## Taxi service to start

Taxi cab service will be available to Hereford residents in December, but they may have to wait a while for their electric bills to be lowered.

While approving the final reading of the Southwestern Public Service franchise, city fathers Monday night suspended a 2.8 percent rate reduction that will be sought by the electric utility company.

Commissioners explained that although a reduction in rates would normally be acceptable, they want to comply with the regional steering committee's request for a 90-day suspension on accepting the rate change.

"The committee needs time to review the request and determine if the decrease should be more than 2.8 percent and make certain that the decrease would not lower rates for commercial customers while raising residential rates," Mayor Wes Fisher said.

James and Virginia Parker met unanimous approval from the commission in their request to open a taxi service in Hereford. Initially, the couple plan to operate one cab out of their home and to add to the service as demand increases.

With plans to begin operation in December, the couple have named their business City Cab. Commissioner Emory Brownlow commented that he believes this will be a positive service to the community as it has been a number of years since Hereford offered taxi service.

Commissioners accepted a \$41,509 bid from Fuller & Sons Construction, of Amarillo, for installing a 24-inch storm sewer on U.S. Highway 385, south of the Fifteenth Street area, and improving drainage on Centre Street. City Manager Darwin McGill requested permission to add an additional \$2,760 to the contract to provide better drainage near the Senior Citizens Center located on Ranger. The request was approved.

Commissioners also agreed to pay \$1,030 to renew membership dues to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

## PCBAN to open offices

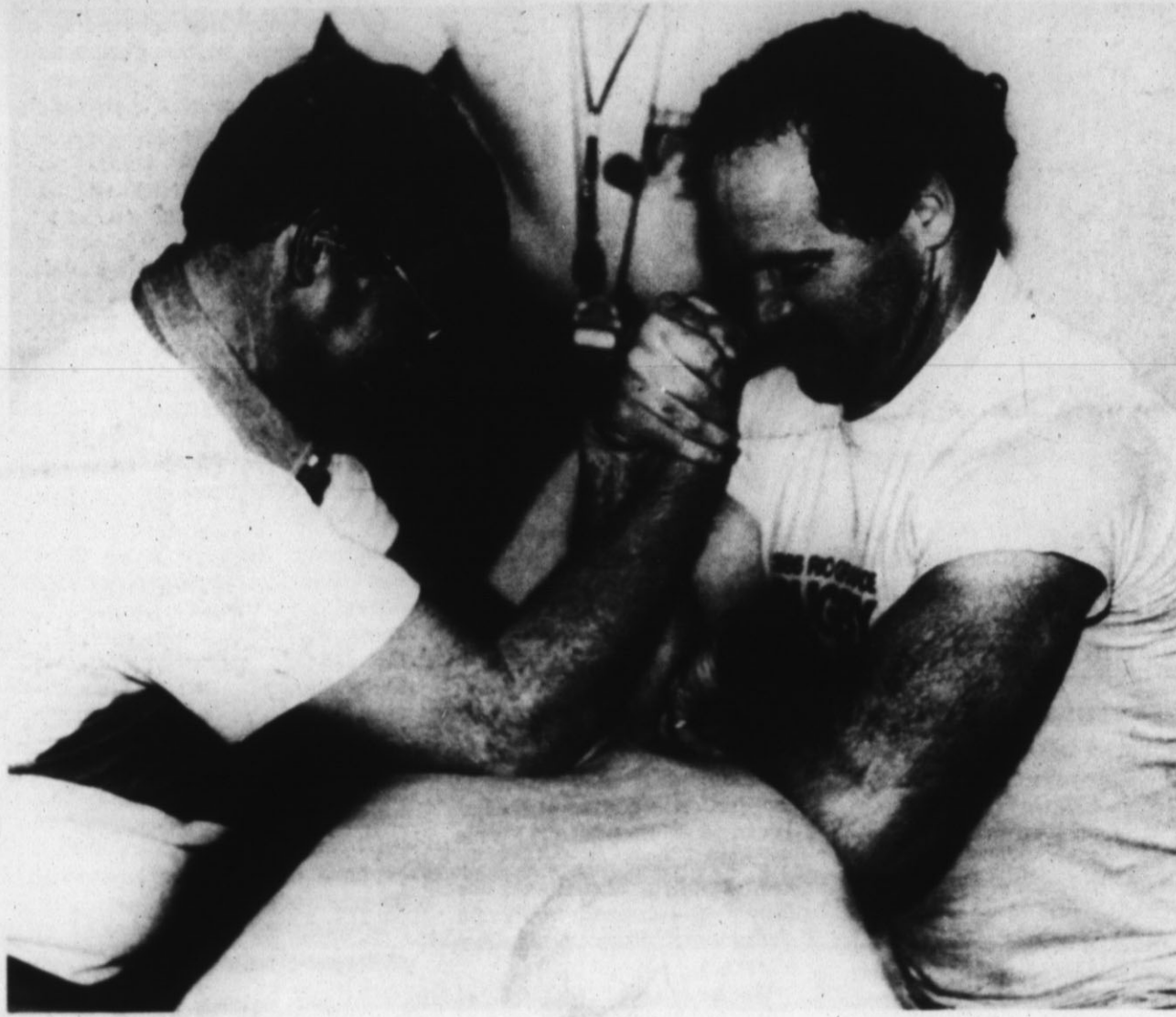
The Panhandle Citizens for a Better Amarillo Newspaper (PCBAN) will formally open its headquarters during a press conference Wednesday at 10 a.m., it was announced today by chairman Paul Engler.

