

WILBARGER IS EXPECTING TO BE OIL POOL

Excitement at Fever Heat Over Recent Strikes In New Field

The Prescott-Feoria well on the Wharton Ranch, about 12 or 13 miles south of Vernon, in Section 51, Block 2, blew in at 1 a. m. Wednesday, despite the most carefully laid plans of management and drillers to hold it down until Saturday, when it was intended to turn it loose in full view of a crowd to be assembled for the occasion. As a result of the lucky strike, Vernon is an oil town overnight, leasing activities border on frenzy, and every train coming into Vernon is loaded to the guards with newcomers hungry for their share of quick and easy wealth.

The rush of oil hit the crown block and went twenty feet over the top of the derrick, spattering the surrounding ground for a radius of 150 feet or more, coming from an eight-inch pipe at a depth of 2,040 feet, with a penetration into the sand of but 18 inches.

The well flowed by heads and was placed under control at 7 o'clock morning, when the casing was capped with a control head and all the tools placed on top of the well to hold down the immense pressure. The well was drilled with cable tools, the bit reached the top of the sand last Friday, drilling being continued thereafter with caution, but Wednesday morning, while the drillers were away, the well blew in.

Flow tanks arrived at the lease Thursday and after pipe line connections have been made, the well will be given an opportunity to show what it can do. Lloyd Sigler, the general manager of the company, stated that the well made two spurts in one hour, the flow amounting to 80 barrels per hour, and he is of the opinion that the well is good for 1,000 barrels. Mr. Sigler is of the opinion that the new field will equal the northwest Extension field and will open the biggest oil pool in Texas.

In addition to Mr. Sigler, M. B. Hasleton, president of the Prescott-Phoenix Company, Senator W. R. Reynolds of New York and P. P. Langford of Wichita Falls are in Vernon looking after their interests in the well and the surrounding field, which is their announced intention to develop as fast as

rigs can be obtained and brought in. The well was begun by the Waggoner-Ranch Oil Company and taken over by the Peoria-Prescott Company through a deal by which A. G. Carter and W. C. Stripling of Fort Worth retired from the project on the theory that it was a dry field and not worth developing. It is the twelfth successive well drilled in North Texas by the Prescott-Feoria concern during the past twelve months, without a single dry hole.—Vernon Record.

REGIONAL TALKS
PLAN OF BAPTISTS

Dallas, March 29.—In preparation for the intensive evangelistic campaign which Texas Baptists are planning for in April and for the Round-up campaign for \$100,000,000 in pledges during the latter part of the month, Dr. F. S. Groner, general secretary of the Baptist Executive Board, has announced five regional conferences to be held in different parts of the state at which all pastors in the state, all missionaries, and the associational organizers of the 75 Million Campaign, will be present. The expenses of these representatives will be borne by the Baptist Executive Board.

These conferences will be held in the following places: Sweetwater, on April 6; Dallas, April 7; San Antonio, April 8; and Houston, April 9. A conference will also be held in the El Paso and Pecos Valley district, but the date for this meeting has not yet been announced.

In attendance at these conferences will be the most noted leaders of the denomination in the state, among them are Dr. Geo. W. Truett, Dr. F. S. Groner, Dr. T. V. Neal, and Dr. J. L. Gross, secretaries of the Board; Mr. R. E. Burt and Mr. M. H. Wolfe, both prominent laymen of Dallas. They will make addresses and lead in the conferences.

At these conferences plans for the evangelistic campaign to be waged during April will be discussed, and the local organization completed. Enthusiasm will also be aroused for the securing of pledges in the \$100,000,000 round-up campaign, which will be held the last week of April. The conferences will last a day at each place and a large attendance is expected.

FEEDING BABY CHICKS BE DONE CAUTIOUSLY

Best Results Obtained by Observing Rules Outlined Here for Poultry Raisers.

(By F. W. Kaseair)

There are many good ways of feeding baby chicks. Some general principles should be observed regardless of the method followed or used.

Before emerging from the shell the baby chick absorbs the yellow or yolk of the egg. This is nature's provision to keep the chick alive until a few days old and strong enough to move about. The absorption of this yolk makes it necessary not to feed the chick too soon. We believe it better to wait with the substantial food until the chick is very active and hungry; generally not much before three days old.

