

# Speed limit cut for area of construction

Hereford City Commissioners elected Monday night to reduce the speed limit to 30 miles per hour on 25 Mile Avenue north of Park Avenue to the city limits.

The speed limit reduction was recommended by the state due to construction that is beginning in that area. The reduced speed limit will be in effect until the construction is completed.

The reduced speed limit is for the safety of the workers and motorists that will pass through the area.

In other business the city approved a recommendation from the federal government to add a railroad crossing arm at the intersection of Highway 60 and Lawton Avenue. The

project will cost an estimated \$110,000. Of that the federal government will pay 90 percent and the state and city will pay five percent each, or an estimated \$5,500. The crossing arm will be a safety precaution to protect motorists who commute to Arrowhead Mills.

Commissioners also held a public hearing to discuss the annexation of a 22-acre tract on Fifteenth Street just west of Centre Avenue. No citizens appeared to speak on the issue, but another public hearing will take place during the next meeting of the city commission on Nov. 4. No vote was taken.

The area of proposed annexation will be used by the prospective purchaser to develop a sub-division.

## DOE to open office in Vega

Weather permitting, a portable office building will be set up in Vega this week to house the panhandle's third Department of Energy information center concerning the proposed site in Deaf Smith County being considered for a nuclear waste repository.

The office will open Nov. 1 on the south side of the intersection of I-40 and State 385 in Vega. Two other offices are in Hereford and Tulia.

Effie Harle, a Vega resident who has assisted in Hereford's DOE Information Office since last spring, will staff the new office. Harle is a graduate of West Texas State University, has taught school, and owned and managed several businesses. She also assisted in fami-

ly owned oil-related service companies.

Harle said the Vega office would have a library identical to that of the Hereford office, but displays would differ.

The office will provide status reports on studies, access to technical reports such as environmental assessments of potential sites.

The DOE expects to issue final environmental assessments late this year or early in 1986. The assessments are used for the DOE's recommendation of three sites to be screened in the site characterization process. The Deaf Smith County site

## Senate Republican leaders trying to head off defeat of Jordan arms sale

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Republican leaders, trying to head off an embarrassing defeat for both President Reagan and Jordan's King Hussein, are scrambling to draft compromise legislation that would tie the proposed \$1.9 billion sale of arms to Jordan to progress in Middle East peace talks.

Sen. Richard Lugar, R-Ind., chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, talked privately with other lawmakers on Monday, as the Pentagon made the formal notification to Congress of the sale.

"The question before us ... is to discover whether it is possible ... to link progress toward peace with the

provision of arms," Lugar said in a prepared statement.

Congressional aides said that without the concessions on progress towards Middle East negotiations, the administration's requested arms sale appeared doomed. More than 70 senators and 225 House members already oppose Reagan's plan to sell Jordan either F-20 or F-16 aircraft in addition to other sophisticated weapons. The sale would go into effect in 30 days unless Congress vetoes it.

In releasing its formal notification, the Pentagon said Reagan wants to sell 40 advanced jet fighters and 300 air-to-air missiles at a cost of \$1.1

billion. In addition, the package includes improved Hawk air defense missile batteries and shoulder-fired Stinger missiles for another \$710 million, and 32 Bradley M-3 cavalry fighting vehicles for \$75 million.

"The sale of this equipment and support will not affect the basic military balance in the region," the Pentagon said. "The proposed sale is in the best interests of both the United States and Jordan because it meets Jordan's legitimate security requirements and furthers our

mutual objectives of fostering a just and lasting peace in the region."

Secretary of State George Shultz, testifying before congressional committees in recent days, also has said Hussein deserves the aid as a reward for taking the "risks of peace." Hussein has said he is prepared to negotiate with Israel, but also wants Palestinian negotiators to be present. He wants the talks held in an international forum.

But congressional critics of the deal, reflecting the views of Israeli leaders, say Hussein has yet to sit down and talk peace with Jerusalem, and until he does so, should not receive any U.S. military assistance.

Even so, many lawmakers who have expressed opposition to the sale have coupled their rejection with praise for Hussein, and made it clear they wish to nurture the king's participation in the peace process.

