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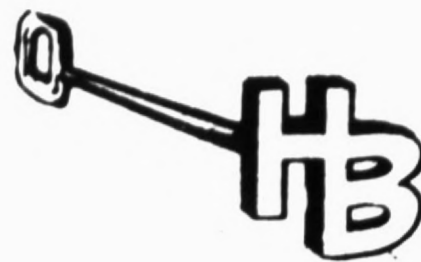

## Duke handles many duties



### Retirement coming soon

Bonna Rea Duke, Hereford city secretary-treasurer, has announced she will retire in February, ending 24 years of service.

City secretary-treasurer is the official title Bonna Rea Duke has held with the City of Hereford since 1976, but it hardly describes the full range of her duties.

She supervises the water utility office, oversees financial accounting and handles personnel records, including payroll and insurance.

She fills the official job of city secretary, maintaining records of the city. Twice a month, too, she attends City Commission meetings and records the minutes of commission actions.

And, she is in charge of elections, when Hereford's commissioners and mayor are chosen.

All this she will give up in February when she retires after 24 years of service to the citizens of Hereford.

Best known as "Bonnie" to her friends and co-workers in the Hereford City Hall, Mrs. Duke actually has almost 30 years of experience in city government. She worked for the City of Tucuman, N.M., for five years before coming to Hereford.

Looking back on her tenure, she has worked under only three city managers--first was Dudley Bayne, then Darwin McGill, who left in August, and Chester Nolen, who came last summer.

"I think Chester knew I was looking at retirement when he came," she said about the decision she has been coming to. "My husband,

Emmett, retired a year ago and he's ready for me to quit, too."

The quiet-spoken Mrs. Duke joined the ranks of city employees on Jan. 1, 1968, working in the tax office. Then, she was named city secretary-treasurer in May 1976.

Although the city manager is finance director for the city, Mrs. Duke's office is responsible for the accounting.

"I'm the bookkeeper," laughed the soon-to-be retiree.

Since she went to work in the city office, there have been significant changes in the utility billing system.

"We did all bookkeeping by hand and utility bills were done on a dual printer -- the bill was printed on a card and posted to the ledger at the same time," she explained.

An NCR computer system then was installed and 14 months ago, a more sophisticated computer was put into service.

City utility billing still is on a first-of-the-month system, with no cyclical billing.

"We've thought about changing but decided it's not necessary for a city the size of ours," said Mrs. Duke.

Through the years, she said, she's enjoyed the association with other city employees as well as citizens of the community. Admittedly, there have been some occasions when unhappy utility customers have caused a few bad moments, though.

"Oh yes, we've had some of those, but usually they calm down when we explain everything to them," said Mrs. Duke.

She attributes the smooth operation of the utility department to a staff of experienced personnel.

"Most of those in the office have worked here 14 or 15 years -- they know more than I do," said Mrs. Duke.

Keeping track of records of city employees is no small task itself, with 78 persons on the fulltime payroll.

Mrs. Duke spent her early life on a ranch on the Texas-New Mexico state line, attending school at Adrian. She also studied at West Texas State University.

After she and Emmett Duke were married, they lived in New Mexico, then came to Hereford in August 1967. The couple has a daughter, D'Ann Craig, and a 14-year-old grandson. The family lives in Littleton, Colo.

When she joined the city staff in 1968, the city hall was a "little square brick building," located at the corner of Miles and Third. Space was limited, to say the least.

When the present city hall was finished in December 1979, Mrs. Duke said, the employees could really spread out.

"Now, we're wishing for more storage," she added.

She remembers the fire station that had been a feed store and was faced with brick. Later, it was razed and the present station at Second and Miles was constructed.

When the time comes to leave her career behind, Mrs. Duke hopes that the projects she's lining up will keep her busy.

When Duke began working for the city in 1968, City Hall was a little square brick building on the corner of Miles and Third. Space was limited. The current City Hall was finished in December 1979, and employees could spread out. "Now we're wishing for more storage," said Duke.

"I have recently learned to do counted cross-stitch... I've always enjoyed handwork but this is new," she said. "I sewed a lot when my daughter was at home."

Mrs. Duke is an avid reader, especially historical novels and an occasional western novel.

But at the top of the list of "things to do" in retirement is to travel.

"We want to see Texas first," she said about the Dukes' future. They enjoy a travel trailer which also will be useful as they fulfill their plans.

But, they have no intention of changing their home base.

"Hereford will still be home," declared Mrs. Duke.

## Weather hampers beet crop

Recent rains have brought the area sugarbeet harvest almost to a standstill, and the effects of the early freeze and wet weather are still being evaluated, according to Dennis Printz, ag manager for Holly Sugar.

"We will start up the harvest again Monday on a limited basis," said Printz. "We're still feeling our way and looking at the situation a day at a time."

Printz said the harvest was about at the halfway point, with some 20,000 acres of beets still in the fields.

A number of sugarbeet producers have expressed concern about the yield on this year's crop and compare the situation to the 1986 harvest. The weather was cold and wet in November that year, and the harvest was about half finished at Thanksgiving time.

## Applications taken for CSF help

Contributions for the 1991 Christmas Stocking Fund are now being accepted at The Hereford Brand, 313 Lee or P.O. Box 673.

The Christmas Stocking Fund is Hereford's charity to assist some of the community's less fortunate during the holiday season. Through the CSF contributions, gifts of food, clothing, medical and utility assistance are provided to those most in need.

Last year, the project garnered \$18,026 after reaching a peak of \$20,718 in 1989. CSF is administered by an anonymous committee of volunteers representing a broad cross-section of the community. Applications for assistance are thoroughly screened and processed by the group.

Applications for assistance from the Stocking Fund will be accepted beginning Monday and will continue through Dec. 13 at the county Red Cross office, 224 S. Main.

Red Cross volunteers will be assisting CSF by taking applications from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. weekdays during the sign-up period. Spanish-speaking volunteers will be on hand to assist applicants from 4 to 6 p.m. daily.

The county Red Cross is not affiliated with CSF. It serves only as a contact point for the charity, which is operated by the volunteer anonymous committee.

A CSF spokesman says stringent guidelines will be followed during the CSF campaign this year.

"We want the public to understand that Red Cross volunteers take on the task of assisting CSF in addition to their other holiday activities. They provide essential help to CSF, help that means the difference in reaching the community's needy."

"Yet, some Red Cross volunteers were subjected to verbal abuse last

year from people who thought they didn't get enough from CSF," said the spokesman.

"The CSF volunteer committee is solely responsible for decisions on the assistance that applicants receive. CSF makes the most needy its top priority for help. CSF volunteers have unanimously agreed to disqualify any applicant who harasses or abuses a Red Cross official or volunteer concerning their CSF status," he added.

The spokesman says that application for CSF assistance does not guarantee that it will be received. "Funding for CSF is limited, and there are hundreds of applications. Volunteers make every effort to help the greatest number of applicants with the funds available."

A large percentage of CSF assistance is with utility bills. This

has also been one of the most complicated areas for CSF workers.

"Applicants who are asking for assistance with their utility or medical bills must provide information when they sign up," said the CSF official.

Those seeking utility assistance are required to bring a copy of their bill. They must provide CSF with the proper account number, and the name in which it is carried on the books of water, gas or electric utilities. An explanation must be provided if the account is not in the applicant's name.

If medical assistance is requested, the applicant must provide the name of the hospital or doctor, and the account number. Pharmacy bills or receipts and account numbers are necessary for help with medications.

All applicants must provide proof of Deaf Smith County residence in the form of bills, voter registration

cards, driver's license, or some item that clearly indicates where they reside.

"Lack of proper account numbers has been a real headache for CSF volunteers for the past three years. We feel that providing the proper account information is a reasonable thing to ask of applicants," said the spokesman.

Students at five Hereford schools will be learning about Multiple Sclerosis in the next few weeks, while also helping raise money for the Panhandle Chapter of the National Multiple Sclerosis Society (NMSS) and enjoying more reading.

The Panhandle Chapter of NMSS is sponsoring a read-a-thon at West Central, Aikman, Bluebonnet and Northwest schools of the Hereford Independent School District and the Nazarene Christian Academy.

"This is not just for fund-raising," said Susan Bovenzi, fundraising coordinator for the Panhandle Chapter. "We want the children to enjoy reading, and we have prizes to give them incentive to read more books."

The prizes include \$30 worth of coupons for children who read three or more books from area businesses and sites including the Discovery Center, the Panhandle Plains Historical Museum, the American Quarter Horse Association museum, and gifts from Burger King, Toot and Totem, Wonderland King and Just For Fun at Westgate Mall.

The top fund-raising reader in the Panhandle area will get a Super Nintendo system, and other prizes include t-shirts, bottles, telescopes and headset radios. The class that reads the most books will get a Pizza Hut party, and the class that raises the most money will get a Borden ice cream party.

A major underwriter of the read-a-thon, which will include over 13,000 students at 44 schools in the region, is Hastings. The top 10 schools in the region will receive \$100 gift certificates from Hastings, and Hastings is providing brochures and special books for all participating students.

Students will also be treated to a special night next summer by Amarillo Texans owner Mike Moore. Another feature of the special event is the Mystery Sleuth, who will provide clues and answers for children to give them more knowledge about multiple sclerosis.

"The Mystery Sleuth is very secretive," said Bovenzi. "He will provide motivation for the students, and does special things like writing backwards and using secret codes that

only participating students will understand."

Some of the schools will be hosting an assembly on environmental barriers. The assembly program includes a video, "You've Got The Power," which features youngsters explaining MS.

Multiple Sclerosis is a debilitating disease for some, while for others it comes and goes, in and out of remission. MS is a chronic disease for all sufferers, interfering with the smooth transmission of the messages sent from the brain and spinal cord to parts of the body.

While symptoms vary from patient to patient, the most common symptoms of multiple sclerosis include excessive fatigue, numbness and tingling, loss of mobility, impaired speech, impaired vision, loss of coordination, bladder problems and paralysis.

Multiple sclerosis actually translates in to "many scars," said Fredricka Genz of Amarillo. She is a volunteer for the Panhandle Chapter of NMSS, and has suffered from MS since 1957.

You couldn't tell from looking at Mrs. Genz that anything is wrong

with her. "No, not unless you see me having an attack," she said. "I have an attack, then it goes back into remission."

The Panhandle Chapter is facing a tough job in the Panhandle area, she said. More persons are being diagnosed with MS through the increased use of Magnetic Resonance Imaging (MRI).

"MS doesn't show up on a cat scan or X-ray, but you can blow up the pictures from a MRI and actually see the scars on the spinal cord or on nerve endings," Genz said.

She said there are at least 15 persons with MS in Hereford, and even more in Dumas. There are six persons in Dimmitt. Those numbers, and number in other places in the Panhandle, exceed the national average of 35-50 cases per 100,000.

"We don't know why, but we seem to have these 'hot pockets' in some places in the Panhandle," Genz said. "We know it's not from the water, because that effect has been tested and it's not there. There may be some environmental something we don't

## New Frugality: Making ends meet is tough

EDITOR'S NOTE - Work hard, live within your means and you'll get ahead in life. So went the advice passed from generation to generation. Yet millions of Americans who are doing just that are wondering if the old formula has gone stale. Many are scraping by these days, burdened by a feeble economy that has produced thousands of layoffs, higher taxes and cuts in social services. In a special report, The Associated Press examines how the American dream has turned into an economic nightmare.

The economic recovery is fizzling and Americans everywhere are feeling the pinch of lingering hard times. While periodic downturns in the U.S. economy are nothing new, there is growing sentiment that more is at stake this time.

Profound changes are occurring in consumer confidence and business strategy. After more than a year of economic uncertainty, people are worrying about the well-being of future generations, not just another tough year ahead.

"It's really more than economics. It's a social, psychological change," observed Robert J. Eggert, publisher of Blue Chip Economic Indicators, a Sedona, Ariz., newsletter that polls leading economic forecasters.

The shock of hard times after the booming decade of the '80s may be at the root of this change in attitude. Instead of rising prosperity, Americans are becoming accustomed to business retrenchment, layoffs and recurring stock market slides.

In response, businesses and consumers are pulling their belts tighter than they have in decades in a "new frugality" that may well define the waning years of this century.

"We have to go back 100 years to the Industrial Revolution to see the types of fundamental changes we're seeing now," said Larry M. Elkin, a tax manager in Arthur Andersen & Co.'s New York office.

Confronted with keener competition overseas and rising costs here,

businesses of all sizes are keeping leaner inventories, even as the holidays approach, and laying off tens of thousands of workers to help cut costs.

International Business Machines Corp., for instance, plans to eliminate 20,000 jobs worldwide, or about 5 percent of its work force, by year's end, and analysts expect an equal number of jobs to be eliminated in 1992.

Rob Wilson, a spokesman for the computer giant, said a leaner-and-meaner approach is part of an ongoing restructuring "designed to make IBM more efficient with our customers."

Small businesses are rethinking their business plans, too. N.R. Underwood and Sons Enterprises Inc., a hardware business in Hudson, Mass., recently opened on Sundays, breaking a 117-year-old tradition. Owner Norman Underwood said that despite the move, sales still are off about 10 percent from a year ago.

Many larger companies have been looking overseas for opportunities, especially in Europe, where 19 countries plan to unify into one giant marketplace by 1993. But even Europe's economies are muddling along these days; Japan isn't doing much better.

In the United States, consumers, like businesses, are downsizing their expectations and spending. The notorious yuppies of the 1980s have turned into "grumpies," or grown-up mature professionals, who think less about second homes and expensive cars and more about sending their children through college, supporting elderly parents and preparing for their own retirements.

"They've been hit by a triple whammy," said Elkin, the tax consultant.