PCBAN, a broad-based citizen's coalition, was formed to protest "biased reporting" in the *Amarillo Globe-News*, according to Engler. Wednesday's news conference is scheduled at the Fisk Building, 8th and Polk Streets, in Suite 640.

The citizen's group was formed after Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce protested a series of articles about Hereford in the *Globe-News* and sent letters to Amarillo businesses asking them to support the protest movement.

Engler said the goal of PCBAN is a two-prong strategy "designed to force the newspaper's publisher and

## Palestine picking up

PALESTINE, Texas (AP) — Whining chainsaws and the deep diesel drone of heavy machinery resounded throughout a devastated area of Palestine as crews cleared roads and streets of fallen trees and debris.

"The good Lord gave me this place, and I'm going to keep it," Teddy O'Neal said Monday as he and other residents surveyed the damage to their homes and studied how to rebuild.

Sunday's tornado ripped away half the roof of O'Neal's house and shifted the brick structure on its foundation, meaning any rebuilding effort would have to be from the ground up, he said.

"We're all just thankful to God that none of us were hurt," O'Neal said.

Under blue skies, as the weather cleared following two days of surprise November tornadoes to Central, East and Southeast Texas, Palestine residents tacked plastic and plywood over gaping holes in their homes.

One person in Palestine died in the tornado and police estimated 59 were injured, with about 32 of those seeking treatment at the local hospital, officials said. More than a dozen tornadoes hit Texas Sunday and Monday, killing 10 people.

"We're covered (by insurance) and everything. It'll just be awhile

before they get somebody out here to check it," said Marilyn Groves as she stood with her husband, Tommy, outside their damaged home.

Like nearly everyone else in the neighborhoods that bore the brunt of the tornado Sunday, the Groves rode out the storm crouched in an interior room of their house.

"There shouldn't be any reason why we can't rebuild," Groves said.

The two families said their homes were uninhabitable. But most other residents apparently planned to stay in their damaged homes.

"We stayed in the living room last night," said Lynn Gibson, who with

## Government plans cut in free commodities

NEW YORK (AP) — The free distribution of cheese, milk and rice will be cut in half during the next year as the government's surplus stock of those items begins to dwindle, a newspaper reported today.

Government programs to reduce the surplus, started two years ago, have succeeded, according to Reagan administration officials quoted by The New York Times.

Between 15 million and 18 million people have been getting some free food each month under the programs, according to the Agriculture Department.

Cutbacks are necessary because the inventory has been drastically reduced, officials at the department's Food and Nutrition

Service told the Times.

Under the Food Security Act of 1985, the government started paying 14,000 dairy farmers to stop milk production by killing or exporting cows, calves and heifers. Also the price supports paid to dairy farmers have been reduced.

"The objective of the 1985 law was to achieve a better balance between supply and demand, and it seems to be accomplishing that purpose," said Robert H. Sindt, an assistant deputy administrator of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Officials at the agencies that helped distribute the food said it will be sorely missed.

"At a time when there is hunger in

America, we are very concerned about the loss of commodities to supplement the diet of people who need them," said Robert J. Fersh, executive director of the Food Research and Action Center, a non-profit group that seeks to fight hunger and nutrition.

A Food and Nutrition Service announcement in the Federal Register said the amount of cheese, nonfat dry milk, rice and honey available for distribution in fiscal 1988 will be half that in 1987.

