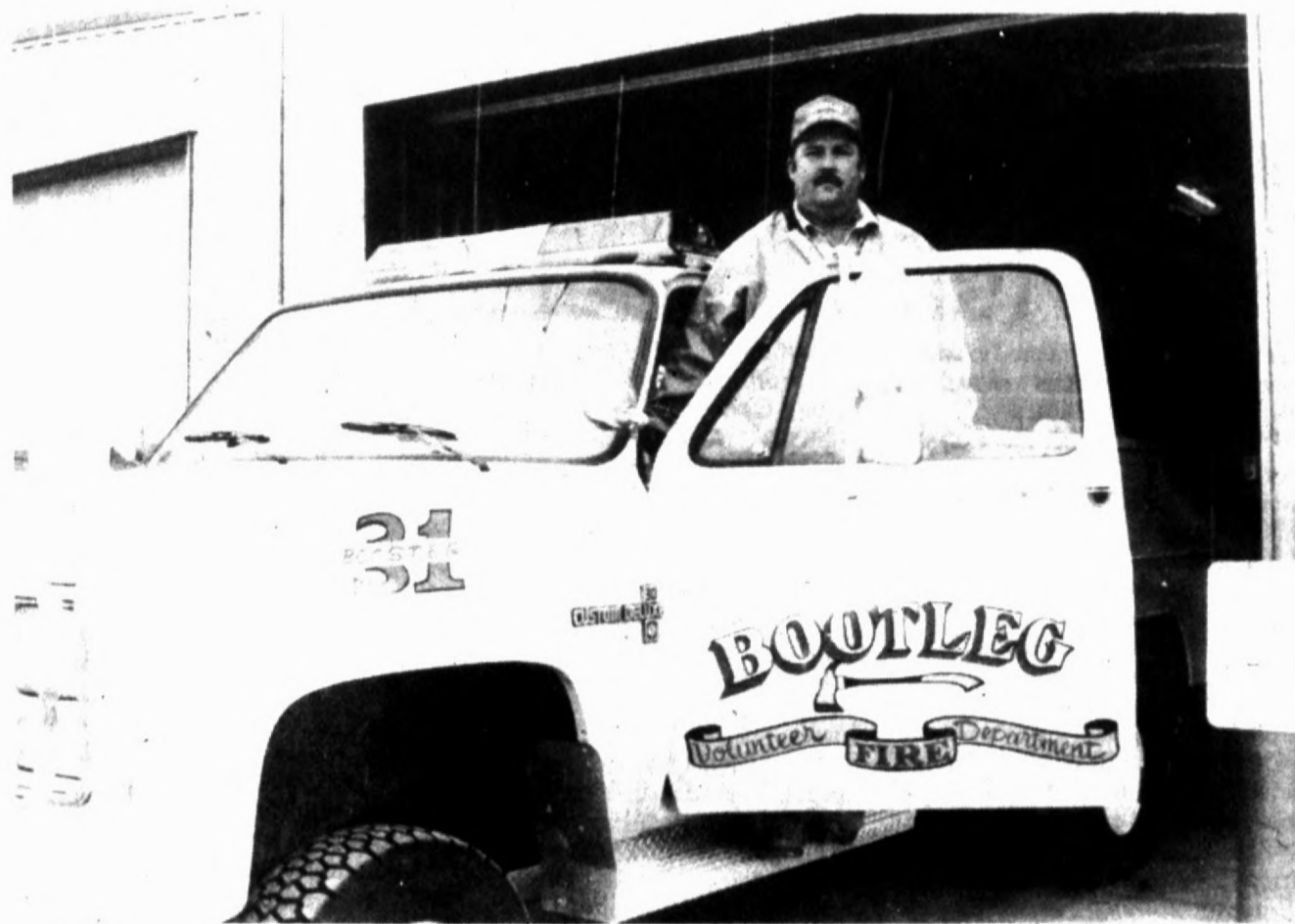

## Bootleg firemen dedicated to job in wide county area

If there's a single factor that keeps volunteer firemen going in far west Deaf Smith County, it's knowing that they're the first line of defense in a wide area... and, the nearest fire department is 25 miles away.

"We're all there is out here," said Bobby Hammock, Bootleg fire chief. "We" is 10 men -- currently, there are no women -- in the volunteer fire department. Their area of coverage, east-west, is "halfway to Hereford and to the New Mexico state line." They go south to the Parmer County line and north as far as they can see.

Fire calls nowadays are made through the county's 911 service, ordinarily, said Hammock, but some residents of west Deaf Smith County still call Hammock.

"They're used to calling me, at home, or at the county barn," said the Precinct 3 foreman.

Although the Bootleg department is entirely independent of the Hereford Volunteer Fire Department, the two cooperate whenever the occasion presents itself, continued Hammock.

"Jay Spain calls us when we can get to something sooner," he said about his relationship with the Hereford city fire marshal.

The Bootleg fire department began modestly enough in 1975 when it was organized. Early on it was a joint

effort of the Walcott and Bootleg communities. However, about three years ago, it was settled permanently in Bootleg and goes by that name, only, now.

The first piece of equipment bought for the department was a 1962 fire truck that had been retired by the Friona fire department and was in use at the Friona airport. Deaf Smith County helped out with a contribution toward the purchase.

Farmers and ranchers in the area contributed toward purchase of items the department needed.

"Times got pretty hard for farmers and ranchers, though, and then we found out we could get Texas Forest Service matching fund grants," Hammock explained.

But, the Bootleg department has never bought a piece of new equipment. Hammock said the firemen have pretty much built their own.

For instance, a tanker truck that holds 3,200 gallons of water started as just another big truck.

"We stretched the frame and had the box built on the back," Hammock continued.

Two other trucks were modified for use, also. One has a 300-gallon tank mounted on the back and the other can haul 250 gallons.

When faced with an emergency need for more water, the firefighters have back-up -- three trailers holding

5,000-gallon tanks are parked at strategic locations in the area.

Landowners help by keeping the tanks full. The mobile units can re-fill their water tanks from the parked tanks.

Gathering up the volunteers when a fire call comes in is not as hard as it might seem, considering the distances involved. A night call puts the telephone "fire bar" in service, calling 10 phones at one time.

During daylight hours, mobile phones and radios are utilized to bring the firefighters to the location of a blaze.

The volunteers have maintained

## Arrowhead Mills is finalist for Governor award

Arrowhead Mills of Hereford is one of 49 companies, governments, civic clubs and individuals to be named as finalists for the first Governor's Awards for Environmental Excellence.

The awards will be presented by Gov. Ann Richards on April 13 at a banquet in the Stouffer Austin Hotel.

Winners will be selected by a blue-ribbon committee which includes representatives from the governor's office, the business community, educators and environmentalists.

The award is constructed from recycled glass, steel and granite.

The awards are sponsored by Clean Texas 2000, a statewide environmental initiative of the Texas Water Commission.

The finalists were selected from more than 1,000 nominations.

Awards will be given in the following categories: large business/industry (technical); large business/industry (non-technical); small business/industry (technical); small business/industry (non-technical); local government; education; media; individual; civic/non-profit organization; youth organizations; and agriculture.

Also to be honored will be members of Clean Industries 2000, representing more than 75 industrial facilities, and Clean Cities 2000, representing 30 cities, who will be cited for their environmental partnership with the state.

Arrowhead Mills is being considered in the agriculture category along with BIOFAC Inc. of Mathis, Texas Cattle Feeders Association of Amarillo and West Point Pepperell of New Braunfels.

## Clinton feels heat on high court pick

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Clinton begins his first search for a Supreme Court nominee looking to reverse the court's Reagan-era conservative shift and facing immediate pressure to keep his promise of a diverse judiciary that recognizes abortion rights.

Justice Byron R. White had barely announced plans to retire when speculation and political jockeying engulfed Washington on Friday. The pressure ranged from women's groups demanding Clinton select a woman to Republicans cautioning against picking a liberal judicial activist.

Clinton, given an early chance to put his mark on the court for years to come, summoned top deputies to the White House today to begin his search.

"I think that there are few decisions a president makes which are more weighty, more significant and have greater impact on more Americans than an appointment to the Supreme Court," the president told reporters Friday.

"And I'm going to try to pick a person that has a fine mind, good judgment, wide experience in the law and in the problems of real people and someone with a big heart."

Clinton aides said Chief of Staff Mack McLarty, Attorney General Janet Reno and White House counsel Bernard Nussbaum would lead the search. Because of the advance notice provided by White, who will step down this summer, the president need not rush.

The flurry of reaction illustrated how Clinton's election had changed things in Washington. Liberals and abortion rights groups were pushing for a nominee from their ranks, not fighting a Reagan or Bush appointee, while conservatives readied themselves to oppose the eventual choice.

Senate Republicans sounded much like Senate Democrats during the Reagan-Bush years: They urged that abortion not be a litmus test.

"If the president nominates a 'litmus test liberal' all bets will be off," said Senate GOP leader Bob Dole.

Only once during the campaign did Clinton attach a name to Supreme Court discussions, calling New York Gov. Mario Cuomo "qualified beyond question."

Others mentioned as potential nominees include federal Judges Richard S. Arnold of Little Rock, Ark., a longtime Clinton friend, and Amalya Lyle Kearse of New York. She was on Clinton's early list of attorney general candidates, as was Judith Kaye, recently confirmed as New York state's top judge.

## 4 defendants sentenced here after guilty pleas

Four defendants entered guilty pleas to charges and were sentenced in 222nd District Court Friday.

Judge David Wesley Gulley heard the pleas and set punishment.

An eight-year term in the Texas Department of Criminal Justice institutional division was assessed Clemente Zavala, 40, on his plea of guilty to felony driving while intoxicated. He will serve part of the term in the TDCJ substance abuse punishment facility.

Concurrent five-year probated sentences were given to Jose Fernando Garcia, 30, who was charged with felony DWI and bail jumping, failure to appear. He also was ordered to pay a fine of \$1,500.

After pleading guilty to burglary of a building, Anthony John Mondragon, 19, was sentenced to 10 years probation. He was fined \$1,500.

Another felony DWI defendant, Jose Valdez, 24, received a five-year probated sentence after entering a plea of guilty. He also was fined \$1,500.

G. Breyer, chief judge of the 1st Circuit Court of Appeals in Boston; Jose A. Cabranes, chief judge of the U.S. District Court in New Haven, Conn.; Stephanie Seymour, a federal judge in Oklahoma; and Senate Majority Leader George Mitchell of Maine, a former federal judge.

Further possibilities: Marion Wright Edelman, founder of the Children's Defense Fund and a longtime friend of Hillary Rodham

Clinton; Sen. Joseph Lieberman, D-Conn., a Clinton political ally and former state attorney general; and Laurence Tribe, a Harvard professor and well-known liberal legal scholar.

As a candidate, Clinton said ideology would take a back seat to excellence in his court picks, but also acknowledged Supreme Court nominees would have to share his support of abortion rights.

## Morales wants study on impact at Pantex

AMARILLO, Texas (AP) - Texas Attorney General Dan Morales has asked the U.S. Department of Energy for a detailed study of the potential environmental impact of storing plutonium at the Pantex Plant.

Morales has written a letter to Energy Secretary Hazel O'Leary asking the agency to analyze its plans store up to 20,000 plutonium weapons cores or pits at Pantex.

The facility's World War II-era underground storage bunkers originally were designed to store conventional explosives. Plutonium is a fissionable nuclear material that triggers the first of three nuclear reactions in a thermonuclear explosion.

Pantex, located 17 miles northeast of Amarillo in Carson County, is the primary assembly and disassembly site for the nation's nuclear warheads.

The Energy Department has released a draft version of an "environmental assessment" stating that plutonium storage has no significant environmental threat to workers, to off-site communities or to the Ogallala Aquifer, a source of water for much of the High Plains area.

The draft, Morales said, "completely ignores the environmental

consequences resulting from the increase in dismantling activities necessitating the increased storage."

Morales said the federal agency has failed to consider alternatives to increasing plutonium storage at Pantex, adding that the agency hasn't adequately assessed safety and risk issues in the draft.

"While I remain proud of the work done by the workers at Pantex, I also remain profoundly concerned that generations of Texans will be forced to live with a decision regarding the storage of thousands of pounds of plutonium made behind closed doors," Morales wrote.

An Energy Department spokesman could not be reached for comment late Friday.

Gov. Ann Richards also has recently criticized the draft environmental impact statement.

"One inescapable fact is readily apparent. A number of assumptions and conclusions stated in the document simply cannot be verified without more information," Richards wrote O'Leary.

Richards also raised her concerns about the proposed six- to 10-year interim storage period sought by the agency, which aims to dismantle up to 2,000 warheads annually at Pantex.

