DSGH approves prison resolution

Deaf Smith County Hospital District joined other local governing entities Tuesday in adopting a resolution to support efforts to locate a minimum-security prison in Deaf Smith County.

The Deaf Smith County Hospital District board of directors unanimously passed a resolution to support the prison efforts. A similar resolution has been adopted by Deaf Smith County and will be considered in a special noon meeting Friday of the Hereford school board. The Hereford City Commission will consider a similar resolution at its meeting on Jan. 6.

Those resolutions, and others, will be included in a package to be presented to the Texas Department of Criminal Justice on Jan. 15.

Deaf Smith General Hospital Administrator Ron Rives told the hospital board Tuesday that the hospital's role in a prison "could be as broad or narrow as you choose it to be." If a prison is located in the county, the hospital could provide an infirmary at the hospital and provide for acute care needs of inmates.

"There would not be a lot of preparation, but there could be a lot of benefits for us," Rives told the board. Contracts with other hospitals for similar prison pay hospitals about \$1,200 per inmate per year, Rives said; that would mean \$1.2 million revenue for the hospital.

The resolution does not bind DSGH to provide for care of inmates, if a prison is located here.

Rives said the hospital operations and financial report for November was "not real exciting." The report showed the hospital's average daily census was 10.8, compared with 12.6 in November 1990.

"It's a lot like October, same song, second verse," said Rives. "It has been slow, but we have been a little busier in December."

Rives said the number of persons seen in the emergency room the past two weeks has increased significantly because of the flu outbreak in the county.

"People are coming to us with non-urgent needs because they feel they can't get in to see a doctor," Rives said. "That has brought us a few admissions, but not many."

The financial report showed the hospital had a profit of \$94,902 for November 1991, compared to a loss of \$11,918 in November 1990. Rives explained that if tax revenues are taken away, the hospital recorded a loss of \$87,000 for the month.

The cash flow statement, however, painted a rosier picture, with net cash flow from operating activities for the month of \$302,145.

Rives said the hospital has seen an increase in cash available because the business office has been playing catch-up with insurance claims and home health care billing.

"Three or four months from now, when we get all of these outstanding accounts taken care of, the cash will be depleted unless we see an increase in activity," Rives said. "...We will have to become more efficient."

Rives told the board he is working on establishing a community committee to assist the hospital in the recruitment of new physicians to the community.

"The one thing I have heard over and over is the need for more physicians," Rives said. "We want community involvement in the recruiting and retention of physicians. We need to community to tell us what they want and what they will do for physicians."

Rives said he wants to establish a task force including board members, hospital personnel, physicians and persons from the community.

"We need community involvement in this," Rives said. "That has been very lacking in the past. We need to hear the concerns of the community and see if they are willing to support our efforts."

"I want to encourage persons in the community to call Ron if they want to help," said board President Raymond Schroeder.

In other business, the board:

- Approved a contract for pharmacy management.
- Heard a report from EMS Director L.V. Watts on the state of ambulances in the department.
- Heard a report on marketing efforts by Steve Jolly.
- Gave informal approval to Dr. Robert Bidwell replacing Dr. Randal Vinther on the board., with formal approval expected in January.

County issues new voter cards

Voter registration cards to be used for elections during the next two years have been mailed this week to 8,419 persons who do, or did in the last two years, live in Deaf Smith County.

For those who still do live in Deaf Smith County, a special word of caution comes from County Clerk David Ruland: Look carefully at the voting precinct number -- it could be different from the last registration.

Preparing for the mail-out of more than 8,000 cards has not been an overnight chore, Ruland pointed out. His deputies worked for weeks getting the data in order.

Since re-districting of the county for commissioner precincts as well as voting precincts, re-assignment of many of the county's residents became a necessity.

Working with computer printouts of streets in Hereford and addresses outside the city limits, employees in the county clerk's office checked locations, using an enlarged map, and made precinct changes.

Ruland said there was no computer program for this task. "It all had to be done manually, physically comparing old and new precincts with map overlays," he said.

Connie Urbanczyk, Treva Hester and Ellic Reyes worked over several weeks on the project, when other duties were not pressing, Ruland said.

Once all the printouts had been gone through with a fine tooth comb, the data was entered into the computer.

Of the 8,419 registered voters, changes were required on almost 25 percent.

"Because of re-districting, 1,990 changes were made on the voter lists -- 23.8 percent," Ruland said.