Agriculture Department officials estimated the amount available would be 210 million pounds of cheese, 48 million pounds of dry milk, 90 million pounds of rice and 48 million pounds of honey.

## Police look for robber

A knife-wielding robber took an undetermined amount of cash in an armed robbery early Monday at the Allsup's Convenience Store at 529 Ave. H in Hereford.

The man, a Hispanic male 18 to 20 years old and wearing a red mask, walked into the store and went behind the counter. He then showed the attendant a knife and demanded all of the cash in the store's cash registers, then fled on foot.

A sketchy description offered by the clerk said the man is 5'6" tall, weighs 110 to 120 pounds, has short hair, big ears, and a small moustache.

Other offenses include a domestic dispute in the 100 block of S. Douglas; a lawnmower stolen from a trailer in an alley between Fir and Elm; two suspects arrested in a tire slashing; prowlers in the 200 block of Star; obscene words spray-painted on a car in the 100 block of Ave. H; a pickup burglarized in the 300 block of Elm, with a fire department badge and three checkbooks taken; Trespassing at a local church;

glass broken out of a window in the 300 block of Ave. K; an assault in the 200 block of Ave. I; burglary of a motor vehicle, with an RCA two-way radio and antenna taken; a car burglarized in the 700 block of Blevins; a possible overdose in the 900 block of Brevard;

Assault charges were filed against a woman, 21, for an incident at Blue Water Gardens; a window broken out of a business on East U.S. 60; a complaint was filed against a driver for cutting across a business parking lot to avoid a stop sign; and gunshots reported in the 100 block of Liveoak.

Arrests included a man, 19, for second offense of no liability insurance; a man, 42, arrested at Deaf Smith General Hospital for being drunk in public; a man, 74, for DWI in the area of Apache and Fifteenth; and a man, 19, for fleeing from a peace officer, DWI, giving false identification to a peace officer, and a DWI warrant.

Police have investigated two minor accidents and issued 33 citations since Saturday.

## Plant ponders Pampa future

PAMPA, Texas (AP) — Company officials today continued the painstaking process of determining the cause of explosions that rocked a chemical plant, killing three workers and injuring 35.

Damage assessors were checked the soundness of buildings still standing at the 775-acre Hoechst Celanese Corp. chemical plant after two strong blasts rocked the plant Saturday, plant spokesman Herbert Reed said.

Plastic sheeting was wrapped around computer terminals and files left exposed after roofs were torn off, Reed said.

Plant manager Ron Guard said the disaster was the worst he'd seen at a chemical plant.

"I'd hate to see one any worse," he said, "because of the damage it did to the heart of the plant and the damage it did to the people."

Three people remained hospitalized today with serious injuries.

The largest single employer in this Panhandle town of 23,000, Celanese is vital to the community but the plant's future is uncertain.

Company officials evaded questions about whether the 35-year-old plant would reopen and when.

"I think to get into speculation on that point is far down the road from where we are now," said Guard, who later added he would like to see the facility return to normal operation.

The company called a meeting of its approximately 400 workers Sunday night to provide details and answer questions about the explosions.

Following the one-hour, ten-minute closed gathering, most

Celanese employees, wearing navy blue satin jackets bearing the company's insignia, were close-mouthed about what was said. Several women emerged from the meeting in tears, and many employees hugged each other.

But some said they felt reassured that their jobs were safe.

"They said that right now it's too early to tell" about the plant's future, said Frank Biggs, a Celanese mechanic for three years. "They said they're not planning on shutting it down but right now it's just wait and see. I feel pretty confident about it."

Don Quarles, a welder at the non-union plant for 15 years, said employees were told they would get regular pay until the company decides what to do with the facility, which is the only plant in the nation to use the liquid phase oxidation process to produce acetic acid and other products.

During Sunday's investigations the safety team extinguished several small ground fires Sunday morning, Guard said, and also stopped some leaks in chemical vessels.

Three people remained hospitalized with serious injuries.

"We will be going in unit by unit by unit to try to assess the damage," Guard said. "We have a lot of information to go through and a lot of people to talk to."