## Two men leave cult home; officials hope end in sight

WACO, Texas (AP) - Two men have left the Branch Davidian religious sect and federal authorities said they were more hopeful about resolving an armed standoff that finishes its third week today.

The men, whisked away by law officers in four-wheel drive vehicle Friday night, were the first people to leave the cult in a week. Their identities were not immediately released by the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms and FBI.

State troopers and other law officers took the men to be questioned at Texas State Technical College, where agencies involved in the standoff have their operations based.

Twenty-five people, including 21 children, had previously left the cult's rural home near Waco. Eight-six adults and 17 children remain inside, according to figures cult leader David Koresh has provided to authorities.

The standoff began after gun battles erupted Feb. 28 when federal

agents tried to serve search and arrest warrants on the cult. Four Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms officers and a reported 10 cultists died.

On Friday morning, the FBI delivered to cult members letters from attorneys who have been retained for them, copies of the original search and arrest warrant, a religious audio cassette and copies of Newsweek, Time and People magazines.

Authorities did not, however, provide the sealed affidavits that apparently contain evidence about the cult's suspected weapons cache.

The FBI gave cultists the materials after a short conversation with Koresh that agent Bob Ricks characterized as the "most positive" since March 2.

The cult leader "indicated that it was his desire to get this matter resolved," Ricks said.

He said authorities were wary of getting their hopes too high, however

# Perot takes on 'Herculean task' with television meet

DALLAS (AP) - Texas billionaire Ross Perot says distributing and tabulating millions of ballots in a nationwide TV referendum is a "Herculean effort" but one that's necessary to achieve reforms in Washington.

"We are inviting everybody to participate; the more the better," Perot said of Sunday's paid program. "Basically, it is our first town hall meeting and the first such referendum on government reform."

Across the country, members of the United We Stand America Inc. committee formed from Perot's

campaign apparatus planned to gather at homes and restaurants to watch the 30-minute presentation.

"It's going to be an exciting weekend for us," said Bill Walker, executive director of United We Stand America Texas.

Of the Perot watch parties, he said, "We're concerned it's going to be too many. These things started as a grassroots effort. But like a Super Bowl party, it has just snowballed."

The spot was scheduled to air at 7 p.m. CST Sunday on NBC. Its \$400,000 cost will be paid by Perot personally, said Sharon Holman, spokeswoman for United We Stand.

Perot told The Associated Press on Friday that 34 million of the 17-question referendum ballots were being distributed in TV Guide.

"For people who happen to be watching the program who don't have a ballot, I will tell them how to make one from a blank sheet of paper," he said.

In addition, 10,000 newspaper editors were sent ballots along with a letter from Perot seeking their distribution as a public service.

"We need to put discipline into the spending system," he said. "Watch Congress; they talk about savings but what they want to do is spend. They treat money like it falls out of the sky. But it comes from hard-working people."

Perot said a Kentucky data processing center will tabulate

a high quality of service by attending training sessions. Four have taken courses at a statewide session at Texas A&M University. Each year, "fire schools" are conducted in nearby communities for volunteers.

Hammock admitted that there have been times when keeping the department operational seemed "iffy" because of a shortage of personnel. "We probably don't have half of those who started it," he said. "There aren't many new people out here to recruit, either."

One of the worst fires that Hammock remembers occurred on the Bridwell Ranch when grass burned a large area, set by a lightning strike.

"We worked from about 5:30 or 6 p.m., when the call came in, until 10 o'clock the next night," he said. A 30-section area of rangeland was burned out in the fire.

Bootleg firefighters were called by the Texas Forest Service in 1988

when a brush and range fire blazed out of control north of Abilene, near the community of Albany.

"Five of us went down there, with a truck, and spent about a day on the scene," said Hammock.

For their contribution, a commendation was sent from then-governor Bill Clements. It hangs on the wall of Hammock's office in the Precinct 3 barn where fire department trucks and equipment are housed.

The department's personnel features three men holding basic certification, one with intermediate certification and the remainder nearing completion of basic requirements, Hammock said. All have taken cardio-pulmonary resuscitation (CPR) training and some have qualified in emergency care.

Although there is no emergency equipment at Bootleg, the volunteers could help in an emergency until an ambulance arrived.

Colorful as the name "Bootleg" may be, there is no reliable history on how the name came to be.

"Some say it was for the obvious reasons -- that there was a store out here that sold bootleg," said Hammock.

"Another story is that there was a school building that the XIT Ranch folks put on skids and moved around to different sites trying to convince people that there were enough children at different places to have a school. They were trying to sell off the ranch then."

Hammock and his colleagues are a dedicated bunch. Last year, they answered 14 fire calls -- two wrecks, eight grass and four structure. So far in 1993, they've responded to five calls.

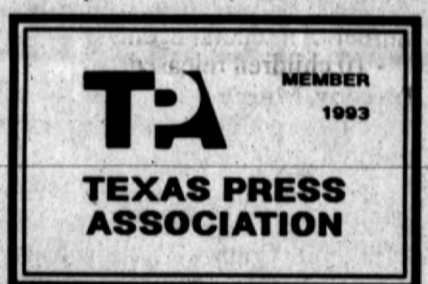
The department picks up \$100 from the county for each call answered, in addition to an annual stipend of \$1,000. Deaf Smith County also contributes \$100 per year for each firefighter who is certified. Equipment needs are purchased from these limited funds. And, the department must lay out about \$1,000 each year for liability insurance.

From these figures, it's easy to see there's no fat in the department budget.

Hammock said that "sometimes we get discouraged" because of the few persons involved. But, the motivation is always there.

"Knowing we're 25 miles away from another fire department makes us stay with it," declared Hammock.

# Playa lake symposium set in two area cities

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will host a symposium about playa lakes in Lubbock and Amarillo this week.

The day-long session will be held from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Wednesday in Lubbock and from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Thursday in Amarillo.

Information on the ecology and management of playas will be presented, but the emphasis of the program will concern step-by-step procedures for landowners who are interested in obtaining playa and wetland management assistance from various agencies.

This assistance can be in the form of easements, cost-sharing and technical help.

Several landowners will share their experiences with working with agencies in several types of assistance programs.

Agencies which have been invited to describe their playa lake assistance are: The Soil Conservation Service, Farmers Home Administration, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, United States Fish and Wildlife Service and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Cost to attend is \$10 at the door, with registration for those signing up on-site beginning at 8 a.m.

The Lubbock meeting will be held at the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center, located at Interstate 27 and FM 1294.

The Amarillo meeting will be held

at the same center, located at Wolflin Drive and Coulter Drive.

# Chronology reveals key moments in Waco standoff

WACO, Texas (AP) - Here are some key moments during the gun battles and ensuing standoff at the Branch Davidian compound near Waco. Times are approximate, according to eyewitnesses.

**Sunday, Feb. 28**

9 a.m. - Waco news reporters arrive near the cult compound; police radio communication indicates authorities may be preparing raid.

9:55 a.m. - About 100 Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms agents move in on compound. A gun battle begins.

10:30 a.m. - Four agents are killed and 15 wounded in the 45-minute battle. Branch Davidian leader David Koresh, also known as Vernon Howell, later says he and others were wounded and his 2-year-old daughter killed.

11:15 a.m. - Negotiations begin to remove dead and injured agents.

11:30 a.m. - Intermittent firing continues.

About noon - A truce is reached.

12:20 p.m. - Hospital helicopters fly away from the site with injured federal agents.

2:45 p.m. - The ATF asks Dallas radio station KRLD to broadcast a joint statement from Koresh and ATF negotiators.

5 p.m. - Three cult members try to leave the compound, but open fire on ATF agents who order them to stop. One dies, one retreats and the other, Delroy Nash, is arrested.

7:25 p.m. - Koresh is interviewed by CNN.

9:15 p.m. - The release of two children from the compound is announced.

10:05 p.m. - Koresh talks for about 20 minutes on KRLD, describing his beliefs and saying he is the most seriously wounded cult member.

10:30 p.m. - Two more children are reported released.

**Monday, March 1**  
1:50 a.m. - Koresh talks for about 25 minutes to KRLD, saying the gun battle was "unnecessary." The broadcast is the last live public comment from Koresh.

- ATF spokeswoman Sharon Wheeler tells reporters the agency was "outgunned" by the cult Sunday.

- Nash is charged with attempted murder of a federal agent.  
- 10 children released.

**Tuesday, March 2**  
- Two women and six more children are released.

10:45 a.m. - Military vehicles and ambulances race toward the cult compound.

1 p.m. - KRLD says Koresh agreed to surrender if his taped statement is broadcast at 1:30 p.m.

1:30 p.m. - Koresh, in a 58-minute taped sermon broadcast on radio and TV, says he will surrender.

2:30 p.m. - The taped sermon ends, but no one leaves the compound.

**Wednesday, March 3**  
Noon - ATF holds first major public briefing, announcing that Koresh said he would surrender when he received "further instruction from God."

- Office trailers are brought in near the compound site for law officers.  
- Hospitals are told they can relax security.

- A young boy leaves the compound, bringing a box of 12 puppies.

**Thursday, March 4**  
- Another child leaves the compound.

- Using Bradley armored vehicles for cover, authorities retrieve a body 350 yards behind the cult residence.

**Friday, March 5**  
- Another child leaves the compound, the 21st.

- Authorities say Koresh has denied an intent to commit suicide.  
- Medical supplies are sent into the compound, including a suture kit Koresh requested to nurse his wounded wrist.

**Tuesday, March 9**  
- Cultists hang a banner outside a window that is visible to reporters stationed two miles away. "God Help Us We Want the Press," it said.

- Koresh tells federal authorities in the evening that he has a headache, leaving negotiations to other cult members for the next two days.

- Authorities search a California house where Koresh lived and South Carolina gun dealer for information about his past.

**Wednesday, March 10**  
- Cultists unfurl another banner: "Send in CFA & Don Stewart."

**Thursday, March 11**  
- Koresh's mother, Bonnie Haldeman and attorney Dick DeGuerin, whom she hired on the cult leader's behalf, are turned away from approaching the law enforcement compound, where negotiators are taking place.

- U.S. District Judge Walter Smith Jr., responding to a motion by Mrs. Haldeman and attorney Kirk Lyons, refuses to grant Koresh access to a lawyer.

**Friday, March 12**  
- Lyons and other attorneys complain

about the secrecy of the weapons charges against Koresh and negotiations.

- Kathy Schroeder leaves, the first person to leave the cult in a week.  
- Oliver Gyarfas leaves, the first man to leave the cult.

**Saturday, March 13**  
- Schroeder and Gyarfas make initial appearances before a federal magistrate, who orders them held without bond as material witnesses.

**Sunday, March 14**  
- Schroeder and Gyarfas talk with cult members inside the compound and tell them to come out peacefully.

- Another banner appears from a compound window, saying "FBI broke negotiations, we want press." Later, similar messages are sent via S.O.S signals and Morse code as a flashing light appears from a window after dark.

- Authorities illuminate compound with stadium-style spotlights, saying they want to protect agents from gun-toting cult members.

- FBI special agent Richard Swensen says this day's negotiations were "less, by far, than any other day."

**Monday, March 15**  
- DeGuerin urges Koresh to "surrender."

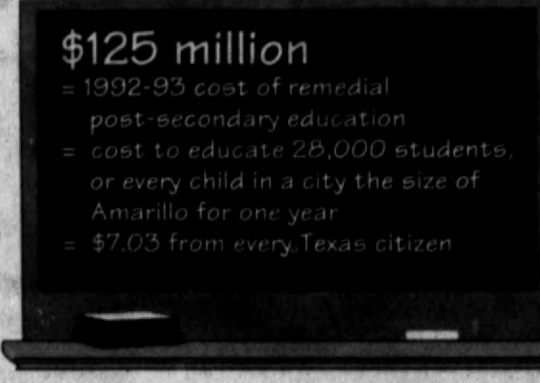
- Negotiators say they are avoiding biblical discussions with Koresh.  
- Steven Schneider, Koresh's top aide, and Wayne Martin, a Harvard-educated attorney, meet in person for almost an hour with an FBI negotiator and McLennan County Sheriff Jack Harwell.

**Tuesday, March 16**  
- FBI says Koresh's wounds have slowed him, but he's still in charge.  
- Schroeder, being held as a material witness, appears in federal court to request release from federal custody.

### Taxpayers educate some kids twice

Texas taxpayers will spend \$125 million in 1992-93 to re-educate high school graduates who are unprepared to go on to college. The amount—appropriated for remedial post-secondary education by the state Legislature—will be paid to community colleges, junior colleges and other institutions of higher education that provide remedial programs. School districts in some states, like Colorado, California and Maryland, plan to provide a high school diploma along with a guarantee that graduates have the skills necessary to enter the workplace or to attend a college.