Dale Braman, 44, was pulling in \$54,000 a year, plus bonus, before being laid off last year as national marketing sales director for Towa Sankind Corp., an Edison, N.J., company that makes electronic cash registers.

Nearly 100 resumes and 20 job interviews later, he has yet to find a similar position even after relocating to the western United States. Braman

had to settle for a \$6-an-hour sales job at a Radio Shack store. His wife, Carol, 40, took a \$21,000-a-year bookkeeping position.

The family, which includes two school-aged children, has had to cut back substantially. Vacations are relegated to visits to relatives. Eating out is a rarity, and for entertainment they borrow videos from the local library.

These frugal attitudes have inspired a slew of recently published cost-cutting advice books. In his "500 Simple Money-Saving Ideas" booklet, consumer economics consultant Joel Martin suggests Depression-like remedies: Cut your own children's hair; dilute shampoo; refrain from idling your car for more than a minute since it's cheaper to restart the engine then; and don't wash or dry clean clothes more than necessary to avoid wearing out the fabric.

"We'll be seeing a lot more of carefully planned spending rather than impulse buying. More businesses will fold before they wake up and adjust to this change," said Cheryl Russell, a demographic consultant from Ithaca, N.Y., and author of the 1987 book "100 Predictions For The Baby Boom."

"During the '90s and early in the next century, the dominating thing will be raising children and family life" for the 75 million baby boomers, born between 1946 and 1964, she says.

To be sure, many experts expect the worst of the suffering to be

temporary. They say a slow recovery from the recession will help correct some of the excesses of a fundamentally strong economy and produce even greater prosperity later.

"I think over the long run, it's probably a good thing for the economy, as long as changes are not made in a way that will hurt company productivity," said Eggert.

According to Eggert's Blue Chip Indicators, the general consensus is that the inflation-adjusted gross national product will decline 0.4 percent this year but grow by 2.3 percent in 1992. Through the turn of the century, economic growth will average 2.5 percent a year, the publication said recently.

The economy was moving ahead strongly in the spring on a wave of consumer confidence from the U.S. victory in the Gulf War. But things went sour by summer, with growing layoffs and worsening budgetary problems among many of the nation's cities and states. The reversal of fortune led some economists to predict another economic downturn, or "double dip."

"The whole economy has not erased the recession yet," conceded Geoffrey Moore, a member of the privately run National Bureau of Economic Research, designated by the federal government as the official arbiter of when recessions begin and end.

and eat, earn and spend, both privately and collectively, so that their children and their children's children would inherit a better world."

"During the '80s," Friedman said in an interview, "we have underinvested in just about all the makings of a strong economy."

Research and development is one example. The National Science Foundation began detecting a significant drop in growth of annual R&D spending by U.S. companies about five years ago. Such spending for new and improved products and technology grew 4 percent to 10 percent a year in the early 1980s after adjusting for inflation, but fell 2 percent to 3 percent a year since 1986, the foundation said.

Productivity gains also have been small. Annual business productivity, which measures workers' efficiency, rose an average 0.6 percent from 1973 to 1979, and 0.9 percent from 1979 to 1986, which is not enough to obtain even moderate standard-of-living improvements, according to the Conference Board, a business research group based in New York.

"We have not saved or invested," said Audrey Freedman, a Conference Board economist. "And it's more than just investing in better equipment and tools. (It's) in the regeneration of our infrastructure, or in education of our people to make them more efficient producers or better managers."

A poll sponsored by the Committee for Economic Development and the Business Roundtable found that only 30 percent of recently surveyed employers positively ranked the overall preparedness of students to hold jobs in their businesses. Sixty-seven percent gave them negative ratings.

At the same time, real personal income has been declining, noted Harvard's Friedman. He said the average American worker earned \$281 a week in 1983, the first year of the eight-year economic expansion, the longest in recent history. In constant dollars, that same person earns just \$260 today.

Until the latest recession, these gaps had been masked for years, economists (See FRUGALITY, Page 5A)

know about, but it's been researched and there's no real explanation."

MS, Genz explained, is not fatal, although symptoms from the disease can be fatal. It is also not hereditary, although there is a hereditary disposition to the illness.

The Panhandle Chapter of NMSS is not supported by United Way or other organizations. The area chapter, and local chapters in the region, sponsor fundraising events each year including the read-a-thon, a bridal show, ugly bartender contests, the MS 150 Wild West Bike Tour, a Beef-a-thon televised auction, arrest jail and bail, and golf tournaments. Sixty percent of the monies raised stay in the Panhandle to benefit programs of the area chapter, with forty percent going to MS research.

Services provided include educational programs for the public, professionals and for people with MS and their families; equipment loans and purchases; counseling; home and hospital visitation; support groups; lending library books and tapes; water exercise; job counseling; referral to other agencies; and symposiums and seminars.

The chapter recently held a special event in Amarillo and Canyon where 24 persons, otherwise healthy, were confined to a wheelchair for a full day to see what some MS patients must deal with. Some of the participants included West Texas State University President Dr. Barry Thompson, State District Judge Pat Pirtle, and other professionals.

Genz and Bovenzi said many eyes were opened.

"Judge Pirtle had to empanel a jury that day for a trial, and he felt he got absolutely no respect," Bovenzi said. "Dr. Thompson said he thought WT was in good shape for persons confined to wheelchairs, but he found out it was not."

They said they would like to have similar events next year in Hereford and other cities.

"One problem we try to overcome is the refusal by some persons to admit they have MS," Genz said. She explained that some persons are afraid to confront their illness because they are afraid of losing their job or insurance benefits, while others are simply afraid to confront the fact they have the disease.

"It's not fatal," Genz said. "I'm living proof that you can have MS and live for many more years."

## Congress rushes to finish up work

WASHINGTON (AP) - Lawmakers are saddling an already veto-threatened and overweigh "emergency" spending bill with a controversial measure the White House opposes that would allow abortions at overseas U.S. military bases.

As Congress rushes to a pre-Thanksgiving adjournment, the Senate voted 57-40 Friday to permit military women and dependents to have abortions performed at overseas bases as part of the \$7.5 billion spending bill.

"This horse isn't going very far," said Senate Appropriations Committee Chairman Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va. "The president is going to veto it anyway."

The abortion measure - aimed at reversing a 1988 decision by the Pentagon that began prohibiting abortions at hospitals on U.S. bases overseas - added one more obstacle to enactment of the emergency measure.

Even before the abortion provision was tacked on, White House officials

said they would urge President Bush to reject the bill because the House sweetened it with \$1.4 billion in new spending on children's programs and another \$1.8 billion to cover farmers' crop losses to weather.

Meanwhile, a \$205 billion bill essential for keeping government health and education programs in the money next year was passed by the House and Senate and sent to President Bush, as did a \$291 billion budget authorization bill for the military.

The Senate was expected to pass today and send to Bush a bill appropriating the money for the Pentagon bill, which stalls the B-2 bomber but keeps money flowing for nuclear missiles, submarines and other Cold War-era weapons.

The spending bill for the departments of Health and Human Services, Labor and Education boosts spending on government health research and aid to demographically low-income school district by 11 percent.

Before reaching the adjournment target of next Tuesday night or early Wednesday, lawmakers have to act on bills providing \$50 billion in bailout money for banks and another \$80 billion for failed savings and loan institutions, said Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell, D-Maine.

Also on the must-pass list is final approval of a bill ensuring another 13 or 20 weeks of unemployment checks for jobless workers who have exhausted their benefits since last March.

But lawmakers also hope to send Bush an anti-crime bill that includes a waiting period for buying handguns, a five-year highway and mass transit bill and a revamping of Medicaid regulations. In addition, House leaders want to pass a campaign finance reform bill.

Key lawmakers were expected to work behind the scenes on all of those measures through the weekend. In other action Friday:

The Senate refused to shut off a Republican filibuster of efforts to finance an investigation into whether the 1980 Reagan-Bush campaign made a deal with Iran to delay release of American hostages until after the election. The largely party-line vote was 51-43.

## Report shows Hispanic students lagging behind

WASHINGTON (AP) - A Census Bureau survey showing that less than half of the Hispanic students in Texas complete high school is dramatic proof of the need for educational reform, a researcher says.

The Census Bureau said Wednesday that 45.2 percent of Hispanics either earn a diploma or a General Equivalency Degree, compared to 69.8 percent of blacks and 74.9 percent of whites.

"I think the people still haven't figured out how much the future of our nation depends on educating our minority population, which is increasing in rapid numbers," said Edward Codina, a researcher with the San Antonio-based Hispanic Association of Colleges and Universities.

"You either educate us or you pay for building more jails or for more welfare," he said. "That's the bottom line."

Codina blamed the lower rates on the fact that a higher proportion of Hispanic students are educated in poor school districts. He expressed hope that recent school finance reform spreading taxpayers' money more equally among wealthy and poor districts will have a positive effect.

In the 1989-90 school year, 44 percent of the estimated 70,000 dropouts were Hispanic, said Joey Lozano, a spokesman for the Texas Education Agency.

"The reason most students drop out of school is poor attendance," he said. Poverty and the need for outside income also figure into the dropout rate, he said.

Codina agreed, noting that low-income students face more burdens than their more affluent peers.

"A lot of (Hispanic students) have to work part-time. A lot of them may end up getting married early," he said. "And these are extra stressors in just trying to succeed in school."

Hispanics also trailed in the percentage of students completing at least four years of college, according to the survey of 58,000 households nationwide. Among whites, the rate was 22.9 percent, versus 10.9 percent for blacks and 8.3 percent for Hispanics.

There was little disparity in high school rates by gender, with 74.7 percent of men 25 and older having completed four years of high school, compared with 73.9 percent of women.

The gender gap widened in college, with men 25 and older recording a 25.7 percent rate of four or more years of college versus 18 percent for women.

Baby boomers recorded the highest high school completion rate, outperforming the generations that came before and after them. The boomers, those 25 to 44, had an 82.2 percent completion rate, versus 70.8 percent for those 18 to 24 and 72.2 percent for the 45- to 64-year-old bracket. Those 65 and older had a significantly lower rate of 49.4 percent.

The trend is duplicated in college, with 25 percent of baby boomers completing at least four years. The completion rate for those between the ages of 18 and 24 - some of whom are still in college - is 7.1 percent. That compares with 20.9 percent for those 45 to 64, and 11.3 percent for those 65 and older.

Texas ranked 19th among the states and the District of Columbia in

percentage of residents 25 or older completing at least four years of college, with a 21.7 percent rate. Nationally, the rate was 21.1 percent.

The Census Bureau cautioned that because results were derived from a survey, rather than from a complete census, some differences in rankings are statistically insignificant.

Texas ranked 31st in percentage of high school graduates among those over the age of 25.

Deaf Smith General Hospital has become the latest hospital to subscribe to Texas Tech MEDNET, announced officials with the hospital and Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center.

Texas Tech MEDNET provides a variety of telecommunication services, including satellite broadcasts of continuing education programs, which help local health care providers better serve their patients. At present 35 hospitals across the state subscribe to MEDNET.

Through MEDNET broadcasts, health practitioners at participating sites are able to watch live programs which keep them current on developments in medicine and health care. Through a two-way audio hookup, participants at each site are also able to ask questions of presenters.

MEDNET currently provides three hours a week of program for physicians, nurses, allied health practitioners and hospital board members. All programs are accredited and count toward the continuing

education requirements set by licensing board of the various health professions.

Participating hospital pay a startup fee then monthly fees.

"Texas Tech MEDNET helps rural hospital overcome their isolation by giving their staff direct interaction with medical specialists," said MEDNET director Dr. J. Ted Hartman. "Because the staff receive programs in the hospital, MEDNET ultimately reduces travel and other expenses necessary for staff to meet continuing education requirements."

