Museum plans 25th anniversary celebration

The opening of Deaf Smith County Museum on March 12, 1967, has been described by a volunteer of the time as a "minor miracle."

That 25-year-old miracle will be celebrated March 8 at an open house at the museum, from 1:30 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Another special commemoration of the occasion is a joint project of the museum and the U.S. Postal Service. On March 12, cards and letters mailed from Hereford may get a special postmark, if customers want the special cancellation.

The postmark was designed by an anniversary committee. It features a line drawing of the exterior of the museum and, to the right, "Station of Memories, 12 March 1992, Hereford Texas 79045."

Postmark collectors or others interested in the museum may leave their stamped letters or cards at the museum or at the Hereford post office before March 12. The postmark will be affixed on that day only.

The "minor miracle" of 1967 actually began 11 months earlier when the fledgling Deaf Smith County Historical Society called a meeting to discuss organizing a museum. Mrs. Henry Sears was the catalyst for the group's museum project.

Response was quite good. Forty, or more persons, showed up at the Bull Barn, including members of the

Deaf Smith County Commissioners' Court.

As enthusiasm mounted, commissioners asked a question that drew a sigh of relief. Could the group use a building owned by the county in the 400 block of Sampson?

Indeed, they could. The temporary quarters became permanent.

The building is a piece of Deaf Smith County history.

Built in 1927, it housed the St. Anthony's Catholic School. On the main floor were four large classrooms, each accommodating two grades of students. The basement housed a kitchen for preparing meals for the school's pupils and staff.

A new school was built in the 1950s and St. Anthony's moved to the site on West Park in 1955.

For the next several years, the building was the home of the Knights of Columbus. In 1965, Deaf Smith County bought the four lots and building for \$32,000.

When the Commissioners' Court in April 1966 offered the premises for the museum, the building had been vacant for more than a year.

Mrs. Sears recalls that the building needed quite a bit of work and lots of cleaning.

A nucleus of a museum had been assembled by a Deaf Smith County resident of many years, Bess Werner. She and her granddaughters, children of George and Johnnie Turrentine, had set up displays in the Turrentine

barn and attracted visitors from around the country.

"The girls were looking for a 4-H project when their grandmother suggested the museum," remembers Mrs. Turrentine.

The Werner collection was augmented by historical items and antiques that, Mrs. Turrentine said, "we begged, borrowed and stole."

Mrs. Turrentine and Mrs. Sears are two of the five workers from those early years who have been elected to honorary life membership in the museum.

Mrs. Austin Rose, recognized with the honorary membership, spent more hours than anyone can remember when the museum was kept open by volunteers.

Mrs. Juston McBride, another of the five, brought a special expertise, a flair for decorating, that enhanced exhibits, said Mrs. Turrentine.

Mrs. Jack Gilliland was the first fulltime director. Her work through the years brought the honorary life membership to her.

Most of the main floor of the building is devoted to static exhibits. Mannequins are changed periodically to give each section a new look.

A chapel, which is the site of several weddings each year, features items that came from churches in Deaf Smith County.

Displays are devoted to rooms as they might have appeared in a home in the early days of Deaf Smith

County. A bedroom, parlor and kitchen are typical of early times.

An office with old office machines and furniture sits in the center of the room. Against one wall is a circular staircase that was removed from the Deaf Smith County courthouse in the past. The stairway connected the county clerk's office with storage on the ground floor.

The "Bess Werner Room" features musical instruments and an historical information library, as well as antique furniture. The room was named for her after her death. Memorials made

in her name were used to buy at least one piece of furniture in the room.

Across an end of the main floor is a country store which is mind-boggling in its wealth of items from another era.

The basement of the building houses a hand-carved circus, made by Abe Martin of Hereford for his daughter, Lonidene Edmonson, and a fashion showcase that is changed periodically with seasons or holidays.

Donna Brockman is the third director, taking the position after Juanita Phillips Koetting, who succeeded Mrs. Gilliland. Mrs.

Brockman has worked three years and pays tribute to the volunteers of the historical society for their work at the museum itself and at the E.B. Black House, an adjunct of the museum.

"They do it all, from planting flowers at the E.B. Black House to arranging displays at the museum," she said. "None of this would be possible, either, without the Commissioners' Court."

The museum may be unique because county government is so involved. Maintenance of the buildings and salary of the director and assistant are paid by the county.

Lewis graduated from Baylor University and earned a master's degree at the University of Missouri. He also attended Drake University Law School.

DSGH changes outpatient procedures

Patients who go to Deaf Smith General Hospital for out-patient services will register in the emergency room, it was announced this week by Ron Rives, administrator.

"The out-patient area, which includes day surgery and out-patient surgery, is one of the busiest and fastest-growing services at the hospital. Streamlining the admission

procedure for these services will provide faster service for our patients," he said.

Jeanette Koehler is the new director of out-patient services. She will be responsible for supervising the registration process and will also oversee the emergency room ward clerks who gather patient information.

Patients will be given out-patient forms at their physician's office.

These forms will be partially completed by the physician and hospital staff when the patient comes to the hospital, Koehler said. "This should save the patient some time when they are using our services."

Individuals who are having out-patient surgery or day-surgery are requested to come to the hospital at least one day in advance of the procedure.

"This will allow us to fill out the insurance forms, pre-certify and register our patients in advance of their procedure," Koehler added. "We are striving to be as efficient as possible and provide the kind of

service our community expects," she said.

Out-patient services include x-ray, laboratory, physical therapy, and respiratory therapy. Services are offered Monday through Saturday, 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Designated parking is available next to the out-patient/ER entrance on the north side of the hospital.

HISD compares well with state

Hereford students are doing better than the state average in many areas, according to a new state report.

Local students are doing considerably better than other students in schools similar to Hereford, the report shows.

A new Academic Excellence Indicator System, developed by the Texas Education Agency, reviewed results in many areas for the 1990-91 school year. AEIS compares districts and individual campuses to all other districts and schools across the state. It also groups districts according to wealth of the district, ethnic diversity and other socioeconomic areas.

AEIS replaces the Annual Performance Report which school districts compiled each year. The HISD board of trustees will host a hearing on the report, then will make copies of the report available at each school, the administration building, the chamber of commerce office, public library and other outlets.

The AEIS compares schools and districts using Texas Assessment of Academic Standards (TAAS) scores

and SAT and ACT test results to compare districts.

According to the AEIS, Hereford students:

--Scored a composite average of 19.7 on the ACT test, below the average of 19.8 statewide but above the 18.8 in the group of schools similar to Hereford.

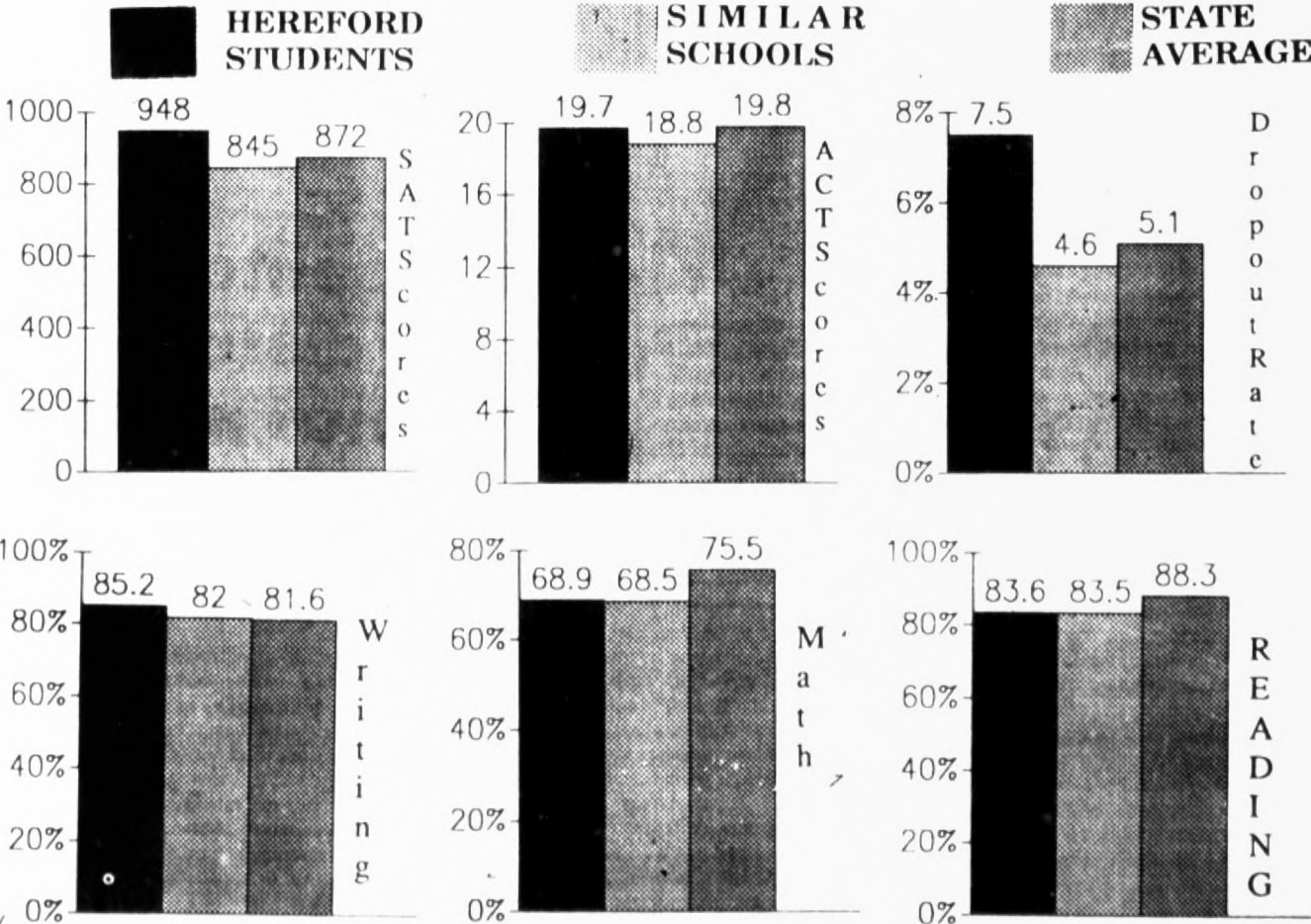
--Recorded an average of 948 on the SAT test, above both the state average of 872 and the group average of 845.

--Averaged 83.6 on the TAAS reading tests for all classes tested, just above the group score of 83.5 but below the state average of 88.3.

--Had an average score of 68.9 on the math section of the TAAS test, just above the group average of 68.5 but below the state average of 75.5.

--Were above normal on the writing section of the TAAS test, with an average of 85.2, compared to 82 for the group and 81.6 for the state.

Hereford's dropout rate was higher than average at 7.5 percent. The group of similar schools had a dropout rate of 4.6 percent, while the state average was 5.1.



Study shows moms identify newborns by touch

NEW YORK (AP) - Does Mom know you like the back of her hand? A new study says she once knew the back of your hand so well she could probably identify you by how it felt. Researchers who blindfolded mothers and had them stroke the backs of three newborns' hands found

that 70 percent could identify their own child, if they had previously spent at least an hour with the baby since birth. That is far better than the 33 percent one would expect by random guessing, researchers said. The women had apparently learned

identifying features of their babies' skin during routine contact, because they were not allowed to study their babies specifically to prepare for the experiment, said study co-author Marsha Kaitz. Kaitz, a psychology professor at Hebrew University in Jerusalem,

presents the work in the January issue of the journal *Developmental Psychology* with co-authors at the university and the Shaare Zedek Medical Center in Jerusalem. "It's pretty amazing, it's pretty exciting," said Tiffany Field, director of the Touch Research Institute at the University of Miami School of Medicine.