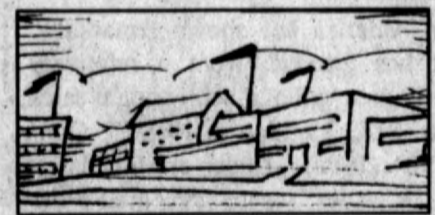

U.S. Sen Dennis DeConcini, D-Ariz., mailed us a copy of a book titled "Human Rights and Democratization in the Newly Independent States of the Former Soviet Union."

## Notes on the Law

The mail-order business in America has shown remarkable growth in the last 25 years. It has grown "from a relatively inconsequential market niche" in 1967 to a "goliath" with annual sales that reached "the staggering figure of \$183.3 billion in 1989." *Quill Corp. v. North Dakota*, 112 S.Ct 1904 (1992). Under existing laws, mail-order sales are not taxable in states where the mail-order companies "do no more than communicate with customers in the State by mail or common carrier as part of its general interstate business." *Id.*

In *Quill*, the State of North Dakota attempted to levy a use tax on Quill Corporation, which has annual sales in North Dakota of approximately \$1 million. Part of its reasoning was that Quill Corporation distributes 24 tons of catalogs and flyers in North Dakota each year and that North Dakota bears the expense and burden of disposing of the materials in its landfills. The State of North Dakota also alleged that the magnitude of the mail-order business, now in the billions, caused a greater "presence" in the State which should allow North Dakota to impose its use tax even though Quill did not maintain any sales staff or warehouses in North Dakota.

After reviewing the history behind the Commerce Clause and reviewing its admittedly confusing treatment of the Commerce Clause in a long line of cases, the United States Supreme Court refused to allow North Dakota to impose its use tax. The Supreme Court felt that if it allowed North Dakota to impose its use tax, then the mail-order business would become subject to similar impositions of use taxes by the 6,000-plus taxing entities in the Nation. These would include the other 49 states and municipalities among other taxing entities.

The case on first glance appears to be a complete victory for the mail-order business. However, the Court concluded with an ominous invitation to the United States Congress to review the issue of whether mail-order businesses should be subject to some form or forms of use taxes similar to the one North Dakota had tried to impose.

The Court stated:

"No matter how we evaluate the burdens that use taxes impose on interstate commerce, Congress remains free to disagree with our conclusions. See *Prudential Insurance Co. v. Bejamin*, 328 U.S. 408(1946). Indeed, in recent years, Congress has considered legislation that would 'overrule' the (existing) rule. Its decision not to take action in this direction may, of course, have been dictated by respect for our holding(s) in (previous cases) that the Due Process Clause prohibits States from imposing such taxes, but today we have put that problem to rest. Accordingly, Congress is now free to decide whether, when, and to what extent the states may burden interstate mail-order concerns with a duty to collect such taxes." *Id.*

In other words, the United States Supreme Court will likely not strike down a tax on the mail-order business in the future as it has in the past. This leaves a \$183 billion taxable target for Congress and the states. The temptation will certainly be there.

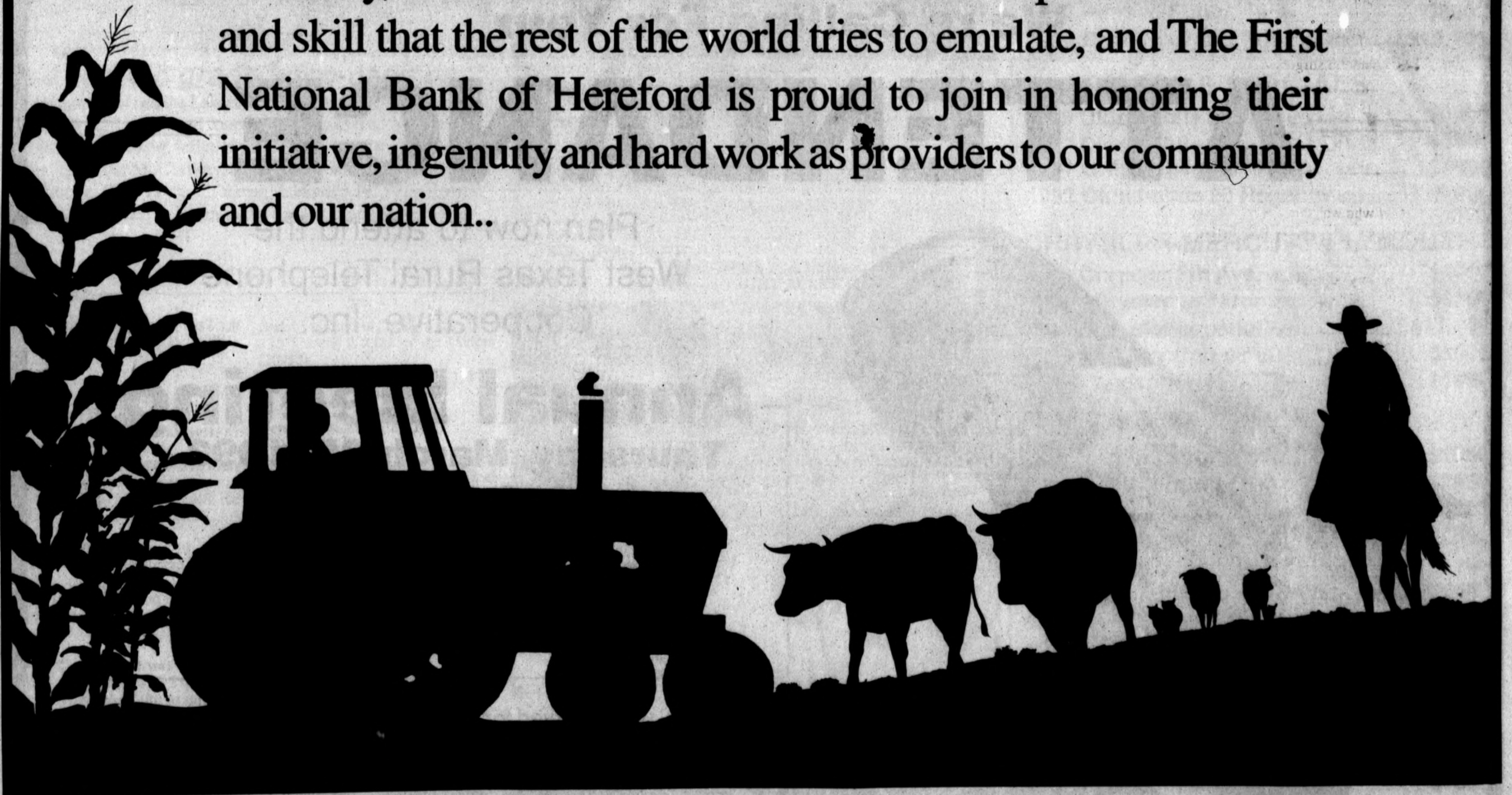

## Southern, GW stage upsets; other games go as expected

Sixteen games, none of them very close, made for a day of few surprises in the NCAA tournament.

There was one big upset Friday - Georgia Tech losing to Southern 93-78 - one milder upset - George Washington beating New Mexico 82-68 - and one near-upset - Massachusetts edging Penn 54-40. But otherwise the second day of the tournament went pretty much as expected.

Three of the four No. 1 seeds were in action, and all posted lopsided wins.

In the battle for supremacy by conference, the Atlantic 10 emerged as the early winner as all four teams from that conference advanced to the second round. The ACC also is doing well at 5-1.

"I thought all along that we deserved to have four teams in the tournament, but no one was going to believe it until we proved it on the court," Atlantic 10 commissioner Ron Bertovich said in Tucson, Ariz.

The Big Ten is 4-1, the SEC is 3-1, the Big East and WAC are 2-1. On the losing side, only two of the Big

Eight's six teams remain - Kansas and Oklahoma State.

### EAST At Syracuse, N.Y.

**Massachusetts 54, Pennsylvania 50**

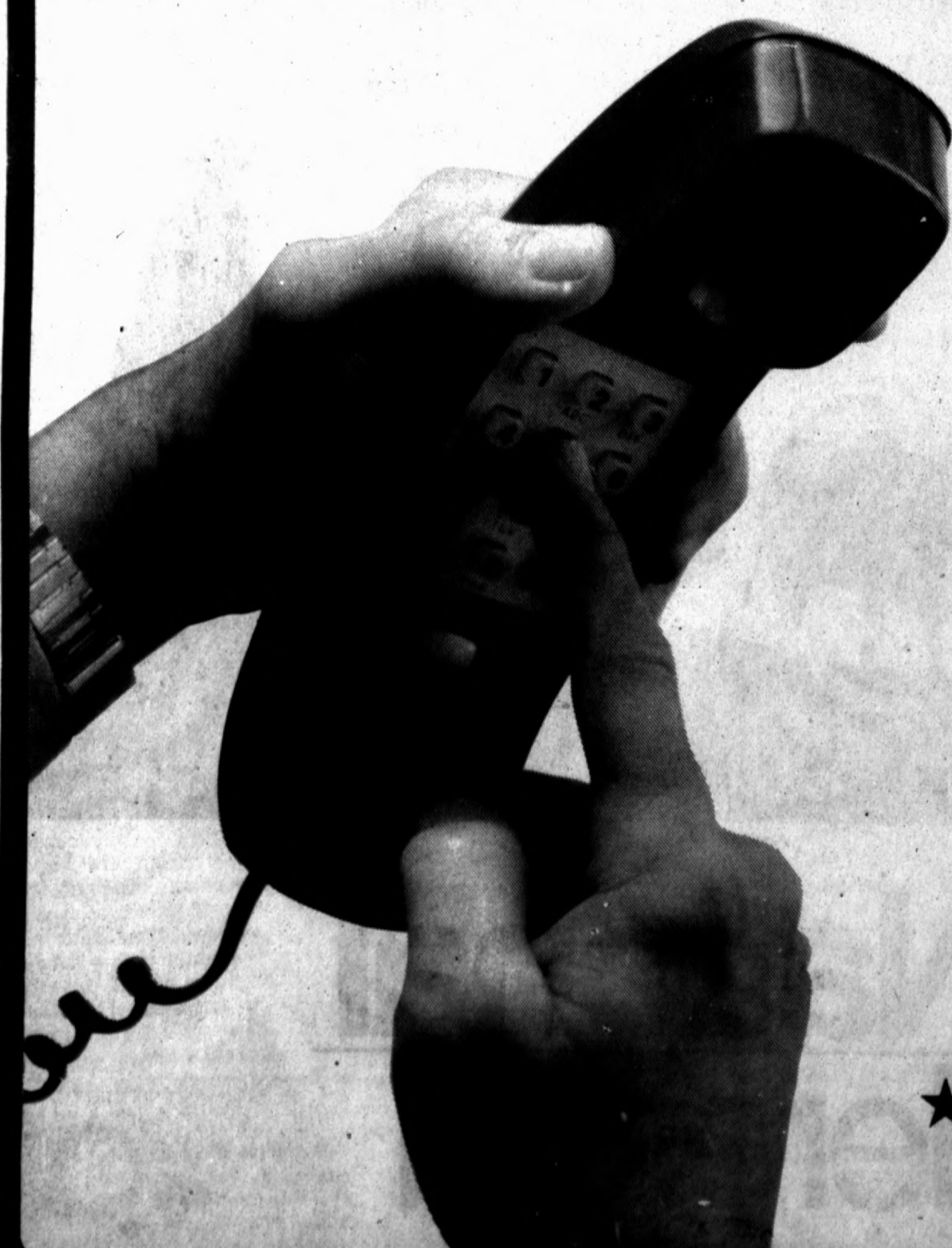

# UTEP edges Houston in NIT

EL PASO, Texas (AP) - Texas-El Paso held Houston's leading scorer, David Diaz, to just 13 points and Johnny Melvin scored 21 points Friday night as the Miners beat the Cougars 67-61 to advance to the second round of the National Invitation Tournament.

The Miners will visit Georgetown, which advanced by beating Arizona State 78-68 Thursday, on Tuesday night. The Cougars, who were aggrieved by an NCAA Tournament snub, ended their season at 21-9.

The Miners overcame a 23-4 run by the Cougars, which began with about 16:20 left in the second half with a Diaz 3-pointer. The Miners battled back to take a 56-55 lead on a jumper with five minutes remaining by Eddie Rivera, who contributed 12 points.

The score would change hands four more times during the next two minutes, before a basket by Houston's Derrick Smith tied the score 61-61. But Roy Howard's ensuing bucket off an offensive rebound put the Miners up for good.

Charles Outlaw, who led the Cougar's with 15 points, then missed four straight free throws.

The Cougars began to foul the Miners in rapid succession during the final seconds. Two free throws by Rivera put the score at 65-61.

