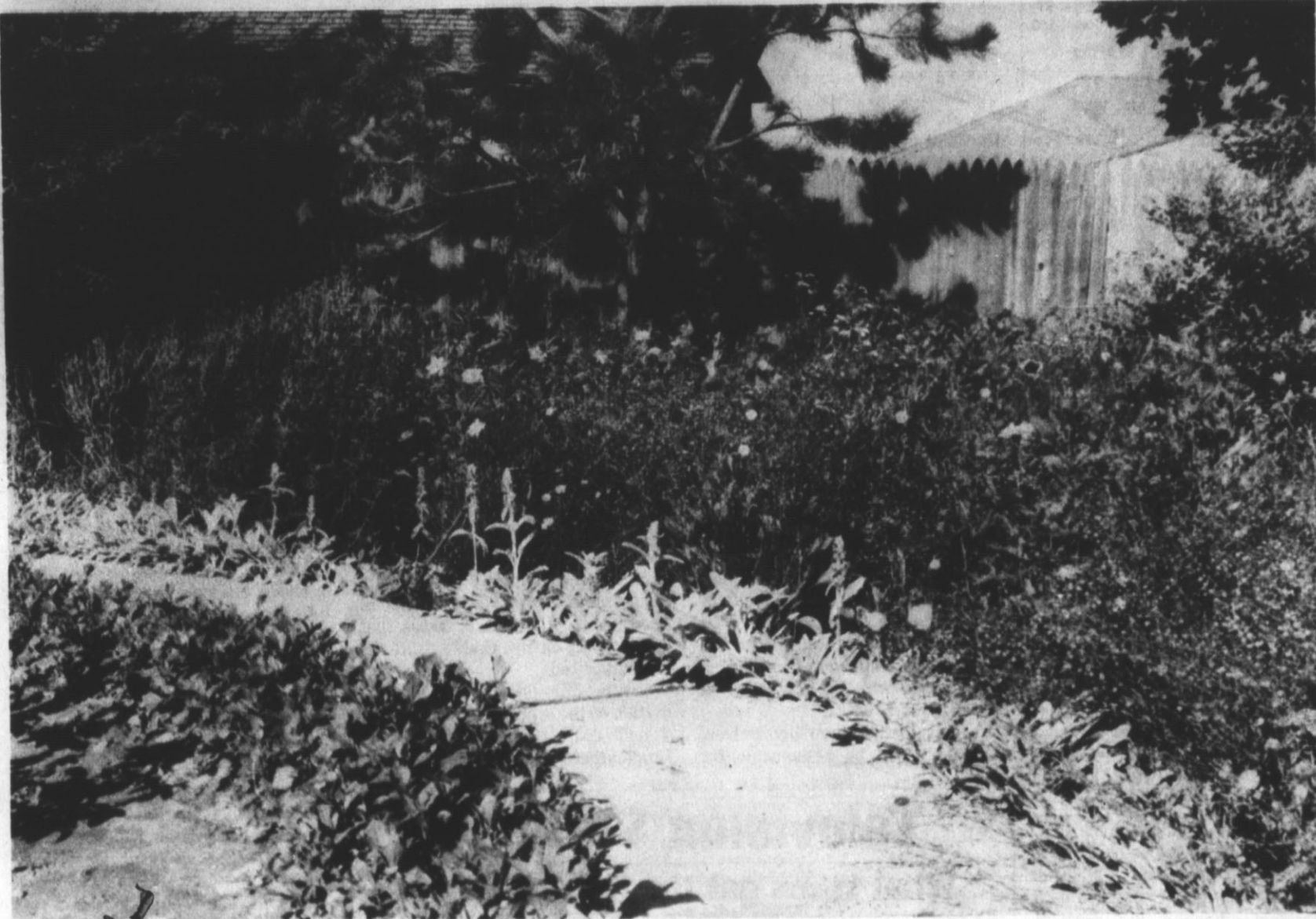

## North's 'prime objective' was to boost GOP at ballot box in 1986

WASHINGTON (AP) — Lt. Col. Oliver L. North's "prime objective" in working for the release of American hostages last fall became President Reagan's political standing and the fate of Republicans in the November elections, a key operative in the Iran-Contra affair says.

As the elections neared, North became increasingly interested in freeing the hostages "to enhance the position of the president" in working for GOP gains, said Albert Hakim, the Iranian-American businessman who worked with North in a private network that sent arms to Iran and aid to Nicaragua's Contra rebels.

### 15 inches near Austin

## Rains drench Central Texas

AUSTIN (AP) — Thunderstorms that drenched soggy Central Texas another day prompted evacuations, stranded motorists and forced helicopter rescues of people who ventured into swollen streams and rivers.

Some areas around Austin reported receiving nearly 15 inches of rain from Thursday's heavy storms that also caused a portion of an Austin street to collapse, authorities said.

More storms were forecast through the weekend in South and Central Texas, and much of the area remained under a flash flood watch overnight.

In Austin Thursday, a helicopter lifted James Kopecky from a rock in the middle of Barton Creek after he became stranded while tubing.

Two of Kopecky's friends also were stranded for a time in thigh-high water at the edge of the creek after their raft flipped in the swift current. None of the three was seriously hurt.

"We've been real lucky that nobody died," said EMS supervisor Michael Morris.

"I am constantly amazed at how every year, when the rains come and the water rises, people go tubing and rafting, thinking they're going to have the most fun. That's when it's the most dangerous," said paramedic Jim Allday.

In an earlier incident, a Travis County sheriff's deputy waded to safety from a low-water crossing

definitely discussed during our attempt in trying to reestablish the relationship with Iran," Hakim said Thursday during his second day of testimony before House and Senate committees investigating the Iran-Contra scandal.

At the time, the Republicans, with Reagan's help, were trying to save their majority status in the Senate.

In other developments in the Iran-Contra story:

—The congressional investigating panels voted to grant limited immunity from prosecution to North, the former White House aide under investigation for his central role in the affair. The panels agreed, however, not to call North to testify

in public until at least July 16. Under the limited immunity grant, North's immunized testimony could not be used against him in a criminal proceeding.

