breast self-exam is to stand before a mirror, inspect both breasts for anything unusual such as any discharge from the nipples or puckering, dimpling or scaling of the skin.

Watching closely in the mirror, clasp your hands behind your head and press your hands forward; you should be able to feel your chest muscles tighten.

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
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

A benign lump can not turn cancerous, but a cancerous lump can develop near a benign lump.

Every new lump does not have to be biopsied.

A doctor should be seen if there is a spontaneous discharge from the nipple. The fluid may be clear, milky, bloody or even green. During a pregnancy, the discharge may be pregnancy related.

A benign breast change does not increase the chances of developing cancer.

At-risk women are those who are older. The older you are, the greater the chances are of getting breast cancer.

One in five women diagnosed with breast cancer has a family history of the disease.

MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

Try a Little "T.L.C."

To most people, the initials T.L.C. stands for tender loving care. I believe in tender loving care but, in this column, T.L.C. represents trust, loyalty and commitment.

These three personal characteristics will help assure your success in business. Whether you own the business or work for someone else, being trustworthy, loyal and committed is important.

As an entrepreneur, I was fortunate to surround myself with trustworthy people on whom I could depend. These employees worked as hard when I was on vacation as when I was standing right beside them. Day after day, they earned my trust.

Trust is a funny thing. You would not keep an employee around whom you could not trust. However, many levels of trust exist. You may trust some employees more than others.

for example, you trust most employees with company funds. For many businesses, this is not a problem. Company time is an entirely different matter. Many employees who would never take a penny from the cash register think nothing about coming a few minutes late every morning. They embezzle a few minutes during the noon hour and leave early if the boss is out of town.

These petty infractions can add up to hundreds or thousands of dollars in lost time. They also eat away at the level of trust. You may have to terminate the most skilled and qualified employee if the level of trust continues to deteriorate.

Loyalty

Loyalty is another form of trust. A.P. Gouthey said, "Loyalty is the one thing a leader cannot do without." True loyalty goes beyond blind love or admiration. The loyal employee will most likely know the faults and weaknesses of the boss and the company. However, they will strive toward success in spite of those weaknesses.

Loyal employees will work hard to maintain the right direction when things are going well. When things are going poorly, you can count on them to pitch in and help right the wrongs.

If you are in business, one of your most important assets is a loyal customer base. At very best, customer loyalty is fragile. Loyalty bonds are difficult to establish but easily broken.

You must earn customer loyalty. Customers only stay loyal to businesses that provide consistent quality in their products and services. Remember the two natural laws regarding customers:

- 1) Customers always go where they receive good value, and 2) Customers always return when you treat them well.

Commitment

Most successes in life require commitment. One trait of commitment is honoring your word. The importance of keeping your verbal commitments will go far in impressing your customers, employees and bosses. If you promise to get something done, do it. If you agree to meet at a certain time and place, be there. If you pledge your support to a project, follow through.

Committed employees will consistently do more than they are paid to do. If you are an employee who agreed to work for \$5 per hour, start doing \$7 worth of work. It won't take your boss long to notice you and what you are accomplishing. You may not receive a pay raise immediately. However, you will have the personal satisfaction of knowing that you are worth more than you are earning.

Commitment also means "hanging in there" during the tough times. It's easy to be a team player when the team is winning. However, it's another matter when the going gets tough. Perhaps a good paraphrase would be "when the going gets tough, the committed keep going."

The trio of trust, loyalty and commitment is the business version of "T.L.C." I hope these traits will become your new goals for personal and business growth.

Recession a different animal

NEW YORK (AP) - If you feel the recovery is passing you by, you may have more company than you realize. Millions of others seem to share that feeling.

The perception, though not entirely absent in other recessions, may have an unusual and perhaps ominous significance in this one: Most of the "recession-is-over" measurements involve expectations rather than current conditions.

"Hope doesn't buy much," says Albert Sindlinger, whose staff conducts telephone interviews with hundreds of Americans every week. Most households are badly pinched, he says. They don't share the optimism of forecasts.