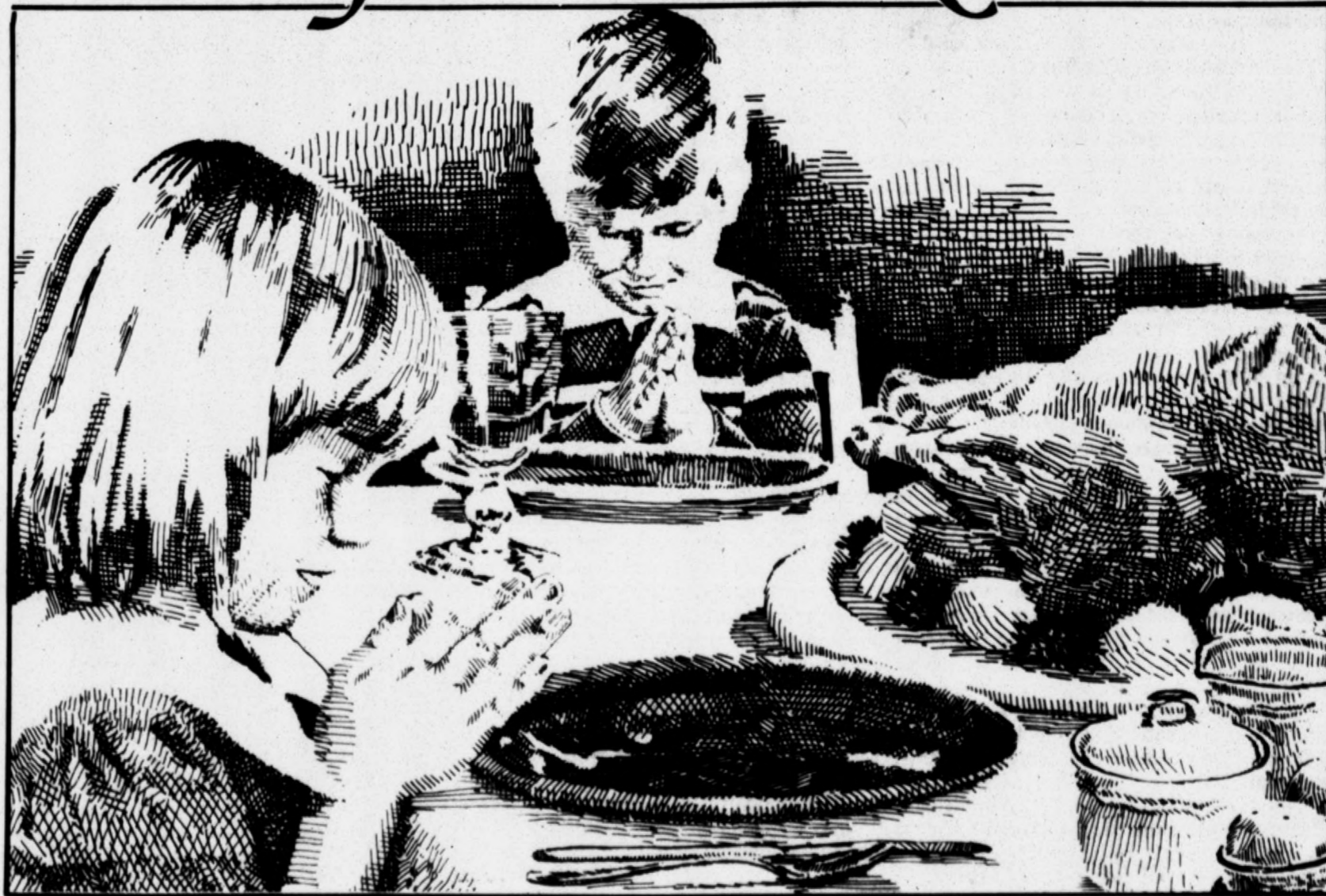

## Voter reform

Concerned citizens across this nation have set up a hue and cry on regaining control of their elected officials. pleasure and entertainment by hurting other people. It is difficult to understand their feelings and state of mind.

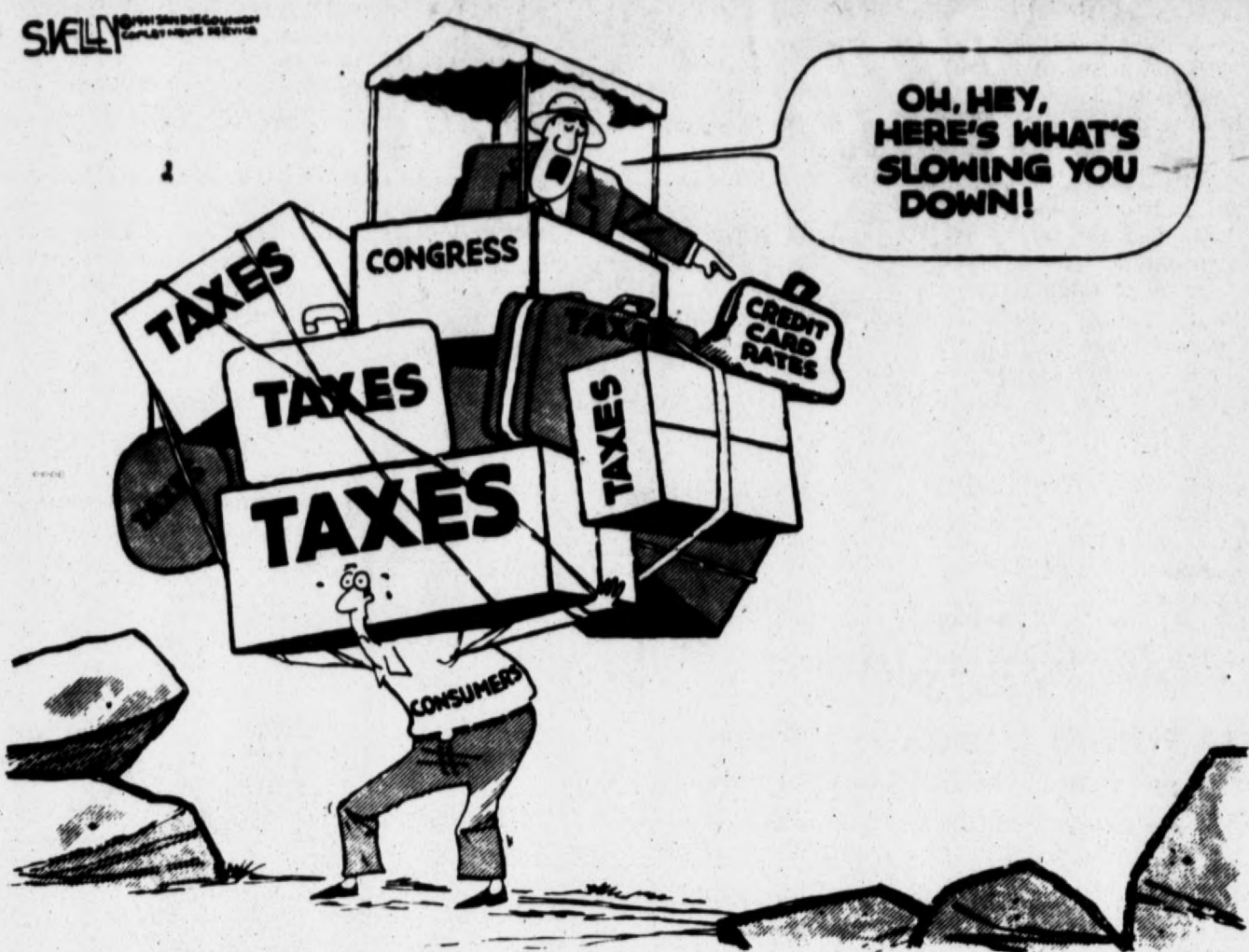
Some of the people whose tires were punctured were retired citizens and several were "one-car families." This senseless vandalism of another person's property shows that the perpetrator has no regard for others.

## Opposing Baptists remain close

FORT WORTH, Texas - Conservatives and moderates alike were sympathetic when they saw me on crutches last week at the Baptist General Convention of Texas state convention.

A tennis injury suffered during a doubles game stretched ligaments in my ankle. It caused me to look like one of the walking wounded as I covered the war over Baylor University at the meeting in Waco.

Baptists who saw me in the convention newsroom with my sprained ankle propped on a chair expressed concern and offered to bring me coffee or a sandwich.

News reporter friends also were concerned.

"Did the Baptists attack you?" one asked.

Kindness shown by Baptists on both sides of the political fence was no surprise. But it reminded me that Baptist fundamentalists and moderates who attack one another at national Baptist meetings act like brothers at Texas Baptist conventions.

I've never understood why. The Baylor controversy, of course, caused some bitter feelings, even name calling between major combatants, including Baylor President Herbert Reynolds and the Rev. Joel Gregory of Dallas.

Emotions cooled down, though, and after it was over - and Baylor won - there were calls for peace on both sides.

Baylor's plan for a self-perpetuating board of regents, 75 percent elected by the school and 25 percent by the state convention, was approved. In the past, the state convention elected all of Baylor's governing board.

Reynolds and others said Baylor wanted to remain affiliated with Baptists, but needed a degree of independence to protect the school

The Republicans are planning to challenge the boundaries in court. They're not just concerned with the Amarillo lines, but lines in other parts of the state. The entire map looks like Picasso designed it.

As long as we stay in the 19th District, they can pretty much do whatever they want to the lines.

You are voting in next year's Republican presidential primary.

You see the usual cast of who-knows-what-they-ares, professional wrestlers or something, that clutter the ballot.

Then there are the real candidates. George Bush. David Duke. Pat Buchanan.

Duke and Buchanan? Yeah, no joke.

Buchanan has taken off for a couple of weeks from "Crossfire" on CNN, and whatever else he does to make an enormous living, to consider running for president.

Duke didn't even take time to lick his wounds after he was defeated by Democrat Edwin Edwards in the Louisiana governor's race.

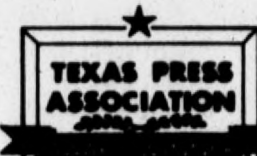

I have to agree with him. After receiving such kindness while limping around the state convention, I conclude that many Baptists - whether conservative or moderate - are practicing what they preach.

### ANOTHER SHOCKING SHORTFALL

WASHINGTON — The Bush administration has raised its estimate of the 1992 federal budget deficit to some \$348.3 billion, about \$70 billion more than originally projected. This will be the largest deficit in history, by far.

This was not supposed to happen. Less than a year ago, the Bush Administration linked arms with Congress to impose a new round of tax increases guaranteed to reduce the deficit. Some guarantee!

The key problem, according to the White House, is that tax receipts are running much lower than predicted. It now seems clear Uncle Sam will rake in about \$20 billion less than expected this year and next year, and more than \$40 billion less annually by mid-decade.

Meanwhile, out in California, Governor Pete Wilson has persuaded the state legislature to impose draconian tax increases in an effort to staunch the flow of red ink. Up in Connecticut, Governor Lowell Weicker is demanding creation of a new state income tax for the same reason. Other states are stumbling into the same trap — raising taxes in an attempt to reduce deficits.

But California and Connecticut will discover — as Uncle Sam has discovered — that higher taxes do not lead to lower deficits. To the contrary, higher taxes strangle economic growth, reduc-

ing tax revenues while at the same time increasing demand for government services. The inevitable result is even bigger deficits.

Unfortunately, there is little reason to believe the politicians will learn from this experience. When the Bush administration sought last year's budget deal, there were many voices — including the U.S. Chamber of Commerce — warning that the cure was worse than the disease. We were roundly ignored. We will probably be ignored again next time when the politicians come back for another round of tax increases to stem the exploding deficit, tax increases that will again make the deficit even larger.

There is no great mystery why this is happening. The bread and butter of politics is spending money to address social needs. But as soon as government spending programs are in place, they assume a life of their own. The beneficiaries come to regard them as entitlements. Bureaucracies and special interest groups form alliances with politicians to defend them.

When recession comes, usually because of foolish government policies, there is insufficient revenue to support all the programs. The inevitable result is red ink and demands for higher taxes.

But taxes aren't the problem — spending is. Until we elect politicians who realize that fact, and give them the support they need to do something about it, the fiscal crisis will continue.

say, by more two-income households and an increase in borrowing.

"(But) borrowing has its natural limits ... and you can't send a third family member to work. You can only go so far," said Freedman, of the Conference Board.

Many experts see trouble ahead if these limitations continue.

William Strauss, co-author of the recently published book, "Generations," believes those born just after the baby boomers, from the early 1960s to 1981, will have the toughest time achieving the so-called American dream of a better life.

A product of divorce, two-income earners and a "latchkey" environment, this generation is less likely to be college-educated than its elders but more likely to bear the fiscal burdens

of a debt-happy government and aging population, he said.

"The decade of the '70s brought a steep decline in the economic fortunes of children," Strauss noted in his book, which analyzes the 18 generations since the founding of the United States. "From the 1950s through the early 1970s, the over-65 age bracket showed the highest poverty rate; since 1974, the under-18 bracket has shown the highest.

"Through the 1980s ... (their) economic stress has moved right up the age ladder with them."

Richard L. Walters, 60, a retired steelworker from New Brighton, Pa., with three grown children, says he's glad he doesn't have to raise a family in today's economic conditions.

"You used to be able to support a family on one salary. You were even able to eat out once in a while," said Walters, who is barely making ends meet on a \$922 monthly pension from former employer LTV Corp.

"It's way harder these days. It takes twice as much to raise one child as it did before. I wouldn't have any children today if I had to get through it again."

The downside of the new frugality is that it is basically a defensive, get-by strategy. And it arrives at a time when the economy actually needs more spending - not less - to get the forces of supply and demand moving again.

Policymakers in Washington have been facing this economic Catch-22 in the growing shadow of the presidential election in 1992.

The Federal Reserve, the nation's central bank, has helped bring mortgage and other interest rates down by steadily lowering key lending rates since the recession began last year.

But the Fed's moves - including another round of cuts this month - haven't done much good yet.

That lack of success is now amplifying calls for even more drastic action, like a tax cut, which might only pad the debts the economy is struggling to repay.

In fact, Harvard's Friedman says the entire tax structure needs to be revamped.

"We ought to have much more of a pro-saving, pro-investing policy stance from the government," he said. "We need a tax structure that favors equity financing instead of debt financing."

