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

Six hurt in Friday wreck

Six persons were injured, four seriously, in a two-vehicle accident Friday afternoon south of Hereford.

A 1985 Lincoln driven by Carlos Chavez, 41, of Hereford collided with a 1984 Jeep Wagoneer driven by Samuel Sheffield, 15, of Hereford. The accident occurred at the intersection of U.S. Highway 385 and a county road three miles south of Hereford.

The Lincoln was going south on U.S. 385 when Sheffield pulled out

in front of the Lincoln. The Wagoneer struck the right front of the Lincoln, which came to a stop just south of the impact point.

Sheffield was alone in the Wagoneer. With Chavez in the Lincoln were his wife, Anna Maria Chavez, 40; his brother, Robert Chavez, 36, of Houston; his father, Francisco Chavez; and his mother, Elija Chavez, 63.

Department of Public Safety Cpl. Bill Scott said Francisco and Robert

Chavez were riding in the back seat of the Lincoln, with the others in the front. Cpl Scott said he was unsure whether anyone in the Lincoln was wearing a seat belt.

All six were taken to Deaf Smith General Hospital. Three were taken in Hereford EMS ambulances, two were transported in Suburbans of the Hereford volunteer Fire Department, and another was transported in an ambulance called in from the Dimmitt

EMS. Emergency workers, because of the severity of the injuries, were at the scene for over 30 minutes treating the injuries.


Sheffield and three of the persons in the Lincoln were treated at DSGH and transferred to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo.

Cpl. Scott said Saturday that no citations have yet been issued in the accident, and his investigation was continuing.

Fire department plans events

Is there anywhere a youngster who hasn't dreamed of riding a shiny red fire truck?

If there is one in Hereford, the chance to realize the dream will come next Saturday.

Between 9 a.m. and 4 p.m., the Hereford Fire Department will load antique fire trucks with children and drive them on city streets.

The special occasion is the climax of an observance of Fire Prevention Week here which will be highlighted for five days, also, by tours of the fire

station by school groups.

"We have more than 600 kids in groups signed up for the tours, starting Monday," said Jay Spain, Hereford fire marshal.

While the emphasis is on teaching the youngsters the importance of fire prevention, the fire department

apparently does not discount the value of making the education a fun experience, too.

"Every child that comes Saturday with a parent may take a ride," Spain continued. No rides will be given during the weekday tours, he stressed.

He emphasized the requirement for children to be accompanied Saturday by a parent, noting that the parent will be asked to sign a release for the child to ride.

The stars of the day will be a 1928 fire truck and a 1948 truck. The '48 vehicle was bought for Hereford firefighting and has been kept in good condition through the years.

But a special story is behind the '28 model American-LaFrance truck.

"It's like one that Hereford owned but it was given to us by a woman, Dorothy Griffin, who bought it in Canyon," Spain reported.

The original 1928 truck owned by the City of Hereford was given to Shriners who use it for parades and other occasions.

Although the volunteer firefighters would have liked to have the old truck back, that was not possible.

Spain remembers that Mrs. Griffin called him and asked if the fire department would like to have her truck.

"I told her we didn't have the money to buy it," he continued. "Then, she said she'd give it to us." Spain and his volunteers jumped at the offer.

"I said we'd be there in an hour to pick it up," Spain laughed.

For three years, volunteer firemen worked on the truck. Spain said he (See FIRE, Page 2A)

City's water usage down

Coleman's records show that in June 1990, there was no rain to help residents take care of their yards and gardens. City wells were pumped for 213,218,000 gallons of water.

Revenue from sale of water was \$152,017 for June last year.

By contrast, June this year saw consumption more than 100 million gallons less than during the same period last year, 112,200,000, with 4.65 inches of rainfall. A corresponding drop in revenue was recorded by the city with billings of \$101,281.

July 1990 was wetter than June. Coleman reports rainfall in his gauges averaged 3.1 inches, allowing the city's wells to lower pumping to 152,328,000 gallons, considerably less than the previous month. City revenues from water sales amounted to \$135,993.

But, this year, Mother Nature contributed 6.29 inches of rain during July and revenue dropped to \$98,290, based on consumption of 131,925,000 gallons of water.

Coleman reports 1.15 inches of rain in August 1990 and 5.62 inches during the same month this year.

Water consumption figures also reflect the higher amount of precipitation.

In August a year ago, the city pumped 133,665,000 gallons of water for customers. Use this year was 105,826,000 gallons.

Water billings this year were \$97,908 in August. Revenue for the same month in 1990 was \$104,570. For the three months, Coleman's

VEGAS POKER

EDITOR'S NOTE - If you can hold your own in a friendly poker game back home, chances are you won't lose your shirt playing with the regulars at a Las Vegas casino. And it's the only game in town in which you're not playing against the house odds. Here a reporter with a penchant for poker shoots down some myths.

LAS VEGAS (AP) - You're in Las Vegas. You're in a casino. You'd just love to get in on a poker game.

But you envision "Tex" and "Shorty" and "Vegas Fats" seated around table flipping cards and chips just like they do in the movies. Wow! Are you intimidated!

Don't be.

Because if you can hold your own in your hometown Friday night poker game, you can go to Las Vegas and in LOW-LIMIT play - match skills with "Fats" and "Tex" and not lose your shirt or the proverbial ranch and maybe even win a few bucks.

A little-divulged Las Vegas secret is that live-action poker is the only legal gambling game in which you don't face the house odds that inexorably make the casino a winner and the players losers.

In poker, instead of playing against the casino, or house, you play against the other players.

According to David Hrcsina, the poker room manager at Las Vegas' Gold Coast Casino, "The astute home poker player definitely can hold his own against the locals in low-limit play here."

"In fact," he adds, "we have skilled amateurs who come out here for fairly high-stakes games and frequently go home with the Vegas regulars' money."

Many Americans have a falsely exaggerated impression of casino card playing.

In the movies, the "Topeka Kid" pushes a mountainous stack of chips into the pot, takes a swig from a

bottle of rotgut whiskey, chomps on his cigar, and snarls, "Well, sucker, are ya in or are ya out?"

The nervous tenderfoot, holding four aces, calls the bet by signing over the deed to his farm and throwing in his faithful dog Rex. The Kid lays down a straight flush - an almost perfect hand and the only thing that can beat four of a kind.

Well, in the true world of legal Las Vegas poker, you can choose the maximum limit you are willing to risk on any given bet. The amounts are written right on a little plaque next to the dealer.

This limit can be as low as \$4. That's it, although it can be raised three, or at the most four, times, depending on each particular casino's policy.

So no matter how many thousands of dollars worth of chips "Vegas Fats" has in front of him, in this type of game, the most it can possibly cost you to stay in for a given betting round is \$20.

At the "showdown," or final determination of the cards, the winning hand, in Las Vegas' most popular game, Texas hold 'em, likely will be not Hollywood's bigger-than-life straight flush but rather a humble pair of kings with a queen "kicker," or next-highest card.

(Also, in a real Las Vegas card game, "Fats" probably is not swilling 100-proof rye, but is sipping Mountain Valley Spring mineral water - Vegas' answer to Perrier. In lieu of a cigar - now banned in many Las Vegas card rooms - Fats quite likely has a little plastic, battery-operated fan on the table in front of him, to blow away still-permitted cigarette smoke.)

Here's how you get into a game: You go to the poker room and look for the floor manager or shift boss, who generally stands at a podium at the entrance. You ask him what games the casino is dealing - or in local parlance, "spreading" - and what the betting limits are.

Don't be afraid to say you are an amateur from out of town. You can even ask the floor manager if he thinks you ought to play in the game or if he feels the competition is too rough.

You will get a straight answer. Now that you're ready to plunge in, what game will you play?

Forget about those Old West favorites, five-card stud and five-card draw. They are virtually non-existent in Las Vegas. There is some seven-card stud, but "the" game these days is Texas hold 'em.

Yes, this is the big-action game in which the world's top players vie for a \$1 million prize in the highly publicized annual "World Series of Poker."

But at some casinos you can play this very same game for limits of \$3 and \$6.

In a \$6-limit game, casinos usually require you to buy \$40 worth of chips when you first sit down. If you lose that, you generally can make further buy-ins for just \$20.

Now to the game itself:

In Las Vegas only the house-employed dealer handles the cards. And every single hand is hold'em (or whatever game is being "spread" at any given table.)

A white plastic hockey-puck-like disk that says "Dealer" indicates the symbolic dealer for each hand. In Texas hold 'em, as many as 11 people can play in the same game.

The player to the left of the Dealer disk - the "button" to the locals - must start the action with a \$1 "blind" bet, even before seeing any cards. The player to his left then must put in a "big blind" of \$3.

This might sound unfair, but that's the way it is. As the "button" circulates around the table during the course of play, each player in turn gets stuck with the mandatory "blinds."

Then the dealer gives two face-down cards to everyone.

The player to the left of the big blind has three choices: He can throw his

cards away, or fold, without paying anything. He can "call" - match the \$3. Or he can raise it \$3, making it \$6 for the next player to stay in.