Johnny Melvin's dunk with 10 seconds capped the scoring.

The Miners led 37-25 at the half as they held the Cougars' Diaz and Outlaw, Houston's second leading scorer during the regular season, to a combined seven points. Outlaw scored four in the first half, Diaz three.

# Shooting of Alice police officer unsolved after 18 years

ALICE, Texas (AP) - Police officer Matthew Charles Murphy, 33, lay dying on a deserted city street on a cold December night in 1974, felled by four .22-caliber bullets in a hand, an arm and his chest and abdomen.

Before his death, Murphy supplied the only clue to his killer's identity by radioing the dispatcher for a check on an Iowa license plate. But the clue proved a dead end, leading law enforcement officers to an abandoned car in an Iowa junkyard.

For 18 years, someone has gotten away with Murphy's slaying, which makes it a rarity: 94 percent of slayings of police officers nationwide are solved, compared with 71 percent of all U.S. homicides. Murphy's is one of four unsolved law enforcement killings in Texas during the past two decades.

"It is unfinished. It's not been put to rest. Somebody did it. He hasn't been held accountable for his actions," says Murphy's son, Pat, a 31-year-old banker who was 13 when his father was slain.

While Murphy's killer remains unknown, these details are known: - Murphy had been returned to patrol duty after a successful undercover narcotics assignment. Some police scholars advise against returning an officer to patrol duty after an undercover assignment because of the danger of retaliation; others say the decision was understandable for a department the size of

Alice's, with few officers to spare.

- Around the time of the shooting, an officer approaching the intersection turned the opposite direction from where Murphy's car was stopped. The officer later said the reflection of patrol lights in a service station window confused him.

- The first person to arrive at the shooting scene, a teen-ager who was out on a date, is not mentioned in the reports of three officers who also were there.

- Immediately after the shooting, Murphy's vehicle was driven away to join the search for the killer. Police scholars consider the vehicle to be crime-scene evidence that should have been left alone. They also say a heat-of-the-moment decision to send the officer in the car is understandable and was not necessarily ill-advised.

- The city initially offered a \$500 reward, considered by police authorities to be low even in 1974 dollars. Some of Murphy's colleagues on the Alice force remember being resentful of the amount. Three weeks after Murphy's death, the reward was upped to \$1,750 - still considered low for a homicide - after the City Council contributed \$500, a private citizen gave \$500 and several others donated small amounts, according to newspaper accounts.

- The current Alice chief says some witnesses still are afraid to come forward.

- Someone broke into Murphy's house a year after his death and stole

the guest register from his funeral and newspaper clippings about his undercover work and slaying.

"Most of the people, they've probably forgotten about it. That's awful to say, but it's just the way people are," said Murphy's widow, Diana Giesler, 50, who has since remarried.

But the Dec. 1, 1974, slaying of Murphy, far from being forgotten, remains fresh in the memory of this community of 19,788 west of Corpus Christi.

In the days following the shooting, law enforcement officials worked around the clock and used a helicopter to search for the killer's automobile. The Texas Rangers and the FBI were called in to investigate, which is routine in police slayings. Dozens of suspects were interviewed.

"I think that this murder should have been solved a long time ago, and apparently some of the people are just not saying anything," said businessman Al Martinez, 63, a personal friend of the slain officer and an Alice city council member at the time of his death. He says he doesn't know why the reward offered in the popular officer's death was so low and doesn't remember any official discussions about it.

Former police Sgt. Juan Barrera, now a captain in the Jim Wells County Sheriff's Department, said he has not forgotten Murphy - nor stopped searching for clues in the slaying. He blamed public apathy for the low reward offer and said he and his peers were

insulted that their lives were valued so little.

"Every day when I go to work and every time I pick up a known drug user since 1974, my first question is, 'Tell me something (about Murphy's slaying),' " said Barrera, 47. "There's not one day I don't remember that officer because he was my friend. And I think that's why I've stayed in law enforcement that long - because I think one day, somebody's going to say something."

An unsolved murder remains by law an open investigation - and therefore officially closed to the public and media. Until recently, there has been no active work on Murphy's case in years.

Joe Frank Garza, the new district attorney who took office in January, and Alice Police Chief Jack Compton have formed an investigative task force. The FBI has offered technical assistance and Texas Rangers have met with local investigators.

Compton says he had been "trying to breathe life" into the investigation since his appointment in 1990.

"I have talked to quite a number of people in the community, and I am very convinced that this investigation can be solved - even at this late date - with a very active and aggressive investigation," he said.

He said police have begun new interviews in the case, and plan to talk with a potential suspect whom he declined to identify except to say that the man's name had come up in previous inquiries into the case.

The chief added that he knows of at least two people who have information about the shooting who have been afraid to come forward because they fear retaliation.

Compton said investigators have received more than a dozen telephone calls - one anonymous - in recent days with information on the case. The Corpus Christi Caller-Times published a three-part series early this month on the circumstances and the investigation of Murphy's slaying.

"Maybe if there's a renewed interest down there, maybe they can turn over some stones and find something," said Pat Murphy, vice president of the First National Bank in George West.

"For the first year (after the death), you're thinking, 'Somebody is going to talk; somebody will know something.' After 10 years, you wonder if anybody's doing anything anymore."

Murphy, who was a seventh-grader at George West Junior High when the killing occurred, handles his father's personal possessions with the delicate touch of a museum curator, taking them carefully from his father's thick briefcase and placing them on a varnished table.

These fragments of another life - including a bloodstained, bullet-torn pack of Marlboro cigarettes; a wallet bulging with children's photos, gasoline credit cards and Catholic holy medals; a Smith & Wesson .357-caliber pistol; handcuffs; and a can of Mace - remain in a safe deposit box at a local bank.

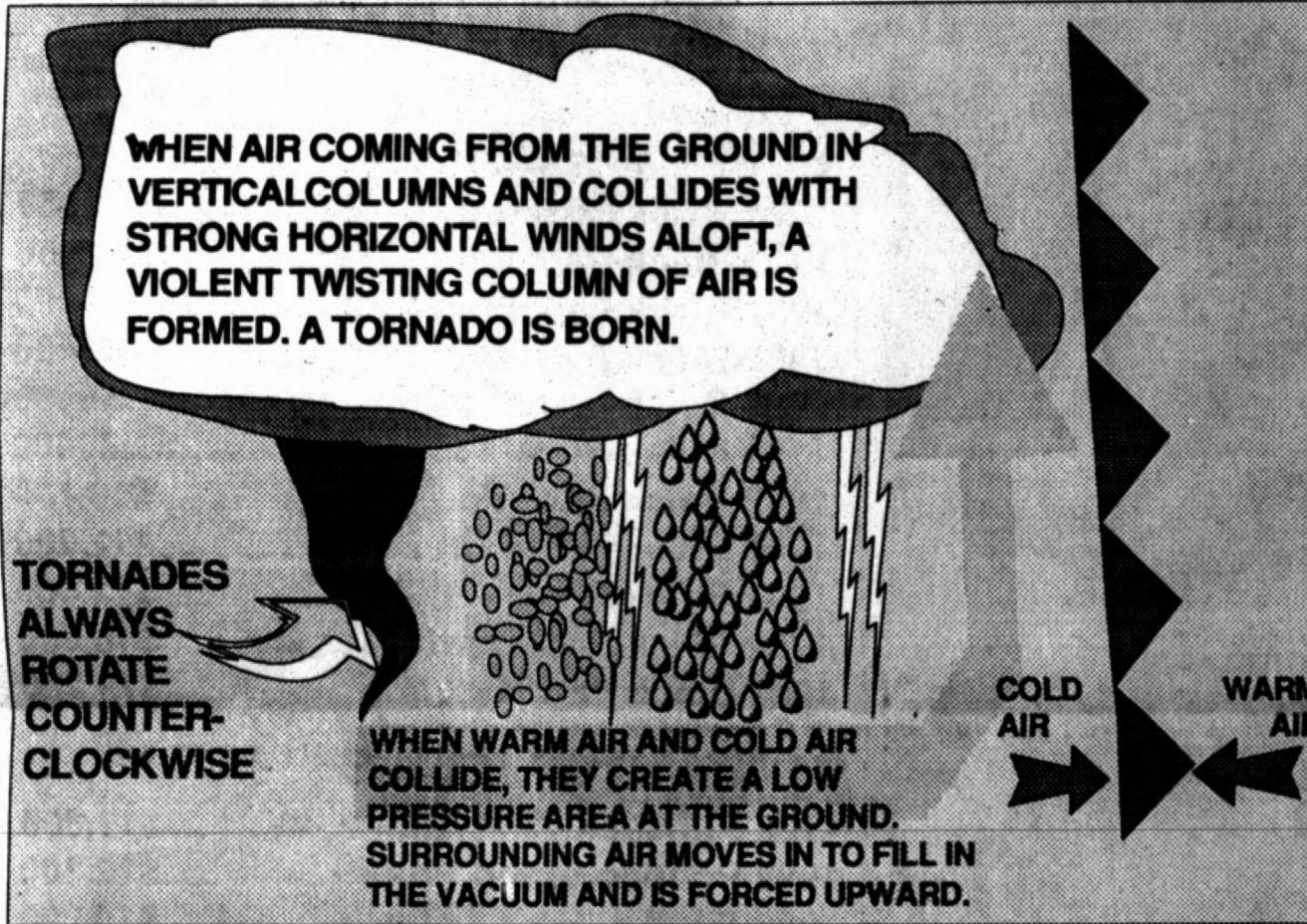
That precaution is considered necessary because of a burglary at the family's ranch house near George West a year after Murphy was shot to death. The burglar was never identified. Taken in that 1975 Christmas Eve burglary were a stack of newspaper clippings from Murphy's undercover work and slaying, a guest register from Murphy's funeral and some of his guns. The register was later found on the grounds of the local cemetery.

"It gives me cold chills," said Diana Giesler, Murphy's widow. "I have no idea why anybody would want a funeral register book, or why those newspaper clippings would mean anything to anyone but the family. ... These were not the kind of things that people normally steal."

Matt Murphy's daughter, Austin teacher Allison Goynes, said she has contacted several legislators about her father's killing. Ms. Goynes, who was 11 when her father was killed, said renewed publicity about the case has also rekindled some of her old grief.

"We want the investigation to remain strong. That's an absolute," she said. "I just didn't want other people who were going through the same misery over the years to feel like this was a lost thing. I don't think we should lose faith in our system. We have to rely on our government to work for us."

## Fury of tornadoes caused by very complex weather forces

While the violence and damage from tornadoes are well known, the actual mechanics of these storms are complex and not completely understood.

They can occur in a variety of situations but are generated most often in severe thunderstorms that occur when warm air and cold air collide.

The collision forces warm air

upward, and that creates a low pressure area at the ground. Surrounding air moves in to fill the vacuum.

In severe storms, cloud tops can rise high into the air, reaching the level of strong horizontal winds that blow the tops into the classic anvil shape often reported around tornadoes. When this happens, more air is pulled upward in something like a chimney effect.

The air moving in toward the

"chimney" begins to turn counter-clockwise and then rises in a twisting column of extreme violence.

Winds in a tornado are believed to reach more than 200 to 300 mph, although no instruments have ever survived an encounter with one of the storms.

Normally tornadoes form in the rear portion of severe storms that move toward the east or northeast and are separate from the heavy rains that occur in these storms.

NEW YORK (AP) - As chief spokesman at the Pentagon, Pete Williams spent three years answering reporters' questions. Now he's going to try asking them.

The former assistant secretary of defense for public affairs will become a general assignment reporter for NBC, beginning March 29.

His job will not include covering the Pentagon, which he left in January.

"It wouldn't be a good fit for the Pentagon or NBC," he said in today's New York Times.

Williams, 41, began his career in 1974 as a reporter at KTWO-TV in Casper, Wyo., eventually managing the NBC affiliate's news operation.

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) - Former President Carter says the decline of U.S. cities is increasing mainly because of apathy among the rich. "Our cities are going down the drain, and most of us don't even care enough to acknowledge the prob-

lem," Carter said Tuesday at Canisius College, a Jesuit school in Buffalo.

When Carter left office in 1981, there were 1,500 homeless people in Atlanta, where he founded the Carter Center, a public policy institute. Today, Atlanta has 12,000 homeless, he said.

Violent crime among juveniles has tripled in Atlanta in the last five years, he said.

An Atlanta teacher told Carter pimps target more sixth-grade girls for prostitution than seventh or eighth graders because the younger girls are easier to control and less likely to have AIDS, he said.

## 'Hatatorium' breathes new life into old cowboy hats

SAN ANGELO, Texas (AP) - A comic visiting San Angelo once said that the name "Hatatorium" made him think of "a place where hats go to die."

