Weinberger scoffs Soviet assertions

Confusion on 'proof' citations

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) defense ministers. Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger today brushed aside Soviet assertions that NATO missiles scheduled for deployment next year would increase the danger of accidental nuclear war.

"That's just another of those things they say," Weinberger declared as he entered North Atlantic Treaty Organization headquarters for a nuclear planning meeting with 13 Western

The ministers were expected to reaffirm their support for deployment of 572 Pershing II and cruise missiles in five Western European countries by the end of 1983 to counter Soviet SS-20 medium range missiles targeted on Western Europe.

DPS says insured should fight tickets

DALLAS (AP) - Insured motorists ticketed for not having proof of insurance should contest such citations in court, according to officials of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Officials said drivers who mail in their fines have admitted guilt and could face either higher insurance premiums for five years or loss of their driver's license, officials said.

Also, judges are confused about whether tickets can be dismissed if a motorist contests the ticket in court by showing proof of insurance,

Some Texas judges will not dismiss a ticket for failure to maintain financial responsibility - even if the motorist presents evidence in court that he was properly covered, said Jim Templeton, assistant manager of the DPS safety responsibility bureau

in Austin. Instead, the judges change the charge from failure to maintain financial responsibility to failure to carry evidence of financial responsibility, Templeton said.

"We don't feel like that is a proper charge," Templeton "There is a misunderstanding of the statute. Some believe there are two offense - failure to carry insurance and failure to have insurance. There is no such penalty in the statute as failure to carry insurance."

But Templeton said the DPS does not have the authority to overturn a conviction.

When a conviction of failure to carry evidence of liability insurance is reported to Austin, the charge is viewed as failure to maintain financial responsiblity, Templeton said.

After the charge is received, the DPS sends the motorist a notice that his

driver's license will be suspended unless DPS officials receive proof of insurance within 21 days, according to Templeton.

By law, the only item that then fullfills the requirement of proof is a certificate of insurance known as an SR-22 form, Templeton said. An insurance policy does not constitute proof, he said.

"To get an SR-22, your regular insurance company will cancel your policy and you must go through the assigned risk plan," Templeton said. "It costs a lot more money."

An attorney general's opinion is pending on whether punishment for failure to carry proof of liability insurance should be as harsh as the penalty for failure to have liability insurance, he said.

Meanwhile, if an insured motorist is unable to get his ticket dismissed by a municipal court judge, the motorist should hire an attorney and appeal the conviction to county court,

Templeton said. "In the long run, it will cost

you less," he said. Templeton made the remarks in an interview with The Dallas Morning News.

Foreign aid handouts not possible, appropriate

Reagan to South America on shirt-sleeve working trip

WASHINGTON (AP) President Reagan, whose last foreign trip took him from palace to palace and from one formal dinner to another, is setting out on "a shirt-sleeve, working trip" to Latin America to show his concernfor financially strapped southern neighbors.

But a senior administration official, recognizing the possibility that the trip would create expectations of major U.S. financial assistance, said before Reagan left that such programs "are neither possible nor appropriate.

"It is not a trip designed to produce spectacular new assistance programs at any of the stops," said the official, who requested anonymity.

The president planned to arrive in Brasilia, the Brazilian capital built out of the dusty high plains of the interior 25 years ago, this evening on the first leg of a trip that will take him to four countries in five days.

He was leaving Washington at midday, after meeting with two congressional delegations at the White House.

Reagan administration officials said the journey was intended to show support for fledgling democratic institutions, develop economic interdependence and boost regional peacekeeping. But guerrilla insurgencies in Central America - the president's last stop - also were becoming a key issue.

Reagan will end the trip on Saturday in Costa Rica and Honduras, with meetings with the presidents of those countries as well as the leaders of El Salvador and Guatemala, which are under attack by leftist rebels.

The senior administration official said Reagan would reaffirm "our support for those countries in Central America that have been threatened by insurgents.'

The threat posed by Nicaragua to its neighbors will undoubtedly be discussed," as will Cuban assistance to the rebels in El Salvador; he said. But he added that the role of Nicaragua, governed by a leftist junta, would not be a major theme.