—Investigators found evidence that another principal in the affair, retired Air Force Maj. Gen. Richard V. Secord, withdrew more than \$80,000 in profits from the Iran arms sales in 1985 and 1986 and spent it on a Porsche sports car, a Piper Cub airplane and a visit to a "fat farm" with business associate and former CIA agent Thomas Clines. The revelation apparently contradicts Secord's sworn contention that he had forsworn profits from the deal.

—When hostage negotiations with

Iranian representatives fell through during a meeting last October in Frankfurt, West Germany, North returned to Washington, leaving Hakim — a private citizen with no security clearance or official standing — to negotiate by himself on behalf of the U.S. government. Hakim said he didn't find that unusual because he was "the only one with the competence" to reach an agreement.

—Two Toronto-based companies on Thursday denied they held profits from U.S. arms sales to Iran after Hakim testified Wednesday he gave money to a company with a similar name.

Hakim said \$6.7 million went to a Swiss-based money-management company for investment purposes and was now with Toronto Dominion Securities in London. But both the Dominion Securities Inc. and Toronto-Dominion Bank, which has a London subsidiary called Toronto Dominion International Ltd., said they knew nothing of the transaction.

A Washington lawyer, David M. Lewis, also appeared voluntarily before the committee to tell how he met with a representative of Hakim, Willard I. Zucker of a Swiss financial management firm, to discuss ways to legally funnel money from the Iran arms sales to North's family.

Lewis said he recalled that Zucker named North, and said he "had earned this money in some unrelated fashion, so it wasn't a bribe or a payoff." Hakim said no "proper" way ever was found to get the money to North from a \$214,000 account that had been created for him.

Following Thursday's hearing, Sen. Paul Trible, R-Va., disclosed that the committee had evidence that Secord had withdrawn more than \$80,000 in arms sales profits.

## Clements will sign AIDS bill

AUSTIN (AP) — Texas Gov. Bill Clements says he will sign into law controversial legislation requiring couples seeking a marriage license to be tested for AIDS when the deadly disease reaches a critical level in the state.

The governor said Thursday that, in connection with the measure, he asked state health officials to present to him a series of options for dealing with AIDS in Texas.

"It's a serious problem," said Clements, "and we're going to do

something about it."

He said the measure he intends to sign is a comprehensive bill to control communicable disease and the marriage license provision is only part of it.

The measure would require people seeking marriage licenses to be tested for AIDS only after acquired immune deficiency syndrome spreads to 0.83 percent of the Texas population.

He said he also intends to sign legislation prohibiting abortion in the

final three months of pregnancy except to save the life or health of the mother or in certain other determinations by a physician.

Clements told the Dallas Morning News that he was contemplating another tour across Texas to build public pressure against "big spending" state senators.

The governor said that he intends, between now and a special legislative session he has called for June 22 to draft a new state budget, "to talk night and day" against the need for additional taxes.

## Decade low jobless rate at 6.3 percent

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation posted a decade-low jobless rate of 6.3 percent for the second straight month in May despite an increase of 46,000 in the rolls of the jobless, the government said today.

The unemployment rate, on the heels of a dramatic 0.3 percentage point drop in April, leveled off as the labor force grew by a "probably somewhat exaggerated" 658,000 people last month, of whom 612,000 found jobs.

Joblessness, however, climbed from 7,500,000 to 7,546,000, the Labor Department said.

At 6.3 percent, the unemployment rate is 0.8 percentage point below its level of a year ago. The number of jobless Americans is about 800,000 less than in May 1985.

The sharp increase in the size of the civilian labor force — people at work or looking for a job — after two months of little change had been expected by many economists.

"Even though employment normally increases strongly between April and May as outdoor activity picks up and young people enter the labor market, the size of the April-to-May change is probably somewhat exaggerated," the commissioner of labor statistics, Janet L. Norwood, said in congressional testimony.

In contrast, a separate survey of non-agricultural payrolls showed employment growth of only 123,000, the lowest monthly increase of the year.

The payroll gains were essentially limited to the service side of the economy. Employment in hospital and business services, such as data processing, accounted for more than one-third of the gains. Employment in the finance, insurance and real estate sectors rose by about 15,000.

Manufacturing employment held steady at about 19 million but construction employment "rose a little less than expected for this time of the year and, after seasonal adjustment, was down slightly from April," the Labor Department said in a statement.

The factory workweek, however, rebounded sharply after falling in April due in part to the Easter and Passover holidays. Overtime in manufacturing rose to an average 3.8 hours per week in May, the highest level since early 1978.

Among adult men, the May jobless rate was 5.5 percent, unchanged from April but down 0.5 percentage point since January.

The May rate for adult women was 5.4 percent, down from 5.5 percent in April and 5.9 percent in January.

The department gave these unemployment rates for other population groups:

—Teenagers, 17.7 percent, up from 17.4 percent in April but unchanged from January.

—Whites, 5.3 percent, down from 5.4 percent in April and 5.5 percent in January.

—Blacks, 13.8 percent, up from 13.0 in April but down from January's 14.3 percent.

—Hispanics, 8.7 percent, down from 9.2 percent in April and 10.6 percent in January.

—Black teenagers, 37.6 percent, up from 36.5 percent in April but down from 43.2 percent in January.

## State rate could show economic recovery

DALLAS (AP) — Federal labor officials today saw more evidence of a fragile recovery in the Texas economy, as unemployment held steady at 8.6 percent in May.

"We are slowly beginning to compile evidence of a turnaround in economic activity," said Bryan Richey, regional commissioner for the Bureau of Labor Statistics. He cautioned, though, that the state's economy still showed substantial weakness.

The rate was the same as in April, and compares with a 9.4 percent figure for May, 1986.

Richey said the statewide survey was affected by many of the same factors as the nationwide unemployment rate, which remained at a decade-low 6.3 percent.

Seasonal adjustments — to account for young people entering the job market and an increase in outdoor work — helped push the Texas labor force to more than 8.5 million people, he said.

### County budget hearing set

A public hearing on the 1987-88 Deaf Smith County budget is on the agenda for the commissioners' regular meeting Monday at 10 a.m. in the courthouse.

Other agenda items include discussion of funds for restoring La Plata Cemetery, county maps, a computer system, transfer of money from the Road and Bridge Fund to the General Fund, a bond fee proposal, and a central purchasing agent.