Actually, just the opposite is true. Gary Busker and his employees create new hats in their Chadbourne Street shop.

But an important part of their business is bringing old hats back from the dead.

"We see hats that have blood stains and branding iron marks. Hats that have been stomped by cows and singed by campfires. They bring 'em in and we try to bring their hats back to life," said Gary Busker, who runs the shop that was founded by his parents back in 1948.

His parents began cleaning and refurbishing well-used hats as a sideline of their hat-making business.

But, over the years, the cleaning service has become a substantial part of the store's business.

"Some of the major hat companies aren't cleaning hats like they used to," Busker said. "So people send us hats from all over: Oklahoma, Houston, Florida. Someone mailed us a hat from Hawaii this morning and we had a customer send us a hat from Washington (state) last week. I guess we've cleaned hats from every state in the union."

The hat-cleaning service costs \$40, Busker said, and can extend the life of a hat by years.

"Nearly any kind of felt hat will last 10 to 30 years, and a quality hat will actually improve with age," he said.

Considering that the cost of a new, better-quality hat begins at \$150 and can run as much as \$1,000, the cleaning fee is a bargain, Busker said.

And if the hat is too far gone to save, he often takes them in as "trade-ins" on new hats.

"We figured that if you're going to offer someone a special deal, you might as well get something in trade."

The "trade-in" hats show their years of wear and tear, he admitted.

"But I can sell that hat to a beginning hat wearer, a kid or somebody like a ranch worker who needs a hat for changing the oil in the truck. He doesn't want to wear his \$200 hat doing that."

Creating new hats, though, is Busker's specialty - even though he says it's "a bit of a dying art."

"There aren't that many hatters around anymore," he said. "Used to, you'd have one in every town. Used to be two in Abilene. Now, there aren't that many."

His shop has been making its trademark "Angelo" hat since 1956.

"Originally, we called it the Santex. But people would confuse that with San Antonio, so we took

over the name of Angelo."

Hatters don't make the hats from scratch. They start with a "body" - a roughly shaped piece of felt that's already been shrunken, dyed and stretched into the shape of a hat at the factory.

Busker's hatters work on ancient equipment, using wood forms and steam to shape and form hats.

"A lot of the equipment we make ourselves," Busker said. "You just can't go to a supply house and buy this. If you don't make it yourself, you have to wait for someone to go out of business and then buy their equipment."

Ralph Blake, who started making hats at the Hatatorium about two years ago, said the process isn't difficult.

**A variety of homestead exemptions could lower your property taxes!**

A homestead exemption lowers the property taxes on your home by lowering its taxable value. If your home is valued at \$50,000 and you receive a \$5,000 homestead exemption, your home will be taxed as if it were worth \$45,000.

**Who qualifies for an exemption?**

Anyone who owned a home on Jan. 1st (and used it as their primary residence on that date) is entitled to a \$5,000 homestead exemption to lower their school taxes this year... and it doesn't matter if your home is a house, condominium or mobile home. (Counties, cities and special taxing districts may also offer homestead exemptions.)

**Are other exemptions available?**

If you're disabled—or if you're 65 years old or older—you are entitled to an additional \$10,000 school tax exemption on your home. And if you qualify for the over-65 exemption, you're also entitled to a permanent, locked-in "ceiling" on the school property taxes on your home. (The ceiling does not apply to county or city property taxes, and those entities may offer other exemptions.)

**Do I have to apply each year?**

No. If you had a homestead exemption on your home in 1992, you won't need to reapply for 1993 unless your chief appraiser requires it. However, if you haven't received an exemption on your present home—or if you've moved to a new home—you'll need to file for an exemption for 1993. And if you turned 65 or became disabled during 1992, you need to file for the additional exemptions.

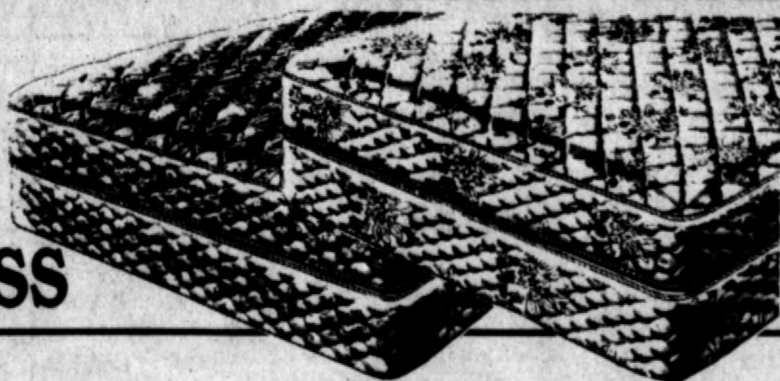

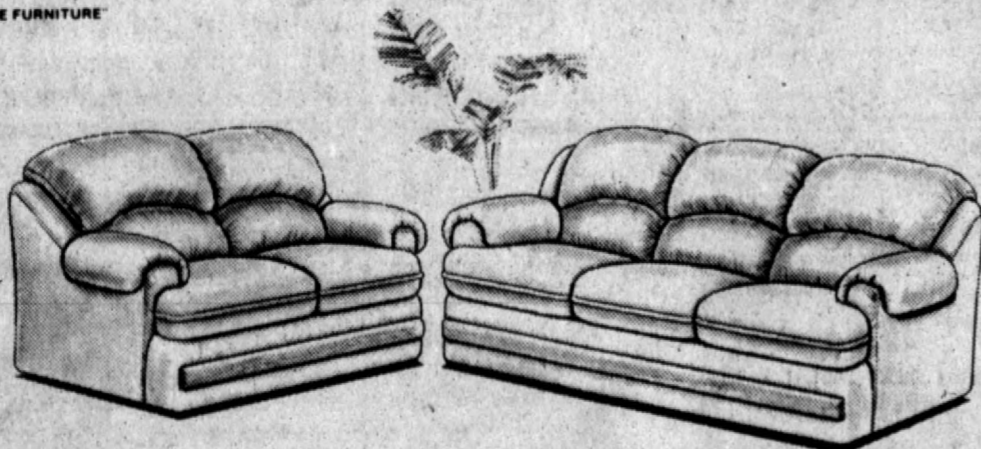

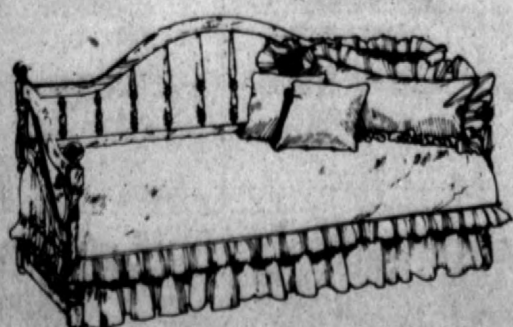

## Women's History Week discussed at meeting

In observance of National Women's History Week, members of Pioneer Study Club met recently at the Caison House with Rosemary Thomas and Mary Panciera serving as hostesses.

Billee Johnson, program chairman, related the origin and purpose of the annual history week celebration. She stated that the purpose is to recognize women's accomplishments at the grass roots level.

Individual interest in recovering women's lost stories began on college campuses and filtered out into society. In the elementary and secondary school classrooms, the problem was glaring: Women were outnumbered 11 to one in the textbooks used by children. Because traditionally history has focused on political, military and economic leaders and events, it has virtually excluded women, people of color and the mass of America's ordinary citizens from the history books.

Multi-cultural history focuses attention on women at the crossroads where the two spheres meet and interact. That is where individual women have emerged as community leaders to address unmet needs, organize for the common good and fight for social justice.

Johnson and her mother were active in the Woman's Suffrage Movement and they proudly cast their votes in the first election open to women.

Women continued to press for recognition and called for an official

congressional resolution declaring a National Women's History Week. In 1981, Senator Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, and Representative Barbara Mikulski, D-Maryland, co-sponsored the first joint congressional resolution for National Women's History Week.

Each club member answered roll call with a three-minute tribute to a Panhandle woman who has achieved special recognition in her chosen field of service. A number of our patrons have gotten hooked on Marian Wells series, but have been frustrated because we haven't had *The Wishing Star*, the first in the "Starlight Trilogy." It's in and will be going out this week. There is a waiting list, so if you've been wanting to read it, get your name on the list. The *Starlight Trilogy* is the story of Jenny Timmons, a young girl from upstate New York. The setting is America after the war of 1812, when

mainline churches were beginning to split apart and new religions and sects were springing up to meet the needs of those who reached for new ideas as they reached for land.

"You can't judge a book by its cover." I know that's not an original thought, but as I work at the library, I am repeatedly impressed by its appropriateness. There is a little book going out this week that I never would have expected much out of, judging by its small (170 pages) size. But the American public has apparently taken to this book about a world-class photographer and an Iowa farm wife. *The Bridges of Madison County* is now topping the New York Times best seller list, and you are welcome to it. Personally, I find nothing appealing in the story of a fly-by-night shutterbug stealing some guy's wife for a prolonged joyride around the countryside taking pictures of bridges. But then, I'm the kind of guy to be disappointed to find that Rush Limbaugh's book has slipped to number two after weeks and weeks as number one. (Don't misunderstand - *Bridges* is on the fiction list, while Rush is on the non-fiction, edged out this week by *Healing and the Mind* by Bill Moyers.)

*Paramedic* is a book that takes you behind the wheel, into the streets, and onto the front lines of emergency medicine from the viewpoint of a New York (what else?) paramedic. Gunshot wounds, ODs, jumpers are all a matter of course to these guys. If you like

action, you'll like this personal narrative by Paul D. Shapiro.

Other books of limited appeal are *Get Rolling: The Beginner's Guide to In-Line Roller Skating* and *The Reunion Planner*. Not the kind of books to hit everyone, but certainly meeting a need for some folks.

I know it's probably too late for this year, but you oral interpreters may want to keep this book in mind: *Scenes and Monologues from the Best New Plays*. Our idea in ordering this is to have some stuff available to high school competitors, but this might work out for a civic or social club program as well.

**SPEAKING OF PROGRAMS...**our solo flight of "A Lifetime in Texas History," presented at Aikman Elementary, was deemed a success - at least in the eyes of the "pilot." This is a program the library has worked up to cover the period of Texas history from the 1830s through the 1890s. Stephen Austin Milles, the presenting character, was born in the days of the Mexican Republic, and relates memories of the revolution, days with the Texas Rangers, the Civil War, and trail-driving. ## Extension News

Any shoe with a heel higher than one inch is detrimental to the health of your feet, ankles, calves, knees and back, with more harm occurring with increased heel height.

Problems begin when there is a lack of space in the toe areas which squeezes the foot and may lead to corns, bunions, and ingrown toenails. Secondly, high heels shift your body's weight to the forefoot, which places undue stress on the metatarsal heads (where the toes and foot connect). This leaves a small surface of approximately one by three inches to support the entire weight of the body.

Other problems include an increased impact at heel strike which may lead to various foot, ankle, knee and back injuries. Also, high heels decrease walking stability and thereby, increase the risk of an ankle sprain as well. High heeled shoes also force the calf muscles and Achilles tendons to shorten. Shortened muscles and tendons

predispose women to such serious injuries as tendinitis or even Achilles tendon tears. This shortening is difficult to reverse.

However, if high heels are a wardrobe must, the following tips may reduce the risk of damage:

-Buy shoes with a wider heel platform that will distribute weight more evenly and make balancing easier.

-Try using an over-the-counter insole to reduce some of the forces of impact on the metatarsal heads.

-Stretch before and after every

brisk walk and at least twice during the rest of the day to reduce muscle and tendon shortening.

-Remove shoes while sitting at desk.

-Try a heel lift in athletic and low-heeled shoes if tightness persists after stretching.

## Hospital responds to patients' needs

Preparing over 2,000 meals each month, from several different menus each day, is the complicated task faced by the Deaf Smith General Hospital dietary department.

During National Nutrition Month, the hospital is recognizing the hard work and dedication of this group of people, according to Ron Rives, CEO.

"The dietary department is not only responsible for preparing meals for the patients, employees and visitors, but they prepare the food for all the special meetings and celebrations at the hospital," Rives said.

The department's primary mission is to provide nutritious, tasty meals to patients, employees and visitors. Martha Rincon, head of the dietary department, believes that good nutrition is a vital part of a patient's recovery. "We must respond to nutritional needs of many different types of patients while still offering meals that are appealing," she said.

The department has a 21-day cycle of menus. The women plan for a general menu and three modified menus which include a bland or soft menu, a diabetic menu, and a low-sodium menu. Working with the physicians, the dietitian visits patients for nutritional screening and assessment. If the patient is at high nutritional risk, a special diet is

developed. The department dispenses diet instructions and family counseling on nutrition, especially important for newly-diagnosed diabetics.

