Waller S. Poage, a representative of Gondeck-Poage Partnership Architects of San Antonio, addressed Deaf Smith County Commissioners Monday about drawings for the proposed \$1.55 million work to the the county jail. Commis-

sioners decided to approve the plans and authorized the architectural firm to proceed with the project's construction-documents

For proposed jail work

Architectural drawings accepted

Architectural plans were accepted Monday by the Deaf Smith County Commission d \$1.55 million work at the county jail.

David Ruland, Deaf Smith county clerk, said the commissioners also authorized the San Antonio architectural firm to finalize all drawings and meet with its construction people to establish specifications for the project.

Waller S. Poage, representative for Gondeck-Poage Partnership Architects, told county commissioners advertisement for bids would be next spring. Construction, which will take about 18 months, could begin as early as May, he reportedly said.

Poage, representing his firm along with former sheriff Travis McPherson, said the remodeling and additions would be completed in stages. Therefore, barring "an unusually high jail population," no inmates would have to be transfered to other facilities during the work.

Approval of the construction-documents phase, commissioners pointed out, is contigent upon

the sale of certificates of obligation in the county. On Oct. 10, commissioners agreed to seek a \$1.5 million, seven-year loan from Kidder, Peabody & Company Inc. to fund the jail work. The loan carries an 8.25 percent interest rate. Bob Davis, a representative of the financing firm, said the average annual payment for the loan would be around \$290,000.

County commissioners decided to collect the needed funds through issuing certificates of obligation, which Ruland explained are no different from issuing bonds expect that the latter method requires an election. Davis claimed a levied tax rate of 8.22 cents, with projected collections of 98 percent, would yield the county just under \$300,000 annually.

More than once, the county fathers asked Gondeck-Poage to attempt cutting the project's cost by eliminating some proposed jail changes. On Monday, however, the commission was told a few additions have been made to the plan. The Texas Jail Standard Commission ordered the alterations, finding the rest of the proposal to be acceptable.

Last month, Jail Administrator Charles Satter-

field said the revamped jail would not contain any luxuries, but would rather offer inmates the minimum re-

In 11 amendments' fate

Houston large factor

AUSTIN (AP) - Texans go to the polls today to decide on a few more patches for the state Constitution, but Houston voters might make the decisions for the entire state.

The 11 proposed amendments - including garnishment of paychecks to guarantee child support payments and a plan to keep the Legislature in operation after enemy attack - does not seem fascinating enough to attract many of the 6.5 million registered voters.

A turnout of about 11 percent was predicted by the Secretary of State's office. About half the votes are expected to come from Houston, where there's a mayor's race on the ballot.

Texas' 107-year-old constitution already has 253 amendments. Another 144 proposed amendments have been defeated over the years.

University of Texas Law School Professor Joe Witherspoon said most state constitutions are patchworks of many amendments. Most state constitutions were drawn to "provide rather extensive limitations upon the exercise of government power," he said.

The constitutional amendment elections - if not coupled with a good race featuring political candidates - traditionally have drawn poor turnouts.

Here are the proposals at stake today:

Proposition No. One -Allows counties with less than 30,000 population to have as fewer than the four justices of the peace now required.

No. Two - Replaces the \$10,000 limit on urban homestead exemptions with a one-acre limit.

No. Three - Authorizes the Legislature to allow commodity boards to collect product assessments to help promote the commodity.

No. Four - Requires lawmakers to set up a system to keep the Legislature in operation in case of enemy attack; allows the governor to convene the Legislature outside of Austin in case of attack.

No. Five - Permits the Legislature to take money from the Available School Fund (which is the interest Associate Dean T.J. Gibson earned on the Permanent

Permits break '82 figures

Building permit figures for October have been released. showing 14 were issued in Hereford for \$1,578,984.

As a result, more permits for more money have already been issued in 1983 than were last year. Since January, \$1,578,984 has been represented by 113 permits.

In October of 1982, according to city official Becky Reinart, 13 permits were approved for \$140,650. That brought the January-October figures up to 97 permits and \$983,340, as 1982 ended with 109 and \$1,396,340.

Atkinson first lawyer to advertise

On Feb. 22, 1976, attorneys John R. Bates and Van O'Steen placed an ad in the Arizona Republic advertising their Phoenix Legal Clinic.