Also, action may be taken on an appointment to the Issue Council of the Waste Deposit Impact Committee, remodeling of offices in the courthouse, purchase of library equipment and a right of way for a water line.

### Police arrest five

Hereford Police arrested five persons Thursday. Public intoxication was the charge on a 36-year-old man and a 35-year-old was taken in for driving while intoxicated, a second offense of no liability insurance, presenting false identification to police and possession of a controlled substance. A 19-year-old man was arrested for theft over \$200 and under \$750.

Two women also were arrested. A 34-year-old was picked up for public intoxication and on warrants of terroristic threat and assault. A 53-year-old female for no driver's license, no liability insurance, and failure to use seat belt.

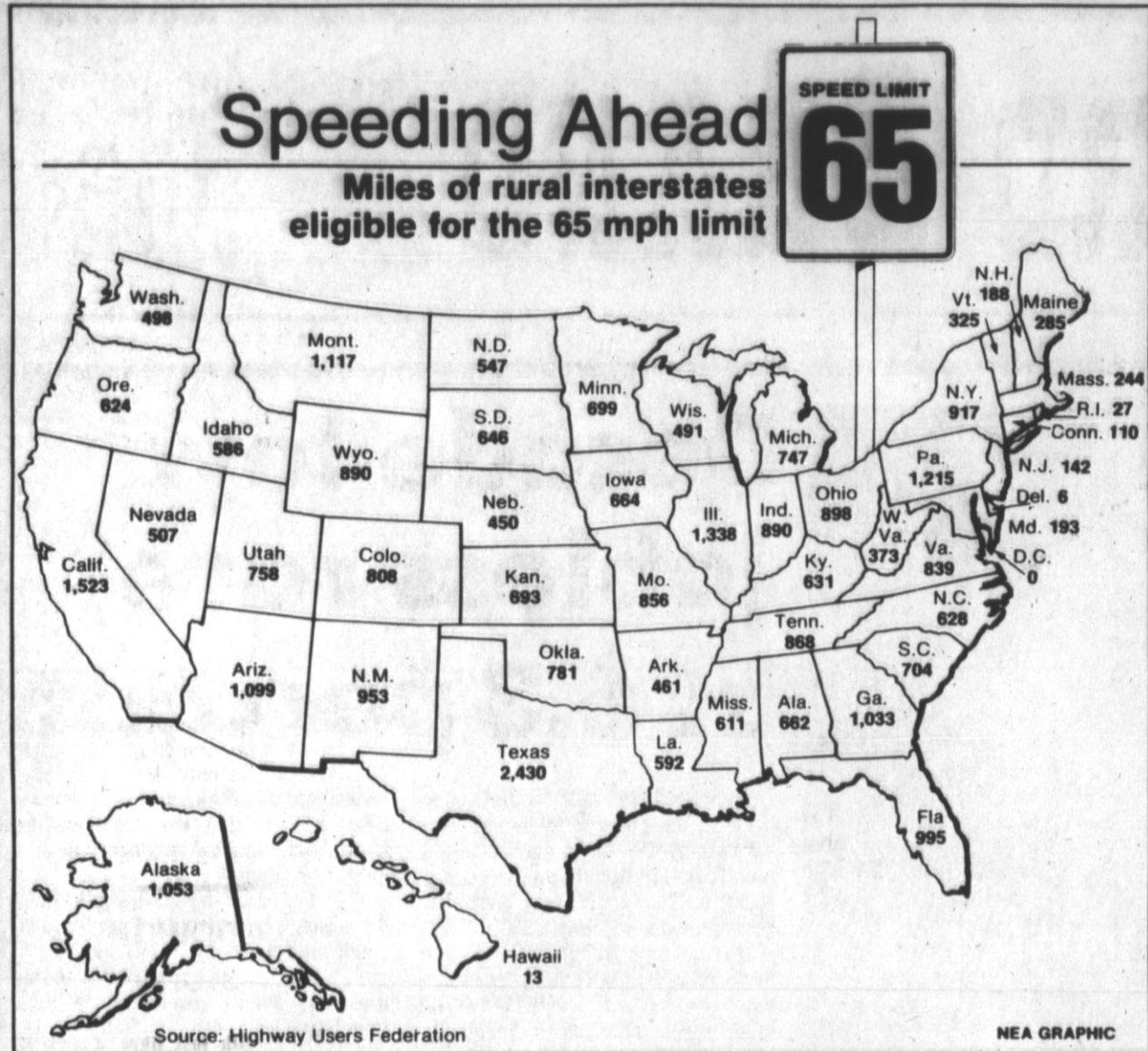

## For women during sex with infected man AIDS risk is one in 1,000

WASHINGTON (AP) — A woman's odds of catching an AIDS infection from a single sexual encounter with an infected man are about one in 1,000, a new report estimates.

Researchers said Thursday the study supports the idea that the AIDS epidemic will spread slowly among heterosexual Americans.

"The likelihood is that the spread of AIDS in the heterosexual community will be limited to segments of the population that engage in a lot of sexual contacts," said Dr. Warren Winkelstein of the University of California, Berkeley.

The study, directed by Dr. Nancy Padian, was presented by Winkelstein at the Third International Conference on AIDS. It was one of several clues presented at the meeting to help answer questions about whether — and how fast — the lethal disease will spread into heterosexual America.

Among other AIDS developments:

—A leading French researcher said a newly discovered AIDS virus has been found in South America and will reach the United States. Dr. Luc Montagnier of the Pasteur Institute in Paris said the virus, called HIV-2, originated in Africa and has been detected in about 100 people in Europe. He said it causes a disease identical to AIDS, although some U.S. experts contend it rarely triggers illness.

—A dentist has gotten an AIDS infection from apparent on-the-job contact with infected patients. Dr. Robert S. Klein of Montefiore Medical Center in New York said the man claimed he had engaged in none of the risky behavior usually associated with acquired immune deficiency syndrome, such as intravenous drug abuse or homosexuality.

His was the only AIDS infection among 1,231 dentists and hygienists surveyed in cities with large numbers of AIDS patients.

—Two new studies conducted in New York and San Francisco found 69 percent of hospital doctors surveyed believe they can get AIDS from their patients. One in four would refuse to treat AIDS patients if given a choice. Dr. Molly Cooke of the University of California, San Francisco, said the research also found the stress connected with AIDS care is greatest among male doctors.