Do Not Feed Too Soon

The first three days, the baby chicks need heat and sleep above all else. We find it advantageous to give them sour milk to drink as soon as they are dry. Fresh water, chick size grit and charcoal may also be placed before them, as soon as possible. If they get very restless, darken the brooder, until time to give them their first food. Darkening the brooder will prevent toe picking and other bad habits, they sometimes develop before they are given substantial food. The water and milk should be given in special dishes, so they cannot get into them. Chick size fountains are best.

When by their actions they show to be very hungry give them their first food. A good starting food is common corn bread, thoroughly baked, and dry and ground up fine. Equal parts of dried bread crumbs and rolled oats mixed with 10 percent of hard boiled eggs, is another good starting food. These starting foods should be fed in such a way they can find it readily. We recommend feeding on low rim pie tins, shingles, clean boards or cardboard. Feed in such a way all chicks can eat at one time without crowding. The same applies to water fountains.

The first five days, feed starting food five times a day; but never all they want or would eat. Keep them a little hungry at all times.

Never Over Feed.

Many people over feed the small chicks.

The baby chicks, that refuse to come to the feeding dishes the morning of the second day should be killed and burned. At best they could not develop into profitable chickens.

Never feed anything but pure and wholesome feeds. Musty, moldy or heated corn meal or any other kind of food, will kill baby chicks.

Sour milk is a most wonderful food for baby chicks, and should be provided by all means, even though comparatively expensive.

From five days to two weeks, feed the starting food three times a day and give two feedings of fine cracked corn, kafir, milo, or a mixture of fine cracked grains, including wheat and heavy rolled oats. These grains may be fed scattered in a dry litter, to induce exercise. For best results it is necessary to keep the chicks working and busy. It aids digestion and keeps them out of mischief.

At this time a very small amount of green food, may also be provided. Any kind of succulent green food will answer the purpose.

In the period of five days to two weeks, a dish full of dry wheat bran may be kept before them all the time. When they get so they waste it, place it in special chick dry mash hoppers or boxes.

From two weeks to four weeks, reduce the number of feedings from five to three a day. One feeding of starting food, two of fine crack-grains in the litter, and the following dry mash mixture before them all the time, in the place of the dry wheat bran, namely—2 parts wheat bran, 2 parts corn meal, 1 part wheat shorts, one-half part of high grade sifted beef scraps and 5 percent of pure ground bone meal.

From four to eight weeks—reduce number of feedings to two, daily, at noon and night of the cracked grain mixture (course) in the litter. Discontinue starting food entirely. Dry mash mixture before them all the time, as of course also a dish of sour milk, fresh water, chick size grit, charcoal and plenty of green food.

Keep the chicks warm at all times. Allow the chicks to run on fresh ground.

Keep them dry and free from vermin.

Make them work. Do not let them crowd. Kill off weak and ailing chicks. Never feed doubtful feed. Do not use mouldy litter.

CLOVIS MEN BUY MILL PROPERTIES

One of the biggest deals made in Clovis business circles for sometime was made this week when W. B. Cramer, Cash Ramey, C. C. Riddings, R. A. Yost and J. W. The mill will be for the present under the management of C. C. Riddings and R. A. Yost, the latter having been with the old firm for several months.

The News is pleased to state that Lester Stone, who has so successfully managed the Clovis Mill & Elevator Co. here, although disposing of his interests, will not leave Clovis.—Clovis News.

WAR INSURANCE IS VERY GOOD THING

Announcement is made by Director R. G. Cholmeley-Jones of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance that the insurance division of the bureau is virtually at the end of its period of congestion and consequent dissatisfaction and vexatious delays, resulting from the great volume of work suddenly thrown upon it by the demobilization of the armed forces during the past year.

Former service men whose insurance has lapsed or has been canceled are encouraged to take advantage of the very liberal provisions for reinstatement of War Risk Insurance by the payment of two monthly premiums with the application and a satisfactory statement of health. They are assured that from now on, receipts for premiums will be sent to them within a few days from the date of the original receipt of the remittance. Instead of the form paragraphs and unsatisfactory form letters which formerly it was necessary to use to answer the flood of mail, they will be replied to with real letters in insurance cases which require detailed and specific answers.