Dr. Michael Yogman, an assistant clinical professor of pediatrics at Harvard Medical School, called the study "a pretty impressive piece of work." But he said he suspected the mothers were using other sensory cues, such as hearing the babies' breathing patterns, because he doubted that touch alone would produce enough information for identification. Kaitz said the mothers could not have heard the breathing because they were at arm's length from the babies in a noisy nursery. She also said a separate experiment found that

mothers could not identify their babies if the infants' hands were covered with cloth, showing that non-touch cues were insufficient.

Alan Fogel, a University of Utah psychologist who studies mother-infant communication, said he considered it quite plausible that a mother could get enough information from the touching to choose correctly at least most of the time.

Most participating mothers said they used the texture or temperature of the infant's hand.


"We were very surprised," by the results, Kaitz said in a telephone interview. "The women themselves are surprised."

It is not clear exactly what skin characteristics are responsible, she said, and mothers may learn them unconsciously.

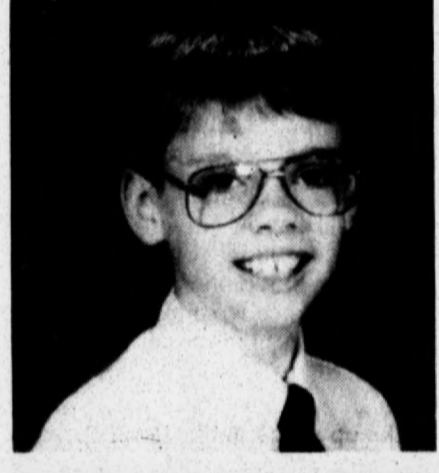

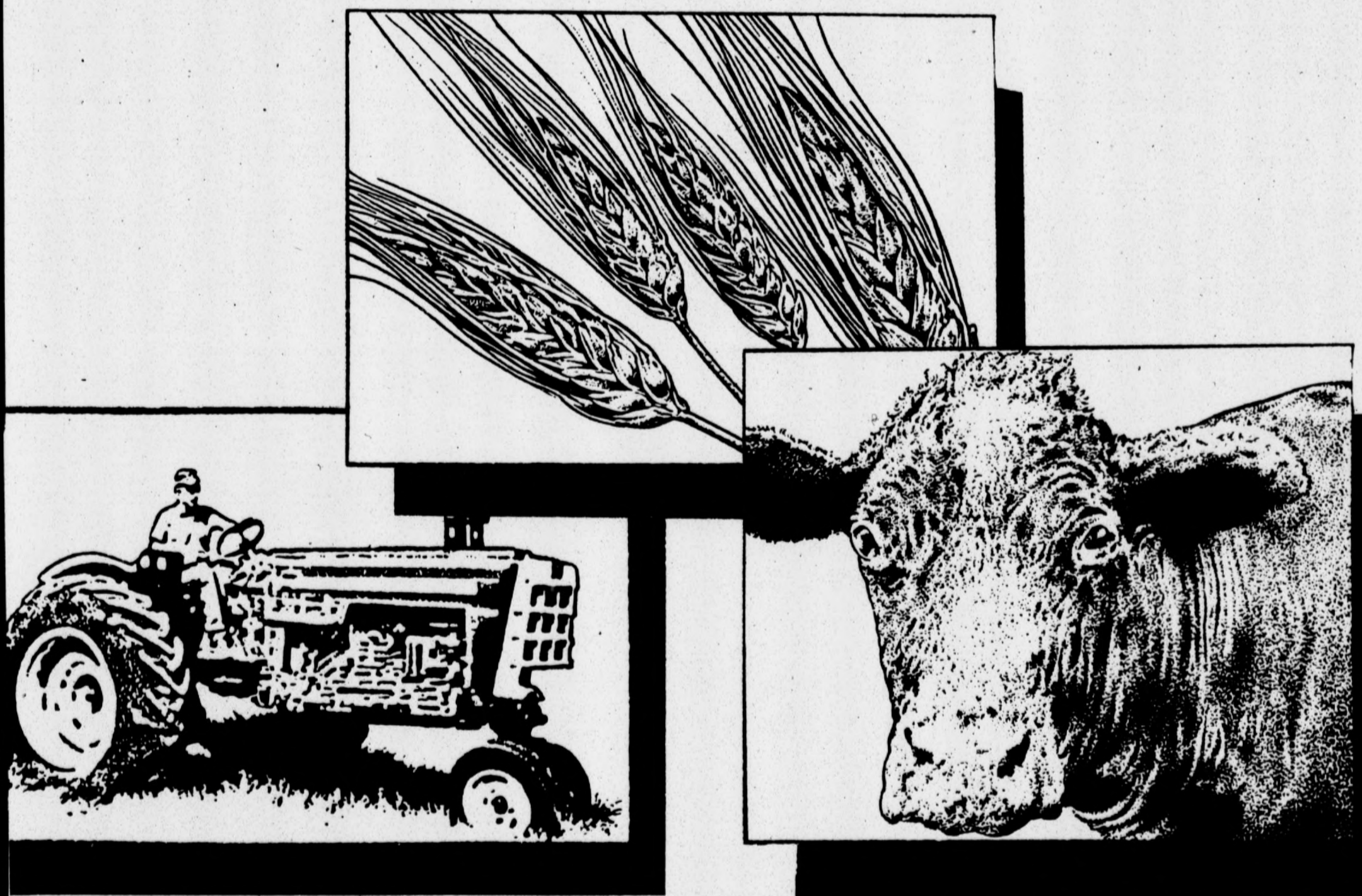

Guerrero tops RRC ballot

AUSTIN (AP) - The Texas Railroad Commission race is a fight over who can best spur new jobs while overseeing the energy and transportation industries. It's also a feud over when it's ethical to take campaign money from those being regulated.

The incumbent is Democrat Lena Guerrero, 34, the first woman and first Hispanic to serve on the century-old commission.

The former state lawmaker from Austin was appointed by Gov. Ann Richards to fill an unexpired term on the panel, and is running to keep the \$74,698-a-year job.

Ms. Guerrero faces primary election opponent David Young, 47, a Texas Department of Insurance regulator who previously lost races for governor, U.S. senator and lieutenant governor - garnering more than a quarter million votes in the last race, in 1986.

Seeking the Republican nomination are former West Texas oilman Barry Williamson of Dallas, who has held federal energy posts, and former three-term Austin mayor Carole Keeton Rylander, who serves on the National Petroleum Council.

Ms. Rylander, who joined the GOP in 1985, lost a congressional bid in 1986 and served as a spokeswoman in Clayton Williams' unsuccessful 1990 campaign for governor.

The winners will face off in the November general election.

The candidates are competing for the only statewide executive office on the ballot this year, on a commission so misnamed that Young says its members work "under the obscurity of an alias."

The Railroad Commission today has very little to do with railroads, although it does handle some safety and inspection matters.

It is concerned with oil and gas production, intrastate trucking, surface mining, gas utilities and the safe handling of liquified petroleum gas.

Commission members also serve on the Texas High-Speed Rail Authority, which is overseeing private efforts to build a 200 mph bullet train linking Texas' largest cities.

Ms. Guerrero, Ms. Rylander and Williamson all have touted the need to aggressively market Texas' natural gas, thus boosting the industry and creating jobs.

Ms. Rylander, 52, and Williamson, 34, also say trucking should be deregulated within the state. Ms. Rylander cites a study saying reform could mean almost 35,000 new jobs.

Complete trucking deregulation is opposed by Ms. Guerrero, who says such action hasn't seemed to work that well with airlines or telephones. She said she wants to ensure safety wouldn't suffer, and that rural communities still are served.

Ms. Rylander and Williamson both have blasted Ms. Guerrero as a liberal, and she has been criticized for her fund-raising - particularly a \$500,000 fund-raiser she had the night before a natural gas hearing.

"Any person who has a contested case in front of me will not be allowed to give me money ... It's improper to lean on people you're fixing to regulate," Williamson said.

Young said he has chosen to make a statement by not raising any money for the primary. "I'm committed to

not selling out, not even one penny's worth," he said.

Even if he wins the primary election, Young said that he will not take money from regulated industries.

Ms. Guerrero, who called the \$500,000 fund-raiser a vote of confidence from industry contributors, said the hearing was held earlier than originally scheduled.

Hereford falls to Sandies in home opener

Amarillo High scored five runs in the first inning, propelling the Sandies to an 11-2 win over Hereford in the Herd's home opener Friday.

The game started with an Amarillo line drive which Hereford center-fielder Richard Wilbanks lost in the sun and could only knock down the Sandie runner ended up on second, but was erased when catcher Michael Campos nailed him trying to steal third.

Another six batters came up before starter Andy Kalka could get another out. Amarillo loaded the bases with two walks and a throwing error by third baseman Tab Hathaway, who

dove to stop a hard grounder in the hole but pulled first baseman Ruben Ramos off the bag with a the throw.

Four of the next five batters got RBI singles. Kalka struck out the eighth batter in the order, then struck out the leadoff hitter.

"We were a little shaky. We weren't quite ready to play," Hereford coach T.R. Sartor said. "When you have a young team with not a lot of returning starters, that happens early in the year. You just hope you overcome it."

Amarillo got three more runs in the top of the third, so Hereford was down 8-0.

Hereford got a single run in the bottom of the third. Campos and Chris Brummett started the inning off with walks. Richard Rodriguez drove home the run with a liner over shortstop. Richard Sanderson, who was courtesy-running for Campos, scored.

Hereford's half of the fourth started with promise, but the Herd only got one run. They loaded the bases with three straight singles by Jerry Rincon, Jake Head and Fonzie Enriquez. Campos and John Nance also struck out, but the third strike bounced on the plate and went over

the backstop, allowing Rincon to score and Cano to reach. Rodriguez struck out to end the inning, making a rare four strikeout inning.

Amarillo scored one run in the fifth and two more in the sixth.

Hereford's Maroon junior varsity split a double-header Friday in Canyon, losing the first game 9-2, then coming back in the second 7-1.

In the win, Hereford got a complete game on the mound from freshman Gregg Kalka, who had eight strikeouts. The win also featured a straight steal of home by Shama Hernandez.

Manning leads Clippers past Heat

Danny Manning is taking the NBA to school since being reunited with Larry Brown.

Manning had a season-high 34 points and a career-high 16 rebounds Friday night as the Los Angeles Clippers defeated the Miami Heat for the first time in eight games, 108-92.

Manning shot 15-for-23 from the field as he reached 30 points for the fourth time this season—three of them in nine games since Brown, Manning's college coach at Kansas, was hired to replace Mike Schuler.

"It's nothing that I've done," Brown said after the Clippers improved to 6-3 under his guidance and returned to the .500 mark for the season. "He's just starting to elevate his game, but he was coming on pretty strong this year as opposed to the past because of his injuries."

Bulls 109, Bucks 105
Chicago won for the first time in

three trips to Milwaukee, rallying from a 15-point deficit behind Scottie Pippen's season-high 41 points.

Pippen's two free throws with 36 seconds to go gave the Bulls a 104-101 lead. Michael Jordan, who scored 24 points, converted two more free throws with 23 seconds left to seal the outcome.

Cavaliers 101, Lakers 90
Brad Daugherty and Larry Nance scored 25 points each as Cleveland won at the Forum for the first time in six games since 1985.

Los Angeles, which lost for the eighth time in nine games, stayed close until late in the third quarter, when Nance scored six of his 14 third-quarter points in the final 3:18 of the period, helping the Cavaliers extend a two-point lead to 77-69 going into the final 12 minutes.

Trail Blazers 117, Bulls 96
Clyde Drexler scored 18 of his 36 points in the decisive third quarter as

Portland won at Washington.

Drexler had 10 points in the first half on 3-for-9 shooting, but he went 5-for-6 and made seven free throws in the third quarter as the Trail Blazers turned a 50-48 halftime deficit into an 86-71 advantage.

Hawks 102, Celtics 90
Kevin Willis had 22 points and 22 rebounds and Rumeal Robinson scored 23 points as Atlanta handed Boston its fifth consecutive road loss.

Willis has had 20 or more points and rebounds in a game 11 times this season for the Hawks, who broke open a close game by outscoring the Celtics 21-13 in the fourth quarter.