A Lugar aide said the committee chairman would attempt to tap that sentiment as he set out to shape legislation that would condition the arms sale on progress at the bargaining table.

## Envoy sent to repair relations

TUNIS, Tunisia (AP) — A special envoy sent by President Reagan to repair U.S. relations in the Mediterranean today faces a government angered by Washington's failure to condemn an Israel air raid on the PLO headquarters in Tunisia.

In previous stops in Italy and Egypt, Deputy Secretary of State John C. Whitehead has attempted to smooth over differences caused by a difference incident — the hijacking

of the Italian cruise ship Achille Lauro.

Whitehead arrived in Tunis on Monday and went straight into talks with Foreign Minister Beji Caid Essebsi. He was to meet today with Premier Mohamed Mzali and President Habib Bourguiba.

Tunisia has been a staunch friend of the United States for 30 years, and Bourguiba has been regarded as one of the region's most moderate

voices.

However, Mahmoud Mestiri, Tunisia's secretary of state of foreign affairs, said Reagan's failure to condemn Israel's strike on the Palestine Liberation Organization headquarters south of the capital created a crisis in U.S.-Tunisian relations.

The Israelis claim the Oct. 1 raid was in retaliation for a Sept. 25 terrorist attack on a bus in Jerusalem. (See ENVOY, Page 2)

rorist attack in Larnaca, Cyprus in which three Israelis died. The PLO has denied that it was involved in that attack.

The government news agency said 61 Palestinians and 12 Tunisians died, but Mestiri said about 30 Tunisians were killed in the raid.

Whitehead came to Tunisia from Cairo, where he said he and Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak reached a "better understanding of each other's point of view."

Egypt played a crucial role in negotiations for the release of the

cruise ship, but Mubarak accused the United States of treachery after Reagan ordered U.S. Navy jet planes on Oct. 10 to intercept an Egyptian Boeing 737 carrying the four hijackers to freedom. The plane was forced down in Sicily, where the hijackers were arrested and charged with piracy and murdering an American passenger.

In a statement read to reporters after Monday's meeting, Whitehead described relations between the United States and Egypt as close, vital and important. He said the

meeting "was a good first step toward furthering this relationship."

On Saturday, Whitehead's tour took him to Rome where he tried to heal Italian-U.S. relations, also frayed over the Achille Lauro affair.

Premier Bettino Craxi's coalition, 99.2nd collapsed over his decision to release Mohammed Abbas, a PLO official whom the United States accuses of masterminding the hijacking. However, on Monday President Francesco Cossiga asked Craxi to form a new government.

"The Changing Face of America: Immigration" was the program presented by Alberta Higgins when members of La Afflatus Estudio Club met recently in the home of Opal Elliston. Della Stagner served as co-hostess.

Higgins stated, "The enormous immigration is rapidly and permanently changing the face of America. It is altering the racial makeup, its land-

scape and cityscapes, its taste in food, clothes and music, its entire perception of itself and its way of life."

She said that Ellis Island was opened as a federal immigration station Jan. 1, 1892. The first immigrant to pass through Ellis Island was a 14 year-old girl from County Cork, Ireland. Officials presented her with

a \$10 goldpiece to mark the occasion, more money she told reporters than she had ever seen in her life.

Higgins added, "That day the station took in 2,251 people. As the tide of immigrants grew, the number coming in on any given day rose to 5,000. On peak days in 1907, 10,000 to 12,000 individuals might arrive."

"By 1954 Ellis Island had lost its purpose and it was declared surplus in 1955. It was put up for sale. Bids as low as five cents to \$202,000 was offered for the 27 and a half acres. In 1965 the federal law decreed the island a national monument.

"An effort is being made to restore the facility along with the Statue of Liberty," Higgins emphasized. "Of the 54,000 legal aliens who came into the U.S. in fiscal 1984, the largest group came from Mexico (57,000) or more, followed by Phillipines (42,000), Viet Nam (37,000) and Bri-

tain (14,000). There are many more who come in from all countries illegally thus helping to change the face of America.

