## Firemen's Ball Is Scheduled For March 13

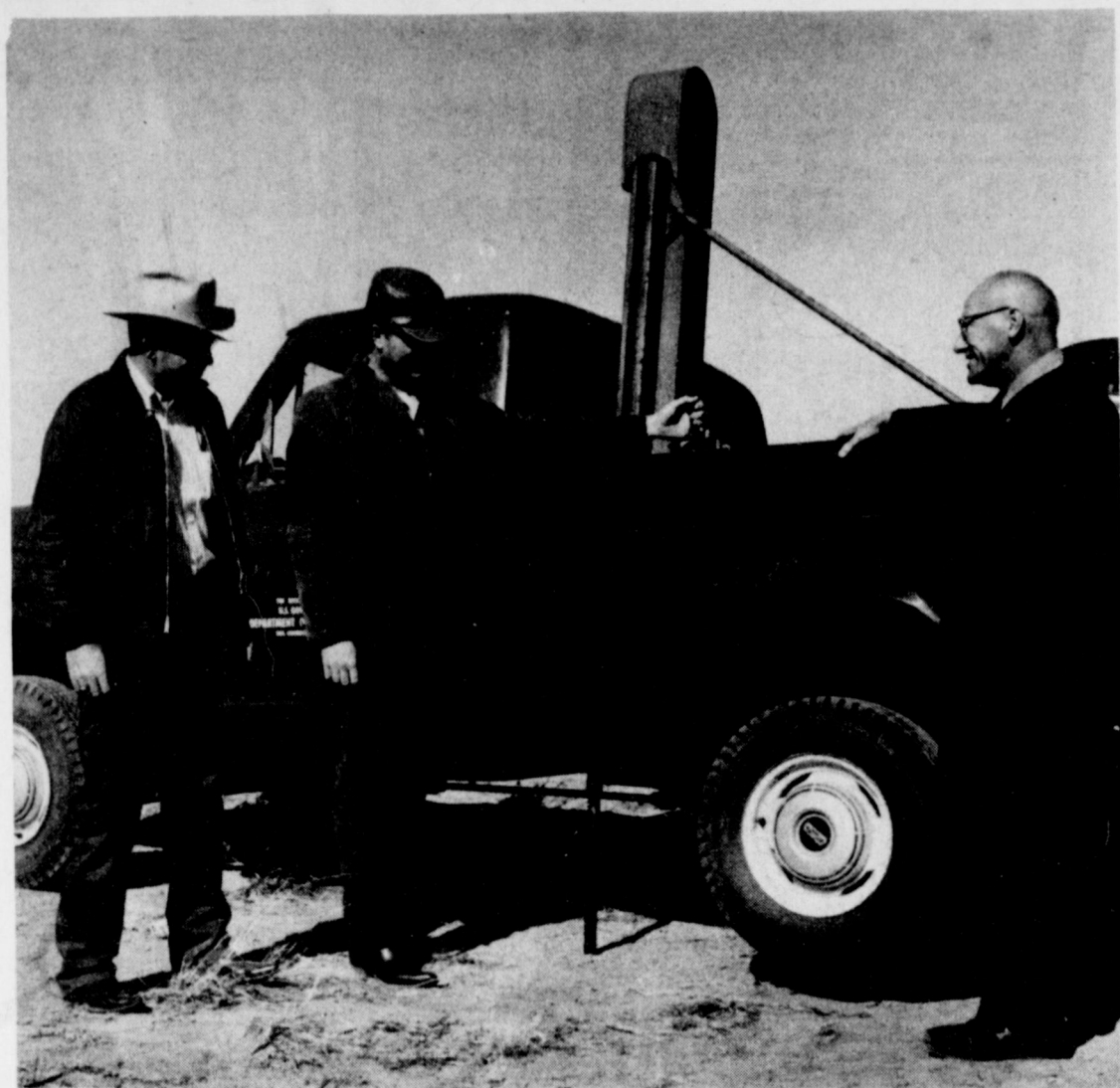
Tickets have gone on sale for the annual Firemen's Ball, which will be held Saturday, March 13, 8-12:30 in the Catholic Center.

## Topographical Maps And Soil Tests Made

If you have noticed much activity just south of West Avenue D, between West Ninth Street and West 17th, it is because a number of preliminary tests have been conducted at the new park site. Members of the Blackwater Valley Soil and Water Conservation District have been at the park site taking surveys for a topographical map showing the varied levels of the park.

They have staked the boundaries of the park, and Charles Ball, surveyor for SCS and Henry Stoneham, unit work leader for SCS, have been coordinating the surveys for the map to help park planners work out roads and other major necessities such as an adequate drainage system before the actual excavation and dirt work begins.