Rockets 84, Nuggets 81
Houston snapped a nine-game road losing streak despite blowing a 22-point lead at Denver.

Buck Johnson's 20-footer broke an 81-81 tie with 31 seconds left after

the Rockets led 49-27 early in the second half. The Nuggets made 27.7 percent of their shots and trailed 47-27 at halftime.

Mavericks 115, Suns 107
Rookies Doug Smith and Mike Iuzzolino combined for Dallas' first 21 points of the fourth quarter, lifting the Mavericks over Phoenix.

Iuzzolino, who scored 14 of his 18 points in the fourth quarter, started the period with a 3-pointer, then scored 11 more points after Smith had a streak of 11 consecutive Dallas points.

Pacers 114, Magic 109
Detlef Schrempf scored 34 points, including two clinching free throws with 17 seconds left for Indiana against visiting Orlando.

Anthony Bowie had a season-high 25 points and Scott Skiles 21 for the Magic. Reggie Miller scored 25 points for Indiana.

Houston course mimics golf's best holes

DALLAS (AP) - January and February pretty much kill golf in Texas.

You can play with two sweaters and gloves on both hands, but late winter in this state wasn't meant for gentle outdoor pursuits. There's no fairway grass and some greens look like lettuce gone bad.

So, golf talk and golf news of any kind during those two months is as welcome as that new driver you got for Christmas.

The biggest off-season golf news in Texas is word of a course being built by a group of Houston businessmen on a 200-acre plot in Humble.

It's no ordinary 18-holes.

The course will be called "The Tour 18" and feature recreations of some of the most famous golf holes in the nation. The bulldozer will attempt to adjust the topography down to the last hump and hill of the originals, the builders say.

If you've been lucky enough to visit or play Augusta National or you've seen The Masters on television, there will be three holes you'll recognize if building plans hold true.

It's "Amen Corner" of Augusta National, No. 11, 12 and 13.

Barron Jacobson, one of the partners in the project, said the intention will be to copy them down to the last grass blade and azalea. It will be like repainting the Mona Lisa - Bobby Jones' creation on an old nursery ground in the Georgia pines is a lime green golfing heaven.

No. 11 is a dangerous Par-4 which has decided several Masters championships in recent playoffs. Larry Mize chipped in from off the green to defeat Greg Norman. Nick Faldo has won there twice, defeating Ray Floyd two years ago when Floyd hit a shot into the pond fronting the green.

No. 12 is a dangerous little 150-yard par-3 over Rae's Creek that may be the most famous short hole in golf. It's framed by dogwoods and azaleas.

Rangers want to win now

ARLINGTON (AP) - No pennant flags adorn the flagpoles at Arlington Stadium.

But the Texas Rangers full squad opened spring training in Port Charlotte, Fla., this weekend with every intention of dethroning the world champion Minnesota Twins in the American League Western Division and putting a championship flag on the centerfield pole for all the fans to see.

"It's time to win," said Rangers general manager Tom Grieve. "The talent is there to win. We have depth, we have power, and we have a good blend of veterans with the young guys. We're going to be there (in a pennant race) this September."

The Rangers have never really made a serious pennant run in their 25 years of existence.

They were 85-77 last year, yet finished 10 games behind Minnesota.

The fans poured through the turnstiles to see the Nolan Ryan-led Rangers. Texas attracted a club record 2,297,718 fans in 79 games.

"Imagine what would happen if this team was in a pennant race," Ryan said. "It would really be exciting. This area would go crazy."

In 1991, the Rangers were a team that hit line drives like a batting machine but had problems pitching and fielding.

Texas had a team batting average of .270, third best in the majors behind Minnesota at .280 and Milwaukee at .271. The Rangers led the majors in runs scored with 829.

Alas, the pitching staff didn't hold up its end of the bargain.

Texas was 11th in the American League with a 4.47 earned run average. The pitching staff gave up 814 runs and 662 walks, the most in the majors. Rangers hurlers also served up 151 homers.

"We had injuries, we had all kind of problems," Grieve said. "But we have pitchers with major league credentials and it's time for the law of averages to even out. There's no reason why this staff can't do the job."

The Rangers are hoping to win more in the summer than they did in the winter, when they lost salary arbitration hearings to Ruben Sierra, Rafael Palmeiro and Kevin Brown.

Sierra won a record \$5 million after talks broke down on a long-term deal, and Palmeiro won \$3.85 million. Brown won \$1.2 million.

The Rangers, who in 1987 had a team payroll of less than \$6 million, will dole out nearly \$30 million this year, the bulk of that going to their nine millionaires.

Many feel that because of skyrocketing salaries, the Rangers must go for broke in 1992 because they likely will begin losing their superstars after this season to teams that can better afford them.

The hard-throwing Brown has one of the best arms in the majors but only posted a 9-12 record and a 4.40 ERA last season.

Bobby Witt made just 16 starts with a 6.09 ERA before hurting his arm. He had arthroscopic surgery to remove a bone spur from his elbow in September.

"If we can just get a normal year out of these two guys, get them back on track then we can have something," Grieve said.

Ryan, who was 12-6, and Jose

Guzman, 13-7, who bounced back from two years absence because of arm troubles, became the Rangers 1-2 punch when Ryan was healthy.

Twice Ryan hit the disabled list because of injuries.

Also, projected starter Scott Chiamparino lasted only five starts before needing elbow surgery.

Jeff Russell was the big horse in the bullpen with 30 saves. Kenny Rogers was the stopper from the left side with five saves.

"We need to deepen our bullpen from both sides," Grieve said. "Brown and Witt need to come through. It could all come together."

The only major move in the off-season brought shortstop Dickie Thon, who hit .252 with the Philadelphia Phillies.

The Rangers will return AL batting champion (.341) Julio Franco at second; first baseman Palmeiro, who hit .322 and led the majors with 49 doubles; young Dean Palmer, who took over for traded Steve Buchele and hit .187 with 15 homers at third; and Ivan Rodriguez, who hit .264 as a rookie, at catcher.

In the outfield, Texas will have Sierra, who hit .307 with 25 homers; Juan Gonzalez, .264 with 27 homers; Kevin Reimer, .269 with 20 homers; and Jack Daugherty, who hit .194 with one homer.

"It's important that this team get off to a good start," Grieve said. "It could really get the fans behind the team."

Texas was leading the AL West at the All-Star break last year then faded over the second half of the season.

"We know what the potential of this team can be," Grieve said. "Now, we have to go out and do it."

But as Ryan himself says: "Pitching is the key for this team. The pitchers need to hold up their end of the bargain."

Astros progressing despite 97 losses

HOUSTON (AP) - The rookie-filled 1991 Houston Astros led the National League with 97 losses, 161 errors, had the fewest road victories in the league with 28, and had a losing home record (37-44) for the first time since 1975.

They also made progress. Three position players spending their first full seasons in the National League started the season as prospects and finished as solid additions to the Astros lineup.

Jeff Bagwell, moved from third to first in spring training, blossomed into the NL rookie of the year. He hit .294, led the team with 82 runs batted in, 15 homers, 75 walks, a .437 slugging percentage and .387 on base percentage.

Steve Finley took over in center field, led the Astros in seven categories and provided leadoff punch. He tied for sixth in the NL with 170 hits.

Luis Gonzalez, after a slow start, finished with a .254 average and led the team with 50 extra base hits (28 doubles, nine triples and 13 homers).

Pitching got a boost from Pete Harnisch, acquired from Baltimore along with Finley and Curt Schilling. By season's end, Harnisch was the ace of the staff. He led the NL in opponents' batting average against (.212) and tied for fourth with 172 strikeouts.

Andruar Cedeno joined the Astros July 27 and took over the shortstop position for the rest of the season.

But progress and hope won't get the Astros too far out of the NL Western Division cellar.

"I think the expectations will be higher this year," General Manager Bill Wood said. "That's normal. I think everybody wants to improve. But everyone connected with this club has to be patient."

There will be some new faces such as power hitting Pete Incaviglia and former three-time all-star reliever Doug Jones and adding interest to the mix will be catcher Craig Biggio's move to second base.

Ed Taubensee, obtained from Cleveland in an off-season trade, is expected to step into the catching position.

Incaviglia slumped to his worst year in the majors, hitting .214 at Detroit last season but he's healthy, again and anxious to nail down the starting rightfield job.

"We looked at the numbers and when he was an every day player, he hit 20 or more homers and 80 or more runs batted in," Manager Art Howe said. "Considering the situation we had in right field last year where we had only 37 RBI the whole season, obviously that would be a step forward."

Incaviglia will battle Mike Simms and Eric Anthony for the rightfield job.

The Astros are hoping that Jones, Cleveland's all-time save leader, will recover from last season when he finished with a 4-8 record and 5.54 earned run average.

Jones is expected to fill the closer role that hurt the Astros often last season. Houston's 36 saves ranked 11th among the 12 NL teams.

Biggio led the team last season with a .295 average and earned his first All-Star appearance. Now he's moving to second base.

"He'll have to work on his pivot the most but he's got outstanding hands and he's got the range and a good throwing arm," Howe said. "It's just a matter of getting the pivot down."

The Astros hope Taubensee will take charge of the catching job. He hit .242 in 28 games with the Indians last season and also had 13 home runs in the minor leagues.

"Taubensee is coming into the picture as a left-handed hitting catcher, that's something we haven't had here the last three years," Howe said. "It gives you a chance to platoon or pinch hit without using another player."

The Astros begin their spring schedule Friday against Kansas City.

The business session is scheduled to begin at 7 p.m.

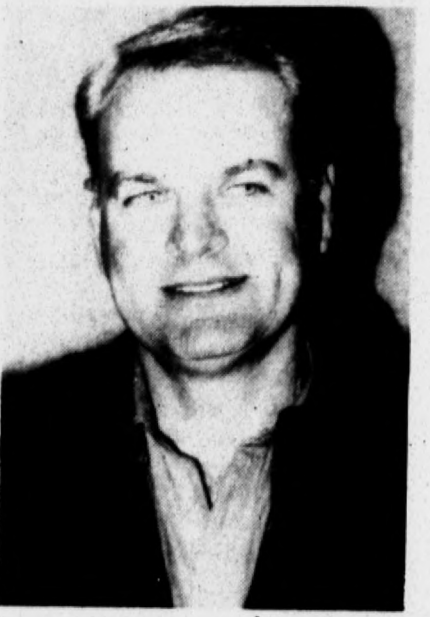

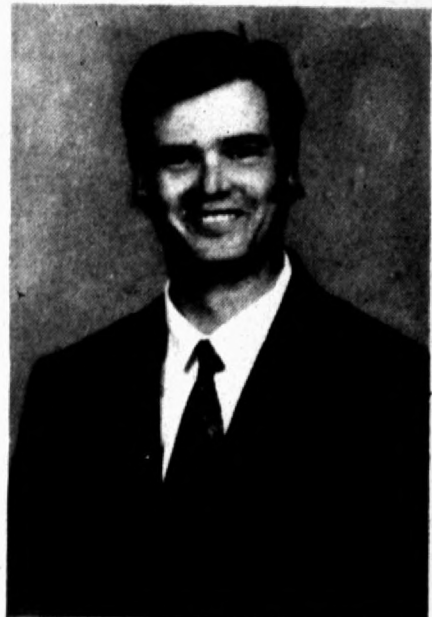

Value of research proven in foods

Anybody wanting proof of how Texas A&M University agricultural research provides healthier and better tasting food can buy and eat it right on campus.

The Rosenthal Meat Science and Technology Center may have one of the best-kept retail secrets in Texas. Consumers can purchase tasty morsels ranging from homemade ice cream to exotic Wagyu beef, and they'll be helping the educational process at the same time.

They'll also find cutting-edge consumer products--though it sometimes takes a little luck. For instance, highly marbled Wagyu beef

was available for a short time in mid-1991 after completion of a Texas Agricultural Experiment Station study on the Japanese breed's potential in Texas.