Rincon is a certified dietary manager and has been with the hospital for 18 years. Charlotte Clark, RDL/LDL, served the hospital for 15 years and is now consulting with the department one day a week. She is a registered and licensed dietitian and has a master of science degree.

Members of the department include JoNell Satterfield, a 13-year employee of DSGH and one of the cooks. Silvia Martinez, at DSGH for eight years, was trained through the Panhandle Regional Training Program, which gave her on-the-job training. Juanita del Toro, who has been at DSGH for six years, also was trained on the job. Pat Esqueda has been at DSGH for one year and received her job training through HISSD.

Jennifer Hubbard, the newest member of the dietary department, is a 1991 graduate of Hereford High School. Her goal is to pursue her education in the medical field, according to Rincon.

"We are very proud of our professional dietary staff," Rives added. "They exemplify our philosophy of 'neighbors caring for neighbors'."

## Give yourself a skin exam

No one can recognize a skin problem earlier than you, so start examining your skin on a regular basis.

Make a date to give yourself this skin exam with each change of season. Check each general area of your body one after the other in sequence:

1. Examine the entire front of your body.
2. Look at the entire back of your body the same way.
3. Check each side of your body.

This slippery surface also resists the build-up of protein deposits, which bother many wearers of soft contacts. Also, the gas-permeable lenses last longer and require less daily care.

## Ag commissioner seeking answers

AUSTIN -- Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry has posed an interesting question: "How would you define agriculture?"

Of course, it is the rich bounty of cotton, grains, fruits and vegetables that Texas farmers harvest from their fields and orchards. Agriculture is also the state's extensive livestock industry that produces milk, mohair, meat, eggs and wool. And we cannot forget honey from the state's smallest livestock.

Perry said that National Agriculture Week, March 14-20, has been a good time to recognize all those hard working folks who are part of the Texas agricultural industry.

"Agriculture is more than farming and ranching. It also includes inputs that go into production and the processing, transportation and retailing that move food and fiber from producer to consumer," Perry said.

Agriculture is an industry that takes care of people through its people. And whether they are plowing a cotton field on the High Plains or packing grapefruit in the Rio Grande Valley, the people involved in all phases of agriculture are the foundation and support that has sustained this industry for generations.

"There's a sense of family and community spirit among all the folks in our agricultural industry," Perry said. "It's the untiring efforts of these individuals that make Texas the second leading agricultural producer in the nation."

As the second largest industry in Texas, agriculture contributes mightily to the state's economy with sales totaling more than \$12 billion. In fact, Texas agriculture generates more than \$36 billion in economic activity across the state and one in every five jobs.

"People not involved in agriculture may not easily recognize the total impact this dynamic industry has on Texas and on many rural towns and urban cities," Perry said.

"After all, agriculture is not defined by county lines or city limits."

But Perry emphasized that agriculture is changing, and changes mean opportunities for all Texans. "And the Texas Department of Agriculture has helped create many of these opportunities through out 'Make it TEXAS' initiative we launched in June 1991," Perry said.

With the help of \$25 million in loan guarantees from the Texas Agricultural Finance Authority (TAF), the department through "make it TEXAS" has been nurturing agricultural enterprises across the state since the first loan was made 21 months ago.

Currently, TAF projects have created 4,100 jobs and generated more than \$390 million in Texas economic activity.

"Jobs, growth and economic opportunity--that's a great way to define Texas agriculture," Perry said.

## Oilseed to reach new level

WASHINGTON (AP) - World oilseed production is expected to hit a record 225.4 million metric tons in 1992-93, the Agriculture Department reports.

That figure is up 0.7 million tons from the forecast of a month ago and 1.7 million over last year.

U.S. production, forecast to be 68.7 million tons, is up 7 percent from a year earlier while foreign production, at 156.8 million tons, would be down more than 1 percent from last year's record.

"Upward revisions for South American soybean crops and China's rapeseed account for most of this month's changes," said the March report on oilseeds and products by the Foreign Agricultural Service. "Small declines are made for sunflower seed and cottonseed."

World soybean production was forecast at a record 115.2 million tons, up 0.8 million metric tons from last month and 8.4 million from last year.

"Crop prospects for both Brazil and Argentina have improved in February based on good growing conditions," the report said. "Brazil's crop is forecast at 21.3 million tons, up 0.5 million from last month, based on improved yield prospects. Argentina's soybean crop is raised to 11.5 million tons, up 0.4 million from last month."

South American production is up 10 percent from last year to 34.8 million tons, it said.

## Sugar consumption climbs higher than '80s average

WASHINGTON (AP) - The average American is eating nearly five pounds more sugar today than in the mid-1980s, but the Agriculture Department says that is a slow rate of growth.

"Since the resurgence in sugar use began in fiscal 1987, growth in sugar consumption has averaged approximately 2.2 percent a year," said a report this month on sugar and sweeteners by the department's Economic Research Service.

Per capita sugar consumption is expected to hit 64.7 pounds in fiscal

1993, up nearly five pounds from the mid-1980s.

"Per capita consumption of sugar has been growing slowly in recent years, at about the same rate as per capita consumption of all caloric sweeteners," the report said.

Total per capita consumption of caloric sweeteners - consisting of sugar, high fructose corn syrup, glucose, dextrose, honey and edible syrups - was estimated at 143 pounds, up from 130 pounds in the mid-1980s.

Beet sugar output is expected to be up 12.1 percent from last year.

## Tips may make remodeling easier in home bathrooms

When selecting replacement fixtures for a bathroom remodeling project, most homeowners limit their selection to what will fit through their bathroom door.

But a whole new range of possibilities opens up when you consider fixtures designed for new construction. These tend to be built on a grander scale, are more luxurious, and have more built-in amenities.

A shower unit in this category, for example, may have features such as one-piece construction and molded-in seat and shelves. The reason these units are designed for new construction is that they can be installed before all the partitions are up.

You can install these oversize fixtures in your remodeling project by opening up an access in an exterior wall. This usually involves removing a window and the framing below it. If you don't have a window, you'll have to cut a hole in the wall which requires temporary support for the ceiling or roof above.

To remove the window, begin by taking off the interior casing. Moving to the exterior, pry the window from the rough opening. With the window free, lift it out bottom first and let it slide down into the opening as you pull it out.

If you remove the window from the top, there's a danger it can topple and fall on you.

Back inside, remove the wallcovering under the window frame. Remove the sill and also the cripples, which are the small studs that hold it up. Do not remove the bottom plate.

To install an oversize shower stall in an upstairs bathroom, for example, carry it up two ladders, rather than sliding it up a ladder, to protect the fiberglass. Once the unit is through the opening, reinstall the sill, cripples, sheathing and siding.

Before installing the fixture, relocate the waste pipe if necessary. You can use flexible, coiled tubing rather than straight pipe to make the job easier.

## Question/Answer

**Q:** I cannot get paint to stay on the exterior clapboard siding of my house. It constantly peels. I have followed the directions on the paint can and still after a few years, the paint peels off. I even tried high pressure water blasting to clean the surface to be painted and still the paint peels off.

**A:** It sounds like the problem is not the application of the paint, but excessive moisture in the house that is migrating through the exterior walls. To correct your problem, you will have to control the moisture buildup in your house and also reduce the moisture migration through the exterior walls.

The migration can be reduced by painting the inside of the exterior walls with a moisture-resistant paint.

Two coats of aluminum paint plus two coats of decorative paint are best for a sand-finished wall. On a smooth wall, a primer-sealer and at least one coat of alkyd semi-gloss paint should be applied.

You can control the moisture buildup in your house by ensuring that the attic and crawl space are adequately insulated and ventilated. The ground in a crawl space should be covered with a vapor barrier such as 6-mil polyethylene sheet.

Clothes dryer vents and exhaust fans from bathrooms and kitchens should all be vented to the outside. Roof gutters and downspouts must be maintained to prevent overflow and to direct the downspout effluent away from the house. Otherwise, water will accumulate around the foundation and seep into the basement and/or crawl space.

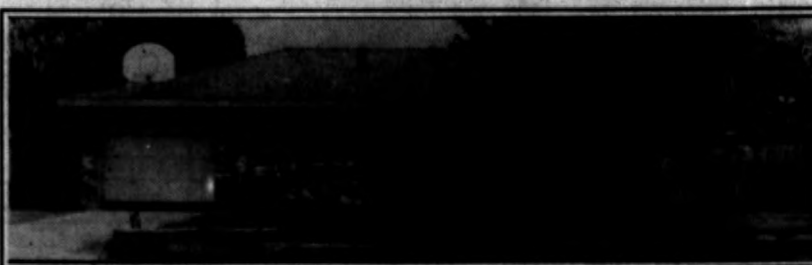

# MINDING YOUR OWN BUSINESS

## ONE MAN'S INFLUENCE

What do J.C. Penney, Walt Disney, Harry Truman, Samuel Clemens, Sam Walton and Dale Carnegie all have in common? All of them lived in the fertile Green Hills area of Northern Missouri when they were young men.

Penney and Walton established nationally known retail empires. Walt Disney is recognized as a pioneer in providing wholesome family entertainment. Truman became President of the United States. Clemens, better known by his pen name Mark Twain, has entertained generations with the adventures of Tom Sawyer and Huck Finn.

However, none of these greats may have influenced common Americans more than the unassuming pig farmer's son from Harmony Church, Missouri. Dale Carnegie is known around the world as the man who influenced millions.

Carnegie was so poor that even other children of modest means made fun of his poverty. When still a boy, he vowed to make something of himself. As he rode his horse to school he practiced making speeches. He studied the lives of great men and modeled their words. Later, he won a public speaking contest at school. Although it had little impact on his life at the time, Carnegie would later claim that winning that contest changed his life.

After dropping out of school, Carnegie traveled the west as a salesman before moving to New York and entering acting school. He was not an accomplished salesman, nor did he win fame as an actor.

### The YMCA and a book

It was public speaking that began to bring Carnegie success. Carnegie was penniless and desperate when he decided to offer a public speaking course through the local YMCA. The manager of 125th Street YMCA in New York City was skeptical of the class. He didn't think the course would create enough interest to pay Carnegie the standard \$2 per night teaching fee. Carnegie offered to share the risk. So, the YMCA agreed to split profits with him after they had recovered their expenses. Soon, Carnegie was pulling in \$30 per night in commission.

The public speaking course evolved into more than just powerful training in oratory. Carnegie realized that his students were gaining self-confidence, overcoming other fears and increasing their personal effectiveness. Many used the training to build successful careers.

The YMCA courses were profitable for Carnegie, but the

real turning point in his life was the 1936 publishing of "How to Win Friends and Influence People." The book quickly became a best seller. His first royalty check for the book was a whopping \$90,000. That would be the equivalent of nearly \$1 million today.

"How to Win Friends and Influence People" was the first of its kind. It was a self-help book. An action book to lead the common man and woman down the road toward success. Although critics of the day denounced the book, it has withstood the test of time and remains a strong seller today. Currently, there are more than 20 million copies in print in 35 languages.

### The training lives on

Although Dale Carnegie died in 1955, the adult education programs he started in 1912 are alive and well today. All around the world Carnegie courses are helping men and women gain self-confidence and overcome fears.

Donny Mason teaches Carnegie courses to folks in the wide open spaces of West Texas. "We offer several different training programs," Mason said, "However, 80 percent of our current attendees still want the original, 12 week Carnegie course."

Among the more than 4 million Carnegie graduates, you'll find names like Lee Iacocca, Stew Leonard and Tom Monaghan. These men have continued the Carnegie tradition. They too, have influenced millions. There is a lesson here for each of us. One person with determination and commitment can create a lasting positive influence on the lives of others.

## Life not all black and white in 'Family Pictures'



Angelica Huston stars  
in ABC miniseries

Unconditional love is believed by some to be the fabric that binds families together. In reality, love can be a many splintered thing which brings rifts rather than rivets to the home.

"Nobody loves unconditionally. Nina; it isn't possible, even with our children," a mother tells her daughter in *Family Pictures*, a two-part miniseries airing Sunday, March 21, and Monday, March 22, on ABC.

Based on the best-selling novel by Sue Miller (*The Good Mother*), *Family Pictures* follows the lives of the Eberlin family through four decades of interpersonal turmoil. Angelica Huston (*Lonesome Dove*) portrays Lainey, wife to David (Sam Neill, *My Brilliant Career*), a Seattle psychiatrist. Their lives are forever changed with the birth of their third child, Randall, who is autistic. In the next few years, Lainey bears three more daughters. David openly refers to the girls as his "Last Straws," indicating their births were against his wishes.