On Wednesday, another activity was going on at the proposed park. Dan Blackstock, soil scientist from Lubbock, was on the acreage taking soil samples to test so the SCS could advise the Park and Recreation Board about what types of vegetation, plants and trees would be best at that location.

Blackstock said most of the soil appeared to be Drake soil on the slopes and Church soil on the lake area. He added that there was approximately 18 inches of topsoil, and would take most types of vegetation,

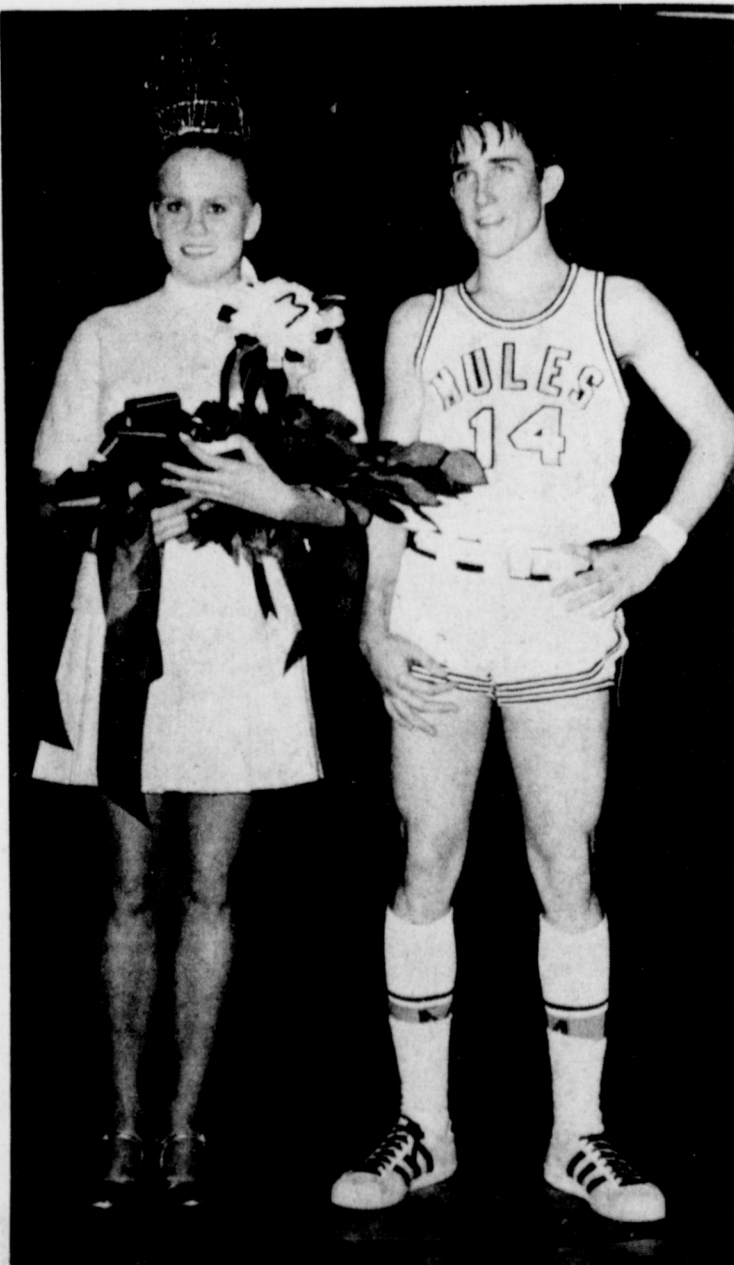

cerning the size of fields and where they will want them located.

He said it is hoped to have the Youth Football field grassed in time for it to be used in the fall of this year.

Irrigation will be the next problem to face, according to Rev. Bartholf. He added that tests will be made on an irrigation well at the intersection of West 17th Street and West avenue F to see if it will serve the needs of irrigation in the proposed park.

Rev. Bartholf also added that as soon as federal wage scales are received from the government, bids will be called for so road work can begin in the park.

Apparently road work will be the first step in the park improvement when the actual work begins, and will be followed by seeding with grass and planting of trees and bushes.

Blackstock explained that the types of soil and irrigation method used will determine the grass, trees and vegetation to be put into the park. He said grass will be used which will stand a lot of 'traffic' and trees and vegetation which will adapt to the soil will be planted.

Carbonate tests will be conducted to see what plants will withstand the calcium deposits in the soil on the lake area. He said that a number of years ago, water was in the lake throughout the year. He added that a lot of calcium came out of the water and was deposited permanently in the soil in the surrounding area.

The local Soil Conservation Service workers, who formerly worked only with farmers, have moved their operations to town partially, and help plan such things as parks and landscaping to help make a town or city more attractive, explained Stoneham.

No 'target' date has as yet been determined to actually be-

gin construction in the park, which was authorized in a bond election on September 19, 1968. Park and Recreation Board members have a master plan they are working from and the federal government is assisting in developing the proposed 110 acre park.