When all bets and raises have been matched, the dealer sweeps up the cards of those who folded and announces, "Five players," or whatever.

Then we come to the next - and according to many, the most important - phase, the "flop."

Here, the dealer "burns" - discards one card and then exposes the next three cards from the deck in the center of the table. These cards count in everyone's hand and can be combined with each player's two initial hidden cards.

Now there is another round of betting. This time, though, the player to the left of the button can "check," or stay in the game without choosing to bet. If someone after him bets or raises, he must of course call to remain in contention.

The original checker also can raise when the betting comes back around to him.

Next comes a burn and a fourth upcard in the middle, which also counts in everyone's hand.

The betting pattern is repeated, but this time for double stakes: bets, calls and raises of \$6.

Now we come to the finale, the fifth and final community upcard, known to Las Vegas as "the river."

(If a local player comments, "That dude flushed me on the river," he is not talking about some bizarre plumbing assault but rather about an amateur player such as you who defied the odds and made a flush on the final card. In Texas hold 'em, of course, you combine your two hidden cards with the five common cards on the board to make the best FIVE-CARD poker hand - ranging from royal flush to not even one pair.)

The betting unit after the final card is again \$6.

A big question naturally is: What are good starting cards in Texas hold 'em?

The best obvious start is a hidden pair of aces. The worst two starting cards, according to computer research, are a 2 and a 7 of non-matching suits.

But - and this is crucial - just because you get a pair of aces it doesn't mean you automatically will win. If the three-card flop doesn't match up with what you have hidden, you must think twice about remaining in the game for further betting.

Suppose you have those two aces, but the flop comes up 7-8-9 of spades. You haven't improved your aces, but someone else certainly could be on the way to a straight or a flush.

Sure, your aces might stand up as the best cards all the way to the end. But as one longtime player cautioned me, "Don't fall in love with 'em, son."

Maintaining your concentration in a Las Vegas poker game can sometimes be difficult.

A scantily clad cocktail waitress is offering you your fifth free drink. A rock band in the casino lounge is belting out "Great Balls of Fire." The slot machines groan "clank-clank-clank." The video poker machines howl "whoop-whoop-bong-bong." Twelve TV screens on the wall are showing major league baseball and horse races for the sports bettors.

What about being cheated? Don't worry.

Video cameras hidden in the ceiling monitor all the card games. And the floor managers are constantly on the lookout for possible collusion.

"Once in a while, we get some attempts at hand tipping," says the Gold Coast's Hrcsina. He explains that two players in cahoots signal each other as to whether they hold good or bad cards and then raise back and forth to trap an unwary newcomer in the middle.

Not only will you not be cheated, but you can get up from the table to go to the bathroom or get something to eat, and leave all your chips and

even cash right at your spot on the table, and all of it will be there, exactly as it was, when you get back.

There are some cautions for beginners in the world of Las Vegas poker.

One thing you absolutely cannot do - if you get those wonderful aces as starters but have only two \$1 chips left in front of you - is reach into your wallet, pull out \$100 bill and say, "Hey, wait a minute. I raise!"

You may only use the chips you had on the table at the start of the hand. But if you get great cards and run out of chips, you still can win something. You do not have to fold.

You bet whatever you have left and announce you are "all in." Your hand will contend for whatever was in the pot up to that point.

Other players who wish to continue raising may do so and challenge each other for extra money, which the dealer places in a side pot. Of course, if at the end another player beats your "all-in" hand, he gets the entire pot.

But generally, in legal Las Vegas poker, you can do almost anything you want.

Some players, waiting patiently for unbeatable cards - known as "the nuts" - pass the time as they fold one unpromising hand after another by listening to music on Walkman headphones. Others read newspapers, but this tends to be frowned upon.

Table chatter is permitted, although there is a fine line between conversation and obnoxiousness. A truly offensive player who uses crude language or insults the dealer may find himself quickly being escorted out of the casino by three 6-foot 5 hotel security guards.

Also, you may quit whenever you want. You won't offend anybody by walking away a winner. To the regulars it's all the same whether you made a killing or lost your stake.

has no idea how many man-hours of labor went into the restoration.

Fittings that were chrome-plated were sanded down and the resulting brass was polished to a high gloss.

New red paint was applied to the body by Spain himself and the fire department's maintenance man, Blane Provence did the woodworking.

"Blane did a beautiful job -- he's an artist with wood," declared the fire marshal.

The result is a fire engine that would do any city proud.

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Columbus' anniversary bittersweet

EDITOR'S NOTE - Though Columbus Day is celebrated Oct. 14 this year, Oct. 12 is the real milestone - the 499th anniversary of Christopher Columbus' landfall in the New World, the start of the Columbus quincentenary. But not everyone is in a party mood.

Whither Columbus?
Explorer or evildoer? Discoverer or despoiler?

Nearly five centuries after his epic 70-day voyage, this native of Italy and agent of Spain is at the center of a tricky cross-current equal to any encountered when he headed West to find East in 1492.

Just consider some Columbus Day events this year.

Replicas of the Nina, Pinta and Santa Maria depart Spain Oct. 12 on a journey retracing Columbus' Atlantic route. In the District of Columbia, a ceremony at the Columbus statue and a reception at the Columbus Club kick off a year-long national observance.

But at sunrise, in another corner of the nation's capital, an American Indian group known as the 1992 Alliance will read the names of native tribes exterminated by sword or disease after Columbus landed. The memorial begins what is called "The Year of the Indigenous Peoples."

This time, it seems, the Indians are ready for Columbus, and they aren't laying down a welcome mat.

"Indians had a lax immigration policy back then," said Suzan Harjo, national coordinator of the 1992 Alliance and a Cheyenne and Creek Indian. She offered this short history: "They came, we welcomed, they killed."

Such are the sensitivities that the national Christopher Columbus Quincentenary Jubilee Commission will commemorate, not celebrate, what is called an encounter, not a discovery. Some call it an invasion.

Although Columbus died in relative obscurity, he is the world's best known explorer. More pieces of America are named for him than anyone other than George Washington, including 47 cities and towns in the United States, plus universities, rivers, streets and plazas.

But Columbus-bashers now blame him for genocide, slavery, colonialism, plunder of tons of gold and silver, and environmental destruction.

The National Council of Councils set aside 1492 as a year of repentance and reflection. The discovery of America, the organization asserted, brought "legalized occupation, genocide, economic exploitation and a deep level of institutional racism and moral decadence."

Columbus "makes Hitler look like a juvenile delinquent," said Indian activist Russell Means. "The Spanish conquest must be repudiated. Celebrating it would be shameful and

the justification of a massacre," said Ecuador Indian leader Manuel Castro.

Indian groups are greeting the replicas of Columbus' caravels with protest canoes, sailing to Europe to discover Spain and grieving the loss of life and lands with periods of silence.

Columbus' champions are pressing ahead with their celebrations. In addition to sponsoring an anniversary voyage that will end in San Francisco on Oct. 12, 1992, Spain is host to a world's fair. Italy also plans observances.

But the anti-celebrations have sucked some of the wind from their sails.

"These groups are seeking to associate Columbus with every ill that has beset the New World since it was introduced to the Old World," said Philip R. Piccigallo, executive director of the Order Sons of Italy in America.

Some scholars see the 500th anniversary as an opportunity to tell the unvarnished story. Maybe it's time to discover Columbus.

"The heat might lead to some light. No one holds the ultimate truth in this matter," said John Hebert of the Library of Congress. "Ultimately, the whole idea about the

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
quincentennial is about America. We're all part of it."

Leif Ericsson and the Vikings preceded Columbus. Discovery is a debatable choice of words; millions were already living on the lands they found, although Europeans and Indians were equally unaware the other existed.

And Columbus blundered by thinking he was in Asia when he landed somewhere in the Bahamas. He named the new land San Salvador; the people living there called it Guanahani.

What Columbus did was boldly sail a course that no man had sailed before. In the process, he irrevocably linked two worlds, willingly or unwillingly, that were separated by continental drift eons before. The world is still trying to sort out the consequences.

"Basically, Columbus bumps into a strange place, calls the people he finds Indians, and tells them, 'Don't go away, I'll be right back.' Unfortunately for the Indians, he kept his word," said (See COLUMBUS, Page 5A)

Myths abound on many wastes

We've got certain groups in this country who have learned how to capitalize on fears, real or imagined, to make a buck. The examples are as plentiful as federal dollars when it comes to cashing in on the public's perception of danger.

We've stalled the growth of the nuclear industry in this country for 20 years by listening to the anti-nuclear people and the fears they drum up. The WIPP site west of Andrews is a case in point. Millions of dollars have been squandered trying to answer all the imagined problems dreamed up by scientists seeking additional grants from Uncle Sam to research perceived pseudo-problems.

The latest in a long line of scary subjects are municipal landfills--and we've created another industry of experts who are willing to testify at the drop of a diaper, on how disastrous landfills are to our well-being.

But along comes a guy after our own heart. He's America's premier "garbologist"--archaeologist William Rathje of the University of Arizona, who argues that we have more accurate information about the surface of Neptune than we have about municipal solid waste.

