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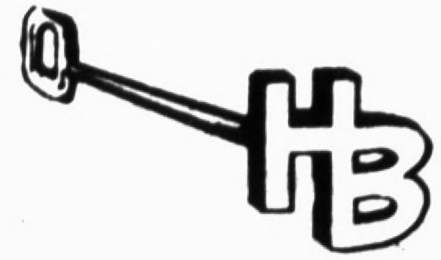

Stamps, like post office, change

For those who remember the penny postcard and a three-cent first class stamp, today's post office is not what it used to be.

All kinds of merchandise emanate from the post office and even the common postage stamp is not ordinary.

Charles Britten, the Hereford postmaster since May 1985, agrees that the postal service has looked for new ways to make expense and revenue balance.

Besides stamps, a variety of items depicting certain stamps can be bought in the post office -- from "Love" nightshirts to picture puzzles. Stamps, though, still are the biggest commodity on sale and each year several new designs are issued, often matching holidays.

This year's holiday stamps -- one design features Santa Claus and another is a Madonna and Child -- were printed before the postal service's governing board decided whether to raise the price of a single first class stamp.

"These stamps don't have a price on them," said Britten, "because they thought the price would go from 29 cents to 30 cents."

Fortunately, foresight left a price off the stamps because the proposed postage increase of one cent was not approved.

Britten said there also may be two more holiday designs issued before Christmas.

Stamp-buyers often select stamps to match the mailing, pointed out Britten.

For instance, a bride-to-be may request the "Love" stamp for her wedding invitations. The 29-cent Love stamp is an interesting design of a globe in the shape of a heart.

Obviously, holiday greeting cards will have the special seasonal stamps affixed.

"Usually, men don't care much what the stamp looks like," said Britten, "but women may ask to see the stamps available. Sometimes, they buy some of several kinds."

Each year, the U.S. Postal Service offers sets of stamps for sale. For instance, all 29-cent issues in a single year come in a commemorative mint set.

A definitive mint set includes an example of every stamp, regardless of denomination, issued in a year.

Cost of the special sets is face value of the stamps, plus the binder.

Some noted figures in the past have been stamp collectors. President Franklin D. Roosevelt often was photographed while, supposedly, studying his collection.

Stamp clubs offer collectors a communications medium and the postal service provides information on a continuing basis to persons who request it.

A few years ago, the postal service made a concerted effort to promote youth collectors. Ben Franklin Stamp Clubs were organized and starter sets for young collectors were sold in post offices.

The starter sets no longer are a post office commodity, said Britten, who noted that flagging interest caused the department to discontinue that service.

A very valuable item for some collectors is a Postal Guide, issued annually, that gives details, such as worth and availability, on U.S. stamps, dating back to 1847.

'91 Stocking

fund underway

Donations for the 1991 edition of the Christmas Stocking Fund are now being accepted at The Hereford Brand, and the anonymous volunteer committee which administers the program is making plans to extend assistance to Hereford and Deaf Smith County's less fortunate this Yule season.

CSF is administered by an anonymous group of volunteers representing a broad cross-section of the community. Applications for assistance are thoroughly screened and processed by the committee.

The newspaper serves as the fund raiser for the community-wide charity effort. Several contributions have already been received at The Brand office, so the names of donors will start being listed next week.

CSF announced that applications for assistance will be accepted beginning Nov. 25 and will continue through Dec. 13 at the county Red Cross office, 224 S. Main. Please do not make application before Nov. 25.

The stocking fund project started on a small scale in 1980 when \$4,800 was contributed to the program. The fund grew each year until a record of \$20,718 was reached in 1989. Last year the total was \$18,026.

The CSF committee will be making plans for the charitable drive next week. The group screens the hundreds of applications for assistance and makes the hard decisions necessary to make the charity function.

The committee has some openings and could use more volunteers. Persons interested in being considered for the CSF committee can contact O.G. Nieman, publisher of The Hereford Brand. He will submit the name to the committee.

CSF is not affiliated with any other organization and has no ties to any governmental agency--local, state or

national. It was created for the purpose of extending assistance to some of the community's less fortunate during the Christmas season. Its funding is generated solely by the contributions of local residents who use this means to show concern for their neighbors during this season of giving.

CSF is asking local churches, civic clubs and other groups and individuals to coordinate with the charity in order to avoid duplication of effort. Groups can contact CSF through the Red Cross office to make CSF aware of the assistance being given to local residents.

CSF can also be contacted to obtain names of needy individuals or families. "Our intent is to help the greatest number of needy," said a CSF spokesman. "If another group or individual is helping a family that is among our applicants, we're able to reach someone else. Otherwise, a single applicant might receive help from several sources, while another needy family might receive no help at all."

Local schools are again asked to conduct canned food drives for CSF. Hereford and Deaf Smith County youngsters have made a major contribution to CSF's food assistance efforts in the past.

Canned foods, paper goods and toiletries are especially helpful items that can be donated by students. Local businesses have helped with competitive food drives of their own the past few years, and such assistance is welcomed again this season.

Service clubs at Hereford High are asked to help by collecting items at the various school campuses, which can then be gathered and delivered to the CSF work station on Dec. 18.

Delivery day will be Dec. 23, and CSF is seeking delivery help.

Southwestern Bell Telephone customers in Hereford will gain access to the most advanced telecommunications networks available Saturday when the phone company converts its system here to a new digital switching system.

The system will serve 6,829 customers in the 364 exchange.

The new equipment has been installed as part of an agreement announced in November 1990 by the Texas Public Utility Commission and Southwestern Bell Telephone, according to Gary Stevens, area manager. The switch is being installed in an accelerated program designed to help boost the Texas economy and provide customer benefits worth more than \$1.2 billion through 1994.

"The negotiated settlement was a product of months of intense discussion among the PUC staff, Southwestern Bell and 23 separate intervening groups," said Stevens. "The agreement provided an incentive to build a telecommunications network that should attract new businesses and job to Texas without increasing costs to the Texas ratepayers."

"With this conversion, Hereford customers will be served by a switching system that is second to none."

Stevens said the digital technology enhances a community's ability to retain and attract new business as well as improved telecommunications services.

"Digital switching enables

Southwestern Bell to improve voice transmission quality and make available a number of new services," Stevens said. New services made possible by the new digital switch include One-Plus Easy Access to long distance carriers, and custom features like Call Forwarding, Call Waiting, Speed Calling and Three-Way Calling.

"Digital switching upgrades Hereford's status in the eyes of business and industry," Steven said.

"Digital is the world standard for advanced telecommunications. It's a definite selling point for a community." The switch allows businesses to use Plexar office communication systems and Digital Link data transmission services.

Another benefit of digital technology is the cost-effectiveness of space requirements and maintenance. In replacing the mechanical system currently in use, the new system uses computers to perform millions of switching functions each second. The system can diagnose itself and, in many cases, correct a problem before customers are affected.

NM ready for ski season

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) - Ski New Mexico has posted this winter's forecast from "The Farmers Almanac" in its Santa Fe offices.

It's everything the ski industry organization could ask for: colder than normal temperatures for November through March for the Rocky Mountains, with above-normal precipitation in the central and southern sections, well-above-normal snowfall over the region and colder and snowier than normal for Thanksgiving through Christmas.

"That's about as good as it gets," said Steve Lewis, media relations coordinator for Ski New Mexico.

The 1990-91 season brought record crowds to Taos Ski Valley, Santa Fe Ski Area and Angel Fire and posted a high for total skier days in the state.

Some 7,000 people were employed in the ski industry last season. Ski New Mexico quoted the Anderson Schools of Management at the University of New Mexico as estimating the industry's impact on the state's economy at \$303 million for the year.

New Mexico got abundant early snowfall last year and continued to get snow when most other areas of the country didn't. Although New

Mexico's snowfall ended up only slightly above average, its eight alpine and one cross-country areas had a record 1.15 million skier days, compared with the previous high of 1.13 million skier days in 1986-87 for 12 ski areas, Ski New Mexico said.

But this year, the nation's economic picture has been gloomy and early snowfall elsewhere has been better than last year, giving New Mexico more potential competition.

Still, New Mexico ski area operators are optimistic, believing the poor economy won't hurt them too much.

"We're one of the least expensive

places to ski in the West. Prices have gone up, but it's still a value when compared to some of the mega-resorts. ... Value is what everyone's into in today's economic market," Lewis said.

"If we have a good snow, it will override the effects of the economy, I believe," said Chris Stagg, vice president for marketing at Taos Ski Valley. "If the snow is average or below average, we'll see the effects of the economy more."

Resort operators also expect some out-of-state skiers who discovered New Mexico last season to come back.

STAMPS

Collectors of new stamps usually buy a sheet, said Britten. Some keep a block for their own collections and may trade, at a later date, with the remainder.

Stamps through the years have become more attractive, often designed by professional artists and printed in full color. The postal service has recognized individuals and events with commemorative stamps.

Since the Postal Service is a sponsor of the U.S. Olympic effort, a special stamp has been issued to note that activity.

In the stamp drawers at the Hereford post office these days are a stamp noting the founding of Switzerland in 1291 and another honoring a pioneer woman pilot, Harriet Quimby.

A Black Heritage stamp and more than one denomination of stamp featuring the Bald Eagle also are offered for sale.

Recently, a booklet of 29-cent stamps featured the caricatures of comedians, drawn by Al Hirschfeld. The 20 stamps could raise a nostalgia trip just by looking at the drawings Laurel and Hardy, Bergen and McCarthy, Jack Benny, Fanny Brice and Abbott and Costello.

Apparently the series was used primarily in booklets, said Britten,

because the Hereford post office did not receive sheets of the stamps.

"We ordinarily get about 5,000 of every stamp that comes out," said Britten. This practice allows the consumer to buy the newest commemoratives, if desired, instead of the standard stamp featuring the flag.

Postal officials continue to seek new ways to finance the mail service and selling the consumer items is one way. This holiday season, there are several items, including a sweat shirt and a lapel pin, with the Christmas theme.

A few years ago, Britten pointed out, the U.S. Postal Service initiated overnight delivery, but the share of the market for that service has dropped dramatically. Several for-profit companies entered competition for those dollars.

On the other hand, some articles that are available for purchase have brought good results.

"We got a limited supply of the Love t-shirt and sold all of them in a few days," he reported.

A mug appropriate for a Mother's Day gift also got good response from the public, Britten said.

The post office is willing to sell stamps to collectors as long as they last, he said, with good reason.

"When someone buys a sheet and doesn't use the stamps, that's all profit," Britten said.

Sharks perform Friday; Mowrey Saturday at mall

A Shark attack will hit Hereford Nov. 22 at 7 p.m. at the Hereford High School Auditorium.

The Sharks, an Amarillo singing group, will perform the concert to benefit the Hereford High School Career Education Program sponsored by the Boy Scouts of America. Tickets, at \$4 each, are available at Silver Screen Video, Hi-Tech Video and Video Escape.

The Sharks have appeared in Hereford before, including being the featured entertainment at this year's Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce banquet.

The members of the eight-person group are professionals in Amarillo. The original group met at the Central Church of Christ for a one-time fling for a talent contest several years ago. They now perform at various functions in Amarillo, elsewhere in Texas and in New Mexico and Oklahoma.

The group features music from the Fifties and Sixties, but also mixes in Motown favorites and gospel songs. While some of their songs are accompanied by pre-recorded music, some songs are performed a cappella.

"We know that a lot of people enjoyed the Sharks at the chamber

banquet this year and have seen them before," said Beau Sill, local district executive for Boy Scouts. "We hope to have a large crowd to enjoy the concert and to help our program."

Up-and-coming country singer Dude Mowrey will appear live in concert Nov. 23 at 8 p.m. at Sugarland Mall in Hereford.

Tickets are available for \$10 in advance from any mall merchant or at HCR Real Estate. Tickets at the door will be \$12 per person.

"We're sponsoring this to try to bring more live entertainment to Hereford," said Henry Reid of HCR, which manages the mall. "We hope that if we get a big turnout for this concert we can get even bigger names in the future and have more entertainment here."

Mowrey is only 19, but has had several songs on the charts. He has also appeared on Nashville Now, Hee Haw and Crook & Chase, and has opened for concerts for Mel Tillis and others.

Mowrey began singing when he was three, picking up verses of Hank Williams songs from his father's singing. By age 7, he performed before a large audience, singing Kenny Rogers' hit, "Coward of the County." He made his first trip to Nashville, recording there and performing at various Nashville spots.

He hooked up with Tillis several years ago, and Tillis is now serving as his manager. Tillis alerted Jimmy Bowen, president of Capitol Records, to Mowrey's talent, and Bowen signed him to a contract with one proviso: Mowrey had to graduate from high school.

Mowrey's debut album included "Honky Tonk Song," "Good Lookin'," "Cowboys Don't Cry," "Falling (Never Felt so Good)" and "We Got Love."