The center, open in its present location since 1983, has served as a key meat science laboratory. Some of its work led to the landmark 1989 National Consumer Beef Study, which showed that Americans wanted leaner beef and led to U.S. retailers offering quarter-inch trimmed products.

It has been in the vanguard of such research as the use of electrical stimulation of carcasses to tenderize beef, a now-standard practice in the

packing industry.

The 29,500-square foot building is where Aggies get hands-on experience in everything from judging animals to cutting meats and arranging them for retail sale. Their efforts are often sold out of the small retail center at the front of the building, where from 70 to 100 meat and dairy products might be on sale at any one time.

"We can make just about anything in the area of processed meats," said Ray Riley, the center's manager. "Of course, because our beef and pork franks are student-made, they're not always of a uniform length or thickness, but they're of high quality."

"I want to offer quality and service, but the main focus is on educating the students."

Boneless peppered ham, chili meat, smoked pork tenderloins, bratwurst, ham and cheese links and jalapeno sausage are just a few of the items offered for sale in the meat section. Whole milk in maroon-and-white A&M cartons, eggs produced by Aggie chickens, and campus favorites such as butter-pecan and chocolate-chip ice cream are among dairy products sold in the store.

It even has beef jerky, honey produced by entomology department bees and frozen yogurt when it's available. Much of the store's stock depends on the work done by students.

Riley prices products based on the local market and how much inventory he has.

"Items like lamb are generally priced lower than local trade, but items like bacon are generally higher," he said. "Our students get a first-hand working knowledge of what it takes to move products and cover costs."

The center's research probably has led to its retail store having leaner products than most other retailers, Riley added. He also said its processed meats often have less water content, and meats are usually smoked longer than the industry norm.

"People tell us our hams are the way hams are supposed to taste, the way they used to taste," Riley said.

He stressed, however, that the store's purpose is to help defray costs of the center's educational efforts, which include hands-on training that many land-grant universities have forsaken.

A&M students still slaughter animals and cut carcasses, while other institutions use less expensive methods, such as one-time demonstrations or videotapes, he explained.

The center has an outdoor, covered

holding pen that includes benches for students evaluating livestock. It has a 150-seat room that looks like most other college lecture halls--except for the concrete floor with a drain in it and an overhead rail that brings beef or pork carcasses right into the classroom.

It has several processing and cutting rooms with classroom seating--probably the coldest classrooms in Texas, regardless of the time of the year. Temperatures are usually kept at 45 degrees, and "the students know to wear their coats," Riley said.

In one of those rooms, students collected data used in a recently released computer program called Computer-Assisted Retail Decision Support, or CARDS. Beef retailers can use CARDS to save money by calculating time required to cut, trim and package beef, using such factors as store traffic, employe expenses and consumer purchases.

Students this year also will judge, slaughter, cut and package beef and pork as part of A&M studies on different feeding trials. Their work should add to the information that helps produce leaner and tastier meat products.

DSEC members will receive capital credits from 1976 and 1977 amounting to one million dollars, and

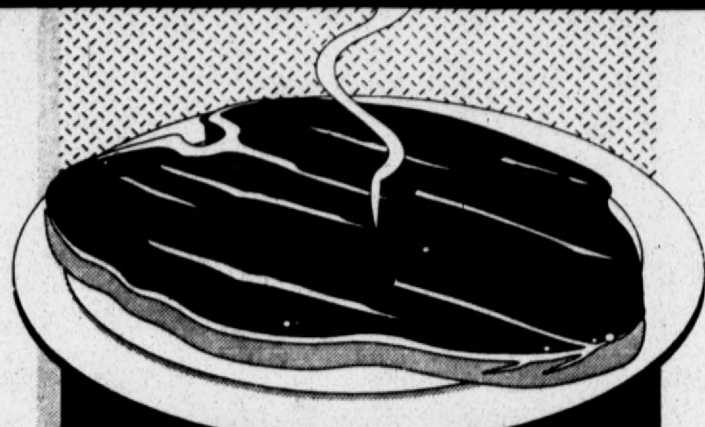
the remaining \$110,766 is a power cost refund.

Damaged vineyards to be topic at meeting

LUBBOCK -- What to do about vineyards damaged by hard, sudden freezing weather such as the South Plains experienced in late October will be one of the problems addressed when the Texas Wine and Grape Growers Association meets here March 5-7 for a statewide educational conference.

Common presentations and separate sessions for growers and for winemakers will be highlighted by several events, including two wine-tastings and tours of Lubbock wineries. Dr. Roy Mitchell, associate professor of enology with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station of Texas A&M University and at Texas Tech University, is coordinating the program.

The keynote speaker will be Dr. G. Stan Howell, professor of horticulture at Michigan State University, East Lansing, Mich. For more than two decades he has conducted research on cultural methods for grape varieties of economic importance in the Midwest.

The conference will begin at 1 p.m. March 5 at the Lubbock Plaza Hotel with a meeting of the association board of directors. That evening, members will take part in the city's "Fork and Cork" festivity, formerly the Taste of Lubbock and Lubbock Wine Classic, at the hotel.

The March 6 program at the hotel will be general sessions for both growers and winemakers. Morning presentations will focus on making quality in the vineyard. Topics will include vineyard management for yield and for quality, pruning and training, harvest operations and cultural practices to minimize freeze damage.

A technical wine tasting will precede lunch.

The luncheon speaker will be Howell, discussing the Michigan wine industry.

Afternoon sessions will examine production and marketing practices. These will include winery management, modern computer software, marketing from the tasting room, appellations and appellation promotions, and marketing and research programs in other states.

From 5:30 to 7 p.m. the public can meet the winemakers and growers at a "blue jeans" tasting event at the Cafe Mezz, 1211 13th St. Winemakers will speak about agricultural aspects of a featured wine and introduce their growers. All Texas wineries have been invited to pour wines of their choice. The event is covered in the conference fee; tickets for those not registering for the conference are \$12 and will be available at the door.

Sessions Saturday morning, March 7, will be at two locations. Grape growers will look at cultural practices at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center north of Lubbock International Airport. Wine makers will look at quality control during presentations at Texas Tech University. Transportation from the hotel to the program sites will be provided.

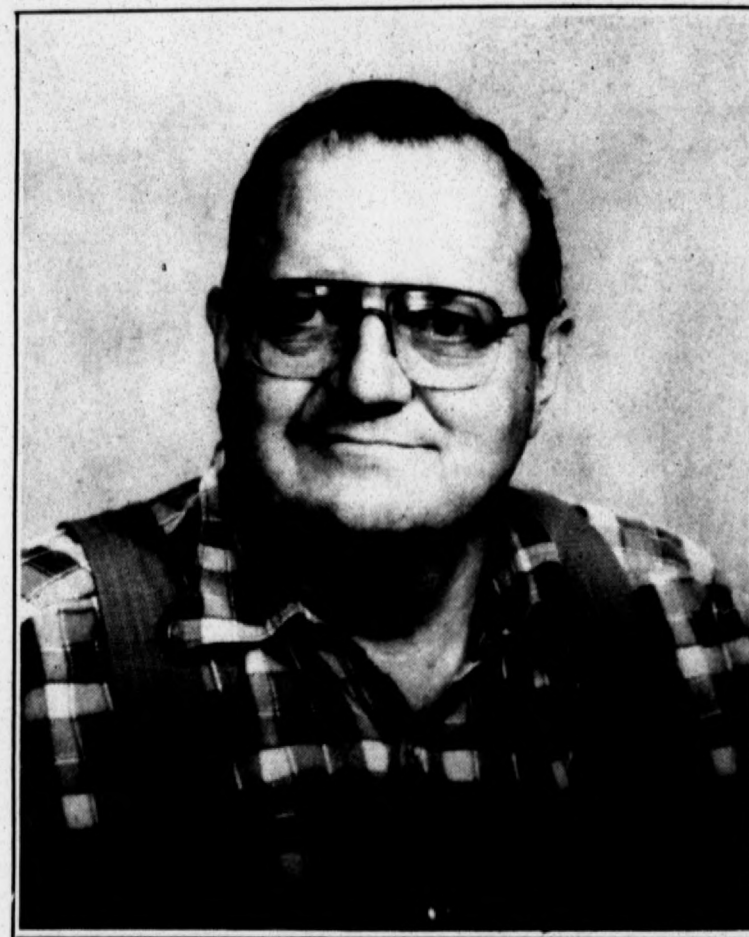
Topics for the growers will include entomology, weed control, pathology, pesticide regulations, soil and petiole analysis, freeze damage assessment, proper responses to freeze damage, and field demonstrations of balanced pruning and spraying.

GOP seeking more seats on high court

DALLAS (AP) - Texas Republicans are embarking on a campaign to capture control of the state Supreme Court for the first time in more than 100 years.

They're also trying to gain a foothold in the Court of Criminal Appeals where they hold no seats.

Three of nine seats on both courts are up for re-election this year.

One of the three incumbent Supreme Court justices up for re-election is being challenged in the March 10 primary. And two of the three Democratic judges on the criminal appeals court face primary opponents.

The Supreme Court is the last resort for civil cases in Texas, and the Court of Criminal Appeals is the last stop for criminal cases.

The most spirited battles have come in the Supreme Court Place 3, where Justice Jack Hightower faces a challenge in the Democratic primary from E. Paul Banner and in the Republican primary where Craig Enoch and Charles Ben Howell are battling to face Justice Oscar Mauzy, a hard-nosed liberal Democrat, in November.

The Republican Party didn't elect a member to the Supreme Court until 1888, when business and medical interests joined with Republicans and judicial conservatives to win a seat on the court they said had been dominated by personal injury lawyers.

During the 1980s, the court issued a series of opinions that, in general, made it easier for the injured to sue and collect damages. Business, doctors and others charged that the result was to drive up the cost of liability insurance. Led by the Texas Medical Association, they launched a campaign that has netted four seats.

Just four years later, the GOP could for the first time this century win a majority of the court's nine seats.

Their target is the 65-year-old Mauzy, who, along with Eugene Cook, a Republican, escaped primary challenges. Cook also faces opposition in the general election in November.

Vying for the GOP nomination for Mauzy's seat are Howell, 66, a former Fifth District Court of Appeals justice, and Enoch, 41, the court's chief justice.

Republican leaders tried to keep Howell out of the race, but Howell said he alone can defeat Mauzy.

He said that if Enoch wins the nomination, Gov. Ann Richards and other influential Democrats will defend Mauzy because of Enoch's involvement in an embarrassing incident in Dallas in 1982.

That year, Enoch, then a state district judge, and several other GOP judges in Dallas were accused of trying to intimidate minority voters by putting up signs in select precincts warning of jail terms for voting fraud. The warnings were denounced as attempts to discourage minorities from voting.

Enoch later apologized for his actions, saying he put up some signs, but not in minority precincts.

Enoch also has gone on the offensive, accusing Howell of wearing pajamas in court and of being targeted by a disbarment attempt.

Dee Klotz, Howell's spokesman, said his concern about the State Bar claim is that people would believe

Howell was disbarred, when he wasn't. Klotz said the pajama incident "flat never happened."

Banner, Hightower's primary challenger, has accused the incumbent of serving special interests and has attempted to put him on the defensive by citing claims by the Wise County Appraisal District accusing him of misconduct. Hightower has dismissed both assaults.

Hightower, 65, dismissed Banner's allegations that he favored his contributors and said he has limited

contributions to \$5,000 per person per election.

Banner, 53, also cited claims by the Wise County Appraisal District accusing Hightower of misconduct for participating in a ruling that benefited a company for which his daughter lobbied.

Hightower denied any conflict of interest, and on Feb. 19 the Texas Supreme Court overruled a motion by the appraisal district, which sought to prevent Hightower from deliberating on a property tax case.

In December, Hightower wrote the majority opinion in a 5-4 decision that said a limestone deposit is not a mineral for purposes of assessing property taxes unless it is part of a working excavation.

