## Shootings, fires reported

# Halloween not harmless

Benign vampires capered through New York City streets amid Groucho-masked nuns and human-sized bread slices, but Halloween took a gruesome turn elsewhere — with deadly fires set by Detroit pranksters and shootings injuring children in two states.  
Reports of tainted candy and goodies laden with pins and needles marred Monday night's holiday in Arizona, just over a year after the Tylenol poisonings in the Chicago area worried parents of trick-or-treaters.  
But officials in most states reported a calm Halloween, made safer by curfews, organized events for children and X-ray stations where

parents could bring treats to spot tampering.  
"We just didn't see many trick-or-treaters out tonight," said police Lt. Jim Webb in Muskogee, Okla. "The city had little programs for the kids to go to — carnivals — and that kept a lot of them off the street."  
However, in Macon, Ga., a 9-year-old girl was critically injured Monday night when an unknown gunman fired into a group of children as they were trick-or-treating, police said.  
And in upstate New York, police said a man who answered his door expecting trick-or-treaters was shot with a rifle by one of two men in army fatigues and blackened faces. His 3-year-old daughter was also wounded.

The streets of New York City's Greenwich Village were thronged Monday night, but most of the 250,000 revelers were grown-ups playing at being children for one night for the 10th annual Halloween parade through the Bohemian heart of the city.  
Costumes ranged from the sedate — a red, white and black painted face over a business suit — to the outrageous: a carton of milk, a seven-slice loaf of white bread, and an entire family of ancient Egyptians.  
Seven witches on stilts swept through the crowd with long brooms and 10 nuns wearing Groucho Marx masks marched in single file.  
In Detroit, one man died and two firefighters were slightly injured in as many as 600 fires set on Devil's Night, the 24-hour period that ended at noon Monday, fire officials said. Officials said the fires were set by teen-age pranksters, not professional arsonists.  
An 18-year-old Phoenix woman who ate poisoned candy, contaminated with an unknown substance, was sickened and felt dizzy, and her 16-year-old sister reportedly swallowed a needle that was embedded in a Halloween treat, police said.  
But Freehold police Lt. Don Burlew said Monday night's haunting was the quietest in his 12 years on the force, and he had a theory about the drop in vandalism:  
"I think the old crowd is finally moving on and doing bigger and better things in life and their little brothers and sisters have better sense."

# Green Thumbs to gather next week

The Deaf Smith County Chapter of the American Red Cross will host a meeting of Green Thumb workers and supervisors Nov. 9 at 9 a.m. at the Hereford Community Center.  
Director Betty Hensen said the gathering is actually a training session for employees in the area who will learn about safety at home and on the job. She expects at least 35 persons to attend, including seven from Hereford.  
The workshop will be conducted by Darrel Haile, area supervisor from Plainview

and Pauline Davis, area leader who lives in Dimmitt and works in Hereford, Dimmitt and Friona.  
Green Thumb is a national, non-profit organization designed to assist senior citizens 55 and over in improving their work skills and finding jobs. Programs in Texas are sponsored by the Texas Farmers Union and serve only rural areas.  
Founded in 1965, Green Thumb is the oldest federal senior citizens program in the nation and is now found in 45 states, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico.

## Cecil Morrison, 53

# Local resident found dead

Hereford resident Cecil Morrison, 53, was found dead in a 1980 Dodge pickup Saturday night in the roadside park one mile south of Dimmitt.  
According to Jerry Jansa, deputy sheriff for Castro County, Morrison was pronounced dead shortly after midnight. Polly Simpson, district judge, acted as coroner.  
Jansa said evidence "seems to indicate" Morrison

died from a self-inflicted bullet wound in the chest. An autopsy was performed Sunday by Amarillo pathologist Dr. Ralph Erdmann, who told Simpson he would personally give her the autopsy report later this week.  
A .38-special revolver was found with Morrison in the truck's cab. There was apparently no suicide note left, Jansa said.  
Early Saturday evening, a Dimmitt resident reported the truck to the local police

department. Police, after a quick check, determined Morrison was sleeping.  
Later that night, another report concerning the Dodge was made to police. This time, a Dimmitt officer determined Morrison was deceased.  
For more details about Morrison and funeral information, see the obituary on page 2.  
Meanwhile, Hereford police reported no major Halloween-related problems

occurred here Monday night. One pumpkin was stolen and a girl was taken to the hospital for having eaten too much candy.  
Among the 18 arrested by local police over the weekend was Alvino Guerra, Route 1. He was charged with DWI after reportedly having caused an injury accident Saturday at 2:56 p.m.  
Guerra drove a 1971 Ford Bronco out from South Progressive Road - onto Highway 60 - directly into the path of a

southbound 1974 Ford, driven by Donald Cross. The Detroit, Mich., resident applied his brakes and skidded into Guerra's vehicle.  
Though neither driver nor the two passengers in Cross' car were hurt, minor injuries were suffered by Guerra's two companions. Keith Adams or 1618 Eighteenth St. and Frank DeLaPaz, 612 Irving, were both taken to Deaf

## Snipers continue attacks

# Grenada schools, stores reopen

ST. GEORGE'S, Grenada (AP) — U.S. helicopters buzzed a sniper on one side of Grenada while searchers 45 miles away cleared the rubble of a mental hospital where as many as 20 patients were killed when U.S. jets bombed the facility.  
The helicopters swooped in low over the treetops after sniper fire Monday sent U.S. soldiers scrambling for cover.

