

Shultz: Soviet talks not likely

WASHINGTON (AP) - Secretary of State George P. Shultz says the odds are against U.S.-Soviet arms control talks being held in Vienna next month, despite the expressed hope of both sides that talks be held.

Shultz' comments, made in an interview with the Associated Press Thursday, would appear to dash any chance that the two superpowers will hold new arms control negotiations

prior to the November presidential election.

Shultz also said in the half-hour interview that it is well known that Soviet leader Konstantin Chernenko is suffering from health problems, but Washington doesn't know whether he is seriously ill.

"There have been many reports that are public knowledge of problems that he has had when he appeared in public on various occasions," Shultz said. "It's clear he does have some health problems. How serious they are, I don't know." The 72-year-old Chernenko hasn't been seen in public for nearly eight weeks, and a senior State Department official said earlier Thursday that "speculation is increasing" about his condition. Another official said Washington is in a state of "heightened watchfulness" on Chernenko's condition. These officials insisted on not being identified.

Three might be charged

According to school officials, Goodrich and his roommate were awakened about 2:30 a.m. Thursday and forced to run through campus and do push-ups and sit-ups.

Accounts given by other students to college authorities said Goodrich, who started classes Monday, collapsed during the "motivational exercises" designed to introduce new cadets to corps traditions but was told to get up and keep running.

His roommate, who suffered no ill effects, helped Goodrich back to the dormitory and helped him into the shower in an effort to revive him. Police were called when he failed to respond, and one officer administered cardiopulmonary resuscitation, authorities said.

Goodrich was taken to St. Joseph and placed on life-support systems in the hospital's intensive care unit. When Goodrich was admitted to the hospital, authorities said, his temperature was 104 and his heart had stopped.

"We are shocked by the passing of Mr. Goodrich and his family has our heartfelt sympathy. This was a most unfortunate accident - a tragedy and I know that no one regrets it more than those involved. Their grief is, of course, shared by all of us,"

A&M President Frank E. Vandiver said in a prepared statement.

Although the exercises were conducted in early morning hours, the student's body may have had difficutly shedding heat because of high humidity. At 3 a.m., weather reports showed, the temperature in College Station was 77 degrees, with 79 percent humidity.

'That isn't very hot, but the body can lose its heart regulating ability at any time, especially when under stress," Lee told the Eagle.

About 2,000 of the school's 36,000 students belong to the corps, which is organized along military lines but is not connected with the ROTC program on campus. Most of its members, who wear uniforms, are male.

In Webster, N.Y., near Rochester, Robert Goodrich, 30, declined to discuss the circumstances surrounding his brother's death, saying the family had not yet been fully informed of the details. But he did talk about Bruce's interests and goals.

"He had said that he wanted to become service-oriented," Robert Goodrich said. "During the time he was interested in the ROTC programs, he talked about making the military a career."

Larry Combest believes he'll win county

Larry Combest said this area does not overwhelmingly support opponent Don Richards, despite the former being a Democrat and former Hereford resident.

"I predict we'll carry Deaf Smith County." remarked Combest, the Republican nominee for the 19th U.S. Congressional District. He was at the courthouse Thursday afternoon as part of a two-day swing through the 15 counties which are to consider his and Richards' candidacies in the Nov. 6 general elections.

"Don got a lot of newspaper support," Combest said, "but I really don't think he will carry the county." Combest said he believed people "are going to look at the ticket," meaning the inclusion of the Reagan-Mondale race. A Republican, the Lubbock resident said, is more likely to be able to successfully represent

area citizens and their beliefs. Democratic congressmen from somewhere as conservative as West Texas, he said, are handicapped due to the more liberal approach of party leaders in Washington. The policies of House Speaker Tip O'Neill, Combest claimed, help make it difficult for conservative Democrats to land important committee positions.

"My campaign is supported by many conservative Democrats who realize the national Democratic Party no longer shares their conservative philosophies," a Combest press release contends he said. "I hope all conservative Democrats will always remember the rousing cheer that went up from the Democratic delegates in San Francisco when the

Duringian interview in front of the courthouse, Combest stressed care needs to be taken in the placement of the nation's first high-level nuclear waste dump. Deaf Smith and Swisher counties - the latter located just outside his district - each possess one of nine sites being considered for the repository. Combest said the Ogallala Aquifer, a main source of water in the Panhandle, must be protected from contamination.