The appraisal district alleged Hightower had a conflict of interest because his daughter, Amy Hightower Brees, had been a lobbyist for an association that stood to benefit by the decision.

The Wise County officials petitioned the court asking that Hightower be removed from the case because it is

still pending before the court on a motion for a rehearing.

Vying for the Republican nomination for Hightower's seat and six-year term are George Barbary, 69, a Dallas lawyer, and state District Judge John D. Montgomery, 44, of Houston.

Supreme Court Justice Cook, 53, will face Rose Spector, 58, of San Antonio in November.

In the Court of Criminal Appeals races:

Judge Charles Baird, 36, faces state district judge Sam Paxson, 57, of El Paso in the Democratic primary in Place

1. Battling for the Republican nomination are Texas Court of Appeals Judge Joe Devany, 70, of Dallas, and Jim Vollers, 60, an Austin lawyer.

Judge Morris Overstreet, 41, of Amarillo, the first black elected to a statewide office in Texas, faces Eugene "Gene" Kelly, 65, of Universal City in the Democratic primary in Place 2. Fifth District Court of Appeals Justice Sue Lagarde, 54, of Dallas is unopposed for the Republican nomination.

Democratic Judge Pete Benavides, 45, does not have a primary opponent.

Jena has just put the finishing touches on the illustrations for a soon-to-be-released children's book. Local people and places have been her models, as I understand, so her presentation should be of more than a passing interest.

HAPPY BIRTHDAY, HANK! Hank the Cowdog is 10 years old (that's 70 to you and me), and every dog must have his day, they say, so Hank's day is March 8, at the Ochiltree County Fairgrounds in Perryton, 2-4 p.m. Author John Erickson and illustrator Gerald Holmes will be there, and a performance will be given at 3:00. For more information, call Perry Memorial Library at 435-5801 in Perryton, the sponsor of the wing-ding. The celebration is free, but refreshments, tapes and books will be for sale.

TOMORROW, March 2nd is Texas Independence Day. In honor of that event, we are releasing a number of new books about our great state.

It's probably inaccurate to call this first one a "new" book. *Trail Drivers of Texas*, originally copyrighted in 1920, has recently been reprinted, and the title tells it all. This is, as the cover recounts, "true narratives related by real cowpunchers and men who fathered the cattle industry in Texas."

Another reprint (from 1929) is *The Raven*, Marquis James Pulitzer Prize winning biography of Sam Houston. This is a classic work retelling the life of Texas "favorite" son.

Really new is a book by historian James L. Haley, *Texas: From the Frontier to Spindletop* is basically a history book. Haley is a thorough researcher, and the text is liberally interspersed with pictures and vignettes of early Texas.

There is a lot of Texas-related fiction available. Nothing brand-new for this week, but we recently released a novel about Galveston which features as a central character not a dashing pirate or charming belle, but that beautiful and resilient city itself.

Not very long on our shelves is a piece out of Michener's Texas that wouldn't fit in the longer work. (Seems to me like a couple of hundred extra pages wouldn't have made much difference in that massive volume.) *The Eagle and the Raven* is a

historical narrative of the two chief players on the stage of the Texas Revolution: Santa Anna and Houston.

And I'm told that I really must read *Love is a Wild Assault* and that this is one of those books that you shouldn't judge by its cover (or title). Harriet Potter was known as "The Bravest Woman in the Republic of Texas." This biographical novel is based on author Elithe Hamilton Kirkland's painstaking research of Potter's own manuscript, as well as countless documents, letters, journals, etc. Maybe I should read it...in spite of the title.

Space is running out, but I would be remiss in speaking of Texas historical fiction if I failed to mention Elmer Kelton. As an inveterate non-

fiction reader, I generally shun fiction of any kind but two guys (both with the initials J.R.) insisted that I read *The Wolf and the Buffalo* (a story about a Black cavalryman and a young Comanche as the Indians were being removed from the Plains). I did, and was pleasantly surprised by the readability, the "cleanness" and especially the historical accuracy with which Kelton writes. Two other Kelton novels I plan to read are both of regional if not local interest: *The Time It Never Rained* (West Texas in the 1950's) and *The Day The Cowboys Quit* (the Cowboy Strike of 1883).

Felines to compete in Amarillo March 28-29

Late March signals not only spring but also fancy felines in the Amarillo Civic Center competing for top honors on March 28-29, the weekend Amarillo Cat Fanciers sponsors its ninth annual show. Every year this event attracts more and more cat lovers. Between 10 a.m. and 4 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday, approximately 180 to 200 registered cats and household pets will be shown and judged.

Cats of all breeds will converge on the civic center for a show known as the Panhandle Roundup. Some of the purebred cats coming to the roundup will come from as far as Virginia, Michigan, California, Oklahoma and Louisiana. In addition to these, the people of Amarillo will be able to see representatives of the many purebred lines raised in the Amarillo area. The cats in competition and display will be of all colors, fur lengths, and coat textures.

Local breeders raising the following breeds usually enter the annual show: Abyssinian, American Shorthair, Birman, Ocicat, Persian, Russian Blue, Scottish Fold, and Somali. The spectator may see from other cities and various states the Maine Coon, Korat, Siamese, Burmese, Tonkinese, Egyptian Mau, Singapura, Balinese, Colorpoint Shorthair, Oriental Shorthair, and Turkish Angora.

Although no wild blood is in any of these domestic breeds, the look of the wild is in the Abyssinian and Ocicat. An Abyssinian is often compared to a miniature cougar while the Ocicat resembles the spotted cats like the leopard and cheetah but with the lovable disposition of a house cat.

The variety is startling. The Russian Blue with its seemingly smiling countenance and the magnificent silver sheen of its short coat contrasts sharply to the Persian with its Pekingese type of face and its fluffy splendor.

The purebred cats share the limelight with the household variety when the nationally accredited judges award the coveted ribbons and rosettes. Each of the six separate judging rings have four areas of competition--kittens from four through seven months, adult male and female cats in various categories of championship, neutered or spayed purebred cats known as premiers, and neutered or spayed household pets.

The small admission charge helps cover show expenses. Out of the excess of entry fees and small admission charge the Amarillo cat Fanciers make sizable contributions to the Amarillo-Panhandle Humane Society and the Animal Rights Association, as well as to the Robert Winn Foundation which makes grants for medical research that develops

new vaccines for cats.

Amarillo Cat Fanciers is affiliated with cat Fanciers Association, the main national purebred registry. Although it is a small organization, it is the major cat club between Dallas and Denver. The magnitude of the cat show is a testimonial to much hard work and dedication of this small group and the local public support. Any cat lover who wishes to join the local club and help promote these shows should call Don Bozeman at 622-2776.

The entertainment of the exhibition and competition toward national recognition is only part of the show. The exhibitors can gain a lot of information on the cat fancy and delight in the feline splendor. It is worth the \$2 admission price, \$1 for children 6-12 years old.

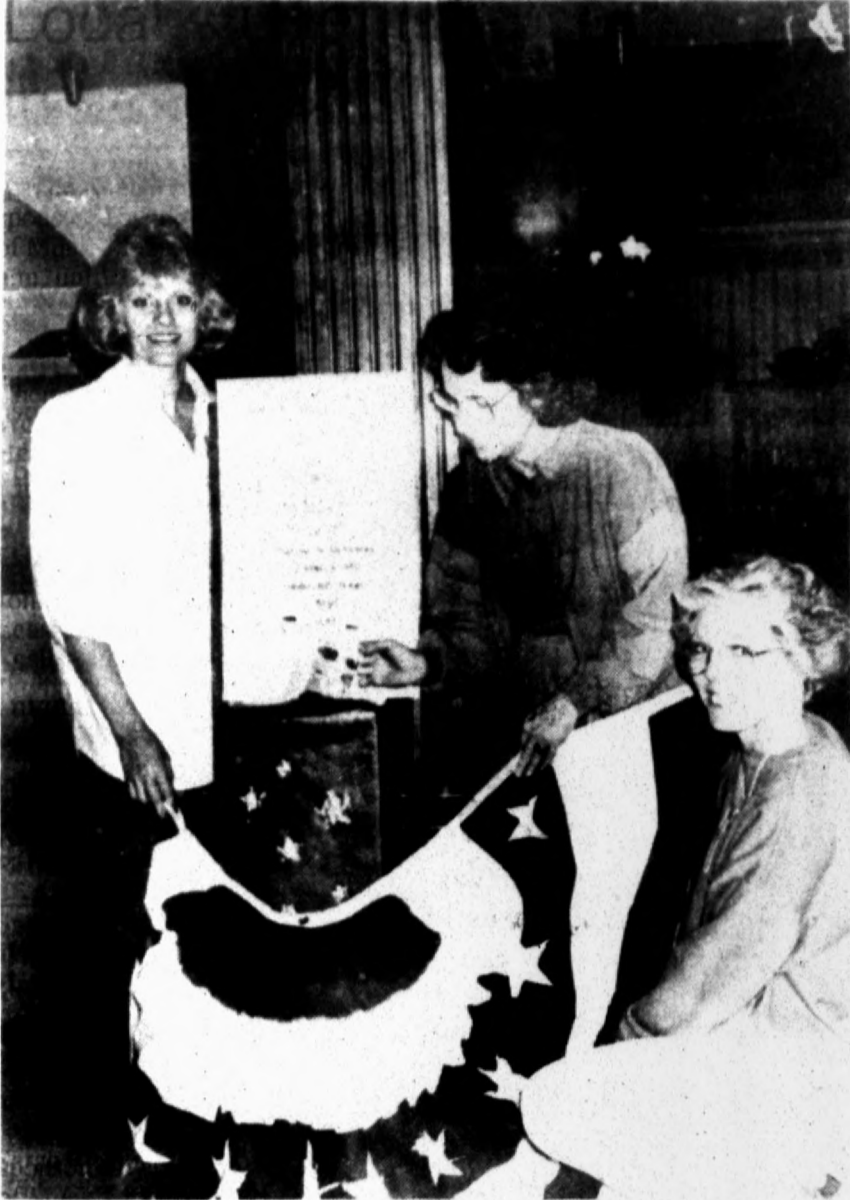

Watch intake of vitamins

When it comes to vitamins, there can be too much of a good thing, experts agree.

Vitamin A, for example, is a fat soluble vitamin, which means it can be stored in your body and need not be replenished each day. More than 100,000 I.U. (International Units) of Vitamin A daily can produce toxic effects in adults, if taken for many months; more than 18,500 IU daily can produce toxic effects in infants. Toxic side effects include hair loss, nausea, vomiting, diarrhea and blurred vision.

The B-vitamins are water soluble, which means they are excreted and not stored in the body, so most of them are non-toxic, but taking too much of one can lead to a deficiency of the others. Vitamin B-6 can be toxic; daily doses of two to ten grams can cause neurological disorders.

Vitamin C is another water soluble vitamin and many say it may be the most important. People, unlike most animals, cannot make vitamin C in their body so the supply needs to be replenished daily. The national Research Council recommends 60 mg per day for the average person but they caution that personal habits, lifestyle and the environment may affect nutritional needs. Smokers, for example, need at least 100 mg of C per day. Many researchers are discussing the health benefits of doses many times the RDA since Vitamin C seems to be safe at almost any level.

Dr. Taylor of the Human Research Center on Aging report that as little as 500 mg of Vitamin C every day may protect against certain types of cataracts with Dr. Verlangieri from the University of Mississippi stating that twice that amount may reduce arterial build up and heart disease. According to Dr. Bulpitt at a leading London hospital, high blood pressure

could result from Vitamin C deficiency but the most encouraging news comes from the National Cancer Institute where Dr. Block concludes that as many as 13 different types of cancer may be prevented with Vitamin C.