# Coleman-less Cardinals have 2-game lead

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Vince Coleman's absence from the St. Louis Cardinals' lineup for the rest of the World Series changes nothing in the minds of the on-the-brink Kansas City Royals.

"We've lost two games without him," Bret Saberhagen, the Royals' starting pitcher in tonight's third

game, said with a wan smile Monday following a workout at Busch Stadium.

Coleman, who stole a rookie-record and major league-leading 110 bases this season, suffered what was called a bruised and scraped left leg during the National League playoffs when he became entangled in an

automatic tarpaulin machine here.

More extensive tests uncovered "a tiny bone chip on the outside of the left knee. It's in the area of the tenderness which wouldn't go away," Jim Toomey, the Cardinals' public relations director, said Monday. "The prescribed treatment for this is for Coleman to rest for six weeks, so he will not see any action in the World Series this year unless we get a lot of snow."

The overnight forecast was for mostly cloudy skies with a game-time temperature in the low 60s and a 30 percent chance of rain.

Coleman missed the final three playoff games against Los Angeles and the 3-1 and 4-2 victories in Kansas City. "How many games have they lost since he's been out?" Royals Manager Dick Howser asked no one in particular. "None, right?"

Case closed. Saberhagen, too, is recovering from an injury, but one far less

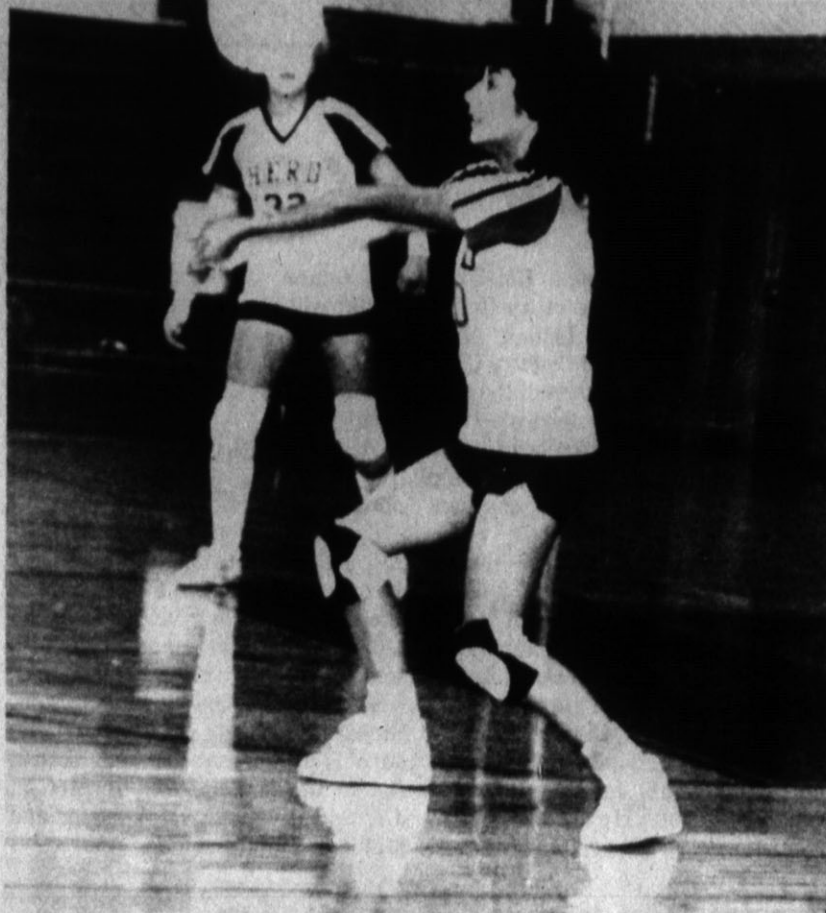
damaging. He was hit on the pitching hand by a comebacker off the bat of Willie Upshaw during the American League playoffs against Toronto and had to leave the game when the hand stiffened in the dugout.

"I had no problem yesterday, I had no problem today and it'll be all right in tomorrow's game," said Saberhagen, the ace of the Kansas City staff in 1985 with a 20-6 record.