With that step completed, a computer program was put into service to print the voter cards, but a small glitch almost ruined the day.

"We got the program from Hood County, but we discovered that the new cards are just enough different, in spacing, that we couldn't print," Ruland said. The programmer was not available to assist in solving the problem.

After "three or four hours of tinkering" with the program, Ruland had the minute changes made so the

cards would print out with the data in the proper spaces on the card.

"We were working on it last Saturday -- we had to be here to sell hunting licenses anyhow, so we made good use of the time," he added.

Once the printer started rolling, the job was finished with few problems and the physical work of getting the registration cards to the post office began.

The cards are printed in duplicate. The original is mailed and the copy is kept on file.

Since the cards came off the computer in alphabetical order by voter name, the original and copy had to be sorted again.

After they were separated, the originals were prepared for mailing by zip code. The carbon copies by voter certificate number.

All 8,419 registrations, then, were handled again, and again, to complete the mailing.

Each card will cost the county 17 cents in postage, in addition to a bulk mailing permit fee. But, at the 17-cent rate, Ruland will not pay an extra charge for the returned card, with a new voter address provided.

The U.S. Postal Service will not forward a card if the addressee is no longer a resident at the address. The card will be returned to the county clerk's office, with an address change, if available.

County residents can help, too, Ruland reminded. If a card is delivered to a residence and the addressee has moved, Ruland said, the card should be returned, not destroyed or sent on to the addressee.

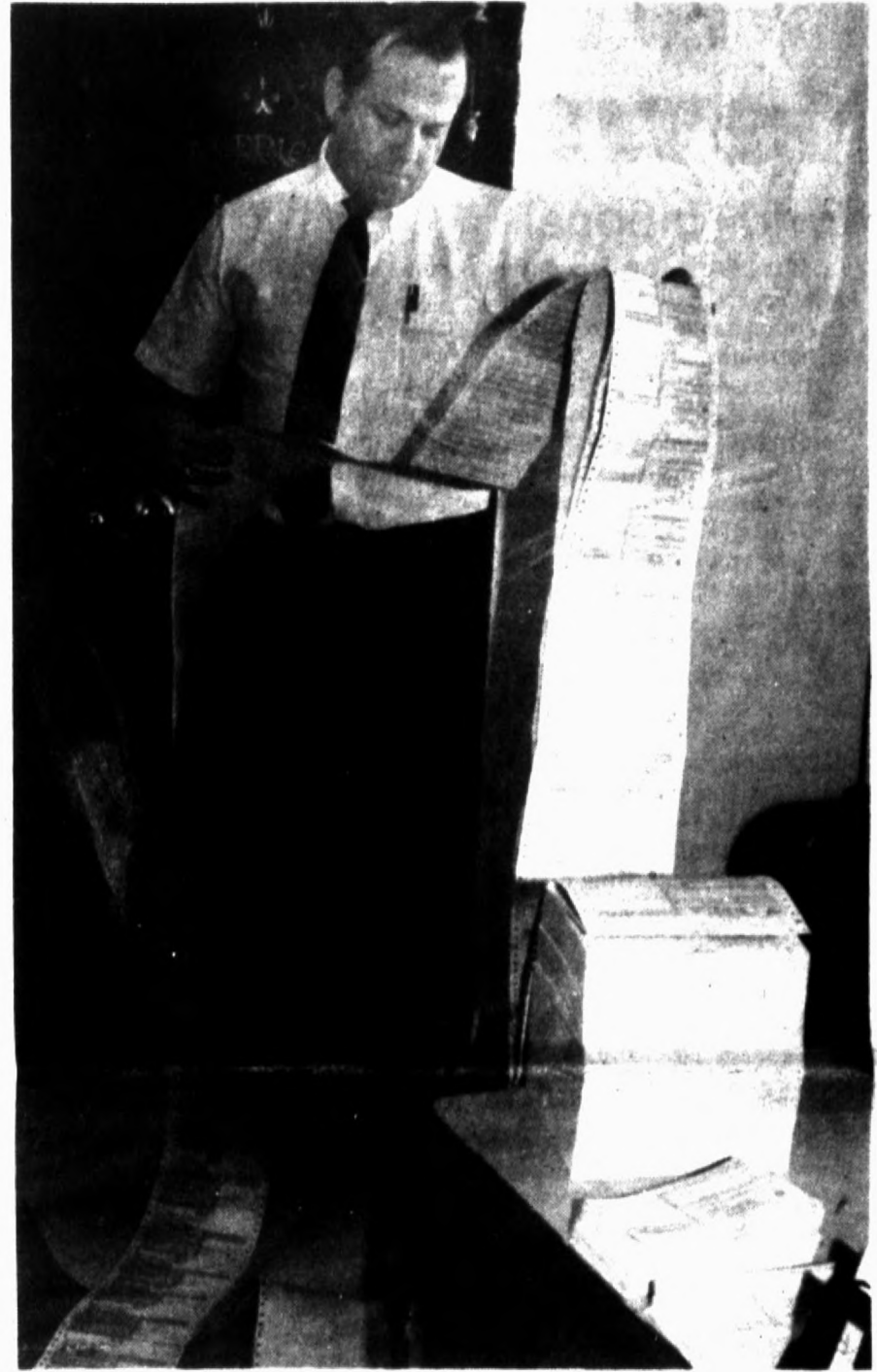
"This happens sometimes when a family member lived there but moved to another address or city," he said.