Despite the sniping, 1,200 Marines were leaving for Lebanon, their original assignment before being diverted to Grenada. U.S. Army soldiers were taking their place today, a week after the U.S.-led invasion of the 133-square-mile Caribbean island.  
Deputy Secretary of State Kenneth Dam said Monday night there was no timetable yet for U.S. troop withdrawal because it was not known

when all the resistance would end.  
Capt. Barry Willey, an Army public affairs officer in Grenada, said he knew of no bands of resisters still fighting on Monday, but added that soldiers combing the island were finding more caches of weapons and ammunition.  
"I don't want to mislead you that the whole island is now secure," Willey said.  
Vehicles with loudspeakers fanned out over the roads, blasting this message over and over: "Members of the People's Revolutionary Army, Cuban defenders. Lay down your arms and surrender. You will be allowed to go home. Gen. Austin has surrendered. The resistance is over."  
Gen. Hudson Austin, who led the Marxist military junta which seized control and killed Prime Minister Maurice Bishop, was taken by U.S. paratroopers after they were tipped that the general was hiding in a house on the southeast coast, Willey said.  
Without firing a shot, the paratroopers seized Austin, along with two militia officers and two young men, Willey said. Whether the

young men were hostages, "I cannot say," Willey said.  
White House spokesman Larry Speakes said Austin was being held "for his personal protection" on the USS

Guam, the flagship of the U.S. fleet off Grenada.  
The Pentagon said 18 U.S. servicemen have been killed, 86 wounded and one is missing since the invasion.

# Sonar detects lost ship on sea bottom

HOUSTON (AP) — A U.S. oil drilling ship that carried 81 people and had been missing off the coast of China since Oct. 25 has been located by sonar 300 feet beneath the sea, a spokesman for the company that owns the vessel said today.  
U.S. and Chinese air and sea craft have been searching for the vessel or survivors in the South China Sea since the Glomar Java Sea disappeared during a typhoon.  
"Using sonar equipment, we have determined that the drilling ship is sunk at the drilling site," said Dick Vermeer, vice president for control and administration of Global Marine Inc. in Houston.

Vermeer said sonar located the Glomar Java Sea lying on its side beneath the drilling site in about 300 feet of water.  
Two U.S. Navy P-3 planes have been searching for the lost ship while China sent 14 ships and three helicopters out in poor weather south of Hainan Island.  
A Chinese ship was expected to arrive Thursday from Singapore to support possible diving operations, oil industry sources said.

# Local credit union plans big changes

Plans for a \$394,000 remodeling and expansion project at Hereford Texas Federal Credit Union were announced here Monday by Jim Rowton, general manager.  
While the current floor plan will be completely revamped and remodeling will be accomplished inside and out, business is expected to be continued at the facility, according to Rowton.  
Additional floor space will be added to the north and east sides of the present building, and the "facelift" will feature

a new main entrance on the north, or 4th Street, side. The drive-in facility will be expanded on the east side of the building, with the entrance still being made from Schley Street.  
Rowton said work is expected to begin this week on the project, and completion is anticipated by mid-March. "We are optimistic about the future growth and the economy in Deaf Smith County," said Rowton.  
The HTFCU has also purchased the corner lot across the street to the north, and it will be utilized as a paved parking lot for employees and customers.  
The Bank Building Corporation, Richardson, will be the general contractor for the construction project. Rowton said all work, with the exception of security equipment, is expected to be contracted locally. The construction and furnishings are expected to total about \$394,000.  
The HTFCU building has not had any major improvements made since the building was erected in 1956. The credit union was established here in 1936. Joe Kerr is current president of the board and Milton Adams is vice president. Other directors include George Lambert of Dimmitt, Nick Yosten, Michael Dodson, Ralph Smith of Dimmitt, and Robert Thompson.

## Students hear about eyes

Textbook terms came to life Monday morning for Stanton Junior High School students in Rueben Vargas' life science class.  
Dr. Harold Brigance, a local optometrist, presented visual aids - including a model of the human eye - and a slide show which he helped assemble.  
Dr. Brigance talked about eye injuries and how to avoid them, common eye diseases and other eye problems. The slide show depicted actual cases from the University of Houston's optometry school.  
Though Dr. Brigance presented news not usually found in junior high textbooks, he said schools are doing a good job of teaching basic, concrete information about the human eye. He also praised school vision screenings that detect eye problems. Before such screenings, he said, children with uncorrected problems were often labeled as slow learners.