They were promptly disciplined by the Arizona Bar for allegedly "tarnishing the dignified public image of the profession" by advertising uncontested divorces. changes of name, adoptions and other basic legal services at prices geared to the middle-income client.

The pair took the case to the U.S. Supreme Court, and "Bates versus State Bar of Arizona" was decided in their favor on June 27, 1977. The court's lengthy decision, which indicated that legal

advertising is not in violation

also included several points in favor of such a practice. The decision was followed

almost immediately by an onslaught on legal advertising through various forms of the media. The ads were especially prevelant in larger cities, where attorneys were apparently more aware of the competition. In Hereford, however, members of the profession seemed satisfied with traditional methods of promoting their practices by word-of-mouth and telephone book listings.

Local attorney Schalan Atkinson recently broke the ice by placing a 3-columnby-4 inch ad in Sunday's Brand, advising potential clients of her availability to discuss workers compensa-

> domestic relations cases, because I do a lot of that," Atkinson said. "I want people to know that I'm available, so they won't go to Amarillo. Not a lot of attorneys in the area do this type of litigation." An Amarillo native and graduate of Texas Tech

University, Atkinson came to Hereford shortly after passing the bar in May, 1976. An assistant district attorney for two and a half years, she has been in private practice since 1979. As the first woman to practice law in Hereford, she said she as "well received." Atkinson said she is not

always impressed with the legal advertising she sees in larger towns and was careful about the wording and appearance of her ad.

The State Bar of Texas, which has always issued strict guidelines concerning legal advertising, revised its rule book shortly after the

decision, said advertising may well benefit the administration of justice. "The middle 70 percent of our population is not being reached or served adequately by the legal profession," the court said. "The public needs information concerning attorneys, their work and their fees. It would be peculiar to deny the consumer this infor-

Second of two-part series Foster parenting requires much

Staff Writer Janice Matthews sometimes gets a lump in her throat when she thinks of one particular foster child

that she and her husband Eddie had in their home. "It's difficult to have to see a foster child go back to the same bad environment with the same problems," Mrs. Matthews said. "But that's all part of the respon-

sibilities of the foster parent. You adjust." Eddie and Janice Matthews helped form the Golden Spread Foster Parents Association, which provides information to foster parents and also helps them cope with the problems associated with having emotionally and-or physically abused foster children.

The group serves to help provide information to the prospective foster parents. "It's a complicated process becoming a foster parent, and we learn more each day," Mrs. Matthews said. "The very first thing that parents must do is to examine their own feelings about sharing their lives with a foster child. It's not an easy task, but it is satisfying."

"In our case, my husband and I always knew in the back of our minds that we wanted to help other children. We contacted a friend of ours that serves on the welfare board in Parmer County to tell him that we

wanted to be foster parents. Normally, interested persons should contact the Department of Human

"We were given an application to fill out and then turned it in to the foster home developer," Mrs. Matthews, explained. "We were interviewed several times by a caseworker, who presented the straight facts about foster children. It wasn't always a pretty picture. Then more forms were filled out an the final application papers were sent before the board in Austin where it was approved and we became certified."

There are several requirements that must be met before becoming foster parents. They may be married or single, may have other children, must be healthy enough to care for children, must be able to meet their own financial needs and may work outside the home if there is suitable care for the child, such as after school care for a school-aged kid.

Foster parents must be willing to work hard and be part of a team with the Department of Human Resources and others in the community to meet the foster child's special needs.

Woman changes plea in baby case

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) - A 32-year-old woman pleaded guilty, then changed her plea to innocent - at a lawyer's urging - in the kidnapping of Cherie Ann Kennedy, a Fort Worth baby who was reunited with her parents last weekend.

The guilty plea by Linda Ashmore Gomez on Monday stunned public defender Jack Cook, who had not yet been appointed to defend her.

"I don't think she ought to plead to anything. ... She didn't have a lawyer," Cook protested to State District Judge Gordon Gray during her arraignment.

The judge, who told Cook that she could change her plea any time, allowed Mrs. Gomez to change her guilty plea following the appointment of Cook and Don Gandy, both of Fort Worth, as her lawyers.

"I advised her to change her plea. She was confused and upset," Cook said.

At the request of Gandy and Cook, Gray appointed a psychologist to examine the defendant.

Study show aliens pay own way

AUSTIN (AP) - A University of Texas study shows that illegal aliens contribute more revenue to the state than Texas provides in public services to them.