The basic tear in David and Lainey's relationship comes from his subscription to psychologist Bruno Bettelheim's theory that autism springs from the mother's prenatal rejection of the child. Perhaps in response, Lainey dotes on her afflicted son, struggling to teach him and reach him in the wee hours and passionately denouncing suggestions that he be institutionalized. David withdraws emotionally from Lainey, equating sex with the conception of yet another child. His search for his own passion in the beds of other women leads to the dissolution of the marriage and personality disorders in two of his children, Mack and Nina, played in

their adult years by Dermot Mulroney (*Longtime Companion*) and Kyra Sedgwick (*Miss Rose White*).

Nina, a professional photographer with a fear of commitment, serves as the story's narrator and archivist, arranging the family photographs on a wall in an attempt to make sense of their lives.

Co-executive producer Don Enright relates that novelist Miller's concept was to write about "a family that the bad thing happened to. She came from the point of view that the bad thing could be anything; in this case it was a child who was autistic."

Enright says for the producers "the universal choice" for Lainey was Huston. "She is, in fact, the only actress the script ever went to."

Huston, who rarely appears on television, says the teleplay "was simply the best thing I'd read all year." She also appreciated "the fact that my work was cut out for me in a way that wouldn't be predictable to me as an

# 'Family Pictures' part of Neill film festival

LOS ANGELES (AP) - This year may look like a Sam Neill film festival, starting with the ABC miniseries "Family Pictures" on Sunday and Monday.

In May, Neill's new movie "Piano" opens at the Cannes Film Festival and the thriller "Jurassic Park" debuts in June. A fourth movie, "The Sinking of the Rainbow Warrior," has not yet been scheduled.

"I did four pictures back-to-back," Neill says. "As soon as we wrapped 'Jurassic Park' in early December, I went straight home to New Zealand for six weeks. I fished and gardened and walked and planted trees, all the things I love doing."

In "Family Pictures," a two-part drama which tells of 35 years in the life of an American family, Academy Award winner Anjelica Huston stars as Neill's wife. It is based on a novel by Sue Miller.

"Family pictures is about 35 years of the sort of off-and-on marriage of this couple," Neill says. "They've had some tough bits and some good bits. I was very affected by it when I read the script. I think people will

be affected when they see it. It's very different for American television.

"It's more about substance than the sensational. I think it will strike a chord in a lot of people."

A strain is placed on the marriage by Miss Huston's devotion to the third of their six children, who is autistic. The child has a disruptive effect on the family, but the mother refuses pleas to put him in an institution. Her excessive devotion to the child leaves her husband and children emotionally adrift.

Kyra Sedgwick and Dermot Mulrooney play two of the children, and Jamie Harold plays the autistic child. Philip Saville directed from a script by Jennifer Miller.

"I feel quite comfortable doing an American accent," says Neill, who was born in Northern Ireland and raised in New Zealand. "But being an American is more than an accent. It's a whole lot of other things you have to absorb. The first American role I did was Damien in 'The Final Conflict,' the last in 'The Omen' series."

In recent years, Neill has starred in such movies as "A Cry in the Dark," "Dead Calm," "The Hunt for Red October," "Memoirs of an Invisible Man" and "Until the End of the World."

"My 9-year-old son, Tim, does a devastatingly accurate impression of his dad's death scene in 'The Hunt for Red October,'" he says. "That's where I regret that I'll never get to see Montana. Thousands of people have stopped me on the street and asked me if I got to see Montana."

Neill didn't quite make it to Montana for "Jurassic Park." Although Montana is where his character, scientist Alan Grant, finds dinosaur bones, that part was filmed in California.

The island scenes were filmed on Kauai, where Neill was working when Hurricane Iniki struck the Hawaiian island on Sept. 11. The hurricane killed three people, left 8,000 homeless and caused about \$1 billion in damages.

"It was alarming," he says, "but in a way it was sort of fun because

it's not the kind of thing that happens every day. Only afterward do you realize what a horrible thing it was and how terrible it was for the people of Kauai. Besides the human toll, it killed birds and stripped away the greenery in a botanical garden in a valley by the sea. Everything was trashed. The upside was that it drew those of us on the picture closer together."

"Jurassic Park," based on the best-selling book by Michael Crichton, was directed by Steven Spielberg. The movie, which also stars Laura Dern, Jeff Goldblum, Richard Attenborough and Sam Jackson, tells of a plan to clone dinosaurs for a theme park that goes awry and has deadly animals running wild.

Neill made "Piano" and "The Sinking of the Rainbow Warrior" in New Zealand, the first time he's worked there in 15 years.

Holly Hunter plays a mute in "Piano," which Neill describes as a very violent romantic triangle set in 1850. It also stars Harvey Keitel.

Jon Voight stars with Neill in "The Sinking of the Rainbow Warrior," which tells of the sinking of a Greenpeace ship in Auckland harbor in New Zealand. Voight plays the captain and Neill is the detective who discovers the ship was sunk by French intelligence agents because it was in the South Pacific to protest French nuclear tests.

Neill is currently in Australia working on "Siren," which tells the story of Norman Lindsay. Lindsay's paintings of nude women shocked Australia for about 60 years.

When he's not working, Neill lives on the South Island of New Zealand with his wife, Noriko, their daughters, Maiko and Elena, and his son, Tim.

"It's very sparsely populated, very beautiful and beginning to produce some excellent wine," he says. "I've just gone into partnership with a vintner. We expect our first vintage in four or five years. We think our pinot noir will be a world-beater, and we've also planted chardonnay. The area is very close in climate to Burgundy in France."

actress, where I could really go on a bit of an adventure with the material."

Huston fares well in the adventure, lending believability to each time period and an emotional intensity that is the centerpiece of this work. Neill supplies able contrast as the cold David, Mulrooney has a memorable turn as the troubled son, and Sedgwick is marvelous as the daughter who turns her neurosis into art. Jamie Harold brings an authenticity to the role of Randall, gained from his portrayal of

an autistic man last year in Bob Randall's play David's Mother.

While laden with sadness, Family Pictures leaves the viewer with a sense of hope, as well as a greater understanding of family dynamics. Nina's reflection at its end offers a lasting life lesson.

"Every child that's born represents such risk-taking on the part of the parents. There's so much potential for pain that any child's existence is not a miracle. And that is the strangest, most wonderful thing of all."

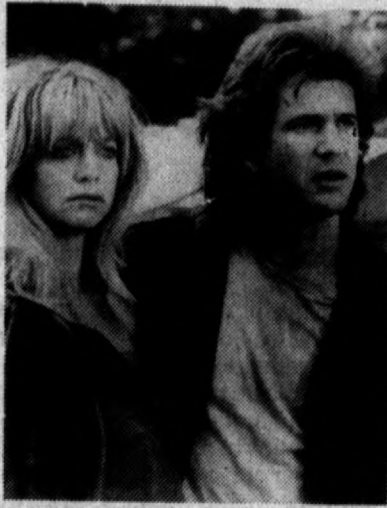
Fiscal troubles at the theater were

LOS ANGELES (AP) - Ambulance-chasing, if not drama, may be raised to new heights by television's increasingly frenzied scramble to turn headlines into movie fodder.

Networks are lunging for quickie films spun from New York's World Trade Center bombing and the deadly standoff in Waco, Texas, and various and sundry other human tragedies and triumphs.

READ about it in the press. SEE it on TV news. MARVEL at the tabloid gossip. And then, perhaps in mere months, GO BEHIND THE HEADLINES with an "inspired by" TV movie - or two, or three (if Amy Fisher is involved).

Producers jockey to buy rights. Facts are sliced and diced into a script, which may have a tenuous link to reality. Production is hurried so a network can emerge first with the melodrama promising the REAL STORY.

Even as Branch Davidian sect leader David Koresh kept Army tanks at bay in Waco, NBC announced a dramatization to air as part of its "In

the Line of Duty" movie series about slain officers. Four lawmen died in the siege.

An NBC film on the Feb. 26 Trade Center bombing also was announced and could be broadcast as early as May - one of four important "sweeps" periods used by local stations to set ad rates.

Gary Coker, Koresh's former attorney in Waco, said he's received eight or nine offers for as much as \$100,000 for rights.

"TV movies, miniseries and (theatrical) movies. This is pretty amazing since the guy might be dead," Coker told the Daily News of Los Angeles.

The NBC "Line of Duty" segment, at this point, is based solely on public records, said Ken Kaufman of Patchett Kaufman Entertainment, the project's producer. No rights have been purchased.

About 20 people, including firefighters and teachers, have sold their stories to Wilshire Court Productions, which is doing the trade center film for NBC.

Four skiers rescued last month after three days in the Colorado wilderness have signed with a talent

agency to turn their ordeal into a movie, while a fifth skier in the party with a conflicting story to tell is being pursued by a rival agency.

"Siege at County Hospital" about the Feb. 8 shooting of three Los Angeles doctors in the nation's busiest emergency room is already in production for NBC.

Speed is imperative, Kaufman said.

"It's a funny world out there. ... Undoubtedly, in the present climate, other people would jump in if our project were delayed," he said.

Haste will not undermine quality, he insisted. Others say there's little time to focus on perspective or effectively sift through the often-conflicting viewpoints that sources may offer.

The quest for reality-based films is unlikely to abate as long as ratings remain dependable.

In one three-day period in February, CBS' "Family of Strangers" and "Judgment Day: The John List Story," and NBC's "Miracle on Interstate 880" garnered a total audience of more than 45 million households.

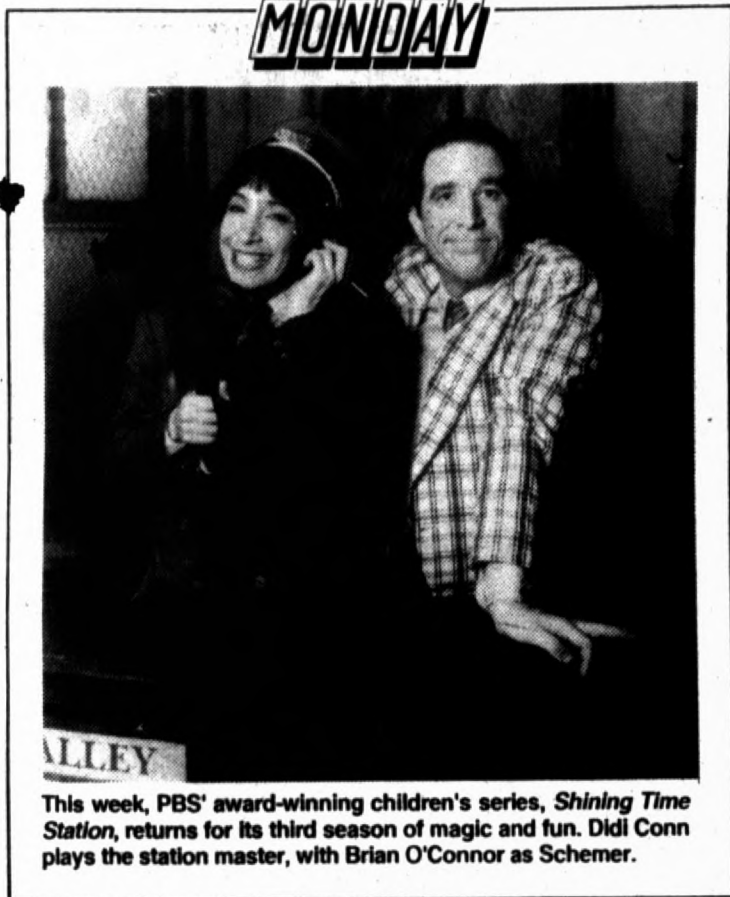

# Picard a lawyer?

MIAMI (AP) - Captain Jean-Luc Picard and the Enterprise may escape Earth and ultimately the galaxy, but a study by two professors shows they can never escape lawyers.

Can Cmdr. Will Riker be extradited to a planet with a non-federation legal system? Is android Data entitled to human rights as a sentient being? Should a mind-reading Betazoid be used for interrogations?

Those legal questions and more are raised in "Star Trek: The Next Generation," say Nova University law professors Paul Joseph and Sharon Carton, who published an analysis of the TV series in the University of Toledo Law Review.

The study began as a joke. But it became serious when the professors found the nation's most popular syndicated series deals with the thorny legal issues in a consistent manner, Joseph says.

"If they were doing it in a silly or unthoughtful way, we couldn't do this," he says.

Star Trek creator Gene Roddenberry envisioned a world - indeed an entire universe - without attorneys at all, say the professors, who worked with the show's writers on their article.

But a legal system and something very much like lawyers are clearly in place by Picard's era in the 24th century, Joseph says.

"It shows there are lawyers out there somewhere," he says. "It should give lawyers a little bit of hope."

It might also give them some pause.

One episode makes reference to a slaughter of all lawyers in the year 2079 after a nuclear holocaust, and temporary adoption by courts of a "guilty until proven innocent" rule.