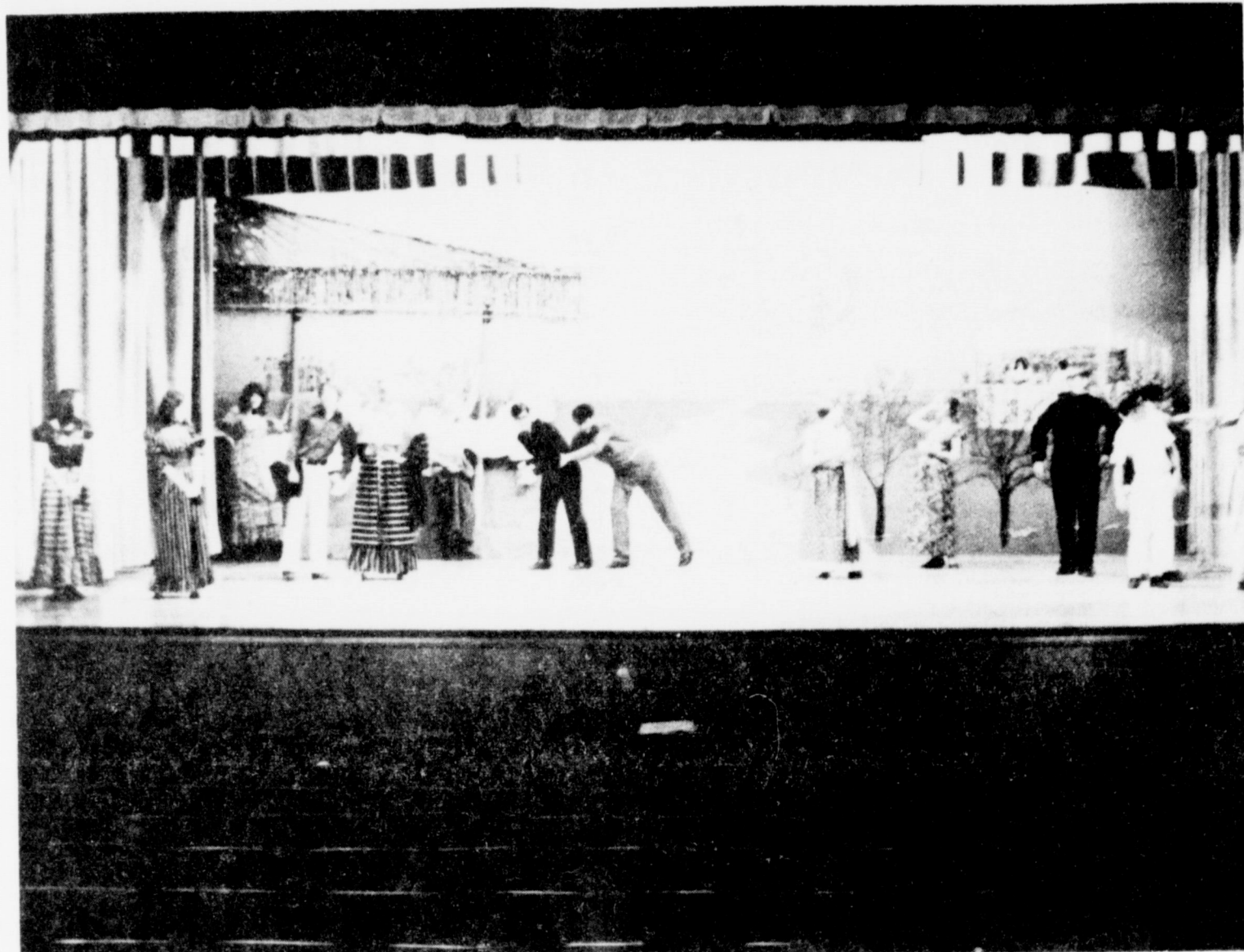
### SC To Sponsor Valentine Day Special Project

When asked to comment on this year's team he commented, "We've come a long way this year and most of us still have another year to go a lot further."

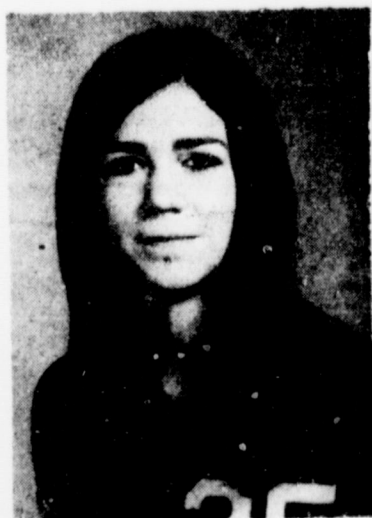