Odessa families file suit against tire plant

ODESSA (AP) - The wicked stench sneaking into Melvin Watson's house is a familiar, if uninvited, guest.
At first, the odor is of rotten eggs. But after a few minutes the scent is overpowering, "as if something had died," Watson says.
Watson's wife and two young boys often complain of headaches, then nausea.

If the smell becomes too pungent, the Watsons will repeat what has become a 15-year-long custom - they will drive 18 miles to Midland, dig into their limited funds and rent a hotel room.
The Watsons and nearly 1,300 other residents who live near Dynagen Inc. in south Odessa have for years blamed ailments on the rubber plant's emissions.
Now they are suing the plant in a class action lawsuit for \$27 million,

claiming Dynagen's pollution robs them of their property rights.
"It gets so bad my little boy will come running in from playing on a beautiful summer day and say 'Daddy, it's stinking again, let's close the windows,'" Watson said.
"We have to lock ourselves in on a summer day to try and avoid getting sick. There's something wrong with that."
Complaints about Dynagen, which manufactures latex and tire rubber,

began pouring into the Texas Air Control Board office in the mid-1980s. Dynagen's air nuisance violations increased to such a point that the Texas Air Control Board sued the plant in 1989 to force it to clean up.
The case was settled this fall when Dynagen, a subsidiary of General Tire Inc. based in Akron, Ohio, agreed to pay \$1.4 million, the largest penalty ever assessed under the Texas Clean Air Act.

Dynagen also agreed to spend more than \$12 million to install state-of-the-art equipment to rid the plant of faulty air emissions.
But Neil Carman, the Air Control Board's chief investigator of the plant, said last week that Dynagen continues to violate state rules.
Carman, who described Dynagen's case "as the worst mess I have ever seen," said the board has cited the

rubber plant 11 times for air nuisance violations since the September settlement.
"We are considering further legal action against the plant," Carman said. "The problems out there have got to stop."
Word of more legal battles and negative publicity jolts Dynagen employees, who fear losing their jobs if the plant is forced to shut down due

The trees, if used as a windbreak in two or more rows, will give cover to wildlife and shelter homes, cattle and roads from wind and snow.
Applications will be taken until mid-March 1992. Ordering early will ensure getting the species you want. The seedlings will arrive the last week of March and can be picked up at the SCS office in Hereford.

Solar workshop scheduled Monday

When do you switch from the windmill to solar energy? That is the question to be addressed November 18 at the Texas Agricultural Research and Extension Center, 6500 Amarillo Blvd. West, Amarillo.
Registration will begin at 10 a.m. with several commercial solar companies having their systems on display until 1 p.m.
Speakers will begin at 1 p.m. Topics to be covered will be: The Economics of Wind vs. Solar Water Pumping; Performance of Existing Systems; Understanding Photovoltaic; Using Falling Water to Pump Uphill with a Hydro Pump and Chopping Ice Alternatives.
The program will conclude by 4 p.m. Jimmie D. Walker, county Extension agent and John Graves,

district conservationist, Soil Conservation Service are chairing the seminar. Walker said, "We decided there was a need for such a program because of the numerous calls we get concerning the solar energy possibilities. When making major repairs to their windmills or drilling a new well, producers are making a financial decision of the type of pumping system to use. We have planned the seminar to help in those decisions."
The seminar is sponsored by the Oldham County Extension Office, Oldham County Soil and Water Conservation District, Tri-State Solar Association, and the Oldham County Solar Associates.

People who had never skied in New Mexico before commented on the quality of the skiing and the lack of aggravations such as long lift lines, Lewis said.
"We encountered a lot of happy first-time skiers to New Mexico, so we will see some returning skiers," he said.
Santa Fe Ski Area had very good response from the Californians who liked not only the skiing but New Mexico's ambiance, said Debbi Owen, administrative coordinator for the Santa Fe and Sandia Peak ski areas.
"I think we're going to hold our own with good snow conditions," she said. "We may not see record breaking like we did last year, but I think we'll maintain."
"We could lose some to Colorado possibly if the snow is good (in Colorado)," said Phil Thyen, marketing director for Red River. "But people are starting to discover New Mexico. We're getting people from different markets all over, even on the East Coast."
But New Mexico isn't resting on its laurels. Ski New Mexico has advertised in skiing magazines and the state has placed a number of ads in special ski sections in publications in Texas and California.
And ski areas have put in improvements.

with increased terrain and a new expert run.
Ski Apache plans to open Nov. 22, about a week earlier than normal.
The ski area does not offer lodging, but Patricia Morrison, who does marketing for Ski Apache, said she's been told quite a few lodges in nearby Ruidoso already are booked for the Christmas holidays, normally the busiest time of year for ski resorts.
Red River, Santa Fe and Taos plan to open Thanksgiving Day, Nov. 28.
"We're about two times ahead of where we were last year (with early snow)," Red River's Thyen said last week.
Red River advertised where it traditionally draws heavily - Texas, Oklahoma and Kansas - and increased ads in Louisiana. It also expects to capitalize on its strength as a ski town for families, Thyen said.
Skiers at Taos Ski Valley who stay more than a day or two come from Southern California, metropolitan New York, Chicago and Texas, Stag said.
Reservations are up 30 percent so far over last year, he said.
But, he said, "if there's no snow, or the snow isn't good, we'll see more people changing around or canceling their plans because they don't feel so confident with the economy."
Angel Fire plans to open Dec. 12. Curt Hanlen, director of operations and marketing, said reservations are running ahead of last year at this time.
"This year... holiday periods are beginning to approach capacity and our off-season (non-holiday) bookings are up substantially," he said. "If Mother Nature delivers, we'll probably be on track for another record ski season."
Skiers who bring a can of food to Angel Fire on opening day ski free; those who give canned food the following three days ski for half price.

The promotion, augmented by turkeys donated by businesses and corporations, should provide food boxes to 200 to 300 needy northern New Mexico families, Hanlen said.
Angel Fire also plans its annual white sale, reducing the price of a lift ticket to \$20 between Jan. 1 and Feb. 13, Hanlen said.
Sipapu, 25 miles from Taos, plans to open Dec. 13, but already has gotten many telephone calls and reservations from skiers from Oklahoma, northern Texas and Kansas, said Charles Cathcart, assistant area manager.
Reservations indicate the ski area is keeping more of the people who showed up last year, Cathcart said.
"We have more reservations now for the coming season than we had for last season," he said.
Cathcart said Sipapu is doing more direct marketing, especially to Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas, Louisiana and


Arkansas, which were largely responsible for last year's increase.
Sandia Peak, which draws most of its business from around Albuquerque, is to open Dec. 14.
Pajarito, seven miles west of Los Alamos, has not set an opening date but typically opens in mid-December, said Rose Alexander, business manager.
The ski area, run by the non-profit Los Alamos Ski Club, draws most of its business from the Albuquerque, Santa Fe and Los Alamos areas and from Texas.
Pajarito had a better-than-average season in 1990-91, but not as good as the record-breaking year of 1987, Alexander said.
But area officials are looking forward to this year.
"We hope it's a record-breaking year," Alexander said. "It's starting out like it was in '87. The weather is real similar."

Red River has added six new trails and expanded its mountaintop restaurant; Ski Apache has a new quad lift, five new trails and expanded ticket windows and plans to offer snow boarding for the first time; Taos has replaced a double chair with a quad, expanded its snowmaking system by 30 percent and expanded its kids' ski building; Santa Fe has built a new children's complex offering everything from day care to ski lessons; and Angel Fire is celebrating its 25th anniversary

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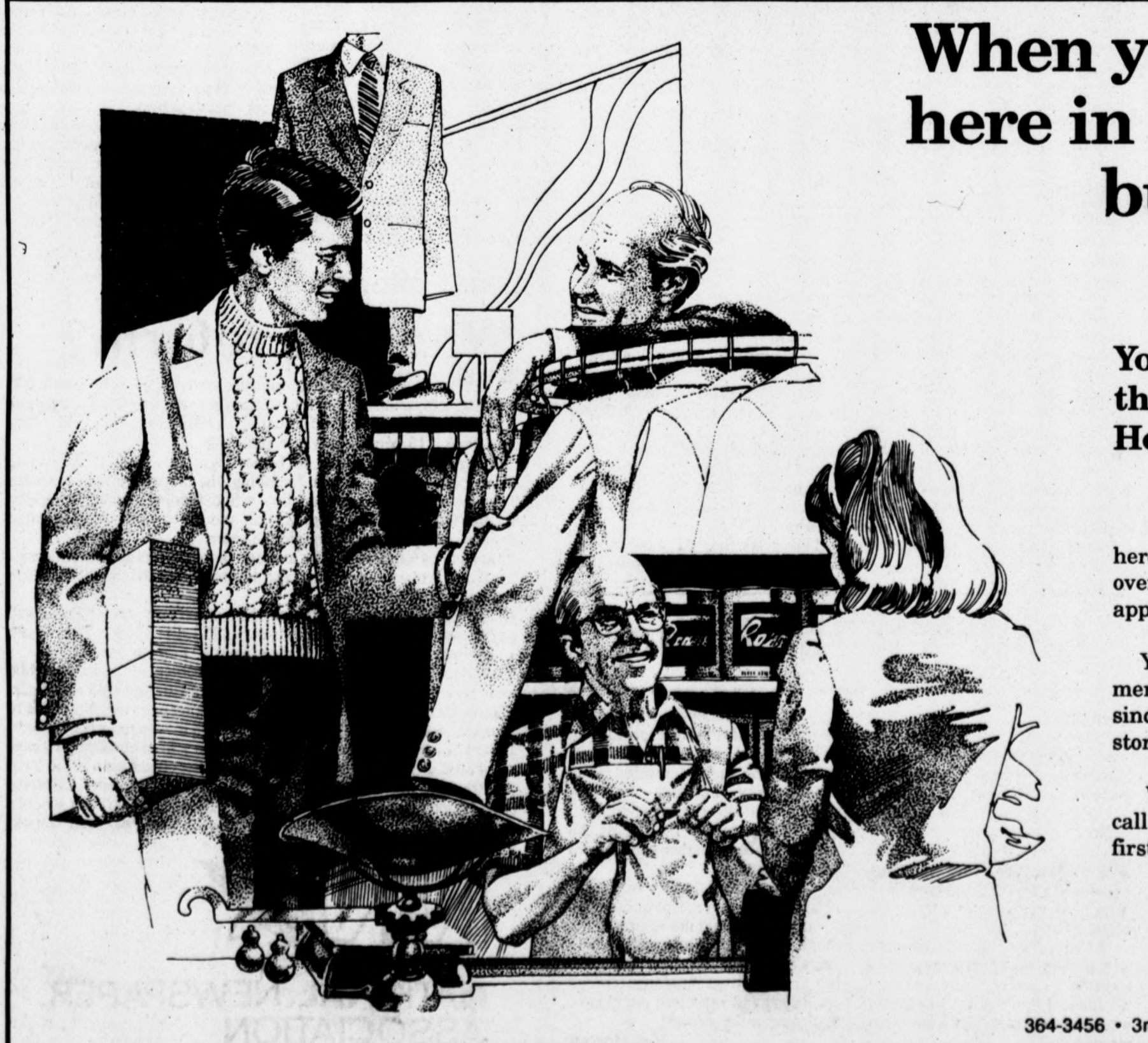

There are a lot of names you could come up with other than Indians or animals, says Dow. Such as:

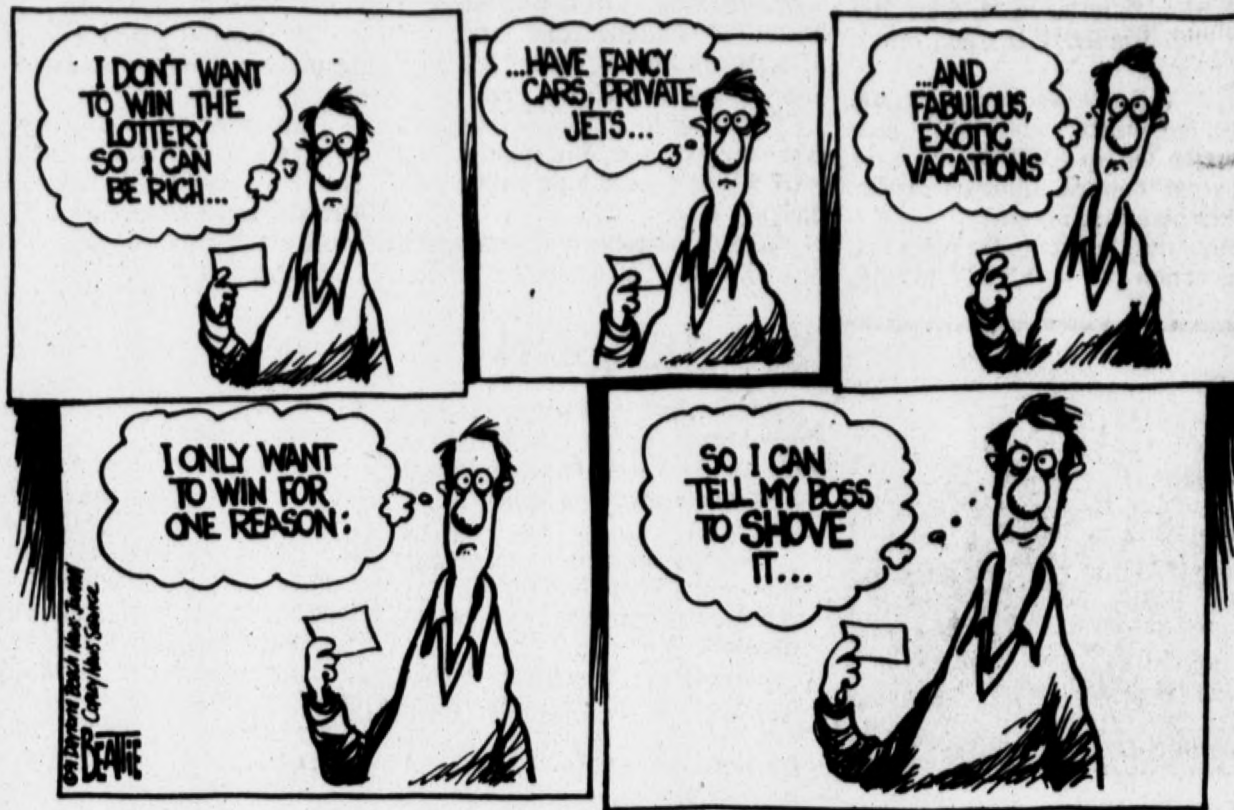

Recession or not, people hurting

 WASHINGTON (AP) - Shunning textbook terms, Ronald Reagan used to say that a recession was when your neighbors lost their jobs, and a depression was when you lost your own.