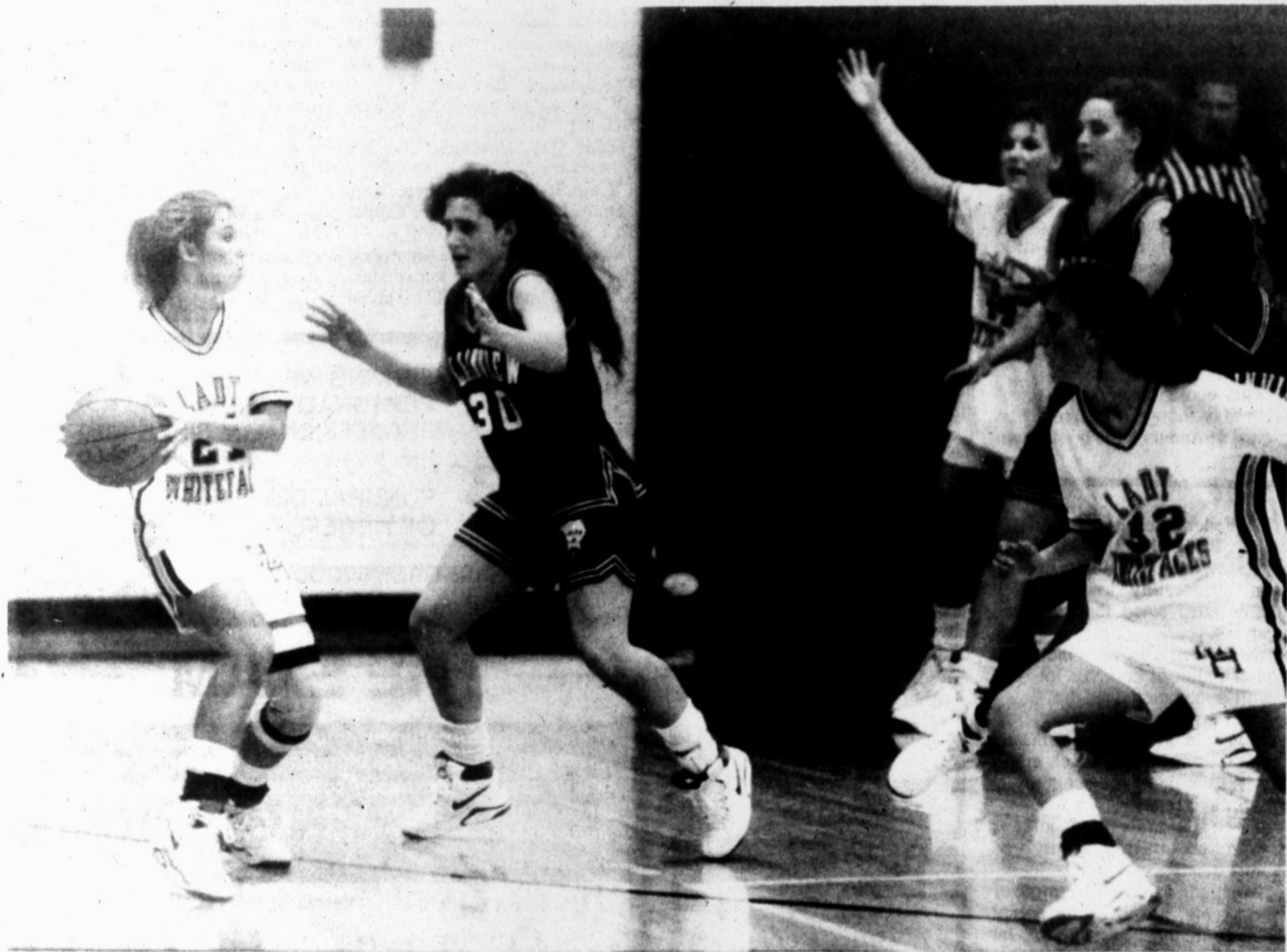

## Lady cagers bow to P'view in home opener

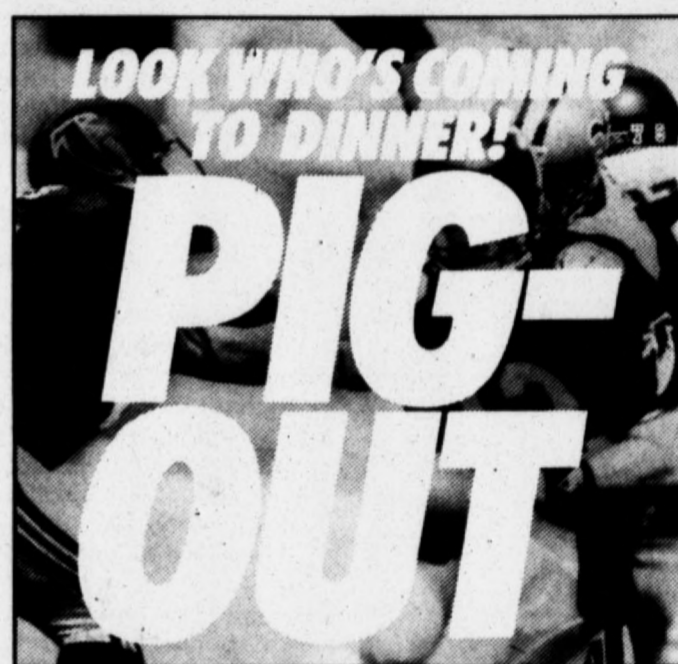
What didn't change was that the loss was the 43rd straight on the road

Herd coach Danny Haney, in his first year as head coach after years of apprenticeship to Don Cumpton, learned some things and had a winning record.

"I feel like we had a good year as far as the record's concerned," Haney said. "We just lost the wrong game."

Consecutive losses to Pampa and Randall put Hereford in a hole in the standings, ultimately costing the Herd

a playoff berth, but Haney said he liked the way the players continued to improve after the losses.

"There's no doubt in my mind we're the best team in the district: the way we were moving the ball and playing defensively at the end of the season."

Haney got some "on-the-job training" in the head coaching position this season, he said.

"It's impossible for anyone—having not been a head coach—to realize everything that's entailed in being a head coach," he said.

"I've learned that you've got to broaden your scope in terms of your

relationships with your players. As an offensive line coach, I had 20 players I had to worry about. As a head coach, I've got 180 players you have to deal with. You've got to make them feel wanted...that it wouldn't be the same without them."

"This year has been a good year for a first-year head coach. There's always mistakes you make that, looking back, you'd do differently--and, of course, you'd do better."

For next year and the near future, the Herd's in good shape. Quite a few juniors started on varsity this year.

# Johnson's learning about NFL officiating

 IRVING, Texas (AP) - Just the other day Jimmy Johnson was talking about the differences in college and professional football player psychology he's observed since leaving the University of Miami for the Cowboys three years ago.

Now, he's learning about NFL officiating. He's learning about how all the Super Bowl teams, the successful teams, seem to get the calls, particularly "defending" Super Bowl champions.

Back in the 1970s and 1980s there were screams that the Dallas Cowboys were getting calls because

club president Tex Schramm was on the competition committee and a good buddy of then-commissioner Pete Rozelle.

What goes around comes around. Now the Cowboys are on the bottom trying to find a hole in the NFL ice.

Just like an NBA rookie has to pay his dues, it appears a new guy on the NFL scene has to endure some mistreatment in officials' judgment no matter how unintentional.

The calls against the Cowboys in the 22-9 loss to the New York Giants, defending Super Bowl champions, set Johnson off into a one-man forest fire.

Worst officiating, he claimed, he had ever seen in all his years in ball

and that included some Port Arthur road games in the Texas Golden Triangle (Port Arthur, Beaumont, Orange) where a traveling team in the old days could get hosed by yellow flags.

Most agreed the officiating crew led by Gordon McCarter kept seeing things that weren't there, blinded perhaps by a player wearing a silver star on his helmet in the nearby vicinity.

John Madden, color commentator for CBS-TV, watched the madness in the Meadowlands unfold and agreed it was one of the poorest officiated games he had ever seen.

Then he added: "What you see on the field today is one reason why I'm

glad I'm not coaching down there on the sidelines."

Johnson was later vindicated by the NFL for his statements when commissioner Paul Tagliabue decided not to fine him the usual \$7,500 hit a coach gets for criticizing the league's striped finest.

He got off as a first time offender; much like a golfer gets a mulligan for a bad first tee shot.

It was obvious even the NFL couldn't stomach the way the Cowboys were treated.

Johnson told the NFL what it wanted to hear, that he would never do it again.

But he saw the tapes and the tapes didn't lie.

Johnson was so drained by the experience that he ran out of gas two blocks deep into a normal mile run on Monday.

"I guess I didn't have any energy left," Johnson said.

Is there a double standard in the NFL? Do the top teams get the calls and the bottom teams get the shaft? Johnson isn't sure.

"The way I approach it is that when we become a top team in the league, if that's the standard then we will benefit," Johnson said.

"Right now we have to be good enough to overcome the breaks. We're not at the level where we can get bad breaks and overcome them."

Johnson doesn't question anyone's integrity.

"I don't mean to come down hard on officials and their commitment," Johnson said. "I know they love this game like the coaches do. But we all need to work together more."

Of course, officials are just part-time employees of the NFL. They are lawyers, engineers, high

school principals, etc.

Should the NFL go the expensive route and hire fulltime officials?

"I don't have the answer," Johnson said.

Owner Jerry Jones said it will probably never happen.

"We are perfectly happy that officials work hard and are honest," Jones said. "I do think instant replay could help them out more. We've got to find other ways to use instant replay to help them."

Johnson said better use of replay would help.

"I'm in more favor of instant replay than when I came into the league," he said. "I feel it can be improved. I don't want to see a call effect the outcome of a game if it can be improved."

Johnson just wants equal justice from the flagmen. A level field from the men in stripes.

He's learning that in the NFL respect comes only after you've earned it.

It can be an emotionally draining experience.

# Gunshot wound paralyzes prep guard

 DALLAS (AP) - The A. Maceo Smith Falcons are opening the basketball season without senior point guard Cecil Medlin.

Around 10 p.m. Sept. 30, Medlin was shot in the neck by an unknown assailant while he and four of his cousins were walking from the State Fair of Texas to telephone someone to take them home. The shooting, which occurred on a dark street near Fair Park, was unprovoked and has left Medlin paralyzed from the shoulders down.

Medlin's mother, Marilyn, said doctors told her that barring a miracle he will never walk again. She is incensed that her son has become an innocent victim and that police have uncovered no leads in the case.

Detective Stan Southall, who is working the case, said no arrests have been made because no eyewitnesses have stepped forward. He does not believe the gunman knew Medlin, and he would not say what type of gun was used.

"Until someone can come forward and give some kind of testimony that would identify an assailant, then there's not much that can happen," Southall said Monday. "If you don't have someone you can charge with a crime, you're up against a brick wall."

Marilyn Medlin believes someone saw something and that if the gunman were found, that would begin to put the pieces back together on a tragedy which has shattered her family's life. "There's been a lot of nights I lay

awake crying wondering why," she said. "I know everything has a reason for happening, but I haven't found the reason yet. Why him? Why couldn't it have been me?"

"I've practically lived my life - he's just starting his. I would rather it have been me than him."

Medlin's parents are divorced. He is the youngest of five children - the other four are out on their own - and he lives with his mother.

Medlin, 17, said he and his cousins have no idea where the gunshots came from, or who fired them. Medlin said he heard at least two shots - and he was struck by a single bullet.

"We just heard the shots," Medlin said. "We didn't see anything. No cars. Nobody. We just heard the shots."

"I think (the gunman) was hiding somewhere - and just shot. I don't know why it happened to me. I guess it's just part of life."

This is the second consecutive year a varsity basketball player from A. Maceo Smith saw his sports career ended by a bullet wound. Fourteen months ago, Stacey Woodson, a Falcons post player, was paralyzed from the waist down during an accidental shooting.

"(Woodson) got shot messing around with a gun," A. Maceo Smith coach Rodney Shropshire said. "He thought the gun was empty, and it happened to have a bullet in it."

It's difficult for Shropshire to understand why anyone would do harm to Medlin. Shropshire said Medlin never gave him any trouble.

"Cecil was the leader of our team," Shropshire said of the 5-9 point guard who averaged 10 points and five assists last season. "He's the one guy that could interpret what we were trying to do."

"The frustrating part about Cecil is he was just walking down the street minding his own business. He had a pretty good head on his shoulders, and he was a really good ballplayer."

So good that Shropshire had hopes of Medlin receiving a college scholarship after this season. So good that Shropshire and his assistant coaches voted Medlin the most valuable player of the Falcons' 1990-91 team.

Derrick Hart started in the backcourt with Medlin last year. The team upset highly regarded Lincoln once, and Hart, a 5-8 junior, had high hopes of teaming with Medlin and helping to make the Falcons a surprise playoff participant from District 10-4A this season.

Now, this.

"You expect this to happen to somebody else besides Cecil," said Hart, a close friend of Medlin. "Bad things happen to bad people - not to good people."

"It was a tragedy what happened to him. He doesn't bother anybody."

After more than a month of physical and occupational therapy, Medlin was released from Parkland Memorial Hospital Nov. 8. His physical therapist at Parkland, Shawn Furr, said, "His spinal cord was completely injured."

Some close to Medlin said he has yet to face the reality of the situation - that he might never walk again. They

say he has yet to express the anger, emotion and bitterness that accompanies a life-altering incident such as his.

"He has to be taught a whole new way of life from a wheelchair standpoint," Furr said. "He can use his arms and his wrist and fingers to a certain degree."

"He's determined. He wants to go to college; he wants to finish high school. I see him progressing as much as he can progress from a wheelchair standpoint."

Medlin had worked at a pizza parlor for about three weeks before he was shot. He had yet to receive his initial check.

Now, his mother said she doesn't know how she is going to pay the hospital bill.

"This has turned our life all the way around," she said. "I feel like I'm in a dream and can't wake up. I want to wake up, but I just can't."

Medlin has kept his spirits up. "This hasn't gotten me down," Medlin said. "I'm OK. I'm going to deal with it. It didn't make me depressed."

In his final day at Parkland, Medlin was dressed in gray sweat pants and Michael Jordan sneakers. He knows what the doctors and physical therapist have said.

"To me, I think I will (walk again)," Medlin said. "I'm not going to worry about what they say."

Marilyn Medlin somberly said: "This (shooting) was for no reason whatsoever. I'm still hostile toward it."

"It's a bitter pill to swallow. But we're praying that a miracle happens."