## Holly Sugar mails checks

Holly Sugar mailed checks totaling \$1,106,127.27 to area sugar beet growers Monday, representing the final settlement for beets grown during the 1982 season.  
The payment brings proceeds from the 1982 crop to more than \$36 per ton for growers with an average sugar content of 14.3 percent.  
Also Monday, initial payments for the 1983 sugar beet crop left the Holly Sugar offices. A total of \$1,703,394.76 was mailed to area beet growers for partial payment of what they expect sugar to sell for. Cal Jones, plant agricultural manager, said checks reflect nearly \$25 per ton on average sugar beets.

### TI stock rises 22 percent

DALLAS (AP) — Analysts reacted with glee as Texas Instruments Inc. stock rose 22 percent in the wake of the firm's decision to abandon its unprofitable home computer line, but the news was bitter for 1,000 of TI's West Texas workers.

TI, which announced Friday that it quit manufacturing home computers, said Monday that it was eliminating 1,000 jobs in Lubbock.

TI spokesman Norman Neureiter would not say when or if more layoffs will occur. TI released a statement that said the consumer division headquarters would stay in Lubbock.

### System failed during hurricane

HOUSTON (AP) — A telephone "hotline," radio antennas, tide gauges and a radar system, all belonging to the National Weather Service, failed when Hurricane Alicia hit the Texas coast last summer, a study by the agency says.

But the malfunctions did not prevent forecasters from providing good service to residents of the Texas coast during the Aug. 18 storm, Richard Coleman, acting director of the agency's severe weather branch, said Monday.

"I was very pleased not only with the actions that our (forecasters) took, but also with the actions of local officials, who worked very hard with out people before the storm hit," Coleman said.

# Marines aren't safe in Lebanon

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two top commanders of U.S. forces in Lebanon say as long as Marines hold their peacekeeping position in Beirut, their safety from terrorist attack cannot be guaranteed.

Gen. Paul X. Kelley, commander of the Marine Corps, and Army Gen. Bernard Rogers, commander of U.S. forces in Europe, testified Monday before the Senate Armed Services Committee on security at the Marine headquarters in Beirut following the Oct. 23 terrorist bombing that claimed at least 230 lives.

"No way, we cannot guarantee that there will be no further attacks against our troops," Rogers said. "We can't make that guarantee as long as our forces are in this situation. You can't prevent it, and I don't like it."

Kelley was returning to Capitol Hill today to explain to the House Armed Services Committee steps taken to protect the troops in the wake of the suicide attack that destroyed the Marine headquarters at Beirut airport.

On Wednesday, the House is scheduled to vote on an attempt by Rep. Clarence Long, D-Md., to cut off funds for maintaining the Marines after Nov. 30 as part of the international peacekeeping force that has been based in the war torn nation for 13 months.

Numerous members of Congress have expressed outrage about the adequacy of the protection provided the Marines, and House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill predicted the vote would be "very close." He said members of a congressional delegation who visited the Marine contingent over the weekend would

carry "a significant amount of clout" in the matter with their colleagues.

In his first public testimony about the attack following his visit to the airport headquarters last week, Kelley told the senators Monday that security is being beefed up. Besides access being limited to a one-lane road, additional guard posts are being added, patrols are being stepped up and machine gun emplacements are guarding the approaches to the U.S. positions, Kelley said.

Kelley pointed out that the Marines' mission was a "diplomatic and political mission, and not a military one," making it difficult for them to build a fortress-like defense.

"Our basic mission is presence," Kelley said. "The Marines had to be seen by the Lebanese people."

He attempted to convince the senators that prior to the attack, "every reasonable and prudent precaution" had been taken to ensure the troops' safety, but that an attack of such magnitude had not, and could not have been, foreseen.

"It was a kamikaze attack," Kelley told the Senate Armed Services Committee. "We didn't have a defense against it in World War II and we didn't have a defense against it in 1983."

The head of the Marine Corps said that the truck took six seconds to speed at an estimated 60 mph. through the compound that housed the Marines, and that even machine gun fire from posts guarding the area could not have stopped a truck of such size.

"We did not have a shred of intelligence that could even suggest that we should anticipate an attack of this size," he said.

## National

### Clark hearing slated today

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senators called William P. Clark before them today to find out whether as secretary of the interior he will offer more than a change of style from his controversial predecessor, James G. Watt.

Environmental critics were not waiting to hear Clark's answers.

Two of the country's largest groups announced Monday they would oppose the nomination, charging that Clark has exhibited a strong anti-environmental bias and has failed to signal any intent to break with Watt's pro-development policies.

Denny Shaffer, president of the Sierra Club, called Clark's overtures to environmentalists "disappointing and cosmetic."

### Earnings improve, stats show

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government says median weekly earnings of American families rose to \$481 in the third quarter, a \$26 improvement over the same three-month period in 1982, which helped to keep household budget-managers well ahead of inflation.

The weekly earnings figure was 5.7 percent above that of last year.