However, the report prepared by UT's LBJ School of Public Affairs says urban areas lose money when the public services provided illegal aliens are compared to revenues from those persons.

The "Use of Public Services by Undocumented Aliens in Texas" report was prepared for the Governor's Budget and Planning Office.

Co-directors of the project were Dr. Sidney Weintraub of the LBJ School and Dr. Gilberto Cardenas of the sociology department. Twenty graduate students participated in the study.

The report, released Monday, found that education is the most costly service for illegal aliens at both the state and local levels and that most illegal aliens pay for their

Trip stimulates support for Reagan

WASHINGTON (AP) - A just-completed congressional trip to Grenada has brought President Reagan fresh support for his decision two weeks ago to invade the Caribbean island.

The 14-member bipartisan delegation returned from the four-day trip Monday night, with most of the members supporting the invasion as necessary to protect American

The group's chairman, Rep. Thomas S. Foley, D-Wash., agreed that the 1,000 Americans on the island faced an "extremely dangerous" situation following a Marxist military coup that led to the killing of Grenada's leftist Prime Minister Maurice Bishop on Oct. 19.

But Foley refused "to put a bottom line" on his conclusion as to whether the invasion was justified until he reports to House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr., D-Mass., who appointed the fact-finding delegation after the Oct. 25

Genetic pattern found for disease

NEW YORK (AP) - Researchers believe they have identified a genetic pattern linked to Huntington's disease that would make it possible for the first time to diagnose the disorder early and tell parents whether they could pass it on to their children.

Until now people who might have the always fatal illness have not been able to find out whether it is silently ticking inside them until symptoms appear, usually between the ages of 35 and 45.

Their offspring have a 50 percent chance of having the disease, and they have had to face agonizing decisions over whether to have children themselves and possibly pass the disease along.

The discovery, to be reported in the Nov. 17 issue of Nature magazine, should allow doctors to identify victims by analyzing the genetic material in, for example, a small sample of blood

Those found to be free of the disease can then have children with complete assurance that their children will

Marines abandon outpost

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) - U.S. Marines today abandoned an outpost caught in crossfire on Beirut's outskirts, while Syrian-backed guerrillas 50 miles to the north closed in on Yasser Arafat and his besieged PLO fighters.

About 150 to 200 Marines in the multinational peacekeeping force were pulled out of their position at the northeast corner of the U.S. base at Beirut airport and moved to ships offshore, Marine spokesman Robert Jor-

The post, at Lebanese Scientific University, was one of the positions caught in a barrage of artillery, rockets, mortar and machine-gun fire between Lebanese army troops and Shiite Moslem and Druse militiamen Monday night. One Marine was slightly wounded in the crossfire, Jordan said.

The fighting near the airport forced authorities to close the facility for the first time since a truce was called six weeks ago in the war among Lebanese religious factions.

Officials agree: no mass grave

ST. GEORGE's, Grenada (AP) - Cuba is asking the United Nations to help prevent the expulsion of its entire embassy staff in Grenada, and U.S. officials say they will investigate "rumors" of a mass grave mistakenly reported by the State Department.


The State Department had said Monday it was "well established" that a mass grave had been located, possibly holding the bodies of Prime Minister Maurice Bishop and more than 100 other victims of the coup that prompted the U.S.-led invasion of Grenada.

But Brian Carlson, a State Department press officer in Washington, later said the department "is deferring to U.S. representatives on Grenada, who indicated they are checking out local rumors of possible gravesites."

"At this point, neither they, nor we, can confirm the ex-

istence of any such sites," Carlson told reporters.

Guy Farmer, chief spokesman for the State Department mission in Grenada, blamed the contradictory reports on poor communications between officials in Washington and

Israel eyes moving

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) -Israeli officials are warily watching Syria's emergency mobilization of reserve forces but insist Israel is not planning to attack Syrian troops or pull its own forces out of Lebanon.

The Syrian mobilization of 100,000 reservists was announced Monday in conjunction with a military alert.

Israel Television quoted military sources as saying the Syrians were responding in part to a mobilization drill for Israeli reserves, which the Israeli Military Command said was to test the strength of its call-up system for wartime.

The Israeli government

tried to reassure Syria by announcing on state radio and television that there were no plans to mount an attack. Officials indicated a similar message was being conveyed to Syria through private

channels.