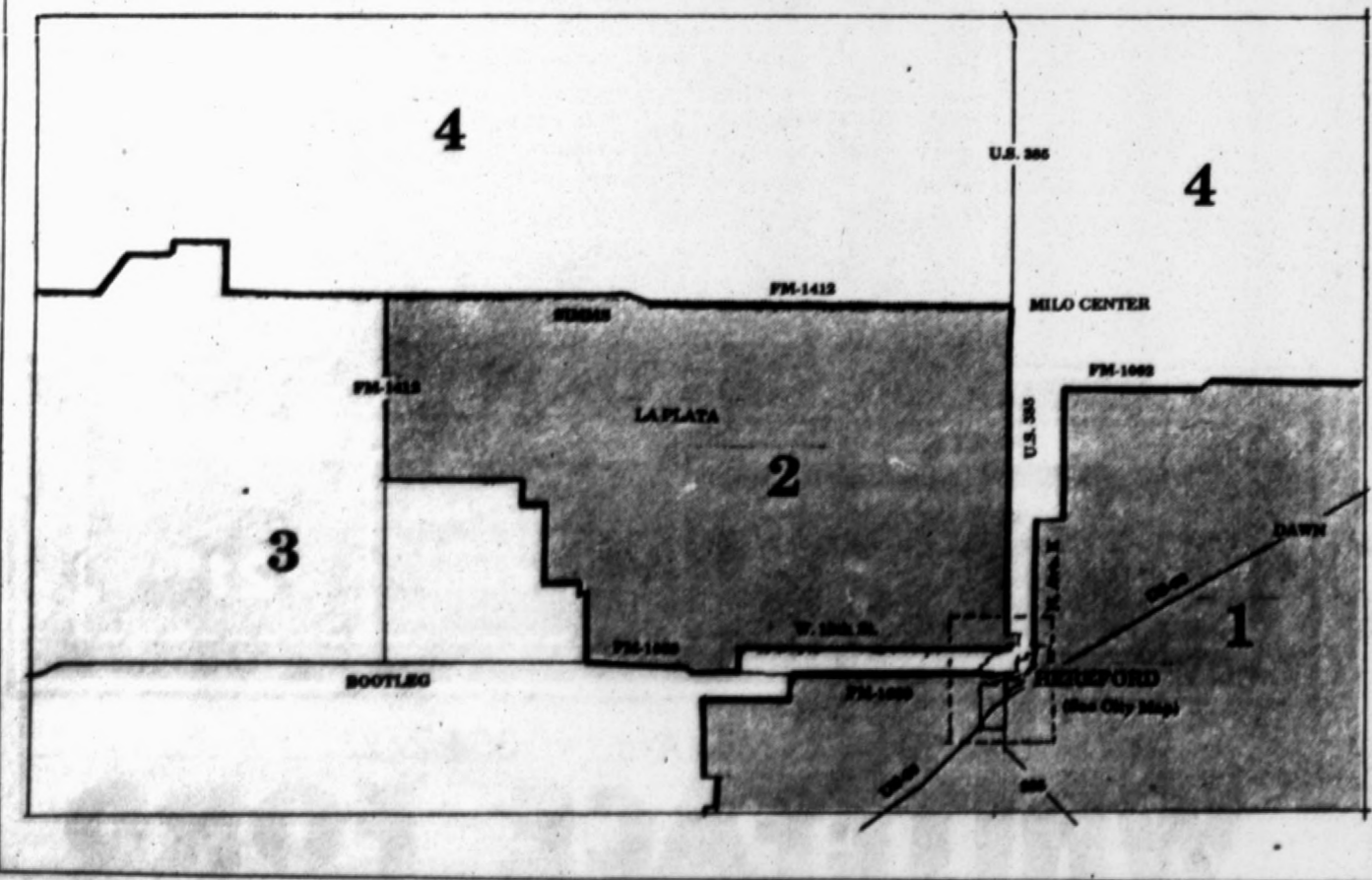
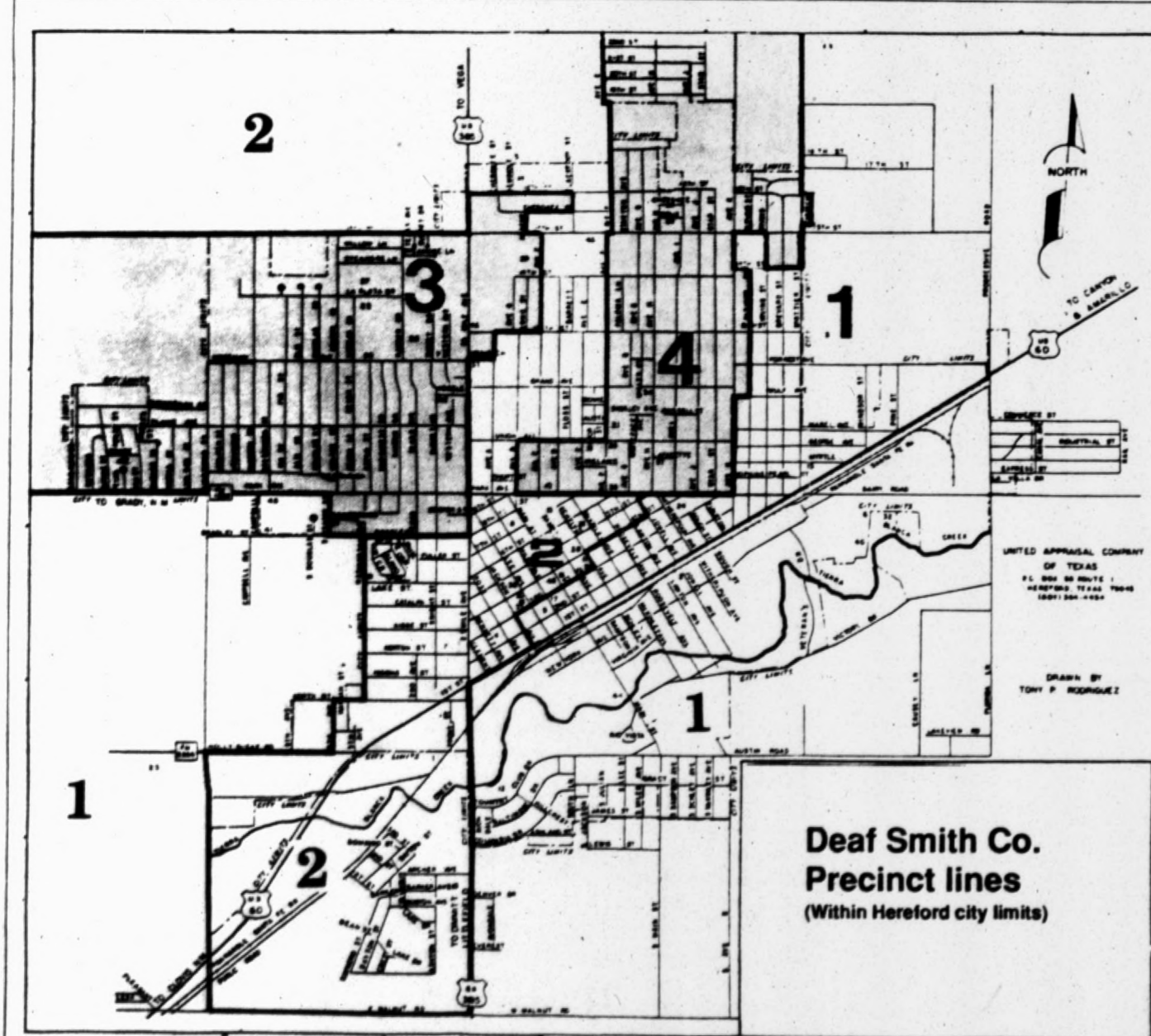


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

# Nocona Nugget helped start UT tradition

 NOCONA, Texas (AP) - Entering the building that houses Jean's Men's Bible Class, the visitor first spies the huge metal cross sitting on the desk near the back wall. The cross is 3 feet high and weighs enough to strain the average back.

"One of our members made it for us," says the small, cheery man who is the proprietor, caretaker, founder and inspiration of the place. "We were gonna put it out front, then we thought maybe we'd put it on the roof. We haven't decided yet, so it's just been sitting there on my desk ever since the guy brought it in."

"That was...oh, five, six years ago..."  
 There is not a great sense of urgency among these men who have met for a 30-minute lesson every Sunday for 13 years, carrying time and memories - the way others carry pocket change.

They come here for solace and fellowship, and have just spent nine years on a leisurely stroll through the New Testament. For some, it has been the only contact with a church in their lifetime.

The friendly man with the big cross on his desk opened Bible Class in April, 1978 - just after his wife, Jean, was killed when the wall of a building collapsed. Those who have lost all but their memories are welcome here.

But if you seek memories of a different sort, the host will bring you the weathered copy of Life magazine dated Nov. 17, 1941. The cover is adorned by 14 members of the University of Texas football team - the unbeaten and presumably invincible legions of Dana Xenophon Bible, who have captured the imagination of a nation edgy over an impending war.

Pictured on that cover are young men whose names are still legendary in UT football lore - Pete Layden, Chal Daniel, Mal Kutner, Spec Sanders, Noble Doss. And the

whirlwind tailback they called the "Nocona Nugget," the man Bible once credited with forging a new path for UT football, a man who through the space of a half-century remains one of the most legendary Longhorns of them all - Jack Crain.

"It was a long time ago," says Crain, who will be 72 in January.

But in this town of 3,000 eight miles south of the Red River in Montague County, they remember the legend of Jack Crain like it all happened yesterday.

Sometimes called the "boot capital of the world," the town is also home to the Nocona Athletic Goods Co. - a famed manufacturer of baseball gloves, among other things - where vice president Bobby Storey will invite you in and show you the 50-year-old Princeton Model helmet - made of rawhide - that Crain wore, grudgingly, at UT.

"I preferred not to wear headgear," he says, eyeing the thing suspiciously, "but they had this special made, so it wouldn't ride down the back of my neck."

Also on display is the football inscribed with the score of the last game the '41 team played - the day before Pearl Harbor - a 71-7 lashing of Oregon that served as the team's "bowl game."

Up at the school, the trophy case contains a picture of Crain with an old UT classmate, future governor John Connally, and the current Nocona High players at Jack Crain Field.

All of it is a tribute to a legend that began in the autumn of 1936, when the Nocona Indians beat mighty Wichita Falls with a 145-pound single-wing tailback who was destined to score 258 points during the season.

"We had a pretty good team," Crain says of the squad that whipped Moran, 64-0, and Burkburnett, 46-14, in the Class B playoffs, which went only two rounds in those days. "Things were a little different then.

"Our field was out there about a mile outside of town, and we'd walk out there and back every day at practice. Then, on game day, they'd go out there and mark off the yard lines and the cars would pull up around the field in a circle."

"In those days, when you went on the field, you took it all with you. It wasn't unusual to play 60 minutes, both ways."

Down in Austin, meanwhile, Bible was laboriously trying to rebuild a tattered program. So he sent trusted assistant Blair Cherry north to woo the mighty mite from Nocona.

Bible realized he was onto something when Crain's freshman team (1938) kept beating the varsity.

Bible, Crain recalls, "was pretty much a perfectionist, I guess you'd say. In those days we called our own plays on the field, but he would give us sequences he wanted us to set up. He was easy to play for - hardly ever raised his voice, except maybe if someone was cussing, and he was fairly lenient on off field discipline. But he was a great coach and leader and could get you to do just about anything."

In later years Bible often pointed to one play - a 67-yard screen pass to Crain that beat Arkansas, 14-13, in '39 - as the moment the Texas program turned the corner into the "modern" era as a winner. A play, Crain says, that was partly luck.

"Our quarterback, Johnny Gill, made it up in the huddle," he says. "They'd been kicking us around all day and we were lucky to win. But we went on to have our first winning season in several years, so I guess it was a big deal."

Crain was injured for much of the 1940 season, but he recovered in time to take part in a glorious finish - when Texas A&M's defending national champions rolled into Austin riding a 19-game winning streak.

"They had John Kimbrough, an

All-American who was so big and strong you could hardly tackle him, and they were Rose Bowl-bound," Crain recalls. "But we spoiled it all by beating them, 7-0."

"On the first play from scrimmage, Layden threw a pass to me that worked for 40 yards to their 35 - and then Doss came back to the huddle saying he was open past the safety down and out. So we threw to him, and they pulled him down on the 1-yard line. Then Layden scored, with less than a minute gone in the game. For the rest of the day, it was scoreless."

"A&M moved up and down the field with this spread formation of theirs, but every time they got close to the goal, they'd shift into the Notre Dame Box and we could bottle them up. I've never understood why they did that."

In '41, it was the Longhorns' turn to contend for the national title, and by the time the Life layout was shot, they had ripped six teams in succession - Colorado (34-6), LSU (34-0), Oklahoma (40-7), Arkansas (48-14), Rice (40-0), SMU (34-0) - and seemed unstoppable, with a healthy Crain leading the way.

But by the time the magazine piece actually ran, they had stumbled - in a 7-7 tie with Baylor.

"It was as bad as a loss," Crain recalls.

The next Saturday was worse, as the 'Horns were upset by TCU, 14-7.

The loss and tie ruined what had been a glorious season and handed the conference title and Cotton Bowl spot to Texas A&M. On Thanksgiving, the Horns vented their frustration by crushing the Aggies, 23-0, and then routed Oregon in the 71-7 game.

"I've always heard that the Rose Bowl people were still willing to take us, but they wanted us to cancel the Oregon game, which was played in

Austin," Crain says. "Bible felt it had been a great team that had turned the program around for good, and the home fans deserved to see it one last time."

"So we missed the Rose Bowl by playing the game. The date was Dec. 6. By the next day, bowl games didn't seem very important anymore."

"Bruce Cabot and some other people had come down for the game and invited about six or seven of us to go deer hunting the next day. But before we got 20 miles out of Austin, we started hearing about Pearl Harbor. Most of us didn't even know where it was."

"We all stayed in school long enough to complete our work for graduation - those of us with the necessary classroom work were let go about a month early by the professors - and then I went into the Navy."