For individuals with full-time or salaried jobs, the Bureau of Labor Statistics said median weekly earnings, which includes overtime, tips and commissions added to paychecks before deductions, rose to \$320, up from \$307 over the same period last year, an increase of 4.2 percent.

During the same 12-month time span, consumer prices were rising at an annual rate of only 2.5 percent.

### Mail rate hike proposed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Postal Service said today it will seek to increase the cost of mailing a letter from 20 cents to 23 cents.

Robert L. Hardesty, chairman of the Postal Service Board, said increases would be sought for all classes of mail, but they would not take effect before Oct. 1, 1984.

The proposed increase for postcards, for example, would be 2 cents, from 13 cents to 15 cents.

Postmaster General William F. Bolger said, "I still think that 23 cents will be a bargain" for a letter.

The officials said the independent Postal Rate Commission would be asked within a few days to approve the new rates. The panel is allowed up to 10 months to consider such a case.

## International

### Japanese give nod to pact

TOKYO (AP) — Japan agreed today to limit auto exports to the United States for a fourth year after winning concessions opposed by the United Auto Workers union.

Japan's top trade official described the measure as a "soft landing" to prevent further disruption in the U.S. auto market, and said he had been promised by a U.S. official that restrictions would be for only one year.

The 1.2-million member UAW demanded a two-year extension of restraints that expire March 31, while Japanese automakers, citing the strong recovery of the U.S. auto industry, said the restraints should be for only nine months.

UAW President Owen Bieber called Monday for a two-year renewal, saying any shorter extension of the existing agreement "that expires shortly after the presidential election will smack of politics, rather than seriously addressing the massive trade deficit in autos with Japan."

### Airlines sign new contract

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Mexicana and Aeromexico, the country's two major airlines, signed contracts with pilots and ground workers Monday night, averting a strike scheduled for midnight.

Ground workers signed first and the pilots accepted a new contract only minutes before the deadline, Fernando Martinez Cortes, a spokesman for Mexicana, said.

Both airlines are government controlled.

Martinez Cortes said ground workers accepted a 25 percent wage increase and the pilots agreed to a 23 percent increase in their salaries.

Ground workers were seeking a 35 percent increase and the pilots had demanded a 30 percent increase.

# Caribbean requires closer look

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico (AP) — Informed American diplomats, historians and analysts agree: the invasion of Grenada proves the United States must do more homework and spend more money on the Caribbean region.

The aftershocks of the invasion and occupation may pave the way toward closer relations between the United States and its southern neighbors in the hemisphere — and for governments that are more to American liking than Cuba's Soviet-supported Marxism, these experts say.

A historian who specializes in Central America, just back from a research trip through Nicaragua, says the lesson of Grenada may be that the U.S. will no longer allow even the

appearance of communism in its own backyard.

Michael Doyle, a Princeton University international affairs specialist, said Americans must remember that the implications of Grenada are different in the rest of the world.

"Domestically, it looks like this is a political coup for Reagan that makes many Reagan supporters delighted and many Reagan opponents quite angry," Doyle said. "For Grenada and the Caribbean, it means the U.S. rescued Grenada from a brutal, thuggish dictatorship."

Most experts agree that the Grenada invasion was "a significant blow" to the Cuban government. In one stroke, the Cubans lost men, a strategic air base and a friendly government, and

they offered no military response. But the experts also agree that the Grenada campaign will not necessarily change the policies of other nations in the Caribbean.

However, some U.S. diplomats in Latin America, who spoke on condition they not be identified, believe the invasion begins a new era.

One, a former ambassador, noted that unlike Central America and South America, political violence and war have not been a part of the English-speaking Caribbean's recent history. Cuban military involvement in Grenada was a "total distortion" of this non-military tradition, he said.

"Grenada means that we are trying to demonstrate that the U.S. is prepared to use military force to protect American lives; that the U.S.

does recognize a security problem and that...we recognize that Soviet effort to promote their own interests in the area next to us and use weapons has got to be dealt with more effectively," he said.

The action on Grenada is widely seen as a message to Cuba and the Soviet Union that there are risks in trying to extend their influence in this part of the world.

One senior diplomat says the Cubans will not stop trying to convert their neighbors.

# Polish women smuggled

HOUSTON (AP) — Two Polish women who sneaked into the United States through Mexico and were arrested with a group of Mexican illegal aliens reached Texas by using only two words, a federal agent says: "Laredo" and "dealer."

Irena Kaminski, 56, and Barbara Molska, 29, appeared confused but cheerful Monday as they appeared before U.S. Magistrate Ray McQuary after spending two days in jail in Houston as material witnesses. They were released on personal recognizance bonds.

The two were arrested Saturday when agents of the Immigration and Naturalization Service raided a southwest Houston house where smugglers were holding 14 illegal aliens for ransom.

The women, who had tried and failed to obtain visas legally, were told they could

enter through Mexico if they knew only two words: "Laredo" and "dealer," said David Berkowitz, an INS agent.

"Somebody from their village in Poland had gotten to the United States by way of Mexico," Berkowitz said.