There are other states which want the dump, Combest claimed. "I say let them have it."

The former aide to four-term Sen. John Tower said there is "a great deal" the federal government could do to help farmers. For one thing, he feels the implementation of a free international market is perhaps being pursued too quickly by the current administration.

Combest also said he favors controls on production rather than acreage. He claimed to be, however, anxious to hear any proposals on agriculture.

Combest was a Tower legislative assistant from 1971 to 1978. For the last six years he has been owner and operator of Combest Distributing Company, a Lubbock firm dealing with electronic equipment.

Born on a farm in Memphis, Combest received his bachelor's degree in business education 15 years ago at West Texas State University.

Signing of agreement stalls

HOUSTON (AP) - Attorneys for a Mexican civil rights group and the city school board signed an out-of-court settlement of a 28-yearold desegregation lawsuit, but NAACP lawyers decided to wait until minor wording changes in the plan were made.

The changes were approved by attorneys for the Houston Independent School District, and the final draft was expected to be reviewed today by lawyers for the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

"This is something that we would be very pleased with, and the beginning to bring more equality into the district," said local NAACP President Frank Burns said.

The agreement was reached among the three groups early Thursday after almost four days of around-the-clock negotiations. But NAACP expressed last-minute reservations.

"We just had a couple of issues where we thought the language needed to be made more clear so that it fully reflected the agreement that had been reached," said NAACP attorney Patrice Johnson.

Heroin sales prompt probe

AUSTIN (AP) - The availability of higher-grade heroin on city streets spurred an investigation that resulted in 53 indictments and a citywide dragnet for 27 suspects, the head of Austin's police narcotics unit says.

Arrests continued Thursday as police looked for people named in the sealed indictments that were handed up last week by the Travis County grand jury.

Officers said the indictments charge delivery of heroin, a felony punishable by a maximum sentence of life in prison.

The arrests began Wednesday night with 12 people named in the indictments and two others had been arrested by Thursday.

The indictments stemmed from heroin purchases made by undercover officers between early July and Aug. 14. Amounts purchased ranged from about half a gram to two ounces, according to Lt. Pete Taylor, head of the Austin police narcotics unit.

Taylor said work on the investigation began in March, as officers were looking at the city's heroin problem.

SWAT teams to eye inmates

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) - A trained negotiator and a sniper will be part of four SWAT-like teams set up to help curb violence within the nation's second largest prison system, where 267 inmates have been stabbed this year, 12 of them fatally.

Lane McCotter, deputy director of operations for the Texas Department of Corrections, said 60 potential members of the special teams, to be called Special Operation Reaction Teams (SORT) took physical training tests this week.

McCotter had several such teams at the U.S. disciplinary barracks at Fort Leavenworth, Kan., where he was commander of the barracks before joining the TDC.

The teams will work at six heavily-guarded units set up for inmates "so ornery you can't take a chance with them," prison spokesman Phil Guthrie said.



In outer space, where the effects of gravity are null, the electrical current causes the mix to separate into its constituent parts while flowing continuously past charged elements. Once the various materials are divided, the target hormone is collected.

The result is a drug of a purity impossible to achieve on Earth.

McDonnell Douglas and Johnson & Johnson have flown the electrophoresis machine experimentally on four earlier shuttle missions. Astronauts operated those machines.

The partners paid NASA \$80,000 to give Walker the training he needed to become a shuttle passenger.

On Discovery's first flight, Walker will be operating a new, perfected model. His goal is to produce enough of the hormone for clinical testing on Earth.

James Rose of McDonnell Douglas said the material to be processed has already been partially purified in a laboratory. The material started as 1,500 liters of fluid produced by laboratory cell cultures. This batch, said Rose, was "put through the most advanced techniques for purification we have on the ground today."

The returned material will then be used by Johnson & Johnson for animal tests and, eventually, for clinical tests on human patients.

A fully automatic electrophoresis machine will be flown in the cargo bay of a space shuttle next year. This 5,000-pound machine will produce even more of the hormone.

Some Montana blazes controlled

HELENA, Mont. (AP) - Nearly a week after timber and range fires erupted across Montana, scorching nearly 250,000 acres, firefighters corraled seven of the blazes and turned their sights today on the worst - a 145,000-acre inferno that has destroyed 30 homes.

The 5,000 firefighters got their first break Thursday when the winds slackened and rain began falling, prompting authorities to express their first note of optimism since the fires broke out last weekend.