Officials with the Environmental Protection Agency and the Texas Water Commission patrolled the plant, and the Occupational Safety and Health Administration was expected to arrive today, said

## Lloyd Sharp, 69, dies

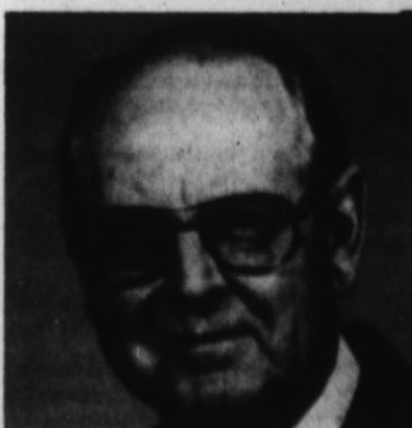
Lloyd Burdell Sharp, 69, former Hereford City Commissioner, died Saturday night in Amarillo after a short illness.

her husband, Gary, and three daughters were assessing the damages early Monday afternoon. "We'll stay if we can because we don't want looters coming in, and if it doesn't get cold. We don't have any electricity or gas."

Preliminary estimates indicate damages may run between \$8 million and \$12 million, with at least 86 businesses and more than 200 homes hit by the twister, said Palestine City Manager Warren Driver.

Many business owners spent Sunday night watching over their shattered buildings and soaked merchandise.

"We'll be spending a few (more) nights down here," said Rick Floyd, manager of Dealer's Electrical Supply, which like several other stores was open Monday. "Something like this, there's a big demand for electrical supplies."

"All of our neighbors seemed positive about building back," Floyd said. "Of course, I'm concerned about some people around town not having insurance money. Business has been bad, but this may give it a little boost," he said.

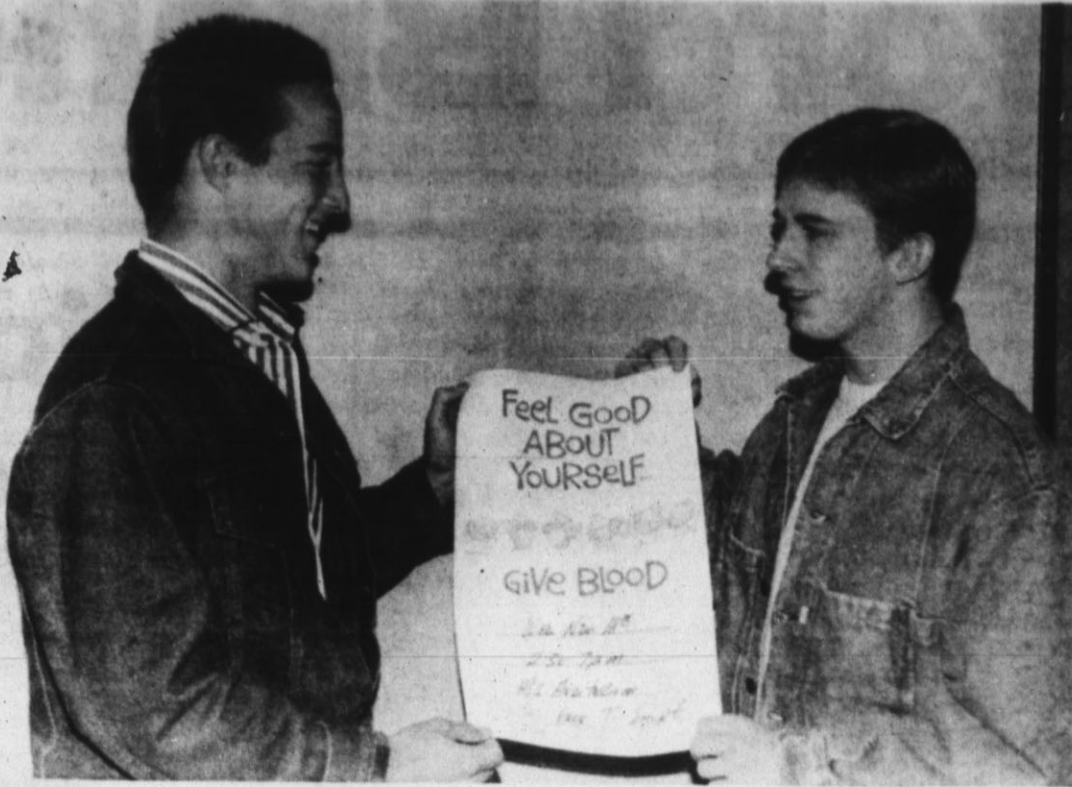
Disaster relief workers said there was no shortage of help.

"Right now, we've got more volunteers than victims, which is good," said Scott Turner, disaster services coordinator for the Anderson County chapter of the American Red Cross.