Berkowitz said the women flew to Mexico City Oct. 21, hopped in a cab and told the driver, "Laredo."

He said the two found themselves on a bus to Nuevo Laredo, Mexico. There they hailed another cab and said, "Dealer." They were taken to a smuggler of illegal aliens.

After spending several nights in Laredo, the women were eventually driven to Houston. Berkowitz said they paid the smugglers \$750, but were asked for another \$1,700, which they were trying to obtain from friends.

Nine people were arrested on charges of smuggling the group when agents raided a

house in southwest Houston Saturday, Berkowitz said. He said officials got a tip from a woman in Chicago that smugglers had threatened to kill her three Mexican brothers unless she paid them \$1,400.

The two Polish women, who speak neither English or Spanish, were expected to go to Chicago until they are needed as witnesses against the group accused of smuggling them, officials said.

I belong to a union. For most of my professional life I've been a dues-paying member of AFTRA, the American Federation of Television and Radio Artists.

Never once has that union sought in any way to tell me how to vote. At no time as AFTRA presumed to speak in my behalf.

Other unions do.

AGVA, the American Guide of Variety Artists, represents actors and actresses. Under the presidency of Ed Asner there have been efforts to superimpose his politics on theirs.

While union involvement in politics may be appropriate for some tradesmen — though I am unconvinced it is — for a union's leaders to presume to

influence mass media is at least a First Amendment misuse.

The teachers unions do not poll their membership before taking sides.

Leader of The Newspaper Guild — representing 24,000 newswriters — has announced that union is in favor of mondale for president, although there was no effort whatever to survey the membership.

Little wonder union membership is rebelling against its own leadership. Membership is down by more than a million in one decade. Unions now represent only one-in-five American workers. And less and less, union leaders are able to deliver the vote of their own constituents.

In the first national election, as many blue collar workers defied union recommendations as did not. Union leaders are union busting from inside!

Our silent majority does not appreciate dictation from anybody. The gesture of commitment from union leaders no longer carries much weight.

Yet when the union represents news writers and seeks to involve them in partisan politics, that can only compromise further their already diluted credibility.

Lichter-Rothman studies affirming that most of the media elite are left-to-far-left in their political ideology should have been an embarrassment, should have begat an effort toward balance.

I see no evidence it did. And now, a year away from election, for the Newspaper Guild to proclaim a preferred candidate must surely render suspect everything the writers subsequently say and write.

Individual broadcasters and newspapers frequently assert themselves politically. So be it.

Readers can accept or reject such "guidance."

But no TV or radio network takes sides in respect for the near-monopoly influence they enjoy and the wide spectrum constituency they serve.

Surely national unions have a similar obligation.

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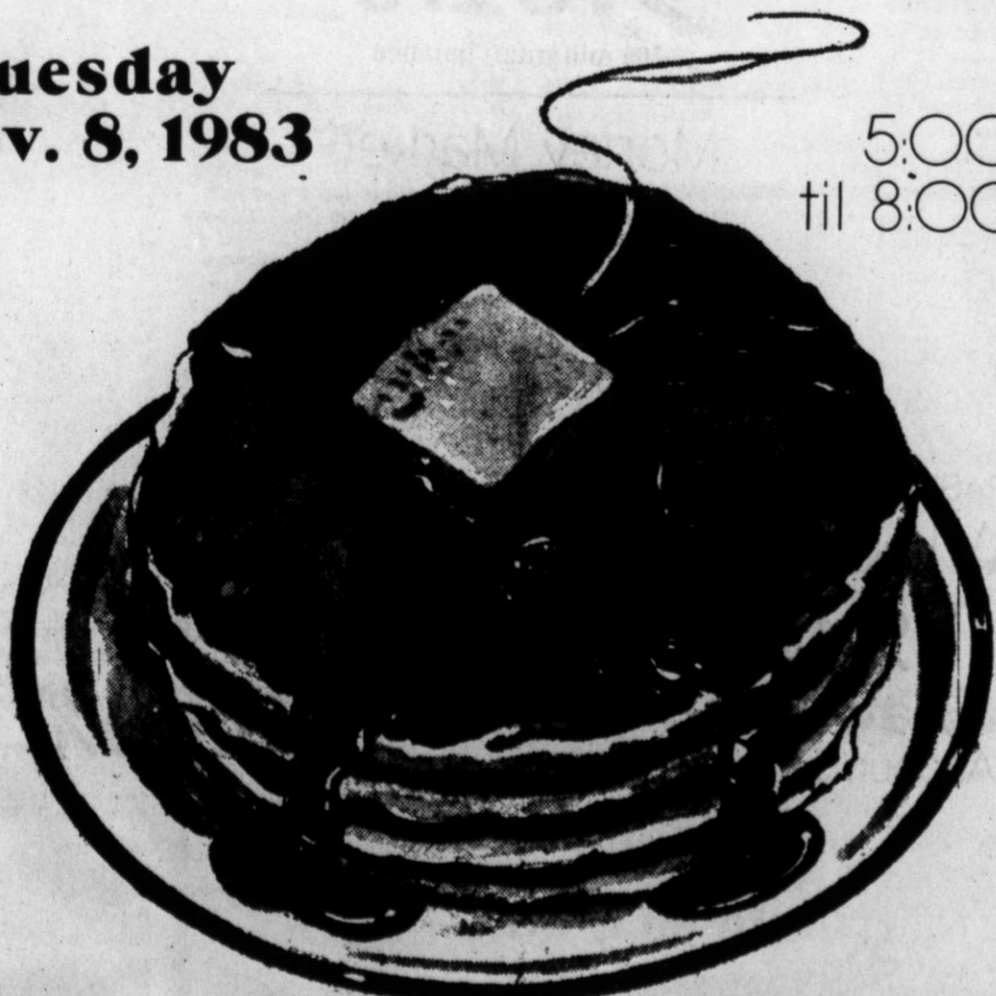
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## Nebraska widens lead again in college football poll