—AIDS cases among infants born to infected mothers have been reported in 26 states, and black babies are 25 times as likely as whites to suffer from the disease. The babies acquire the lethal virus while still in the womb. Dr. Margaret Oxtoby of the U.S. Centers for Disease Control said the number of infant cases is doubling every 14 months.

—Dr. Donald Francis of the CDC said similarities between hepatitis B and AIDS suggest the AIDS virus may eventually infect 5 percent of all Americans, including 30 percent of the urban poor. However, some experts said that since people infected with AIDS are far more likely to be lifelong carriers of the virus, AIDS may spread farther through the population than hepatitis B.

—Swedish researchers are testing a synthetic protein called peptide T, which was developed in the United States, to see if it can block the AIDS virus and reduce patients' symptoms. Dr. Lennart Wetterberg, head of psychiatry at the Karolinska Institute in Stockholm, said 36 AIDS patients are receiving the therapy.

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## Senator says allies won't join U.S. in Gulf strike

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Foreign Relations Committee chairman is trying to get Congress to stop U.S. military plans in the Persian Gulf, as another senator says America's allies won't join any U.S. strike against Iran.

While the debate continued Thursday over the wisdom of President Reagan's plans to protect Kuwaiti oil tankers, the Senate prepared to receive new details about the administration strategy.

Adm. William Crowe, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, was testifying today before the Senate Armed

Services Committee about Navy efforts.

It's Crowe's first Capitol Hill appearance since the controversy blossomed last month after an Iraqi missile attack on the USS Stark killed 37 sailors. Iraq and Iran have long been at war, and Kuwait, an ally of Iraq, sought the U.S. protection because its tankers have been targeted by Iran.

Sen. Claiborne Pell, D-R.I., Foreign Relations Committee chairman, introduced a bill Thursday that would prohibit the reflagging.

"This proposal is poorly conceived and dangerous," Pell said. "It is being undertaken without balancing the possible benefits against the very real risks of greater American involvement in the Persian Gulf hostilities."

Sen. John Warner, R-Va., who returned from a tour of the gulf Thursday, said that if U.S. military action is required, "We're going to have to go that strike alone. It will only be Americans. The American people have to understand that very clearly."

The Reagan administration, meanwhile, is debating whether or not to strike pre-emptively against Iran's anti-ship missiles, known as Silkworms, if they are deployed against shipping in the Strait of Hormuz. The Washington Post reported in today's editions.

The newspaper, quoting sources it did not name, said such a strike is only one of several options under discussion. The options range from warning Iran through diplomatic channels not to deploy the Silkworms to an actual strike by U.S. bombers or Navy guns as soon as there is evidence the missiles are ready to fire at shipping, the newspaper said.

The Post said U.S. intelligence agencies estimate the Chinese-made missiles could become operational by July 1.

Warner was accompanied on his weeklong trip to the gulf by Sen. John Glenn, D-Ohio. During their visit, the pair met with representatives of the Gulf Cooperation Council, a group of allied Arab nations. They said the GCC nations are fearful of an Iranian victory, believing that would mean Iran would move against the small nations on the western side of the gulf.

"We have a tremendous lack of credibility in the Arab world," Glenn said, citing the bungled U.S. mission to rescue American hostages in Iran in 1980, the withdrawal of U.S. forces from Beirut after American Marines were killed in 1983 and the secret sale of U.S. arms to Iran.

"I don't like the idea of the Kuwaiti reflagging," he said, "but I think the gulf states are looking at this as almost a kind of a litmus test" of American will to protect Western interests in the region.

## Eligibility of job applicants to be certified

Effective June 15, 1987, local Texas Employment Commission offices will begin certifying the employment eligibility of job applicants for employers under the Immigration Reform and Control Act of 1986 (IRCA).

According to new TEC procedures, employers who hire job applicants through TEC for jobs lasting longer than three days will receive employment verifications as soon as the employer notifies the TEC office that an applicant has been hired. This will insure that employers are in full compliance with the provisions of the IRCA.

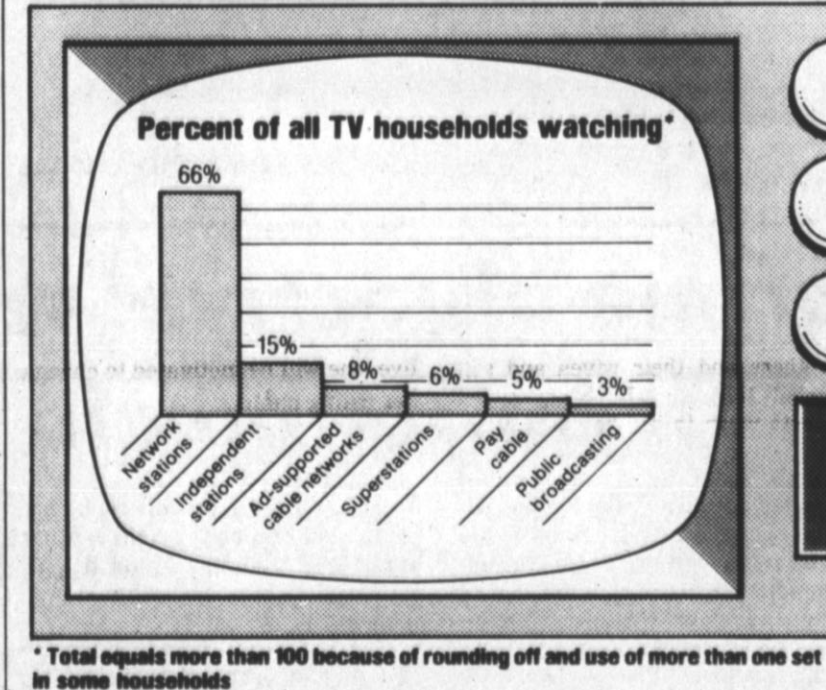
For jobs lasting three days or less, employers will be responsible for

their own verification of the employment eligibility of job applicants.

All individuals registering for work with TEC after June 1, 1987, will need to provide evidence of identity and employment eligibility. Documents used to establish identity must contain a picture of the applicant. A Texas driver's license will satisfy this requirement. To establish employment eligibility, applicants may use an original Social Security card, unless it states that employment in the United States is not authorized.