In Damascus, the Syrian capital, a spokesman for President Hafez Assad said the government had put its 220,000-man army on alert and called up a 100,000-man reserve force.

Israeli television quoted officials as saying the Syrian moves reflected concern in Damascus over the dispatch of 30 U.S. warships to the Lebanese coast and its fear of possible joint Israeli-American military reaction to recent series of truck bombings that killed 230 U.S. servicemen, 58 French paratroopers and 28 Israeli

soldiers and security officers. Israel said last week it was willing to coordinate military policy and operations with

the United States in Lebanon. The State Department in Washington urged Syria to exercise "restraint and prudence." A spokesman, who declined to be identified, tried to discourage speculation that a second aircraft carrier battle group sent to the eastern Mediterranean was part of a buildup to strike

Syrian forces. U.S. military sources said the carrier John F. Kennedy, which led the battle group, is expected to sail through the Suez Canal

FOSTER

Foster parents must keep in mind that foster care is temporary and directed toward making the best possible permanent arrangement for the child. They must also be willing to get to know and understand the individual child and deal with the kid's situation and needs with patience, determination, skill and love.

"The foster children we have had tend to talk about their problems very openly and honestly," Matthews said. "Sometimes, it is tough to not show your personal feelings to the child."

"When we had the sexuallyabused girl in our home, we couldn't gain her trust," Mrs. Matthews explained. "She was ordered to visit her mother and stepfather, but she didn't want to go. Our hands were tied."

There are other minimum standards for foster family homes that must be met before becoming certified. A home study is done with the entire prospective foster family, discussing the foster care process, the family's willingness for a child and "the types and ages of children that the family might best be able to care for.

For a home to be certified, each family member must have a negative TB test, the house must pass fire and sanitation inspections and references must be obtained. To remain certified, the home must be recertified every two years, at which time the foster home workers visits and discusses several areas.

Foster parents are also required to have 15 hours of training each year. This is done through reading books and articles on child care, attending workshop sand training sessions on child care and any other activity which increases the foster parents' knowledge of children in any

area of their lives. Foster parents also work closely with case workers when needed. They focus on the foster child and work as a team with the foster parents. They visit the foster family and share information with the foster parents, such as legal information about the child and the status of the child's return home.

The Matthews, who reside in the Easter community, have three biological children, including 3-year-old Jeremy, 7-year-old Carrie and 9-year-old Candy.

"We have never had a problem with our own children accepting a foster child into our home," Mr. Matthews explained. "In fact, if possible as far as the time element is concerned, we try to sit our children down and explain to them what problems this foster child has so that they will understand what's going on. When that child arrives, our children are eager to help them adjust.

"Once we were planning on having a boy arrive and then the plans were changed at the last minute. Our son was really disappointed that he didn't

have a playmate." "Although our chi don't present a problem, sometimes it's difficult when the foster children need clothing or need medical attention," Mrs. Matthews said. "Most of the children arrive with little or no clothes or perhaps they just have one shoe. That's when contacting another foster parent really

"If the child needs medical attention Eddie and I make his appointment and take him for medical treatment. The actual expense is taken care of by the state or insurance,"

Mrs. Matthews said. "In some cases, the caseworker can make arrangments for the child to see a doctor, but we would rather do it ourselves so that the child will feel more a part of our

family.' "Also, we have found that we would rather not work with the biological parents,"

Mrs. Matthews continued. "This is just our personal preference. We find it easier to make visitation arrangements with the case worker, such as taking the child to the courthouse, and then picking him up at a

designated time." The case worker also gives a 24-hour notice before packing up the child, but we are available for emergency arrivals," she added. "Once we were brought a baby at 1 a.m. and picked it up the next day at noon."

Mr. Matthews is manager of Easter Grain Inc., secretary of Easter Lions Club and has served as president of the Golden Spread

County Extension Agent In Texas, 4-H volunteer leaders "link" young people with programs - and efforts with success. 4-H leaders are asked to do strong things - to volunteer and to lead youth in

Before joining 4-H programs, volunteer leaders must pass two tests: they should like young people and they must be genuinely interested in them.

In Texas today, some 22,000 4-H volunteer leaders have passed those tests. Still, Texas 4-H programs need more volunteer leaders. Choices of programs to lead are limitless, as are leader styles, schedules and situations.