The Nebraska Cornhuskers, fresh off another lopsided victory, this time over Big Eight foe Kansas State, widened their lead over second-place Texas in the Associated Press college football poll.

The Cornhuskers polled 57 of 59 first-place votes and 1,178 of a possible 1,180 points from a nationwide panel of sports writers and sportscasters.

Texas, which defeated Texas Tech, received the other two first-place votes and 1,123 points.

Last week, with 58 voters participating, Nebraska had 54 first-place votes, while Texas received four.

Behind the two unbeaten powers, who have held down first-and second-place for seven straight weeks, there was a lot of movement, though the 20 teams remained the same as last week.

Auburn moved up one spot to third with 1,048 points after stopping Florida 28-21, while Georgia, a 3-14 winner over Temple, advanced from sixth to fourth with 954 points. That sets up a key Southeastern Conference game Nov. 12 when Auburn travels to Georgia.

Miami of Florida also jumped two spots to fifth after knocking off West Virginia, while Illinois, a 16-6 winner over Big Ten foe Michigan, moved up three places to sixth. The victory

made Illinois a strong favorite for the Big Ten berth in the Rose Bowl.

Maryland's victory over North Carolina moved the Terrapins from 13th to seventh, while North Carolina fell from third to 10th. Southern Methodist is eighth this week, up two spots, while Florida held on to its No. 9 ranking.

The second 10 consists of, in order, Oklahoma, Brigham Young, Michigan, Ohio State, Iowa, Boston College, West Virginia, Notre Dame, Alabama and Washington.

Last week, it was Washington, West Virginia, Maryland, Oklahoma, BYU, Ohio State, Iowa and Alabama, with Boston College and Notre Dame tied for 19th.

## Texas' Class 5A title game to be telecast for first time

AUSTIN (AP) — Television stations around the state have signed on to carry the telecast of the Dec. 17 Texas high school football championship game in Class 5A, officials say.

"We are covered in every area," said Russ Potts, former Southern Methodist University athletic director and now president of Sports Productions Inc. of Dallas, which will produce Texas' first-ever telecast of a high school football title game.

The agreement between the University Interscholastic League and Sports Productions Inc. of Dallas includes a ban on replays of controversial calls by officials. Also unseen will be athletes being treated for injuries.

Sportscaster Verne Lundquist of Dallas, who handles the play-by-play for the Dallas Cowboys radio broadcasts, is set as the play-by-play man.

Former University of Texas coach Darrell Royal will be one of the color announcers. Roger Staubach will join Lundquist and Royal if the game is in the Dallas

area. If not, veteran announcer Frank Fallon will be the third man.

The site for the game won't be selected until the final two teams are known.

Marshall said the UIL probably will get \$20,000 from the telecast. The schools involved will split \$16,000.

Concerning the decision to disallow replays of controversial calls, UIL director Bailey Marshall said Monday, "We feel like we just want to show the positive sides of the game."

UIL official Bob Young added, "It's high school kids. We don't want to cause any embarrassment to anybody." Young said the list of "no-nos" also prohibits the announcers from questioning officials' decisions.

"Sometimes I think that is all the announcers do," he added.

Other no-nos are live interviews with coaches, and commercials advertising beer or wine.

"I don't think there's

anything worse than interviewing a coach on the sideline when he's getting ready to play," said Potts, who also added that the ban on criticism of referees does not bother him.

"I don't think there's anything wrong with those kinds of suggestions," Potts said. He said the announcers will be free to comment on the play.

## Moseley field goal lifts Redskins over Chargers

SAN DIEGO (AP) — For a few anxious minutes, Mark Moseley knew what it felt like to be in Neil O'Donoghue's shoes.

After missing four field goals in Monday night's game against San Diego, Moseley was fighting a case of nerves when he lined up for what he called "the hardest field goal I ever had to kick in my career."

"I was over there on the sidelines praying to get another chance," said Moseley, a veteran of 12 National Football League seasons. His 37-yard field goal with four seconds left produced a 27-24 victory over the Chargers and helped Moseley, 35, conquer a confidence crisis that traced back to a key miss two weeks ago.