Crain spent the next four-plus years in air-sea rescue in the Pacific, then returned for a one-year fling at pro ball with the Miami Seahawks of the All-America Conference.

Crain tried a year of law school, which he decided was not for him.

Eventually, he went to work as an appraiser for the Texas Veteran's Land Board, then branched out into other business ventures. He spent six years (1960-66) in the state legislature, then he and Jean - whom he had married in 1951 - settled into raising cattle on a ranch outside of Nocona. And there he has remained.

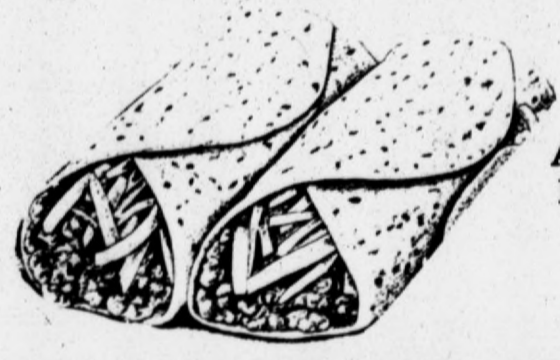
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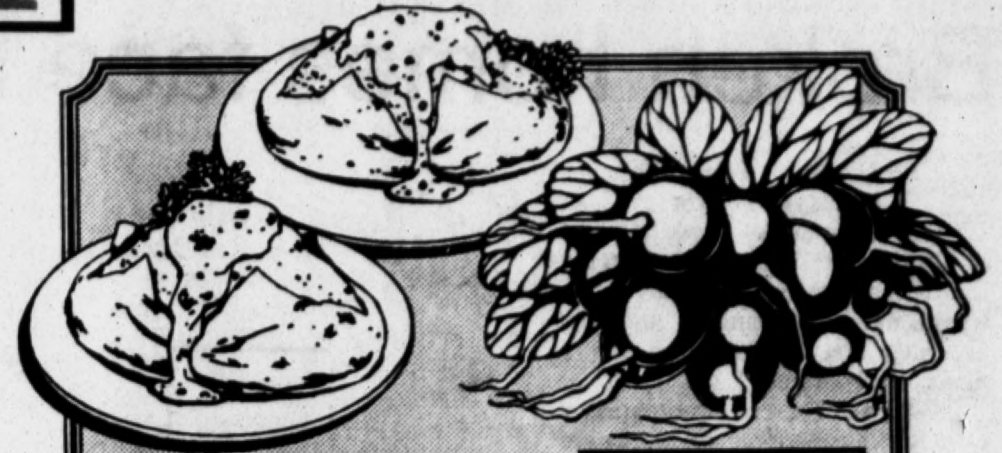

## Broken homes face unusual holiday, family challenges

Traditions are an important part of holiday family fun, but when the family is separated or divorced, traditions are changed and the holidays can be anything but a pleasant experience.

Making the best of the situation is what families with broken homes are forced to do.

There are a lot of emotions that parents and children of broken homes must deal with during the holidays that are unique to their everyday lifestyles.

"Children feel a loss because the traditional setting and people they are around are different," said Bluebonnet School Counselor Elva Devers, who attended a seminar on the effects of holidays and divorced families at Cedar Creek Hospital in Amarillo recently. "Children feel anxiety when they see relatives in different places and having two separate households and sets of rules."

The seminar Devers attended was given by Dr. Christine Archambault, co-founder of Divorced Anonymous and Dr. Allen Adler who is a psychiatrist.

"Many children become depressed and saddened because the things they are used to aren't the same anymore," said Devers, speaking from her seminar notes. "Although it is a 'should not' in a divorce relationship, children often become nervous about having the parent quiz them about the other parent or use them as messengers."

"Some children feel they don't know enough about what is going on and others are burdened with knowing too much."

Although the pain of divorce runs deep, parents must put off their differences while the children are around.

"If the children hear arguing or fighting it creates a tension when the parents continue their warfare. Also, children resent not being able to choose who they are visiting for the holidays."

Sometimes the focus of bad holidays is put all on the child, but the hardships are equally devastating to the parents.

"Parents feel many of the same pains as the children," Devers said. "It is hard for parents to feel the pain of the loss of an old lifestyle. The holidays make you think happy and people think you're happy when you are depressed inside."

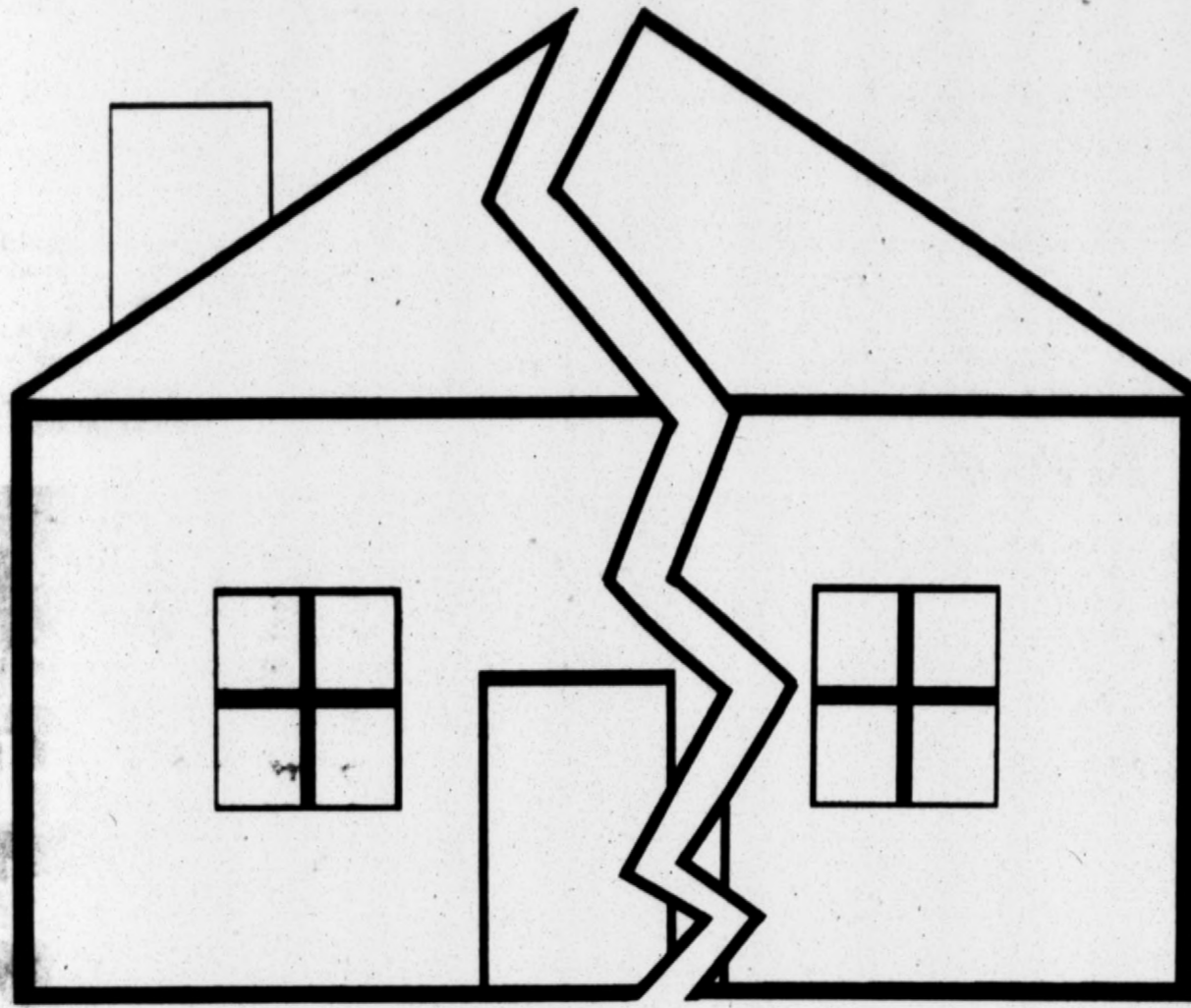
"Parents feel alone during this time and experience anxiety over having the children visit the other spouse."

During the hard times, parents need to be searching for solutions to their own problems and help their children cope with the troubles they are experiencing.

"Children need to feel as much structure and stability as possible. They need to know what is going on to avoid being caught by surprise."

"The younger the child is, with structure, the more adaptable he is. Structure refers to the kids being informed of what is going on and what they're doing and with who."

Some of the things suggested at the seminar to improve the holiday situation include visiting or spending the holidays with aunts, uncles and cousins; starting new traditions; do new things, places to see and eating without overwhelming the child; finding spiritual support; do things



together that bond.

Other suggestions include examining the family structure. The presenters of the seminar felt it was a good idea to separate the children during the holidays. Their reasoning was because the kids spend so much time together it is not harmful to separate them during the holidays and it allows each parent to be with at least one child. If the parents live in the same city, they suggested the children spend Christmas Eve with one of the parents and Christmas Day with the other.

They caution parents not to entertain the entire time and offer one thrill after another; rather, be sensitive to what the children enjoy.

Gift-giving should be a time of sharing joy with the child, not trying to buy their love.

"Gifts should be within the parent's budget," said Devers. "The best gifts are those that will be remembered all year such as a

magazine subscription or a membership in a book club.

"Parents must be tolerant of the other's gift. Don't criticize the other spouses' gift."

At a time when depression dominates one's life, it is easy to not take proper care of yourself, but care is important to recovery.

"It is important to take care of yourself during the bad times," said Devers. "Proper diet and exercise are vital to being able to cope with what is going on around you."

"Parents should watch their telephone calls during their times of depression. It is easy to just pick up the phone and call someone and run up your bill."

"It is best to not go to a movie alone or shopping. These can cause depression and excessive spending to ease the pain."

"Parents should not expect to heal in a short period of time, it can take years and years to cope with what is going on."

Parents should be aware of how their actions affect the children.

"If a parent is concerned with

something that the other spouse is doing, it is best to help them with education. Supply the children with 800 numbers they can call when they feel the situation is getting bad. This gives the children some control when the situation is completely out of their control.

"Parents should not air their conflicts during the holidays or 'mix camps.' Don't associate with the other spouse or the other spouse's family during the holidays. This gives the child a false sense of hope that the family is getting back together and it can stir up old feelings."

"Parents should not be afraid to get counseling or therapy," said Devers. "People who can't handle it alone need to talk with someone. If necessary they should call their doctor and get medication to get through the holidays."

The holidays don't have to be a hard time on divorced families. If the parents would work together and set aside their personal interests and keep the best interests of the child or children in mind at all times, the holidays can be a happy time again.

ATLANTA (AP) - Not all hardwoods are hard, some softwoods aren't soft - and knowing which is which can make a difference when selecting wood for a fireplace, according to a forest products company.

Experts at the Georgia-Pacific Corp. explain that trees are classified by their leaves, not their density. Softwoods usually are evergreens with needles or scale-like leaves, while hardwoods have broad leaves.

For the most heat per cord, they advise, select dense woods like hickory, oak and beech, which are hardwoods, or yew, a softwood.

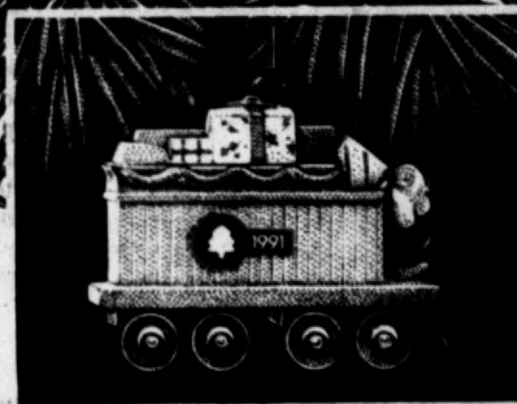

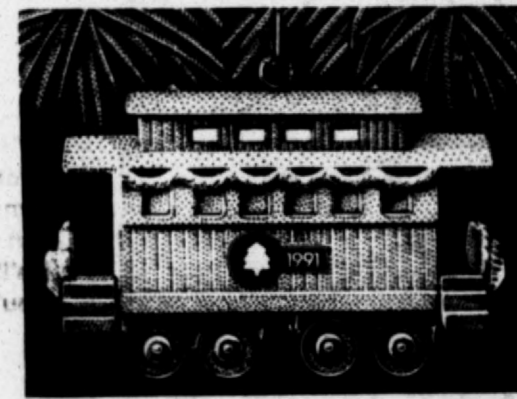

- A theme basket of wines and gifts custom-prepared by your local wine shop. The Wine Information and News Exchange, an industry group, suggests picking different wines from one maker and adding appropriate food or theme gifts. For example, a

selection of Italian wines could be packed with pastas, olive oil, sun-dried tomatoes and other edibles into a basket from Italy.

- A bottle of Jack Daniels Tennessee whiskey, packed in a holiday tin box with an old-fashioned distiller's thermometer.

- A beer sampler from around the world, packaged by Guinness, with brews from England, Ireland, Canada, Mexico and Czechoslovakia.

- And if you or your recipient prefers bourbon, sip while you peruse the "Jim Beam Holly Jolly Juggling Guide," a booklet of advice, much of it tongue-in-cheek, on getting through the holidays.

- They're still taking orders at Aberlour Distillery for the gift you won't touch for another eight years. A cask of 360 bottles of single malt scotch whisky timed to mature with the millennium (New Year's Eve, 1999) awaits the patient owners of the \$3,000 casks. Meanwhile, there is a tasting kit this year, annual reports on progress from the company, and an invitation to visit the distillery to check on your investment as it ages.

them. Make sure the box is shallow enough for them to climb in and out of and keep the litter clean.