That kind of everyday economics might be useful at the White House now, as President Bush tries to deal with the political problems of an economic slump he'd rather not call a recession.

His political allies don't all agree. "We are in a recession," Sen. Phil Gramm, R-Tex., said Wednesday. "If we've turned the corner in the economy, we didn't leave any skid marks."

Bush says instead that "the signals are mixed." His latest diagnosis - growth, but not as much as he'd like, inflation in check, relatively low interest rates that he predicts will boost sagging consumer confidence.

"But people are hurting," Bush told a campaign fund-raising crowd in New York on Tuesday, charging that congressional Democrats have "mugged" an administration program that would have kept the economy strong.

Bush points to a 2.4 percent increase in the gross national product during the three months ended in September. While it isn't the kind of growth he wants, he said in Rome earlier this month, "it is not recession. It does not fit the definition of recession."

Congressional Democrats and the party's presidential candidates said he ought to stay home and look around, a theme they've been hammering for weeks. Rep. Joseph P. Kennedy II of Massachusetts said Bush believes in "tinkerbell economics" in which a recession can be wished away with a blink and a click of the heels.

But Bush insists all the Democrats offer is "phony action ... some euphoric tax cut" that may or may not help. He said his growth plan, centered on a cut in the capital gains tax rate, has been put into "liberal limbo" in Congress.

Jack Kemp, the secretary of housing and urban development, has been pushing for a tax cut that would couple the administration plan with rate reductions the Democrats want. "This economy, while technically, perhaps, out of recession, it's limping, it's anemic and it needs some oxygen in the body economic to create more jobs, to create more growth," Kemp said in a CBS-TV interview.

Whatever the terminology, the impact on jobs, on income, on business, on consumer confidence, is what counts now and for 1992. From the days when Bush was rated invulnerable for re-election, there's always been a caveat for the economy and the possibility that persistent recession could make it a major liability.

That's starting to show up in public opinion surveys, with Bush's

job approval ratings dipping to the mid-50 percent range, down sharply from the highs of the Persian Gulf victory but still higher than those of other third-year presidents in the past three decades.

An economic slump in or just before a campaign year means trouble for the party in power. The 1980 recession was one of the issues that helped Reagan beat Jimmy Carter.

In the summer of 1976, the year Gerald R. Ford lost to Carter, inflation was the problem, and a poll showed a two-to-one preference for Democrats as the party that would do the best job of keeping the country prosperous.

That preference shifted to the Republicans during the Reagan years, but Bush's economic performance ratings have dwindled now.

Even so, there are other issues - not least, the foreign policy interests

his critics are discounting as they taunt his travels abroad and insist on more emphasis on the economy and other issues at home. As the commander-in-chief, he has a record and standing no challenger can rival.

Furthermore, the Democrats haven't been able to put together a coherent economic recovery plan of their own; that's still a work in process, despite a recession that dates from July, 1990.

Independent economists don't know whether it is over or not. By standard definitions, a recession occurs when the gross national product declines for at least two consecutive quarters, a six-month period. There were three quarterly declines in this one. Recovery means at least two straight quarters of economic expansion; there's been one, but there are indications the year may end with another decrease.

Not to mention another argument about terminology.

Where is reform?

The results are in. The state comptroller surveyed the more than 1,000 school districts in the state and has found that the average tax rate has increased from \$1.06 per \$100 valuation in 1990 to \$1.20 in 1991. That is more than a 13 percent increase statewide.

Once again we have been misled by our Legislature. From the beginning of the reform of public school financing, the taxpayers of Texas were told that the new plan would "equalize" school funding. The high property value districts would pay more in taxes and the low property tax value districts would pay less or remain the same.

That has not happened. The average taxpayer has seen his share of local school property taxes increase at three times the rate of inflation in one year.

If that rate of increase continues, the property owners of Texas will be paying an average of \$1.35 next year and \$1.50 by 1993. That would be a total increase in tax rate of more than 40 percent.

The Legislature, by design, is passing the problem of financing public schools in Texas to the local property owner. But, through mandates, regulations and other rules, the Legislature is taking more and more control of the operations of the public schools away from the elected school boards.

If the Legislature wants to control how the school children of Texas are educated, then they should also pay for that education. If the local taxpayers are to pay for that education, then the elected representatives of those citizens should have more control of the operations of our schools.

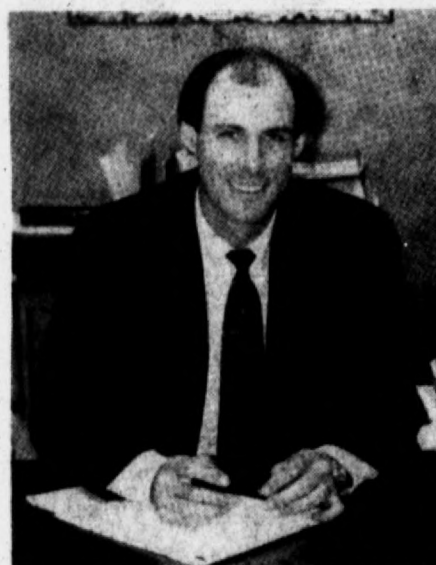

to increasingly costly penalties.

"I don't understand why we have all this animosity against us," Luke Wallace, who has worked at Dynagen for five years, told the Odessa American. "I think Dynagen is doing everything they possibly can ... I don't think we've been given a fair shake."

Dynagen employs more than 200 people and has an estimated payroll of \$8 million, according to company officials.

But employee John Meeks said the fallout from shutting down the plant would cost Odessa between 500 and 600 jobs.

"(The city) will be one who pays for it," Meeks said.

For years Dynagen illegally burned waste rubber laced with carcinogens butadiene and styrene in an overloaded incinerator, according to records from the Air Control Board investigation that led to the 1989 lawsuit.

Too many complaints from residents about the odors and an investigation by Carman forced the plant to shut the incinerator down in 1989.

The most recent complaints are caused by odors coming from the plant's massive waste water evaporation ponds.

The ponds cover 165 acres, and as the temperature outside steams up, the vapors from what government officials call "sludge" become increasingly noxious.

ENSR Consulting and Engineering, an independent environmental group hired by Dynagen, determined that more than 18 million gallons of sludge, a thick, gooey byproduct of the plant's waste water, has been allowed to accumulate in Dynagen's ponds.

Bill Lockey, who heads the Texas Water Commission's Odessa office, said he tried to solve the problem by draining the ponds and allowing the sludge to air out, but the stench was too strong.

"I told them to put the water back in there," Lockey said. "The odor was horrible. I think ultimately we will have to shut the ponds down."

The hostility between residents and the plant became so heated that the Rev. Jesse Jackson attempted to soothe feelings in a July visit.

"We need the plant, we need the jobs, we need the right to breathe free," said Jackson, who noted that "when

the emissions do blow, there's a dropoff in school attendance."

"The people in the community have a right to be at the table," Jackson said, adding that his participation would "make sure the interest of the plant managers, the workers and the community coincide."

Jackson helped initiate a committee comprised of plant officials and residents to help deal with the problem.

Dynagen plant manager Tim Gorman downplayed the recent air nuisance violations, saying the problems at the plant have dwindled considerably since the settlement.

"It gets so bad my little boy will come running in from playing on a beautiful summer day and say 'Daddy, it's stinking again, let's close the windows.' We have to lock ourselves in on a summer day to try and avoid getting sick. There's something wrong with that." - Melvin Watson, discussing the smell emitted by Dynagen Inc.'s rubber plant in south Odessa.

"The worst mess I have ever seen. We are considering further legal action against the plant. The problems out there have got to stop." - Neil Carman, Texas Air Control Board chief investigator on Dynagen.

"We are just trying to conduct business as usual," Gorman said. "Right now, I just want the plant to put in the new (air control) equipment. We hope to put all of the controversy behind us."

Gorman said he could not comment about the residents' lawsuit because it is pending. The case is scheduled to be heard in August 1992.

Michael McLeish, the attorney for the residents, said his clients have been held prisoners in their own home.

"This case was there for many years prior to the lawsuit being filed," McLeish said. "These people suffer

constantly from headaches, watery eyes, rashes and nausea. And health surveys show a significant amount of people suffering from asthma and tumors.

"The sad thing is the technology always existed to take care of these problems."

Susan Bernal, who has shared the same neighborhood with the Dynagen plant since 1966, feels sure the odor problems would have been taken care of if the residents weren't mostly low-income.

"If we all made lots of money and were friends with the mayor, it probably wouldn't be the same," Mrs. Bernal said. "I think they would

have taken care of the problems a heckuva lot sooner."

Mrs. Bernal, a 41-year-old mother of five, said her children frequently suffer from asthma, skin rashes and burning eyes due to the odors.

"A lot of times I am confronted with whether to take kids to the doctor," Mrs. Bernal said. "If I was financially stable I could afford to take my kids to the doctor. But when you can't afford help, what can you do?"

"It's hard to live with the fact that I am watching my kids get sick from air pollution and there is nothing I can do."

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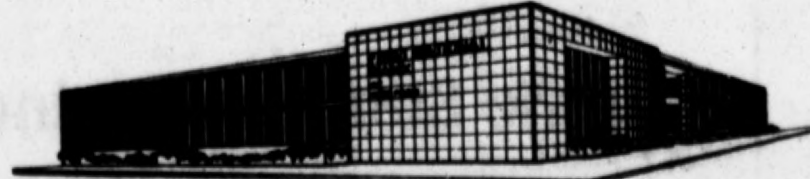

Lady Cagers to lean on guards

The Lady Whitefaces basketball team must face a season in a tall person's sport without any really tall players. Coach Dickie Faught said the team's biggest post player is 5 feet 8 inches tall.

"With a lack of size, you have to worry about rebounding, which was a problem (in Tuesday's scrimmage in Friona), and defense against tall post players, like Melinda White of Borger," Faught said. White recently signed to play basketball at Texas Tech.

Other girls who may make the varsity this year are, at guard, junior Amber Griffith, who is a "strong possibility," Faught said, and juniors Cristal McNutt, Misty Peabody, and Brandy Dunn. Inside, he has juniors Taylor Brooks and Wendy Hollingsworth and sophomores Jamie Simpson and Misty Dudley.

Dudley "should have a strong chance to start at post player," Faught said.

Faught cites the enthusiasm of the team as a reason to watch the Lady Whitefaces this season.

"They have fun playing. There's a lot of young kids. I think this team's going to play with a lot of enthusiasm and going to be fun to watch."

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Littlefield whips Dalhart

Littlefield scored a touchdown in every quarter and beat Dalhart 26-8 in a Class 3A bi-district playoff game played Friday at Whiteface Stadium in Hereford.

Littlefield, the champion of District 2-3A, will advance with a 8-2-1 record after the Wildcats' eighth straight victory. Dalhart finishes at 6-5 after being picked last in District 1-3A but finishing second to Childress. It was the Wolves' first playoff appearance since 1983.

Littlefield got 111 yards rushing and two touchdowns from Trevor Blair, who started the Wildcats' scoring when he took an option pitch from quarterback Michael Vaught and finished an 8-yard touchdown run. The 76-yard, 11-play drive was led by tailback Anthony Goodson, who ran for 59 of the yards. The kick

failed and Littlefield led 6-0 with 3:59 left in the first quarter.