## Bad fuel causes problems with injection system

Auto experts are warning motorists about the penalties of using sub-standard fuel and fuel lines in their fuel-injected vehicles. The reason is the need for keeping the injector nozzles free of accumulations of contaminants. The tiny orifice which sprays gasoline into the port of a fuel injected engine may be about the size of a human hair. Deposits from the gasoline can accumulate at this critical points, eventually restricting the flow of the fuel.

The result: poor performance and, in advanced cases, starting trouble.

Most major brands of gasoline feature detergent additives to minimize or prevent this condition. Sub-standard brands may not, however, and, if used regularly, could cause injector trouble.

The fuel filter plays an especially important role on fuel injected cars, according to Car Care Council. While filtration is no substitute for

detergent action, it does trap most of the dirt and contaminants that come from the gas tank. Consult your vehicle owner's manual for fuel filter replacement recommendations, suggests the Council.

Fuel injector cleaner, a chemical product generally sold in 8 ounce containers for pouring into the gas tank, is a popular item found on auto supply shelves. Used periodically, this powerful detergent can help clean restricted injectors. When the clogging of these fine orifices has gone past the point of chemical cure, sometimes because of intense engine heat baking the deposits onto the injector opening, the owner may have to seek professional help. Most auto service technicians are equipped with testers and tools to take care of such malfunctions.

Another consideration with fuel injected vehicles is the fuel line hose. As opposed to conventional carbureted fuel systems, where fuel is delivered at a pressure of 8-10 p.s.i. (pounds per square inch), fuel pressure runs up to 60 p.s.i. Sub-standard fuel hose may not be able to accommodate that pressure, especially on older vehicles where partially restricted injector orifices have created back-pressure. Under such circumstances fuel line pressures can reach 175 p.s.i.

Fuel injected vehicles operate at higher under-hood temperatures, adding another form of stress to the fuel line.

The result of inferior fuel hose or improper connections could be a fire caused by gasoline spewing from a ruptured gas line onto a hot engine.

## Automobile care tips for vacations listed

"Drive safely and have a great trip," your friends shout as you take off on the first leg of your vacation. For most of us it works out just that way. But tens of thousands of vacationing motorists this summer will experience some kind of disabling car trouble. Such breakdowns often result in delays and unexpected expense that, at best, put a damper on a long awaited holiday.

Some mechanical difficulties cannot be anticipated. When a part such as an alternator fails, for example, it's usually without warning. Preventive maintenance measures do not apply. But when the alternator light comes on because a worn drive belt has been overlooked, that situation need not have happened.

American Automobile Association says most highway breakdowns can be avoided through preventive measures: taking care of needed mechanical maintenance well in advance.

## Scandals are not Jewish issue

NEW YORK (AP) — With their special sense of group identity, Jews tend to feel hurt themselves when another Jew falls. Why did "we" err?, they wonder, even though it involves someone else.

It spurs self-examination. Such a round of inward-looking has resulted from recent Wall Street insider-trading scandals involving some Jews, among others. No similar self-searching came in religions of the others.

But for Jews, "we're family and all that," remarked Thomas Neumann, director of intergroup relations of the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, regarding that connecting "peoplehood."

**ENGINE**

If your trip includes towing a trailer, hauling heavy loads, or driving in extreme heat, consider installing an auxiliary transmission cooler. Overheated fluid accelerates transmission wear. Auxiliary coolers also are used for control of engine oil temperatures.

-Tires: Check inflation, inspect tires for cuts and bruises. Rotate and balance tires and have wheels aligned if needed.

misdeeds were not a particular "Jewish issue," and Jews involved should not be judged differently than any others, yet the co-responsible communal ties were pointed up.

"We have a right to make demands on other Jews to live lives that are the most scrupulous lives they can lead," said David Teusch a Jewish ethicist of the Reconstructivist Rabbinical College in Philadelphia.

This is "not merely because we're worried about what non-Jews think," he said, but because of the ultimate purpose of Judaism to bring God's moral light to humanity, exemplified "in the way we do our daily business."

Counter to "the overwhelming privatism of American society," he said, "we must have a

resurgence of communalism and the ideology that Jews do have the right to make (moral) demands on each other in serious ways."

A two-hour discussion on the matter by a panel of Jewish ethicists, economists and rabbis was sponsored recently by Jewish Week, the country's largest Jewish newspaper.

Editor Philip Rittenberg said the basic consensus was that "there was a Jewish way of doing business" whose ethical demands "go beyond the law of the land."

Rabbi Marc Gellman of Dix Hills, N.Y., who also teaches at Hebrew Union College, said the cases of financial wrong-doing are not time-bound, but "the very same ethical abuses" were assailed by the prophets Isaiah and Amos.

My brothers and their wives agreed to this plan. Within two weeks three brothers reneged and the fourth brother said we should mind

our own business. Please understand that our mother has been wonderful to us and has never asked for anything in return. Is my plan justified or not?—M.J. in New Orleans

**DEAR J.M.:** Your plan may be well-intentioned but it won't modify your mother's behavior one iota. She is going to continue to feed her face until someone succeeds in getting her to understand that her life is in danger. Then, if she really wants to live, she will be motivated to change her eating habits.

My advice is to contact her physician and urge him to phone Mama, insist that she come in for a checkup and explain that her obesity is life-threatening. Pressure from family members will only promote alienation. She needs your love and emotional support. Give them to her.

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## Catering styles and costs vary

Although both extremely lavish weddings and very simple weddings are found in all localities, wedding catering styles and costs vary widely from one part of the country to another.

In Atlanta, for example, a wedding for 200 guests with a two-hour reception and substantial hors d'oeuvres, cocktails and champagne would be considered very proper. It might cost about \$6,000 at the Ravinia Hotel, according to Alice Carey, catering manager.

Rebecca Owens, banquet manager at the Dallas Marquis Quorum Hotel, says that in Dallas, a wedding reception for 100, including hors d'oeuvres and cocktails and entertainment for several hours, might cost about \$4,000. On the other hand, in Chicago where she worked before coming to Dallas, it was more typical to have a cocktail hour and a dinner and dance, which naturally cost more.