The box should be washed about once a week with mild detergent and water. Don't use strong-smelling disinfectants because the odor may keep them away. The best thing for mama and the babies to make them thrive is good old TLC. Good luck! — Heloise

## Extension News

### BEVERLY HARDER County Extension Agent-HE HOLIDAY WORKERS

During the holiday quarter, November-December, retail merchants tend to hire more part-time workers. These workers may be students who just need the money, homemakers wanting to generate extra cash for family gifts to senior citizens wanting to supplement their income.

Faces may be different among the workers, but hurried holiday shoppers have different behavior. When dealing with the public, workers need to remind themselves of some common courtesies customers expect:

- \*Be friendly.
- \*Ask to assist customers find merchandise.
- \*Be alert to shoplifters; merchants can't afford to lose profits and keep prices down.
- \*Try to keep a positive attitude, even when customers try your patience.

\*Be accurate. Double check change you give, as well as entries into the computer.

\*When in doubt about anything, ask a regular employee for help.

\*Be neat and appropriately dressed for your job.

\*Be on time; work your full shift.

\*When seasonal work is finished, express appreciation to your supervisor or employer for letting you work.

Part-time workers may want full-time work after the holiday season.

Use a part-time job to prove your value as a worker and you can usually be assured of a good recommendation for your next job. Good work skills, a positive attitude and commitment to an employer are skills sought by the best firms. Holiday work may bring you the gift of a good job.

Educational programs conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service serve people of all ages regardless of socioeconomic level, race, color, sex, religion, handicap or national origin.

## Holiday bird picking, cooking tips offered

**Picking the Bird**  
- Plan on three-quarters of a pound per serving if the turkey is more than 12 pounds; 1 pound per serving if the bird weighs 12 pounds or less.  
- Buy fresh turkey one or two days before you plan to cook it. Check the "sell by" date on the label of fresh turkey; this is the last day the turkey should be sold.

**Food Safety**  
- Always defrost a frozen turkey completely before cooking it. Never let poultry thaw at room temperature; bacteria that cause food poisoning grow at this temperature.  
- After handling raw poultry, always wash your hands, utensils and work surfaces with hot, soapy water to prevent spreading bacteria to other foods.

- Use acrylic cutting boards instead of wooden cutting boards; wooden cutting boards are too difficult to

wash thoroughly.  
- To thaw safely, place the turkey in its original wrapping on a tray in the refrigerator, estimating 24 hours of thawing time for every 5 pounds. Keep the raw turkey in the refrigerator until you're ready to cook it.  
- Use separate dishes for raw and cooked poultry.

**Poultry Preparation**  
- Remove the neck from the body cavity and giblets from the neck cavity. Rinse the turkey inside and out under cold running water; pat dry. Twist wing tips under back; tie legs and tail together securely, or tuck legs under band of skin. Brush with cooking oil and lightly season inside and out with salt and pepper.

- Insert an oven-proof meat thermometer into the center of the thickest part of the thigh, not touching the bone, or use an instant-read thermometer to check internal

temperature of turkey.  
**To Grill**  
- Place a heavy-duty aluminum foil drip pan in the center of the lower grate of a charcoal grill. The drip pan should be slightly larger than the turkey.

- Pile an equal number of charcoal briquets on each side of the drip pan.  
- Ignite the briquets; leave the lid off the grill until coals have a light coating of gray ash, about 25 to 30 minutes.

- Position the turkey, breast side up, in the center of the cooking grate directly above the drip pan. Place the lid on the grill and maintain a temperature high enough so that the turkey heats beyond 140 degrees F internally within 4 hours. Don't forget to add charcoal to each side every hour while grilling.

- No peeking! Every time the grill is uncovered, heat escapes, potential-

ly adding to grilling time. With the lid on, heat evenly circulates around the food, much like a convection oven, so turning the bird is unnecessary.

- Cook until the meat thermometer registers 180 degrees F and the drumsticks move easily in their sockets. Remove turkey from the grill; let stand 15 to 20 minutes for easier carving.

- Stuffing may be baked in a disposable foil pan on the grill alongside the turkey during the last 30 to 45 minutes of cooking time.

- To maintain freshness, refrigerate the turkey within 2 hours of cooking. Meat should be removed from the bone, then wrapped securely in plastic wrap, waxed paper, aluminum foil, or an airtight container. The turkey can be refrigerated for up to 3 days; or up to 2 months in the freezer.

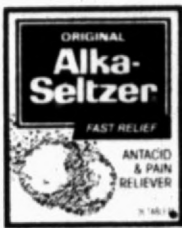

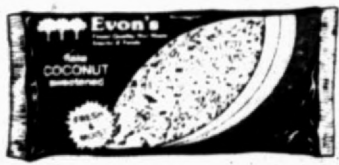

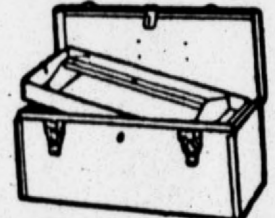

Can you help us or send us information on what to do?

**DEAR READER:** It sounds like he has sleep apnea — periods of stopping breathing, along with snoring when breathing resumes. Loud snoring is a frequent sign. It most often occurs in overweight middle-aged men. It is often associated with high blood pressure and may cause a heart attack. During the periods when such an individual is not breathing, the oxygen content in the blood falls, sometimes to very low levels. That can affect the heart, particularly if a person already has heart disease — which is common in overweight middle-aged American males.

Overweight individuals — which includes women — may have so much fat around the neck area that it contributes to obstruction of the airway when lying down. And there may also be a brain factor involved in some cases. The problem of obstruction of the throat area has given rise to surgery, the cutting away of tissue folds in the back of the throat, as one means of treatment. In others, a tracheostomy, making a hole in the

windpipe below the voice box, is used so air can get into and out of the lungs while sleeping.

Sleep apnea may cause fatigue the following day.

Today most such cases are treated with continuous positive airway pressure (CPAP). A mask is fitted over the nose and provides a continuous flow of air under pressure through the nose, keeping the throat open. It, and other treatments, are discussed in the issue I am sending you.

**DEAR DR. LAMB:** What is the cytomegalovirus? My doctor did blood tests while I was extremely ill and said I had cytomegalovirus mononucleosis. I still do not feel that great, and it has been four months. The last time I was there he said it should have nothing to do with the way I feel now.

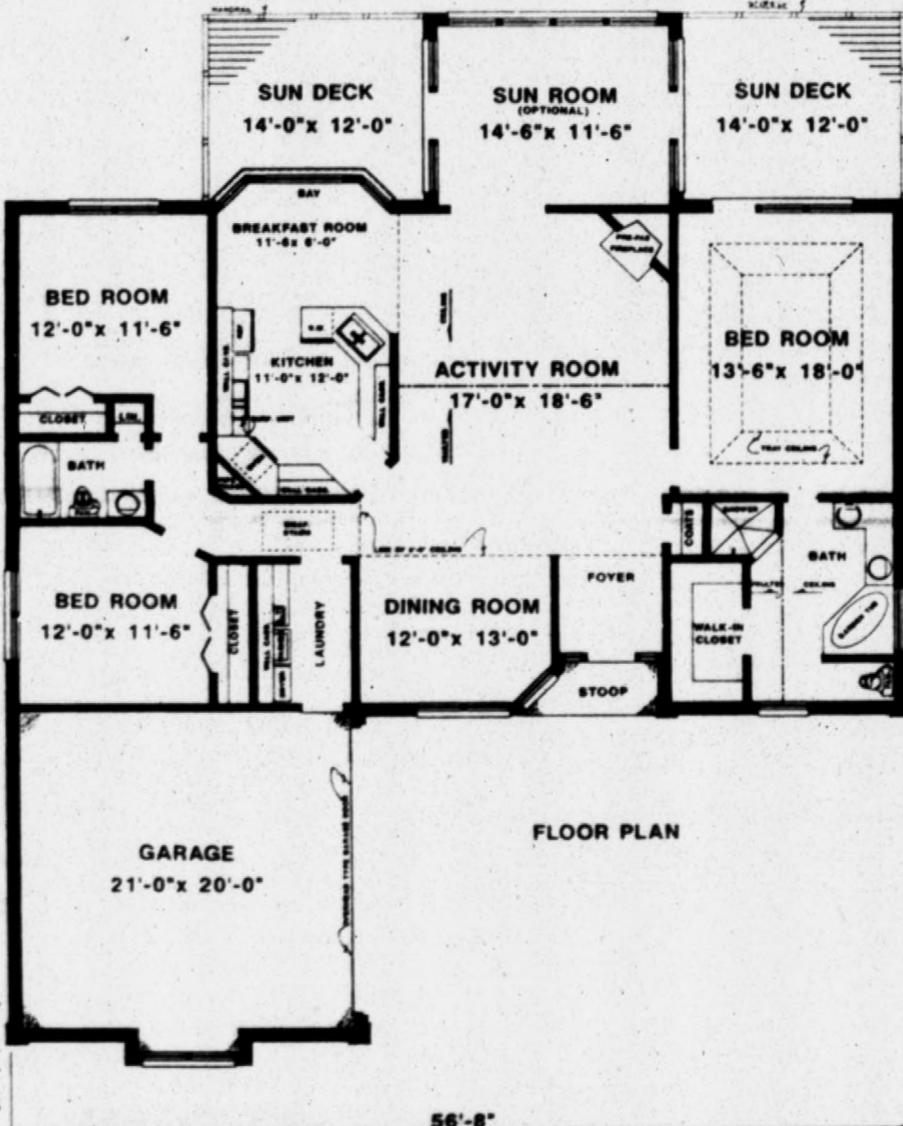

## Question-Answer

Q. - My wife and I are doing extensive renovation on our summer home. We have most projects pretty well in hand, but one of the toughest jobs we find is driving nails in concrete. Do you have any tips that can help us in this area?

A. - There's no getting around it, driving concrete nails is difficult work. If you have a lot of nailing to do, you can rent power equipment that will make the job go considerably easier. In any event, here are a few pro tricks that will help you with almost any nailing job you have.

The first tip is to use a 2-pound mash hammer when driving concrete nails. Carpenter's hammers are not intended for driving hardened steel nails or tools, and the lightweight carpenter's hammer - usually 16 ounces - is too light for driving nails into concrete.

Another tip is to use a masonry bit and predrill holes through the wood piece and into the concrete wall or

floor. You can have good success if you're driving nails into concrete that is less than one year old. Older concrete is very dense, and it is almost impossible to get a nail into it without predrilling an undersized hole, then driving the concrete nail.

If you are fastening wood to concrete block walls, drive the nails into the mortar joints, not into the block. The hollow cores of the concrete block will just collapse if you try to drive a nail into them. The mortar joint offers a solid masonry nailing surface that will hold a nail. You may prefer to use flat, or cut, concrete nails for nailing into mortar joints between concrete block, and use ordinary round concrete nails for nailing wall sole plates into concrete slab floors.

The development of construction adhesive has been a real plus for difficult fastening jobs. Apply a bead of construction adhesive to any piece of wood before nailing the wood to concrete. The adhesive bead will help bridge over any irregular spots in the concrete, and will allow you to fasten with fewer nails.

### Series archives virtual treasure trove

To paraphrase George Orwell's axiom from his *1984*, who controls the syndication rights to television of the past controls television of the future.

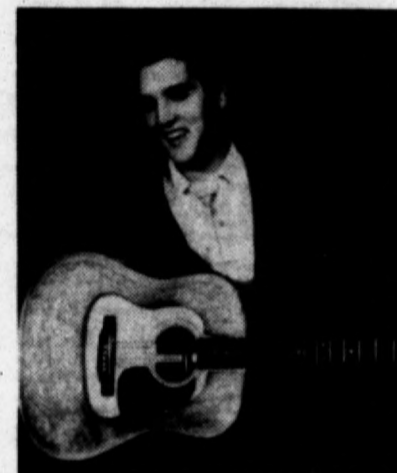
Network television occasionally produces a series that shines like a gem among the dull stones of its bleak wasteland, and these exceptions are granted an indefinite afterlife in syndicated reruns, sometimes earning a sad reunion special or even an anniversary resurrection.

In late November 1991, CBS falls back on its brighter moments for a three-day Classic Weekend, offering *Bob Newhart* and *M\*A\*S\*H* anniversaries, plus *The Very Best of The Ed Sullivan Show II*, which airs Sunday, Nov. 24.

Ed Sullivan's "very best" was the best of television in general. For the 23-year run of his show, between 1948 and 1971, Sullivan owned Sunday night. His was the definitive variety show, a cornucopia of acts which brought the family together by providing entertainment for all tastes and ages.

Although Sullivan's wooden mannerisms and awkward delivery make him the antithesis of the modern television host, he was the greatest showman since P.T. Barnum. He introduced American audiences to foreign performers they otherwise would not have seen. And many a Hollywood star took his or her first televised bow on Sullivan's stage: Bob Hope, Walt Disney, Dinah Shore, Eddie Fisher, and the meteoric comedy team of Dean Martin and Jerry Lewis.

Elvis Presley had appeared on television before, but it was his Sullivan appearance (shot from his waist up for reasons of propriety) that opened the door for superstardom and cult worship. And there is an entire generation that vividly remembers where they

were on the night of Feb. 9, 1964 — tuned in to the Sullivan show for the TV debut of The Beatles.

*The Very Best of The Ed Sullivan Show II* was produced by one of the industry's best guides for archival journeys, Andrew Solt, whose impressive list of credits includes *Imagine: John Lennon, Remembering Marilyn, This Is Elvis* and *It Came From Hollywood*, as well as many of the Jacques Cousteau specials.