The two teams traded interceptions (two each) for much of the second quarter, with Dalhart's James Harris picking off Vaught's pass at the goal line to save a score.

Blair intercepted a pass from Dalhart QB Jonathan Harraid and returned it 51 yards to the Dalhart 29, setting up Littlefield to score seconds before the end of the half. Vaught hit Pete DeLeon with a 21-yard pass, and DeLeon got out of bounds at the 4-yard line with 11 seconds left. On the next play, Goodson ran it in for the touchdown, and ran for the 2-point conversion for a 14-0 lead at the half.

Littlefield scored again on its first drive of the second half, finishing off a 58-yard, 7-play drive with 38-yard cutback TD run by Blair. The kick

failed again, and the Wildcats led 20-0 with 6:47 left in the third quarter.

Littlefield's last points came on a 13-yard TD pass from Vaught to DeLeon with 2:16 left in the game. The Wildcats went 69 yards in only five plays, with big ones being a 19-yard pass from Vaught to Everett Young and a 34-yard scamper by Blair. The pass for two points failed, and they led 26-0.

Dalhart broke up the shutout when tailback Harris broke free for a 62-yard scoring run with 1:48 left in the game. Jacob Curbow ran for the two points to provide the final score.

The Wolves wasted Harris' 19 carry, 140-yard effort.

For Littlefield, Vaught completed 4-of-12 passes for 105 yards. He threw two interceptions.

Pistons fight past Jazz

Isiah Thomas and Karl Malone traded baskets in the third quarter. Dennis Rodman, John Stockton and a pair of coaches traded blows in the fourth.

Thomas scored 44 points, his highest total in eight seasons, and led Detroit past the Utah Jazz 123-115 in another round of Friday night at the fights involving the Pistons.

Earlier this week, the Pistons and Bulls got into a big brawl in Chicago. This time, the trouble at Auburn Hills, Mich., started after Rodman and Stockton tangled after a foul call.

Jazz coach Jerry Sloan, a battler with the Bulls in his playing days, and Pistons assistant Brendan Suhr also got involved. Rodman and Suhr got two technical fouls apiece and were ejected. Sloan and Stockton both drew technicals and stayed in the game.

Rodman offered to shake hands with Sloan, who refused. Moments later, Rodman was tossed out for taunting Sloan.

"After Rodman threw Stockton down, I went on the court to protect my player, which is what any coach would do," Sloan said. "I don't have to shake hands with anyone, because it isn't a love match out there."

"Besides, I saw the playoffs, and I didn't think the Pistons liked to shake hands."

Rodman said it wasn't that big of a deal, really.

"I told him it was a physical game, and I wanted to shake his hand, but he didn't want to shake mine," Rodman said. "He's a great competitor, and we're both professionals. It's over now."

Thomas made 15 of 22 shots and 12 of 16 free throws. His 44 points were the most since he scored 47 on Dec. 13, 1983, in a triple-overtime game in which Detroit beat Denver 186-184.

"The last four or five games, I've felt really good," Thomas said. "Tonight, things were just really in a groove."

Malone scored 31 points on 13-of-20 shooting.

The Pistons led by six points at halftime, and both Thomas and Malone put on shows in the third

quarter. Thomas scored 16 points on 7-for-7 shooting while Malone made all six of his shots for 15 points.

Detroit led 87-82 entering the fourth quarter, and Thomas scored eight of the Pistons' first 12 points in helping hold off Utah's comeback bid.

"Surprise, surprise, surprise, this team can score," Pistons coach Chuck Daly said. "When we move the ball, we're better, and we had a lot of guys flashing in the middle."

Jeff Malone added 25 points for the Jazz and Stockton had 20 before fouling out.

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Cowboys' success turns tables on Giants

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (AP) - A little more than six weeks ago, the Dallas Cowboys were nothing more to the New York Giants than a bunch of upstart kids who hadn't found a way to beat the defending Super Bowl champions in three years.

How times have changed. The upstart Cowboys (6-4) will look to stick it to the old guys for a second time this season and almost put an end to the Giants' playoff hopes when they take on New York (5-5) at Giants Stadium Sunday at 3 p.m. CST.

If Dallas can sweep the season series it would move two games ahead of New York in the standings, in effect giving it a three-game lead

over the Giants because it would have won the head-to-head series - the first tiebreaker to determine who goes to the playoffs.

"It's a game we have to win if we want to stay alive," Giants linebacker Carl Banks said. "We just need to win as many as we can. It's about survival. Obviously a lot of teams have beaten us, but we're winning to stay alive."

One of the teams that beat the Giants this season was Dallas. It scored a 21-16 victory on Sept. 29, breaking a six-game losing streak against New York.

That game typified the season for the Giants and new coach Ray Handley. New York never punted,

had quarterback Jeff Hostetler complete 28 of 34 passes for 368 yards and still found a way to lose on a late Troy Aikman to Michael Irvin touchdown.

"We moved the ball well, but like the whole season, we just made mistakes," Giants tackle Jumbo Elliott said. "The mistakes have hurt us. If we don't make them, maybe we're eight and two and we don't have our backs against the wall."

The Giants lost one fumble inside the Dallas 10, had another returned for a Cowboys touchdown and then had Hostetler throw an interception late as the team was driving for a go-ahead score after the 23-yard

touchdown pass from Aikman to Irvin.

Irvin, whose 53 receptions lead the NFC, said the last thing the Cowboys are thinking about now is the playoffs - or putting a damper on the Giants' chances.

"Hey, if we were eight and one we might be thinking about the playoffs," said Irvin, whose 826 yards receiving tops the NFL. "We are 6-4 and we are in a tough spot. We have to think, and think hard about every game."

Irvin said the Cowboys' offense is so young it is still trying to learn all the ins and outs of the system. He said the one thing the team is sure of is how the Giants will play.

"It will be a bang-bang football game," he said. "The Giants play tough up front and you expect that. They are going to be in front of their home crowd. I just hope they don't come out and play too great. They have so much talent it is tough to match it on the field."

Dallas is also coming into the game off a tough 26-23 overtime loss to Houston, a game the Cowboys had a chance to win in overtime.

"This is a real big game for us," Irvin said. "But when you are a young team like us, and you are trying to be put up with the top teams,

every game is a big game. If we played St. Thomas University it would be a big game. Each win gives us confidence and that's what we need."

The Cowboys' schedule is not going to get any easier. Dallas plays Washington (10-0), Pittsburgh (4-6), New Orleans (9-1), Philadelphia (5-5) and Atlanta (5-5) in their final five regular season games.

New York catches a break after this week with games against Tampa Bay (2-8) and Cincinnati (1-9), before ending with Philadelphia, Washington and Houston (8-2).

SWC starts 'pork-free' season

DALLAS (AP) - With the Southwest Conference Hog-free, there should be a wild scramble for the basketball championship this year with Houston, Texas and upstart Rice expected to shoot it out down to the last free throw in the last game on March 8.

The Arkansas Razorbacks, who had won the last three SWC titles, have defected to the Southeast Conference.

The SWC coaches have picked Houston as the team most likely to succeed the Hogs and coach Pat Foster is feeling confident with the return of Craig Upchurch, who missed a season with a back injury.

"You are always optimistic that this will be the year, and I feel that way going into this season," Foster said. "When you combine the people we have returning with the new people we have brought in, I think that we have a chance to be very good."

"This could be the best offensive team we've had. We have Upchurch back but the most important thing is that we have good depth."

Look for the Cougars to pick up the tempo on defense.

"We will use more gambling

defenses that try to put pressure on our opponents," Foster said. "We're going to press, use half court traps and run and jump defenses."

Texas looks tough, although coach Tom Penders will be trying to work a lot of newcomers into his offense.

"I'm not sure winning 20 games is as realistic a possibility as it was the last few years," Penders said. "But we have some exciting players coming in."

One is guard Terrence Rencher, a freshman from the Bronx, N.Y., who was voted the top player in the city.

"He's a born leader and if he becomes leader of this team as a freshman I'll have no problem with it," Penders said.

Texas has been in the NCAA Tournament three straight seasons with records of 25-9, 24-9, and 23-9.

"We are in the process of rebuilding but we should be competitive," Penders said. "Houston, Rice and don't forget TCU, they'll all be good."

Rice is loaded.

"We're still trying to build a winning tradition but we have a lot of experience and talent," said Rice coach Scott Thompson. "We've got high expectations."

Rice returns all five starters,

including 6-10 junior center Brent

Scott, who averaged 17 points and 10 rebounds per game.

TCU also has a talented center in 6-11 Reggie Smith, who averaged 17 points, and nine rebounds per game. He also blocked 43 shots.

Guard Michael Strickland presents a deadly outside shooting threat and the Frogs have two new point guards, Brent Atwater and Paul Tramble, both junior college transfers.

"We should be much better this year," said coach Moe Iba. "We had problems at point guard last year."

"For the first time in a long time I don't think you can pick a clear-cut favorite to win the conference race," Iba said. "Just about everybody has upgraded their programs."

Baylor and Southern Methodist also could cause trouble.

Baylor returns four seniors, including David Wesley, the best point guard in the league.

"Having Wesley back in good health for the season will be a big plus for us," said Bears coach Gene Iba.

The Mustangs will rely on guard Mike Wilson, the SWC's newcomer of the year, to get coach John Shumate's team going.

"We have the potential, the nucleus to have a good team," Shumate said. "But right now I'd say

the favorites are Houston and Texas and Rice."

Texas Tech and Texas A&M will have new coaches.

James Dickey replaces the reassigned Gerald Myers, who coached at Tech 21 years.

Tony Barone was hired to replace the fired Kermit Davis Jr., whose violations of NCAA rules got the Aggies put on probation.

The Raiders will be competitive if Will Flemons, a 6-7, 225-pound forward, can stay healthy after missing most of last season with a broken foot.

"Our major concern is Flemons," Dickey said. "If he returns to his old form it will be a big plus."

Barone will be coaching a team that returns no starters.

"My main concern is bodies," he said. "All I know is there will be no team that we play who will play harder than us. I know that's food for everyone else's bulletin board but that's fine because that's fact."

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Trophy brings memories of simpler times

 SAN ANGELO, Texas (AP) - The trophy sits rather unnoticeably under the fluorescent lights of Blackshear Elementary School. A sea of children pass by on a daily basis, giving it little more thought than they do the glass case that holds it.

But the trophy, along with a small blue plaque, is a reminder of days when an all-black San Angelo high school bore the Blackshear name and when racial segregation was the norm - even in the arena of high school athletics.

Recently recovered and polished by members of the Blackshear Ex-Students Association, the trophy is one of the few tangible pieces of evidence of Blackshear High School's only football championship. The year was 1950. The Korean conflict waged half a world away,

Angelo State was a junior college and blacks could not sit at lunch counters with white people or drink from fountains for white people only.

And it was in 1950 that Blackshear, then a member of the Texas Class A Negro Interscholastic League, was putting together a string of football wins on its way to a championship victory - one it finally claimed on Christmas Day when the Leopards defeated Huntsville 32-0.

The four decades since that game have blurred the memory of exactly what happened. Newspaper accounts over the years have changed Blackshear's classification from Class A to Class 2A to Class 3A and back again, but regardless of what classification the Leopards were, they did win the championship.

That championship was the only one Blackshear won, but that final

win in 1950 was enough to tide over a generation, and the thought of it today is still enough to bring smiles to the faces of those who remember.

Freddy Kelley remembers, as do Jimmy Norton and Ralph Powell. All three were members of the championship squad. Norton and Kelley were backfield mages, with Kelley at running back and Norton at quarterback, while Powell was a lineman.

The three men recently stood together in the hall of Blackshear Elementary, and it didn't take much prodding to get the trio started down memory lane.

"There's a lot of pride behind this," Kelley said as he held the trophy, which was inscribed with the year 1951 because it was donated a year after the fact by Nathan's Jewelers. "That was back when football was football."

Indeed it was. The majority of Blackshear's starters played both sides of the ball, the helmets had no facemasks and the only new piece of equipment Blackshear players enjoyed was a set of jerseys, the only new ones Kelley, Powell or Norton could ever remember having.

And then there was the Leopards' practice field.

"When we first came out for football, we asked Coach (the late Allie Lee Thomas), 'When are they going to clean the field?' and he said, 'In a few days,'" Kelley said. "By the first day of practice, the field was still not clean. And by the first scrimmage, we found out who was going to clean the field up and it was us."

Norton laughed: "We had to cut down a whole bunch of little mesquite trees so we could play, and that was about all the trimming we did."

The physical hardships were to be endured as a way of life, however, and Norton still recalls his playing days with a good deal of emotion.

"That championship was a beautiful thing for a group of young men who came from a less fortunate area than many other children to accomplish," Norton said. "We loved one another. Sure, we had our scrapes but we were family."