State law requires that new voter registration cards be mailed bi-annually. Since the 1990 U.S. Census, re-alignment of voting precinct lines also was necessary.

Returned cards will allow the voter rolls to be updated. Names will be purged from the rolls.

Residents who changed addresses in the city or county will not receive cards and will be given an opportunity to register in their new precincts.

By law, the new cards should have been mailed by Dec. 6, said Ruland, but most counties in the state did not

meet that deadline because of the redistricting process.

Since the U.S. Department of Justice must approve the redistricting plan and has not done so, yet, there is a

chance that some changes will be made later.

If precinct lines are changed, again, new cards will be mailed to those affected, Ruland said.

Prison 'game' very competitive

The competition for landing a state prison site is getting more competitive all the time, members of the Deaf Smith County Prison Task Force have learned.

But, as sub-committees study land sites and possible incentives that might be offered in applying for a site, they feel that a competitive package can be assembled without going "overboard on perks," reported task force chairman O.G. Nieman.

He added that the all-important site to be proposed here had not been determined yet. "We met Tuesday afternoon and discussed several sites again. We almost had two sites to propose, but problems came up with both of them."

A public informational meeting has been scheduled next Monday by the Prison Task Force. It will be held at the Hereford Community Center at 5:30 p.m. Members of the task force will outline the application process and respond to any questions or concerns.

Bill Barry, director of management services at the Texas Department of Criminal Justice in Huntsville, recently reported that more than 110 Texas communities have expressed interest in the prison facilities that will be awarded early next year by the TDCJ.

Barry said the proposals are getting more and more competitive, based on his conversations with

communities inquiring about proposals. However, Barry expects about 50 or 60 cities to actually submit proposals.

When community leaders first gathered in Hereford to launch a study, the chairman of Lamesa's successful task force group, reviewed some of the requirements and told about that city's incentive package which accompanied the application.

Lamesa's proposal was valued at \$2 million, which included a 320-acre plot of land, provisions for roads, utilities and waste disposal, and cash for other "perks."

After Lamesa was selected as a site, a fund-raising drive netted \$500,000 in just 30 days. The public

donations were used as incentives in the package for helping buy land and providing a house for the warden.

Although a boom in real estate is not expected, a survey conducted at the Price Daniel state prison unit in Snyder could give local folks some insight about what to expect, as far as employment and housing is concerned, if Hereford and Deaf Smith County should be selected for a prison site.

A senior warden at Snyder's prison conducted a survey of employees and had 172 persons, or more than half, respond. Of those, 95 were originally

Shooting woes hurt Herd cagers

Hereford's boys' and girls' basketball teams went to Canyon Tuesday night but couldn't find the baskets.

The coaches for both teams--Jimmy Thomas for the boys, Dickie Faught for the girls--cited shooting woes as their teams' main problems in bad losses to the Eagles.

The girls lost 48-20. "We shot about 18 percent," Faught said. "You can't beat a mediocre team shooting 18 percent; let alone a good one."

The girls were outscored by at least five points in each quarter. Their record is now 6-11.

"Either from nervousness or intimidation, we didn't focus well on shooting," Faught said. "Maybe we

felt the pressure of who we were playing, and that caused us to shoot poorly."

Canyon's girls are now 7-6. Canyon's boys are even better at 12-1, and they beat Hereford 61-37. The Herd played evenly with Canyon in the second half, but their downfall came in the second quarter, when they shot 1-for-15.

