FREEDOM'S SOURCE

Freedom, from one standpoint or another, is a subject of almost constant consideration. We think about, talk about, and freely exercise the rights available to us. Most of us probably take them for granted, and use them with little or no concern for what must be done to preserve them. We seem to assume that they will always be available to us and our children, regardless of how we live; but we know better.

The survival of 'freedom' will not be accidental or incidental. We understand the need to be well-informed, our actions must be governed by the highest sense of responsibility, and we must be honest in our thoughts and actions. We cannot go along day after day unconcerned and indifferent, without eventually becoming guilty of contributing to the loss of freedom.

To preserve freedom, we must understand the 'source of freedom'. Morality, Christian morality, is the source of freedom. In fact, history strongly emphasizes the fact that free people who wish to remain free must be people of great integrity. We

cannot be people who are overly concerned with self-indulgences and self-seeking and long remain free people. We cannot preserve freedom unless we are preserving and exalting the best of human qualities and the noblest of human aspirations.

Every time we think about human rights, or talk about them, or exercise them, we must remember that they cannot long survive in an immoral social climate. Human rights and privileges are the natural fruit of moral and ethical thinking and action. This conclusion is not debatable, because it is historically factual.

Human freedom will gradually erode to the extent that people promote the sordid, the debased and the

degraded in their behavior. When the final test of a nation comes, it is the character of that nation that will determine its survival. The character of a nation is, of course, the character of its people.

All rights and privileges inherent in the basic concept of freedom are dependent upon a high level of morality and ethics for life and survival.

Cancer myths shown as false

Take just a second to test your knowledge about cancer facts. Decide if the following statements are true or false.

If my neighbor has cancer, I could catch it.

Cancer is mostly a woman's disease.

Black men rarely get cancer.

If air touches cancer during surgery, the cancer will spread.

Bumps and bruises cause cancer. Spicy foods cause cancer.

Answers: All are false.

Many blacks, Hispanics and other minorities still believe these statements and pass them on to their families and friends.

The truth is, there is no truth in any of them.

Surgery does not cause cancer to spread. Cancer is not contagious.

Black and Hispanic men, women and children do get cancer. Bumps and bruises may hurt and spicy food might give you heartburn, but they don't cause cancer.

There are other important facts about cancer to know and remember. Cancer is actually more than 100 diseases that affect all ethnic groups, both sexes and all ages. Unfortunately, blacks and Hispanics in the United States currently have a higher incidence for some types of cancer than whites.

For example, black Americans have higher rates for cancer of the prostate and esophagus than whites. Similarly, Hispanic men are at greater risk for stomach and liver cancers, and cancer of the gallbladder has increased among Hispanic women. And cervical cancer re-

mains twice as high for black and Hispanic women than for white American women.

Blacks and Hispanics also have a higher mortality (death) rate for certain types of cancers than do whites. "This is a tragedy that doesn't have to continue," said Dr. Lovell Jones, associate professor of gynecology/biochemistry at The University of Texas M.D. Anderson Hospital and Tumor Institute.

"Cancer is not an automatic death sentence. If found early enough, it is usually very treatable."

There are more than three million Americans alive today who have had cancer. About two million of these people have lived five years or longer, and many of them can be considered cured of cancer, according to the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

In spite of the positive outlook for some cancer patients, many minorities are dying because their cancers are not found early enough and others delay seeking treatment.

Dr. Jones said. According to "Cancer Facts and Figures For Minority Americans 1986," published by the American Cancer Society, the high cost of health care, unawareness of cancer signs and low estimation of cancer prevalence cause the differences between racial groups.

To address the issues of cancer in minority communities, UT M.D. Anderson Hospital is co-sponsoring a national conference, April 22-25, titled "The Realities of Cancer in Minority Communities." Representatives from major comprehensive

cancer centers, such as UT M.D. Anderson Hospital, minority health care professionals and the general public will discuss specific cancers affecting minority groups, the government's role, nutrition and cancer in minorities and many other related topics.