The reason, he says, is that families are watching prices and taxes rise while their incomes remain stagnant. Businesses, meanwhile, remain mired in a sales and profits slump. That's the real world, he says.

In contrast, the world of hope, says Sindlinger, is made up of economists, investors and some government officials with vested interests in promoting a quick end to recession. He worries that they overlook realities.

Sindlinger's thesis is worthy of attention because it takes aim at those who last summer scoffed at the prospects of recession, denied it when it came and said it was over when it wasn't. He questions their methods.

It is easy to see why Sindlinger trusts ordinary Americans. In them, he says, resides the unbiased economic truth. It is what people can or can't afford that determines economic direction - not, he says, what sages say.

"It would be wonderful if economists talked to people," he growls from his headquarters in Wallingford, Pa., where employees of Sindlinger & Co. conduct their

research. But, he laments, economists talk to themselves and to their computers, and both, he says, may be programmed for the past.

He contends that the numbers produced by this recession cannot simply be measured against old recessions to produce an estimate of depth and anticipated longevity.

The people he and his researchers talk to, he says, are too deep in debt and bills to embark on the recovery conventional forecasters anticipate. He says it is one of the differences between this recession and others.

There are other important differences too, he says. This isn't simply a business-cycle recession, according to his view of things. There are no excess inventories to work off, after which workers are recalled to their jobs.

He claims today's jobless are different than before, when

blue-collar workers were laid off and rehired as the recovery proceeded. In recent years, however, imports have caused many blue-collar jobs to be "exported," he says, reducing the blue-collar component of unemployment.

Today's jobless figures, he says, contain far more white-collar jobs than before, and "those who wear those collars aren't being recalled." Why? Because their jobs have been eliminated.

Read the newspapers, he says. He refers to job cuts at International Business Machines, Apple Computer, Wang, Citicorp, and other large companies. "Those aren't layoffs," he says. "Those jobs won't be recovered."

For such reasons he argues that the current recession is a structural one, rather than the more typical recession that corrects imbalances in supply and demand and, in the process, cuts into inflation and interest rates.

A full sized kitchen, breakfast and laundry are included and garage or deck approach is from the breakfast room. A half bath is centrally lo-



cated on the first floor.







Stephen King, that ultra-prolific writer who seems to publish a new novel every week, has dived into the deep end of the prime-time TV pool with *Golden Years*, a summer series due to premiere on CBS with a two-hour first episode on Tuesday, July 16.

Touted as "the author's first original story created for network television," the first five episodes of *Golden Years* were penned by King, with Josef Anderson stepping in to derive the final two from King's story. King also shares the title of executive producer with Richard P. Rubinstein, whose Laurel Entertainment (*Tales From the Darkside*) is the series' production company.

King's work has been generally successful when adapted into motion pictures, the titles *Carrie*, *Christine* and *The Shining* being the better examples, but the author has not had a memorable television adaptation since the miniseries *Salem's Lot*. His *Sometimes They Come Back*, which recently debuted in prime time, would perhaps have been better received had it not been the same theme as his less-engaging *It*, King's only other made-for-TV project, which pre-dated the former by a matter of months.

Both thrillers involved the return of a terror from childhood, which drew the protagonists back to a dark tunnel for the exciting climax. His formulaic writing makes us well aware of the things that frightened Stephen the boy, and we may well suspect that Stephen

the man has a novel-writing program on his word processor.

For *Golden Years*, King found fresh material in the clichés of the sci-fi B-movies of the 50s. This may sound familiar: the lab of a crazed government scientist working on a secret biological regeneration project explodes and contaminates the crusty old janitor with a mysterious "green stuff," triggering a gradual transformation. The janitor (Keith Szarabajka) feels fine, but his wife (Frances Sternhagen) notices the subtle changes.

The premiere episode of *Golden Years* is worth checking out just for some of the set design and cinematography, but after that, well, if you're sitting around with a pot of java and a few stale donuts, tune in.... Something interesting might happen. © TV Listing Inc.