"If you play a team that's 12-1, you better play well," Thomas said. "In the first quarter, we played pretty well. The second quarter offensively was the worst we ever had."

While Hereford only scored two points in the period, Canyon scored 20. Both teams scored 29 in the second half.

"I was so proud of our kids in that second half," Thomas said.

Leo Brown led the Herd with 11 points. The boys' record is now 2-9. Faught said his team's performance included some positives.

"Our offensive rebounding positioning was a whole lot better than it had been," he said, "and our post defense was a whole lot better. Their big post only got 12 points... We had the defense right in their face." Misty Dudley led the Lady Whitefaces with eight points.

The boys' junior varsity saved a little face for Hereford with a 66-57 win in overtime, while the girls' JV fell 48-18.

The boys' JV trailed Canyon 28-17 at the half but scored 23 points in the third quarter and took the lead, 40-39. At the end of the fourth quarter, Canyon forced overtime by making a buzzer-beating shot to tie at 56-56.

Overtime belonged to Hereford, as the Herd scored 10 points to Canyon's one.

"The press worked well," JV coach Oscar Rendon said. "We got some easy baskets, then (Canyon) had to take some bad shots."

Greg Coplen scored 20 points for the JV, Angel Orosco had 14 and Tim Burkhalter had 13.

Jenifer Holmes led the girls' JV with 10 points.

Brown, Samples make All-South Plains team

Hereford senior football players Leo Brown and T.J. Samples were named to the 5A-4A All-South Plains football team by the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal.

Samples, a 6-foot-3, 280-pound guard, recorded 32 pancake blocks, while allowing only three sacks on the year for the Herd. His blocking was graded out by coaches at 87 percent.

Brown, a 6-2, 195-pound tailback,

broke the Hereford single-season record for rushing yards in 1991 with 1,577 yards on 282 carries. Brown is also a candidate for the Class 4A all-state team, which will be announced Thursday.

Both Samples and Brown were first-team all-district selections, and were team captains for the 7-3 Hereford football team.

'Noles' Lee out of Cotton Bowl

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) - Florida State's leading rusher, junior tailback Amp Lee, is academically ineligible for the Cotton Bowl.

"It is a shame that this has happened," coach Bobby Bowden said Tuesday. "I know Amp was excited about playing in the Cotton Bowl and he has indicated to me that he is looking forward to his senior year at Florida State."

The fifth-ranked Seminoles (10-2) play No. 9 Texas A&M (10-1) in the Cotton Bowl at Dallas on New Year's Day.

Lee, who gained 977 yards rushing and caught 26 passes for 336 yards this season, failed to meet NCAA academic standards in the just-completed semester.

He could still have qualified for the game, because NCAA rules say

the player's ineligibility starts the first day of classes in the next semester - Jan. 6 at Florida State. But the school's policy is that the player is immediately ineligible.

Lee, who is majoring in social science, can regain his eligibility for next season by improving his grades before practice begins. Lee said he was "very upset" at failing to make his grades and he would attend Tallahassee Community College in the spring to improve them.

"I did not fulfill the expectations of a lot of people, including myself and my teammates," Lee said. "This, in no way, should be construed as my making a decision to leave school and turn professional."

Replacing Lee in the Cotton Bowl will be sophomore Sean Jackson, who has gained 392 yards on only 63

carries, an average of 6.2 yards per carry.

News that Lee will be unable to play in the bowl game was the latest blow to Florida State, which was ranked No. 1 all season until losing its last two games to Miami and Florida.

Lee, known for his darting cuts and shiftiness rather than his speed, is only 32 yards shy of becoming the first Florida State player to rush for 2,000 yards and catch passes for

1,000 yards in his career. Should he return for his senior year, Lee figures to easily reach that plateau.

"I have not, in any way, ruled out returning to Florida State next year and I intend to work toward graduation and earning a degree," Lee said.

For his career, Lee has rushed for 2,092 yards and caught 70 passes for 968 yards. He has scored 30 touchdowns rushing and eight receiving.

Morris may leave Twins

NEW YORK (AP) - Less than two months after the World Series, Jack Morris appears to be leaving the Minnesota Twins.

He could find a new team as soon as today.

Morris, the World Series MVP who pitched a 10-inning, 1-0 shutout in Game 7, is scheduled to meet with the Toronto Blue Jays.