In the past, large doses of vitamin C could lead to digestive distress. Fortunately, there's now a vitamin supplement that lets you get all the health benefits of vitamin C without the stomach upset. 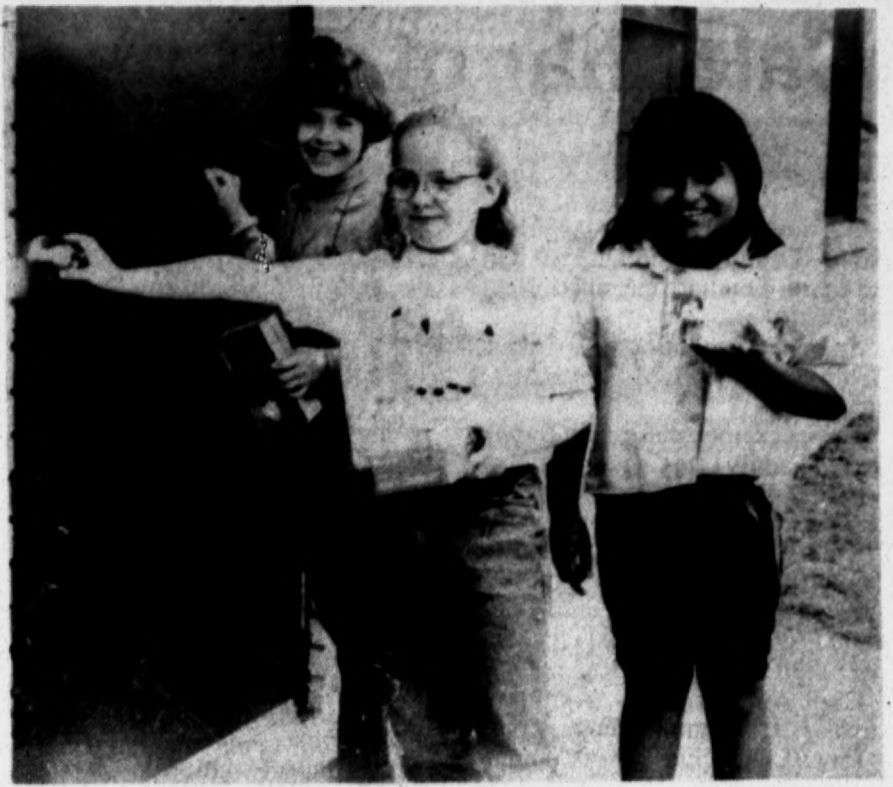
Orchestras in concert Tuesday

New form affects hiring practices

Whether hiring one person or 1,000, all employers will be affected by changes in the new I-9 form released recently by the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service.

The previous I-9 form, a part of the Immigration Reform and Control Act (IRCA) of 1986, mandated that all employers verify employees' legal right to work in this country. "Probably the most pertinent change in the revised form is the increased emphasis on informing employers about the anti-discrimination provision of the law," said Dr. Dick Edwards, economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The new document carries this anti-discrimination notice: "It is illegal to discriminate against work eligible individuals. Employers CANNOT specify which document(s) they will accept from an employee. The refusal to hire an individual because of a future expiration date may also constitute illegal discrimination."

"When the law was being debated in 1986, many in Congress expressed great concerns that the citizenship requirements would discriminate against Hispanics and others," Edwards said.

According to Edwards, a survey showed that indeed 18 percent of the employers who described their hiring practices were being discriminatory. In Texas, this percentage was 28 percent -- the highest of any state surveyed under this particular law.

However, changes in the new form should help prevent discriminatory practices, which were found to be mostly unintentional, Edwards said. The form also was revised to clear up any question as to which documents would satisfy the identity and authorization requirements.

"What many employers would do is ask to see one of the several documents listed on the old form as being acceptable," he said. "If an applicant did not have it, the employer would not hire the person, when in fact, there were many other acceptable documents not listed."

The new form does not give a specific list, but a separate, expanded list that employers can use to match up the documents they are given by applicants.

Another change on the I-9 is the addition of a third section, which deals with re-verification of temporary documents.

Edwards says following these suggestions will help employers

avoid problems when complying with the anti-discrimination provision of the IRCA:

*** Complete the I-9 form after an offer of employment has been made.** In the past, many companies would ask only certain applicants to fill out I-9 forms prior to being hired because they felt others would not have the proper documentation. Not having all applicants fill out the I-9 form at the point of application could be deemed discriminatory.

*** Allow the employee to decide which documents he or she wishes to provide for work authorization identification.** Do not ask to see a specific document (driver's license, Social Security card, green card, etc.). Refusal or request of specific documents is discriminatory because the applicant may not have these, but others that are valid. The employer should ask for documentation that shows work status and verification. Then, the person chooses what to show.

*** Do not refuse any valid document because of a future expiration date.** Another practice that could be discriminatory is failing to hire someone who has a temporary document that can be updated or made permanent.

*** Do not ask for additional documents after a person has provided document sufficient for verification.** What the documents should show are identity and legal status in terms of the right to work. Some documents such as the "green card" does both. If one document does not show this, another must be presented. Rather than asking for specific documents, let applicants who what they have. If the documents are not appropriate, require that other be furnished. Do not ask for additional papers if the documents presented show identity and legal work status.

*** Do not have a U.S. citizen-only hiring policy unless required by law or specified by government contract.** For most jobs, a person does not have to be a citizen. If an employer implements a "citizen only" hiring policy this may be discriminatory unless it is specified by government contract.

*** Keep I-9's in a file separate from an employee's personnel file.** The I-9 form contains certain information not available on the application, so the form should be filed separately. If kept with the personnel file, some could imply that reference was made to the I-9 form and that information was used in a discriminatory manner.

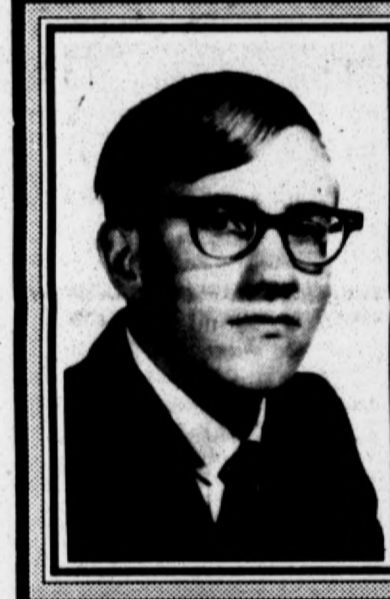

The best way to stay healthy is to eat right. Eating right means choosing from a wide variety of foods: meats, milk and dairy products, fruits, vegetables, grains and cereals.
 However, eating right doesn't only involve the foods you select. Proper preparation of the foods you bring into your kitchen is also an important part of eating right.
 Become a leaner cook by following these simple guidelines:
 -Fry less often.
 -Roast, bake, grill, braise or broil meat, poultry and fish.
 -Use marinades and herbs instead of high fat sauces and gravies to flavor meat, fish and poultry.
 -Season cooked vegetables with herbs, lemon or stock.
 -Baste meats and poultry with stock or broth and a minimum amount of butter or margarine.
 -Stir-fry often. Use a non-stick wok or saute pan and only a small amount of oil.
 -Use non-stick pans and an aerosol oil spray when sauteing.

-Rely on the microwave to reheat leftovers and cook fish, vegetables and poultry with a minimum of fat.
 -Eat fresh fruit, sherbets, ices, fruit gelatins, angel food or sponge cake for dessert.
 Select a varied diet and prepare your foods the lean way and you will be eating right.

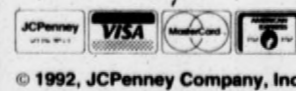

A person doesn't have to be totally blind to be considered "legally blind." The designated indicates severely limited vision that can not be corrected better than 20/200. Certification as legally blind entitles the individual to state and/or federal assistance for vision services that make the most of the remaining ability to see. Unfortunately, some people with restricted vision have difficulty accepting the designation and so miss out on valuable treatment and benefits. There's a lot of help available: hand-held magnifiers and prisms plus telescopic lenses or microscopic segments for regular lenses. These aids improve visual acuity so that many legally blind people can read and take care of themselves. The optometrist is an eye professional who can certify the condition, prescribe and provide the needed low-vision aids and also provide support to help the patient adjust.

'GWTW' is movie of the century, but not the best

EDITOR'S NOTE - Long after "Bugsy," "The Adams Family" and other current hit movies have been forgotten, a Civil War epic made in 1939 will remain etched in the minds of filmgoers. Here a veteran Hollywood reporter casts his vote for "Gone With the Wind" as the Movie of the Century, even though he concedes it's not his favorite film.

LOS ANGELES (AP) - If the movies, film, talking pictures, motion pictures or whatever is the unique art form of the 20th century, as it undoubtedly is, what then is the unique movie of the century?

Aaahhhh!
Well, after almost 50 years of watching movies, and as a Hollywood reporter, I cast my vote for "Gone With the Wind."

Not that GWTW is my FAVORITE picture. In fact, I didn't feel compelled to see it until 10 years after the original release.

But its lasting impact at home and abroad, and the fact that its protagonists, Scarlett O'Hara (Vivian Leigh)

and Rhett Butler (Clark Gable) have assumed folklore status cannot be ignored.

People of all generations can quote lines such as "Frankly, my dear, I don't give a damn" and "I'll think about it tomorrow."

While critics of the film and Margaret Mitchell's novel from which it was made have pointed to what they claim are its black stereotypes, its equation of sex with power, and its equation of killing with manhood, nevertheless GWTW has remained in the public mind ever since its Dec. 19, 1939 release, a time when World War II in Europe was in its first months.

The film quickly became the biggest moneymaker in U.S. history, though its release abroad was largely stalled until World War II ended. It also set a new Academy Award record, receiving eight Oscars, including one for best picture.

MGM re-released the film in 1947 and continued the practice every seven years, always to impressive grosses. The total net (returns to the

company, not theater receipts) in U.S. and Canadian theaters is listed by Variety at \$79 million. The figure is not adjusted for inflation.

Premier magazine recently ranked "Gone With the Wind" as the sixth most successful film in history with \$259.2 million in total net in a list of the Top 10 movie money-makers in North America, all adjusted for inflation.

The magazine ranked "Star Wars" (1977) first at \$393.2 million, followed by "E.T. the Extra-Terrestrial" (1982) with \$336.9 million, "Jaws" (1975) with \$311.4 million, "The Sound of Music" (1965) at \$310.9 million and "The Godfather" (1972) coming in just slightly above "GWTW" at \$260.6 million.

Meanwhile, Turner Broadcasting, which owns the rights to "GWTW," estimates that worldwide receipts for the film have totaled \$2.1 billion, adjusted for inflation.

Musicalized versions of "Gone With the Wind" have appeared in London, Tokyo, Los Angeles and San Francisco. Television screenings draw strong ratings. MGMUA has sold a million "GWTW" videos in the U.S. alone at a retail price of \$89.98.

Now the Mitchell saga is destined for another go-round. Her estate authorized a sequel novel, "Scarlett," written by Alexandra Ripley, which has topped the best-seller list. The rights for a miniseries have been sold for \$9 million.

Motion pictures have been called the only new art form to be created in the 20th century. While Thomas A. Edison actually developed his Kinetograph in 1889, and other inventions followed, it was Edwin S. Porter's 12-minute "The Great Train Robbery" in 1903 that first proved the dramatic possibilities of the new medium.

The dramas of D.W. Griffith and the comedies of Mack Sennett captured the nation, as did the growing ranks of popular stars, notably Charlie Chaplin, Mary Pickford and Douglas Fairbanks.

The advent of talkies in the late 1920s added hugely to the movies' appeal. Instead of pantomime and printed dialogue, the medium now offered more realism. Musicals filled the screen with spectacle, gangsters' machine guns could be heard, smart dialogue could crackle.

As movies grew more popular, the companies became bigger. By the 1930s, the industry was dominated by six or eight studios who employed hundreds of stars, directors and other creative talent.

The advent of color was another boon for the box office. Three-strip Technicolor, introduced with "Becky Sharp" in 1935, added greatly to the appeal of "Gone With the Wind," especially in the reddish hues of the burning of Atlanta.

Movies flourished through the '30s and '40s, then television began eroding the theater audience. Studio contract lists soon vanished, and the major studios became financial and distribution agencies for filmmakers who were largely independent.