Wedding food has been getting more interesting lately all around the country, according to Bill Heaton president of Wedding Expos, of East Islip, N.Y., which puts on bridal fairs in 20 cities across the country for those planning a wedding. Instead of the sitdown dinner or the simple hors d'oeuvres that are traditional, some weddings now include a number of buffet stations set up in different parts of the room where different types of food are served. The guests can follow the latest trend by "grazing" from place to place while they socialize.

Regardless of what type of event is planned, caterers say that you can have a wedding more in keeping with your ideal if you can communicate with the caterer. It can make the difference between a successful wedding party and a disappointment, says David Chaparro of Two's Company Catering in Los Angeles. He advocates making it clear just what type of party you have in mind.

The first thing is to feel comfortable with the catering manager, says Ms. Owens. Then if you ask the right questions, communicate your understanding of what you will be getting and have it spelled out in

writing, there should be no unpleasant surprises on the day of the event. It is also important to describe the type of atmosphere you wish to create, whether simple or extravagant, she says.

Most people have no idea of the extent of services caterers offer, Chaparro says. His point was endorsed by the banquet managers who note that they can do as much or as little as required but have the capability of planning the entire event, including transportation, accommodation for guests, flowers and entertainment.

A catered party requires direction from the host. The three agreed that planning is easier if you approach them with definite ideas. At least have a firm commitment on date, time and place of the wedding. Con-

sider whether you plan to have dancing, since a larger space will then be needed. Some questions to ponder include how you would like the food served (buffet or sitdown meal) and what style of food and beverages you wish to offer.

Often those planning a wedding are indefinite about everything, Ms. Carey has found. "They know they want to get married, but that's about all."

She advises to try to choose a date that does not have any other special significance. For example, Feb. 14 is one of the most difficult because it is associated in many minds with romance. "Not only does everyone want to get married then but the heart association usually likes to host events that day too," she says.

If carob powder turns to stone

**DEAR POLLY —** I bought carob powder instead of cocoa for baking because I read that carob doesn't have caffeine. However, it is as hard as a rock. I never had this problem with cocoa. What can I do to soften it up so I can use it again? —

DARLENE

**DEAR DARLENE —** I'd return the can of carob powder to the store or write a complaint letter to the manufacturer!

But if that's not feasible, try to break it up enough with a knife, ice pick or other object to get it out of the can, then grind it in a blender or food processor. That should restore its flourlike consistency. (Sounds as though the carob powder must have gotten damp.)

## Belmont Park has quaint tradition

There's a quaint tradition at Belmont Park, where the backside roads leading to the barns carry the names of Triple Crown winners and other thoroughbred headliners.

Gallant Fox has his road and so do War Admiral, Count Fleet and Affirmed. Secretariat has an avenue and so does Kelso. It all seems perfectly appropriate, since they were great race horses and this is a great race track.

Belmont is where the best 3-year-olds face their most difficult challenge — 1½ miles in the Belmont Stakes, a distance none of them has ever run before.

This is the thoroughbred industry's testing ground, a laboratory where we find out just how good a horse really is. It is something Jack Van Berg thinks about frequently as he prepares Alysheba for his Triple Crown try Saturday.

"None of us knows if his horse can go 1½ miles," Van Berg said. "Any trainer who tells you he does is blowing smoke. We'll find that out Saturday."

Van Berg trusts in Alysheba, though.

"He's overcome my training," the Hall of Fame trainer cracked. "I was high on him last year as a 2-year-old. I figured one of two things. Either I had a lot of 2-year-olds who couldn't run or he was very good."

So far, he's been very good. But the Belmont raises tough questions for the son of Alydar, runner-up to Affirmed in all three 1978 Triple Crown races.

There is the issue of the distance. And there is the matter of running without Lasix, the anti-bleeding medication that is banned in New York. And there is the business of breaking the stranglehold Woody Stephens has had on this race for the last five years.

## OSU wins, but Ventura's hitting streak snapped

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Oklahoma State pitcher Pat Hope has provided a surprise to College World Series opponents who thought the third-ranked Cowboys were nothing more than heavy hitters.

Hope, 13-2, pitched his second complete game of the NCAA Division I baseball championships Thursday night, struck out 11, walked none and scattered seven hits to down No. 2 Stanford 6-2 in the winner's bracket finals.

A six-run sixth inning proved to be all the offense Oklahoma State needed.

Stanford's Jack McDowell, 12-5, and reliever Al Osuna kept Oklahoma State's All-American third baseman Robin Ventura from getting a hit when his one-hop smash was mishandled by Stanford second baseman Frank Carey.

"It was an error," Ventura said. "I knew right then it wasn't a hit."

The victory in the winner's bracket final gave Oklahoma State, 59-11 and unbeaten in the College World Series, an automatic berth in the championship game either Saturday or Sunday.

Stanford, 50-17, was to play No. 7 Louisiana State, 49-18, in an elimination game this afternoon, followed by Oklahoma State against No. 1 Texas, 60-10.

A Texas victory would force a meeting Saturday night between the Longhorns and the Stanford-LSU survivor. The winner of that contest would meet Oklahoma State on Sunday night for the title.

A victory tonight by Oklahoma State would eliminate Texas and set up a championship game Saturday night between the Cowboys and the Stanford-LSU winner.

Before Alysheba gets a street named after him at Belmont, he'll have to answer those questions. And in the sprawling Belmont barn area this week, they've been asked many times.

When showers fell Thursday, one wag called it Woody weather since Conquistarose loves the mud and Stephens won the last two Belmonts in the rain. The forecast for Saturday, however, is for clear skies.

If Liz's is too crowded for you, a short walk down Secretariat Avenue brings you to the roomier Frenchman's Kitchen. It, too, did brisk business as the track bulged with extra visitors, drawn there by Alysheba's bid.

Customers there wondered whether Alysheba was a super horse, or merely the best of an ordinary 3-year-old crop.

What about Leroy Jolley's entry of Gulch — unbeaten at Belmont — and Leo Castelli, surprisingly installed as second choice behind Alysheba in the morning line? And don't forget Bet Twice, beaten twice by Alysheba at the Derby and Preakness. Why would his owners enter lightly-regarded Manessa Jack in this demanding race at the last moment?