"Cancer is an equal opportunity disease" and is a public health problem of major importance," said Dr. Jones, chairman of the symposium.

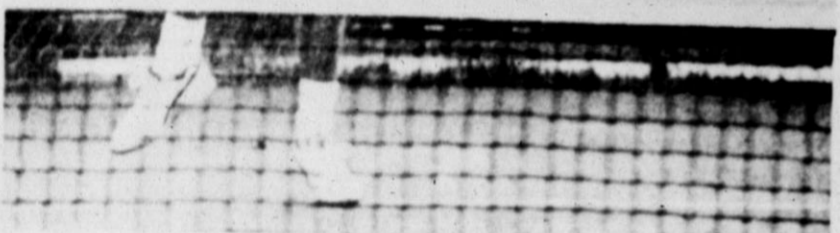

Each league will have a minimum of four teams and a maximum of ten teams. If necessary, high school and junior high school leagues will be combined.

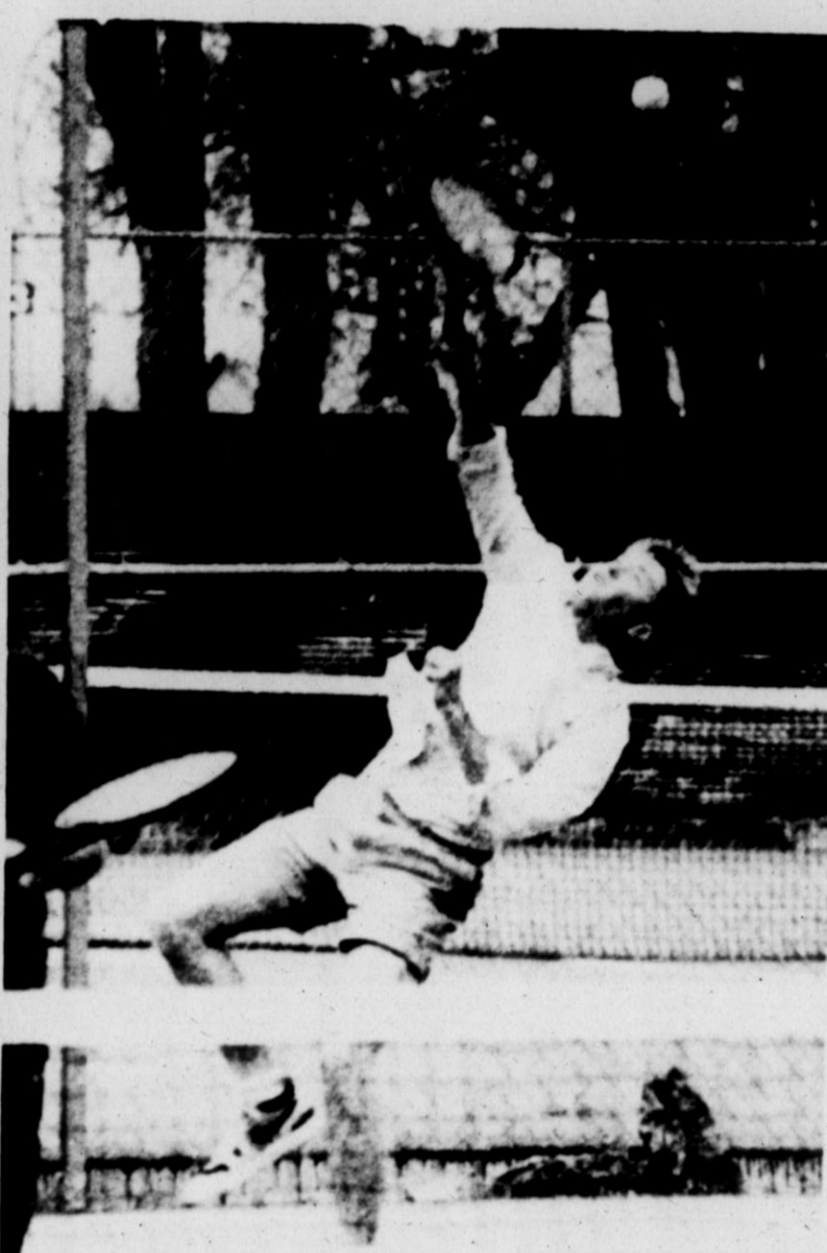

Standards are changing on television

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A brief history of sex on television:
 — 1952: Lucy is pregnant but may not say the word on "I Love Lucy."
 — 1961: Rob and Laura sleep in separate beds on "The Dick Van Dyke Show."
 — 1973: Maude Findlay gets an abortion on "Maude."
 — 1986-1987: Teen-ager David brings home a box of condoms on "Valerie," Arnie Becker and a client have a sweat-soaked encounter in bed on "L.A. Law" and millions of viewers tune in for the climactic mating of Maddie and David on "Moonlighting."

right or wrong, is that we're writing and producing adult television for adults, and it is a medium considerably grown up," said Steven Bochco, co-creator of NBC's hot new show, "L.A. Law," as well as the ground-breaking "Hill Street Blues."
 "I think we as adults have a responsibility to monitor things children watch," Bochco said, "but I am fundamentally opposed to the notion of censorship. If there is something that offends you, turn it off. I think ultimately the audience is the best censor of all."
 "I think over a long period of time a number of taboos have fallen by the wayside," said Leonard Goldberg, president of 20th Century Fox and producer of "Something About Amelia," an award-winning, made-for-television movie that dealt frankly with incest.