The trip is Reagan's sixth out of the country in his 22 months in office. Three previous foreign trips were in this hemisphere: two to Canada and one to Mexico.

His most recent foreign trip a four-nation European tour last spring - was heavy

with visits to famous palaces, including overnight stops at Versailles and Windsor Castle. There were black-tie dinners and such a busy schedule that the president dozed briefly during a meeting with Pope John Paul

This trip is half as long as the European trip, and only one late night is planned. The president's wife, Nancy, will accompany him.

Depressed sales close Levi Strauss factories

PLAINVIEW, Texas (AP) -Depressed sales of jeans and other clothing are blamed for the permanent closure of a Levi Strauss plant here - a move that will put 290 people out of work and wipe out a \$2.9 millionannual payroll, company officials said.

The plant, which will close down right before Christmas, makes clothing for children from toddlers to early teens, according to plant manager Gary Beggs.

Levis Strauss is consolidating its manufacturing in an effort to cut costs, Beggs said Monday

Company spokeswoman Nancy Peterson in San Francisco said the company's earnings have declined steadily this year.

The closing of the plant here, and plants in Clovis, N.M. and Hobbs, N.M. are "economy related. Jeans sales have been somewhat flat," she said.

Net income dropped 56 percent in first quarter 1982 compared with the same period last year. The decline continued, with a 46 percent decrease in the second quarter and a 17 percent drop in the third period.

Sales also were off, she said, falling 17 percent in first quartered compared to a year ago, 11 percent in the second, and 8 percent in the third.

Former mental patient takes 33 hostages

HOUSTON (AP) - A former mental patient who held 33 people at gunpoint in a four-hour standoff with police wanted to be re-admitted to a psychiatric hospital but officials refused because he didn't have insurance, a SWAT officer says.

The 25-year-old man, armed with a .22-caliber pistol, walked into the Spring Shadow Glen Hospital on Monday afternoon and took 20 patients and 13 employees hostage, police said.

The hospital, which opened in 1981, specializes in drug and alcohol treatment, and admission is voluntary.

"The gunman was a former mental patient. He wanted to be taken back into the hospital, but they wouldn't admit him because he didn't have any insurance. We were told he was discharged in the first place because he had a \$20,000 bill he couldn't pay," said a SWAT officer at the scene, who didn't want to be identified.

Hospital officials had left the scene and could not be reached for com-

Man sought in deadly hit-and-run arrested

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) -Police prepared extradition papers today for a 28-year-old man sought since a driver ran a pickup truck through a crowd outside a bar in July, killing four people and injuring two others.

Gregorio Sanchez was arrested Monday in Carlsbad, N.M. by his landlord - a police captain, authorities said.

San Antonio Police Lt. Jack Sum-

mey said extradition proceedings would begin if Sanchez did not agree to return voluntarily.

Sanchez was indicted Nov. 10 on four counts of murder in connection with a hit-and-run assault July 17 outside a lounge on the west side of San Antonio.

Witnesses told police a group was standing around a parked car when a pickup ran through the group, went up the street, turned around and ran through the group a second time before speeding away.

Four people were killed and two others were injured.

The attack apparently stemmed from an argument, police said.

Police recovered a heavily damaged pickup truck two days later at San-

chez' residence, authorities said. Carlsbad Police Capt. James B. Williams said Sanchez had been stopped for routine questioning Satuday night when a patrolman saw him standing in the shadows near a used car lot where several burglaries had been reported.

Sanchez was released, but was jailed Monday after information from the interview was matched up with a bulletin issued by San Antonio police, Williams said

The possibility of an extreme winter is always there. despite even his own forecast. Gilman admitted. But he added that "nobody has any grounds for flat-out saying that this will be the coldest winter of the century," as some have done

The chances of a relatively cold season exceed 55 percent from the Great Plains westward, except for the far Northwest and along the Mexican border, he said.