Consequently, he says, we continue to make important political decisions on the basis of myths and old wives tales.

Myth #1: Our throw-away society is the root cause of the solid waste crisis.

Actually, the intensity of waste generation, a function of the gross national product and population growth, has not changed since 1970, according to figures based on data from the U.S. census bureau. Moreover, packaging's contribution to the waste stream has been declining every year since 1972. Today, packaging comprises only 30 percent of our nation's municipal garbage.

The truth of the matter is that packaging eliminates more solid waste than it produces. Professor Rathje has studied households in both Mexico and the U.S. and found that--although Americans discard twice as much packaging as Mexicans--Mexicans discard three times as much food waste as their American counterparts. The net result is that Mexican households generate one-third more garbage a day than American households.

Myth #2: Landfills pose a serious threat to groundwater resources.

A few do, but most don't.

According to EPA's worst-case scenarios, 83 percent of all municipal solid waste landfills pose less than a one-in-one million lifetime health risk. To put it in perspective, you are 42 times more likely to die from a lightning strike than from leaking landfills.

Moreover, EPA concludes that 60 percent of all landfills pose less than a one-in-10 billion lifetime health risk under the same worst-case scenario. In other words, you are 170,000 times more likely to die from insect stings.

Myth #3: Waste incinerators are a dangerous source of toxic air pollution and generate hazardous ash residues which are difficult to dispose of safely.

Again, the EPA's own data fail to support the hysteria surrounding the incinerator issue. Modern incinerators pose less than a one-in-one million health risk under worst-case scenarios. Regarding the ash issue, the EPA and U.S. conference of mayors recently completed the most comprehensive study ever undertaken to examine the leachate from incinerator ash for hazardous residues. Their conclusion? Leachates were close to meeting drinking water standards.

Myth #4: Recycling can solve our solid waste crisis.

Frankly, this myth is based on wishful thinking and misleading data. First of all, collection rates for materials are misrepresented since 50 percent of all recyclable material collected is too contaminated for reuse. If we collected every material for which recycling is economically feasible and for which there are markets, we would collect only 31 percent of the waste stream.

The fundamental reason that we have a solid waste "crisis" is because landfills, which are the ultimate disposal site for 75 percent of our garbage, are filling up and not being replaced. Why? Because the NIMBY (not in my backyard) syndrome has paralyzed the siting process and created a waste disposal gridlock.

According to Rathje, until we squarely address the siting problem and purge these four myths from the policy debate, the garbage "crisis" will be with us for some time to come.

William Wayne has little justice

U.S. District Court Judge William Wayne Justice of Tyler has struck another blow against the victims of crime and in favor of the criminals of Texas. As you may remember, Judge Justice is the federal judge that has held the Texas prison system captive for most of the past decade.

His rulings in favor of inmates have placed caps on the populations of state prisons and required the state and local governments to spend vast amounts of money on prisoner benefits. Judge Justice alone is responsible for billions of dollars of tax money expenditures for such things as law libraries for inmates, cable television systems for prisons, optional work programs and other such changes to the Texas prison system.

At one time, Texas prisons were self supporting, using inmate labor to provide food and clothing for the inmate population. Today, the prison system is a major cost of state government.

Last week, Judge Justice revealed a decision he had made in the Jimmy Paul Vanderbilt Jr. case. Vanderbilt, a former rookie police officer in Amarillo, was convicted in 1976 of the abduction and murder of Amarillo teenager Katina Moyer. His crime was discovered when Moyer's lifeless body was found abandoned on a rural road in 1975.

Twice Vanderbilt has been convicted of the crime of murder. Twice he has been sentenced by juries to die by lethal injection. Following the normal appeals, the U.S. Supreme Court has upheld the sentence.

Enter Judge Justice. In 1988, Justice vacated that sentence because Vanderbilt, in the judge's opinion, had not been properly advised of his rights before a psychiatrist examined the killer. Since that time, Judge Justice has been holding the case in his court on a stay of execution.

Now, Judge Justice has announced, in a ruling made Aug. 12, that he is throwing out the death sentence imposed by the courts because Vanderbilt is not a continuing danger to society. Vanderbilt has been sitting on death row since 1976, a very difficult place from which to endanger society.

Fifteen years and millions of dollars of tax money have been invested in trying to carry out the sentence that a jury of peers imposed on Vanderbilt. Katina Moyer's family and friends have relieved her pain and suffering at each successive trial.

All that investment of time, money and emotional pain were cast aside in a moment by one federal judge--Judge Justice. That is not justice, it is a mockery of our judicial system.

Checks will bounce up again in '92

WASHINGTON (AP) - For a scandal with staying power, make it mundane - the sort of everyday transgression voters can understand, and resent.

That's why the flap over bounced checks in the House bank is likely to be replayed by challengers in the 1992 congressional election campaign, and in the arguments of the term limit lobby that wants a 12-year ceiling on House or Senate service.

It is the combination of privilege and hypocrisy that makes such episodes into issues. They may not count for much in Washington, but they do play in Peoria.

While settling its own bounced check problem, the House also passed the Truth in Savings Act, requiring clear disclosure of interest terms, fees and charges levied by banks - for things such as checks returned for insufficient funds.

Take it from Rep. Robert H. Michel, the Republican leader, who comes from Peoria: Behavior that shows special favors for some members of Congress is a problem for all of them.

It fits the image of inside-the-beltway standards that makes politicians and officeholders different from the people who sent them to Washington.

That doesn't always register so clearly in the biggest scandals of the time - the complexities of an outlaw

international bank, of the savings and loan collapse and bailout, of the Iran-Contra case, even of Watergate.

In those situations, the scandals involved questions and conduct far from the experiences of the average American. It takes an expert witness to explain misconduct in the market for government bonds.

Nobody with a checkbook needs any explanation of a bounced check. And when official misbehavior gets to that commonplace level, it tends to stick.

The influence peddling charges that beset Harry S. Truman's White House caught on with the voters after the "deep freeze" became its symbol. In that episode, a White House aide suggested that a man angling for government contracts send home freezers as gifts to Truman's address in Independence, Mo., and to other top officials.

The freezers weren't as expensive as other favors in the case, but the symbol hit home and became a factor in the 1952 campaign.

The gift of a vicuna coat symbolized the controversy that forced Sherman Adams to resign as Dwight D. Eisenhower's chief of staff in 1958.

The \$640 toilet seat came to symbolize waste in Pentagon contracting during the Reagan administration.

The now-reformed travel habits of John Sununu, the current White House chief of staff, fit the same

pattern. He used Air Force jets for personal travels, including a trip to the dentist. That registers with everyone who has waited in line at an airport, and everyone who goes to the dentist.

So, too, with congressional pay, now \$125,100 a year by separate, nervous votes of the House and Senate. Constituents do not get to set their own salaries, and no matter how much an increase in congressional salary may be merited, it is guaranteed to stir a political backlash. That's been going on since the first one, 175 years ago.

The case of the bounced checks began with an auditors' study of the House bank, operated in a Capitol office for House members and their aides, as a checking account convenience. It isn't really a bank, because it does not pay interest on deposits, and it makes no loans.

At least it wasn't supposed to make loans. The General Accounting Office reported that it was doing essentially that because House members wrote checks for hundreds of thousands of dollars more than they had on deposit, and the bank covered them until they paid up, as much as a month later.

The GAO audit said 8,331 checks written by members of Congress were bounced during the year ended June 30, 1990. None of them were identified.

No money was lost, and House Speaker Thomas S. Foley banned the practice on Wednesday. He said it used

to be tolerated, although he tried to forbid it six months ago, and he intends to make the ban stick this time.

So he told the House that members are on notice not to bounce checks, and that bank employees who let it happen again will be fired.

"...A very small issue," said Rep. Robert K. Dornan, R-Calif., in a world of big problems. But he understood the impact of that small issue well enough to say that he wants a letter attesting that he never was among the check bouncers.

For the average citizen, an overdraft costs money, as much as \$35 for a check returned for insufficient funds.

Since the bank had enough money on deposit from members who didn't bounce checks to offset those who did, the episode didn't cost any tax dollars, Foley said.

"But the perception that members have a special privilege which is not accorded to the general public is one that I do not believe should be countenanced. ...," he said.

Michel added that any indiscretion setting congressmen "above normal citizens ... is a blot on the whole House," even if only a few members do it. "So it rankles those who like to walk the straight and narrow around here and do what is right," he said.

Columbus actually made four trips to the new lands. He brought soldiers of fortune, horses, cows, pigs, sheep and some unwanted baggage: the black rat, measles, smallpox, diphtheria, the common cold and other European plagues the settlers gave to defenseless natives who perished by the millions.

The Spaniards didn't want them to die, which makes many scholars dispute the genocide charge. They hoped to enslave the natives to work the new sugar cane plantations, ventures that led to the first destruction of the rain forest. But when the natives died, African slaves were imported.