 "In recent years, we've been able to devote programs to once-taboo subjects," he said. "Obviously, there are still a number of taboos, which for the most part I think are rightly there. Television is a medium that's available to the whole family."

Indeed, most of today's prime-time schedule probably wouldn't cause Ozzie and Harriet to raise an eyebrow. Cliff Huxtable and his family on "The Cosby Show" could trade places with Jim Anderson and his brood from "Father Knows Best."
 But social upheavals are eventually reflected on the small screen, albeit sometimes well after the fact. Civil rights, women's liberation and the sexual revolution found their way into early '70s scripts for shows such as "All in the Family" and "Maude."
 Ironically, it may be the frightening spread of AIDS that brings network standards full circle. While stations are breaking new ground with condom commercials, fear of the deadly disease could also cause the TV industry to be more cautious about presentations of casual sex.
 "Women are closing in on men in the rat race, and more and more females are getting ulcers to show it — now almost as many as men, according to Health Magazine."

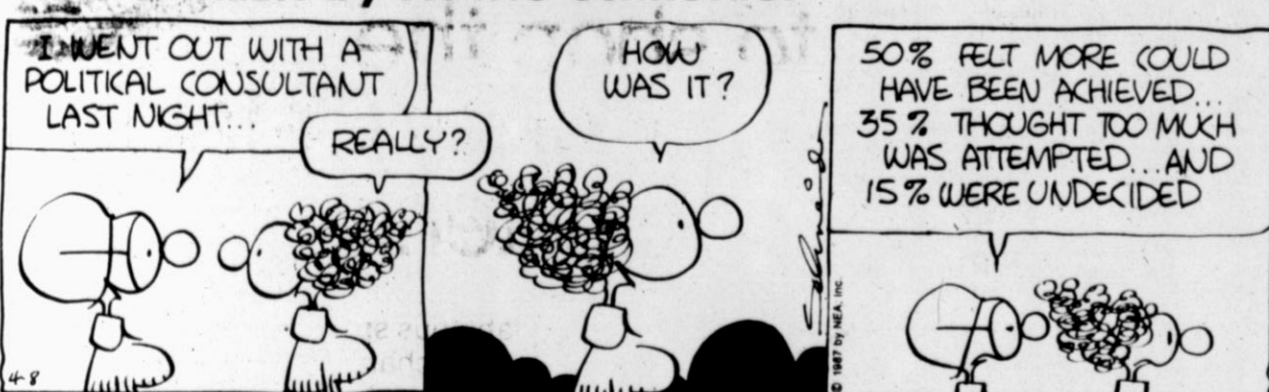

Death faces 240 million children

WASHINGTON (AP) — Disease and malnutrition will combine to kill more than 240 million children in developing countries by the year 2000 at current child mortality rates, a new study warns.
 The report, "Child Survival: Risks and the Road to Health," estimates that between the years 1985 and 2000, some 244 million youngsters under age 5 will die.
 Of them, 240 million deaths are expected in the less developed parts of the world. That is nearly as many

people as currently live in the United States.