Despite hard times, most of the studios prevailed. New devices were introduced to lure ticket buyers. Stereoscopic movies proved a popular novelty, beginning with "Bwana Devil" in 1952. Major films such as "Kiss Me Kate," "Dial M for Murder" and "House of Wax" were shown in 3-D. Eventually the fad died out, mostly because people complained that the plastic red-and-green glasses gave them headaches.

Wide screens had been attempted from the 1920s on, but they came into vogue with the opening of Cinerama in 1952. Three projectors cast three images on a curving screen that seemed to put the audience into the action. In 1953, 20th Century Fox introduced a one-projector process, CinemaScope, with a biblical spectacle "The Robe." Wide screens became a more permanent part of the filmmaker's tools.

The '80s brought a new burst of prosperity with the development of residual markets: videocassettes, pay TV, etc. It also brought a process of colorizing old black-and-white movies by computer, thus enhancing their appeal for TV and videocassettes. The practice brought a flood of protest from traditionalists.

As the century nears its end, at least four of the major movie companies are owned by foreign companies. But the box office remains strong for hit movies, and Hollywood views the next century with optimism. New processes, such as digital recording and high-definition video, give promise that the film industry will continue to profit from technological advances.

"Gone With the Wind" came along at the height of the big-studio

era in 1939, which produced more classic films than any other year, including "The Wizard of Oz," "Stagecoach," "Mr. Smith Goes to Washington," "Goodbye, Mr. Chips," "Dark Victory" and "Wuthering Heights."

"GWTW" was produced by an independent filmmaker, David O. Selznick. His vision prevailed through the years of the Search for Scarlett, the dozens of script rewrites, the shift of directors.

Why does "Gone With the Wind" continue evergreen in people's memories?

First of all, it was a cracking good story with powerful characters. The casting was perfect, down to the smallest character role. Production values were impeccable; Selznick even insisted on costly laces for the women's petticoats, even though they weren't seen in the film.

And "Gone With the Wind" struck a resonant chord with all Americans, since it dealt movingly with the nation's greatest drama - the Civil War.

"On one hand, 'Gone With the Wind' is a giant, glorified soap opera," comments Leonard Maltin, reviewer and historian for "Entertainment Tonight." "And yet the

characters and the actors are so compelling that it is elevated far beyond the status of a soap opera.

"The fact that it was a period piece when it was first released helps keep it fresh; it doesn't date, as many films on contemporary subjects do.

"I don't know how to explain the popularity of 'Gone With the Wind'; I just marvel at it. Even in the past weeks it was shown on television and got big ratings. I guess it is the ultimate 'event' movie."

"It was simply an engrossing story marvelously made," adds director-producer Robert Wise, former president of the Motion Picture Academy and Oscar winner for "West Side Story" and "The Sound of Music."

"It's an enduring story concerning a vital time in our history. The casting was magnificent. Not just Gable and Leigh, but Leslie Howard, Olivia De Havilland and all the supporting actors. It's one of the few times when the readers of a novel were satisfied with the casting."

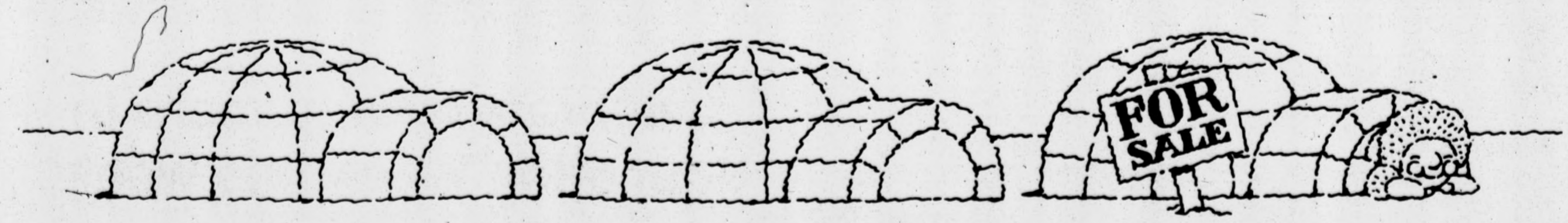

MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

The Lost Sale

The mall was crowded, but the bookstore was almost empty. I was browsing through a stack of discounted books when a customer approached the nearby check-out counter. After waiting a few moments, she interrupted the clerks who were busily engaged in an animated, but private conversation.

Finally, one of the clerks turned and offered to help. The customer asked if the store carried a particular book on a business topic. Without moving, the clerk said that she was sorry but they didn't have that book in stock.

The clerk offered no additional assistance and returned to her interrupted conversation. The customer murmured her thanks and left the store with a disappointed look.

Ordinarily, I wouldn't have paid any attention to this none-

of-my-business conversation. However, on this occasion I had just examined a copy of the book in question - at least I thought I had. With my curiosity aroused, I returned to the business section. Four copies of the exact book the customer requested were on the shelf, available for sale.

The potential customer, however was gone. The sale was lost. Everyone lost during this exchange. The customer's want was not satisfied. The owner's profits were not bolstered by the sale. Even the clerk lost. She lost an employee. Finally, she allowed a potential profit and additional job security to become a competitor's opportunity.

Preventing the loss

In this case, the loss was preventable. The desired product was in the store and the sale should have been made. This is not always true. However, even if the desired product is not in inventory, you may not lose the sale. There are ways to prevent losses.

First, everyone in the store should know the inventory. I know it is not humanly possible to memorize every one of the thousands of titles on a bookstore's shelves. However, in this case, a quick check on the store's computer would have shown the book in stock.

If there is no computer at your store, encourage your employees to get out from behind the counter in slow times and work the inventory. Straighten up shelves, move merchandise to new locations or create new displays. The more everyone knows about the inventory, the more likely you are to make a sale.

Second, train everyone regularly. Every employee with customer contact should understand the importance of taking care of the

customers. Training will reinforce the concept the customer is the only reason any business exists.

With proper training, each clerk in the bookstore would quickly turn to the computer to check on the desired book as a routine service to each customer. Also, a trip to the business section would have made the sale. If the product was not on the shelf, and not in the back room, a knowledgeable clerk might have offered to get the book via special order.

Suggest a Substitute

Third, suggest a suitable alternative for an out-of stock product. Once again, in this case, there were at least four or five other books on the same subject. The customer may have chosen another selection as a satisfactory substitution.

Finally, a trained clerk armed with inventory knowledge and true desire to help the customer, might have suggested additional items to enhance the sale. Challenge your employees to look for additional items to suggest to each customer. McDonald's sells a lot of french fries and apple pies by offering or suggesting those items to its customers.

Turning a lost sale into a satisfied customers is great business building strategy. Grow your business by knowing your inventory, focusing on the customer and using the power of suggestive selling.