"We've got search and rescue teams out, we've got damage assessment teams out, we have one shelter active," he said. "I would estimate that we've already fed 300 to 500 meals at our mass feeding station."

The Red Cross was the lead agency for private relief groups which included the Salvation Army and the Texas Baptist Men's Group.

Gov. Bill Clements planned to visit Palestine and Jacksonville this afternoon.

Celanese spokesman Herb Reed.

Until the investigations are completed, which officials say could take weeks, plant officials would not speculate on possible causes for the explosions.

"Right now that would be an area of speculation," Guard said.

Operator Richard Wilson, 25, of Pampa, and mechanic Joe Barnett, 43, of White Deer, were killed at the site of the first blast, Guard said, while maintenance supervisor Eugene Turner, 60, of Pampa, was killed by flying debris.

"Two of our major units were damaged extensively," he said. "Other units have damage but most of what we saw was superficial."

The plant contains nine operating units.

Officials have determined that the first blast occurred near a turbine in an auxiliary utility area, where natural gas is used to produce steam. The second more powerful explosion occurred in a butane reactor unit adjacent to the utility area, said Guard.

Guard said there was no relation between repairs being made to a coal-burning boiler during the accident and the explosion. He said the coal unit is some distance removed from the affected units.

About 60 residents near the plant who were evacuated after the accident were allowed to return to their homes late Saturday night, said Department of Public Safety trooper Wayne Beighle. Officials said a fire that had raged since the blasts burned itself out before dawn Sunday.

Still hospitalized today were Gary Starns, who was in serious

condition at Amarillo's Northwest Texas Hospital; Bob Wilson, in satisfactory condition at Dallas' Presbyterian Hospital and Bennie Woodward, also at Pampa, in good condition, officials said. Joe Brown was released from Pampa Community Hospital Sunday afternoon.

The most recent accidents at Hoechst Celanese Corp. were in 1979 when 12 people were injured, four seriously, in two separate accidents, the company said.

## Ice buildup prime suspect in crash

DENVER (AP) — Ice buildup during a snowstorm has emerged as a prime suspect in the Continental Airlines jet crash that killed 27 people and left five in critical condition today.

A spokesman for federal investigators said today it was too early to rule out any causes, but an outside expert, a witness and a report on a 1985 crash of a similar DC-9 jet fueled questions about whether a hazardous amount of ice accumulated on the plane's wings.

Flight 1713 rolled sharply left and right just after liftoff Sunday with 82 people aboard, then caught a wingtip, flipped onto its back and broke into three pieces as it slid down the runway.

"I would strongly suspect there was ice on the wing," said Richard Shevell, a Stanford University aeronautics professor who worked on the DC-9's design as chief of aerodynamics for Douglas Co. in the early 1960s.

Asked if icing was the prime suspect, National Transportation Safety Board spokesman Ted Lopatkiewicz said today, "We at this point haven't eliminated anything... that would be an area of investigation at this point, yes."

Investigators also are looking at

snowy runway conditions, possible engine failure, wind shear and other factors, said Bob Sheldon of the Federal Aviation Administration. NTSB director Jim Burnett was scheduled to give the news media its first briefing today on early findings.

The 21-year-old, twin-engine jet had been sprayed with de-icing fluid 20 minutes before it tried to take off from Stapleton International Airport for Boise, Idaho, airline officials said.

But the delay between de-icing and takeoff could have allowed ice to collect on the DC-9's wings, Shevell told the Denver Post on Monday. Ice can distort the shape of an aircraft wing and destroy its lift ability.

Ice buildup is a particular concern on early models of the DC-9, such as the one used for Flight 1713, because they are not equipped with slats on the front edges of the wings to give added lift during takeoff. The New York Times reported today.

The Times cited an NTSB report on the February 1985 crash of a DC-9 taking off at Philadelphia International Airport: "Aircraft without leading-edge devices are more sensitive to even light amounts of airfoil ice, which may not always be visibly detectable and which may accumulate during pretakeoff taxi operations."

## Letters to the Editor

Dear editor:

The uproar caused by **The Amarillo Daily News** reports about "Hereford and the Hispanics" is unfortunate, but it is to be expected. I am sure that whites are still licking their wounds. Being a native of Hereford, with many friends and relatives living there, I can sympathize. But for the Hereford Chamber of Commerce to call for a boycott of Amarillo businesses that advertise in the **Daily News** and to join T. Boone Pickens in organizing a Panhandle-wide pressure group to force the paper to print the news their way is going too far.