And if the Leopards were a family, then at the head of that family was Thomas, who was much more than a coach to the majority of his players.

"He was a father to all of us -

those that did and didn't have fathers at home," Kelley said. "He got things out of us that nobody else could. He was a highly respected member of the community, and people still today remember him as a coaching father."

"Behind his back, we used to call him Alley Oops, which was just our own little handicap for him," Norton recalled. "To me, he was my father and my coach."

Thomas served as coach of the Leopards for 14 years and when the school was moved from its spot on North Randolph Street, now Martin Luther King Drive, to Brown Street, where the elementary school now stands, Thomas went with it.

When desegregation began in 1955 and Blackshear students began attending San Angelo High School, Thomas remained at Blackshear, which was then Blackshear Junior High School.

He retired from the school system in 1981 and died in 1988, but his memory lives on, as do most of the memories surrounding Blackshear. Every three years, former students gather for a reunion to talk about the old days, catch up on new events and generally reflect back upon a simpler, if not more racially equal, time.

"The worst thing an average teen-ager did then was maybe steal some peaches," Kelley said. "There was not a whole lot of violence."

Kelley said he and his peers were taught discipline at an early age, and that discipline was a big reason for the postgraduate success of many of Blackshear's alumni.

"There are so many people from that 1950 team that went into all different aspects of the professional community," said Kelley, a retired San Angelo police officer. "We graduated doctors, lawyers, teachers from that team and from the whole school."

Kelley's older brother Ben, who was an all-state player for Blackshear, went on to play football for Illinois University and eventually the San Francisco 49ers.

Norton, who works for GTE, said the camaraderie among teammates was the biggest part of athletics for the majority of Blackshear's players, and able-bodied young men who did not participate in some form of athletic competition, specifically football, were frowned upon.

"It was a matter of wanting to be with the fellas," Norton said. "That was the whole thing. You weren't much if you didn't want to be with all the fellas."

And it was the "fellas" who brought a good deal of pride to Blackshear. Successful not only in football but in track and field, basketball and baseball as well, the fellas were family and they regarded their hardships as a natural part of life.

To be included in those hardships was the district to which the Leopards' football team belonged.

Players today can gripe all they want about traveling long distances to play football, but the point is moot to Powell, Norton and Kelley who belonged to a district that included teams from Amarillo and Lubbock in addition to teams from Odessa, Midland and Abilene.

"We played in some cold weather, but nothing like when we played in Amarillo," said Powell, who has worked for the postal system for the past 31 years.

All the schools Blackshear played were also segregated, and Kelley remembered playing a team from Mart whose equipment made the Leopards' shine by comparison.

"Their uniforms were worse than

ours," Kelley said. "I remember one kid who had to play with street shoes on."

Kelley said despite the color lines which separated blacks from whites in San Angelo, the entire town still stood behind the Leopards.

"My memory shows me that we received support from the entire city," Kelley said. "People of all races were supporters of Blackshear."

Among those supporters was San Angeloan Homer Nickel, who chartered a bus for the members of the 1950 Blackshear team so they could go watch Angelo College play in the Oleander Bowl on New Year's Day 1951 in Galveston.

In addition to the trip, Nickel did much to recognize the efforts of Blackshear as did all-black Prairie View A&M University, which also donated trophies.

All the trophies now stand in the glass case at Blackshear Elementary now, and as Kelley, Powell and Norton stood talking in the hall, children of all races and colors mingled in and around them.

Times are different, much different, but nothing can replace the memories. As Powell and Co. put it, "those were definitely the good ol' days."

DALLAS (AP) - When Bum Phillips was coach of the Houston Oilers, he was a sports writer's delight.

His one-liners and witticisms made reading about an Oiler football game almost as much fun as seeing it from 1975 to 1980 when he compiled a 55-35 record to become the winningest coach in franchise history.

Who can forget his punch line after Houston upset Dallas in the 1979 Thanksgiving Day game: "The Cowboys may be America's Team but by dang the Houston Oilers are Texas' team."

Or after Houston had lost to Pittsburgh in the AFC championship game: "We knocked on the door this year. Next year we'll kick the damn thing in."

Now, you can catch his act on the Oilers radio network and it can be a kick to turn down the TV sound and tune up ole Bum, the colorful "color" announcer.

Bum hasn't changed. His dialogue sometimes has grammatical problems much like Dizzy Dean, the late broadcaster of the St. Louis Cardinals, but it's rich and gets to the heart of the matter.

For example, after a recent upset by the lowly New England Patriots, Phillips summed it up this way: "They ain't any good but they don't know it."

After the overtime loss to the Washington Redskins, which came because placekicker Ian Howfield missed a short field goal, Bum said:

"We didn't get outplayed' we just got outkicked."

Hopefully, you had the television sound turned down during the recent Dallas-Houston game.

The fun started with one of his broadcaster partners bragging that a referee in the game was the best man at his wedding.

"You holding that against him? Is it a plus or a minus?" Bum needed.

And then, there was Bum:

-On Houston linebacker Lamar Lathon: "He's playing hiserr... head off."

-On a late hit on quarterback Warren Moon: "He's flat on the ground. You gotta touch him, not butt him around."

-On a kickoff out of bounds by new placekicker Al Del Greco: "That ain't a good way to endure yourself to the fans."

-On 5-9 running back Allen Pinkett: "He's not little he's just short."

-On a wide receiver who slipped: "He was 'afixin' to be open but he fell."

-Again on Del Greco: "He just acts like he means to do it."

-On the overtime struggle: "I thought the Washington game was tough on the nerves. This one is worse."

-On the last seconds of the game: "Just think how many of these things I went through in 37 years. I'm glad it's Jack (Pardee) down there and not me. Being an announcer ain't near as bad as standing on the sidelines."

Have some fun. Turn down the TV sound and dial up ole Bum.

Class 4A's No. 1 team falls, again

The top is no place to be if you're a Class 4A football team this year.
Dallas Roosevelt, The Associated Press preseason No. 1 pick, lost its first two games and barely qualified for the playoffs. Next came West Orange-Stark, which lost in its first week at the top.
Bastrop won all 10 of its games and held the No. 1 spot for seven weeks, but the Bears missed the playoffs after two forfeits for using an ineligible player. Then Houston C.E. King lost to LaMarque in its first game as a top choice.
On Friday night, it was Sulphur Springs' turn. The Wildcats, who were voted No. 1 last week, dropped their first game of the year, a 17-13 decision to the 6-4 Kilgore Bulldogs in the bi-district round of the playoffs.
"I'm just so elated," said Kilgore coach Bill Rhodes. "I told the kids at the beginning of the year they could go as far as they can."
The Bulldogs raced to a 14-0 lead in the first quarter after recovering a Sulphur Springs fumble on the first play of the game. Kilgore scored five plays later on Randy Ross' 3-yard run.

Later in the period, Kilgore went up 14-0 on a 67-yard flea-flicker pass from quarterback Tim McLaughlin to Brandon Craven. The Bulldogs then used a staunch defense, including Richard Thomas' interception in the final minute, to hold off Sulphur Springs.
In Class 5A Division I games, No. 5 Jersey Village topped Spring Westfield 18-13 and No. 10 Corpus Christi Carroll smashed Laredo United 47-14. In Division II, it was No. 3 Waco over Austin Crockett in a 58-44 scorefest, and No. 7 Dallas Carter eased by Lake Highlands, 23-17.
Houston Waltrip and Yates tied 14-14, but Waltrip advanced on penetrations, 3-2. Killeen also got past Austin Johnston on penetrations after a 14-14 tie.
Elsewhere, previously undefeated Hurst Bell was shocked by 6-4 Lewisville, 30-17, and Huntsville, the preseason No. 1 team in the nation, was dumped by Katy, 26-14.
Huntsville coach Joe Clements blamed the Hornets' 7-2-2 record on injuries.
"I don't think we had the same 11 on offense at any time this year," Clements said. "I think it was kind

of demoralizing to line up with someone different every week."
Quarterback Chris Moore ran for two 1-yard scores and a 5-yard touchdown to lead Katy. Huntsville's Chuck Clements, the state's second-leading passer, helped Katy's effort with two interceptions.
Dallas Carter needed a blocked punt and 47-yard scoring drive in the final 1:09 to beat Lake Highlands. Artis Burns blocked the Lake Highlands punt to set up the drive, which included a 43-yard pass from Cedric Douglas to Darrell Wilson and Wilson's 3-yard scoring run.
"God looked down on us and blessed us tonight," said Carter coach Freddie James.
Burns promised the victory was not Carter's last of the year.

"We're going a long way, baby," he said.
Lake Highlands took a 17-16 lead with 7:42 remaining on Detron Smith's 18-yard touchdown run. Smith carried 22 times for 130 yards and two scores in the losing effort.
Sterling Boyd ran for 180 yards and two touchdowns, leading Sherman past Irving Nimitz, 35-21.
"We couldn't stop that cat," said Nimitz coach Mike Farda. "We were in position on him, but he just outran us. He's a great back."
Nick Murrell carried 32 times for 161 yards and Jersey Village used a fake field-goal attempt in the fourth quarter to beat Westfield.

"You think you have a handle on God, the Universe, and the Great White Light until you go home for Thanksgiving. In an hour, you realize how far you've got to go and who is the real turkey."—Shirley MacLaine

Shirley MacLaine is not one of my favorite actresses. With the exception of *What A Way To Go*, which is not even on video, I don't recall ever watching one of her movies. Neither is she one of my favorite authors, but I did find the above quote from her latest book, *Dance While You Can*, amusing and accurate. This is her sixth book and she's still searching for "the truth within herself" as she recounts her nearly four decades in Hollywood.

With all the charges and denials flying between Bette Midler and Gerardo Rivera about the claims he makes in his autobiography *Exposing Myself*, you may have your interest peaked. Then again, maybe not. Regardless, it's here and available for you to read for yourself and come to your own conclusions.

Once upon a time there really were Great Americans. Some of these people were politicians, as hard as that may be to believe. One of the greatest was Henry Clay - Congressman from Kentucky, Speaker of the House longer than any man in the century. A superb orator, Clay had a passion for the Union, and more than any other, helped preserve it through the antebellum period. In *Henry Clay: Statesman for the Union*, Robert V. Remini reveals the professional and human (did he have feet of clay?) side of this extraordinary man whose great sense of duty and humor helped him overcome defeats in his personal and political life. (Clay was known as the "Great Compromiser" a title that would apply to many political figures today for entirely different reasons.)

Christmas will soon be here and the library is ready (more or less). This week we introduce a few new books to give you a reason to put off all those things you really should be doing to get ready. *Holiday Homes* is a "coffee table" book published by Southern Living. This beautiful book will either inspire you or depress you. A *Foxfire Christmas* is a collection of Appalachian Memories and traditions in the style of the previous *Foxfire* books, and there is a fascinating little book titled *A Treasury of Christmas Stories* by Webb Garrison, filled with stories and pictures of Christmas lore.

And before we leave the non-fiction shelf, we have something for you war buffs, too. John Toland, one of this country's most respected and popular historians offers *In Moral Combat - Korea, 1950-1953*. This is a well-researched and well-written narrative of America's first limited war. There is also *A Frozen Hell: The Russo-Finnish Winter War of 1939-40* by William R. Trotter, the story of Finland's heroic resistance to Communist Russia's aggression.

We've got a biggie heading the fiction list this week: Norman Mailer's *Harlot's Ghost* - a book about spies and intelligence officers (the difference is: THEY use spies--WE use intelligence officers). No, this is not a novel in which the forces of light struggle with those of darkness. The enemy here is the soul-consuming cold war itself.

I'll probably get in trouble for saying this but here goes...If you're looking for a sleazy novel, try Charlotte Vale Allen's *Gentle Stranger*. The jacket reads like a soap opera. "Violence," "Love," "passion"...just a few of the words to indicate what's inside. Apparently some soft of plot about an aging ballerina and a younger man.

Extension News

The turkey, the traditional holiday bird, is a tasty, healthy choice for holiday meals. Don't let the risk of foodborne illness from improperly handled turkey spoil the holiday fun.

Turkey is highly perishable food and requires special handling in thawing, preparation, cooking and storage. Follow these tips on handling turkey safely:

*If shopping in advance is necessary, frozen turkey is the best bet. Look for one that is solidly frozen. Keep it frozen at zero degree or below until ready for thawing. Allow two to three days, depending on the size of the turkey, for thawing in the refrigerator.

*Fresh turkey is highly perishable and should be bought no more than a day or two before cooking. If shopping must be done in advance, a frozen turkey is a better choice.

*In determining what size turkey to buy, allow about one pound per person. This will provide generous servings with enough leftovers for other meals.