But meeting targets for improved child health could save 65 million of those young lives, according to the analysis prepared for the Agency for International Development.

The report by the Columbia, Md.-based Institute for Resource Development says, "A child born in one of the high-mortality African and Asian countries today is on average 20 times more likely to die before reaching age 5 than a child born in the United States, Japan or Sweden."

In addition, child deaths vary widely even among countries within regions; not just between developed and developing nations, said Alene Gelbard, the Institute's deputy director of population studies.
 "This is just really unjust," she commented in an interview. But the differences also offer a glimmer of hope, because if one nation in an area has fewer child deaths, the reasons for its success can be learned and applied elsewhere, she said.

The Institute, a research division of the Westinghouse Electric Co., published the report Monday. The report looks at infant deaths in more than 100 developing nations, and compared them with three developed

nations, Sweden, Japan and the United States.

The United Nations estimates that about 2 billion babies will be born during the 15 years, 1.8 billion of them in the so-called developing world. Of the 244.6 billion under-5 children who will die at current mortality rates, 239.7 million will be from the developing nations, the study concludes.

But 65.3 million of those deaths could be prevented by meeting a series of targets for various nations to lower their infant and child mortality rates by the year 2000, the report says.

"We know a lot about what needs to be done" to lower the rates, explained population expert Katrina Galway of the Institute's Demographic Data for Development Project.

The immediate need is for an organized approach to the problem so that national and international policy makers can target the methods to avoid these deaths, she said.

DR. GOTT Husband adds to her problem

DEAR DR. GOTT I'm 5 feet 3 and weigh 180. I've tried everything from diet pills to a dozen weight-loss groups. My husband has given me an ultimatum. He says if I really loved him I could lose weight, and if I don't get it off in the next 12 months, he'll leave me. What can I do?

DEAR READER — Ultimatums are often hard to deal with, they give "either/or" options, neither of which may be appropriate.

For example, your husband probably is incorrect in assuming that if you loved him, you would trim down. You undoubtedly do love him — and can't lose weight. Therefore, the lose-weight-or-else doctrine is both scary and unreasonable.

Your best approach would be to put yourself under the care of a doctor. There may be a metabolic abnormality underlying your weight problem, or you may need evaluation by obesity specialists at a teaching hospital to which the doctor can refer you.
 You also may need some counseling to help you to manage stress, self-image problems, and your husband's demands.

In addition, you may want to look into some marriage counseling. If your husband agrees to go with you, he may learn more effective ways to handle his anger and the grandiose concept that he is in control of your life. Someone should point out to him the corollary of his statement: If he loved you, he would stick with you regardless of your weight.

For most obese people help is available. I believe that you will feel relieved at getting that help from a reputable medical source. At the same time, the dynamics of your marriage need attention, too.

 — 1986-1987: Teen-ager David brings home a box of condoms on "Valerie," Arnie Becker and a client have a sweat-soaked encounter in bed on "L.A. Law" and millions of viewers tune in for the climactic mating of Maddie and David on "Moonlighting."
 People on television are now doing what they once couldn't even talk about. And they are talking about it — a lot — with quips, asides, innuendos and double entendres.
 For instance, David finds Maddie on her hands and knees and asks, "You looking for something or have you finally come to your senses?" On "Designing Women," Julia tells her sister, Suzanne, "If sex was fast food you'd have an arch over your head."
 "The basic position I always take,