The probability of extreme cold exceeds 60 percent from western Kansas and Nebraska through the Rockies and Great Basin to central California. The highest probability of frigid weather, 70 percent, is in the basin areas surrounding the

Great Salt Lake, he added. The probability of warmer weather than normal in this winter's forecast exceeds 55 percent from the Appalachian Mountains eastward," said a weather service statement "and reaches a maximum of 65 percent along the mid-

Atlantic coastal plains. The forecasters also said chances of a relatively wet winter exceeded 55 percent in most of the South, the lower Midwest and East Coast states as far north as New York and Connecticut. This chance of higher precipitation exceeds 60 percent in the Ohio-Tennessee Valleys and coastal states from Delaware

to Florida. Only in western Oregon and Washington was there a high probability of a dry winter. The chance of excessive moisture exceeds 55 percent from New Mexico, Colorado and Wyoming southwestward to southern California.

This probability of higher than normal moisture is greatest in Utah and adjacent parts of Arizona and Nevada, where it reaches 60 percent.



Bowl matchups interesting; create controversy

The bowl matchups are set. And, as is the case virtually every year, there is a certain amount of controversy.

This year, it's kinda hard to understand why either Tulsa or New Mexico, both teams 10-1, or perhaps both, aren't in one of the bowl games.

How could teams like Wisconsin (at 6-5), Kansas State 6-4-1), Air Force (7-5) or Iowa (7-4), or even Tennessee 6-4-1) be invited over Tulsa or New Mexico.

The lackluster of some of those teams sorta makes a travesty of certain games.

I always thought bowl games were supposed to reward teams with outstanding records. Maybe that's not the case, in some instances.

I was looking through previous bowl game records, and found some interesting facts concerning this year's mat-

So, starting with the Independence Bowl, Dec. 11, here are how this year's games shape up:

INDEPENDENCE BOWL - Wisconsin (6-5) vs. Kansas State (6-4-1): While this isn't your basic biggie, it nevertheless offers and interesting matchup. Wisconsin is 0-4 in bowl games (it most recently lost to Tennessee in last year's Garden State Bowl) while K-State is making its first-ever appearance in any bowl:

HOLIDAY BOWL - Ohio State (8-3) vs. Brigham Young University (8-3) Dec. 11: The Buckeyes are 7-9 in bowl games, while BYU is 2-4. BYU is making its fifth straight Holiday Bowl appearance (it is 2-2), while Ohio State is making its first. Last year, the Buckeyes beat Navy in the Liberty Bowl. BYU has been involved in some great Holiday Bowl games, losing to Navy, 23-16, in 1978 and Indiana, 38-37, in 1979, before beating SMU, 46-45, in '80 and Washington State, 38-36, last year.

TANGERINE BOWL Boston College (8-2-1) vs. Auburn

(8-3), Dec. 18: BC is 1-2 in bowl games, and making its first appearance in one since 1943. Auburn, meanwhile, is 6-7-1 in bowl games, but it's the Tiger's first bowl appearance since a 27-3 win over Texas in the 1974 Gator Bowl. Boston College's only bowl win came in the 1941 Sugar Bowl against Tennessee, 19-13.

SUN BOWL - Texas (8-2 with one regular season game remaining) vs. North Carolina (7-4): This is a rematch of the 1980 Bluebonnet Bowl clash, won by North Carolina, 16-7. Both are experienced bowl clubs. Texas is 15-11-2 over the years and NC 5-8. Both are making their third trip to the Sun Bowl, and each is 1-1. Texas defeated Maryland, 42-0, in 1978, then lost to Washington, 14-7, the next year. The Tar Heels beat Texas Tech, 32-28, in the 1972 Sun Bowl Clash, then were upended by Mississippi

ALOHA BOWL - Maryland (8-3) vs. Washington (9-2), Dec. 25: This is the innagural Aloha Bowl. Maryland is 4-7-1 in bowl games through the years, while the Huskies are 5-5-1 (with only one previous game out of the Rose Bowl). Washington won last year's Rose Bowl (beating Iowa, 28-0). Maryland's last bowl game was the 1980 Tangerine Bowl, in which the Terps lost, 35-20, to Florida.

