## Tractor Victim by advance reservation only. Tickets were distributed to No Charges Yet

Giving a better than even chance to live now, Douglas Bray, about 45. his chest crushed by a tractor in a fantastic fray on an isolated Deaf Smith county farm early last week, is still alive in the Deaf Smith county hospital and local officers are still wondering what to do about filing charges against his alleged assailant.

Bray was brought to the Deaf Smith county hospital Wednesday morning of last week by Jim Prince, foreman at the Horton farm, nearly 18 hours after he had been injured.



### Firdman Watts Gets Suspended Sentence In The body of Mack Reeves, 64-year old bachelor was discovered Monday afternoon at his home Trial for Death of Paul Foster Last Week

Firdman Watts, charged with murder without malice in connection with the highway death of Paul Foster of Hereford, was found guilty and given a 5-year suspended sentence in 47th District Court at Canyon Tuesday of last week.

The 24-year old Mexican-American, resident of East Amarillo, was the driver of a car which was involved in a head-on, collision with a car driven by Paul Foster on Highway 60 near Umbarger last March 28.

Foster was killed instantly, and his wife seriously injured in the wreck. Watts suffered from head injuries.

Charges of murder without malice were filed against Watts at Canyon following the accident. Trial, twice delayed, opened in District court there last week.

The jury was out in the case a little more than three hours before returning the "guilty" verdict. Sentence was suspended by District Judge Henry S. Bishop.

**Brother Hurt** As Light Ship Crashes Hill

Apparently a great many people resented the discrimination at the hospital or they resented being taxed without either benefits or representation or they objected to the tax burden.

Now we face another bond issue, this time in the amount of \$150,000. It is for hospital improvements and expansion. We feel our position should be made clear.

I am a qualified Osteopathic Physician and Surgeon. I am licensed by the Texas State Board of Medical Examiners to practice medicine and surgery the same as any Osteopathic Physician or Doctor of Medicine (allopathy) in Texas. My license is signed by both Doctors of Medicine and Doctors or Osteopathy the same as is the license of other doctors in Texas. In fact the only difference in the framed license which hangs on our walls is the name, degree and number.

The County Commissioners Court appoints a hospital board and they have full power in operating the hospital. For years this board has been told that the reason I am not permitted to care for my patients in the hospital is that the graduate nurses took an oath not to practice for anyone but MD's. As a matter of public information may I quote the Nightingale Pledge which nurses take upon graduation:

"I SOLEMNLY PLEDGE MYSELF BEFORE GOD IN THE PRESENCE OF THIS AS-SEMBLY:

"TO pass my life in purity and to practice my profession faithfully.

"I WILL abstain from whatever is deleterious and mischievous, and will not take or knowingly administer any harmful drug.

"I WILL do all in my power to maintain and elevate the standard of my profession, and will hold in confidence all personal matters committed to my keeping, and all family affairs coming to my knowledge in the practice of my profession.

"With loyalty will I endeavor to aid the physician in his work, and devote myself to the welfare of those committed to my care."

Hereford has been good to me and to my family and we have tried to be good citizens. It takes a lot of neighborliness, good citizenship and teamwork to make a town grow and a county great. We have strived to be progressive and constructive, to live and to let live, to pay our way and to ask from the public only that which we have earned. We want our position understood so that we may be removed from the debate and controversy which is sure to follow.

We have no interest in the hospital bond issue other than that of a good citizen. If voting the bonds will help make Hereford bigger and better we have an obligation as a good citizen to vote for them. If the facts and practices prevalent in the hospital are such as to make us honestly feel we cannot support the bond issue then that is a personal decision which we must make with our conscience at the ballot box. We are taking no personal or public stand in the matter, although our patients are insisting that we should do so. We feel that our patients, even though they be deprived of the hospital facilities and our treatment of them in it, must make their own decisions on the vote. Perhaps they can also take a detached viewpoint and say: "It is a good thing for Hereford then I must support it."

We have every confidence in the ability of our good citizens to make up their own minds.

Hereford is on the way to making a great little city. Good citizenship, an accurate statement and understanding of issues in elections and the fullest expression of our citizens will make it even better.


