Seven Bills for Misdemeanors, One for Felony-Jury Discharged.

Following is the text of the Don-M. L. PRATHER, BL. D., Pres. ley county grand jury's report to

To Hon. Ira Webster, Judge 47th Judicial District of Texas:

We, the grand jury, empaneled at the July term, 1904, of the district court of Donley county, herewith submit this, our final report:

We have carefully inquired into and investigated violations of the criminal laws of Texas committed in Donley county and have returned into open court seven indictments for misdemeanors and one for felony.

We have inspected the public buildings and premises and find all kept in a reasonably good conrespectfully recommend that the commissioners court inspect the roof of the court house to cause any needed repairs to be made that may be necessary on ac-

We have found, upon investigation that there have been numerous cases of malicious mischief committed in the town of Clarendon, such as breaking out windows, turning out water, etc., and also petty theft. But in no case have we found sufficient evidence upon which to find indictments. We trust however, future grand juries of the county will not find sucti misdemeanors as

But the reakless habit of boys gathering over in negro town after dark and shooting up the town is about a thing of the past and the would-be "bad men from bitter creek" and the report of his pistol no more reminds the peaceful citizen that we are in the "wild and woolly west." If you hear any howl investigate the cause. If you hear any criticism or "fish stories" investigate them. My record as city marshal, my personal character and life are an open book and I invite the fullest investigation of them all

As city marshal I have never hesitated when state law were violated and against which the city had no ordinance-to logge complaints in the state courts, although I never got a cent from it, even where convictions were made, and have expended both time and money to get the proper evidence before the court to make convictions, especially for violations of the local option law.

I have never received any salary except fees in cases of conviction until the past eight months the city has paid \$10 per month for my attention to city affairs.

I make my race upon my own merits as an officer and citizen and ask that you investigate both fully.