Meanwhile, Bob Kipper has a new team and Rick Sutcliffe is getting closer to finding one.

Kipper, a 27-year-old reliever who left the Pittsburgh Pirates to become a free agent, agreed Tuesday to a \$1 million, one-year contract with the Twins. Sutcliffe has narrowed his list to three teams, including the Baltimore Orioles.

The New York Mets, the biggest free-agent spenders of the offseason, are thinking about adding another. And one of the infielders they are considering is former New York Yankees second baseman Willie Randolph.

The San Diego Padres dropped out

of the bidding for free agent outfielder Danny Tartabull, saying they couldn't afford his request for a five-year contract at more than \$4 million per season.

Morris, who made \$3.7 million in 1991, the most among pitchers, declined to exercise his \$3.65 million option with the Twins, his hometown team.

Minnesota offered to raise Morris' 1992 salary, but not by as much as the pitcher wanted. Twins general manager Andy MacPhail, anticipating a multimillion dollar contract extension for Kirby Puckett, said he couldn't afford to go higher.

"I think it's really down to Toronto and Boston, both of which are acceptable alternatives, even though it's not his first choice," said Morris' agent, Richard Moss.



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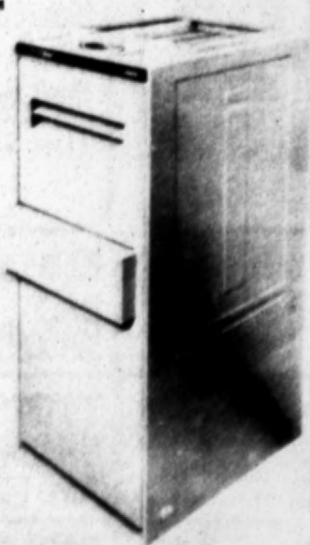

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Cavaliers burn Heat

Miami easily has the best record of the four NBA expansion teams, so Cleveland's 20-point halftime lead over the Heat at halftime was somewhat surprising.

It got worse after the third quarter as the margin climbed to 39 points.

It got worse still as the Cavaliers outscored the Heat 42-13 in the final period for a 148-80 victory, the most lopsided margin in NBA history.

"I don't know what we played, but it wasn't basketball," the Heat's Glen Rice said.

The Heat, 11-12 while the other three expansion teams are at least 10 games under .500, ran into a Cleveland team that had blown several large leads this season and were determined not to let it happen again, especially at home.

"It's good to keep the pressure on them when you're up," Cleveland's John Battle said. "After a while, we just couldn't stop it."

The 68-point margin eclipsed the mark of 63 set March 19, 1972, when the Los Angeles Lakers beat the Golden State Warriors 162-99.

Elsewhere on Tuesday night, it was New York 102, New Jersey 94; Boston 105, Orlando 98; Utah 122, Charlotte 102; Atlanta 117, Indiana 113; the Los Angeles Lakers 102, Chicago 89; San Antonio 98, Dallas 87; Houston 100, Washington 97; Seattle 116, the Los Angeles Clippers 99; and Golden State 119, Minnesota 105.

Mark Price and Battle led Cleveland with 18 points each. Steve Smith scored 15 for the Heat.

Lakers 102, Bulls 89

Los Angeles handed defending champion Chicago only its second loss in 19 games behind James Worthy's 25 points.

Los Angeles gradually pulled away in the fourth quarter, opening an 87-76 lead with 6:07 left, and the

closest Chicago could get was eight points.

Michael Jordan led the Bulls with 21 points, but missed 14 of 20 shots.

Spurs 98, Mavericks 87

David Robinson had 22 points, 12 rebounds and eight blocked shots in Dallas one day after he was married in San Antonio.

Willie Anderson had 18 points, 12 rebounds and 10 assists for the Spurs, who also got a good performance from newly acquired Vinnie Johnson, who tied the game at 72-72 before Donald Royal's layup put the Spurs ahead for good.

Derek Harper and Rolando Blackman scored 21 points each for the Mavericks.

Rockets 100, Bullets 97

Otis Thorpe's layup gave the Rockets the lead for good, 97-95, with 28 seconds remaining, and Kenny Smith's free throw with 6.6 seconds left made it 98-95.

Two free throws by Michael Adams, who scored 22 points, pulled the Bullets within one with 3.8 seconds remaining before Hakeem Olajuwon scored the final points of the game on two free throws.