Also part of the Columbus legacy is the change in world eating habits. Explorers introduced wheat and barley while discovering maize, potatoes, cocoa and tobacco. Imagine a world without popcorn, french fries and chocolate bars.

"The essential thing about 1492 is that it was the first step in the unification of the globe," said Norman Fiering of the John Carter Brown Library, the only library in the world dedicated exclusively to the history of the Western Hemisphere.

Just 60 years after Columbus' landfall, historian Francisco Lopez de Gomara called it "the greatest event since the creation of the world, excluding the incarnation and death of Him who created it."

On past anniversaries, the trend was to name things after Columbus.

In 1792, a fledgling republic named the home of its capital the District of Columbia.

A century ago, New York erected a statue atop a pillar of Italian marble at a site named Columbus Circle off Columbus Avenue, and the composer Anton Dvorak honored Columbus with his "New World Symphony." The World's Columbian Exposition in Chicago was called "the jubilee of mankind."

The 500th anniversary includes everything from an elaborate flower show in Columbus, Ohio, to Hollywood spectacles, TV documentaries and tall-ship regattas.

But the commemoration has not been without its problems.

John Goudie, chairman of the congressionally created Christopher Columbus Quincentenary Jubilee Commission, resigned in December after questions were raised about finances and management.

His replacement, James Kuhn, said plans are proceeding smoothly, and the way it sounds, gingerly.

"We are commemorating the 500th anniversary of Columbus' voyage to the New World," Kuhn said. "What took place was an encounter, but that encounter happened to be one of the most important events of the last 500 years. That encounter led to many, many, many discoveries."

The commission has a Native American Advisory Council, headed by Klamath Indian William Ray. He sees the quincentenary as a chance for Indians to tell their side of the story.

"What Indian people want is a more equitable view of what happened. It wasn't all a great adventure," said Ray. "There are Indian tribes that no longer exist except in name. We want to honor those who did not make it."

And the climactic sermon at Washington's National Cathedral on Oct. 12, 1992, will be delivered by Bishop Steven Charleston, a Choctaw Indian who is the leader of the Episcopal Diocese of Alaska.

"1992 should be a time of very sincere and sober reflection for everyone," Charleston said. "The issue is not the captain, it's the cargo. To simply focus on Columbus is to miss the boat. We need to stop and ask hard, serious questions about what colonialism has cost all of us in human lives and in the environment over the last 500 years."

Levelland hands Herd season's first loss

The Hereford Whitefaces' winning streak was stopped at four as the Levelland Lobos used the wind for advantageous field position early, then controlled the ball in the final minutes to beat the Herd 17-7 Friday at Whiteface Stadium.

Both teams are now 4-1.

The game was statistically the Herd's worst offensive showing of the season. Tailback Leo Brown ran for 103 yards on 24 carries, but that was still 60 yards below his average. The Herd totalled only 92 yards, including 8 passing.

Chad Sandoval took all but two snaps at quarterback Friday, and was under nearly constant pressure. He was sacked four times for a total of minus-16 yards, and he completed only 1-of-8 for five yards.

In the first half, Hereford made only two first downs. They had six for the game.

"Levelland played good defense and we didn't execute," Herd coach Danny Haney said. "I'm not going to take anything away from Levelland because they played well."

The Lobos' coach, Buster Leaf, said he was glad to hold Brown to only 103 yards.

"We were very fortunate," Leaf said, because several times, Brown "was one man away from breaking it."

The Herd got off to a bad start before the game even started. Miscommunication between Haney and his captains resulted in Hereford kicking off into a stiff wind out of the north.

"I'll take full blame for that," Haney said.

The two teams traded punts after their first possessions, and that's when the wind came into play.

"It was strong enough to keep the punting game from being effective," Shawn Fogo, Hereford's punter, said. "I wasn't allowed to get any height on the ball into the wind."

Fogo did an admirable job under the conditions; his punts into the wind—"bullets," he called them—were for 33, 34 and 34 yards.

Still, a 33-yard punt from Hereford's own 20 resulted in good field position for the Lobos. They cashed in with a 53-yard drive, 21 of which was a pass from quarterback Craig Black to tight end Jason Edwards. Four plays later, Black scored from 8 yards out, and Jacob Velardez kicked the extra point for a 7-0 lead with 2:36 left in the first quarter.

In the second quarter, with Levelland punting into the wind, the Herd had the ball twice inside Lobo territory but couldn't score. On their best chance, Haney went for it on fourth-and-8 at the 19-yard line instead of having Ben Perry try a 36-yard wind-aided field goal.

"I talked to Ben before the game, and he said 30 yards was the maximum for him today," Haney said.

Sandoval's pass fell incomplete,

and Hereford didn't get close again in the first half, which ended with Levelland up 7-0.

The second half started with indications that the Herd was going to take control. Levelland's Chris Smith returned the kickoff 38 yards to the Lobo 41, but on first down Herd linebacker Eric Sims collared tailback Estevez Golightly for a four-yard loss, then on third-and-10, safety Richard Sanderson picked off a pass from Black at the Hereford 47-yard line.

"I saw this guy coming across the field, I was going to tackle him, but I saw it was overthrown. I slipped and it landed in my arms. I wish I could have kept my feet," Sanderson said.

The Herd drove 53 yards for a touchdown, all of it on the ground. Brown had 44 of those yards, but his backfield mates were responsible for two important short runs. Fullback Kyle Hansen got a yard on third-and-1 at the 27, and Sandoval got three yards on fourth-and-3 on the 18.

Brown went the final 15 yards, making the last cut after a block by receiver Clay Wallace.

"Clay Wallace had a pretty outstanding block on the outside. I was supposed to give him a 'go' call, and I gave him one," Brown said. "The line did an outstanding job—Stephen Blea, Derek Mason."

Perry tied the score at 7-7 with his extra point kick.

The Lobos promptly answered the challenge. Golightly, who ran for 91 yards in the game, got 25 of that total on the second play of an 80-yard touchdown drive. The big play, however, came on third-and-9 at the

Black ran the option to the left with backup tailback Brant Wallace as the pitchman. Black was tackled for what appeared to be a 6-yard loss, but Hereford rover Alvaro Avila was flagged—defensive holding—for tackling Wallace, who was well behind the play.

Instead of fourth-and-15, the Lobos had first-and-goal at the 10-yard line. A play later, Black ran the ball in from the 3, and Velardez kicked the extra point for a 14-7 lead with 43 seconds left in the third quarter.

Hereford got three possessions while the Herd defense held Levelland, but the Herd offense couldn't get a first down.

On the first possession, Hereford had a third-and-4 situation at their own 36-yard line. Sandoval pitched the ball, but nobody was there. Fortunately for the Herd, Brown outraced the Lobo defense to recover the ball for a 14-yard loss.

Fogo returned the ensuing kickoff 32 yards, but that was as far as the Herd's rally went.

Oiler receivers pay the price

HOUSTON (AP) - Houston's quick but small wide receivers are being forced to pay the price for the quick-strike reputation of the Oilers' run-and-shoot offense.

Oiler opponents are throwing up more zone defenses to protect against a Warren Moon bomb, forcing the Oilers to look for the intermediate routes across the middle, where brave receivers receive the most spectacular hits, their bodies exposed as they leap high for passes.

"Teams are playing a lot of zone and making it hard for us to get up the field," wide receiver Drew Hill said. "If that's what we've got to do, then we got to do it. When one team sees some working for another team, they're going to do the same thing."

The Denver Broncos, off to a 4-1 start after finishing 5-11 last season, likely will use zone coverage against the Oilers in Sunday's noon kickoff in the Astrodome.

"All of us would rather run down the field and catch a long touchdown bomb," Hill said. "But it's our job to take what we can get and right now they are trying to take away the big play."

The Oilers, 3-1, following a 24-20 loss to New England and an open date last week, have seen all kinds of defenses thrown up to stop the run-and-shoot.

Force-the-receivers-over-the-middle-and-bash-them seems to be the current trend.

"That's always been a defensive philosophy, there just seems to be more of that going around now than usual," Oilers coach Jack Pardee said. "But if everybody's ganging up on somebody inside, we should be having someone who won't be taking a hit."

"We shouldn't have to throw into a crowd all the time."

Wide receiver Ernest Givins has been somersaulted by defensive backs many times but he keeps coming back over the middle when called.

"Sure, it's a sacrifice, but that's what we have to do to move the ball," Givins said. "Sometimes we can catch them deep and sometimes not. We all like to catch the bomb but we know it's not always going to be there."

Moon doesn't think the Oilers will see extensive zone defenses the rest of the season.

"A lot of teams tried to do that last year and they were unsuccessful," Moon said. "We know those guys are going to get pounded from different games, but most teams will play what they do best. If they are a man team, that's what they are going to play or zone the same way."

"Denver is a lot of zone. They'll play some man but like to play zone most of the time."

The Oilers rank No. 2 in the NFL in passing offense, but the running game, among the league leaders after the first two weeks, has dropped No. 11. Allen Pinkett will share playing time against Denver with Lorenzo White, getting back into shape after missing training camp as a contract holdout.