A year ago, he was near-perfect for the Super Bowl champion Redskins, hitting 20 of 21 field goals for an all-time NFL accuracy mark. Over two seasons, he had made 23 consecutive kicks, another NFL record.

But Monday night he was near the breaking point.

"I wouldn't be human if I didn't say I was thinking about the four misses," said Moseley, who had failed from 43, 52, 47 and 39 yards. He also had made a 43-yarder. The winning kick "felt like I had a 1,000 pounds taken off my shoulders," a relieved Moseley told reporters. "It's been a mental struggle all year. Tonight was the turning point of my career."

It was the third consecutive week that a field goal kicker determined the outcome of the Monday night NFL game. In last week's 20-20 tie bet-

ween St. Louis and the New York Giants, the Cardinals' O'Donoghue missed three field goal attempts in the overtime period.

Two weeks ago Moseley missed a 39-yarder as time ran out, allowing the Green Bay Packers to preserve a 48-47 victory on Jan Stenerud's 20-yard field goal with 54 seconds left.

With the victory, Washington improved its record to 7-2 in the NFC East, a game behind the 8-1 Dallas Cowboys. San Diego slipped to 3-6 and has a three-game losing streak, its longest in five years under Coach Don Coryell.

Moseley's kick erased a dramatic comeback by the Chargers, who trailed 24-7 early in the fourth quarter and tied it at 24-24 with 1:52 remaining on a 43-yard field goal by Rolf Benirschke.

San Diego quarterback Ed Luther overcame six interceptions, a fumble and a sack to ignite the 17-point fourth quarter with a pair of touchdown passes 4 1/2 minutes apart.

But, after Benirschke tied

it, the Redskins drove 72 yards in the final two minutes to grab the victory.

Washington built its lead by converting three of Luther's interceptions into 17 points. Redskins' safety Mark Murphy had three interceptions. San Diego also lost two fumbles, including one that rolled through the Washington end zone for a touchback.

Joe Theismann completed 25 of 46 passes for 324 yards while Luther finished with 19 completions in 36 tries for 314 yards.

"It's tough to take," said Luther. "We stopped ourselves."

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## Tributes pour in following Halas' death

CHICAGO (AP) — "Papa Bear" George Halas, owner of the Chicago Bears and last survivor of the pioneering group that founded modern professional football in a Canton, Ohio, auto showroom, has died at the age of 88.

Halas, whose teams won eight national championships and produced 20 members of pro football's Hall of Fame over a career that spanned seven decades, died Monday in his apartment on Chicago's North Side, family members said.

His daughter, Virginia Halas McCaskey, was at his bedside when he died, his grandson, Rich McCaskey, said.

Halas' death prompted an outpouring of tributes from former players, coaches and others who remembered his contributions to the game and his feisty, driving personality.

"George Halas leaves modern professional football as his memorial," said Commissioner Pete Rozelle. "He was the National Football League — its founder, the driving force that sustained it during struggling pioneer years, the owner-coach-innovator whose dynamic Bear teams triggered public acceptance of the NFL and the revered elder statesman whose vision and vitality were pivotal in the league's growth."

## 3 or 4-way tie looms in district race

Hereford, Amarillo, Plainview, Palo Duro and Monterey are all 5-2 in the district standings. The first and second-place teams advance into the playoffs.

Coch Jery Taylor will explain the playoff possibilities and give a scouting report on Lubbock Coronado when the

Whiteface Booster Club holds its regular weekly meeting at 7:30 tonight in the exercise room, located next to the field house.

All interested football fans are invited to attend the meeting. Other coaches will report on the junior varsity and junior high teams, and a film of the Amarillo game will be shown.

Coch Taylor will probably point out that Hereford has to beat Coronado Friday night before being concerned about playoff possibilities.

The best bet, according to the way the teams have played, is a four-way tie for the title. The key game comes early, as Palo Duro plays at Monterey on Thursday night. It's the only game involving two of the leaders head-to-head.

The other key game, of course, is Coronado at

Hereford. The Mustangs had an open date last week after knocking off Amarillo, 13-12, the week before. The Mustangs are not mathematically eliminated with their three losses. But, with Amarillo playing winless Lubbock High and Plainview highly favored over Caprock, there doesn't appear to be much chance for a team with three losses.

Amarillo appears to have the best position in the puzzle. The Sandies defeated all the leaders except Palo Duro, so they could advance in a tie with Hereford, Plainview and Monterey. If Palo Duro whips Monterey, however, Amarillo will gamble on the coin flip. The Sandies will be pulling for Monterey to win, of course, while the others will be hoping for a Coronado win in order to eliminate Hereford from a coin-tossing game.

Hereford's best bet is to defeat Coronado and hope to emerge a winner in a coinflip between three or four teams. If Hereford wins and Palo Duro wins, it will be a four-way tie—assuming Amarillo and Plainview win their games. If Hereford wins and Monterey wins, Amarillo will clinch the top spot and there is a three-way tie between Hereford, Monterey and Plainview for the second position.