Leaders tailor their own programs to a great extent. Today's 4-H clubs come in every size and arrangement - with needs to fit any leader's talents, time and

Some larger clubs require several leaders and tasks are divided according to leader preferences. Other 4-H clubs have special-interest leaders, while some clubs need resource people who can share expertise in certain subjects.

Generally, leaders start off choosing one of three types of jobs: organization, project work or activity work.

ORGANIZATIONAL LEADER -- This leader works with other leaders to coordinate a club's program, enroll members, assist in the overall club program and

counsel officers in their jobs. PROJECT LEADER - This leader works in a project area, guiding members in a project, such as foods, pet care, woodworking or some 50 other 4-H projects. Project

leaders help members improve their skills and increase their knowledge and interests. ACTIVITY LEADER --This leader joins club members in tours, safety talks, games, demonstrations and other activities dictated by members' interests. Also

an activity leader can serve as a liaison person between the cub and the community on safety campaigns, health programs, special-events window display, fair exhibits

Resource persons are also wanted - and needed. For people who feel their special talents are centered in one area, serving as a resource person can make a great impact in a special way.

and other community pro-

Resource persons can share a special interest or a hobby with one club or many clubs in their county, or they can work on special events such as parades or

community-service projects. Anyone interested in serving as a 4-H volunteer leader should contact the county Extension office.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socio-economic levels, race, color, sex, religion or national origin.



Top 4 same in college poll

Nebraska, Texas, Auburn and Georgia held on to the top four spots in the Associated Press college football poll today, while Illinois moved ahead of Miami into fifth place and traditional powers Oklahoma and Notre Dame fell out of the Top Twenty and were replaced by Clemson and Pitt.

Nebraska, which routed Iowa State 72-29, received 58 of 60 first-place votes and 1,198 of a possible 1,200 points from a nationwide panel of sports writers and sportscasters. Texas, a 9-3 winner over Houston, received the other two first-place ballots and 1,140 points.

Last week, with 59 voters participating, Nebraska led Texas 57-2 in first-place votes amd 1,178-1,123 in points.

Auburn defeated Maryland 35-23 and remained in third place with 1,063 points — the losers dropped from seventh to 11th — and Georgia's 10-9 squeaker over Florida kept the Bulldogs fourth with 999 points, while pushing Florida from ninth to 14th. Auburn visits Georgia on Saturday.

However, Illinois' 50-23 victory over Minnesota boosted the Illini from sixth to fifth with 975 points, while Miami's 12-7 triumph over East Carolina on a touchdown with 1:04 remaining dropped the Hurricanes from fifth to sixth with 951 points.



"It wasn't pretty," Detroit Coach Monte Clark said. "In fact, it was kind of ugly. But, it was a win and got us back to the .500 mark.


McNorton's interceptions both came in the fourth quarter as the Giants tried in vain to post their first victory in six games.

Attempts to photograph the wreckage with the television camera Sunday were frustrated by fouled cables.

Kott said the company was still attempting through the U.S. State Department to get permission to search the nearby Vietnamese coastal area. Viet Nam has refused to permit search vessels into its territorial waters.

Kott said earlier that if any of the crewmen got off the Java Sea in life boats, they would most likely have been carried by wind and current toward the Vietnam coast.





November 1963 that plunged most of America and much of the world into stunned despair.

The Russian-born Marina was 22 years old and staying at the suburban home of a friend when President John F. Kennedy was shot to death in Dallas. She had been married to Lee Harvey Oswald less than three years when he, in turn, was gunned down by Dallas nightclub owner Jack Ruby.

"It was horrible," she said, shuddering.

She considered returning to her homeland, then realized she could not face either friends or family or the uncertain prospect of prosecution or persecution.

"I left Russia of my own free will," she said. "I cut the ties, and there was no way back. The only person that I solely depended on, and that I crossed the ocean for, was

Lee ... and then he was gone." She once agreed with the Warren Commission that Oswald, acting alone and on his own, fired three murderous shots into the presidential motorcade as it passed the Texas School Book Depository.

She now has doubts.

"It's more confusing now than it was before," she said. "Twenty years ago, I took everything as the truth ... It was easy for me to pronounce Lee guilty because all the facts were against him."

Since then, Marina said, historical researchers and congressional investigators have raised new and disturbing questions and some now contend evidence was destroyed or distorted.

"So many things have been destroyed," she said. "Why? Maybe the answer is simple. but nobody bothered to give it

"I would like for Lee to be innocent, but I honestly don't know whether the man is innocent or guilty. We're all just guessing."