LIBERTY BOWL - Alabama (7-4) vs. Illinois (7-4), Dec. 29: The Crimson Tide comes into this game in an unusual situation - it's the first time they've ever lost three games in a row in the same season under Bear Bryant. Over the years, Alabama has been one of college football's most prolific bowl teams, posting a 18-14-3 mark. Last year, the Tide lost to Texas (14-12) in the Cotton Bowl. Illinois is making its first appearance in a bowl game since 1964. The Fighting Illini are 3-0 in bowl games, and all three appearances have been in the Rose Bowl.

GATOR BOWL - West Virginia (9-2) vs. Florida State (8-2, with one game remaining), Dec. 30: The Mountaineers are 6-3 in bowl games, while Florida State is 2-7-1. West Virginia won last year's Peach Bowl (26-6 over

Florida). Florida State did not play in a bowl game last year, but prior to that the Seminoles were on the short end of two straight Orange Bowl encounters against the University of Oklahoma.

HALL of FAME BOWL - Vanderbilt (8-3) vs. Air Force (7-5), Dec. 31; Neither team has been to many bowl games. Vandy is 1-0-1, while Air Force is 0-2-1. Vanderbilt is making its first bowl trip since 1974 when it tied Texas Tech (6-6) in the Peach Bowl. Air Force hasn't been to a bowl since 1971 when it lost to Tennessee in the Sugar Bowl. Vandy's only bowl win came against Auburn in the 1955 Gator. Air Force lost in the 1963 Gator Bowl to North Carolina, and played a scoreless tie against TCU in the '59 Cotton Bowl.

BLUEBONNET BOWL - Arkansas (8-1-1 with one regular season game left) vs. Florida (7-3, also with a game remaining), Dec. 31: Both are making their first appearance in the Bluebonnet, although both are experienced bowl participants. Arkansas is 7-9-3 through the years, while Florida is 6-7. The Razorbacks lost to North Carlina, 31-27, in last year's Gator Bowl, while Florida was beaten by West Virginia in the Peach Bowl.

PEACH BOWL - Tennessee (6-4-1) vs. Iowa (7-4) Dec. 31: Both were in bowl games a year ago, Tennessee beating Wisconsin in the Garden State Bowl, while Iowa lost in the Rose to Washington. The Vols are 12-12 through the years, while Iowa is 2-1. The Hawkeyes have never been to a bowl game except the Rose, prior to this year.

FIESTA BOWL - Oklahoma (8-3) vs. Arizona State (9-2), Jan. 1: First meeting between these two schools in a bowl game. OU is 16-6-1 in bowl competition, while the Sun Devils are 6-4-1. Last year, the Sooners ripped Houston (40-14) in the Sun Bowl. Oklahoma is making its second Fiesta Bowl appearance, while ASU is making its sixth trip to the bowl which is on its own campus. Arizona State is 4-1 in previous Fiesta Bowl games, losing only to Penn State in 1977 (42-39). OU won its only previous Fiesta battle, smashing Wyoming, 41-7, in the 1976 affair.

COTTON BOWL - Pittsburgh (9-2) vs. SMU (10-0-1), Jan. 1: SMU is 3-5-1 in bowl games, while Pitt is 7-7. It's Pittsburgh's first ever trip to Dallas for the New Year's Day clash. SMU is making its first Cotton Bowl appearance since 1966, when it lost to Georgia, 24-9. Pitt won last year's Sugar Bowl (24-20) against Georgia. SMU's last bowl appearance was in the 1980 Holiday Bowl, losing

SUGAR BOWL - Georgia (11-0) vs. Penn State (10-1), Jan. 1: This one is for the national championship as they are ranked 1-2 in the wire service polls. Georgia is 10-10-1 in previous bowl appearances, while Penn State is 12-6-2. The Bulldogs are making their third straight Sugar Bowl appearance, while the Nittany Lions are making their first appearance there since 1979, when they lost to

ORANGE BOWL - Nebraska (10-1) vs. LSU (8-2-1), Jan. 1: These teams met in the 1971 Orange Bowl, and the game decided the national championship (Nebraska won, 17-12). The Cornhuskers are 11-9 in bowl appearances, while the Tigers are 10-11-1. Last year, Nebraska lost to Clemson in this bowl, 22-15. LSU is making its first Orange Bowl appearance since 1974, when it lost to Penn State, 16-9. LSU's last bowl game was in 1979, when it defeated Wake Forest in the Tangerine.