The winner of this district plays the second-place team in District 4-5A, while the runner-up here plays the first-place team in 4-5A. Abilene Cooper upset Midland Lee last week in District 4-5A to cause a little scramble in that race. Permian is 5-1 with Odessa High still to play, while Midland Lee and Odessa are 4-2 in the race.

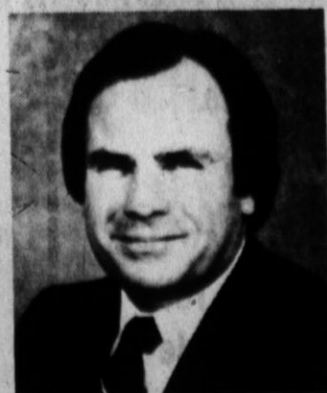

# HHS girls win first cross-country title

For the first time ever, girl cross country runners from Hereford High School won the district meet when they topped a seven-squad field Saturday in Lubbock.

The victory qualifies HHS for next Saturday's regional meet, also to be held in Lubbock. Last year, Hereford girls failed to qualify for regionals as they finished fifth in the district.

Only the district's top two teams and top five individual runners are eligible for regional competition.

In 1982, HHS boys placed first in the district meet. This year, however, their season came to an abrupt end Saturday with a fourth-place effort. No local male runner was able to finish in the top five individually.

Hereford's distaff harriers were paced by sophomore Selma Moreno, third individually with a two-mile clocking of 12:15. Another 10th grader, Glenda Gonzales, was fifth with a 12:48. Also running in the top ten for the Whitefaces were senior Dana Cabiness (seventh, 12:57) and sophomore Francis Flores (eighth, 13:02).

Other female participants for HHS were senior Yolanda Alaviz (14th, 13:23) and sophomore Judy Sanders (28th, 13:55).

According to HHS coach Martha Emerson, all six girls ran faster times than they did on the same course at Oct. 15's Lubbock Invitational, in which Hereford was second. "It was a great effort by all

six of these young ladies," Emerson commented. "They wanted this district championship very much and they have run more miles in training than any group I have coached."

Final girl team standings showed HHS with 36, Lubbock-Coronado 63 (thereby it also qualifies for the regional meet), Amarillo 71, Amarillo-Tascosa 86, Amarillo-Caprock 95, Amarillo-Palo Duro 144 and Plainview 203.

Emerson felt an El Paso school may be considered the favorite for Saturday's regionals, but that her squad has a good chance of being in the top three. If it does finish in the top trio, HHS would qualify for the state meet, scheduled the following Saturday (Nov. 12) in Georgetown.

Despite what Emerson described as "their best effort of the year," Hereford boys ended behind Monterey (66), Caprock (89) and Coronado (90) with 95 points. Trailing the Whitefaces were Lubbock with 120, Plainview 124, Amarillo 126, Palo Duro 169 and Tascosa 215.

Francisco Saucedo, with a three-mile time of 16:50, was Hereford's highest individual finisher at 10th. Thirteenth was Eliseo Ramirez, who recorded a 16:57.

The other HHS placings and times were earned by Frankie Vallejo (21st, 17:29), Gary Blevins (22nd, 17:30), Lape Rocha (29th, 17:39), Joel Lopez (38th, 17:56) and Alonzo Martinez (39th, 17:59).

In junior varsity competition, Bobby Aranda was sixth with an 18:35. In the JV girls' race, Mari Lou Hernandez' 13:58 was good for second. Eva Medrano (15:27) and Veronica Estrada (15:40) also ran for the Whitefaces.

## Tax law affects family insurance

**COLLEGE STATION**—Changes in the tax law affecting the amount of uninsured personal casualty or theft losses that can be claimed as deductions have important implications for family finances.

Under the old rule, you could deduct all but the first \$100 of uninsured losses, explains Nancy Granovsky, a family resource management specialist.

But beginning with the 1983 tax year, you will only be able

to claim a total losses in excess of 10 percent of your adjusted gross income, says Granovsky, a home economist with the Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service.

Under the new rules, only

the most catastrophic unreimbursed losses would probably be deductible for an average-income family, although any loss could cause a financial hardship, says the specialist.

"People who haven't experienced a fire, theft or other loss this tax year, may be unaware of how this rule change could affect them," Granovsky says.

It would have the greatest impact on those consumers who raised their insurance deductibles over the past several years, thinking they could write off any uninsured losses on their income taxes, she adds.

Some of these consumers may wish to decrease their deductibles again as a shield against losses that would not be offset by a tax deduction.

Families will need to choose between increasing insurance—and premiums—to compensate for the loss of tax advantages, or risking a greater casualty or theft loss with a high deductible, says the home economist.

In making this decision, consumers should remember that the purpose of insurance is to cover those risks and hazards that we would not be able to cover ourselves, says Granovsky.