Denver is tied for 12th in the league in total defense but the Broncos lead the league with nine interceptions, three each by safeties Steve Atwater and Dennis Smith, which ties them for the league lead.

Coach Dan Reeves has found success in allowing quarterback John Elway to call his own plays and Gaston Green has been an outstanding replacement for holdout Bobby Humphrey at running back.

Astros imitate Braves in rebuilding with youth

HOUSTON (AP) - The Houston Astros have a secondhand blueprint for regaining their status as contenders in the NL Western Division.

The Atlanta Braves already have used it to go from last place to star status in one year.

Manager Art Howe doesn't want the significance of what the Braves have done this season to be lost on his young team as they close out their 1991 season in the cellar vacated by the Braves.

"I want our guys to realize what can happen in a short period of time," Howe said. "I think what they've done is kind of exciting for everyone, especially for us. They basically built from within to turn things around, just like we expect to do."

Despite the Astros' lowly finish, there is an air of optimism going into the off-season. Although the Astros are realistically more than a year away from contention, they aren't conceding next season either.

"I don't know if we're a year away," catcher Craig Biggio said. "They need to make a couple of moves. The main thing is we keep everything together and we get a couple of players."

The surprising development of pitcher Pete Harnisch, first baseman Jeff Bagwell, left fielder Luis Gonzalez and Steve Finley's play in center field, helped the Astros provide an entertaining lineup despite their finish.

"We've come a long way and answered a lot of questions," Howe said. "I'm very proud of the way we played this year. I think we have a few additions to make and then we'll be a fine club."

The question hardly needed to be asked, and Howe didn't require time to think when asked the club's top priority in 1992:

"Closer, closer, closer," he said. The Astros' final home series against Atlanta provided a good example of Howe's frustration.

The Astros took leads into the late innings of the first two games of the series, only to have the bullpen allow the Braves to rally to victory.

Mark Portugal moved from starting pitcher to closer with mixed results, and Howe spent most of the year trying to find the solution.

The Astros lost 45 percent of their games by two or fewer runs this season.

"You're absolutely right that's too many," Harnisch said. "I don't want to go through another year of learning how to lose. I want to win."

Harnisch was often the victim of poor run support.

Bagwell may be the biggest success story of the newcomers. He adjusted from Class AA to the major

leagues and switched from third base to first base the week before the season opened.

He adapted immediately to his new position and was among the team leaders in hitting most of the year. His 13-game hitting streak was the longest on the team all season.

"I think I made great progress in the outfield this year and remember we had guys like Jeff and myself in new positions," said Gonzalez, who moved from first base to the outfield. "We were expected to lose but this team has been aggressive all year and we've played hard."

Second baseman Casey Candaele thinks the next step for the young club is to forget about the losses this season.

"Individually, the young guys got experience and that's good," Candaele said. "But I think we need to come back and win ball games next year and not let people tell us we're a young team."

"We're here now and we don't like to lose."

Computer data is help with irrigation

As water becomes more precious, irrigation decisions become more difficult. That's when the farmer can turn to an increasingly useful agricultural tool—computer-generated data—for help.

Three Texas A&M researchers have developed a computer model that helps farmers decide when to irrigate sorghum and corn on the Texas High Plains. The model is especially helpful in drier seasons, when expensive well water must replace rainfall and when farmers can't keep up with their crops' water needs.

Dr. Ronald Lacewell and Dr. James Mjelde of Texas A&M's department of agricultural economics, and department graduate student Kelly Bryant developed the model for a specific regional application, but say the technology can be used for many crops and regions if the proper field data is available.

"The next big opportunity to be more efficient with water is management," said Lacewell, a professor in the department. "We've got great

equipment. Where we haven't done what we can is in management, which is knowledge-and-information-based."

When they actually put their model through its paces, it told them what common agricultural wisdom already had: that in drier years, if a farmer has both corn and sorghum crops that must compete for water, costly irrigation will bring a bigger net return in corn crops.

That, however, is assuming equal soil water conditions for both crops. If sorghum fields are drier than corn fields, the net return on irrigation in drier years would be higher for sorghum, the group concluded.

"Everybody already knew that; Kelly quantified it," Lacewell said.

Corn, for instance, is particularly susceptible to stress if it suffers a lack of water at the times it grows tassels and silk and when its grain fills out.

Lacewell said Bryant came to his general conclusions after randomly trying different irrigation strategies, which included decisions of whether or not to irrigate in each of 15 different growing stages for each crop in a

single season. Farmers in the High Plains must, in essence, decide every five days during the growing season whether or not to irrigate a crop.

Because there are so many stages and two crops, there would actually be 32,768 possible outcomes, or irrigation

decisions, but Lacewell said the random generation of 200 strategies gives an accurate range of real outcomes.

They got their base data from three years of corn crops in Bushland, Texas, as well as one year of records

from sorghum crops in Bushland. They then used the computer program EPIC, or Erosion Productivity Impact Calculator, to generate data on how corn and sorghum would be expected to do in the High Plains.

EPIC was developed in the mid-

1980s, primarily by U.S. Department of Agriculture researchers in Temple. It has found various applications with "well over 500 current users," said Paul Dyke, a Texas Agricultural Experiment Station researcher in Temple who helped develop EPIC.

Not to get too confusing, it is sufficient to note that FACT also has authority for a TOP, PLD, FOR and FSWR. And that's just in the part covering commodity programs.

Under conservation, one of the humdingers is the ECARP, or Environmental Conservation Acreage Reserve Program, which includes the Conservation Reserve Program, CRP, and the Wetland Reserve Program, or WRP.

Then there's the AWOPP. It is the Agricultural Water Quality Protection Program. And it has an optional IFPM, or Integrated Farm Management option.

The conservation portion of FACT also has an EEP, or an Environmental Easement Program. But there is also an EEP, Export Enhancement Program, in the trade part of the law,

Farmers recognize federal acronyms

WASHINGTON (AP) - Government commodity programs are sprinkled with abbreviations and acronyms that only a bureaucrat could love. But generations of farmers also know them as part of the business.

The Agriculture Department itself - properly, the U.S. Department of Agriculture - is known to virtually every supermarket meat buyer as USDA, although years ago some called it DOA.

Farmers deal with ASCS offices to get price support loans from the CCC. That's a shorthand way of saying the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and the Commodity Credit Corp.

Now, the department has a new plaything, an acronym called FACT.

That is the Food, Agriculture, Conservation and Trade Act; or the 1990 farm law; or farm bill, which became technically improper after it was signed by President Bush last Nov. 28.

Within FACT, a farmer might be told at the local ASCS office, is a program for idling a share of crop acreage to qualify for CCC price

The council will assess rural economic development problems in various regions of the state and develop a strategy to achieve long-term rural development throughout Texas in collaboration with state, local, and private sector organizations.

The Texas council is one of eight pilot state projects which have been organized pursuant to the Presidential Initiative on Rural Development. Stressing the importance of the Initiative on Rural Development, President Bush observed, "We have long recognized the needs of our cities, but now is the time to refocus our attention on the heart of America. Economic redevelopment in rural areas is not just about numbers and statistics and bushels of grain—it's about

hardworking, dedicated people who simply need to the benefit of sound government policies to help them to help themselves."

Thirty members of the Texas Federal Rural Development Council representing Federal, state, and private sector organizations attended the National RURal Economic Development Institute in New Orleans on March 3-7, 1991. The Institute was sponsored by a federal grant for participants from the eight pilot states.

The program, coordinated by the University of Wisconsin-Extension Service, was constructed to provide training on the concepts and strategies that lead to successful economic development and an understanding of the diversity in economic conditions and opportunities across rural America.

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
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Romo gave his career for SMU

DALLAS (AP) - A bronze statue would be nice, placed somewhere outside the entrance to Ownby Stadium.

It's the least Southern Methodist University could consider for what Mike Romo tried to do for the school.

He was the one name player the Mustangs had in their death march back from the NCAA death penalty.

If there is one victim of the SMU slush fund scandal and all the crooked alumni which burned the football program to the ground, it is Romo, who may never play again after what happened to him against Baylor.

Romo had run 21 yards for a first down; he was always trying to make something happen. Then he was tackled cleanly from behind by the Baylor pursuit.

Romo crash-landed, then felt that pain in his knee again - for the fourth time in his career. He had to undergo surgery for the third time on his left knee.

As a senior at San Antonio Roosevelt, Romo was high on the recruiting lists of passing teams. Brigham Young University was interested. So was the University of Miami.

Then he tore the anterior cruciate in his left knee.

Suddenly, Romo's blue chip was broken.

SMU was in a position to take chances and then-coach Forrest Gregg gambled that Romo could rehabilitate and regain his old form.

Romo thought so too and signed a letter of intent. So the Mustangs had them one "name" player in a recruiting class of nobodies.

"I decided to go to SMU because I thought it would be great to help make them a winner again," Romo said at the time.

Romo did, sort of.

He threw a touchdown pass on the last play of the game to beat Connecticut and directed the Mustangs to victory on a joyous homecoming over North Texas in a triumphant 2-9 season.