Van Berg and Stephens shared the spotlight all week, two affable old friends facing off on this familiar turf. Stephens likes his chances of upsetting Alysheba's appellation, even if it doesn't rain for Conquistarose. He gives Gone West a shot.

"He's always been a good colt and he's turned into a pretty good race horse," he said.

What if the entry fails and Stephens' streak is snapped. What about next year?

"I've got 18 2-year-olds," Stephens said brightly. "A few from Seattle Slew, a few from Danzig Connection, a few from Mr. Prospector."

Who knows. Maybe there's a Belmont street name in the crop.

# New Mavs coach receives accolades

DALLAS (AP) — Just 14 weeks after being fired by the Phoenix Suns, John MacLeod has rebounded to win one of the NBA's plum jobs — head coach of the Dallas Mavericks.

MacLeod, who took his team to the NBA playoffs nine times but never won the title, was named Thursday to replace Dick Motta as coach of the seven-year-old Mavericks franchise, owner Don Carter said.

Terms of the contract between MacLeod and Carter were not announced, although general manager Norm Sonju said it is "a similar ongoing handshake contract like the one that Motta had with Mr. Carter."

Motta, whose unwritten contract was renewed each year by a handshake with Carter, stunned team officials May 20 when he resigned after seven seasons with the NBA team.

MacLeod has a 579-543 NBA record and is the ninth-winningest coach in NBA history. He was fired Feb. 26 midway through his 14th season with Phoenix, and broke off talks with the New York Knicks, who are searching for a coach, earlier this week.

The Dallas Times Herald reported that MacLeod is expected to earn

about the same salary he received in Phoenix — estimated to have been about \$350,000.

The man chosen to succeed Motta as coach of the Mavericks netted several accolades from peers and players — including Mark Aguirre, the forward who frequently feuded with Motta.

Aguirre said he wasn't surprised to learn Thursday night that team owner Don Carter had tapped MacLeod as Motta's successor.

"Considering his background, I kind of thought he would be the coach," he said. "He's a proven coach who's won quite a few games. He's handled his players well. I've always liked him, and I know he likes Derek (Harper). I think it will be a good situation."

For his part, the 49-year-old MacLeod said he thinks he and Aguirre have at least one thing in common.

"Aguirre wants to win, and I want

to win," MacLeod said. "He is a very, very good basketball player who's been a key part of this Dallas franchise, and I think we're going to get along fine."

Aguirre, who is close to Mavericks owner Don Carter, said Carter had talked to him "a little bit" about potential candidates, but Aguirre said he politely told Carter it was not his job to talk about coaches.

Mavericks assistant coach Richie Adubato, who interviewed for the job

MacLeod got, said the new coach's record speaks for itself.

"Needless to say, John MacLeod has won a lot of games," said Adubato, who has said he would stay on as first assistant in Dallas. "He's been in the finals. This team is knocking on the door of that situation."

Tom Heinsohn, the former Boston coach whose Celtics beat MacLeod's Suns in the 1976 finals, gave the new Mavericks mentor high marks.

# Lakers coach is not overconfident

INGLEWOOD, Calif. (AP) — Virtually everyone may be conceding the NBA title to the Los Angeles Lakers, but Coach Pat Riley definitely isn't.

"I've been around this game too long and remember last year when we whipped Houston in the first game (of their Western Conference playoff series) and then we got beat four straight ... period," Riley said when asked if he thought his Lakers would continue to have an easy time with the defending champion Boston Celtics.

But Riley may have trouble convincing others that the Lakers, who took a 2-0 lead in the best-of-seven series with a 141-122 romp over the Celtics Thursday night, aren't unstoppable.

"If you take the attitude where you think it's over with, you're going to get whipped," he said. "I'm not cautious about that, I firmly believe that."

The series now switches to Boston

for the third game Sunday, the fourth on Tuesday and the fifth, if necessary, on Thursday.

But Riley had to admit that the Lakers, who beat Boston 129-113 in Tuesday night's opening game at the Forum, are playing great basketball.

"Sure, I'm elated, ecstatic. We're playing championship basketball," he said, adding that the Lakers were playing their best at the most timely of times.

Celtics Coach K.C. Jones seemed to agree.

"I can't remember a team that uses the fast break as well as they do," he said. "They have 12 different ways to come at you with the fast break."

"They could run down the court with their eyes closed and could find (James) Worthy under the basket wide open. They could run down the court with their eyes closed and find (Michael) Cooper in the three-point area licking his fingers ..."

Cooper, the Los Angeles reserve who was voted the NBA's top defen-

sive player this year, continued to spark the Lakers with his offense. As he has often in this year's playoffs, he started them rolling when the game was tight.

This time, Cooper came off the bench to ignite a rally that began late in the first quarter and continued through the second. The Celtics had held a five-point lead, but Cooper's shooting helped the Lakers pull out to a 75-56 lead by halftime.

He finished the game with 21 points in 26 minutes, including an NBA finals record of six three-point baskets, on just seven long-range tries. He also matched the finals record for assists in a quarter with eight in the second-period rally. Laker teammate Magic Johnson also matched that mark, in the third quarter.

"Cooper came in and broke our backs with those three-pointers," said Celtics forward Larry Bird, who led Boston with 23 points and 10 rebounds.

"Here we were up by two or three and all of a sudden he hits a couple of

threes and next thing you know, the Lakers are up by nine."

Cooper was one of five Lakers to score more than 20 points. Byron Scott had 24, Worthy and Kareem Abdul-Jabbar had 23 each, and Johnson had 22 points and 20 assists.

After their second lopsided loss to the Lakers, the Celtics found themselves hoping the return to Boston Garden, where they've won a remarkable 84 of their last 86 games, will change their fortunes.

Asked what mysterious aura their home arena seems to have for the Celtics, Jones replied, "I don't know what it is. I just hope it's still there when we get back."

"If it is, we'll be in good shape." "I'll take my chances on getting three in a row at home," Bird said. "I've always said that Game 5 is the crucial game, and we have to like the fact that we have it at home."

Many observers question whether there will be a fifth game. Late in the second half of Game 2, the fans at the Forum were chanting, "Sweep! Sweep! Sweep!"