Pervis Ellison led the Bullets with 27 points and 15 rebounds.

SuperSonics 116, Clippers 99

Seattle, behind 16 points apiece by point guards Nate McMillan and Gary Payton, snapped the Los Angeles Clippers' eight-game winning streak.

Benoit Benjamin scored 20 points and Ricky Pierce 19 for Seattle, which took away any doubt of the outcome with a 14-2 spurt for a 113-88 cushion with less than two minutes left.

Ron Harper led Los Angeles with 18 points.

Warriors 119, Timberwolves 105

At Oakland, Golden State handed Minnesota its ninth straight defeat as

Tim Hardaway scored 30 points and Chris Mullin 28, including the 10,000th of his NBA career.

Doug West scored 28 points for Minnesota.

Knicks 102, Nets 94

New York erased a nine-point deficit with a 19-0 burst and remained the NBA's only unbeaten team at home by holding New Jersey scoreless for 7:40 in the fourth quarter.

John Starks came off the bench to lead the Knicks with 27 points.

Drazen Petrovic led the Nets with 19 points.

Celtics 105, Magic 98

Boston squandered a 16-point lead but held on to win at Orlando behind Reggie Lewis' 23 points.

The Magic, losers of eight consecutive games, closed to 81-80 by scoring the first 11 points of the fourth quarter. The Magic tied the game four times after that, but didn't pull ahead.

Scott Skiles led Orlando with 18. Hawks 117, Pacers 113

At Atlanta, Dominique Wilkins scored 39 points and Duane Ferrell a career-high 25 as the Hawks held off Indiana.

Trailing 114-104 with 3:31 remaining, the Pacers closed to 114-113 on Chuck Person's 3-pointer with 1:16 to play.

Reggie Miller led the Pacers with 28 points.

Jazz 122, Hornets 102

Jeff Malone covered for the absence of Karl Malone by scoring 22 of his season-high 34 points in the first half as Utah won at Charlotte.

Karl Malone, the NBA's No. 3 scorer, sat out because of a one-game suspension for a flagrant foul against Detroit's Isiah Thomas on Saturday night.

Kenny Gattison paced the Hornets with 19 points.

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. (AP) - It took career games by North Carolina's George Lynch and Eric Montross to help the ninth-ranked Tar Heels avoid a second upset to a Florida team in three days.

Lynch came off the bench for 24 points while the 7-foot Montross had 21 points and 12 rebounds as the Tar Heels rallied from a 13-point deficit in the second half Tuesday night to down Jacksonville 98-87.

"Eric still isn't where he's going to be," North Carolina coach Dean

Smith said. "But he was certainly effective."

Smith was just happy to have a win following his team's first loss of the season, an 86-74 Atlantic Coast Conference home defeat to Florida State.

In the only other game Tuesday night involving a ranked team, No. 12 Michigan State crushed Illinois-Chicago 75-51.

Lynch, a 6-foot-7 junior, did not start in Tuesday night's game after fouling out with just nine points

against Florida State. He scored 20 of his 24 points in the second half Tuesday and did not miss a shot, hitting eight field goals and four free throws.

Lynch's eight points keyed an 18-0 run that gave North Carolina (7-1) control of the game, while Jacksonville went more than six minutes without scoring.

DEAR ANN LANDERS:

My beautiful 19-year-old son was murdered by two hoodlums who stole his car. He is buried in a cemetery in North Hollywood. I recently visited his grave.

Soon after, I wrote a letter of complaint to the cemetery about a situation I find appalling. And now I am writing to you, because I value your opinion and need to know if I have a legitimate complaint.

More and more people are using the cemetery to jog, walk, bike and learn to drive. Young children play in the water fountain. Some folks bring lunches and picnic there.

I received a response from the cemetery agreeing that people should not use the grounds to learn to drive and kids should not be playing in the fountain. But it said, "We don't believe ALL activities are inappropriate. We feel that the park is for the living, as well as the dead, and we don't think peaceful, quiet activities such as walking and jogging demean those who are buried there."

I always thought a cemetery was a place to bury loved ones, a place of beauty for quiet meditation, not a multi-purpose piece of real estate. I realize that most people feel that once a person is dead, he is dead and cemeteries aren't important. I felt that way, too, before this horrible loss. Had I known the place was like an amusement park, I would not have buried my son there.