Considering Romo had an inexperienced offensive line and the rest of the team was mostly freshmen, experts were amazed SMU won a game.

Romo was sacked so many times he had to have an operation to remove torn cartilage from his right knee following the season.

Two years of absence from the recruiting wars showed even more on SMU last year. The Mustangs surprised Vanderbilt 44-0 in the opener but didn't have the depth to stay with anybody else they played.

Romo, in particular, took a

battering. He had an operation in the spring to remove torn cartilage in the left knee.

His offensive line was better this year, but still not the quality of other Southwest Conference schools. Romo was running for his life when he was hurt.

Romo was quality although he didn't have a big arm. He did know how to read defenses and how to hurt them.

But his body wasn't bullet proof.

In 24 games, he had already become the ninth career SWC leader in passing yards and third in completions.

Still, he never had the team around him to be able to seriously damage SWC teams.

SMU is still at least two years away in recruiting, maybe more, from being able to compete on a Saturday to Saturday basis in the SWC.

With all his talent, Romo still couldn't take the Mustangs to victory over another league school.

SMU coach Tom Rossley realizes the school has lost its only marquee name.

Rossley said if there was one recognizable name at the school it was Romo.

"He's the one name everybody knew," Rossley said.

Even Romo had a tough time getting fans into Ownby Stadium.

The struggling SMU program couldn't even sell out its home opener against a nationally ranked team in the tiny 22,000-seat facility.

There's hope that Romo will be able to come back for his senior year.

But why should he?


Romo said he isn't sure he wants to try for a fifth knee operation.

But SMU's forlorn football program owes him everything.

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
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
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
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

Unusual gifts, crafts found at Inkahoots

What started out as a wild idea catering to the Christmas shopper looking for the original gift and an outlet for local craftsmen has turned into a full-time business.

Elaine McNutt started Inkahoots last October as an outlet for local craftsmen who were looking to show their wares without having to open their own business.

The shop stayed open through Christmas. This year, enough interest has been expressed in the store that McNutt and her new partner Nadine Berend have decided to keep it open year round.

"Last year was our first year," said McNutt. "We had a real good response to the store. Last year, before Thanksgiving, over 50 percent of the sales were to out-of-town customers."

Although the store is run by McNutt and Berend, individuals rent space by the square foot to bring in their goods to sell.

"We lease the space by the square foot and the store gets a percent of the commission to keep it operating," she said. "The people who lease don't work here. Most have other jobs and do this for an extra income-type thing."

Not all items are handmade. Some of the lessees go to market for their goods.

"There are over 30 people involved in the store. We have sales representative from Dallas who have some goods here. Some people have antiques and others sell crafts," McNutt added.

Classes are also taught at Inkahoots.

"Anyone can teach a class here,"

McNutt said. "The store does get a percentage from the classes."

Already many classes have been set. Among those are mum making, duplicate stitch, smocking, French hand-sewing, broom skirts, scissor cutting and calligraphy.

According to McNutt, children's classes will be added in the summer. "We hope to get beginning drawing and make-it-and-take-it type classes," she said.

In keeping with the name Inkahoots, which is slang for working together, McNutt said she had a lot of teamwork getting the building ready.

"Each renter decorated their own booth," McNutt said. "Our husbands built all the partitions. Everyone was in charge of their own decorating and did a good job."

Because the store's success is contingent on group support, Inkahoots gives a lot of people opportunities they might not have had before.

"I think a lot of people who can't afford the overhead of opening their own business have an opportunity to go out on their own," McNutt said. "Several have children and can't work outside the home but can paint or whatever and bring it in."

"If you have a good product and quality merchandise at a good price, you'll have a good business."

In addition to crafts and classes, Inkahoots has a variety of watches, jewelry, antiques, sewing supplies and some clothing.

The store is still popular with over 90 visitors on opening day.

She stated, "Not only have I lost 30 pounds but my cholesterol has dropped from 232 to 143. I have two closets full of clothes which have not fit me in two years that I can now wear." In a separate report, a telephone interview revealed that a Wilmington, North Carolina pharmacist lost 14 pounds in 3 weeks on the product and was never hungry.

From Preppie To
Prairie To Polar Bears

Gone are the days when children's clothing was distinctly different from adult's clothing. Today, except for teddy bears, ducks, bunnies and other nursery motifs, factors influencing clothing trends are the same, whether the size is 4T or Misses' 14.

For Fall/Winter '91, Americana themes, favoring the frontier, are receiving a warm welcome. Native American influences are prevalent as sweater motifs, fringed and beaded trims, blanket stitching, Indian blanket patterning and beaded leather moccasins. Patchwork anoraks, leather bomber jackets, lumberjack plaids and printed flannel shirts have up-county appeal, particularly in boyswear.

For the young miss, Little House on the Prairie themes dominate. Gingham, plaids and coffee-ground calicos, in looks that range from smock-style dresses to pinafore

jumper, enhance the prairie appeal. Patchwork prints, pieced quilt motifs and stenciled hearts appear as all-over prints or as decorative accents. They are shown in antique colorations, such as chambray blue, barn red and coffee brown.

The preppy look, dressed up but deliberately nonchalant, continues its popularity. For the young gentleman, popular looks include oxford shirts, bow ties, cord jackets and denim work shirts. Slouch jackets, with pleated trousers in a properly subdued glen plaid, are also fashionable. For the young lady, a favorite silhouette is the dropped waist dress, with velvet or corduroy accents. 

Frederick Forsyth is at the top of our new book list this week with his new book entitled *The Deceiver*. For seven years Sam McCready has served with distinction as chief of the covert operations of Britain's Secret Intelligence Service. This experience as an inventive and intrepid field agent has served him well; now times have changed and a new high-level policy decision demands a new style operative. McCready is one of the first targeted for removal. Foreign Office regulations entitle McCready to a choice of an obscure administrative position or early retirement.

Timothy Edwards sees the removal of McCready as an opportunity to advance his own career. Presented to a panel of his peers, McCready's exploits an independent style that has often driven him beyond the rules. This style may be evidence of his value, or proof that he should be removed. Timothy Edwards will be presiding over the panel and McCready's long shot effort to save his career.

Domestic Pleasures by Beth Gulcheon is a "novel of manners set in a city comprised of many villages, each with its own manners and values," modern New York.

When her ex-husband Raymond is killed in a plane crash, his estate is left to their 16-year-old son Jack, and Charlie is the executor.

Martha and Charlie affect the lives and happiness of each other in chains of related events far beyond what they see themselves. This is a pleasant, funny, touching and romantic story I think you will enjoy.

Raid On Truman by John T. Campbell is a novel that pulls the reader into the roller coaster of North Korea.

A U.S. navy carrier battle group led by the USS Truman is attacked with a nerve agent while cruising off the coast of Korea. The nerve agent renders the crew unconscious. General Kang, the North Korean leader plans to use the Truman and crew as bargaining chips in a global power play.

The nuclear weapons on board the ship will place North Korea in the exclusive club of nuclear nations. The only thing that prevents a smooth, successful hijacking is a freak ventilation malfunction. This malfunction has allowed the engineering compartments to escape contamination.

Lt. Paul Simmons, the engineering officer on watch, must lead the "snipes" in their fight to regain control of the ship. Being trained to deal more with mechanical affairs rather than military, the Lt. wonders if he is capable of leading the men into hand-

to-hand combat against the North Koreans.

The first meeting will be held at the Hereford Seniors Citizen's Center on Wednesday Oct. 9th, beginning at 11:30 a.m. through 12:30.

The support group will provide all with the opportunity to share with others who are going through similar experiences. It is very important for caregivers and others touched by Alzheimer's disease to have a support system.

The public is invited to attend the support group and share with others.

These meetings are designed for people touched by the disease to come together in a nonjudgmental,

safe environment to vent their frustrations, to share coping techniques, to learn more about Alzheimer's and discover what resources are available to them.

Alzheimer's is a progressive, degenerative neurological disorder that results in severe mental deterioration and eventual physical decline. There is no cure.

The disease has a gradual onset. Symptoms include difficulty with memory and loss of intellectual abilities severe enough to interfere with routine work or social activities. The Alzheimer's patient also may experience confusion, language problems, poor or decreased judgement, disorientation in place and

time, and changes in behavior or personality.

Alzheimer's can strike people in their 40's or 50's but most victims are older. Four million Americans have the disease and it is the most common form of irreversible dementia, a group of symptoms that characterize certain diseases and conditions.

Alzheimer's also affects the family of the patient. The emotional, social and financial costs of caring for an Alzheimer's patient are high. Family members also often risk their own health in order to care for the patient at home.

October prices lower on beef, pork

October will be an excellent month for sales on beef and pork, as large supplies of animals are expected to send prices lower during the rest of the year, said Dr. Dick Edwards of College Station, a food marketing expert with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Edwards said abundant supplies at the farm level already should have sent retail meat prices down.

"This did not occur, said livestock marketing specialist Ernest Davis at Texas A&M, primarily because of an impasse between feed lot managers and packers over prices, which led to a temporary reduction in the number of cattle entering the retail market.