## Royals' Saberhagen wins 10th game of season, 6-1

Danny Tartabull, Steve Balboni and Kevin Seitzer hit home runs that backed Saberhagen. Tartabull, playing his first game in Seattle since the Mariners traded him to Kansas City during the winter, broke a 1-1 tie with a two-run homer in the sixth.

Wade Boggs, a three-time AL batting champion, hit an RBI triple and two singles that led Boston past visiting Detroit.

Bill Madlock, a four-time National League batting champion signed earlier in the day by Detroit, had a two-run homer and two singles.

The Red Sox broke the game open with five runs in the sixth inning against Walt Terrell, 4-6, and reliever Willie Hernandez. Boggs' game-tying triple sparked the outburst.

Bruce Hurst, 6-4, yielded 11 hits in his seventh complete game, most in the major leagues. He struck out Kirk Gibson with the bases loaded to end the game.

Larry Herndon and Alan Trammell also homered for the Tigers.

Rob Deer hit two solo homers and Milwaukee scored seven runs in the fifth inning to beat New York.

## DR. GOTT See physician about goiter

By Peter H. Gott, M.D.

**DEAR DR. GOTT** — There is a very large growth on the right side of my throat that makes it hard to swallow. Also, my right ear is very tender and aches. People tell me it's only a goiter. Should I worry?

**DEAR READER** — Yes. You need an accurate diagnosis. See a doctor. Neck swelling can have many potentially serious causes, including enlargement of the lymph glands. Goiter (a painless, benign swelling of the thyroid gland) used to be a common condition because people, especially those in inland areas, often did not obtain enough iodine in their diets. Today, goiter is rare, in part due to the facts that table salt is iodized and that, with refrigeration, fish is more commonly consumed than it was previously.

Goiter is often treated with iodine supplements. However, when it causes difficulty in swallowing or breathing, it may have to be removed surgically. Therefore, you need an examination by a physician.

**DEAR DR. GOTT** — What is acute neuronal ceroid lipofuscinosis? It struck my healthy stepson at 4, and seven years later, he is losing sight, speech, movement, etc.

**DEAR READER** — Neuronal ceroid lipofuscinosis is an unusual hereditary disease characterized by accumulation, in nerve tissue, of fat

pigments called ceroid and lipofuscin. This untreatable disease causes deterioration of nerves, blindness and seizures.

**DEAR DR. GOTT** — My wife is a semi-invalid with multiple sclerosis. Her biggest problem is the burning sensation in the buttocks area. There is constant friction sliding from bed to wheelchair to commode.

**DEAR READER** — Multiple sclerosis is a nerve disease of unknown cause that produces numbness in certain parts of the body, visual difficulties, loss of muscle control and weakness. As the disease progresses, increasing disabilities result.

In your wife's case, the burning of the skin over her buttocks may be due to friction and the constant pressure of lying and sitting on that area. She needs scrupulous attention to her skin. Frequent turning, application of creams and lotions to reduce irritation and the use of a fluffy sheepskin pad (or an oscillating air mattress) on which to sit and lie are useful methods to prevent burning, breakdown of skin and pressure sores. Her doctor or visiting nurse can advise you. In addition, you can obtain more information about M.S. by writing the National Multiple Sclerosis Society, 205 East 42nd St., New York, NY 10017.

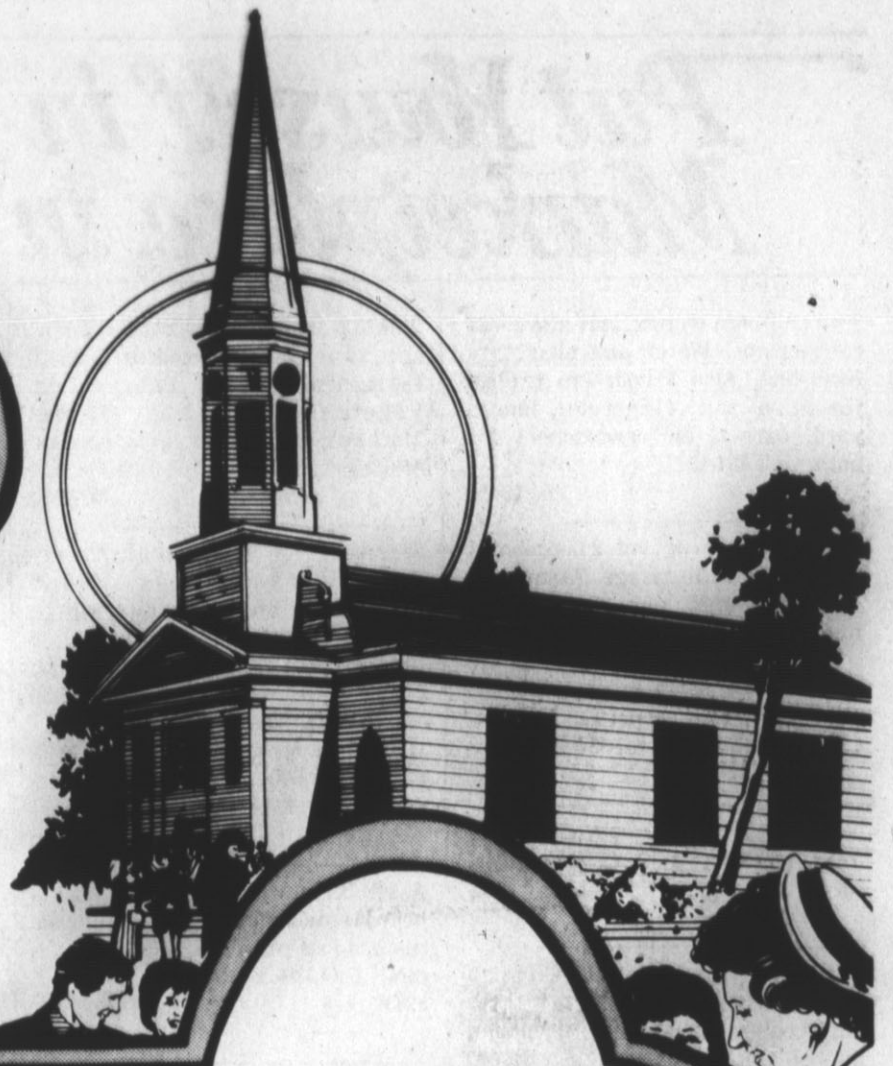