It upsets me that I do not have the funds to move his grave to another cemetery. Please, Ann, advise your readers to check out the cemetery in advance. They should ask, "Do you allow the public to use the grounds for exercising and recreational purposes?" I feel strongly that parks are the appropriate places for jogging, bicycling and laughing children. Am I wrong?—Grieving Parent, North Hollywood, Calif.

DEAR PARENT: I can understand

why you are upset. Your letter points up the importance of checking out the cemetery in advance.

Since there is nothing you can do about this situation, please consider using your place of worship to meditate and find peace.

DEAR ANN LANDERS: It has taken me a long time to write this response to "Florida Wreck," whose husband ran off with an old flame he met at their high school reunion.

My story is similar, except we had been married 30 years when my husband developed a full-blown case of the middle-aged crazies. After I quit trying to figure out what I had done wrong, I started to heal, but my self-esteem was zero.

When my husband left me, I had never held a full-time job. Thankfully, my children were grown, so the only emotional wreck I had to deal with was myself.

After two years of counseling, two years of college, nine years of employment, many prayers and the support of friends and family, I am leading a productive life. I am nothing like the 47-year-old wreck I was when I thought life held nothing for me.

I'm now nearly 60 and have a good life. If I can do it, anyone can. So I want to say to "Florida Wreck" take whatever steps are necessary to work through the pain and God bless you.—Single and Happy in Missouri