right or wrong, is that we're writing and producing adult television for adults, and it is a medium considerably grown up," said Steven Bochco, co-creator of NBC's hot new show, "L.A. Law," as well as the ground-breaking "Hill Street Blues."
 "I think we as adults have a responsibility to monitor things children watch," Bochco said, "but I am fundamentally opposed to the notion of censorship. If there is something that offends you, turn it off. I think ultimately the audience is the best censor of all."
 "I think over a long period of time a number of taboos have fallen by the wayside," said Leonard Goldberg, president of 20th Century Fox and producer of "Something About Amelia," an award-winning, made-for-television movie that dealt frankly with incest.
 "In recent years, we've been able to devote programs to once-taboo subjects," he said. "Obviously, there are still a number of taboos, which for the most part I think are rightly there. Television is a medium that's available to the whole family."

Indeed, most of today's prime-time schedule probably wouldn't cause Ozzie and Harriet to raise an eyebrow. Cliff Huxtable and his family on "The Cosby Show" could trade places with Jim Anderson and his brood from "Father Knows Best."
 But social upheavals are eventually reflected on the small screen, albeit sometimes well after the fact. Civil rights, women's liberation and the sexual revolution found their way into early '70s scripts for shows such as "All in the Family" and "Maude."
 Ironically, it may be the frightening spread of AIDS that brings network standards full circle. While stations are breaking new ground with condom commercials, fear of the deadly disease could also cause the TV industry to be more cautious about presentations of casual sex.
 Women are closing in on men in the rat race, and more and more females are getting ulcers to show it — now almost as many as men, according to Health Magazine.

POLLY'S POINTERS

DEAR POLLY — I have a cedar chest that was covered with plastic adhesive paper. Removing the paper leaves a sticky residue. How can I remove the sticky surface from the chest? — B.B.
DEAR B.B. — Since you certainly don't want to harm the finish of the wood in any way (although it may be marred from contact with the adhesive), I think the best method would be to rub the sticky residue with vegetable oil. This is quite effective in removing glue and adhesive from hard surfaces. Apply the vegetable oil liberally, and rub with a soft cloth until the sticky residue is gone. In addition, you'll be reconditioning the wood. Hope this helps! — POLLY
DEAR POLLY — The state of Florida has passed the seat belt law, and levies a 20-dollar fine if you are caught not wearing it while driving. Each time I get out of my car, I clip part of my seat belt to my steering wheel with a plastic clothespin. I have to unclip it to drive, and it reminds me to "buckle up." — PATSY

Death faces 240 million children

WASHINGTON (AP) — Disease and malnutrition will combine to kill more than 240 million children in developing countries by the year 2000 at current child mortality rates, a new study warns.

The report, "Child Survival: Risks and the Road to Health," estimates that between the years 1985 and 2000, some 244 million youngsters under age 5 will die.

Of them, 240 million deaths are expected in the less developed parts of the world. That is nearly as many

people as currently live in the United States.

But meeting targets for improved child health could save 65 million of those young lives, according to the analysis prepared for the Agency for International Development.

The report by the Columbia, Md.-based Institute for Resource Development says, "A child born in one of the high-mortality African and Asian countries today is on average 20 times more likely to die before reaching age 5 than a child born in the United States, Japan or Sweden."

In addition, child deaths vary widely even among countries within regions, not just between developed and developing nations, said Alene Gelbard, the Institute's deputy director of population studies.

"This is just really unjust," she commented in an interview. But the differences also offer a glimmer of hope, because if one nation in an area has fewer child deaths, the reasons for its success can be learned and applied elsewhere, she said.

The Institute, a research division of the Westinghouse Electric Co., published the report Monday. The report looks at infant deaths in more than 100 developing nations, and compared them with three developed

nations, Sweden, Japan and the United States.

The United Nations estimates that about 2 billion babies will be born during the 15 years, 1.8 billion of them in the so-called developing world. Of the 244.6 billion under-5 children who will die at current mortality rates, 239.7 million will be from the developing nations, the study concludes.

But 65.3 million of those deaths could be prevented by meeting a series of targets for various nations to lower their infant and child mortality rates by the year 2000, the report says.