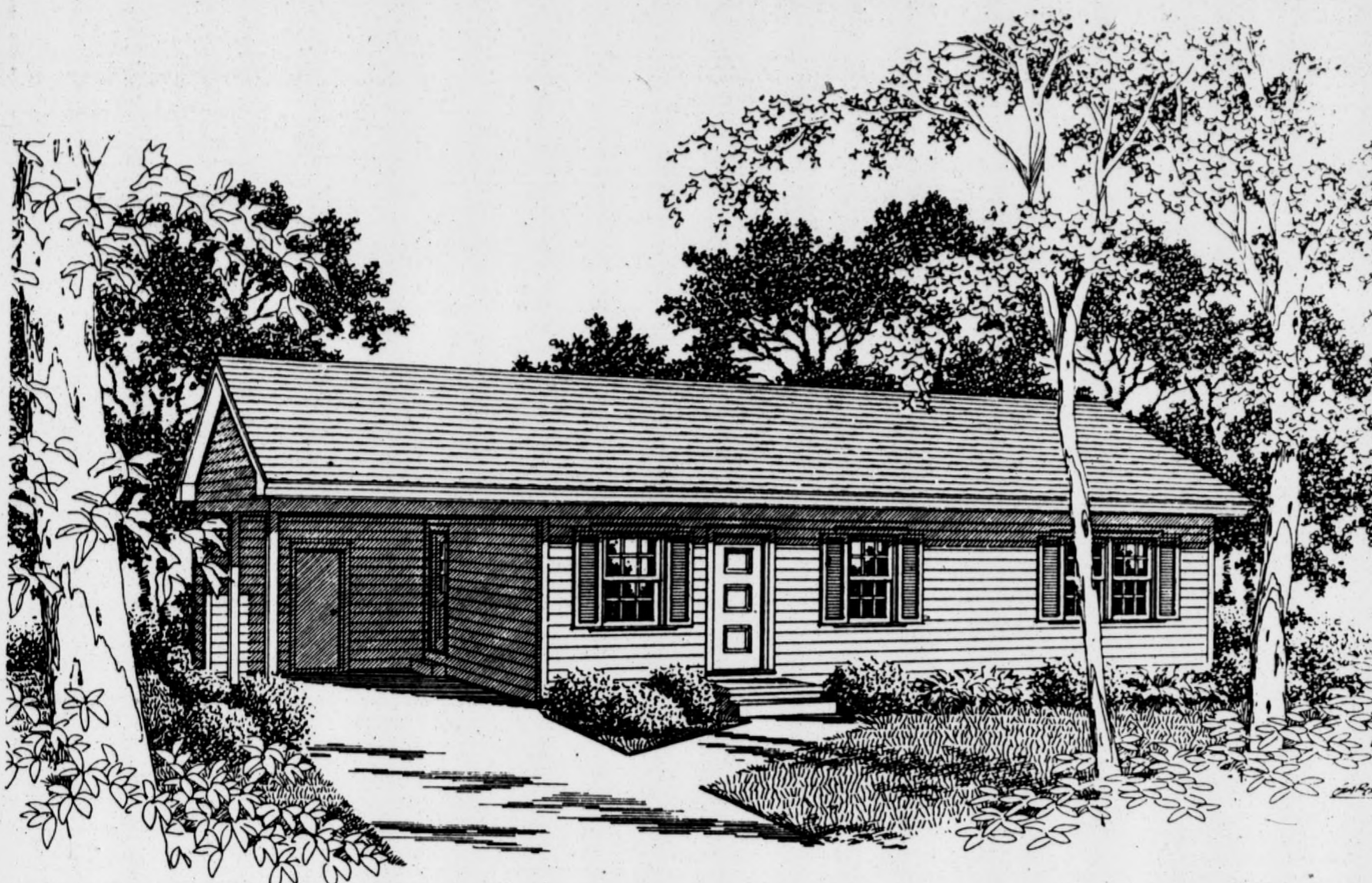

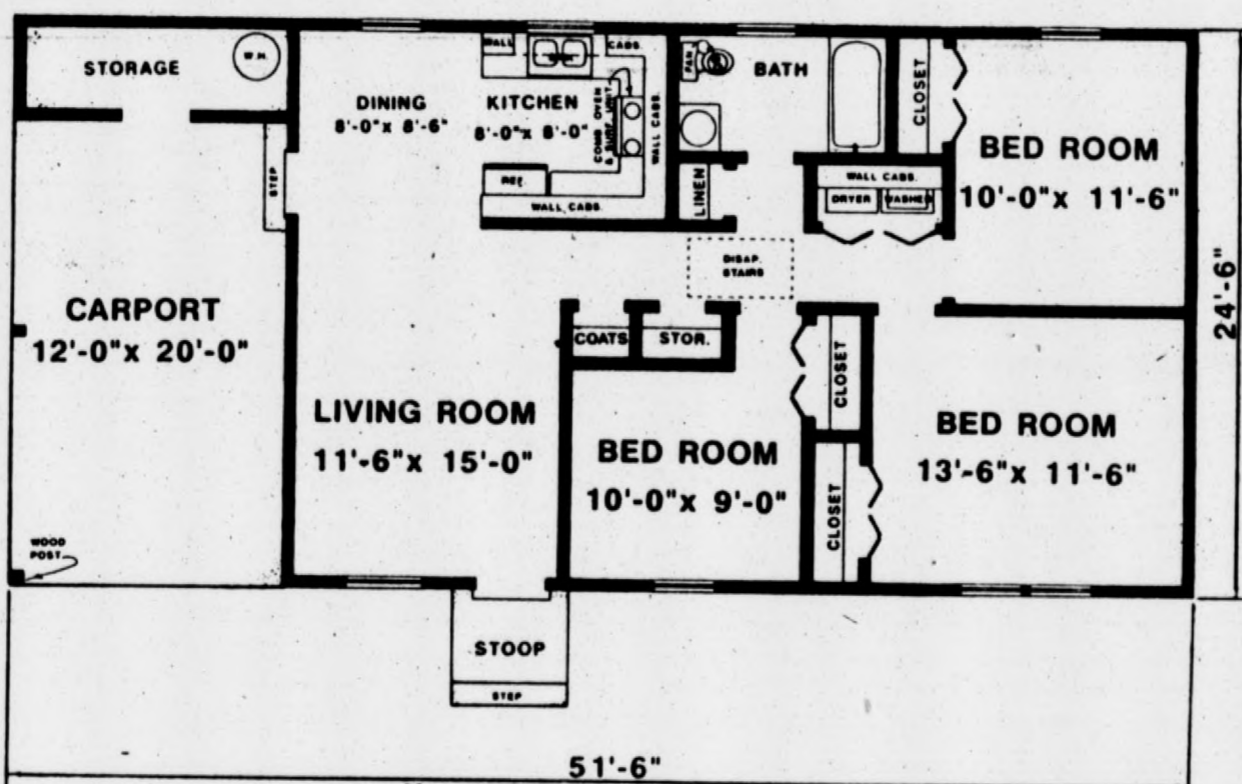

Q. - I have a chronic problem with cracking and peeling paint on the inside of windows and sills. How can I reduce the need to paint so frequently?

sun's rays than other surfaces. Installing storm windows, caulking windows tightly and installing window shades can reduce such weathering.

A. - Many factors can contribute to paint failure on interior surfaces around windows. When windows are leaky, paint is subjected to damage from moisture. The tendency of moisture inside the house to evaporate through points of least resistance, like windows, causes extreme dryness on the surfaces. And sills have a higher exposure to the

Paint can also fail when it's applied to a surface that's too glossy or dirty. It's wise to knock off the sheen on existing paint before repainting. High infiltration of dirt and dust makes it a must to pay careful attention to cleaning surfaces during preparation. Lab data indicate latex polymers bond better than oil-based paints and that latex is chemically more stable when dry.

Question & Answer

Q: My ranch house is about 20 years old. It has a 90-foot-long roof and the width of the house is about 30 feet. The roof deck is in excellent condition, but the shingles need to be replaced soon. I was told this would be the right time to retrofit the roof with a ridge vent, which would eliminate the need of running the attic fan for hours on a hot summer day. Can you advise me on the feasibility of this project and also if this is a do-it-yourself job?

continuous louvered opening that runs almost full length of the roof ridge). Actually, any time, weather permitting, is the right time to retrofit a roof with a ridge vent. The installation is independent of the condition of the shingles. It is a do-it-yourself project providing that you observe normal safety precautions when working on the roof.

A: From your letter, I assume you have asphalt composition shingles on your roof. These shingles generally have a projected life of 17 to 22 years. Yes, this would be a good time to install a ridge vent (a low profile

The ridge vent is very effective in reducing the heat load during the summer months and minimizes the moisture buildup in the attic during the winter. For maximum airflow through the attic, the ridge vent should work in conjunction with soffit vents. If you don't already have soffit vents you should install them when you put in the ridge vent.



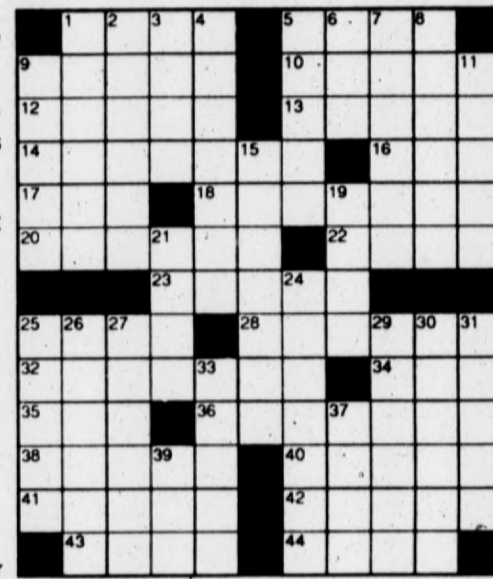

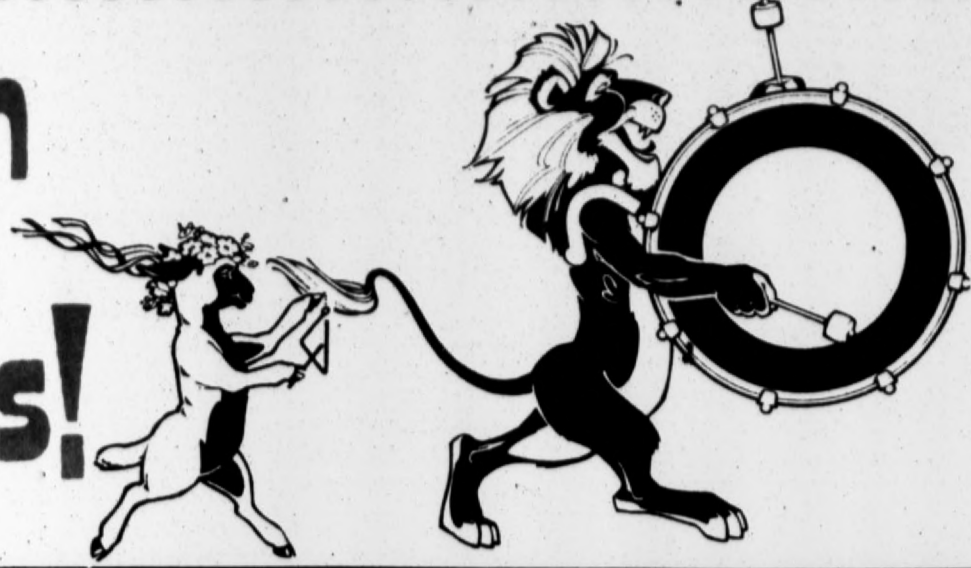

'Powers That Be' takes comedy inside the Beltway

John Forsythe stars in political satire

Based on the track record of its executive producer, *The Powers That Be*, debuting Saturday, March 7, on NBC, will either die ignominiously in four to six weeks or become a staple of contemporary culture, airing on the network for a decade or more. The prime-time mover in question is none other than Norman Lear, a 70-year-old gadfly whose successes have changed the course of television comedy and set a standard even he may not be able to equal.

Twenty-one years ago, Lear stood domestic situation comedy on its ear, replacing suburban picket fences, mom's pearl choker and dads who knew best with a loud-mouthed bigot whose castle was a row house in Queens, his throne a threadbare wing chair six feet from the television. The premiere of *All in the Family* was a cultural event anticipated and dissected by millions. It was an emblem of the 1970s, a decade of confusing moral issues and self-help. And it gave its blessing to the family dinner table, a better place to argue than the streets.

Since *All in the Family*, every Lear hit has broken barriers. *Maude* was the first series about a strident feminist. *Sanford and Son* and *Good Times* were the first to portray blacks in an unidealized urban environment, while *The Jeffersons* showed blacks getting a well-earned taste of the good life. *Mary Hartman, Mary Hartman* was both soap opera and parody. The flops, too, have been famous for their daring, from A.K.A. *Pablo* to *Sunday Dinner*.

Yet Lear insists he doesn't perceive a change in television since he began writing for the medium some 40 years ago.

"My grandfather taught me life is

about throwing pebbles in the water. You don't ever see the water rise, but you have the faith that it does. Any physicist will tell you that it does. For all the talk about changing the face of television, it still seems to me like throwing a pebble in the water. I've never seen the tide rise at all."

Perhaps that's what keeps Lear going at an age when the youthful fire to change the world is generally expected to have cooled. His latest foray is an election-year satire that's intended to pay dividends of renewed interest in political leadership.

The Powers That Be stars John Forsythe as Senator William Powers, a five-term Eastern Democrat who's being pressured to run for president. Holland Taylor (*Bosom Buddies*) plays the chilling woman behind the man, a Lady MacBeth who slaps her hapless maid in front of a tickled studio audience, then drags her offstage for more verbal and physical abuse. Valerie Mahaffey plays their nervous daughter, billed as a recovering anorexic, who's married to a wimpy congressman (David Pierce). Peter MacNichol is Powers' harried, image-conscious press secretary, and Eve Gordon (*Coming of Age*) is Powers' mistress. As if this weren't enough, the one-hour pilot introduces Powers' gate-crashing illegitimate Jewish daughter (Robin Bartlett) conceived while he served in the Korean War.

There's hardly anyone to root for here; the ensemble cast is a collection of hollow stereotypes orbiting a gutless central character. Stick around, begs Lear, and watch the well-meaning senator develop a spine. But evolution takes time, and this series may not have until next month.

'Cloning of Joanna May' doesn't bear repeating

Fine performances don't redeem slow-moving film

 In 1987, cable's Arts & Entertainment network debuted the BBC's four-part adaptation of author Fay Weldon's *The Life and Loves of a She-Devil*. Grounded by an ACE award-winning script, the TV version perfectly captured the dark hilarity of Weldon's story, and Phillip Saville's direction kept the work going at a fair clip.
 Sadly, the same cannot be said for A&E's latest adaptation of a Weldon work, despite the fact it was produced by so many of the same people. *The Cloning of Joanna May*, premiering Sunday, March 1, is a disappointment, offering little (if any) of the biting wit and insight that made *She-Devil* such

watchable fun.
 A&E bills *Joanna May* as a "darkly comic tale of obsessive love and genetic engineering." A more accurate description might read, "a slow, sordid tale of sexism, dubious science, low self-esteem and the male ego at its most pathetic."
 Carl May (Brian Cox) is a self-made man. Born to poverty in Eastern Europe, Carl rose to wealth and power through shrewd business acumen and unbridled ambition. One of his acquisitions was his wife Joanna (Patricia Hodge), a redheaded beauty of considerable style. Carl realizes, however, that time will take its inevitable toll on his wife's looks (he apparently has no such thoughts about himself) and determines to find a solution. Engaging

handy genetic-engineers-for-hire, Carl has Joanna cloned and places the three budding beauties with different families. The plan? To choose the pick of the laboratory litter when the girls reach a suitable age.
 The acting in *Joanna May* is deft and appealing, as far as it goes. Patricia Hodge (Mary Fisher in *She-Devil*) is sympathetic in the title role, and Brian Cox's elegance makes Carl slightly less loathsome. Veteran character actress Billie Whitelaw delivers the film's most winning performance as Mavis, a bumbling private eye long employed by Joanna to track Carl's romantic wanderings.

 "My dad was a better singer than I am, I believe," says Grammy-winning singer/songwriter Rodney Crowell. "I got my voice from my mother."
 The Houston native has found plenty of success in his own right, earning accolades from *Cashbox* magazine, the Country Music Association and the Academy of Country Music. He also holds the record for the number of singles (five) from one album (*Diamonds and Dirt*) to top the country charts of *Billboard* magazine.

AN ANGEL AT MY TABLE: (1991/Australian) This is the acclaimed Jane Campion film, with script drawn from three autobiographical novels by the New Zealand writer, Janet Frame. The movie not only tells the astounding real-life story of Janet Frame but, quite successfully, explores the roots and evolution of literary imagination, specifically, Janet Frame's: astounding literary imagination.

As it proceeds from Miss Frame's austere childhood through her years in a mental hospital, and eventual recognition as a writer, the story reaches beyond worldly events to tap the writer's hidden instincts and thoughts.