"Overall, it sounds a lot better," said Paul May, spokesman for the Department of State Lands.

Seven large fires totaling nearly 190,000 acres remained out of control today. Five others were listed as contained, meaning they were circled by fire breaks and not likely to spread unless weather conditions worsened.

In south-central Montana, 500 firefighters were massed in the Bull Mountains south of Roundup for a full-scale assault on the state's most destructive fire, one covering 145,000 acres near Hawk Creek. It destroyed about 30 homes in a subdivision near Roundup on Monday.

Groundwater plan draws fire

WASHINGTON (AP) - A long-awaited administration plan to give states major responsibility for protecting groundwater - the source of half the nation's drinking water - is being called inadequate by two environmental groups.

Under the new strategy unveiled Thursday by the Environmental Protection Agency, the federal governent will set contaminant standards and regulate pollution sources, sometimes indirectly through existing state programs.

The participating states will be responsible for classifying particular groundwater aquifers.

Alvin Alm, EPA deputy administrator, told a news conference that EPA expected to give the states \$7 million soon to draw up their groundwater protection strategies.

Timothy Hayes, a Richmond, Va., attorney who handles water matters for the Environmental Defense Fund, said the new strategy needs "more carrot and more stick" to give states an incentive to participate.

Pact sparks labor revolt

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) - A reported agreement between caretaker Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir and his chief rival, Shimon Peres, to take turns leading a bipartisan government set off a revolt today in the ranks of Peres' Labor Party.

Israeli media reported the accord calls for Peres to serve the first 25 months as prime minister and Shamir to take the top post for the next 25 months, breaking the deadlock that had resulted from the inconclusive July 23 elections.

Peres was designated by President Chaim Herzog to form the government after his Labor Party received 44 votes to 41 for Shamir's Likud bloc, leaving 13 smaller parties holding the balance of power with 35 seats. Herzog had urged the two major parties to form a national unity government.

Shamir spokesman Yossi Ahimeir told The Associated Press that Shamir had not yet agreed to let Peres to serve as prime minister first and that other details still were not ironed out. But he said he expected an agreement during a meeting between the leaders today.

Under the plan, put forth by Australian Prime Minister Bob Hawke, each nation would be free to provide military facilities to friendly countries - specifically, nuclearpowered warships of the U.S. Navy.

The stipulation means the zone would not hinder American military operations in the region, where Australia, New Zealand and the United States have operated the AN-ZUS defense pact since 1951.







Arthur joined by tropical depression

MIAMI (AP) - Tropical storm Arthur churned slowly toward the Leeward Islands today as forecasters said the thick of the 1984 Atlantic hurricane season had arrived "all of a sudden."

Meanwhile, a new tropical depression formed in the central Atlantic Ocean and two other areas of disturbance attracted weather-watchers' attention, the National Hurricane Center said.

Before this week, only three tropical depressions and no tropical storms had cropped up during the first three months of the season.

"This is getting to be the time of year when you expect a lot of tropical activity to be in the Atlantic," said

hurricane center forecaster Bob Case. "It seems to hold off, then all of sudden bang, you're in the thick of it."

Arthur, born Wednesday afternoon of the season's fourth tropical depression, was expected to cross the Leeward Islands and emerge into the warm waters of the northeastern Caribbean by early today, bringing with it thunderstorms and gusty wind, forecasters said.

At 10:30 p.m. EDT Thursday, Arthur was about 300 miles eastsoutheast of Antigua, part of the island group that separates the Atlantic from the Caribbean.

It was moving northwest at 5 mph with gale-force winds of at least 38


mph extending 75 miles from the storm's center, the Coral Gablesbased hurricane center said in its latest statement.

The storm's last reported coordinates put it near latitude 15.0 north and longitude 58.0 west. Highest sustained winds were estimated at 45 mph, and "little change in strength" was expected through this after toon. according to the statement.

Satellite photos Thursday showed the "poorly defined center of a tropical depression" had formed about 1,000 miles east of Barbados in the Atlantic.





Insurance board considers rate increase

AUSTIN (AP) - Insurers who 8.6 percent for the statutory classes coverage in Texas want higher higher premiums because they say the economic downturn drove business costs out of sight.

The State Board of Insurance took the appeals under consideration.

The National Council on Compensation Insurance asked the threemember board Thursday for a 28.7 percent increase although the board's staff has recommended a 10.6 percent increase.