"We know a lot about what needs to be done" to lower the rates, explained population expert Katrina Galway of the Institute's Demographic Data for Development Project.

The immediate need is for an organized approach to the problem so that national and international policy makers can target the methods to avoid these deaths, she said.

DEAR DR. GOTT — I'm 5 feet 3 and weigh 180. I've tried everything from diet pills to a dozen weight-loss groups. My husband has given me an ultimatum. He says if I really loved him I could lose weight, and if I don't get it off in the next 12 months, he'll leave me. What can I do?

DEAR READER — Ultimatums are often hard to deal with, they give either or options, neither of which may be appropriate.

For example, your husband probably is incorrect in assuming that if you loved him, you would trim down. You undoubtedly do love him — and can't lose weight. Therefore, the lose-weight-or-else doctrine is both scary and unreasonable.

Your best approach would be to put yourself under the care of a doctor. There may be a metabolic abnormality underlying your weight problem, or you may need evaluation by obesity specialists at a teaching hospital to which the doctor can refer you.

You also may need some counseling to help you to manage stress, self-image problems, and your husband's demands.

In addition, you may want to look into some marriage counseling. If your husband agrees to go with you, he may learn more effective ways to handle his anger and the grandiose concept that he is in control of your life. Someone should point out to him the corollary of his statement: If he loved you, he would stick with you regardless of your weight.

For most obese people, help is available. I believe that you will feel relieved at getting that help from a reputable medical source. At the same time, the dynamics of your marriage need attention, too.

Conservation groups disagree

Report claims erosion doesn't hurt production

WASHINGTON (AP) — A new report by Agriculture Department economists is stirring disbelief among conservation groups with its claim that U.S. farm productivity is not seriously threatened by soil erosion.

More than 5 billion tons of U.S. soil are stripped away each year, including more than 3 billion tons from cropland, the department's Economic Research Service said Tuesday.

"Despite the magnitude of these

numbers, this erosion does not pose a serious threat to the United States' ability to produce food and fiber," the report said. "However, erosion is a serious problem in some locales. The on-site costs of erosion exceed \$1 billion per year, but the off-site costs

borne by the general economy are several times greater."

Bob Gray, director of public policy for the American Farmland Trust, a non-profit conservation organization, said the ERS apparently had used a "limited model" for its productivity research, adding: "No wonder no one pays any attention to ERS."

Gray said when told of the report that its conclusions about farm productivity must not have been based

on solid information. "I'm wondering where they are," he said. "They're kind of back in the Stone Age on this."

The report was included in the April issue of Agricultural Outlook magazine, published by the research service.

Erosion is the wearing away of land surface by running water, wind, ice or other natural agents. At first,