The number of unposted premiums in the bureau, which last October was approximately 88,000 has just been reduced to an average of 10,000 or less than one day's work.

Unanswered mail in the insurance division shows a reduction of approximately 60 percent from the daily balance of five months ago. Probably it will be two or three weeks before it will be possible to answer all the letters as quickly as it is now possible to mail out receipts for premiums, but it is a matter of only a few weeks before the answering of all ordinary inquiries in reference to insurance matters within four days of their receipt in the bureau will be the regular practice.

While some difficulties due to failure of service men to furnish serial numbers and other necessary information always will be inevitable, very serious handicaps in the addressing of the men have just been overcome. Through a special appropriation made by Congress, the bureau has been enabled to put its entire list of former service men on addressograph plates. This prevents errors that previously occurred through repeated copying from the millions of records with typewriters.

Former service men desiring to reinstate War Risk Insurance which has lapsed or been canceled, or to convert their insurance in cases where it is now in force, should apply to any post of the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, or other organizations of former service men, Army, Navy and Marine Corps recruiting stations, State Insurance Commissioners, any home service section of the American Red Cross, Salvation Army, Knights of Columbus, Jewish Welfare Board, Y. M. C. A., or to other fraternal

or welfare organizations or agencies which are in a position to furnish blanks and necessary information. Or, if they prefer to do so, they should write directly to the Insurance Division, Bureau of War Risk Insurance, Washington, D. C., in all cases furnishing the following six points of information for the identification of their cases in the records:

1. Full name (including first, middle and last name) and complete address.
2. Rank, rating or grade at the time of original application for insurance.
3. Army or Navy organization at time of original application for insurance.
4. The number of Insurance Certificate or Government Life Insurance Policy, if known.
5. Army Serial Number, if in the Army.
6. Date of discharge, if discharged.

Service men whose insurance has lapsed or has been canceled are reminded, however, that as long as they are without insurance, they are without its protection, and, in their own best interests, should apply for reinstatement of their insurance without delay.

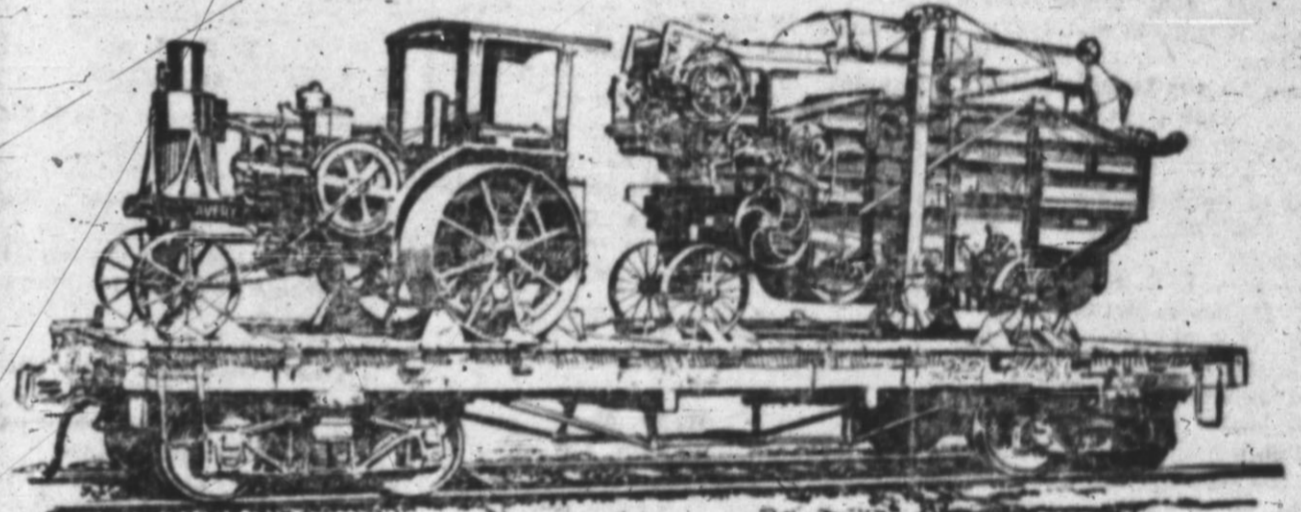