*Thawing a frozen turkey in the refrigerator is the preferred method for safety reasons, but you can also thaw it in cold water. The important thing is to keep the turkey cold while thawing to prevent bacterial growth. To thaw in the refrigerator, put the turkey in the original wrap on a tray

or in a pan to catch dripping juices. An 8- to 12-pound turkey will take one to two days to thaw; a 16 to 20 pounds turkey will take three to four days. For faster thawing, put the turkey package in a water-tight plastic bag and submerge in cold water. Change the water every 30 minutes to keep it cold. Depending on size, this can take from 4 to 12 hours. Do not thaw turkey on the counter. Bacteria can multiply rapidly at room temperature, and outer portions of the turkey may thaw and reach room temperatures before the inside is thawed. Small turkeys can be thawed in the microwave according to the manufacturer's manual instructions, but the turkey should be cooked immediately after thawing.

*Wash the turkey with water inside and out before cooking, removing neck and giblets from the cavity. To prevent spread of bacteria, wash hands, utensils and the sink after contact with the turkey.

*Turkeys stuffed with dressing present special problems because bacteria can easily multiply in the stuffing and cause food poisoning. Cooking stuffing separately is the safest method. But if a stuffed bird is the choice, take special precautions. Never stuff the bird ahead of time; stuff just prior to putting in the oven. Never stuff a bird that will be cooked in the microwave. It may not cook thoroughly.

*Cook turkeys to an internal temperature of 180 degrees to 185 degrees. A meat thermometer can be used to check for doneness. If the turkey is stuffed, check the stuffing for doneness. It should reach at least 165 degrees. When done, remove all stuffing from the bird immediately and put in a separate container. Harmful bacteria is more likely to grow in the stuffing if it sits in the bird after cooking.

For more information on safe handling of holiday foods, contact the home economics agent at the county office of the Texas Agricultural

Extension Service. Also, the USDA Meat and Poultry hot line at 1-800-535-4555 handles consumer requests concerning meat and poultry.

Betzen is no stranger in the kitchen. She has been preparing meals since she was 9 years old.

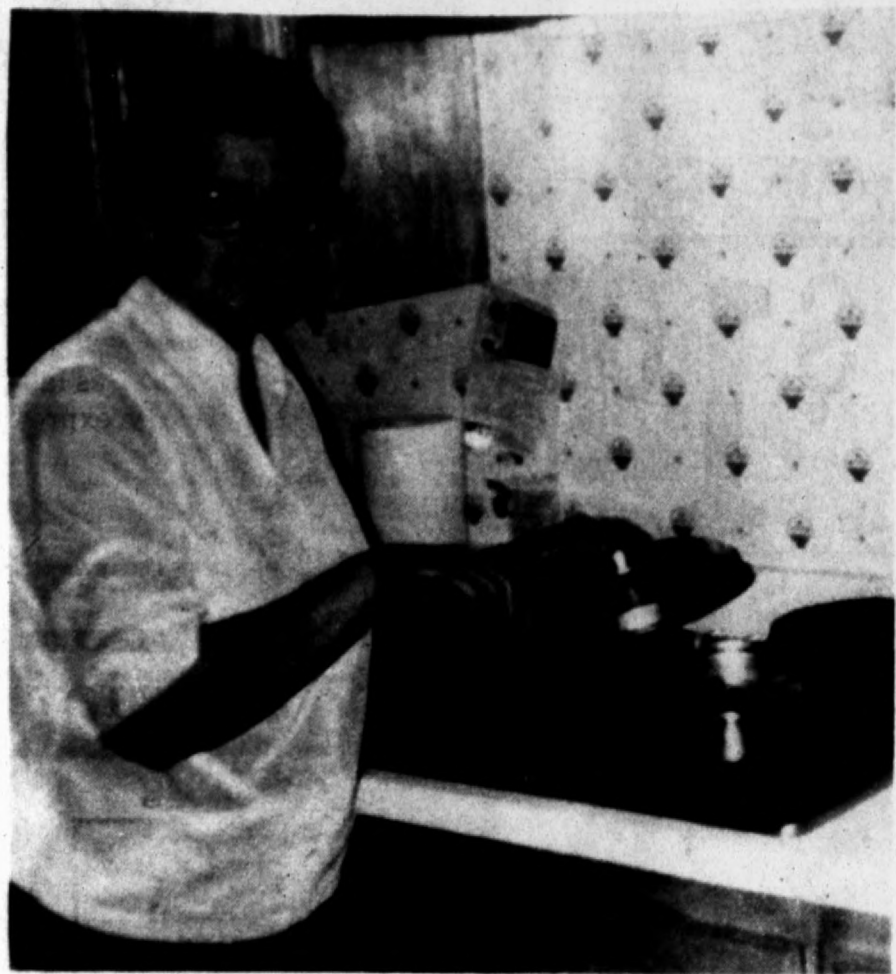
"I was raised in a large family and I raised a large family, and I've always enjoyed cooking for them," she said.

Betzen prepared a typical "Betzen" Thanksgiving menu as a guide to others preparing large Thanksgiving meals. These are tried and true family pleasers. She usually starts out with a large turkey and dresses it with cornbread dressing and giblet gravy. For those who do not like birds, she fixes a ham with cranberry sauce. Her side dishes include hot rolls, mashed potatoes, candied sweet potatoes, a triple recipe of avocado-cottage cheese salad (recipe included in story) and homegrown green beans (fresh from the freezer). The meal is topped with blueberry cheesecake pie, apple pies, pecan pies, and fresh coconut cake for dessert.

Although all of her recipes are homemade, Betzen is not opposed to short cuts.

"I have a Jenn-Air and grill everything," she said with excitement. "Grilled anything is better."

Among her modern appliances are a computerized bread maker, microwave and food processor.

Betzen loves to cook, but cooking is not her only interest. She enjoys gardening and sewing as well.

"I have a greenhouse where I keep flowers, cactuses and plants. I have a Christmas cactus that is already in bloom. I have some real unusual cactuses that have unusual blooms on them."

Betzen also has several poinsettias left over from last Christmas which she is nurturing in hopes they will make a return this Christmas.

With eight granddaughters, Betzen enjoys sewing for them and recovering furniture.

"I've made a quilt top of recycled jeans. With the current trend in recycling I thought it would be the think to do," she laughed. "It was a joint project with one of my daughters. Jeans make great quilts. You can take them outside and not track the grass back inside."

Betzen recovered two chairs with furniture swatches and has made a denim sailboat quilt for one of her grandsons.

Family is important to Betzen and the holidays are a special time for them. Gathering around the family table for a meal is always a special time.

Listed are a few of her and her

family's favorite recipes for others to enjoy.

AVOCADO & COTTAGE CHEESE SALAD

2 ripe avocados, peeled and diced
2 ripe tomatoes, diced
1 bunch green onions, chopped, tops and all
2 lbs. carton cottage cheese, drain
1/4 cup vinegar
1/2 cup salad oil
salt and pepper to taste
Put avocados in bowl, add oil and vinegar, a layer of cottage cheese, tomatoes, another layer of cottage cheese, top with green onions. Mix when ready to serve. It makes a very pretty layered salad.

BLUEBERRY CHEESECAKE PIE

1 stick margarine
20 graham crackers
1/2 cup powdered sugar
1 8 oz. package cream cheese
1 cup sugar
2 eggs
Melt one stick margarine in 9x13 cake pan. Mix 20 graham crackers 1/2 cup powdered sugar in food processor until well mixed. Add to melted margarine and mix well, press down firmly on bottom of pan. In food processor mix until smooth: cream

cheese, sugar, eggs and pour over crust. Bake at 20 minutes at 375 degrees. Cool and spread one can of blueberry pie filling over top.

EASY REFRIGERATOR ROLLS

2 cups potato water (water saved after boiling potatoes)
1 package yeast
1/2 cup sugar
2 tsp salt
6 1/2-7 cups flour
1 egg
1/4 cup shortening

In water add sugar, salt, and about half of the flour. Beat for two minutes. Add egg and shortening, beat in remaining flour until smooth. Cover with damp cloth and place in refrigerator. Punch down occasionally. About two hours before baking, cut off amount needed. Return remainder to refrigerator. Shape into rolls and place in greased pan. Brush tops with melted butter. Let rise until light (1 1/2 to 2 hours). Heat oven to 400 degrees. Bake for 12 to 15 minutes. Makes about four dozen medium rolls.

DEAR DR. LAMB: My son has given blood for several years because he has a rare type that is needed. Recently he was informed by letter that he could no longer participate because on two separate occasions HTLV-1 (human T-lymphotropic virus -1) antibody was discovered. It was also stated that the virus can cause paralysis or leukemia and the chances of developing an illness was remote. It did not state if he needed to consult a doctor, and I would like your opinion on this matter. Does it require treatment and what is the cause? This is a puzzle to us.

mean he has a disease or ever will have. The infection is rather common in some areas, one being Japan. Studies there show that less than 1 percent with a positive test do develop leukemia eventually. I would think a consultation with a hematologist would be useful to clarify his situation.

The way the virus is transmitted is not known. The virus does occur in families, and you might want your family tested for it. It can be transmitted by blood and that is why many blood banks are now screening for this virus. It is not AIDS by any matter or means. 

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YOUR EYES

VISION TRAINING



Many people find reading a great effort. Even those of high intelligence can't keep up with college requirements because their eyes tire easily and headaches often follow. Some see double print, or must close one eye to see a single image. Ideally, these problems are dealt with as soon as they become obvious, often when those affected are children in school. But many of the very brightest youngsters can ignore vision problems and compensate by squinting, sitting in the front row in class, or reading only in short spurts. By high school or college, treatment will be needed to improve eye movements, focusing and coordination. Even adults can benefit from vision training. Try this exercise: put a drop of ink or dark tape on your thumbs, and extend your arms at shoulder height to the limits of your side vision. Turn quickly between the left thumb and the right several times. If there is any difficulty in seeing sharp images at the end of each head movement, talk to your optometrist. Vision training may be indicated.

Lessons from Leonard's

At 3 p.m. on Friday afternoon, the parking lot at Stew Leonard's was already full. I joined the motorists circling the lot trying to find an available spot.

I had driven to Norwalk, Connecticut, out of curiosity. Like the hundreds of thousands before me, I had come to experience the magic of Stew Leonard's. Leonard's is the world's largest dairy store and probably the most well known. It is not a large chain; there are only two stores. The second store in nearby Danbury, opened only a few weeks ago.

Stew Leonard is famous. Although an entrepreneur with only two stores, he has graced the covers of most business magazines. He has been touted as a master of customer service in dozens of best-selling business books. His name is known around the world.

I went to see what kind of store could create this reputation. I found some valuable lessons that we can learn from Leonard's

obvious success.

First Impressions

The store grounds were beautifully landscaped and very clean. Signs were colorful and the outside displays attractive. Even from the parking lot, this store looked more like a well kept theme park than a supermarket.

Inside, the store was clean, bright, colorful and busy. It was crowded, but no one seemed to mind.

There was animation everywhere. Just like Disneyland's "Country Bear Jamboree," life-like animals were singing the praises of Stew Leonard's. The singing hens told the story of farm fresh eggs. A milk carton band sang the virtues of the store's fresh, wholesome milk. Clover, the cow, blinked and mooed on command.

The store is laid out like a maze. The traditional front-to-back aisles do not exist at Stew Leonard's. When you enter, a winding aisle guides you through the entire inventory.

All store employees are dressed in bright uniforms. Everywhere I looked they were at work keeping the shelves arranged and making certain that every display was attractive. It was a beautiful store inside and out.

According to store manager Jim Mount, The Original Stew Leonard's opened in 1969. The store has expanded 27 times and now encompasses 106,000 square feet. Initially, the store carried only seven items and a crew of seven managed all operations. Today, the store carries about 700 different items and employs more than 700.

Why People Shop There

As I walked through the original Leonard's Store, I asked about a dozen shoppers why they shopped there. "Quality" was always the first

answer. They mentioned the quality of the meat, fresh produce and the high standards of excellence throughout the store.

One woman who had driven nearly 40 miles to shop at Leonard's was emphatic about the difference. "I drove by a dozen good stores to come here," she said. "You can't find this quality anywhere else."

I found the customers' answers very interesting. This store has a world-wide reputation for customer service, but shoppers come because of the quality. As I pressed for other reasons, most admitted that it was a fun place to shop. They like the treatment they receive from the store's courteous and friendly employees.

In my opinion, there are five reasons for Leonard's success. First, Leonard's carries only top quality items. Second, they promote the merchandise in clever, colorful displays. Third, the entire staff is always friendly and courteous. Fourth, the prices are commensurate with the value. Low prices were never mentioned by customers or staff. Finally, the company is entirely focused on meeting the needs and wants of its customers. Employees talk to customers daily to see what they like and what could be improved.