TNT to celebrate Stanwyck

Vigor, versatility marked career

Born in Brooklyn in 1907, orphan Ruby Stevens had lived in 14 foster homes by age 18. Finding real escape only in movies, Ruby especially enjoyed determined heroines like indomitable Pearl White. Informal dance lessons led to chorus work and, eventually, her Broadway debut in 1926's *The Noose*. Critics praised the young actress, now equipped with a strong new name: Barbara Stanwyck.

On Monday, July 15, cable's TNT unveils a new documentary/tribute, *Barbara Stanwyck: Fire & Desire*. The program takes stock of Stanwyck's personal life and seeks to place her versatile body of work in context.

Stanwyck found lasting stardom, of course, in films, playing many of the most significant, influential women's roles in Hollywood history. Parts like *Stella Dallas*, the evangelist in *The Miracle Woman* and zany Sugarpuss O'Shea in *Ball of Fire* reminded producers and writers how effective a strong female character could be. Her white-hot performance in *Double Indemnity* helped make that film a movie milestone, and Stanwyck lent her talents to many great film noir works that followed, including *The Strange Love of Martha Ivers*.

Stanwyck was also a skilled comedic actress, infusing charm and vitality in movies like *The Mad Miss Manton* and her own favorite, *The Lady Eve*. Years later, she won an Emmy for her portrayal of lady rancher Victoria Barkley in TV's *The Big Valley*. Health problems and the scarcity of good roles made further appearances rare, but she won much acclaim for her fiery performance in the miniseries *The Thorn Birds*.

TNT's program is a laudable effort, and a good introduction for those unfamiliar with Stanwyck's intense, riveting work. An hour, however, scarcely does justice to a screen legacy such as this, and host Sally Field's near-hysterical gushing grates on the nerves. Nevertheless, *Barbara Stanwyck: Fire & Desire* is a valuable reminder of an important screen artist who should not be forgotten.

Ex-salesman Donahue sold on talk-shows

"Guess who's here?" Phil Donahue asks his audience. He paces in front of them while he lists his guests' claim to fame, common problem or concern. As the questions start, he darts in and out of the audience, trying to get to everyone. He pauses to ask, "Is the caller there?" And then he's off and running again. Donahue's style is unorthodox, but it's prompted the press to call him "the best talker in television."


Donahue has been in television more than half of his life. He was born on December 21, 1935, in Cleveland. His broadcasting career began while he was attending Notre Dame University.

After he graduated, Donahue returned to his hometown, where he landed his first professional job. He stayed there until 1959, then did a ten-month stint at WABJ Radio in Michigan. His next move was to WHIO-TV/Radio in Dayton, Ohio. Not only did he anchor the television news, but he was also the host of a radio call-in talk show, *Conversation Piece*.

Donahue left broadcasting briefly to try a career as a salesman. But in 1967, WLWD-TV approached him with an offer he couldn't refuse: a television talk show of his own. *The Phil Donahue Show* was born on November 6, 1967.

Donahue is married to actress Mario Thomas and has five children from a previous marriage.

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

TIME OUT**Faldo a dark horse at British Open**

One year ago, Nick Faldo was riding on top of the golf world after winning his second British Open championship. This week, the native Englishman, who has been near the top of the PGA earnings list for the last several years, will be trying to return to top form when the oldest of all the major professional championships gets underway at Royal Lytham & St. Anne's Golf Club in Southport, England.

Faldo, who ranked just 112th on this year's earnings list going into July, could pocket more than \$146,000 with a victory in the 120th British Open. However, even if he's at the top of his game, he will find repeating last year's performance tough against a field that includes former champions Mark Calcavecchia and Tom Watson.

Calcavecchia won the 1989 Open in dramatic fashion when he came from four strokes off the pace in the final round to best Australians Greg Norman and Wayne Grady in the tournament's first-ever four-hole playoff.


ABC Sports, which has been at the British Open since 1962, has expanded its live coverage, Saturday and Sunday, July 20 and 21, to four hours each day in order to follow the leaders throughout the course. ABC will have cameras at all 18 holes, with commentators Roger Twibell, former PGA champion Dave Marr and BBC golf-expert Peter Alliss providing analysis.