All the recommendations include a mandatory 2 percent increase ordered by the 1983 Legislature after it raised maximum weekly payments to those injured on the job from \$189 to \$203.

"You need a total rate that will be adequate for the worsening experience in this type of insurance," said Anthony Grippa, vice president of the National Council of Compensation Insurers.

During the past 34 years, Benefield logged more than 6,000 hours flying time. He joined Rockwell's B-1 program in 1974.

Benefield, a retired Air Force colonel, was born in Rison, Ark., and graduated from Jefferson High School and Texas A&M University, where he studied aeronautical engineering passionately, Mrs.

Benefield said.

Benefield joined the Air Force in 1950, saw duty in Korea, completed the service's test pilot program in 1955 and worked with flight test operations at Edwards. He flew combat tour in Vietnam in

1967-68 and then worked for the Federal Aviation Administration for four years as a test pilot.


Benefield received several military honors and awards during his career, including the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics Chanute Flight award. He was the son of Thelma-Benefield and the late Allen Benefield of Jefferson. Other survivors include Benefield's wife, Suzanne, of Lancaster, Calif.; sons, Terry of San Diego and Tommie Jr., a U.S. Navy pilot stationed in Jacksonville, Fla.





Beach cleanup ends

GALVESTON, Texas (AP) - Scattered patches of oil still stain Galveston beaches, but efforts to clean up what's left of the tar-like mess that washed ashore Aug. 3 have been halted because "you'll never get it squeaky clean," a Coast Guard spokesman says.

By the end of the week, Mayor Jan Coggeshall said, only one cleanup crew will be on call. Scores of teams scoured, the beaches in the weeks after the spill. .

Sand on the island's beaches still has an oil content of between 1 percent and 4 percent, Coast Guard Lt. Larry Clark said Thursday.

Ordinarily, Clark said, the sand contains no oil "except right where there's a tarball." But "natural processes" will break down the remaining oil, Clark said.

"You'll never get it squeaky clean," he said. "You'll never get it as clean as it was before the spill."

The British tanker Alvenus spilled about 2.8 million gallons of oil into the Gulf of Mexico July 30 after it ruptured south of Cameron, La.

The 690-foot vessel is now docked at Todd Shipyards in Galveston, awaiting repairs, Clark said.

He said he was uncertain how much the cleanup had cost.

Between 80,000 and 100,000 cubic yards of sand have been removed from the island's beaches since the spill, Ms. Coggeshall said. But she said the loss "isn't going to make that much difference" to the environment, according to a report by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration.

Cleanup efforts of the city's seawall will continue, Clark said. City officials had asked that that



Super Bowl rematch headlines NFL slate

The Washington Redskins meet the Miami Dolphins in a rematch of Super Bowl XVII opponents as the National Football League opens its regular season on Sunday.

Since beating Miami in the NFL's championship game 27-17 two years ago, the Redskins have played the Dolphins once in an exhibition game that resulted in a 38-7 victory for Miami last year.

"They are among the elite - a well-coached, disciplined team that doesn't do anything fancy but outexecute you," said Washington assistant coach Richie Petitbon of the Dolphins.

The Redskins' growing injury list - which includes defensive linemen Dave Butz (back) and Darryl Grant (knee), cornerback Darrell Green (thigh) and offensive linemen Joe Jacoby (ankle) and Russ Grimm (leg) - remained a primary concern heading into the season opener.

"The injuries will play as great a part in planning our game plan as what Miami does," said Redskins Coach Joe Gibbs.

The Dolphins don't have as many injury problems as the Redskins only linebacker A.J. Duhe is missing due to lingering knee and shoulder problems. Quarterback Dan Marino bounced back from a dislocated finger to throw for 204 yards against

Tampa Bay in last week's exhibition game.

In other action Sunday, the defending NFL champion Los Angeles Raiders - who walloped the Redskins 38-9 in last year's Super Bowl, open on the road at Houston. Also Sunday, it's Atlanta at New Orleans, Kansas City at Pittsburgh, New England at Buffalo, Philadelphia at the New York Giants, St. Louis at Green Bay, San Diego at Minnesota, San Francisco at Detroit, Tampa Bay at Chicago, Cincinnati at Denver, and the New York Jets at Indianapolis.

Cleveland plays at Seattle in a Monday afternoon game and Dallas visits the Los Angeles Rams in the first of the weekly Monday night games.