The Royals were one out away from a 2-0 victory Sunday night before the Cardinals erupted for all four runs, three on Terry Pendleton's double.

"We're not going to take that into tomorrow's game," Saberhagen said.

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
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## Cost of convenience should be considered

You may be paying as much per pound for the convenience of individually packaged treats like fruit leather rolls for your child's lunch box, as you would for a pound of lobster.

With consumers willing to spend more money for convenience, "added-value" food products are now the biggest trend in the food industry, says family economics expert Nancy L. Granovsky.

"Adding value means taking a basic food product and making it more attractive and more profitable by making the product more convenient," says Granovsky, a specialist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

salad bars and frozen orange juice concentrate, pre-mixed and then sold in cartons in the dairy case, are just a few examples of added-value products, she explains.

"Many consumers don't realize what they're paying for the convenience of less food preparation time, because per pound comparisons of costs are difficult to make," the specialist points out.

For example, if you buy a whole fryer chicken on sale, you could pay around 49 cents a pound. But when that chicken goes into a frozen dinner or entree, Granovsky says the price goes up into the range of \$2.50-5.00 per pound.

"You may not mind the higher prices of added-value food, if you place a high premium on your time," Granovsky says. "But if you need to cut back on expenses, or you'd rather spend some of your money on things other than food, you might start by considering the cost of convenience."

BEFORE WE SPEAK

WE CAN REFRAIN from saying things which cause problems and difficulties. 'Before we speak' we have the right, perhaps it is a duty, to consider with the utmost care what we are going to say, and how it may affect us. Of course, we must also be concerned with the feelings of those to whom we may speak. After careful consideration, we may decide that it is best not to say anything. If we do decide to speak, we must do our best to say what will be most helpful to us, and also how those who hear us may feel. Such wise action does not require any form of dishonesty, or anything else undesirable.

BEFORE WE SPEAK, ask the question: will that I am thinking about saying help me or hurt me? Will it help or hurt the person to whom I speak? If it is going to be harmful to us or to others, we must not say it. If we are in a situation where a reply is required, or a com-

ment from us is indicated; we must make what we say something that will help us and not hurt anyone. We can at least be neutral in what we say.

WE MUST LEARN the art of being non-committal; indicating neither consent nor dissent. There is no merit in the manner of speech that brings forth the comment - "He says what he thinks." Many times this is exactly the wrong thing to say, and more often than not, there is no reason to say it. There is no reason why we should think that it is necessary for us to try to answer all questions presented to us, and no reason why we should want to comment upon every issue that arises.

THE POWER OF SPEECH is a great blessing, when it is used wisely; but unwise talk causes all kinds of problems. We can use our power of speech to help ourselves and to help others.

BEFORE WE SPEAK let us choose each word with the greatest of care.

## Alan King praises good food in new book

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Alan King: comedian, actor, producer, author and bon vivant.

King, who is also something of a gourmet cook, enjoys good food so much that he has joined forces with food critic Mimi Sheraton to write a book about cooking and eating. But mostly eating.

The book is called "Is Salami and Eggs Better Than Sex?: Memoirs of a Happy Eater," and it's from Little Brown and Co. King recalls some memorable meals around the world, and if you never thought food was funny, you haven't heard King talk about it.

King's brand of funny was once a fixture on television specials, but he has not done one in years.

"There just aren't any to do," he said. "The only TV specials I see now are when a network has an obligation to one of its regular stars. I much prefer producing for TV and the movies...."

"Thank God for Bill Cosby. I got a call the other day to do something. I think they're trying to dig up all the old stand-up comedians. Cosby brought back good, funny comedy."

King was just back from one of those whirlwind promotion tours,

and he had flown in by way of San Francisco, Philadelphia, Rio De Janeiro, Brazil, and Bogota, Colombia. No, he wasn't touting the book in South America, he was there as a movie producer.

Here, King was at one of his favorite eating places, Ma Maison's. He had a Bloody Mary with gin in front of him and he was swapping stories with Patrick Terrail, the owner of the restaurant. Terrail was telling him he was just completing a book on how to select a restaurant and how not to be intimidated by waiters and wine stewards.