At age 42, Marina Porter is tiny, trim and attractive, with light brown hair and blue-green eyes that sparkle when she laughs, which is often and easy.

She blends her heavy Russian accent with broken English and mixed metaphors and says she's grown older and not much wiser but has changed considerably in the last two decades.

"I cannot be 22 forever," she said.

Having reluctantly agreed to an interview, she arrived one recent evening at a northside restaurant with a longtime friend whose Austrian accent is at least as heavy as Marina's.

Guilt gone but doubts persist after 20 years

"We should have brought an interpreter," quipped Dallas attorney Frank Jackson, who is representing Marina's daughters in a libel suit against the National Enquirer.

"Sometimes people ask me how many languages I speak," she said. "I say none ... In Texas, you can not learn much English."

Less than two years after the assassination, Marina met and married Kenneth Porter, a carpenter, and they now live with their son Mark. 17, in a country home north of Dallas near Rockwall.

Her daughters by Oswald, June, 22, and Rachel, 20, attend the University of Texas at Austin where the elder is an honor student and journalism major and the younger is studying fashion merchandising.

Speaking of Rachel. Marina said with a laugh:

"Today she wants something, tomorrow she wants something else...I wouldn't be surprised if two weeks from now she says she wants to be a doctor or a nurse or a dirt sweeper."

Jackson said the suit against the National Enquirer, set for trial in January in federal court in Dallas, is over a July 1982 story about June and Rachel Oswald Porter.

'The story holds them out as being socially ostracized and depicts them as social outcasts when indeed they were not," Jackson said. "They were not ostracized as children by their friends, their peers. They led a very normal childhood."

A lawyer for the National Enquirer, Irving Younger, said the publication would have no comment on the suit because the litigation is pen-

Friends say Marina has great rapport with her daughters and portray her as a woman of strength, sensitivity and intelligence.

Said Jackson, who is her friend as well as her attorney:

"I think she has created a normal atmosphere by accepting the things that happened and not overemphasizing them. She has struck a beautiful balance in her life and in the lives of her family. "She's incisive and sen-

sitive and really just a helluva woman." Marina does not fully

"People always say, 'Oh,

you are so strong,' and I'm not. I'm a very weak person. I bruise very easily, I really do. I'm a survivor, a stubborn 'People say I'm strong and

that I've made it. Well, I would never have made it without Kenneth. When you're alone and all the chips and all the bridges fell down, who is there to pick you up?

"Many times he would disagree with what I was doing, and he's not the wishywashy type to go along with it. But he gave me room to grow and do it on my own. He's a very secure man, and he was always there to pick up the pieces."

However, she also says, "I don't always go with the flow; I swim against it. I'm not passive. When I was younger, I was idealistic. I'm not anymore."

She can also admit to being moody, forgetful, naive, humble, vain, a bad listener, a compulsive talker, a chain smoker and probably not the best mother, wife or neighbor.

"I'm cynical now, but I'm caring," she said. "I like myself even though I do put myself down."

When pressed, she acknowledges she is trusting, adaptable, sensitive, quick to forgive and forget and by no means a plain Jane.

"I'm multicolored," she said with a smile. "It depends ... I'm sunny on a sunny day and blue on a windy day. My husband never knows what's coming, and maybe that's what keeps him around." Most importantly, she said,

she is content, which has not always been the case. "There's no need to run for the rainbow or to try to catch the rainbow because it's not

there, for anyone," she said. "When I came to this country I was very young, and everything seemed rosy across the ocean. I came with nothing but a peaceful feeling

toward this country ... "Then the mess of '63 happened ... I thought I was an adult, but I wasn't. I was really a naive ... little girl, a kid with two kids in practically the middle of an international

scandal." She said she felt disgraced and somehow guilty and spent years purging the feelings of guilt and grief.

"When you start analyzing yourself it can drive you up the wall," she said. "It was horrible. So I stopped that and started living normally, and it's much better

"I don't have any desire to waste the rest of my life trying to prove something that cannot be proven."

Marina did not recall, nor did she deny, once showing a reporter a magazine article in which the author theorized that her sexual rejection of Oswald was the "final straw" that snapped his mind and drove him to kill.

"I think he's right," she said at the time, two or three years after the assassination.