ROSE BOWL - UCLA (9-1-1) vs. Michigan (8-3), Jan. 1: The first-ever meeting in the Rose Bowl between these teams, although Michigan did beat the Bruins, 33-14, in last year's Bluebonnet clash. One of Michigan's three losses this season came at the hands of UCLA (31-27 the third week of the season). The Bruins are 2-7-1 in bowl games, while the Wolverines are 6-7. UCLA's last Rose Bowl game was a 23-10 win over Ohio State in 1976. Michigan defeated Washington two years ago, 23-6.

I had an aunt once who moved from the East to the West Coast and suffered from jet lag for three years.

It was something she couldn't seem to shake. Every night she went to bed at 7 p.m. and woke up at 3 a.m. It had an effect on her whole life. She didn't know what prime time was. She'd call up people at her breakfast and tell them to have a good day when they hadn't seen it yet. And it wasn't unusual for her to invite you to a candelight dinner at 4:30 in the afternoon. (Happy hour was at 3:30).

We had a lot of fun at her expense, but I always empathized with her. Jet lag is nothing to kid around about. For those of you who have had no experience with it, let me explain what happens.

When you travel on a plane from one time zone to the next, not only does your body not know how to adjust to the change, it never forgives you for what you have done to it.

Jet lag takes away all your control over your life. The best way I can explain it is that it's a lot like standing up on a crowded subway from Bulgaria to New York. You're eating cabbage rolls at 4 a.m. and you don't know why. You're sleeping with your eyes open and you don't know why. Your head falls in your soup over a late lunch and you don't know why.

Some of the more sophisticated travelers have tried to fool their bodies. Suppose it is 11 p.m. in California and 2 a.m. in New York. They rationalize if they go to bed at 1 a.m. in California, they wake up at 7 a.m. in New York Right? Wrong. They'll wake up at 11 a.m. in California and are late for their appointment.

There's another interesting phenomenon about a body that travels. It never turns down food. I could fly through 18 time zones in 18 hours and have a full course meal in every one of them. I have seen people outgrow their seat belts from New York to Hawaii.

There's a group of researchers who are studying ways of how to get the body to adjust to air miles. They've got it down to a diet in which you plan and reschedule your meals several days before you go on a trip. Frankly, I think it would be easier to slow the planes down.

I have my own theory. I think that jet lag is a disease of the middle class as they struggle desperately to get from one place to another.

Renewing a countertop

DEAR POLLY - I have a Formica countertop in my kitchen that I would like to renew. I can't afford to replace the entire top, however, I would like to cover it with ceramic tiles. Is this possible? - K.G.E.

DEAR K.G.E. - Yes, it is possible, providing you use an epoxy-base tile grout that will adhere to the plastic laminate surface. This grout should be mixed with one-half to twothirds parts sand. When you purchase your tile and grout, be sure to let the dealer know what surface you're planning to cover so that he or she can advise you on the proper product.

Playboy. "That all started with an article which was written as if the guy had never been here and knew nothing about me or Playboy," Hefner, clad in his customary silk pajamas and robe, said during a recent interview.

"I really have been more involved, in part because of some of the economic problems. But I have not been involved in what might be considered the operating management of the company for a decade and a half."

It was 5 p.m. Hefner had arisen a couple of hours earlier and was settled on a couch before a backgammor board table in an elegant study inside his 30-room, Tudor-style mansion. He fiddled with the omnipresent pipe and spoke again about the gossip which swirls around his reclusive life.

'My work style is such, and has been for more than 20 years, that I work afternoons and evenings. I work in pajamas. I think these things create some of those impressions" he said "But I've found there just aren't many reasons to go out."

Indeed, Hefner's 512-acre complex must be the ultimate bachelor pad: staff of 30, tennis court, custom pool with stereo-equipped spa and Jacuzzi tucked under a mockwaterfall, guesthouse crammed with pinball and video games, a small zoo, aviary and fishpond.