"People think you get better food because you're a celebrity," King said. "That's not true. You go to a restaurant and you may not get the best table the first time. But if the food is good you keep going back until they know you as one of their best customers."

"New York is full of new restaurants. I don't want to go to any new restaurants. It took me long enough to find a few that I like. For instance, I like risotto, but it's hard to find. But there's one little restaurant that on a scale of one to 10 is a six. But they have good risotto, and with a salad and a red wine, it's great."

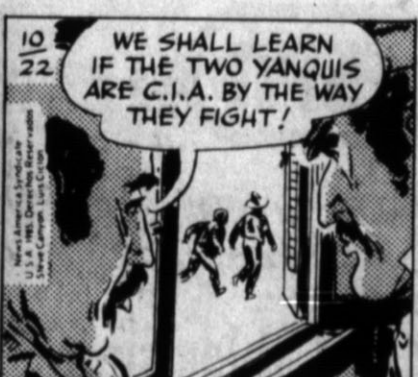
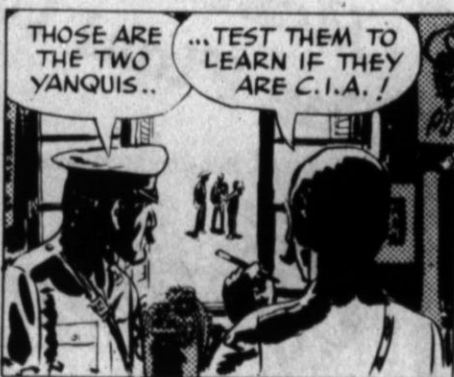

## Friendship strained by politics

**J ALLAS (AP)** — Businessman H.R. "Bum" Bright and former Texas Gov. Bill Clements once were close friends who ran in the same business circles, socialized together and shared political strategies. But lately a breach in that close alliance has developed, apparently helped along by Bright's decision to support former Congressman Kent Hance instead of Clements for the Republican nomination for governor of Texas. "I'm sure Bill feels badly I'm not supporting him," Bright said. "I have no personal gripe against Bill, and I hope he wouldn't to me. But Bill is a very competitive person, and he thinks if you're not for him, you're against him." Bright was state finance chairman for Clements in his unsuccessful bid for reelection in 1982. To add to the strain, Jim Francis, Clements' former campaign manager who is employed by Bright, is running the campaign of Hance, a former Democrat who switched parties earlier this year. Clements declined to comment on his relationship with Bright. "That's a very personal thing," he said, "and I don't think it has anything to do with this political campaign." When Clements was governor in 1981, he appointed Bright to the Texas A&M University Board of Regents, a post Bright resigned this year in a political spat with Democratic Gov. Mark White. That same year, Bright raised \$2.9 million for Clements at a dinner, setting a Texas fund-raising record and erasing Clements' 1978 campaign debt. Bright and Francis partly explain their new political allegiance to Hance by contending that Clements had told them several times he would not be a candidate for governor in 1986. But Clements said, "They hear what they want to hear. I told all of these (prospective) candidates... I reserve my judgment until they prove to me that they were indeed viable and credible statewide candidates, and then I'd make my mind up." He said he had decided Hance and U.S. Rep. Tom Loeffler, his two opponents for the Republican nomination, were not viable statewide candidates so he became a candidate himself. Francis, who encouraged Hance to run, likened Clements to Walter Mondale — a candidate who has money but represents the past, "a has-been."

He referred to Hance and Loeffler as a "couple of Gary Harts." But Clements' campaign organizer, Martha Weisend, commented, "If I remember correctly, Gary Hart lost." According to Bright, he and Clements have not talked much in several months. Some Republicans involved in 1986 campaigns predict the falling out between the two men could mean a nasty inner-party fight. One top Dallas County Republican, who asked not to be identified, told the Dallas Morning News, "That schism is so deep and wide that it could easily transmit into a vicious campaign by the candidates and their supporters." Clements said he doesn't know how the GOP dog fight will affect the party. "You know we have never been quite in this position before," he said, adding he hoped the competition wouldn't do irreparable damage. One unidentified Loeffler strategist, an elected official who asked not to be identified, told the News, "I think you're going to see Hance and Clements club it. I think it will be the bloodiest fight in years..."