The Cowboys open the season with a new quarterback in Gary Hogeboom, who is supplanting Danny White. They also have 12 rookies on a 49-man roster that lost five players to retirement.

Most of the Dallas newcomers are replacing a group of blue-chip retirees - Harvey Martin, Drew Pearson, Billy Joe DuPree, Pat Donovan and Robert Newhouse. The last time the Cowboys lost as many players, in 1975, they went to the Super Bowl.

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) - Tim Witherspoon, his World Boxing Council heavyweight crown on the line for the first time tonight against undefeated Pinklon Thomas, says he's hoping for an early ending to the fight.





Soviet Union lauds own achievements

MOSCOW (AP) - The Soviet Union's answer to the Los Angeles Olympics, the Friendship '84 Games, ended with the hosts trumpeting their sporting achievements and taking a final blast at the Summer Games they shunned.

Sports and ceremony closed out the Friendship Games on Thursday, with the Soviets scoring a final triumph by winning the basketball

By ALISON SMALE Associated proclaiming the Games more successful than the Olympics.

At a closing ceremony in Moscow's Rossiya Hotel, adjacent to the Kremlin, Gramov reiterated that the Soviet Union and 14 other countries, mostly its East bloc allies, were right not to go to Los Angeles.

"Boundless commercialization" characterized the Summer Games, he told an invited audience. "The atmosphere of Los Angeles once again proved the correctness of the decision" to boycott the Olympics, he added. "In all aspects, Friendship '84 surpassed Los Angeles," a Bulgarian woman basketball player, Vanya Dermedzhiyeva, also told the audience. Though the Soviets insisted their Games were not meant to rival the Olympics, Gramov, both at a press conference and at the closing ceremony, said that Friendship athletes set 18 world records, compared to "only 11" at Los Angeles, and said that 47 Olympic records were bettered, compared with 45 in the Olympics. There were some disappointments. Soviet swimmer Vladimir Salnikov failed to beat his own world records in the 400- and 1,500-meters. But he beat the Olympic gold medal times. East Germany, whose athletes were said by other competitors to be bitterly disappointed at missing the Olympics, proved its sporting prowess in swimming, winning 16 events.

hurt." The Estacado club, from District 1-4A, needs to be in better condition, Kelley said.


"In time," he said, "both teams will be good football teams."

Sigel fails to win third amateur title

EDMOND, Okla. (AP) - Jay Sigel doubted he would win the U.S. Amateur golf championship a third straight time. He was right.

"I'm as fierce a competitor as there is," the soft-spoken Sigel said. "I had to lose sometime and I don't mind losing to Rocco.


"He deserved to win. He played very well. He played better than I did," Sigel said.

After 36 holes of match play today, only four golfers will remain in the hunt.

The two top qualifiers, Scott Verplank of Oklahoma State and Scott Dunlap of Florida, are among 16 golfers still in the running for the 1984 title.

Lendl advances in U.S. Open

NEW YORK (AP) - If Ivan Lendl reaches the final of the U.S. Open Tennis Championships - and Mats Wilander and a few other gentlemen might have something to say about that - it really won't matter to him who's on the other side of the net.

"I really don't care. I'd just like to get there and then have the problem of facing somebody," Lendl said Thursday night.

John McEnroe is ranked No. 1 in the world and the No. 1 seed here. Lendl, the gaunt, stoic Czech, and Jimmy Connors stand 2-3 in each case

It was Connors who beat Lendl in each of the past two U.S. Open finals. Conversely, Lendl handed Connors his two worst losses in recent years, 6-0, 6-0 in the WCT Tournament of Champions at Forest Hills this year and 6-1, 6-1 two years ago at the ATP Championship in Cincinnati.

And it was McEnroe whom Lendl beat earlier this year in the French Open for his first Grand Slam title.

Barring an upset along the way, Lendl will almost certainly face one of them. When asked again to make a choice, Lendl smiled ever so slightly and replied: "I would prefer to play somebody else."

Detroit

Navratilova, by far the best women's tennis player today, was asked following her second-round match whether she was driven to be the greatest ever.

"It's a long-term goal," she replied. "And it's also a very subjective goal because there'll always be people who are 90 years old who'll say, 'Well, I saw Suzanne Lenglen and she was better.'