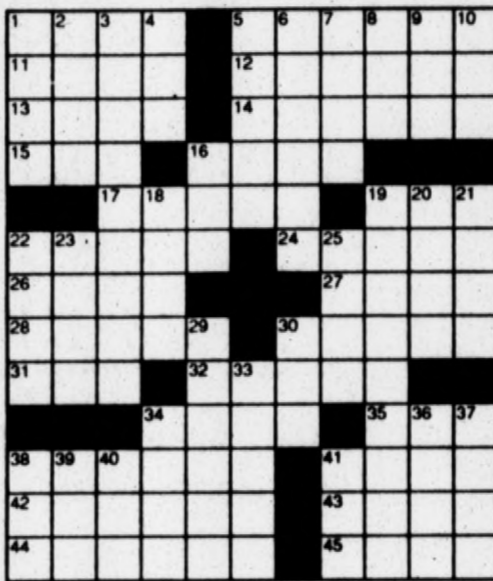

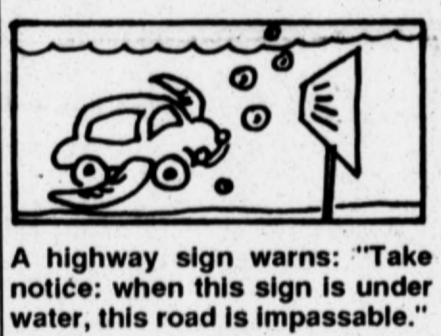

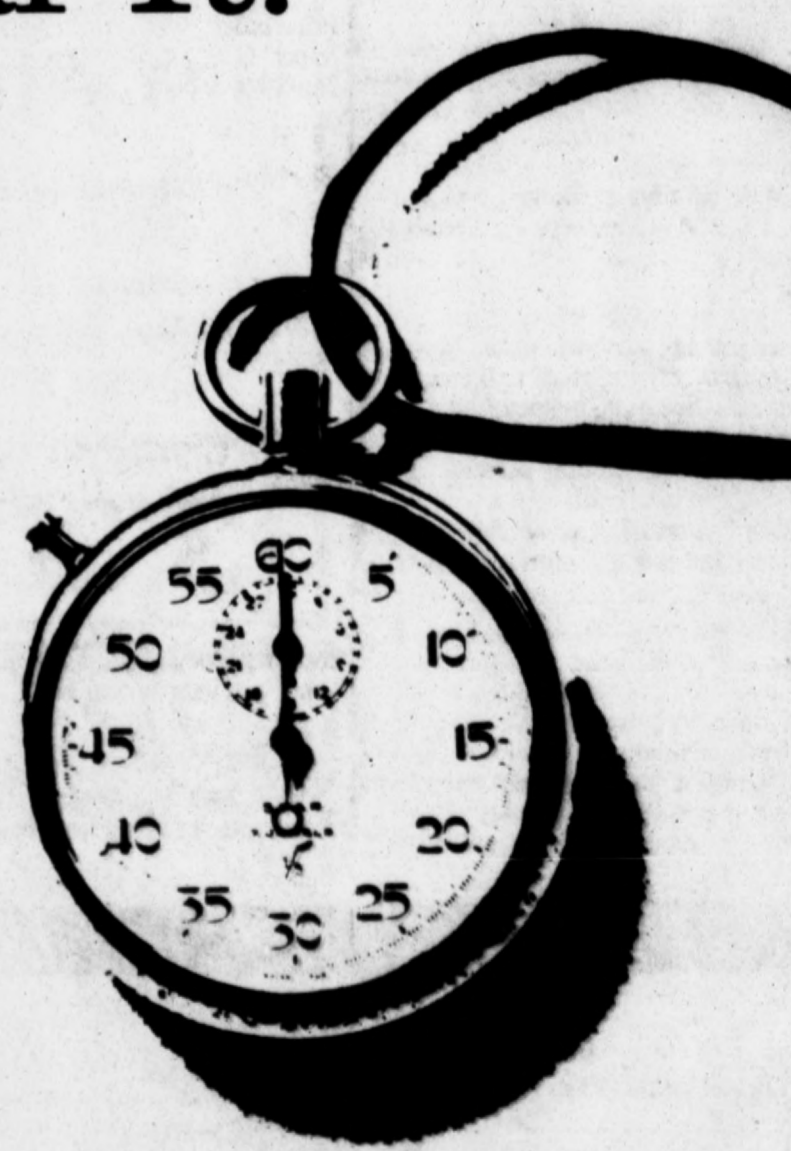

Ask Dr. Lamb

DEAR DR. LAMB: Two years ago my husband informed me that he had been having an affair. We worked out our marital problems, but a year later I broke out with sores on my genitals. The doctor said it was herpes. He drew blood from my husband and myself, sent them off for verification and later informed me that the tests were positive. Then he put me on Zovirax. I took the pills for about two months and the symptoms disappeared.

Later our family moved to another town. The change and trying to hold my marriage together was a big strain on me. I have been told that stress will cause an attack of herpes, but I did not have another flare-up.

Could the diagnosis and test results have been incorrect? My husband never did have any symptoms. Why? Will I always be a carrier and never cured?

This is constantly on my mind. I have no one to confide in but my husband, and he does not feel the diagnosis was correct in the first place and doesn't feel it is his fault. Your help in clearing up this mess will be appreciated.

DEAR READER: If the blood tests were positive that means you have herpes simplex. If I understand your letter correctly, it means your husband also has herpes. Earlier tests

did not distinguish between oral and genital herpes because the two viruses are almost interchangeable, but more recent tests are able to do this. I can't say which test was done in your case. Your doctor could also tell from studies of secretions from the active lesion when you have an outbreak.

A very high percentage of people who have genital herpes do not know it. They may have the disease and not have any sores. Since the virus can survive in a dormant state for life, a person may go through life with the infection and never know it unless a blood test shows that he has antibodies to the virus. That may explain why your husband had no symptoms. It also tells you that you have no way of knowing when either one of you got herpes. Your husband may well have had genital herpes long before his affair. If either of you were sexually active before marriage, either or both of you could have had silent genital herpes all these years. A failure to understand this point has led to marital discord in many instances.

DEAR DR. LAMB: I have severe osteoporosis and take calcitonin by injection and calcium tablets (1,500 mg daily). Should I take the calcium tablets with milk or with citrus juice? One source says take them with milk at bedtime. The other source says that milk hinders absorption of calcium and you should take them with citrus juice. Which is correct?

DEAR READER: Both milk and citrus juice enhance the absorption of calcium. The lactose in milk is the factor that enhances calcium absorption. Milk and milk products are the only sources of lactose in our diet. Milk itself is the most important dietary source of calcium. It is better than calcium pills if you can use a little more than a quart a day.

Acidity enhances calcium absorption, hence citric acid as found in orange juice does enhance it. But beware of coffee, tea and colas which can significantly decrease calcium absorption if you use many of these items.

Students who are selected as an Outstanding Rural Scholar based on academic records and recommendations are also eligible for loans under the Outstanding Rural Scholar Recognition Program.

State funds are available through this program to match the rural

sponsor's contribution. For each year that the student works for the sponsoring community organization after graduation, one year's principal and interest on the loan is forgiven.

Many rural Texas communities already subsidize educational expenses for local students pursuing a health career. The Outstanding Rural Scholar Recognition Program can help a community ensure a well-trained and committed health care work force for the future.