"I had been guilt-ridden so long," she explained this evening, "that I tried to find an answer, that maybe I triggered something... "Some psychiatrists

believe that if a man is (sexually) rejected, or if he is without a woman, he is more prone to commit a crime because he is under stress. ey're more aggressiv

and there has to be an exit for the energy somewhere. But psychiatrists have one opinion today and a different one tomorrow.

She said that after much reflection, she concluded she was not part of what drove Oswald to kill, if indeed he did

"I'm not so certain anymore," she said. "But I'm not an expert on anything and it's natural for me to try to clear his name or want for him to be unguilty."

She said Oswald, while hardly a model husband, "wanted children, and I think he was a loving father."

However, she said it was "humiliating" living in this country and "depending on other people for hand-medowns and charity. It was killing your pride and making you half a person."

"She is under my skin," Marina said of Ms. Ullmann. 'She would understand...

"I learned a new word from her: longing. That's the feeling, that unsatisfied something that's always there ... longing. It's not a dream, it's just a longing for something, for something that was good and beautiful. It's nice memories."

Dern, she said, was an actor "that I couldn't stand. He always played bad characters, and every time he was on I would leave the

room. I just couldn't stomach

She said the memory of her ex-husband would fade away and she could not always "visualize his face" but that Dern somehow reminded her of Oswald.

"There was something there, something that was unclean about him," she said. "I'm not talking about Lee per se. But the last few days, in the jail, and all his dramatic experiences make him dirty and that's what Dern represented."

Marina said she later saw Dern in a non-acting television appearance and found him to be a "gentleman and a compassionate man ... and I

was shocked to see the person was not mean." She is not an avid moviegoer but loves to read.

particularly Sidney Sheldon novels. She watches television and adores ABC newscaster Ted Koppel, who she thinks is "brilliant, elegant, bright and honest" and the "Walter Cronkite of the younger generation."

Marina has tended to ignore most of the assassination books but was angered by one author who accused her of taking a Russian lover while married to Oswald.

She said she did write to a former suitor, "but he was my boyfriend and never my lover. Too bad, but he never

Marina likewise was offended with another writer who she said described her as someone who "came across the ocean and disgraced America " Said she:

"I'm no disgrace to America, believe me. I love this country ... and if I had only known ahead of time ... I tried everything to earn my place under the sun in America. I bent backwards to please the American government and the American peo-

She said she cooperated fully with government investigators, whom she feels exploited her knowledge of Russia and insisted she answer questions unrelated to the assassination.

"I felt like a traitor ... but I felt obligated to empty my soul to the American people ... so that I would earn my place and be accepted."

She said she now knows she can never return.

"I don't miss Russia per se, but I miss Leningrad as the town where I grew up. I cried when I was leaving. You get so attached with all your soul to the city that you never forget, you never throw it out of your heart, ever."

totally Though 'Americanized,' Marina said she does get homesick, not for the Soviet system but for her hometown.

"Once in a while," she said wistfully, "the wind will blow, and there's a certain smell in the air, and your heart will just turn over, and you don't have to close your eyes, because just for that instant, for that moment. you're home ... when the birches were in bloom or when the snow was melting, and it's so easy to think, gosh, here is the same skies all over the world, and you think you're home.

"And that's only for an ins-

Diet for hernia

DEAR DR. LAMB - My wife's doctor told her she has a hiatal hernia. We know that there are certain foods which should not be eaten but the doctor was not very specific. We do know that spicy

foods will cause sharp pain in the upper chest area. Can you give us more information on what she can or can-DEAR READER - There

are three main objectives in

choosing a diet for a hiatal hernia. First you want to avoid causing the stomach to produce more acid. When the hernia slides through the diaphragm there is often leakage of material from the stomach backward into the lower esophagus. The stomach's acid contents can cause burning and pain in the lower chest and pit of the stomach. This means that coffee, tea, colas and alcohol should be avoided Antacids are often given

to neutralize the stomach acid to help prevent acid irritation of the lower

The second goal is to limit the volume you put in the stomach. A full stomach is more likely to leak backward when you lie down. The rule here is to eat a small meal and to wait a couple of hours after eating before lying down so the stomach can empty.

The third goal, and one often overlooked, is to try to prevent gaseous distention. When a lot of gas accumulates in the abdomen, the pressure in the abdominal cavity helps to force a portion of the stomach through the enlarged hole in the diaphragm.