But by the time of the Enterprise's adventures, a recognizable legal system has been restored.

In an episode where Data's sentence is examined, a judge shows up, a captain identified as head of the judge advocate general's office. She must be a lawyer, notes Joseph.

Several episodes refer to a constitution, says Joseph. "They also talk about 'guarantees' - evidently the equivalent of our Bill of Rights."

Picard, in one episode, invokes "Guarantee Seven," expressed as a right against self-incrimination.

And Picard offers legal counsel to a crewman undergoing a loyalty interrogation by a telepathic Betazoid in another episode.

"How much privacy are we willing to violate?" asks Joseph. "Are we willing to open people's very minds?"

Some episodes have dealt with more familiar 1993 issues, including an allegory on abortion and choice.

In "Up the Long Ladder," aliens use the transporter system to reproduce some of Riker's DNA and create clones. Riker destroys them with his phaser, making a statement Star Trek writer - and attorney - Melinda Snodgrass says was frankly aimed at the abortion controversy.

"We certainly have a right to exercise control over our own bodies," says Riker.

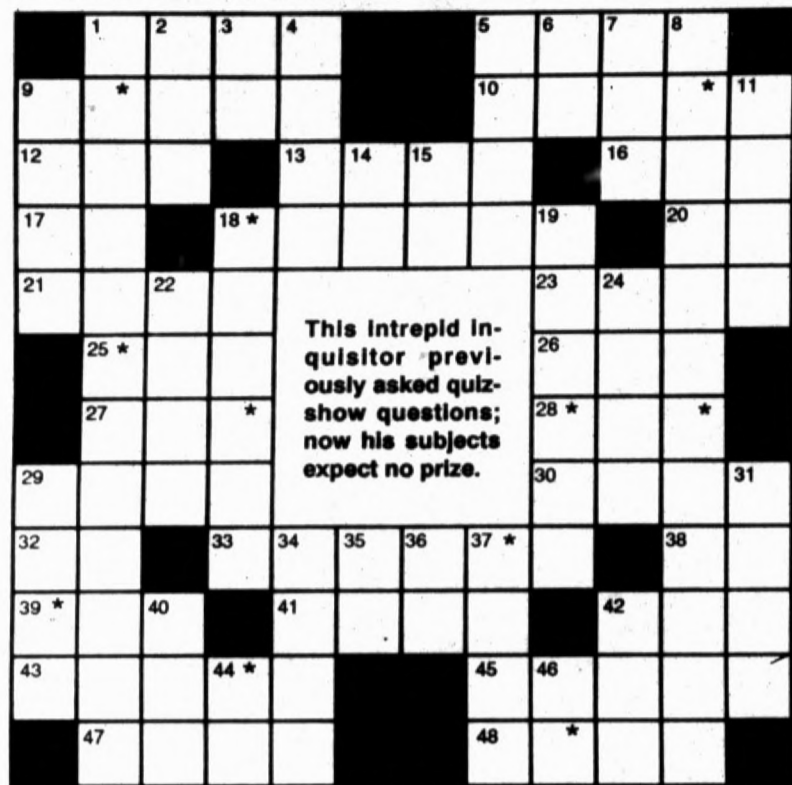

# SOAP TALK

## Bad guy Corbett becomes sci-fi hero

What happens to a bad guy when he is written off a soap? In the case of Michael Corbett (ex-David Kimble, *The Young and the Restless*), fears of unemployment well up "for about two minutes," and then life goes on.

In the year since Corbett left *Y&R*, he has done a pilot for Fox, starred in the David Lynch film *Voyeur*, due out next fall, and is now working with Douglas Trumbull on a sci-fi movie, *Secrets of the Pyramids*.

"Doug is an absolute genius," says Corbett. "He [did special effects for] *2001: A Space Odyssey*, *Close Encounters of the Third Kind* and *Blade Runner*. He is a legend and is receiving an Academy Award [next week] for his technical achievements in the movie industry."

Corbett says working on the film is quite a bit different than working on a soap opera.

"On a soap you have to learn 30 to 60 pages of dialogue a day, and with the film you only have a few pages in a day. There are trade-offs, though."

"This film is more physical than anything I've done before," says Corbett. "There are a lot of stunts, running and jumping. It's fun, but difficult. I've been working with the same trainer Michele Pfeiffer had in *Batman*, and I've needed the added strength and stamina the workouts give me just to get through a normal day here."

The character in the film is a good guy and Corbett appreciates the opportunity to show a different side of himself.

"He's a real-estate developer. A scruffy guy with a great sense of humor, who happens to find a 100,000-year-old pyramid on his property. In the pyramid he comes across advanced technology left behind from the former occupants, and he tries to keep the bad guys from gaining control of it. The role is campy and fun to play."

Now that Corbett has hit the big time, would he consider doing another soap? "I got my first job on a soap at a very early age and virtually grew up working on soaps," says Corbett. "I would have no problem going back to daytime."

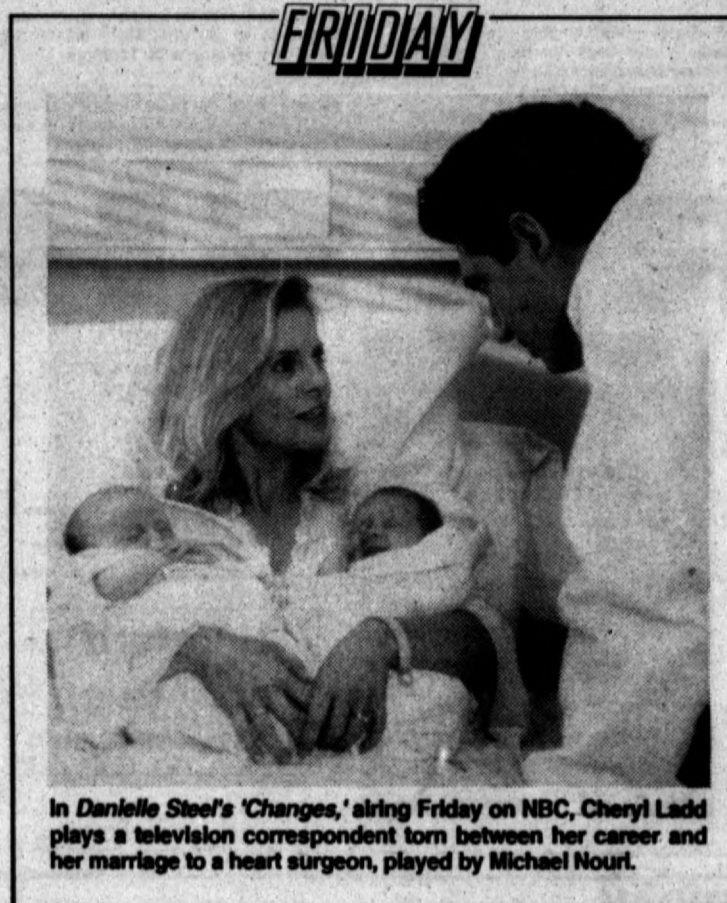

**Q: I would appreciate it very much if you could send me an address for Steve Landesberg. He used to be on the television show Barney Miller. —T.F. Nelson, Macon, Mo.**

**A: You can write to Landesberg, who played Detective Arthur Dietrich on the show, in care of Agency for the Performing Arts, 9000 Sunset Blvd., Suite 1200, Los Angeles, Calif., 90069.**

**Q: A black-and-white movie was made, I believe, in the 1960s that starred Kirk Douglas as a French army colonel in World War I. The story centered on the selection of several of these soldiers to be executed for cowardice. I believe the title was What Price Glory? Is it available on tape? —Niles Cruthirds, Columbus, Mo.**

**A: Actually, the movie you are looking for is Paths of Glory (1957). Though What Price Glory? is also about World War I and features fine performances, especially by James Cagney, Paths of Glory is simply a brilliant movie from a brilliant director — Stanley Kubrick (A Clockwork Orange, The Shining, Lolita). This film, perhaps the best anti-war movie ever made, should be available in most any decent video store.**

**Q: Has Nana Visitor ever had a starring or recurring role in anything other than Star Trek: Deep Space Nine? She looks so familiar. —Rick Francis, Tualatin, Ore.**

**A: You might have seen Visitor, who was going by the name Nana Tucker at the time, as Nancy Feldman on the day-**

time soap *Ryan's Hope*. She also starred in the brief, on-again, off-again, and eventually canceled 1990 series *Working Girl*.

**Q: Could you please tell me when Dan Blocker died? My husband says he has only been dead six or eight years, but I think it has been a lot longer. —J. Jackson, Chillicothe, Texas.**

**A: It has indeed been more than six or eight years since Blocker, who played Hoss Cartwright on the original *Bonanza* television series, passed away. Blocker died on May 13, 1972.**

**Q: I'm a big fan of Dean Martin. He's so handsome, a great actor and his singing voice is wonderful. When did his *Dean Martin Show* air and how long did it last? —Lynette Hlavaty, Chicago, Ill.**

**A: The *Dean Martin Show* aired from Sept. 16, 1965 until May 24, 1974. During the show's last season, it was titled *Dean Martin's Comedy Hour*. You might also remember Martin and partner Jerry Lewis were hosts of *The Colgate Comedy Hour* from 1950-1955.**

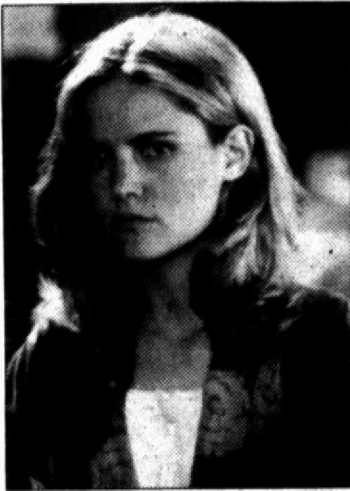

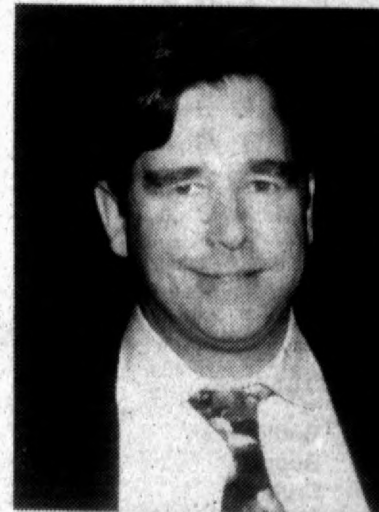

**Lifetime sheds light on painful tale of 'Stolen Babies'**

**Mary Tyler Moore offers chilling portrayal**

A shocking case which resulted in many legal reforms is the basis of *Stolen Babies*, a powerful film premiering Thursday, March 25, on Lifetime.

For over 25 years, Georgia Tann owned and operated the Tennessee Children's Home Society. Admired for the fierce dedication to "her children," Tann was an energetic, charming spinster who won the affection of, and generous donations from, many of Tennessee's leading citizens. With the help of Judge Camille Kelly (one of the nation's first women judges), Tann oversaw the adoption of some 5,000 babies, mostly to wealthy couples in cities such as New York, Chicago and Los Angeles.

But most of these adoptions were illegal. Using her influence with state welfare agencies and local officials, Tann separated the babies from their parents, mostly poor, illiterate residents of the Tennessee backwoods. Some were taken from mothers in state-run mental institutions, who were told their children were stillborn. When parents challenged Tann, Judge Kelly abused her powers,

often declaring the parents "unfit" and clearing the way for another low-profile, high-dollar adoption deal.

Mary Tyler Moore plays Georgia Tann, and the casting of such a familiar, popular actress as the manipulative, deceptively evil Tann is a smart move. Her charm and gentle authority make understandable Tann's courtship of the rich and powerful, as well as her intimidation of ignorant, disadvantaged parents.

Lea Thompson (*Back to the Future*, the soon-to-be-released *Dennis the Menace*) skillfully plays Annie Beales, a welfare worker whose initial awe of Georgia Tann is replaced by her mounting sense that something is very wrong.

"Annie's a composite character of a lot of people who helped bring this to a stop," says Thompson, who describes the case as an "incredible abuse of power and people."

Mary Nell Santacroce is memorable as the imperious Judge Kelly, and Kathleen Quinlan (*The Doors*) is sympathetic as Bekka Stern, a wealthy Memphis matron who innocently adopts one of Tann's stolen babies and later incurs the powerful woman's vengeful wrath.

"It's not the honors and not the titles and not the power that is of ultimate importance," Rogers said. "It's what resides inside."

Rogers, 64, was born in Latrobe. He was ordained as a Presbyterian

minister in 1962 with a charge to continue his work with children and families through television.

"Mister Rogers' Neighborhood" has been produced at Pittsburgh public station WQED since 1968.