The strain between the two old friends, who are only three years apart in age, became public in a big way with a newspaper story last month which quoted Bright as saying Clements had told him other Southwest Conference schools would be dragged into the football recruiting scandal that had sullied Southern Methodist University. Clements, chairman of the board of governors for SMU, angrily denied Bright's claim. when prosecutors joined the Wood case with the marijuana distribution case, they went on "an evidentiary field day" of testimony. A federal circuit appeals court turned down his appeal in July, saying combining of cases in one trial is widely accepted unless there is a compelling reason for separating the trials. ## Chagra loses appeal

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The Supreme Court has rejected the appeal by Jamie "Jimmy" Chagra of two federal convictions. The court turned down Chagra's appeal without comment Monday. Chagra contended that cases against him should have been tried separately because testimony on one charge on which he was acquitted prejudiced him on other counts for which he was sentenced to jail and fined. Chagra, of El Paso, Texas, was given a five-year term and \$10,000 fine for conspiracy to obstruct justice in the investigation of the 1979 assassination of U.S. District Judge John H. Wood Jr., and a 10-year sentence and a \$100,000 fine for conspiracy to distribute marijuana. Chagra contended that

when prosecutors joined the Wood case with the marijuana distribution case, they went on "an evidentiary field day" of testimony. A federal circuit appeals court turned down his appeal in July, saying combining of cases in one trial is widely accepted unless there is a compelling reason for separating the trials. Chagra was cleared of charges of conspiracy to murder Wood and of the murder itself, but was convicted of conspiracy to obstruct justice in the same event. **Football**  
 SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — Attorneys for Clinton Manges say they will appeal a judge's decision ordering the rancher-olman to pay overdue paychecks to the San Antonio Gunslagers.  
 Manges, owner of the United States Football League franchise, was ordered Monday by retired Judge Eugene Williams to make good on overdue paychecks worth \$601,000.  
 "We are now faced with an appeal," said Manges attorney Mike Maloney.  
 Such an appeal would have to be filed within 30 days.  
 Meanwhile, Phil Hardberger, attorney for the United States Football League Players Association, said he would begin foreclosure proceedings today on "everything we can get our hands on."  
 Such foreclosures, he said, could be delayed only if an appeal is sought and an appeal bond is posted.  
 A suit seeking payment of the overdue paychecks from May and June was filed by the USFL Players Association after an arbitrator ruled July 11 that Manges would have to make good on the payroll.  
 "I'm very pleased we got what we came for," said Doug Allen, executive director of the players association.  
 Hardberger said the court's ruling is much more powerful than an arbitrator's decision.  
 "Now we can prevent him from swapping land or selling it," Hardberger said of Manges. "We will continue to take every step as long as Mr. Manges has land in this state."  
 During testimony, Bud Haun, president of South Texas Sports, Inc., parent company of the Gunslagers, said the team had tried to borrow money to meet the payroll.  
 But efforts to raise the money had been unsuccessful.  
 "The reason we haven't paid — we just flat haven't had the money," Haun testified.  
 Haun also blamed the team's financial problems on the league's order that all franchisees help bail out such teams as Houston, Los Angeles and Birmingham.  
 "I have the deepest sympathy for them," Haun said of the 53 players.  
 The judge also ordered Manges to pay Hardberger \$24,000 in attorney fees.

**Houston (AP)** — A state district judge scheduled a hearing for today to decide whether she again will temporarily enjoin school districts from enforcing the state's controversial "no pass, no play" rule.  
 Houston attorney Anthony Sheppard is asking State District Judge Marsha Anthony to issue a temporary restraining order until the U.S. Supreme Court rules on a lawsuit challenging the school statute.  
 Sheppard, an attorney for failing students in Allef and Spring Branch school districts, filed a lawsuit last spring asking Ms. Anthony to temporarily enjoin district officials from using grades as a criterion for participation in extracurricular activities.  
 The judge, a former schoolteacher, ruled in May that the controversial rule was unconstitutional, but the Texas Supreme Court overturned her decision in August.  
 An appeal of the state high court's ruling is pending in the U.S. Supreme Court.  
 Sheppard also is asking Ms. Anthony to consider converting the lawsuit into a class action case.  
 Under the no pass-no play rule, a student failing to make a grade of at least 70 in any course during a six-week grading period can be banned from extracurricular activities during the next six weeks.