Stew Leonard's stores are successful because they stay close to their customers. They provide the quality, value and service that everyone wants in a warm and friendly atmosphere. 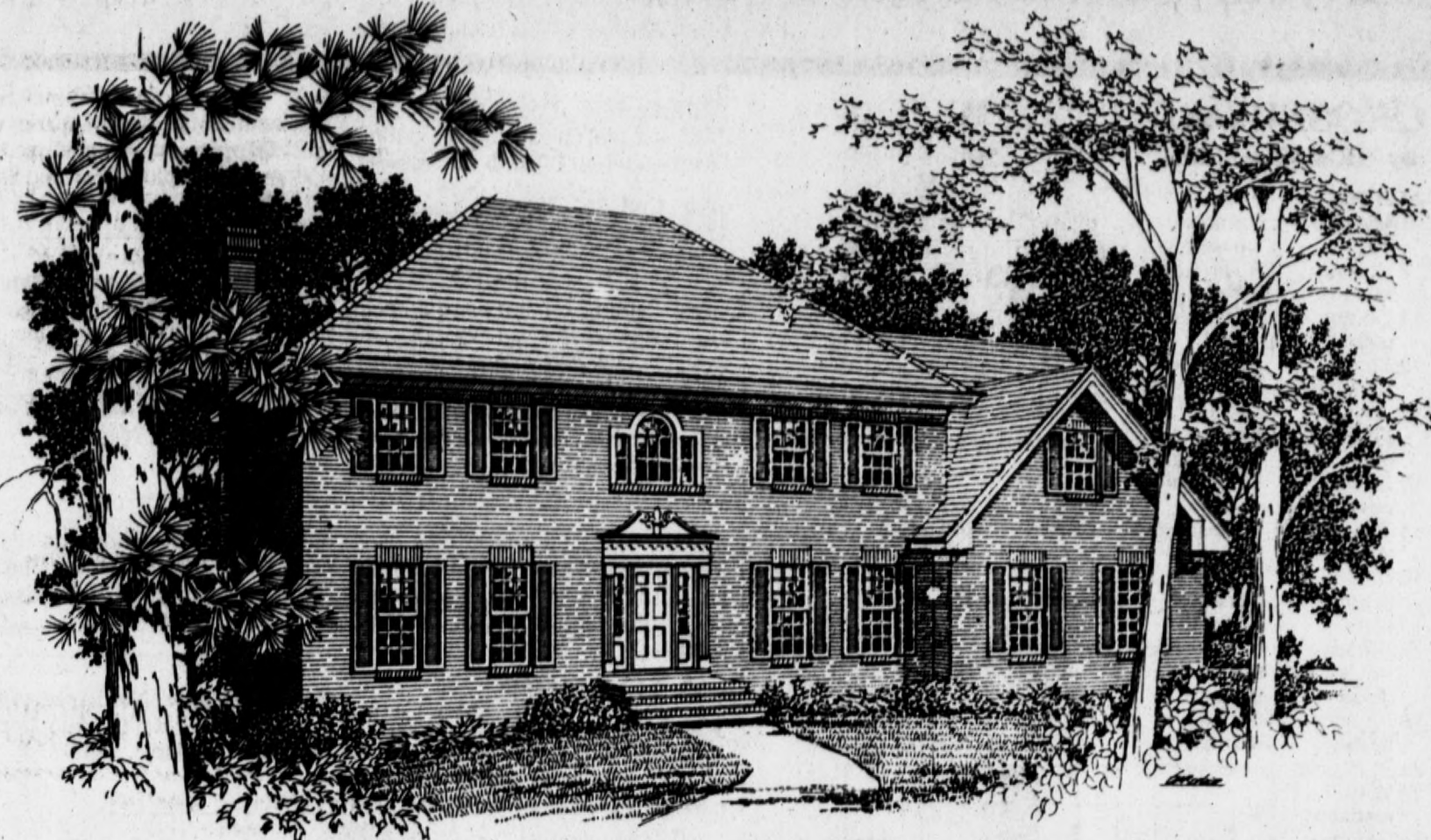

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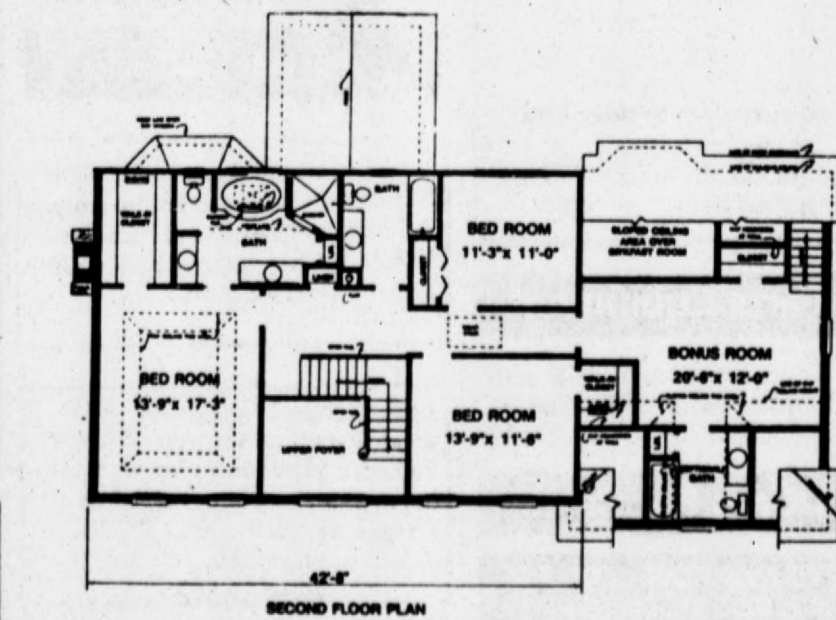
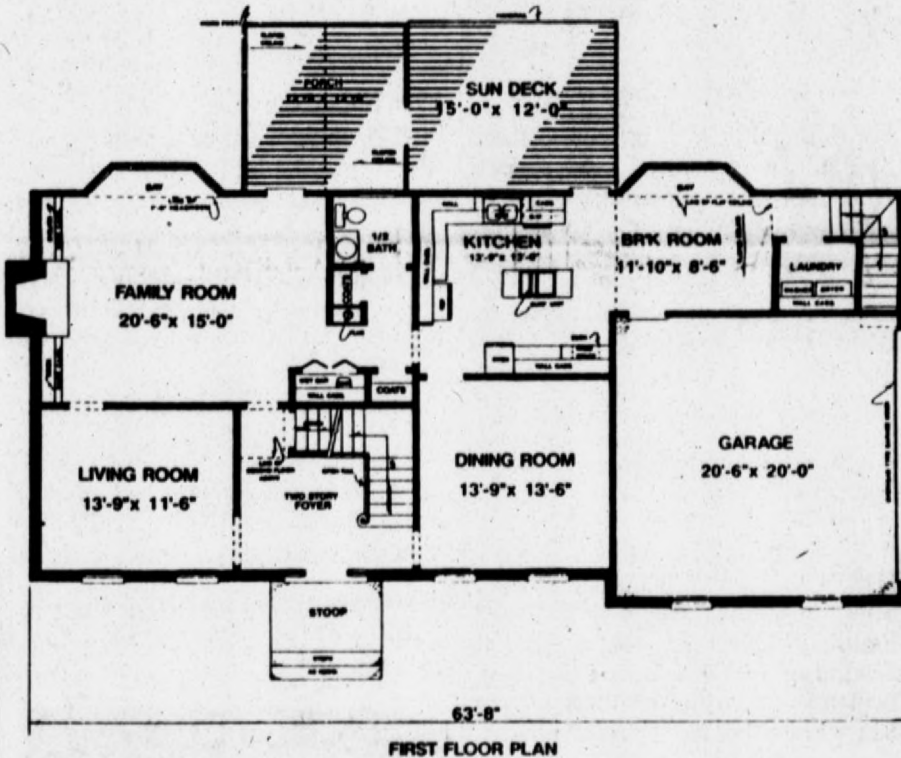

Question-Answer

Q. - I have a home with radiant heating (cement slab floor with embedded circulating hot water), and I want to replace the existing vinyl tile in the kitchen. I would like to use slate, quarry tile or something similar, but I'm concerned about the chance of disrupting heat transfer and increasing energy requirements and cost. What do you recommend as the best covering for this type of floor?

A. - Any floor covering that you like will do fine. We checked with the American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air-Conditioning Engineers (ASHRAE) and they say there would be no appreciable increase in energy use regardless of the type of floor covering.

The response time of a radiant heating system to changes in thermostat setting is normally slower than that of a hot water system with baseboard or free-standing radiators, or a forced warm air system. This means it takes longer for a radiant system to reach the desired comfort temperature than the other two systems. By covering the floor, you will slow down this response time slightly, but you will also increase the mass of the heated floor so it takes longer to cool down. Thus the end result will be almost no perceptible change in heating costs.

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

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White, Nielsen take 'Chance of a Lifetime'

Romantic tryst includes bungee jump in Mexico

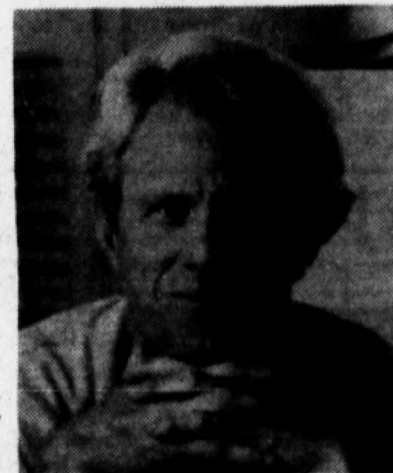
Even Golden Girls sometimes have to do the bungee-cord jump. "I dropped about 12 feet, which to me looked like the top of the Empire State Building," says Betty White. White, with Leslie Nielsen and Ed Begley Jr., stars in the new NBC telefilm *Chance of a Lifetime*, debuting Monday, Nov. 18. "I'm not exactly built for speed," jokes White.

Billed as a romantic comedy, *Chance of a Lifetime* follows the travails of long-widowed, uptight Evelyn Eglin (White), whose life has become her husband's decorating business. When her doctor tells Evelyn she has six months to live, she is too shocked to share the news with anyone, including her harried son Darryl (Begley).

Instead, Evelyn jets off to Mexico for two weeks to live and let live. There she meets and falls in love with rich widower Lloyd Dixon (Nielsen) and begins to kick up her bungee heels for the first time in years. Little does she know that her medical diagnosis is a mistake and she may be stuck with Lloyd for longer than she thinks.

"Everybody's always asked me what I wanted to play on television and haven't," says White, a five-time Emmy winner. "I told them I killed Eve Arden once, so that takes care of the drama, and that what I'd really like to do is a romantic love story. And, by George, they came up with one."

They also came up with her leading man of choice, or White did, anyway. "I was fantasizing. I said, 'You know who would be absolutely ideal for this would be Leslie Nielsen.'" Nielsen, however, was up to his ears making *Naked Gun 2 1/2*, so White sent him a nice note with the script:

"Dear Leslie," she wrote. "Please try and make it work. — Love and kisses, Betty."

Nielsen promptly wrote back: "Dear Betty: You got me."

And that's romantic enough, even if *Chance of a Lifetime* leaves viewers less than titillated.

Well, almost everyone. *Chance of a Lifetime* is good-natured enough, sporting a number of chuckles, but it moves a bit slowly in places. White, however, turns in a charming, fine performance and Nielsen and Begley provide good supporting work. Unfortunately, they can't quite give the script the lift it needs when the dialogue falls flat, as it occasionally does.

Does *Chance* have a chance? The film faces stiff competition on the Monday-night lineup, including heavy-hitting *Murphy Brown* on CBS, and NFL Football on ABC. Time and ratings will tell.

'Homefront' heartthrob likes his '90s life

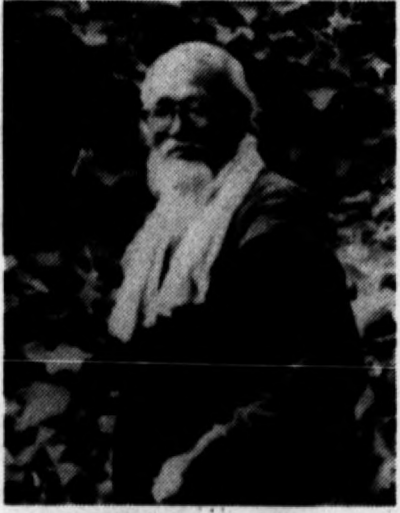

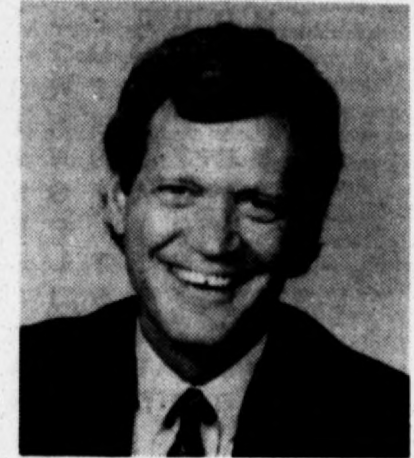

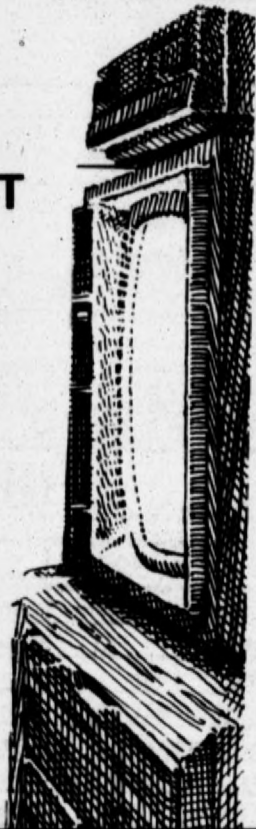

'Tiny Toons' airs script by teen trio

With what has to be the most dramatically conceived cartoon in history, Warner Bros. has managed to create a half-hour of publicity thinly disguised as a *Tiny Toons* episode.