The freedom of the press is one of the truly great American liberties. A paper today may print something we like, tomorrow something we hate, but it has the right and the duty to print it the way it sees it.

I, too, have complaints about the Amarillo paper. I think the paper needs to report more international and national news and the editorial page should feature columns from the whole political spectrum, not just the conservative extreme. These, I think, are reasonable requests. But if I were to try to pressure the paper to report only the news that I like or to always present my favorite topics in a positive light, that would not be fair to the rest of the readers who might not see things my way.

Journalism holds a vast responsibility. A newspaper's public duty is to print the news. On controversial subjects, this task can become very difficult. You certainly cannot please everyone. But by reporting as much information as possible from as many different sources as possible, the paper gives the readers the best chance at understanding the issue at hand, learning who is saying what about that issue, and then making up their own minds.

Hereford has much to be proud of, but it is not perfect. No town is. Personally, I think there were some inaccuracies in the **Daily News** stories but the overall concept is correct. Hispanics in Hereford have not gotten a fair shake. But that is not really news. Anyone familiar with what is going on there knows it is true.

But things are beginning to change. Hispanics are exercising more political power and are organizing to improve their social

and economics lives. This will make a decisive difference.

I hope that the whites understand that just because Hispanics are gaining in power does not mean that whites will lose out. There is plenty for all. We should remember that democracy does not really work unless it is put to work for everyone. Only when the local government and business leaders represent the whole population will Hereford see its racial problem come to an end. When that happens, it will be a "win-win" situation for Hispanics and Whites.

The Amarillo Daily News once again has used its monopoly to unjustly weaken and malign an entire community - Hereford. In the past, this newspaper has attacked individuals, companies and universities. With Hereford it has become even bolder, showing its true colors.

Hereford fell victim to the whims of the Amarillo newspaper when it decided to make that community a target of its "investigative reporting." Many people inside and outside the Hereford community believe there was never a story to investigate.

In the aftermath of the 38 articles on Hereford and the Hispanics, there is a story that has not been reported. Hereford residents are upset by the unfair treatment by this newspaper, and are banding together to seek change. The Hereford Chamber of Commerce has formally written Hereford merchants asking them to evaluate their business relationships with Amarillo suppliers and business. This collective action is not intended to hurt Amarillo businesses. Rather, it is an outstoken plea that asks Amarilloans to withdraw advertising and to denounce a newspaper regime that seeks to tear down rather than to accurately report the news.

The Hereford Chamber of Commerce believes that the loss of millions of dollars of Amarillo merchants will change this newspaper's negative operation. Sadly,

Hereford's strategy is its only option.

What does this paper have to say about such a reaction to its biased negative reporting? To date, its only reaction has been "no comment." What action will this paper take to correct the damage inflicted on Hereford? Will the Amarillo Globe-News continue to give credence to "stories" that seek to embarrass and harass? The editor's selective judgement of news is ludicrous.

The Panhandle cannot meet its potential until changes are made with respect to the Amarillo Daily News. President Theodore Roosevelt once said that a town is only as good as its newspaper. Positive economic development and unjust reporting don't go hand-in-hand. Character assassinations of communities, universities and companies deal the Panhandle a set-back when we are all working hard to build a constructive living environment.

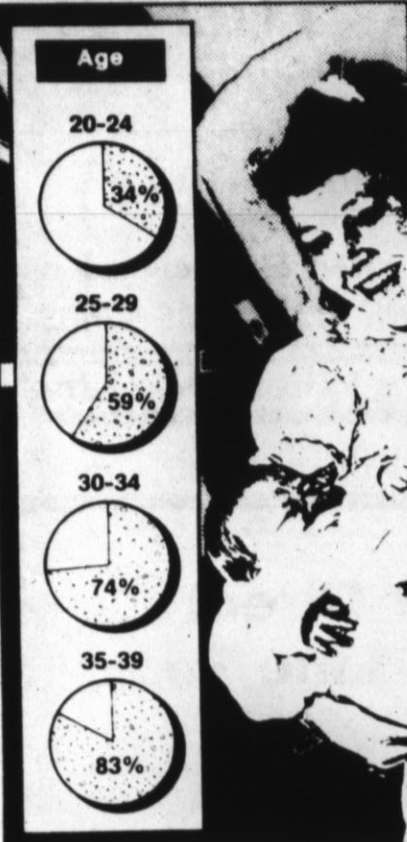
My daughter is hurt and angry and she wants her co-worker to know it. What should she say?—Minneapolis

## Ask Dr. Lamb

**DEAR DR. LAMB:** My niece was diagnosed several months ago as having encephalitis. She was discovered at her work desk having seizures. She was rushed to the hospital where the diagnosis was made. After several weeks, she was allowed to go home. She has never seemed to recover a sense of reality. She is in the hospital again.