Inside the gray stone mansion are marble-floored halls, luxurious dining room, library and an enormous master bedroom with four televisions, four video recorders, lighting and curtains all controlled from the more than king-sized bed. Also there to share it all is Shannon Tweed, a 25-year-old blonde who is the 1982 Playmate of the Year.

It has been 29 years this December since Hefner began publishing Playboy magazine on his kitchen table. His \$600 investment made him a multimillionaire, able to indulge any whim, follow any fantasy. He knows it upsets

"It seems obvious to me that the two great guilts in our society are material wealth and sex, and if you tie

blems," he said. "And if you do it in such a fashion that everything seems to work for you and you seem to be having an awful lot of fun at it. then it does touch some nerves.'

Not that he loses much sleep worrying. Now 56, Hefner has turned over management of the Playboy empire to his 29-year-old daughter Christie, who became president in April: He remains chairman.

'My average day during the week begins in the early afternoon and starts usually with some dictation. I usually go into a meeting about two or three o'clock, and that takes up the rest of the afternoon. Then, into the evening hours," he said.

"I usually retire about midnight or one o'clock, and then probably spend the next three or four hours relaxing with my girlfriend, eating, watching a movie on tapes. That would be a typical day.'

It hasn't been Playboy's best year. The company sold" off its lucrative London casinos under pressure from British regulatory authorities because of alleged gaming law infractions and also liquidated its book publishing operation, two resort hotels and the New York Playboy Club. Surgery for sweating HEALTH

Lawrence E. Lamb, M.D.

DEAR DR. LAMB - In one of your columns you mentioned surgery that can be done in cases of severe underarm perspiration. This is a solution I could only dream was possible. What is this surgery called and what kind of doctor would per-form it? Would I consult a plastic surgeon and what kind of scars would be left? I've tried everything and this seems to be my only

hope. Please help.
DEAR READER — You might want to see a derma-tologist first and see if there are any other measures that you have not tried that might be successful for you. If not, he might direct you to a competent specialist in your area for expectations.

your area for surgery. There are three surgical approaches. One involves cutting the chain of sympathetic nerves (upper thoracic sympathetic chain) that is the root source of fibers to the underarm and hand area for sweating. If the feet are a problem a lumbar sympathetectomy can be done. A second but temporary approach is to cut the termi-

nal nerve fibers to the area. The third method could be done by a plastic surgeon and is really rather simple. It is to cut away all the skin in the area. This has been used for under the arm sweating. It removes the sweat glands. Obviously you would have a scar in the area under the arms but

DEAR DR. LAMB - I am just a layperson but I feel my experience with older folks gives me a little extra insight. I have seen more than a few cases of people in their 70s and 80s who took a flight and either had a stroke or heart failure while on board or within a few hours of landing. With the

with careful work it could be a small incisional scar.

exception of one case, all of these people became little more than vegetables, afraid or unwilling to resume their former active lifestyle - in a lot of cases totally unable.

These were all people under a doctor's care who flew with medical permission. This is just another example of age discrimination through ignorance. Air-lines don't care. If you need oxygen you'd better arrange to bring it on board yourself. DEAR READER - One

thing you learn in science is not to draw conclusions on a few observations. That is why research designs are so important to what conclusion can be drawn.

It is true that some people with medical problems cannot fly without supplemental oxygen. But to put your concern into perspective, an air-plane cruising at 35,000 feet has the same cabin altitude


The government claims the alleged bribe took place at a Jan. 10, 1979, meeting in Cannon's Las Vegas office.

Cannon is not charged in the case, and the trucking bill eventually passed with his support. He lost his reelection bid on Nov. 2 to Republican Chic Hecht in what was considered a major upset

At the Jan. 10 meeting with Williams and Cannon were defendant Allen Dorfman, a former adviser to the pension fund, and Ed Wheeler, a Teamsters' attorney

The prosecution contends that Cannon and a group of his Las Vegas neighbors were offered exclusive rights to a piece of prime property owned by the Teamsters' Central States Pension Fund. In return, the government says, Cannon promised to take control of legislation to deregulate the trucking industry and stall it.