In the Nov. 24 special, about 65 performers are featured in clips averaging one minute in length. Besides a few headliners like The Beatles, The Rolling Stones and Presley, who appeared in the first special, this edition carries an "all-new" lineup.

Enjoy once again musical greats Nat King Cole, Johnny Mathis, The Fifth Dimension, The Byrds, Lovin' Spoonful, Creedence Clearwater Revival, Roy Orbison and Jackie Wilson; including animal trainer Clyde Beatty, whose loss of control over his big cats drove Sullivan into the audience.



**Up-and-coming Daley tees off for the Skins**

Golf's rising star John Daley goes up against three of the best ever to play the game on Saturday and Sunday, Nov. 30 and Dec. 1, when ABC presents live coverage of the ninth Skins Game from La Quinta, Calif.

Daley, the youngest player ever to take part in the Skins Game, tees up against two-time defending champion Curtis Strange, U.S. Open winner Payne Stewart and Jack Nicklaus, the PGA's Golfer of the Century and winner of this year's U.S. Senior Open.

Daley became the hottest story in golf earlier this year with a storybook finish in the PGA Championship. The 25-year-old tour rookie was added to the 151-man field as the ninth alternate less than 24 hours before tee time. He put on a long-drive exhibition to walk away with the \$230,000 first prize. Daley ranks first in driving distance on the PGA tour with a 287-yard average on his tee shots.

Strange, who will be going after his third Skins title in four tries, has pocketed nearly \$500,000 in his past two appearances.

Hall of Famer Nicklaus is the only golfer to take part in all nine Skins Games. He captured the 1984 event by winning \$240,000 on one hole and ranks second only to Fuzzy Zoeller on the Skins Game earnings list. The colorful Stewart, who was third on the PGA money list last year, is making his first Skins appearance.

# LET'S TALK

### 'Madeleine in London' is a holiday treat

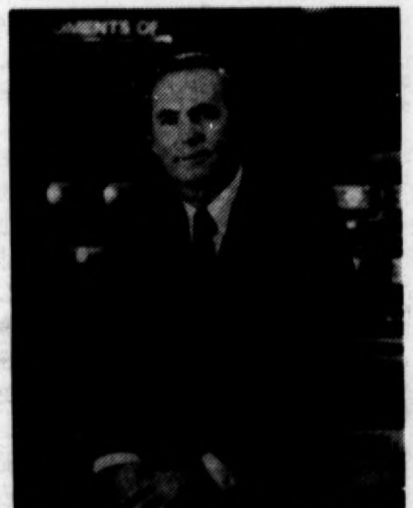

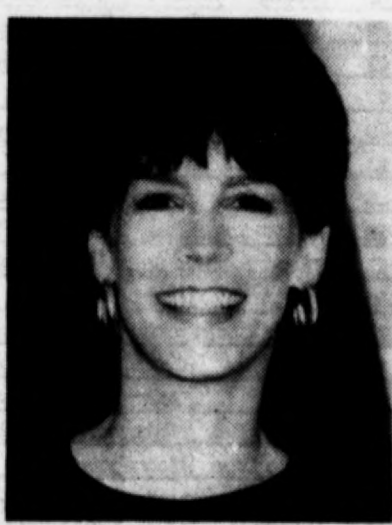

# 'Dame Edna' is coming, 'Dame Edna' is coming!

Will she leave state-side audiences at sea?

Ever since 1607, a constant stream of British colonists, militiamen, rock stars, dog trainers ("Walkies!!") and comedians has washed up on these shores. Responses have been mixed. William Penn, The Beatles and Monty Python were warmly received, while King George's men never stood a chance.

On Saturday, Nov. 30, NBC gambles with Dame Edna Everage, a high-toned edition of that staple of British comedy, the man in drag. Dame Edna, who is said never to step out of character, even in private, began her career as a confidante of the rich and famous some 20 years ago in her native Australia.

With a wardrobe from the House of Liberace and a warmly condescending interview technique like that of a dinner-at-eight Church Lady, Dame

Edna chats up everyone from pop singer LuLu to Lauren Bacall. In *Dame Edna's Hollywood*, her first special for American television, she shares her couch with Bea Arthur, Larry Hagman and Cher. Fellow-Aussie Mel Gibson makes an appearance via the Dame's front-door security camera. While the juxtaposition of the shimmering Dame Edna with the manish Arthur is certainly food for thought, the other segments mostly fall flat. Americans have never excelled at the British art of trading exquisite banalities.

But Dame Edna does not permit lulls in the conversation. If she senses a guest is not equal to the challenge, she simply takes over, cooing and rhapsodizing and girl-talking up a storm.

"I'm like Barbara Walters with a sense of humor," she notes with a characteristic, razor-edged charity. "I call it vitamin L, for laughter."

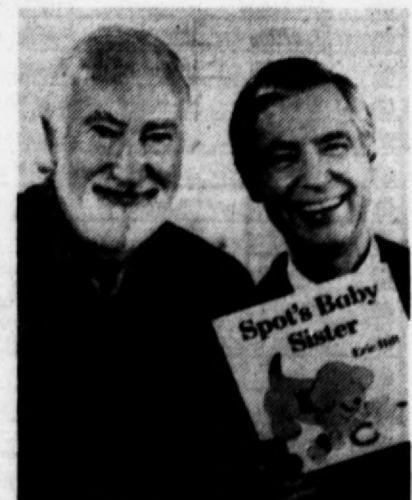

# HAVE FUN at the Movies

EXCELLENT GOOD FAIR POOR DON'T WASTE MONEY

**ALL I WANT FOR CHRISTMAS:** Starring Harley Jane Kozak, Jamey Sheridan, Ethan Randall, Kevin Nealon, Thora Birch, and Lauren Bacall. Every Christmas season needs a feel-good family movie like this one. It is a connect the dots, tri-generational story, about well-meaning, mischievous children with such youthful exuberance and clarity of vision that they don't understand that some things might be impossible: like uniting divorced parents in time for Christmas.

The production has an old-fashioned, filmed-on-the-back-lot look to it that fits right in with the fairy-tale plotting. Everything and everyone is perfect; perfect people with perfect attitudes who live in picture-perfect apartments and cavort in perfect snowfalls. There's even the perfect Santa. This is a movie that can't miss because it's basically a good story with a good moral. It is a well-directed film with good production values that hold the attention (on different levels) of children and adults. But most of all

it is well-acted. Harley Jane Kozak and Jamey Sheridan are very believable as the estranged parents. Ethan Randall and Thora Birch, playing a brother and sister who

actually enjoy each other's company, are delightful and convincing young actors. Thora Birch (Paradise) almost steals the show. You feel nice inside just watching her. Lauren Bacall is absolutely charming as the famous Broadway actress/grandmother with whom the children have great fun. (The grandmother/granddaughter singing duet is worth the price of admission.)

The whole movie appears to be a number of well-crafted vignettes carefully put together to come out just right - and, they do. Please, take your family to see this movie - you deserve a pat on the heart. **Rated G. Four Boxes**

Robert de Niro and Donald Sutherland. **Flames** race and explode in Ron Howard's film, named for the backward blast of some blazes. While there are some big name players manning the hoses, it's the fires that provide the momentum.

Howard's effectively pumped-up style relies on some heavy directorial artillery: soaring music, hand-held camera work, 360-degree circular shots and glistening beads of water spraying in slow motion. That's about all there is to the film and, on the small screen, a lot of the special effects are greatly diminished. **Rated PG-13. Two Boxes**

A French drawing room, mid-19th century comedy/drama about the misbehaving intellectuals of France. Chopin (Hugh Grant), the shy, frail, romantic composer, falls prey to the advances of George Sands (Judy Davis, the French writer who dresses like a man.

Chopin's friend is Hungarian composer Franz Liszt (Julian Sands), whose unhappy lover, Marie D'Agoult (Bernadette Peters), is constantly pregnant. For reasons that often seem vague, Marie plots to keep Chopin and Sand apart. Most of the action takes place at the country estate of a rich and pretentious arts patron. It's a romp in the past that's good, smart fun and the performances - one and all - are terrific. **Rated PG-13. Four Boxes**

## President's Corner

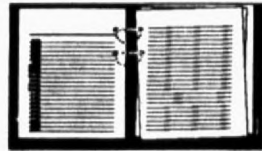

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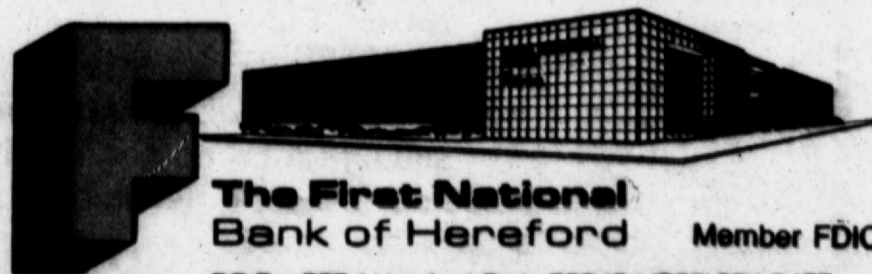


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# Nutrition, good food now go together

Not too many years ago, health professionals had little to do with chefs and fine foods experts (if it's good for you, it can't possibly taste good), and gourmet gurus scorned nutrition and health (if it tastes good, it can't possibly be good for you.) Nutrition means little unless it's turned into food-food that tastes good. And the culinary experts respond to the increase in demand for more healthful food, are making professionals job a lot easier.

"Resetting the American Table: Creating a New Alliance of Taste and Health" was a coalition-building project by The American Institute of Food. A purpose to bridge the gap between implementation guidelines, acknowledged culinary leaders who set the stage for innovative, healthful food preparation, and communicators who report on both health and taste issues.

This project was the brain child of Julia Child. Concerned that dietary recommendations frequently create a "Fear of Food, a sense that food is medicine to take or to avoid for a given daisies," Julia Child encouraged the exploration of relationships between taste and health.

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A grant from National Dairy Board funded a conference of professionals and an invited group of chefs, dietitians, nutrition scientists, physicians, exercise physiologists, public health professionals, education specialists, food marketers, communicators and several individuals who unite about food, health and nutrition.

The objectives of the conference were to arrive at a document that incorporate the fine key elements. Nutrition, physical activity, food availability, quality and preparation, food safety, and education. Together the entire group formed a quality and provide the link between taste and health.

From the conference held in Boston, Mass. earlier this year all participants of food industry came to some consensus.

1. Minimize the "guilt factor" by presenting food within the context of good tasting nutrition.

2. Focus on the positive rather than the negative.

3. Stress moderation, not deprivation.

4. Promote keeping ethnic food traditions, particularly those that use foods like grains and legumes.

5. Be supportive of food services operations and restaurants that offer a variety of healthful options.

On October 29, 1991 while attending The American Dietetic Association 74th Annual Meeting in Dallas, Tx I had the privilege of attending lectures by Julia Child who reported the many aspects of the joint project on making sense out of nutritional guidelines. Several factors were emphasized to help gain greater understanding of the American public and assistant persons in interpreting the guidelines in their own lives to achieve a healthful diet. As professionals were challenged to help Americans achieve both quality of life and pleasure at the table.

Biological factors interacting with post experience help determine what a person like to eat. Human nature is molded by culture, which includes both conscious and unconscious values influence food acceptance, choice, enjoyment, and aesthetics. To change more effectively food habits formed early in life, it is important to understand both biological constrains and cultural influences.

American cuisine is a remarkable mixture of regional cuisines and also those form around the world introduced by immigrants to America.

These foods are not only a source of nutrients but also a statement of cultural and ethnic heritage, traditions, life-styles, and customs.

The enjoyment of eating with variety and wise choices is the emphasis now made by both health and taste professionals. In the matter of taste one must consider nutrition and in the matters of nutrition consider taste. In all cases consider individuals needs and references.

The case values under this umbrella tenet are:

1. Taste is the first determinant of consumer food choices

2. Dietary recommendations should respect culinary traditions but must recognize individual needs to achieve matutinal adequacy and a sense of well-being.

3. Nutrition and good health begin around the table with a healthy, positive atmosphere.

4. These are no "good" or "bare" foods in isolation. It's the overall diet that counts.

There is a definite relationship between foods and diet quality that provides the link between taste and health. As professionals we must emphasize the principles of moderation, variety, balance, and choice. Evaluate diet quality by total consumption not individual foods or one meal.

Concerns in the field of nutrition are still present and needs careful evaluation, and public education. Over consumption of foods high in fat is a major concern. In making higher fat choices in one's diet it is important to consider how often and how much these foods are consumed. Truthful food labeling in a standard format is essential so that individuals can plan a total diet in accordance with the recommended dietary guidelines. Rely on consuming adequate levels of nutrients by eating a variety of foods and not depending on supplements to achieve goals of nutrition. The professionals recognize that physical activities, quality of life, overall health, and a sense of well being.

It is important to use high-quality raw materials and ingredients that are available a the point of maximum flavor and optimum conditions and nutritive value. Flavor and texture are often more crucial than appearance.

Food safety is always a major concern of the food industry and professionals and must be subject for review and practice daily. In all areas of this essential business be it at home, in restaurants in hospitals or other facilities in which food is prepared and offered to individuals, the necessity

of food safety must be a prime objective.

Eating and enjoyment of food enriches all our lives. As professionals we need to reaffirm the importance of nutrition, modify recipes and menus and offer the public a wider range of choices consistent with dietary guidelines. In striving to accomplish

these goals, we can be providers and supporters of the notion of "health food" conjured up images of sprouts and tofu-excellent foods, but not exciting. Today, however, healthy food menus a cornucopia of nutritious, flavorful, beautiful, colorful choices. Indeed, we're learning that eating will is part of living well in every sense.