I know the virus is transmitted by mosquitos and is uncommon. What is the prognosis of this disease?

**DEAR READER:** I'm sorry to say the outlook is not good. Encephalitis is a virus infection of the brain itself. That is different from many forms of meningitis, which involves the membranes covering the brain. Because the brain itself is afflicted, it

commonly causes convulsions and other signs of brain damage. There is often an altered state of consciousness.

In part because we really do not yet have good medicines to combat virus infections, it is difficult to help these people. Medicine to help control the symptoms and complications is about all that can be done. Those who survive often have permanent changes in personality and may have psychiatric problems because of the brain damage.

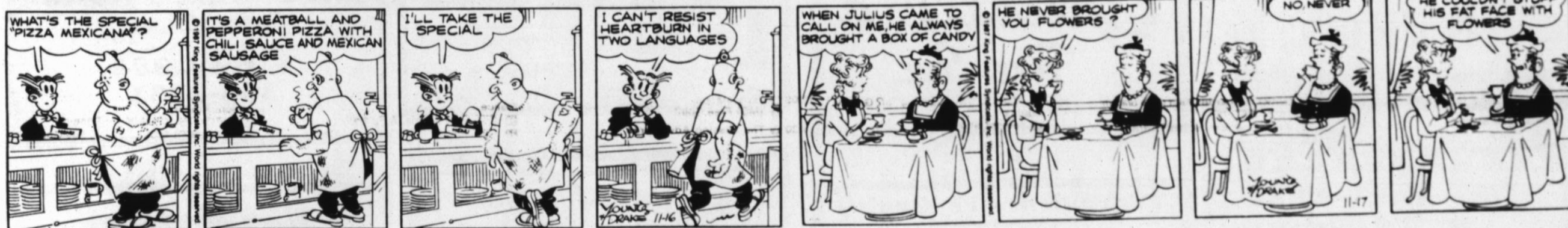

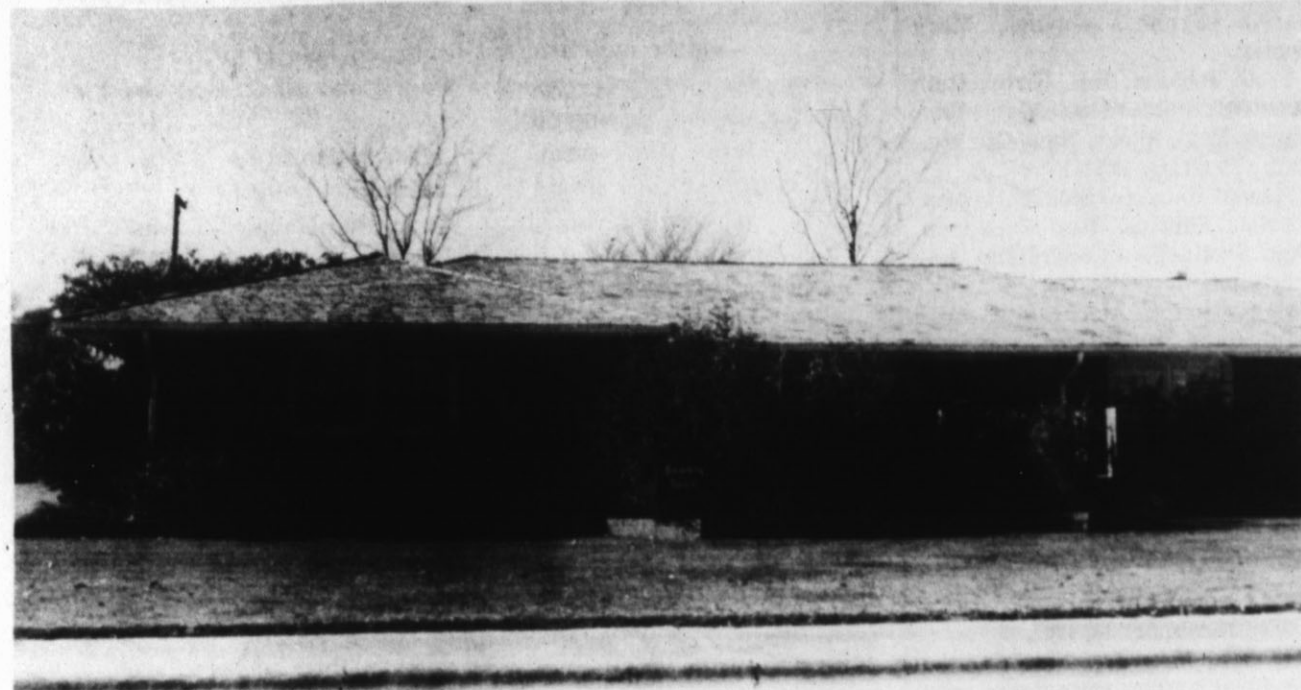

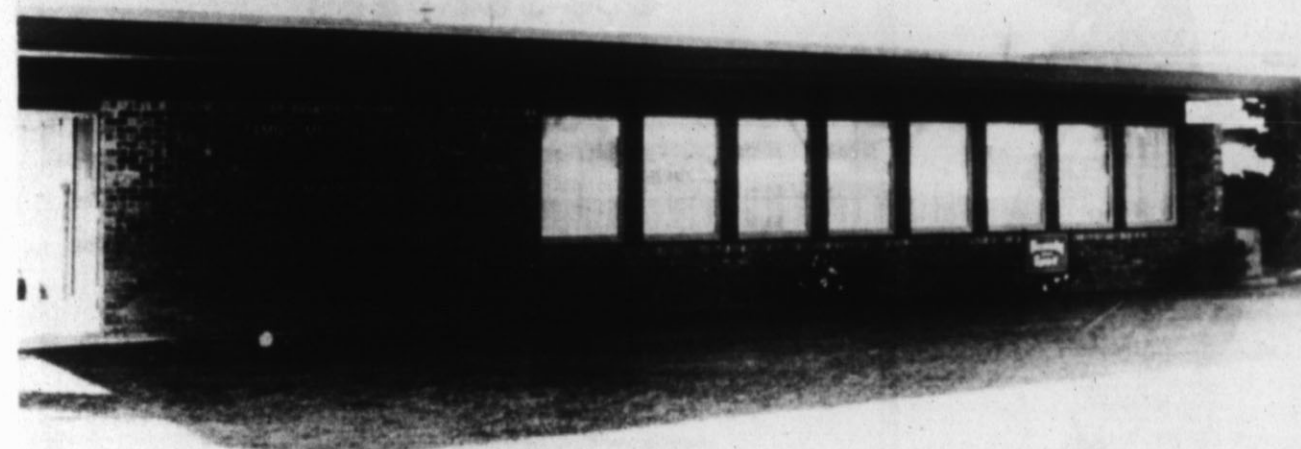

## Social Security Facts

### APPLYING FOR SSI

People who believe they may be eligible for supplemental security income (SSI) payments should apply without delay. Jim Talbot, Social Security manager in Amarillo, Tx. said recently. Payment can begin only with the day of application or the date of eligibility, whichever is later. In the case of a child, an application can be made by a parent or guardian or by some other responsible person.

The application process can be speeded up if the person brings along certain information at the time he or she applies; however, the application should not be delayed simply because all of the information is not available. Social Security personnel will help obtain whatever else is needed. This information includes:

The applicant's Social security card;

A birth certificate or other proof of age;

Details of income and assets (such as payroll slips, bank books, and copies of tax returns);

Details about living conditions (the landlord's name, lease, or mortgage);

Medical records for applicants claiming eligibility for SSI on the basis of disability or blindness.

Sometimes a blind or disabled per-

son who lives in a public institution becomes capable of living in the community but lacks the necessary funds to do so. Monthly SSI checks may permit the person to live outside the institution.

As an alternative, a responsible person can apply on behalf of the institutionalized person when it appears that he or she will soon be discharged.

### WHO'S IN CHARGE?

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) — Half of today's doctors will face malpractice suits or appear as expert medical witnesses in the courtroom sometime during their careers, says Donald Ciaglia, who teaches community medicine at the University of Rochester.

First-year med students at the university prepare by taking part in a mock trial in which practicing judges preside. District attorneys and defense attorneys grill the students, teaching them how important good record-keeping will be.

"It shows them that they may be in charge in the operating room," says Ciaglia, "but in the courtroom the lawyers are in charge."

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