"This kept consumers prices up," he said.

Between April and September, wholesale prices dropped about 12 percent, Edwards said, but retail prices only went down about 2 percent.

"Retailers have been stubbornly holding about 10 percent of the reduction," Edwards said. "It now appears that this management play was unsuccessful and animals will be coming to the market in a flurry."

This doesn't mean there will be an immediate 10 percent reduction in beef prices, Edwards said. The pass-through from retailers will begin in October with a two percent to three percent cut in overall prices.

The biggest reductions will be for

items in seasonal demand such as ground beef, chuck roasts, arm roasts, round steak and meat used in stews, soups, and special meals for cool weather, he said.

"Look for ground beef specials for less than a dollar per pound on three to five pound packs," he said. "T-bones and loins could reflect discounts to \$1 to \$1.50 per pound off regular prices."

Poultry prices will be stable during October as the industry prepares for November special.

Catfish producers will seek additional sales by offering specials on fillets, nuggets and steaks. Demand for shrimp should increase with fall weather, but supplies are such that the prices will continue at present levels. Sales on medium sizes should be about \$3.50 per pound.

"For those with a more exotic taste, shark steaks and roughy will be priced below normal levels," he said.

The 1991 peanut crop in the United States was at near record levels, 40 percent higher than last year's drought-stricken crop. Large supplies translate into lower prices for peanut butter, about 10-20 percent below present prices, Edwards said.

The apple harvest is projected to be slightly above last year's, so prices should be about the same with specials of 45-49 cents for small sizes, 59 cents for the mediums, and

69 cents on the larger sizes.

Prices for jack-o'-lanterns will not be lower this year, but size and quality should be much better after an excellent growing season.

Other featured produce items will be sweet potatoes, white potatoes, brussels sprouts, cauliflower, grapes, honeydew melons, and cranberries. Fall squash varieties, such as butternut and acorn, also will be plentiful, he said.

Vegetables produced for canning or freezing also have been quite good in 1991, and higher prices and shortages seen previously should ease. Specials will return on lima beans, green beans and corn on the cob.

All sorts of baking mixes will be marked down, just in time for fall baking. Fresh dough products, such as biscuits, ready-made pie crusts and cut and baked cookie dough, will be discounted. Frozen pie crusts and frozen fruits used for pie fillings are other items that will be reduced.

"Breakfast becomes a more important factor in our lives with cooler days," Edwards said. Hot and cold cereal prices will be cut, primarily through coupons and not lower prices on the shelves. Bacon,

sausage and eggs will be priced lower because of production increases. Prices for frozen pancakes, waffles and sweet rolls also will be reduced.


"The noontime meal, whether it's at school, work or home, will benefit from specials on soups," he said. competition among the manufacturers of canned soups, dried soup mixes, and microwavable soups, will help consumers' pocketbooks.

"Watch for the double bonus of lower shelf prices and coupons as these companies compete for your dollar," Edwards said.


Even with all this good news, retailers will make their biggest splash with their halloween promotions, featuring any item that could be tied to this event. A wide range of items will be featured from candy and costumes to greeting cards, cold cuts, cakes for the store's bakery and spiced apple cider.

Specials also will be tied in with Oktoberfest, with retailers offering attractive prices for imported beer. Many also will have promotions beginning in October that offer free turkeys with minimum purchases of groceries.

"If you want the free bird, watch for the beginning of these promotions," Edwards said.

MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

SELLING TO YOUR UNCLE

Morris Carter ships popcorn around the world. John Dryden manufactures cushions for outdoor patio furniture. Bill Hand owns and operates a welding shop. Charles McMahon is a manufacturing engineer.

These entrepreneurs have one thing in common. They sell their products and services to the same customer - their uncle. That's Uncle Sam, to be more specific.

Uncle Sam, alias the United States Government, is a big spender. In fact, our government is the largest single customer in the world. It has more than 2,000 purchasing departments that buy from big, medium-sized and small businesses.

Most small businesses don't have a clue about selling to the government. Who do you call? How do you get on the bidders' lists? How do you know what the government wants to buy? How do you handle the infamous government paperwork? Other major

concerns are how long it takes to get paid and the fine print associated with government contracts.

Ready Resource

Across the country, agencies are available to help business owners do business with the government. They have many names including contract procurement centers, procurement assistance centers, contracting assistance programs and government purchasing assistance centers. Regardless of the name, the mission is similar. These offices exist as a ready resource to help small businesses get government contracts.

In the northernmost 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle, the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission's Contract Procurement Center provides this service. Courtney Sharp coordinates the program. "We have helped area businesses land more than \$30 million worth of federal, state and local government contracts," Sharp said. "Our procurement center opened just five years ago, so you can see the business is there."

Some Success Stories

John Dryden's firm, Paradise Cushions, has been successful in landing government contracts. The company makes designer cushions for upscale patio furniture shops. It specializes in high-quality, limited production items.

"We have a slow season after the summer production has been shipped," Dryden said. "We were looking for something to produce to keep our workers employed and to pay overhead." He found help at the Contract Procurement Center.

By doing a computer search of requests for proposals, Sharp

located items that Uncle Sam needed and Dryden could produce. One of the best matches was a canvas backpack for firefighters.

Dryden knew he could build it and decided to bid. "We got the contract, worth \$625,000," Dryden said. "That will keep us busy right up to spring production."

Morris Carter landed a three-year contract in 1988 to sell popcorn to U.S. Government locations in Europe and the Pacific Rim. "It was good business for us," Carter said. "The paperwork really isn't that bad, and we generally get paid in 30 to 60 days."

Charles McMahon has been the successful bidder on government contracts. However, he feels there may be ways of making money, even when you aren't the lowest bidder. "If you lose a bid," McMahon advised, "call the low bidder. You may be able to subcontract part of the order." McMahon points out that often there is more profit and less red tape involved for a subcontractor. "You may be a winner even when you lose," he smiled.

Bill Hand has landed several small contracts but feels that the red tape is a real problem. "They really pile the paperwork on you," Hand said. "Sometimes, I think the extra business isn't worth the hassle." Hand felt that he might be better off working on non-governmental accounts.

TEC PROGRAMS

The Hereford office of the Texas Employment Commission is a service point for special programs such as Project RIO, Job Corps, JOBS and the Targeted Job Tax Credit program.

Project RIO (Re-Integration of Offenders) is designed to assist persons that have been released from the state prison system. Construction costs of new prisons, coupled with the cost of maintaining inmates, have called for alternative solutions. Project RIO assists by providing basic work search skills, training, counseling, job

referrals and assessments to determine if they qualify for other special programs.




Job Corps is a vocational training program for persons 16-21. It allows for vocational training in a variety of fields. The basic format is that the individual will live at a training centers while (in most cases) earning a salary while learning a trade.

JOBS is a co-agency service to provide the opportunities to gain full-time employment. Along with the Texas Department of Human Services, persons are helped with job search skills, career choices and basic job referrals.

The Targeted Job Tax Credit is a special tax credit program. The credit allows an employer with a qualified employee to take up to a 40 percent deduction of the first \$6,000 paid in wages to a qualified persons. The potential credit is \$2,400. Employers can request that the TEC screen for TJTC-qualified applicants for referrals to their job openings.

The Hereford TEC office is a service point for many programs that are geared to assist employers and job seekers alike. Tax dollars provide the services, and the programs can be used as a tool for the area's future.

Designers target 55, up crowd

CHAMPAIGN, III. (AP) - Experts around the country are sizing up the shape of things to come, measuring as many as 10,000 women with rulers and ribbons in an effort to develop better-fitting clothes for the 55-and-up set.

The industry project is the first step toward ready-to-wear clothing designed specifically for the older woman.

"Just because they are older does not mean they are larger. Other things change, like muscle tone and bone structure," said Ellen Goldsberry of the University of Arizona. "But the clothing industry has absolutely no data about their figures."

More than 17 million American women are 55 and up. Many older women endure clothing that's too tight here and too loose there. And many would be willing to pay a little more for the perfect fit, Goldsberry said Wednesday.

She and colleague Naomi Reich are coordinating the measuring project for the American Society for Testing and Materials, which develops standards for everything from tire cords to clothes.

At the Cooperative Extension Service office in Champaign County on Wednesday, women slipped into light blue body suits criss-crossed with ribbons to mark measuring points.

Volunteers used rulers and other tools to record 57 measurements, including the slope of the shoulders and the roundness of the abdomen.

"I think when they get all done, we'll have better clothes," said 79-year-old participant Orlena Leischner of Fisher. "It really is hard to find a one-piece dress that fits in all places."

The \$180,000 project is being funded by the garment industry.

Now, sizing is based on measurements taken in the 1940s. Most of the women used for those measurements were in the Army, and only 2 percent were over 50.

Among them was flight nurse Elberta Morse of Champaign, who was measured in 1946. Morse, 69, decided to be measured again Wednesday to help older women find better-fitting clothes.

"I noticed a change in clothes in the early '50s after the last project," she said. "I began to buy the new juniors. I could see the difference. They fit me."