**Dallas (AP)** — Arkansas State quarterback Dwane Brown and linebacker Henry Jackson, both from defending champion Angelo State, have been named players of the week in the Lone Star Conference.  
 Williams and Jackson led the Rams to a 21-4 win over Texas Southern Saturday in their final action before the beginning of the 1985 LSC season.  
 Williams, a 5-9, 186-pound senior from Midland High, ran for 229 yards and scored twice on runs of 1 and 36 yards. He also maintained his LSC scoring lead and took over the top spot in LSC rushing at 106.6 yards per game.  
 Jackson, a 6-0, 217-pound senior from South Garland, had 19 tackles, one quarterback sack and an interception. He also blocked an extra point attempt.

**Chicago (AP)** — Albert "Runt" Pullins, a member of the original 1929 Harlem Globetrotters basketball team, died of emphysema at age 74.  
 Pullins got his nickname "Runt" because of his 5-foot-8-inch stature, which made him the second-shortest player on the original Globetrotters team. He toured with the team until 1934.  
 NEW YORK (AP) — A juror in the tax-evasion trial of boxing promoter Don King told U.S. District Judge Thomas P. Greisa that he has already formed an opinion, even before the prosecution has finished presenting its case.  
 Assistant U.S. Attorney Roanne Mann told Greisa that the juror was obviously prejudiced against the prosecution and should be replaced by an alternate. The defense argued that the juror had vowed to keep an open mind and should remain, and the judge agreed.  
 DALLAS (AP) — Quarterback Danny White is a probable starter for the Dallas Cowboys in their game here Sunday against the Atlanta Falcons, team officials announced on Monday.  
 White sat out the 16-14 loss to the Philadelphia Eagles with bruised ribs.  
 However, rookie guard Crawford Ker has been ruled out for the Atlanta game. Ker has been admitted to Baylor University Medical Center for traction treatment after suffering muscle spasms in his back.  
 Listed along with White as probable for the Atlanta game are linebacker Jeff Rohrer, despite a strained back; running back Timmy Newsome, despite continuing problems with an injured knee; and offensive tackle Phil Pondera, also still bothered by an old knee injury.

**Basketball**  
 NEW YORK (AP) — Rookie forward John "Hot Rod" Williams and the Cleveland Cavaliers agreed to withdraw his National Basketball Association contract pending the outcome of the state of Louisiana's appeal of his court case.  
 Williams, a former Tulane star, had been acquitted on sports bribery charges involving point shaving last season.  
 If Williams' court dismissal is upheld, NBA Commissioner David Stern will decide whether Williams is eligible to play.

**Boxing**  
 LONDON (AP) — A middleweight bout between two leading British boxers who publicly traded punches outside an exclusive club one month before their official fight was given the go-ahead — despite fears by police that it could stir up racial tension.  
 Errol Christie and Mark Kaylor, whose dislike for each other is well-documented, will fight Nov. 5 at the Wembley Arena in northwest London.  
 Kaylor is white, Christie black, and police feared the fight could whip up racial tension in the wake of several recent outbreaks of violence on London's streets.

**Baseball**  
 HOUSTON (AP) — Jim Leyland, third-base coach for the Chicago White Sox, is "high on the list" of candidates to become manager of the Houston Astros, says Astros General Manager Dick Wagner.  
 Leyland, 46, has been highly recommended to replace Bob Lillis, who was fired at the end of the regular season, and is "one of five — plus or minus one — that we are looking at."  
 Wagner said, "I'm going to talk to him Wednesday and see how he feels about our club and our league."  
 Wagner said Monday that Don Zimmer, a third-base coach with the Chicago Cubs, is no longer a candidate.  
 "We have not asked for permission to talk to him," he said.  
 Wagner said he hopes a new manager will be named shortly after the World Series.