"If you go on titles alone, then Margaret Court was the greatest. If you go on Wimbledon titles, then Suzanne Lenglen or Helen Wills Moody was the greatest. If you go on longevity, then Chris would be the greatest, and perhaps I would be right behind her. So it depends on what criteria you use."

Ultimately, though, Navratilova admitted: "It does drive me - yes." Other seeded women moving into the third round were No. 3 Hana Mandlikova of Czechoslovakia, who

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

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DIALING FOR DOLLARS Teachers taught to cope in Alaska's bush

JUNEAU, Alaska (AP) - Steve Grubis is a survival specialist, teaching teachers from the rest of the nation about life in the Alaska Bush, where problems with language and culture often make them "strangers in a strange land."

"A typical village scene is to see sled dogs tied up to a TV satellite system," Grubis said. "Or see someone sitting in their homes watching the 'Dukes of Hazzard' on TV while a herd of caribou goes by:

"It's not necessarily a case of culture shock when you go into some villages. But it is culture fatigue," he said. "The ways people organize and do things with one another are different there from elsewhere."

Grubis, 41, is assistant professor of cross-cultural education at the University of Alaska-Fairbanks. The former Boston resident aid he has worked in the Canadian Arctic and Alaska for the past 18 years, mostly in rural areas.

Teachers come from every state in the nation "plus a couple of foreign countries" for his three-semester cross-cultural orientation program, Grubis said in a telephone interview Monday.

"Some districts require it as a condition before they hire someone," Grubis said. "It makes for a more stable, more knowledgeable staff."

Turnover is high for teachers who work in remote areas. It generally ranges from 15 percent to 20 percent a year, although it can go as high as 50 percent in some rural districts, according to officials with the state Department of Education. That compares with a turnover rate of 7 percent for the Anchorage School District in the 1982-1983 school year, officials said.

"Most don't know what they're getting into," Grubis said of teachers seeking jobs in the bush.

For example, sometimes "it's just not wise" to go outside in some villages in winter, he said. Temperatures commonly range to 50 degrees below zero in some villages, with wind chill factor readings of minus 100.

"Many of the teachers who go into rural Alaska go to communities of 500 or less," he said. "There's no road system. They're isolated, without support. They're not able to visit relatives on the weekend.

"Professionally, they may have to teach five or six different subjects

"I've seen them walking in with a cowboy saddle to a Yupik village on the (south central) coast," Grubis said. "There isn't a horse within 300 miles."

"Some will come in and not leave the teacherage (combination schoolliving quarters) except to get their mail," he said.

"They roll the shades down, turn the heat up and put pictures of Florida on the wall," Grubis said. 'Those are rare instances, but they happen.

"In some communities, English is not the primary language," he said. "They're strangers in a strange land.'

The orientation program Grubis offers includes bringing in native teachers to talk about life in the bush, where 20 different languages are spoken and where living conditions "have jumped from the Stone Age to the 21st century" in little more than a decade, he said.

While the university's rural orientation program is not mandatory for Alaska teachers, educators must be certified to work in the state.

Alaska currently is being flooded with certification requests from nonresident teachers who have heard about the high pay and excitement to be found here, Education Commissioner Harold Raynolds said last week.

Some 50 to 90 applications are arriving daily, and the flow picked up recently when Gov. Bill Sheffield appeared on nationwide television during a Washington, D.C., visit to trumpet the virtues of working and living in Alaska.

"That, plus news coverage focusing on statistics that Alaska pays teachers about \$15,000 more a year than other places, is stimulating it," Raynolds said. "We have 20,000 certified teachers on file and we employ about 7,000 in the state so we have no real shortages."

While the Education Department does certify teachers, it does not act as a job broker, he said.

"This is unsolicited," he said of the certification requests. "We are not recruiting.'

Starting teachers earn about \$25,000 a year in Alaska with experienced classroom instructors pulling down as much as \$50,000 annually, he said.

About 2,300 of the state's 7,000 teaching slots are at villages where one instructor often works with

children in grades kindergarten through 12.


Alaska is a very attractive place to become a teacher, but many people looking for jobs in rural areas have their expectations all wrong, he said. "A classic you hear is about the

teacher recruited from California for a small village who had a tennis racket with her when she arrived,"

Raynolds said. "Some of those villages don't even have telephones, let alone tennis courts.

"That illustrates the complete misunderstanding about villages in Alaska and the impressions of what it's like to live here," Raynolds said. "It's exotic all right, but exotic on the hardship, not the romantic side."