Rachel Eggen, specifications-quality manager for intimate apparel at Sears' Chicago headquarters, said the study could help the industry offer a better fit.

"These women are conscious about how their clothes look and fit - their appearance," said Eggen. "They diet and exercise, but still the biological clock ticks, and certain changes happen as they grow older."

The point of the shoulder rolls forward, for instance. The chest area narrows, the upper back widens, and the spine compresses, reducing height. The derriere flattens, and the abdomen protrudes.

"Some women buy pants with stretch fabric and elastic waistbands and wear them backwards," said Goldsberry. "It fits their new figure, but it's an absolute shame."

Goldsberry and Reich will continue collecting measurements through January, then they'll analyze their findings and eventually make them available to the garment industry.

Changes could include clothing and patterns designed specifically for the older body, Goldsberry said. And there could be labels that provide length and circumference information about the garment instead of just size numbers "that mean nothing," she added.

However, she said it could be two or three years before women see changes on clothing racks.

"The companies will have to re-gear and redesign, target the market and change their thinking," Goldsberry said. "Today's older woman won't buy the frumpy old house dress 'Grandma' used to wear. She wants style and fit."



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



NBC scores with story of Babe Ruth



Stephen Lang (*Crime Story, Last Exit to Brooklyn*) stars as George Herman "Babe" Ruth, arguably the greatest player in the history of professional baseball. Airing Sunday on NBC, *Babe Ruth* also stars Bruce Weitz, Lisa Zane and features Pete Rose as Ty Cobb.

Small-screen effort hits the high points

"The book on Babe," says actor Stephen Lang, "is that he was a simple man, but I've never really met a simple man." First and foremost, George Herman "Babe" Ruth was a giant among baseball players. He shook the game to its foundations, and he personified the era in which he lived.

Born six years before the century, young George Ruth was left by his father at a Baltimore orphanage, and he never stopped being a kid. When he left Baltimore, his one thought was to play baseball, or, as the script of NBC's *Babe Ruth* puts it, to "have fun." His exuberance spilled over into his private life, which was largely unreported in the press at the time. He ate, smoked, gambled and womanized. And when he went to the ballpark, he hit home runs.

Lang's task in portraying Ruth in the movie, which airs Sunday, Oct. 6, began with the challenge of learning to play ball like Ruth. Ordinarily a right-handed hitter, Lang spent four weeks at Hall-of-Famer Rod Carew's California baseball camp, perfecting his Babe Ruth swing, as well as the patented Ruth trot as he circled the bases.

"The job was not to turn me into a left-handed slugger," Lang says with an ironic grin. "The job was to turn me into the greatest ballplayer that's ever played the game."

"Hitting seemed to me to be the central metaphor for his life. When the hitting began to fall into place, then playing the role began to fall into place." (Ruth himself modeled his

swing after that of Chicago White Sox slugger "Shoeless" Joe Jackson. "He had the perfectest swing I ever saw in my life," Ruth said.)

With Ruth, everything must be raised to a higher order of magnitude. He was not only physically big (Lang gained 35 pounds just to play the young, relatively well. And, while many of his records have since been broken, no one player has equaled his performance on the field.

Babe Ruth paints its hero in broad, quick strokes. Lang gives the part his all, but he can't overcome the glibness of the script. Too many scenes are set up simply to shoehorn in a famous quote, either by the Babe or about him. At that, *Babe Ruth* offers nothing of his seasons with the Boston Red Sox, when, as a pitcher, he set a shut-out record that still stands.

The film's finest moments come when Ruth is with children (the apocryphal hitting-the-home-run-for-Johnny scene is not here, thank goodness) or with his own hero, Yankee manager Miller Huggins (Bruce Weitz). Pete Rose appears, in a much-publicized cameo, as Detroit Tigers player-manager Ty Cobb. Due to the producers' licensing agreement with Major League Baseball, Rose, who is currently banned from the game, was not allowed to appear in uniform.

Also starring are Lisa Zane as Ruth's second wife, Claire; William Lucking as Brother Matthias, the monk in charge of the Baltimore orphanage; and Neal McDonough as the up-and-coming Lou Gehrig. © TV Listing Inc.

**Host Barker is
'Right' for the job**

"Come on down!" For the past 20 years those words have brought men and women screaming down an aisle to take their place in contestants' row on CBS' *The Price Is Right*. The show is currently the highest rated network game show, and heading up the mania is six-time Emmy Award-winner Bob Barker.

Born in Darrington, Wash., Barker spent most of his youth on the Rosebud Indian Reservation, S.D., where his mother was a teacher. Later, he enrolled in Drury College in Springfield, Ill., on a basketball scholarship. World War II interrupted his education, but following his discharge from the Navy, where he was a fighter pilot, Barker returned to Drury to finish his studies.

It was while he was putting himself through college that he discovered his calling: audience participation shows. A year after college graduation he moved to Los Angeles. Within a week, Ralph Edwards, who was developing the idea for *Truth or Consequences*, heard Barker on his car radio and knew he had found the host for his show. Barker stayed with the show for 18 years. On Sept. 4, 1972, he took a new job as host for *The Price Is Right*.

A man of many interests, Barker travels extensively, is a Civil War buff and has studied karate under Chuck Norris. He is also an outspoken opponent of animal exploitation.

NBC is Notre Dame's best recruiting tool

When executives at NBC Sports made the decision to bring regular-season college football back to the network after 26 years, they decided to do things in a big way. And they did, signing an exclusive five-year agreement to broadcast all "Fighting Irish" home games.

Who can blame executive producer Terry O'Neil, himself a Notre Dame alumnus, for acting giddy about the deal? After all, five of the top six all-time highest rated college football games involved Notre Dame. Over the last three seasons, TV audiences for Notre Dame games have been 52 percent higher than the average for college football telecasts, and, in the last decade, Notre Dame has played in the three highest rated college games.

The partnership between the university and the television network was forged in a struggle involving the College Football Association and a court battle between the NCAA and the universities of Georgia and Oklahoma over rights to negotiate television deals. But, by taking advantage of the situation, NBC and Notre Dame have set what could be a dangerous trend in college football recruiting.

In making a major financial commitment to one school, NBC's fortunes have become irrevocably linked to the success of that school's football program. Pandora's Box is open.

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One on One with John Tesh, a half-hour show spotlighting celebrities, airs each weekday on NBC.







THE FISHER KING: Starring Robin Williams, Jeff Bridges, Mercedes Ruehl and Amanda Plummer. This dramatic comedy is only for those who equate love with lunacy and understand that true redemption is always total. The hero of *The Fisher King* is a visionary street person named Parry (Williams), a former professor of medieval history who lives in a remarkable world of his own creation in order to insulate himself from a tragedy in his past. The anti-hero is Jack Lucas (Bridges), a man filled with fatal cynicism who once looked down at life from the top. However, his off-handed arrogance triggered an incident which has sent him on a precipitous decline. Penniless and without prospects, Jack finds himself plucked from disaster by the most improbably savior . . . Parry. It is the beginning of an amazing friendship. Parry needs

love. Jack needs hope. The key to both their redemptions lies in their quest to win the heart of Parry's imperfect vision of a woman - and their quest for the Holy Grail. This emotionally powerful film is about healing wounds and about how giving and getting are pretty much the same thing. It's certainly not a film for everyone. It is visually complex and the characters are secondary to the world in which they exist. The script incorporates elements of literature, mythology, whimsy, romance, fantasy and lust with a unique level of terror and sophistication.

The acting is astounding. Jeff Bridges brings new shading to his craft. Robin Williams seems to dissolve into parts of every lunatic he has ever played - and makes them all seem new. Mercedes Ruehl, the worldly video store owner who provides solace to Jack after his fall from grace, is lusty,

poignant and brilliant. Another brilliant actor is Michael Jeter doing an astonishing and hilarious impression of Ethel Merman. Director Terry Gilliam (*Brazil*, *Time Bandits*, *The Adventures of Baron Munchausen*) is one of the most imaginative persons working in films today. What Gilliam does for the eye and the mind through film is remarkable. If you love lunacy, like Robin Williams' unique brand of comedy, and believe that only the pure-hearted can discover the nature of true love . . . then this is the movie for you!!! Rated R for violence and nudity.

CYRANO DE BERGERAC: (1990/French with English subtitles) Starring Gerard Depardieu. A touch of cosmetic prosthesis adds just enough to Gerard Depardieu's own generous nose to make it the object of ridicule and swordplay in Edmond Rostand's romantic verse drama. Smitten by Roxanne (Anne Brochet), Cyrano acts as a go-between for her and his none-too-articulate cohort, Christian (Vincent Perez). Jean-Paul Rappeneau's film is a physically elaborate period spectacle, and Depardieu's performance is a disciplined whirlwind of conflicting emotions that finds surprising new life in this

somewhat theatrical antique based on the play of 17th-century Paris. Nominated for the Oscar for Best Foreign Film. Not rated. Would be a PG. Even for those who do not like subtitles, this is a beautiful story (happy ending and all) which the whole family would enjoy.