In "Buster and Babs Go Hawaiian," the pint-sized spinoffs of favorite *Looney Tunes* characters follow a scenario penned by a trio of eighth-graders from Waynesboro, Va. Advance publicity indicates the handwritten script "miraculously" made its way into the hands of *Toons* executive producer Steven Spielberg, who decided to buy it. While it must be immensely pleasing to the girls from Virginia, the fruit of their efforts lacks the luster that usually rubs off on Spielberg productions.

The girls and the famous producer appear as caricatures in the cartoon, and the banter they exchange with Buster and Babs Bunny is designed to let viewers in on the story behind the story. However, these scenes were written after the girls' visit with Spielberg, and the result is an in-joke with no punch line. It would be a stretch, at best, to expect someone watching the show without a press kit to grasp the only real story here: the incredible luck of three young girls.

As one might expect, the animation is terrific, but the story, while pretty good for three eighth-grade girls, says more for having faith in the postal service than it does for big-budget cartoons.

A&E deregulates Reagan legacy

Proof positive of the Peter Principle, Ronald Wilson Reagan's ascent from radio announcer to B-movie actor to governor to president of the United States is traced on A&E's *Biography*, premiering Tuesday, Nov. 19. Fellow actor Peter Graves accepted the mission of playing host for this character study of the man called "Dutch" who changed wives and political persuasions before climbing the pinnacle of power and public trust. The star of *Bedtime for Bonzo* is shown in many lights, hues and shades of memory.

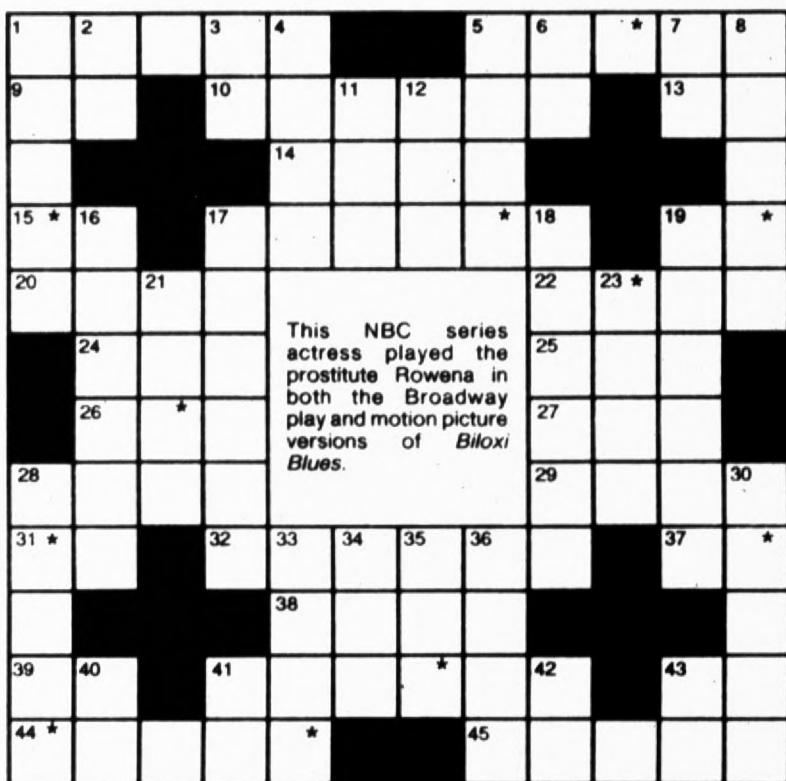

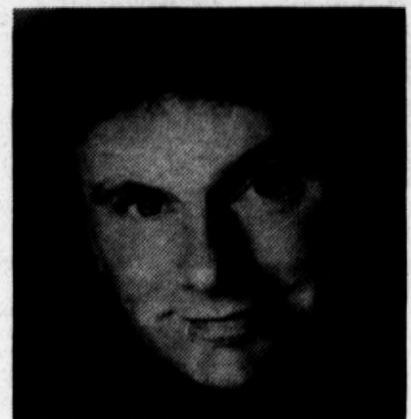

Susan Lucci stars in new ABC thriller

Seldom has there been so much energy and beauty packed into a 5-foot-3-inch frame as there is with Susan Lucci, who plays Erica on ABC's *All My Children*. She is a living, breathing, walking dynamo, and this week she's starring in the *ABC Sunday Night Movie*, *The Woman Who Sinned*, Nov. 17.

Lucci did many of her own stunts and when asked if she had to do anything to prepare for the physical strain, she commented, "Our studio floor here at ABC is the size of a football field and each of the sets (for *All My Children*) are arranged all around the perimeter of that space, so there really is a lot of running. You spend 12 hours in the building, and you never have time to sit down. It's a little more physical than anyone would know, and it helps me stay in shape."

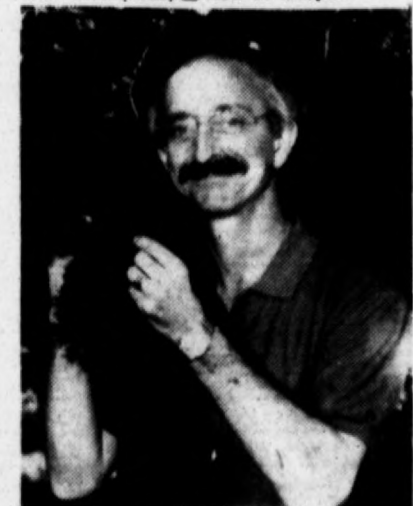
Lucci takes four weeks off from the soap each time she does a movie, which takes a lot of coordination between her, the producers and writers. "It takes a lot of team effort, a lot of participation from Agnes Nixon and Felicia Baird, our executive producer. I also do a lot of pretaping and post-taping, so there is a lot of cooperation from the cast and crew."

Family is important to Lucci, and she spends almost all of her time off with her husband and two children, 16-year-old Liza Victoria and 11-year-old Andreas Martin. She attends football games and karate classes and is as active in her children's life as possible. "I make certain we have breakfast and dinner together every day, and we all enjoy traveling and skiing together," says Lucci, showing a maternal warmth she rarely has a chance to display on screen.

Why Tyson should have been a contender

When defending heavyweight champion Evander Holyfield steps into the ring against Italian challenger Francesco Damiani in Atlanta Saturday, Nov. 23, fight fans will have a pretty good idea who the eventual winner will be. But there's already no doubt that they are the losers in this prime-time, pay-per-view money grab.

Former champion Mike Tyson's tender ribs prevented what a felony indictment could not: a confrontation between great fighters that created the illusion of good vs. evil and promised to line the pocketbooks of the fighters, promoters and anyone else who could get their hands on a piece of the pie.

Those who felt that a man accused of a violent crime shouldn't be allowed to fight for the heavyweight championship until he has been cleared of those charges might consider Tyson's injury, which has cost him well over \$10 million, to be poetic justice. However, that doesn't change the fact that what once was a great main event has become a Holyfield sparring session.

Damiani looks impressive enough on paper. He was unbeaten in his first 27 professional fights before being stopped by Ray Mercer in January. But the only reasons to pay to see this one are if you like one-sided fights or if you think that Damiani could pull a Buster Douglas. Don't bet on the latter.

Carrying a strong message of family unity, the musical numbers are intercut with skits, reminiscences and definitions of "family" offered by stars such as Louis Gossett Jr., Patti LaBelle,

Diahann Carroll, Debbie Allen, Jasmine Guy and Marsha Warfield. Also featured are short vignettes filmed on-site at some of the Black Family Reunion Celebration events held this year in various cities.

In addition to an impressive list of musical guests including Dionne Warwick, Melba Moore, Vanessa Williams, BeBe and CeCe Winans, Keith Washington, Tracie Spencer and The Boys, this concert marks the first time Gladys Knight has performed without the Pips since the group was formed in 1952.

Knight allows that the transition was "challenging," in that such a long collaboration was "like being married. For 39 years you just get used to a certain sound and having those guys on your right or your left."

George Carlin at 'Shining Time Station'

NEW YORK (AP) - Actor-comedian George Carlin's latest role calls for him to be about 18 inches tall.

"You have to compromise along the way sometimes," says Carlin, the new Mr. Conductor of "Shining Time Station," PBS' preschool show, "and height is one of the compromises I'm willing to make."

Carlin has taken over from Ringo Starr as the show's wee interlocutor and narrator of the Thomas the Tank Engine stories.

It's a big change to work in children's television, given "the rather delicious irony that I'm known for my frank language, my candor," said Carlin, creator of the classic bit, "Seven Words You Can't Say on Television."

"That's really only one part of my comedy, and my comedy is only one

part of my career, and my career is only one part of my life," he said.

Carlin was attracted to the Mr. Conductor role, he said, because of the show's quality.

"There's usually a theme that runs through a show which respects, I think, a child's ability to follow," he said. "And yet there is an interesting, broken quality to the run of the show. It doesn't linger anywhere too long."

As a character, Mr. Conductor "needs some attention, needs an audience, is a bit of a showman or a showoff," Carlin said. "He has something to offer the others ... but isn't very heavy-handed about it."

"He sort of gently comments, 'Oh, I see. ... Well, that might be good. Maybe it won't, and we'll find out.' ... He lets the children find out for themselves. That's really the most valuable way, anyway."

It's a fun role, but Carlin takes Mr. Conductor very seriously because he wants to be taken seriously as an actor. He has great hopes for his supporting role in Barbra Streisand's new movie, "Prince of Tides," with Nick Nolte.

It isn't the first time Carlin has tried to make his mark as an actor.

In his first flush of success in the '60s, the short-haired, mainstream-looking Carlin acted in a Doris Day movie and a "That Girl" episode with Marlo Thomas, and auditioned for the Broadway stage.

"I did all these things and I just was never comfortable with the acting. I couldn't do it right, I didn't feel good, I wasn't there," he said. "So I had to put that aside rather than either embarrass myself or starve."

He let his hair and beard grow,

concentrated on his comedy, and was phenomenally successful. By the time the bearded, long-haired Carlin starred in "Carwash" in the mid-'70s, "I'd been hopelessly typecast."

In the mid-'80s, he began to study acting and the film roles began coming, including "Outrageous Fortune," "Bill and Ted's Excellent Adventure," TV movies for Disney and Fox, and the Bill and Ted movie sequel.

He still has to overcome Hollywood producers' perception that he's not interested in acting. "They should know A, that I'm serious and, B, that I have some 'range,' as the actors say," he said. "'Prince of Tides' will show them."

HAVE FUN at the Movies

EXCELLENT GOOD FAIR POOR DON'T WASTE MONEY

BILLY BATHGATE: Starring Dustin Hoffman, Nicole Kidman, Loren Dean and Bruce Willis. *Billy Bathgate* is an interesting movie that strives to be a great film. It misses. So, put this small, sometimes well-told, gangster tale on your video watch list. Based on the critically acclaimed E.L. Doctorow best-seller by the same name, it is a curious telling of the story of a street-wise young boy in the 1930s, from Bathgate Avenue who dreams of a better life. Billy Bathgate (Loren Dean) is convinced that joining mobster

Dutch Schultz's (Dustin Hoffman) gang is his passport. He idolizes the legendary gangster but soon finds out that life in the underworld is filled with mistrust and suspicion, and that Dutch's power and control is on the wane. Unfortunately, the film is mired by dark, murky production techniques (presumably to give the story mystery and intrigue) and mumbled, swallowed dialogue. Both techniques only irritate and make you wonder what the heck is going on. Whatever element was to

be the linchpin (perhaps Billy, perhaps Dutch's demise) is missing. None of the characters or the parts of the story really come together.

The acting, however, is superb. Dustin Hoffman has truly electrifying moments as the once-powerful mobster, who is now losing control. He not only does not accept this, he does not even understand what is happening to him. Loren Dean, as Billy, retains a rather unique vulnerable and innocent appearance while steadily growing aware of his increasing gang ties. Bruce Willis, with his smug, cocky, slick, lover-boy hit man. However it is veteran character actor Steven Hill, as the gang's accountant, who give the film its richest performance. He's wiser, older and as decent as a crook can be. His acceptance of his fate as a member of a once-powerful gang and his powerlessness to resist the temptations of blood money is brilliant.