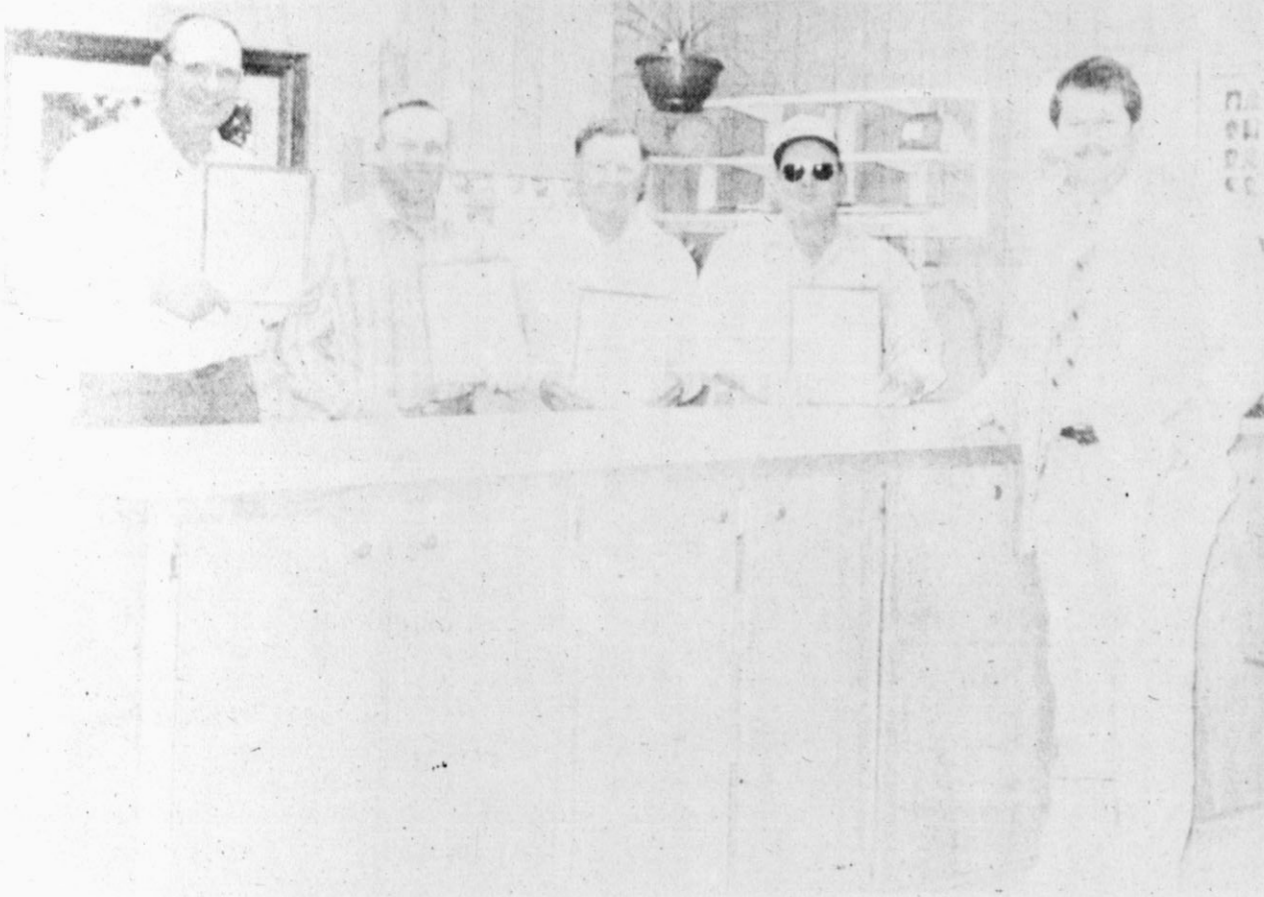
there is "sheet" erosion that removes a thin layer of soil. Runoff water soon converges into rivulets and small channels called "rills."

When rills merge and form larger water flows, they become gullies or stream banks.

Erosion from wind is more dire 44 percent, or 185 million acres, are eroding fast enough to "eventually impair productivity."

"The potential long-term loss of productivity on a national level appears to be low," the report said. "Estimates (by the agency) show that if the present levels of wind and sheet and rill erosion continue for another 100 years, productivity on the soils with the highest erosion problems nationwide might decline only about 4 percent."

The report added: "When the acres on which erosion is not a serious problem are included, the average productivity loss on all agricultural land from another 100 years of erosion at current rates would be less than 3 percent."

Study recommends groundwater districts

AUSTIN (AP) — A report recommends that local and regional groundwater districts should be created in areas that rely on groundwater, with these districts developing groundwater-protection plans and rules for preventing contamination and depletion.

Saying that "once the well is poisoned, it's too late," State Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower released the task force report on Monday.

"Preventing contamination in the first place is the only workable approach to maintaining a fresh, clean groundwater supply," said Hightower, chairman of the 29-member panel of citizens and public officials.

According to the report, 60 percent of all fresh water now consumed in Texas, including 40-50 percent of the drinking water supply, is pumped from underground.

"Nowhere is groundwater more crucial than in rural areas," the

report says. Nearly three million Texans depend for their drinking water on private wells (1.1 million) or on groundwater supplied by rural water associations or other small systems (1.8 million), according to the Texas Water Development Board.

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
